RECOMMENDATION

Provide direction and feedback to staff regarding the budget information provided at this meeting.

SUMMARY

This session will address all remaining funds of the City not previously presented and included in the following fund types: Special Revenue Funds, Capital Projects Funds, Internal Service Funds, Enterprise Funds. The 5 Year Capital Improvement Program will be presented as well.

BACKGROUND

The following fund categories are presented in detail by fund in the attached study session document:

SPECIAL REVENUE FUNDS - This type of fund is generally used to collect revenues that are restricted as to how those funds might be spent. The City of Antioch also uses this type of fund to document revenue that is intended for a specific City program or service. A majority of the Special Revenue Funds have been presented to Council in previous study sessions. The Gas Tax, Traffic Signal and Measure J funds are presented during this study session as they account for capital projects throughout the City.

CAPITAL PROJECTS FUNDS – This type of fund accounts for capital projects being done by the City. The Residential Development Allocation and Hillcrest Bridge Capital Projects Funds have already been presented and are not part of this discussion.

INTERNAL SERVICE FUNDS - Internal Service Funds are used to account for the financing of goods or services provided by these funds to other departments on a cost reimbursement basis.

ENTERPRISE FUNDS - these types of funds are operated in a manner similar to a private enterprise. These funds should be self supporting through fees paid by the users of the service. The Prewett Park Enterprise Fund was presented at a prior study session and is not part of this discussion.

Water and Sewer Fund budget projections include rate increases as proposed in the Master Fee Schedule being presented to Council on May 28, 2013. Any revisions to these rates that may occur with approval of the Master Fee will be incorporated into the final budgets presented to Council on June 25th. The impact of not adopting the increased fees is detailed in the study session document attached.

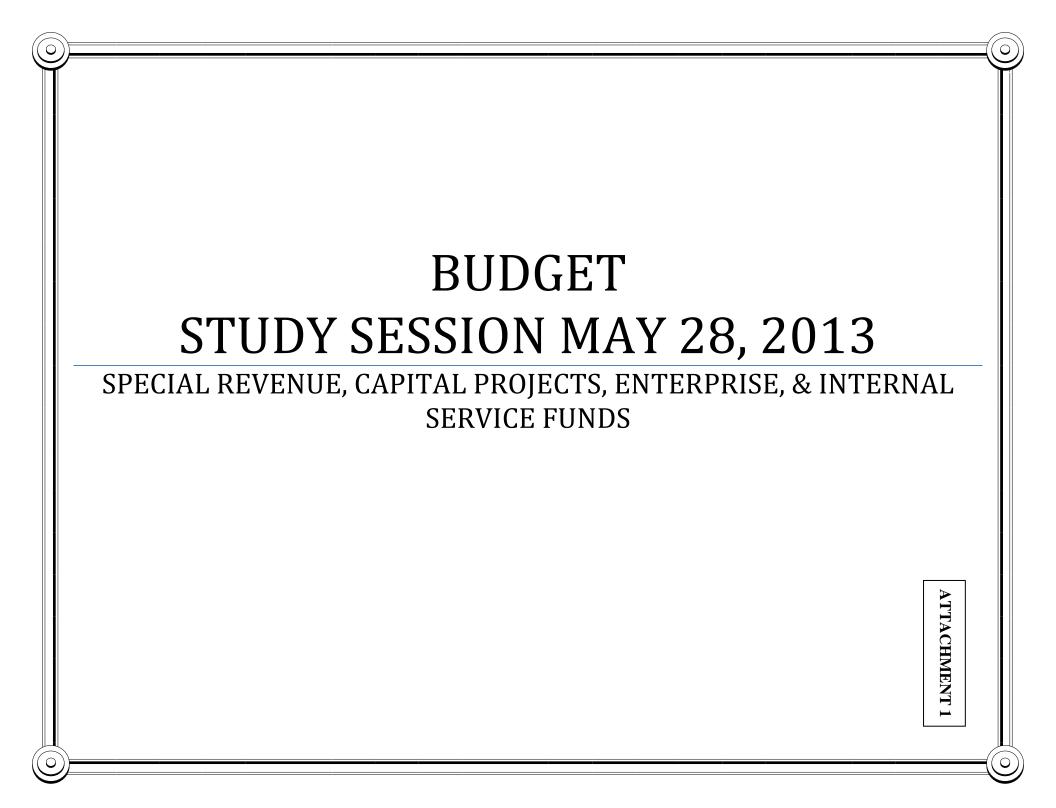
A budget item to highlight pertains to the Marina Fund. On May 1, 2013, the State Department of Finance (DOF) ordered the City as Successor Agency to reverse \$768,958 in transfers made to the Marina Fund since January 1, 2011 and remit the funds to the County Auditor-Controller for distribution to the taxing entities. We are challenging this decision, but the fiscal year 2013 budget reflects the relinquishment of the funds and a transfer in of \$284,222 from the General Fund. These funds were being set aside pending the outcome of the DOF review. Due to the loss of these monies and rental income from the restaurant located at the Marina, capital projects in fiscal year 2014 have been reduced as not enough funding exists. For future budgeting years, the City will need to evaluate operations at the Marina and bring expenditures in line with projected revenues while maintaining adequate reserves for emergencies.

5 YEAR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

The 5 Year Capital Improvement Program for 2013-2018 is being presented for review and discussion by the City Council. It was presented to the Planning Commission on May 15th. The budgets in the study session document incorporate the fiscal year 2014 and 2015 capital projects as presented in the document.

CAPITAL PROJECTS FUNDS

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT FUND 311 – This fund records all revenues, expenditures, assets and liabilities associated with City capital projects. It accounts for resources used to construct or acquire capital assets and make capital improvements. It was established in 1987 to set aside money from the General Fund for any capital improvement project not provided for in one of the other funds. The City can transfer General Fund dollars to this fund as needed. The Measure WW division was established in FY11 to account for projects approved under Measure WW grant funding. The Energy Efficiency & Conservation division was established in FY11 to account for PG&E rebate funds received from the Honeywell Retro Fit project used for energy efficiency and conservation programs.

CITY OF ANTIOCH 5 YEAR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM 2013–2018

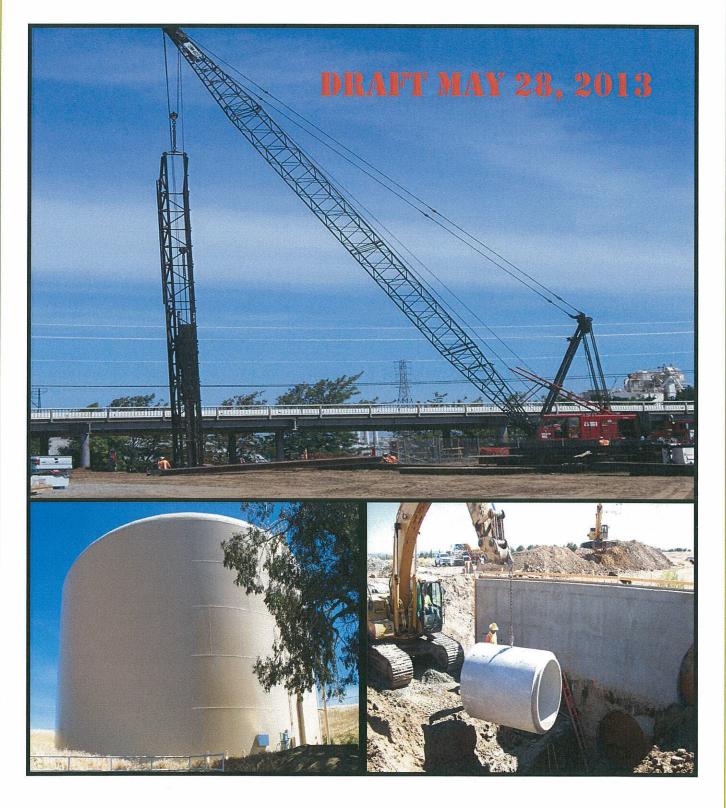


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CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM OVERVIEW

1. PROGRAM OBJECTIVE

The City of Antioch's Capital Improvement Program (CIP) primary objectives are to provide professional and technical engineering services and support to all City Departments related to facility expansions and improvements, infrastructure rehabilitation and development, and to provide leadership in implementing Federal, State and Local programs.

The CIP relates the City's annual capital expenditures to a long-range plan for public improvements. California Government Code Section 66002 requires local agencies that have developed a fee program to adopt a CIP indicating the approximate location, size and timing of projects, in addition to an estimate for the cost of all facilities or improvements to be financed by fees.

The Capital Budget document is different from the Operating Budget document, but the two budgets are closely linked. The Capital Improvement Budget, as distinguished from the Operating Budget, is used as a planning tool by the City to identify specific Capital Improvement needs consistent with the financing and timing of those needs in a way that assures the most responsible and efficient use of resources.

Projects within the City's CIP are allocated over five years using both existing and projected revenue sources. The CIP staff plans for and designs infrastructure specifications and bid documentations, and provides project management and oversight during and after construction.

The CIP is a five-year plan to guide the construction or acquisition of capital improvements, and includes the capital budget for the upcoming fiscal years, which is a one-year authorization from the City Council to expend dedicated revenues for specified projects. Prior to adoption by the City Council each year, the CIP is reviewed by the City's Planning Commission to assure its consistency with the City's current General Plan.

The five-year CIP is reviewed annually to enable the City Council to reassess projects in the program. Staff continues to prioritize the five-year CIP projects taking into account the City's continued reductions of incoming revenues for several project categories. Project expenditures for outlying years beyond the one-year approval are provided in the CIP for planning purposes only and do not reflect a Council commitment of funds.

