We're excited to share that the Springboard Internship Program officially kicked off this June, now in its fifth year!

This public service internship places Antioch youth ages 16–18 — yessss-juniors and seniors in high school -- who either live in or attend school in Antioch — in departments across the City of Antioch.

This year, we received nearly 200 applications for just 34 available placements — an incredible response that highlights the growing interest in public service among our young people.



NEIGHBORHOOD CLEANUPS

Over the last several years, the City of Antioch's Code Enforcement Division has held annual "neighborhood cleanup" events at various city facilities in Antioch. These events are a partnership between the City of Antioch and Republic Services to assist residents with free, lawful disposal of unwanted household items. It is anticipated that these events reduce the occurrences of illegal dumping, since unwanted items are disposed of properly, and the number of reports to the Code Enforcement Division for junk/rubbish accumulation on private property is reduced.

Keep an eye on your mailbox for your invitation flyer from Republic Services to your Neighborhood-specific event!
Events are held during the months of March through October, and you will need to bring your invitation flyer with you to gain access to the event and dispose of your unwanted household items at no charge.