2. <u>CIP PROCESS</u>

The CIP is developed as a coordinated effort between the CIP staff, the Director of Public Works/City Engineer, and the Director of Finance.

The annual CIP process begins with a memo and a CIP Project Request form sent out to all City departments and City Council members requesting proposals and requests for capital projects to staff for consideration and inclusion in the CIP with their annual operating requests. New CIP project requests are evaluated and prioritized based on goals and objectives of the City Council, as well as available funding, consequences of not completing the project, and the impacts on the operating budget. Some projects have specified funding sources, such as assessment districts, Federal and State grants or special fees.

The draft CIP is prepared by Capital Improvement staff and reviewed by the Finance Department Director and the Director of Public Works/City Engineer before being circulated and presented to the Planning Commission, the Parks & Recreation Commission, the Economic Development Commission and the City Council as part of the annual review. The final CIP budget is presented to the City Council in June and is adopted concurrently with the annual operating budget.

3. CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM CATEGORIES

The program is divided into six major categories:

• Community Facilities

This category includes new and renovated public buildings as well as the Marina. The majority of the projects in this category are located in the City's former redevelopment areas.

• Parks & Trails

This category includes improvements and renovations for local and community parks, open space, and trails in the City.

Roadway Improvements

This category includes new streets, street widening, street rehabilitation, grade separations, bridges, the overlay program, sidewalk repair program, and the City's Pavement Management System.

• **Traffic Signals** This category includes new traffic signals and signal modifications throughout the City.

Wastewater and Storm Drain Systems

This category includes extensions, replacements, rehabilitations and reroutes of the sewer and storm drain system.

Water Systems

This category includes projects related to the Water Treatment Plant, new water lines, and repairs to existing lines.

4. <u>READING THE CIP PROGRAM</u>

In order to facilitate the use of the CIP binder, it is divided into categories. The following category references are of special interest:

- "Program Categories" contains a summary of each project by category and contains a project number, project name and funding source. It also provides a subtotal of expenditures for each category.
- "Project Details" lists projects sorted by project number in numerical order and contains detailed information for each project, such as project location, project description and project justification.

5. SOURCE OF FUNDING FOR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS

Many of the CIP projects are funded from restricted funding sources.

5.1 CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT FUND

This fund was established to set aside money from the General Fund for any Capital Improvement project not provided for in one of the other funds, such as parks and community facilities improvement projects. Revenue sources for this fund are annexation fees and the proceeds of sales of surplus properties. The City may transfer General Fund dollars to the Capital Improvement Fund as funding becomes available. Decisions to transfer funds from various funding sources to the Capital Improvement Fund are made annually.

5.2 GAS TAX FUND

The City receives gas tax funds from the State of California, as provided by the State Street and Highways Code. The gas tax funds are limited to research, planning, construction, improvement, maintenance, and operation of public streets. The city also uses these funds to pay for maintenance and operation of streetlights.

5.3 LOW AND MODERATE INCOME HOUSING FUND

This fund was for the Redevelopment tax increment, which no longer exists, due to the dissolution of Redevelopment.

5.4 MARINA FUND

This fund accounts for the operation of the City's Marina and the Fulton Shipyard Boat Ramp. Funds are collected from lease agreements, berth rentals and launch fees.

5.5 MEASURE "J" RETURN TO SOURCE

The source of money for this fund is the voter approved one-half cent sales tax. Provided the City has complied with the Growth Management Program, each year the City receives return to source funding from the Contra Costa Transportation Authority to be used for transportation improvement and maintenance projects.

5.6 MELLO ROOS FUND

Formed in 1989, the Mello-Roos District (District) is a joint agreement between the Antioch Unified School District (AUSD) and City. This fund is for the construction of eight AUSD schools and new facilities at the Prewett Family Water Park. Funds for the District come from a fee assessed on each new home located primarily in the Southeast Area. The fees, which are based on the square footage of each home, are used to pay off construction bonds used to finance the District's construction projects.

5.7 TRAFFIC SIGNAL FUND

Fees are collected from developers to fund offsite traffic signals.

5.8 WATER & SEWER RELATED RESERVE FUNDS

The City collects user fees and developer fees to fund offsite water and sewer facility improvements. The fees are placed into one of the following four funds:

Water Fund Sewer Fund Water Facilities Expansion Fund Sewer Facilities Expansion Fund

5.9 NATIONAL POLLUTANT DISCHARGE ELIMINATION SYSTEM FUND

NPDES- The National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System was mandated by the Clean Water Act of 1987 to reduce storm water related pollution. The program is funded by a parcel assessment.

6. <u>GRANTS FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES</u>

CMAQ - Congestion Mitigation Air Quality funds are federal funds used to reduce emission from vehicle travel and provide alternatives to driving alone. Signal timing is another example of emission reduction.

HBRR - Highway Bridges Repair and Replacement. This money is for renovation and replacement of substandard bridges only.

CDBG - Community Development Block Grant Fund. This fund accounts for grant funds received from the Federal Government for the purpose of developing community programs and urban renewal projects.

HES - Hazard Elimination Safety. These funds are available for upgrading high accident locations on major arterial.

TEA 21-Transportation Equity Act for the 21st Century is a six-year program that provides the state and the local governments funding for transportation improvement and roadway rehabilitation projects.

RTSOP - Regional Traffic Signalization and Operations Program provides funds for traffic signal system projects. The purpose of the program is to support projects that reduce congestion and automobile emissions.

TDA - Transportation Development Act provides state funding, from sales taxes, to each county and city, for transit operations and bicycle facilities.

TFCA- Transportation Fund for Clean Air. Funding under this program is intended to support projects contributing to a reduction in vehicle emissions. Local governments are eligible to apply for TFCA-Regional funds from the Bay Area Air Quality Management District.

BTA -The Bicycle Transportation Account (BTA) provides state funds for city and county projects that improve safety and convenience for bicycle commuters.

SR2S - Safe Routes to School. The program provides funding for construction projects near schools, with the intent of increasing pedestrian and bicyclist safety and improving the environment for non-motorized transportation to and from school.

Measure WW Park Bond Funding - The East Bay Regional Park District has enacted Measure WW. This Park Bond Measure provides funds for the acquisition, renovation and development of neighborhood, community, regional parks and recreation lands and facilities. These fund allocations are available to municipalities over the next 10 years. The City of Antioch's share of allocations is approximately \$4.5 million.

Proposition 1B - As approved by the voters in the November 2006 general elections, Proposition 1B enacts the Highway Safety, Traffic Reduction, Air Quality, and Port Security Bond Act of 2006 to authorize \$19.925 billion of state general obligation bonds for specified purposes, including high-priority transportation corridor improvements, State Route 99 corridor enhancements, trade infrastructure and port security projects, school bus retrofit and replacement purposes, state transportation improvement program augmentation, transit and passenger rail improvements, state-local partnership transportation projects, transit security projects, local bridge seismic retrofit projects, highway-railroad grade separation and crossing improvement, congestion relief and traffic safety.

DBAW Grant - State Department of Boating and Waterways (DBAW) may grant funds to a county, city, district, or other public agency for the construction and development of small craft launching facilities.

Proposition 1E Storm Water Flood Management Grant - The storm water management portion of Proposition 1E is designed for projects that manage storm water runoff to reduce flooding and are ready, or nearly ready to proceed to implementation. The Storm Water Flood

Management Grants are being disbursed to local agencies through the Integrated Regional Water Management (IRWM) Grant program and provides a 50 percent cost match for the project.

7. <u>ROADWAY MAINTENANCE PROJECTS</u>

In addition to the City's Capital Improvement Program funds allocated to roadway improvements projects, the City's Street Maintenance Division also contributes to roadway improvements each fiscal year by using gas tax revenue to resurface neighborhood streets, and repairing or paving utility service cuts and utility trenches.

The work is performed using a combination of City public work forces and private contractors as part of the City's local street and utility maintenance programs.

STUDY SESSION - SPECIAL MEETING

1. PRESENTATION AND DISCUSSION OF BUDGET DEVELOPMENT FOR THE GENERAL FUND, RECREATION AND ANIMAL SERVICES SPECIAL REVENUE FUNDS AND PREWETT PARK ENTERPRISE FUND FOR THE 2013-14 FISCAL YEAR

Finance Director Merchant gave a brief overhead presentation and presented the staff report dated April 16, 2013 recommending the City Council provide direction and feedback.

Mayor Harper thanked Finance Director Merchant for the comprehensive report.

City Manager Jakel clarified the Building Inspector position was driven by a significant increase in development activity. He added the City's preference would be to contract services from a neighboring agency.

2A.01 05-28-13 Finance Director Merchant added there was money in the current year budget for a contract building official so the net impact of the position would be less. Additionally, she noted building permit revenue had risen significantly, which helped fund the position.

Councilmember Tiscareno thanked Chief Cantando for the report and engaging the community in efforts to reduce crime.

Councilmember Agopian thanked Chief Cantando for the presentation, his recruitment efforts, and engaging the community in efforts to reduce criminal activity. He cautioned that while the report was positive, it was in comparison to one of the worst years of crime increases.

Mayor Harper expressed concern that if Police Officers continued working overtime, it would result in more injuries and fatigue. He noted they City needed the communities help moving forward.

<u>Item L</u> – Dave McNabb, McNabb Construction Inc., reported that he had investigated the submissions by H&H Construction and one of the homeowner projects had never been constructed. He discussed the importance of child safety for playgrounds.

Public Works Director/City Engineer Bernal reported staff was satisfied that the contractor and his subcontractor had satisfied the requirement for having completed public projects of both construction and poured and placed mats within the last two (2) years.

In response to Council, Public Works Director/City Engineer Bernal stated staff did not verify the personal residence projects' being that they were not a requirement for the bid. He noted Leathers and Associates would be supervising construction.

In response to Council, Information Services Director Barton, responded that he would have the security camera vendor look at the site to determine what equipment would be needed and quote the project.

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Councilmember Agopian felt staff should research to determine if all the information provided by H&H Construction was accurate.

Councilmember Tiscareno stated that with Leather and Associates overseeing the project, he felt the project could be completed efficiently with H&H Construction.

A motion by Councilmember Tiscareno to award the bid to H&H Construction and rejecting the bid protest, died for the lack of a second.

City Attorney Nerland explained the manner in which the Public Hearing would be conducted.

3. ANNUAL COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT (CDBG) ACTION PLAN FUNDING

Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Consultant Teri House presented the staff report dated April 15, 2013 recommending the City Council: 1) Approve the funding recommendations of the CDBG subcommittee, and approve the Resolution reflecting the final recommendations and adopting the draft Fiscal Year (FY) 2013-14 Action Plan. 2) Approve the recommendation of the CDBG subcommittee to modify the funding cycles within each Five Year Consolidated Plan so that the first funding cycle covers two years and the second cycle covers the remaining three years of the Consolidated Plan, as is being considered by all Contra Costa CDBG/HOME Consortium jurisdictions.

In response to Councilmember Agopian, CDBG Consultant House stated she would provide Council with an annual report indicating what had been accomplished during the program year.

In response to Mayor Harper, CDBG Consultant House clarified in the future, if more grant funds became available, Council could consider modifying the grant length to consider more providers.

Mayor Harper opened the public hearing.

Willie Mims, East County NAACP and Black Political Association, questioned if the programs funded had been evaluated by the Council or City Staff to determine if they had been successful.

CDBG Consultant House responded that all the proposals and agencies funded undergo extensive quarterly evaluations to assure they are performing well.

Mayor Harper closed the public hearing.

Councilmembers Wilson and Tiscareno discussed the methodology used to determine the recommended length for the grant cycle.

On motion by Councilmember Tiscareno, seconded Councilmember Agopian, the City Council unanimously 1) Approved the funding recommendations of the CDBG subcommittee and approved the resolution reflecting the final recommendations and adopted the draft Fiscal Year (FY) 2013-14 Action Plan. 2) Approved the recommendation of the CDBG subcommittee to modify the funding cycles within each Five Year Consolidated Plan so that the first funding cycle cover two years and the second cycle cover the remaining three years of the Consolidated Plan, as is being considered by all Contra Costa CDBG/HOME Consortium jurisdictions.

4. COMMUNITY SUPERVISION PROGRAMS

Councilmember Rocha recused herself from this Item due to potential conflict of interest related to her employer being involved with the services to be provided to AB 109 formerly incarcerated individuals and left the Council Chambers.

City Attorney Nerland reported there was a supplemental staff report on the dais this evening and copies were available for the public in Council Chambers. She noted subsequent to the City's supplemental staff report, the ACLU sent a letter at 5:30 P.M., dated April 23, 2013, which was also on the dais.

Community Development Director Wehrmeister presented the staff report dated April 23, 2013 recommending the City Council: 1) Motion to read the Interim Zoning Ordinance and Regular Ordinance by title only: 2) Motion to extend the Interim Urgency Ordinance regulating Community Supervision Programs including the findings for the need for this urgency action (4/5 vote required) (Revised attachment A); 3) Motion to introduce a Regular Ordinance amending Section 9-5.203 and adding Section 9-5.3836 to the Antioch Municipal Code dealing with Community Supervision Programs. Staff was proposing some modifications to the ordinance that the Planning Commission unanimously recommended adopting on April 17, 2013. Staff's recommendations were shown in redline to the Planning Commission's recommended ordinance The Community Development Director explained that the issue of (Revised attachment B). location of service providers for previously incarcerated individuals arose when such a use planned to locate next to the Nick Rodriguez Senior Center and Community Center and the County Probation Department ignored the City's concerns about that location. There was never an effort to ban the uses, but simply to find appropriate locations both from the perspective of public safety and the success of the programs in decreasing the high recidivism rates among this

population. Following a public hearing, the Planning Commission made a recommendation about the location of these uses, which the staff recommendation has further refined. Accordingly, the staff recommendation is that the Community Supervision Program uses be allowed in any zone where Business and Professional Offices are permitted or conditionally permitted, but be subject to a use permit if the zone requires a use permit or if located within 1500 feet of a public or private school, park, recreation center, senior age restricted living facility or other Community Supervision Program.

The Mayor opened the public hearing.

Iris Archuleta, Antioch resident, stated that the organization she co-founded, Youth Intervention Network (YIN) had submitted a proposal to provide services and she felt the ordinance was premature as it would come prior to the development of a strategic plan. She believed that individuals that would utilize services under AB 109 would be self-electing to do so in an effort to help reintegrate into the community. She stated she hoped decisions made regarding this ordinance were not driven by fear prior to Council receiving the facts.

Terry Rosevelt discussed the importance of Community Supervision Programs noting he had selfselected to participate in the rehabilitation programs, upon his release back into the community after 18 years in prison.

Micaela Davis, representing the Northern California ACLU, summarized a letter submitted to Council which urged them to reject the proposal to extend the interim ordinance and the proposal to introduce the regular ordinance.

Willie Mims, representing the East County NAACP, expressed concern regarding the ordinance. He urged the City Council to reject it noting it could violate issues of environmental justice and put a barrier in place to these services.

No other individuals wishing to provide public comment, Mayor Harper closed the public hearing.

In response to Council, Community Development Director Wehrmeister provided a map of the zoning districts and the 1500 foot buffer area around the defined "sensitive uses" in the proposed ordinance. She noted there were many areas that would permit professional offices, by right, that were not located within the buffer. Copies of the map were made available to the public.

City Attorney Nerland clarified that the question presented this evening was whether uses that provide services to individuals who had previously been incarcerated and were on probation or parole services would require a conditional use permit, if located within 1500 feet of the sensitive uses. She added this use would require a conditional use permit only in locations where other business or professional uses required a use permit or where they were within 1500 feet of the sensitive uses.

In response to Councilmember Agopian, Community Development Director Wehrmeister provided a map of the Tri-Delta Transit system map. Copies of the transit map were made available to the public.

Councilmember Agopian stated he intended to ensure parolees had access to vital services and wanted to provide good quality I areas for those services to be located. Thus, access to public transportation was important and still provided with the proposed ordinance. He did not believe that the Council's zoning action made access to services more difficult. He acknowledged staff for being flexible and responding to the stakeholders.

Councilmember Tiscareno clarified his intent was to support the services for parolees and the goal was to look at a strategic plan to locate them in areas that would set the programs up for the highest success rate. He gave the example that it may not help success of these programs if located next to a bar given the issues raised about substance abuse being a challenge faced by some parolees.

Councilmember Wilson applauded the efforts of Mr. Rosevelt for self-selecting to participate in rehabilitation programs. She stated her intent was to provide local resources for parolees to ensure success. She expressed concern that delaying action on this item may cause services to seek locations in other communities.

In response to a question from Councilmember Wilson, Captain McConnell stated successful reentry services appropriately located would be an asset from the Police Department's perspective. He reported that they had collaborated with the Community Development Director with regard to the recommended action this evening.

Mayor Harper reopened the public hearing to allow the representative from County Supervisor Glover to speak, given that the Supervisor had sent a letter previously regarding the City's proposed ordinance but had not chosen to speak during the public comments.

David Fraser, Chief of Staff to Supervisor Glover, stated the Supervisor and staff were supportive of changes made in response to their previous concerns. He expressed concern that obtaining a use permit would be cost prohibitive for non-profits because of the \$2000 deposit for staff time required of all use permits in the City.

Ed Diokno, Senior Policy Advisor to Supervisor Glover, suggested Council choose a 500 foot radius around sensitive uses. He acknowledged that recidivism rates were high in the 75% range; however, it was based on parolees who had not participated in rehabilitation programs. He reminded Council that parolees currently living in the community, received services from existing agencies.

Lamar Thorpe, Antioch resident and member of Economic Development Commission, then asked to speak and cautioned the Council in creating innuendos regarding the services. He noted that there would be women who were on probation or parole, who were the caretakers of children. He

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added that access was also making sure Antioch received community members back into the City and provided them with services they deserved.

Jennifer Costa, representing Rubincon Programs, reported they had been very successful at providing reentry programs for the previously incarcerated in Antioch. She urged the City Council to consider that they had been providing services with no need for limitations and cautioned that in many cases, transportation was an issue. She invited the Council to visit their office and meet with clients. She spoke to their desire to be a permanent program for the Antioch community.

Jessie Warner, Contra Costa County Reentry Coordinator, stated she was available to answer any questions regarding the AB109 programs, Probation Department's role, and the services. She discussed the importance of a regional approach and noted by creating the opportunity for the County and Cities to provide resources, the State had given local jurisdictions the chance to reduce recidivism.

Mayor Harper thanked all the speakers for their comments and closed the public hearing again. He voiced his support for the ordinance noting he had a mandate to protect the public safety, which included assuring these types of programs were not located adjacent to sensitive uses.

Councilmember Agopian indicated his desire to set these programs up for success and wondered about changing the buffer zone radius from 1500 feet to 1000 feet.

At the Councilmember Agopian's request, Director of Community Development Wehrmeister provided a map of the zoning districts and the 1000 foot buffer area around sensitive uses. Copies of this map were provided to the public.

Following discussion, the City Council supported providing services in areas where those who participate, would be successful. They agreed to change the radius requirement to a 1000 foot buffer around sensitive uses. They affirmed that there had been no intent to restrict or ban reentry services. They spoke to their desire to continue working with the organizations providing reentry services to insure success.

ORDINANCE 2064 C-S

On motion by Councilmember Agopian, seconded by Councilmember Wilson, the City Council unanimously 1) Read the Interim Zoning Ordinance and Regular Ordinance by title only; 2) Extended the Interim Urgency Ordinance regulating Community Supervision Programs including the findings for the need of this urgency action (revised Attachment A to reflect the language in the proposed regular ordinance and changing the proposed 1500-foot buffer to 1000- foot buffer); 3) Introduced a Regular Ordinance amending Section 9-5.203 and adding Section 9-5.3836 to the Antioch Municipal Code dealing with Community Supervision Programs per revised Attachment B to include a provision allowing the Planning Commission or City Council to grant relief from the requirements and changing the proposed 1500-foot buffer to 1000-foot buffer.

Mayor Harper, on behalf of the City Council, reiterated that they had no intent to ban the program and they would remain flexible and continue to work with individuals that oversee supervision programs.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Jim Boccio invited the City Council to visit the Bedford Center from 11:00 A.M. – 2:00 P.M, to observe the services they provide the community.

Willie Mims suggested City Council consider utilizing bid savings from the playground rebuild to install lights in the park. He expressed concern that staff had provided attachments to the staff report at the meeting, which had not been given the Council in sufficient time to study the information. He questioned why the map attachments and supplemental staff reports were not made available to the public, in a timely manner.

STAFF COMMUNICATIONS

City Manager Jakel announced Wilbur Avenue would be closed for construction between Apollo Court and Viera Avenue from 7:00 A.M. – 7:00 P.M., Monday through Friday, beginning April 29, 2013 and ending on or before May 10, 2013. He noted the next City Council meetings would be held on May 14 and May 28, 2013.

COUNCIL COMMUNICATIONS

Councilmember Wilson reported on her attendance at the Assembly in Sacramento, on behalf of the City of Antioch, in support of AB935.

Councilmember Agopian reported on his attendance at the Showcase of the Schools.

Councilmember Tiscareno reported on his attendance at the Showcase of the Schools. He thanked Councilmember Agopian for attending a meeting at Knoll Park to discuss some issues of concern with residents.

Mayor Harper thanked the City Council for their thoughtful input and staff for their professionalism this evening.

ADJOURNMENT

With no further business, Mayor Harper adjourned the meeting at 11:06 P.M. to the next regular Council meeting on May 14, 2013.

City Attorney Nerland announced there was a supplemental staff report for Item J on the dais this evening.

On motion by Councilmember Rocha, seconded by Councilmember Tiscareno, the City Council unanimously approved the Council Consent Calendar with the exception of Item I which was removed for further discussion.

Item I – Councilmember Rocha recused herself from this Item and did not vote due to potential conflict of interest related to her employer being involved with the services to be provided to AB 109 formerly incarcerated individuals.

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On motion by Councilmember Agopian, seconded by Councilmember Wilson, the Council approved Item I. The motion carried the following vote:

AYES: Harper, Wilson, Tiscareno, Agopian

COUNCIL REGULAR AGENDA

3. **REVENUE BALLOT MEASURE**

City Manager Jakel presented the staff report and Ruth Bernstein gave a brief overhead presentation of the community survey recommending the City Council motion to receive and file the community survey (Attachment A) and provide direction to staff regarding a revenue ballot measure. Based on the community survey, it is staff's recommendation to place a one-half cent sales tax measure on the November 2013 ballot with a 10-year sunset subject to annual independent audit and a Citizens' Oversight Committee. Staff has made some suggestions regarding the composition of the Citizens' Oversight Committee as discussed later in the report and seeks direction.

In response to Council, Ms. Bernstein clarified the margin of error for the survey was 4.9. She cautioned that their experience had been, when there are multiple measures attempting to accomplish the same goal; it added a level of confusion and difficulty.

Councilmember Agopian stated he was disappointed the survey had not explored the business license tax.

Mayor Harper reported Hans Ho had submitted a ballot measure to the City. He thanked Mr. Ho and those who assisted, for their submission and concern for the community.

Terry Ramos, Antioch resident, spoke in support of a ballot measure proposal for a fee on landlords to address public safety.

Fred Hoskins, Antioch resident, stated he felt the cost of the survey was frivolous and hiring more police officers would not improve public safety. He suggested the Police Department establish a system to test citizens to allow them to protect themselves with small arms. He requested the City Council commit their stipends to cover the cost of the ballot measures.

Gil Murillo, Antioch resident, cautioned that with the potential for a transportation tax measure on the ballot, there could potentially be three competing ballot measures. He spoke in support of a business license tax for rentals and suggested the City focus on being creative in developing revenue streams for the City.

Hans Ho, Antioch resident, spoke in support of the sales tax measure and a companion business tax measure for owners of rental properties, to increase public safety.

Mayor Harper read written comment from Donna Wilson, Antioch resident, who expressed concern a survey of only 400 residents, did not fairly represent the registered voters in Antioch. She also noted she was opposed to a ballot measure to increase sales tax.

Robert Munton, Antioch resident, spoke in support of a ballot measure for a business tax on owners of rental properties.

Joseph Zamora, Antioch resident, spoke in opposition to a ballot measure for a business tax on owners of rental properties.

Donald Freitas, Antioch resident, spoke in support of a landlord rental fee as a means of providing a stable dedicated funding source and a companion sales tax measure to address public safety.

George Briggs, Antioch resident, reviewed his written requests for further details on sales tax and business tax revenues. He stated he felt the survey had not tested a sufficient number of registered voters.

Bill Cook, Antioch resident, stated based on his contact with a large sector of the community; he disagreed with the results of the survey. He noted residents had strongly suggested that they would not support a sales tax measure, unless there was a companion business tax measure for the landlords of rental properties.

City Manager Jakel provided the projected revenue for a sales tax measure and clarified there had been no discussion regarding the reauthorization of the transportation tax.

Ms. Bernstein clarified that 400 interviews was a reasonable and normal sample size for a population similar to Antioch.

Following discussion, the City Council consensus voiced their support for a one-half cent sales tax measure and a complimentary business tax measure for landlords on residential units. They discussed the importance of making the landlord rental fee ballot measure as clear and concise, as possible.

Councilmember Tiscareno stated that he supported both measures; however, he remained concern that if both were on the ballot, it would cause confusion for voters.

Further discussion regarding the revenue ballot measure resulted in Council consensus support for: a citizen oversight committee comprised of seven (7) Antioch residents; annual audit; and the budget reflecting the revenues generated.

Councilmember Agopian suggested the oversight committee include a member of the business community, labor representative, and a member of the Police Crime Prevention Commission.

On motion by Councilmember Tiscareno, seconded by Councilmember Rocha, the Council unanimously directed staff to bring back an ordinance for: (½) one-half cent sales tax over ten (10) years with a seven (7) member oversight board; annual audit; and line item in the City's annual budget shall reflect all revenues generated.

Councilmember Agopian suggested language in the business license tax measure include a freeze on other business licenses for five (5) years and a simple formula to address a reasonable cap on apartment complexes. He suggested, in the future, the City consider an ordinance to address problem businesses in Antioch.

On motion by Councilmember Agopian, seconded by Councilmember Wilson, the Council unanimously directed staff to work with the citizens regarding a business tax on residential landlords.

4. FULTON SHIPYARD BOAT RAMP

Director of Public Works Bernal presented the staff report dated May 9, 2013 recommending the City Council motion to determine if the Fulton Shipyard Boat Ramp was to be closed as recommended by the Antioch Parks and Recreation Commission.

Councilmember Rocha suggested the Fulton Shipyard Boat Ramp be placed in the Capital Improvement Projects (CIP) and Tidelands and WW funds be considered for future improvements.

In response to Councilmember Tiscareno, Director of Public Works Bernal stated he would explore whether the Water staff could be responsible for opening and closing a gate at the Ramp.

Councilmember Agopian thanked staff for the presentation. He proposed a gate, with a pass reader, to be installed to allow annual pass holders access to the secondary launch ramp facility. He suggested looking at the Capital Improvement Program (CIP) to enhance and secure the property. He also supported installing security cameras and stickers being placed on the boat trailers of the annual pass holders.

Director of Public Works Bernal reported a gate, with reader card system, would cost \$50,000 - \$60,000.

Rick Robison and Sheila White, Antioch residents, spoke in support of keeping the Fulton Shipyard Boat Ramp opened and securing it with fencing to prevent criminal activity in the area.

Marty Fernandez, Antioch resident, spoke in support of keeping Fulton Shipyard Boat Ramp opened. He urged the City Council to improve the area and noted that if it were utilized more, criminal activity would decrease. Mayor Harper stated the boat ramp should be placed on the list of Capital Improvement Projects (CIP) and prioritized for the next fiscal year. He suggested the City determine if Tideland Funds could be utilized for improvements and work with the Antioch Police Department on crime prevention through environmental design.

Councilmember Tiscareno discussed the importance of the Antioch Police Department patrolling the area and keeping it active as a way to deter criminal activity.

On motion by Councilmember Agopian, seconded by Councilmember Rocha, the Council unanimously directed staff to leave the boat ramp open; install a gate, with acceptable reader, with main gate lock; and seek funding options.

PUBLIC COMMENTS - None

STAFF COMMUNICATIONS

City Manager Jakel announced the next City Council meeting would be held on May 28, 2013 and the Council would be adjourning to Closed Session immediately following this meeting. He announced NRG had a community improvement day and had made several improvements at the Skate Park, Water Park, and Community Center.

COUNCIL COMMUNICATIONS

Councilmember Agopian reported on his attendance at the Antioch Prayer Breakfast and the Recognition ceremony for the Antioch Police Department.

Councilmember Tiscareno reported on his attendance at the Youth Intervention Network luncheon and Red Day event. He announced Allied Waste was working with the Antioch Police Department and training employees to report criminal activities, in the community. He noted they were looking to expand the program to other businesses in the City.

Councilmember Rocha announced Jr. Giants sign-ups would begin on May 20, 2013 and the Los Medanos Community Health Care District rooftop reception would be held from 5:00 P.M. – 7:00 P.M. on May 29, 2013.

Councilmember Wilson reported on her attendance at the Women's Club luncheon and the Harlem Ambassadors Charity Basketball game.

Following discussion, City Manager Jakel stated there may be a possibility of rescheduling the July 23, 2013 meeting to accommodate Mayor Harper and Councilmember Rocha being out of town at the Transportation Conference. He stated they intended to follow up with the citizens group immediately to determine how to proceed with the business tax measure.

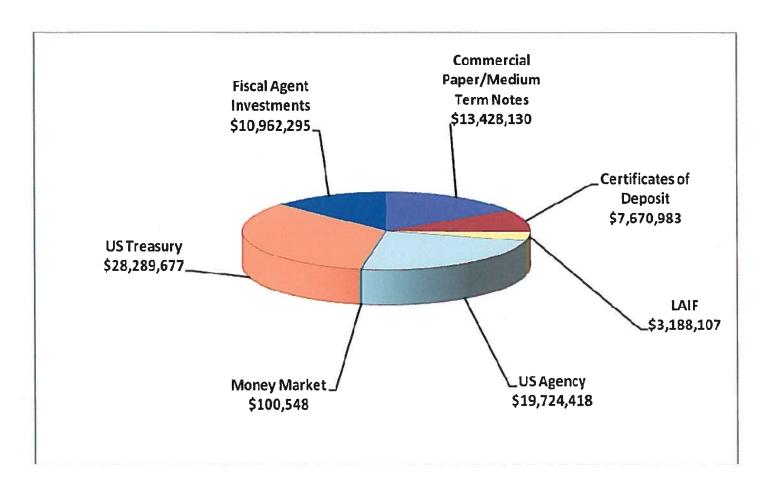

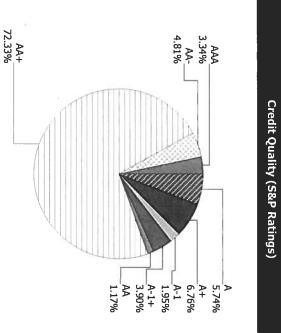

Recommendation

Recommend adopting the resolution establishing the appropriations limit for the 2013-14 Fiscal Year pursuant to California Constitution Article XIII B.

Background Information

The passage of Proposition 4 in November 1979 amended the California Constitution and set appropriations limits for cities. The State-implemented legislation requires cities to annually adopt a resolution establishing the appropriations limit on spending by cities of funds from proceeds of taxes.

<u>Analysis</u>

Statistical information for calculating the City of Antioch's appropriation limit is as follows:

2012-13 Appropriations Limit - \$101,294,059 Per Capita Personal Income - percent increase over previous year 5.12% Population Change - percent increase from previous year 1.12%

Based on the above statistics, the City of Antioch's appropriations limit for 2013-14 is \$107,675,585.

Attached are calculations for previous years.

Financial Impact

The attached resolution establishes a maximum limitation of appropriations of \$107,675,585, which the City cannot exceed. This does not mean the City has revenue sources to meet such a level of appropriation. The City's 2013-14 General Fund budget appropriations subject to this limit are approximately \$68 million below this legal limit.

Subject: Price and Population Information

Appropriations Limit

The California Revenue and Taxation Code, section 2227, mandates the Department of Finance to transmit an estimate of the percentage change in population to local governments. Each local jurisdiction must use their percentage change in population factor for January 1, 2013, in conjunction with a change in the cost of living, or price factor, to calculate their appropriations limit for fiscal year 2013-14. Attachment A provides the change in California's per capita personal income and an example for utilizing the price factor and population percentage change factor to calculate the 2013-14 appropriations limit. Attachment B provides city and unincorporated county population percentage change. Attachment C provides population percentage change for counties and their summed incorporated areas. The population percentage change data excludes federal and state institutionalized populations and military populations.

Population Percent Change for Special Districts

Some special districts must establish an annual appropriations limit. Consult the Revenue and Taxation Code section 2228 for further information regarding the appropriations limit. Article XIII B, section 9(C), of the State Constitution exempts certain special districts from the appropriations limit calculation mandate. The Code and the California Constitution can be accessed at the following website: http://leginfo.legislature.ca.gov/faces/codes.xhtml.

Special districts required by law to calculate their appropriations limit must present the calculation as part of their annual audit. Any questions special districts have on this issue should be referred to their respective county for clarification, or to their legal representation, or to the law itself. No state agency reviews the local appropriations limits.

Population Certification

The population certification program applies only to cities and counties. Revenue and Taxation Code section 11005.6 mandates Finance to automatically certify any population estimate that exceeds the current certified population with the State Controller's Office. **Finance will certify the higher estimate to the State Controller by June 1, 2013**.

Please Note: Prior year's city population estimates may be revised.

The cost of living factor provided here is per capita personal income. If the percentage change in per capita personal income is selected, the percentage change to be used in setting the fiscal year 2013-14 appropriation limit is:

New ADA compliant handicap accessible ramps were constructed at all three locations that the improvements were performed.

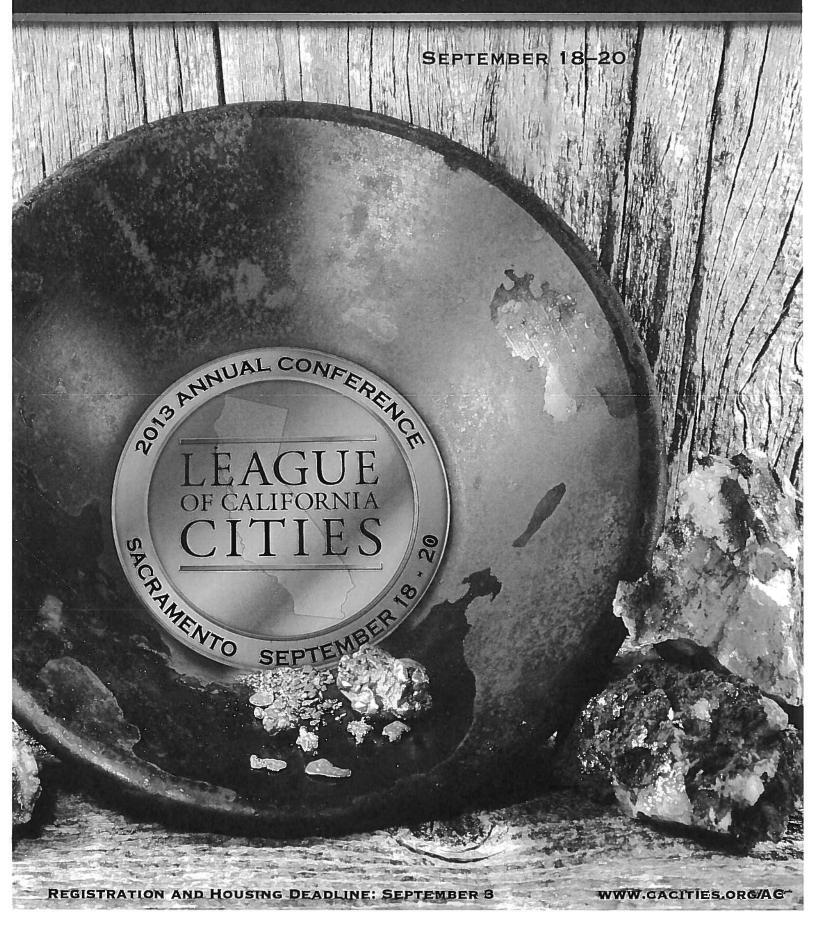

How to Participate in the League's Annual Conference Resolutions Process

Policy development is a key part of the League's legislative effectiveness. The League's Annual Conference Resolutions process is one way city officials can directly participate in the development of League policy. The 2013 Annual Conference Resolution Calendar of Events identifies the key points in the process.

Submission of Resolutions

CITIE

Any elected or appointed city official, individual city, division, department, policy committee, or the board of directors may submit a resolution for consideration at the conference. Resolutions must be submitted to the League's Sacramento office no later than 60 days prior to the opening of the conference. Resolutions should focus on direct municipal issues of statewide importance. Please Note: The League's membership is currently voting on an amendment to the League's Bylaws that would require resolutions submitted to the General Assembly be concurred by five cities or five city officials. The votes will be canvassed by the League's Board of Directors at its April 24-25 Board meeting. If the amendment receives the required 2/3rd vote of those member cities voting, the new requirement will be applied for resolutions submitted to the General Assembly. The League will begin accepting resolutions on May 6.

Consideration at the Conference

The League President refers the resolutions to the League policy committees for review and recommendation at the Conference. Resolutions are next considered by the General Resolutions Committee (GRC), which consists of representatives from each division, department, policy committee and individuals appointed by the League President. Resolutions that are approved by the GRC, and resolutions that are approved by the policy committees, but not approved by the GRC, are next considered by the General Assembly. Resolutions approved by the General Assembly become League policy. Other action on resolutions can be: referred back to a policy committee, amend, disapprove, or no action.

Late-Breaking Issues

Resolutions to address late-breaking issues may be introduced by petition at the Annual Conference. To qualify, a petitioned resolution must be signed by 10 percent of the voting delegates and submitted at least 24 hours before the beginning of the Concluding General Assembly *(Deadline: Noon, Thursday, September 19)*. All qualified petitioned resolutions are forwarded to the General Assembly for consideration, regardless of the action recommended by the GRC.

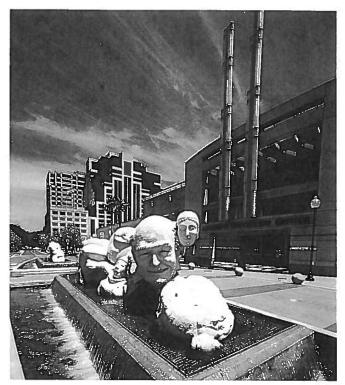

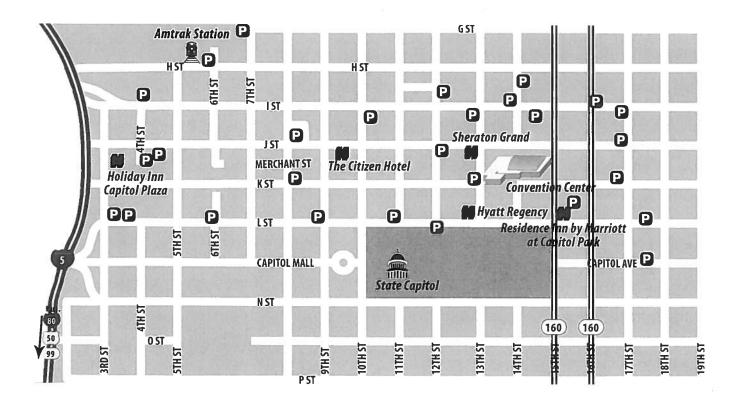

RECOMMENDATION

Adopt the Resolution of the City Council of the City of Antioch Approving Updates to the Master Fee Schedule Effective July 1, 2013.

AMENDMENTS TO THE MASTER FEE

Attachment 2 contains the current Master Fee Schedule. Changes to fees are highlighted and contain strikethroughs and changes/additions in blue throughout the document. The following is a brief summary of changes.

<u>Proposed Police Department Amendments:</u> Police fees have increased in accordance with the San Francisco Area Consumer Price Index. Fees related to card dealers are being eliminated as the State now handles this process. No increases are being proposed for Animal Services.

<u>Proposed Community Development Fee Amendments:</u> Fees have increased in accordance with the San Francisco Area Consumer Price Index.

<u>Proposed Public Works Fee Amendments:</u> A majority of increases are based on the San Francisco Area Consumer Price Index (other than water and sewer rates discussed in the next paragraph). Water and Sewer connection fees are being increased by the Engineering News Record Cost of Construction Index.

Water and sewer rates fee increases for fiscal years 2011 through 2015 were approved by resolutions 2010/44 and 2010/45. When the rate increases were approved in 2010, Council requested a rate review be conducted after two years. This was presented to Council in May 2012 and at that time, Council decided to not implement the recommended rate increases for fiscal year 2013. Staff is recommending the City implement the 6% water rate and 4% sewer rate fee increases as approved in resolutions 2010/44 and 2010/45 for fiscal year 2014 in order to fund staffing, operations and capital improvement projects to the water and sewer utility as outlined in the proposed five year capital improvement program.

<u>Recreation and Community Services:</u> Some rates are increasing to recover actual costs.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

The fee increases will ensure that the City recovers as much of the cost for providing services as possible. Although there have been some reductions in certain staff and benefit costs due to past concessions with the City's labor and bargaining groups, there are still increases in other labor costs, as well as overheard costs such as utilities, such that the Consumer Price Index is an accurate mechanism to use to increase some fees to ensure that they are limited to the reasonable cost of providing services. Recovery of fees is imperative to help overcome the financial challenges we are facing. Departments have incorporated proposed fees into their budgets.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the City Council uphold the Planning Commission's recommendation (7-0) and deny the request for an amendment to City Council Resolution 2001/38 to remove the single-story restriction and allow a two-story home on Lot 4 of the Golden Bow Estates.

REQUEST

Scott Broder requests an amendment to condition of approval number 60e from City Council Resolution 2001/38 to remove the single story restriction from Lot 4 of the Golden Bow Estates. The amendment would allow the construction of a single family home up to 35' in height. The project is located at 3501 Ram Court **(APN: 076-680-004).** (Attachment "A").

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

On May 1, 2013, the Planning Commission heard the subject request and recommended denial of the amendment to the City Council (Attachment "B"). The Planning Commission recommended denial based on several reasons; the first being that the architect indicated during a community meeting that the development would try and use as many single story homes as possible, especially on the north side which abuts existing residences. Further, only three of the twelve lots now have single story restrictions and the Commission felt that to reduce the single-story lot restriction to only two did not seem to meet the intent of the project architect's suggestion to address the neighbor's concerns. Secondly, the privacy concerns expressed by the neighbors during the original approval process were still evident and the Commission did not want to undermine the preceding Commission and Council decision.

In 2001, the City Council approved a tentative subdivision map to subdivide the subject property and the surrounding property into thirteen lots, twelve custom single-family home lots and one lot for a spiritual facility (Attachment "C"). The conditions of approval contained a provision restricting six of the twelve lots to single story homes.

In July of 2003, the applicant requested a one-year extension of the approval for the tentative map (Attachment "D"). The request also included removing the single story restriction on Lots 9, 10, and 11 (Attachment "E"). The request for removal of the single story restriction was based on the new information available at completion of the civil engineering drawings. The final grade for Lots 9, 10, and 11 was lower than originally anticipated and would now allow for the construction of two story homes that would not impact the privacy of the existing residential neighborhood.

The final map was recorded on the property on July 19, 2004. Subsequently, two building permits for homes on Lots 3 and 6 have been issued.

ENVIRONMENTAL

On April 24, 2001, the City Council adopted a Negative Declaration (ND) for this project in conformance with the California Environmental Quality Act. Based on the Initial Study, it was determined that the project was not going to have any impacts to the environment. The project originally contemplated 12 parcels with custom single family homes. A subsequent environmental document does not need to be prepared because 1) no changes to the project are proposed requiring revisions to the previous ND due to the involvement of new significant environmental effects or a substantial increase in the severity of previously identified significant effects, 2) no substantial changes have occurred with respect to the circumstances under which the project is undertaken which will require major revisions of the previous ND due to the involvement of previously identified significant environmental effects or a substantial increase in the severity of previous ND due to the involvement of new significant effects, 2) no substantial changes have occurred with respect to the circumstances under which the project is undertaken which will require major revisions of the previous ND due to the involvement of new significant environmental effects or a substantial increase in the severity of previously identified significant environmental effects or a substantial increase in the severity of previously identified significant environmental effects or a substantial increase in the severity of previously identified significant effects, and 3) no new information of substantial importance, which was not known and could not have been known with the exercise of reasonable diligence or at the time the previous ND was adopted.

ANALYSIS

Issue #1: Project Overview

The applicant is requesting an amendment to the conditions of approval on the tentative map for the Golden Bow Estates (Attachment "F"). The applicant is requesting the single story restriction be removed from Lot 4 to reduce the overall footprint of the house and to provide more space for landscaping. Lot 4 is located on Ram Court and shares a fence with 3330 and a small part of 3326 S. Francisco Way. The subject lot size is approximately 9,351 square feet. The final grade elevation on the subject lot is 106 feet and the adjacent property, 3330 S. Francisco Way, has a finished grade of 98 feet, which is a difference of 8 feet. There is an existing pine tree on the adjacent property with a diameter of 42 feet and an overall height of 65 feet (Attachment "G"). The applicant is proposing a conceptual two story house on Lot 4 with an overall height of 25'4" with an architectural element consisting of a clerestory window for lighting purposes at a height of 30'4".

During the public hearing process for the original approval of the Golden Bow Estates, the architect indicated that during the community meetings, the development would use as many single-story homes as possible, especially on the north end of the site abutting the residential neighborhood (Attachment "H"). There was also a discussion in the minutes from the Planning Commission hearing in regards to the procedure for the individual lot owners to request an amendment to the conditions of approval to build a two-story home if the owners were interested in pursuing removing the one-story restriction.

Based on the 2003 tentative map extension approval, three of the lots had the single-story provision removed, leaving Lots 2, 3, and 4 for single-story homes. The owner of Lot 2 has not been in contact with the City thus far for a building permit and Lot 3 currently has a single story home in the final stages of construction. Lot 6 is under construction with a two-story home.

Issue #2: Land Use

The subject property has a General Plan designation of Medium Low Density Residential and a zoning designation of Planned Development (PD). The surrounding land uses and zoning designations are as noted below:

- North:Single family residential (PD)South:Single family residential Golden Bow Estates (PD)
- East: Dhyanyoga spiritual facility (PD)
- West: Single family residential (PD)

Issue #3: Proposed House Design

The main reason for the single-story restriction on the subject lot was due to neighbor's concerns regarding the loss of privacy and the finished height of the pads. The applicant approached the conceptual design of the home with the intent to mitigate the privacy concerns by having the house constructed on the southern side of the property, recessing the second story, and the planting of nine 36" box coniferous trees. These factors coupled with the existing 65' pine tree and the line of sight study from the north elevation showing a restricted view of the adjacent properties was not enough to alleviate the concerns of the neighbors and the Planning Commission. The pad height for the subject house is 8' higher than the adjacent Lot 697 (3330 S. Francisco Drive), which concerned the Planning Commission regarding the overall height of the two-story home compared to the existing homes on S. Francisco Drive as well as the loss of privacy. Further, the large proposed trees would be planted over an irrigation easement with pipes underground, which raised concerns about the roots causing damage to the pipes. These concerns resulted in the Planning Commission recommending denial of the request to the Council.

lssue #4: Community Response

The response regarding the project from the surrounding community has been mixed. At the Planning Commission hearing two neighbors spoke against the project. One of the neighbors (3326 S. Francisco Street, Lot 696) expressed concerned with the two-story house because of the grade difference between his lot and the subject lot. Within the same vein of comments, the other neighbor (3334 S. Francisco Drive, Lot 698) expressed concern over visual issues and having a large two-story structure behind his house. The resident of 3326 S. Francisco Drive also submitted a letter to the City opposing the proposed project, but would not be in attendance at the City Council meeting (Attachment "I").

Several letters were also submitted in support of the project from the residents of the Golden Bow Estates (Attachment "J"). The project engineer also spoke on behalf of the applicant during the Planning Commission hearing stating he felt that the visual issues had been mitigated appropriately.

- 2. The house on Lot 4 shall be located on the southern portion of the lot as shown on the Broder Residence plans, dated December 20, 2012, with review and approval by staff.
- 3. No balconies shall be constructed on the north elevation of the home on Lot 4.
- 4. Nine (9) or more 36" evergreen box trees shall be planted along the northern and eastern property lines. Placement and species shall be subject to staff review and approval.

Subject: PW 652 – Golden Bow Estates (Dhyanyoga)

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Planning Commission recommend approval to the City Council of an amendment to City Council Resolution 2001/38 to remove the restriction allowing only a single story home on Lot 4 of the Golden Bow Estates.

REQUEST

Scott Broder requests an amendment to condition of approval number 60e from City Council Resolution 2001/38 to remove the single story restriction from Lot 4 of the Golden Bow Estates. The amendment would allow the construction of single family home up to 35' in height. The project is located at 3501 Ram Court (**APN: 076-680-004**). (Attachment A).

BACKGROUND

In 2001, the City Council approved a tentative subdivision map to subdivide the subject property and the surrounding property into thirteen lots, twelve custom single-family home lots and one lot for a spiritual facility (Attachment B). The conditions of approval contained a provision restricting six of the twelve lots to single story homes.

In July of 2003, the applicant requested a one-year extension of the approval for the tentative map (Attachment C). The request also included removing the single story restriction on Lots 9, 10, and 11 (Attachment D). The request for removal of the single story restriction was based on the new information due to the completion of the civil engineering drawings. The final grade for Lots 9, 10, and 11 was lower than originally anticipated and would now allow for the construction of the two story homes that would not impact the privacy of the existing residential neighborhood.

The final map was recorded on the property on July 19, 2004. Subsequently, two building permits for homes on Lots 3 and 6 have been issued.

ENVIRONMENTAL

On April 24, 2001, the City Council adopted a Negative Declaration (ND) for this project in conformance with the California Environmental Quality Act. Based on the Initial Study, it was determined that the project was not going to have any impacts to the environment. The project originally contemplated 12 parcels with custom single family homes. A subsequent environmental document does not need to be prepared because 1) no changes to the project are proposed requiring revisions to the previous ND due to the involvement of new significant environmental effects or a substantial increase in the severity of previously identified significant effects, 2) no substantial changes have occurred with respect to the circumstances under which the project is undertaken which will require major revisions of the previous ND due to the involvement of new significant environmental effects or a substantial increase in the severity of previously identified significant effects, and 3) no new information of substantial importance, which was not known and could not have been known with the exercise of reasonable diligence or at the time the previous ND was adopted.

ANALYSIS

Issue #1: Project Overview

The applicant is requesting an amendment to the conditions of approval on the tentative map for the Golden Bow Estates (Attachment E). The applicant is requesting the single story restriction be removed from Lot 4 to reduce the overall footprint of the house and to provide more space for landscaping. Lot 4 is located on Ram Court and shares a fence with 3330 and a small part of 3326 S. Francisco Way. The subject lot size is approximately 9,351 square feet. The final grade elevation on the subject lot is 106 feet and the adjacent property, 3330 S. Francisco Way, has a finished grade of 98 feet, which is a difference of 8 feet. There is an existing pine tree with a diameter of 42 feet and an overall height of 65 feet (Attachment F). The applicant is proposing a conceptual two story house on Lot 4 with an overall height of 25'4" with an architectural element consisting of a clerestory window for lighting purposes at a height of 30'4".

During the public hearing process for the Golden Bow Estates, the architect indicated that during the community meetings, the residents were informed that they would use as many single-story homes as possible, especially on the north end of the site abutting the residential neighborhood (Attachment G). There was also a discussion in the minutes from the Planning Commission hearing in regards to the procedure for the individual lot owners to request an amendment to the conditions of approval to build a two-story home if the owners were interested in pursuing removing the one-story restriction.

Based on the 2003 tentative map extension approval, three of the lots had the singlestory provision removed, leaving Lots 2, 3, and 4 for single-story homes. The owner of Lot 2 has not been in contact with the City thus far for a building permit and Lot 3 currently has a single story home in the final stages of being constructed. Lot 6 is under construction with a two-story home.

Issue #2: Land Use

The subject property has a General Plan designation of Medium Low Density Residential and a zoning designation of Planned Development (PD). The surrounding land uses and zoning designations are as noted below:

North:	Single family residential (PD)
South:	Single family residential – Golden Bow Estates (PD)
West:	Dhyanyoga spiritual facility (PD)
East:	Single family residential (PD)

Issue #3: Proposed House Design

The main reason to the single-story restrictions on the subject lot was due to neighbor's concerns regarding the loss of privacy and the finished height of the pads. The home being proposed on Lot 4 is proposed to be constructed on the southern side of the property with a detached garage on the northwestern side. The second story of the home is recessed from the single story footprint along the northern fence line. The applicant has provided a line of site study from a window on the north elevation, illustrating the viewer has a restricted line of sight to the house and backyard of 3330 S. Francisco Way. There is a large pine tree that would obscure the line of site as well. The applicant is also proposing planting nine (9) coniferous 36" box trees to alleviate any potential concerns from the neighbors regarding the loss of privacy. Due to the pyramidal shape of the conifers, staff is recommending that the coniferous trees be replaced with evergreen trees that have a substantial rounded canopy. Based on the placement of the house and the proposed landscaping, staff is comfortable with the request with the addition of conditions memorializing the location of the home on the southern property line, no balconies shall be constructed on the north side of the house, and at a minimum nine (9) evergreen trees be planted along the northern and eastern property line. The evergreen tree species will be reviewed and approved by staff.

Tina Wehrmeister Secretary to the Planning Commission Vice Chair Hinojosa clarified with staff that the Municipal Code allows extensions up to two years but that the Planning Commission has discretion to extend to whatever time they desire.

3. PW 652 – Scott Broder requests an amendment to condition of approval number 60e from City Council Resolution 2001/38 to remove the single story restriction from Lot 4 of the Golden Bow Estates. The amendment would allow the construction of single family home up to 35' in height. The project is located at 3501 Ram Court (APN: 076-680-004).

Senior Planner Gentry provided a summary of the staff report dated April 25, 2013.

OPENED PUBLIC HEARING

Cheryl Amand, on behalf of Scott Broder, said that she is familiar with Mr. Broder's plans, that she is also a resident of the Golden Bow Estates and that her residence is currently under construction. She distributed a letter to the Planning Commissioners from James Koch and Tulsi Gottfredson, who own property on the south side of Scott Broder's property. She said that the Golden Bow community was requested by council to be a development of custom homes. Scott has plans for his dream home but he does have sensitivity to the concerns heard about privacy for neighbors and that on the north side facing South Francisco, Scott will have no view of any residences. She said that he has designed his home so that the lower portion is on the south side and closer to Ram Court.

Commissioner Azevedo clarified with Ms. Amand that Mr. Broder has seen the resolution and that he is in agreement.

Commissioner Azevedo mentioned that there were previous concerns about privacy with lots 696, 697 and 698. He was concerned with the window for lot 698 and the line of sight looking into that backyard. He discussed with Ms. Amand the importance of planting and maintaining the trees to serve as a buffer.

Commissioner Miller expressed that the trees should be evergreen and not trees where the leaves would fall off to which Ms. Amand said that the applicant is happy to put in what the Commission desired.

SP Gentry said that it was recommended that the trees have a more rounded canopy than the trees proposed and that they be evergreen. She said that the applicant would be working with staff for the selection of the trees.

Vice Chair Hinojosa asked Ms. Amand about this being proposed as a partial two-story. Ms. Amand said that the part of the home on the north side will be one story, that the rise of the home will be on his property closest to Ram Court and that he is proposing not to have any view of homes to the north of him through trees and construction.

Vice Chair Hinojosa referenced the site plan and confirmed with SP Gentry that the window would be recessed on the north side and not entirely flush with the wall on that side. SP Gentry said that the home plans are very preliminary at this point and that staff is recommending no balconies on the north side.

Commissioner Motts clarified with Ms. Amand that the window feature was for light, not viewing, and that there is no hall or room connected with it.

Michael Hechathorn spoke to say that he has an office in town and has reviewed these plans. He said that they look pretty all inclusive, removing any visual issues with surrounding houses.

Chris Beckwith, resident at 3334 South Francisco, said that his home is directly over the fence and down the hill from the property in question. He said that the homes were proposed as one story, that he has been against this, that people visiting his property don't have anything good to say about the custom homes and that he is concerned about the visual issues. He said that he does not want to see a two story behind him, that a one story is tall enough and feels this will make it difficult for him to sell his home.

Commissioner Miller clarified with Mr. Beckwith that 3334 South Francisco would be lot number 698.

William Saunders said that while he wants to be a good neighbor, his yard level is 12 to 15 feet lower than the level they are building on. He said that this is a pretty intrusive structure, that he does not wish to look at it every day and that people living on his side of the street are not happy to face that big wall. He said that the owner of the home

between Chris and himself is on the road six days a week and that he is probably not aware of the issue and how it will affect their property values. He said the tree that they have already causes them nightmares with droppings and damaging root systems. He stated his concern that in the future what happens if Mr. Broder chooses to remodel and that it would be unfair to the people who already live there without some restrictions.

Commissioner Motts discussed with Mr. Saunders the view consideration.

Commissioner Miller confirmed with Mr. Saunders that his address is 3326 South Francisco.

CLOSED PUBLIC HEARING

Commissioner Baatrup discussed with staff the easement shown, the type of easement not known and that there are probably restrictions to prevent things from being built on top of it.

REOPEN PUBLIC HEARING

Mr. Hechathorn said that this easement is a private water supply easement for water well on lot 2 that feeds the 12 houses and the church facility down the hill for irrigation only with backflow preventers. He said to address the previous concerns that a house up the street sold recently for ten to twenty thousand over the asking price with multiple offers.

RECLOSE PUBLIC HEARING

Commissioner Baatrup expressed his general concern with planting trees in easements and he is opposed to planting large trees in this easement. He said that by planting trees to alleviate the imposition to neighbors, that there is an acknowledgement of privacy. He asked staff about the architectural design and the flat roofs jumping out as inconsistent and going against design guidelines established for communities.

SP Gentry said that there is no design review for custom single family homes and that although the original plans were reviewed by an architect, she would have to check to see if a staff level review was done as well. She said that this is not your typical subdivision.

Commissioner Azevedo said that given previous discussions regarding keeping homes to single story and the considerations of fences, trees and all kinds of things, he has not heard anything to overturn that and that he will not be supporting this amendment.

Commissioner Motts discussed with SP Gentry that the house would be subject to review by staff including the 40% lot coverage, the appropriate setbacks, and compliance with all requirements.

Commissioner Baatrup clarified with staff that out of the 12 lots there are only 3 single stories. SP Gentry said that prior to the previous Planning Commission approval, there

were community meetings and that although they were to use as many single story homes as possible that if a homeowner wanted to come back through the process to remove the restriction that it would be on a case by case basis.

Commissioner Baatrup said that with only 3 out of 12 single stories, that he cannot support this change.

Vice Chair Hinojosa said that as a policy matter she does not feel that the Commission should undermine predecessor decisions. She does not feel that this proposed project has evidence enough to overturn the previous decision and that she is inclined to deny the recommendation by staff.

CA Nerland confirmed that there would be a unanimous motion to deny but that this would be a recommendation to the City Council to deny, that this would be heard by City Council on May 28th and that all parties would be given notice.

It is recommended that the City Council:

- 1. Adopt the Negative Declaration; and
- 2. **APPROVE** the proposed Tentative Major Subdivision Map to subdivide two parcels into thirteen parcels subject to the conditions contained in the attached resolution.

BACKGROUND

The Planning Commission considered this item at the regular meeting of April 4, 2001. After holding the public hearing and considering all testimony, the Planning Commission voted 5 - 0 with two Commissioners absent, to recommend approval of this project to the City Council. A copy of the staff report and minutes from this meeting are attached for the Council's review.

ENVIRONMENTAL

A Negative Declaration is proposed for adoption. A copy of the Initial Study is attached. The Planning Commission reviewed the Negative Declaration and Initial Study at the April 4, 2001 meeting and recommended adoption.

ANALYSIS

The applicant requests approval of a tentative subdivision map that would subdivide two existing parcels into thirteen parcels. Twelve parcels will be custom single-family residential lots and the thirteenth parcel will be developed with a proposed spiritual facility pending use permit approval. The property has a General Plan designation of Medium Low Density Residential. The site is located on the west side of Contra Loma

Blvd., approximately 1,100 feet north of James Donlon Blvd. At the April 4, 2001 meeting, the Planning Commission voted, 5-0 to recommend approval of this project to the City Council.

The Planning Commission staff report for this project is attached, dated April 4, 2001. Please refer to this staff report as it includes the information necessary to review this proposal. The following bullet items outline the key issues brought up at the Commission meeting and identify changes the Commission made to the conditions of approval.

 <u>Architectural Guidelines:</u> The applicant is proposing architectural guidelines for the subdivision in order to ensure a high quality development. The draft guidelines are attached to the Planning Commission staff report. The Commission approved the following changes to the conditions relating to the architectural guidelines:

60b) The minimum house size for this subdivision shall be 2,000 1,700 sq. ft.

60c) Roofing material shall be concrete tile or composition shingle roofing. Buildings shall be finished in stucco or hardboard real wood siding.

<u>60g) One member of the architectural review committee shall be a licensed architect.</u>

Masonry Wall: Staff has recommended a condition requiring that the developer install a masonry wall on the east property lines of lots 4 though 9. This condition will avoid a patchwork of fencing which would be visible from Contra Loma Blvd. Masonry walls along the north and south property lines of the lot designated for the spiritual center will be conditioned as part of the use permit. There was some concern from the public regarding proper construction of masonry walls associated with this project. To address this concern, the Commission amended condition #54 and added condition #65 as follows:

54) A decorative masonry wall is required on the east property lines of lots 4 though 9. The wall shall be located at the top of the adjacent down slope. The applicant shall construct the wall at the time of construction of infrastructure improvements for the subdivision. The design <u>and engineering</u> of the wall shall be subject to staff approval.

65) Any masonry wall constructed as a result of this project shall be subject to staff design and engineering review.

Almond Trees: The owner of lot 87 located in the Centennial Park subdivision, expressed her concern regarding the potential loss of existing almond trees near her property line. The Commission directed staff and the applicant to try to come up with a solution to preserve these trees. Staff met with the property owner, the project engineer, the architect, and a representative of Dhyanyoga Centers, Inc. at

the project site and determined that the trees can be preserved. The said trees are located directly adjacent to the rear property line of lot 87 in an area that will not require grading. Staff has added the following condition to address this issue:

66) The almond trees located adjacent to lot 87, located in the Centennial Park subdivision, shall be preserved and not removed or damaged as a result of nearby grading.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

None. The developer and/or, in the case of custom lots, future homeowners, are required to pay all fees and will pay for all costs of construction and maintenance until the City Council accepts the improvements.

WHEREAS, on April 4, 2001, the Planning Commission duly held a public hearing, received and considered evidence, both oral and documentary, regarding a Tentative Map to allow the subdivision of two lots into thirteen lots, twelve custom family lots and one 3.44 acre lot and voted 5-0 to recommend approval to the City Council; and

WHEREAS, on April 24, 2001, the City Council duly held a public hearing, received and considered evidence, both oral and documentary, regarding a Tentative Map to allow the subdivision of two lots into thirteen lots, twelve custom single family lots and one 3.44 acre lot; and

WHEREAS, based on the traffic study, the project's impacts do not exceed the level of service requirement for traffic and other infrastructure established by Measure "C" (Contra Costa County Sales Tax/Transportation Initiative).

WHEREAS, the proposal is as follows:

To **APPROVE** the proposed Tentative Major Subdivision Map to subdivide two parcels into thirteen parcels, 12 custom single-family lots and one 3.44 acre lot located on the west side of Contra Loma Blvd., approximately 1,100 feet north of James Donlon Blvd (PW-652).

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act and City implementing procedures, the City Council does adopt a Negative Declaration for this project; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Council of the City of Antioch does hereby make the following required findings for a Tentative Subdivision Map:

- 1) That the subdivision, design and improvements are consistent with the General Plan (Government SS 66473.5);
- 2) That the subdivision complies with the Housing Element as it relates to regional and local needs (Government SS 66412.3);
- 3) That the subdivision will comply with future passive or natural heating or cooling opportunities as required by Government SS 66473.1; and
- 4) That the subdivision complies with local ordinances.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Council of the City of Antioch, after reviewing the staff report and considering testimony offered, approve the Tentative Subdivision Map for 6.82 acres of land located on the west side of Contra Loma Blvd., approximately 1,100 feet north of James Donlon Blvd (PW-652), subject to the following conditions:

STANDARD CONDITIONS

- 1) That the lots and improvements within the development comply with the City of Antioch Municipal Code, unless a specific exception is granted thereto.
- 2) That approval of this tentative map shall not be construed as a guarantee of future extension or re-approvals of this or similar maps, nor is it an indication of future availability of water or sewer facilities or permission to develop beyond the capacities of these facilities.
- 3) That approval of this tentative map shall not constitute the approval of any improvements shown on the tentative map.
- 4) That the developer pay any acreage and utility connection fees which have been established by the City Council prior to the filing of the final map and as required by the Antioch Municipal Code.
- 5) That all street intersections meet the requirements of Caltrans Highway Design Manual for Intersection Design Standards (Topic 405).
- 6) That the developer pay traffic signal fees as adopted by the City Council.
- 7) That the developer submit a drainage study outlining what facilities are to be constructed and how they will function as a part of the Drainage District, and that the improvements to mitigate the increased downstream runoff be constructed as required by the County Flood Control and the City Engineer.
- 8) That improvements and fees that are required by the Contra Costa County Flood Control District be implemented, as approved by the City Engineer.
- 9) That the developer provide adequate water pressure and volume to serve this development, as approved by the City Engineer. This will include a minimum residual pressure of 20 psi with all losses included at the highest point of water service and a minimum static pressure of 50 psi.
- 10) That all streets intersect at 90 degrees.
- 11) That all driveways be perpendicular to the street centerline for a minimum distance of 20 feet behind the curb, or as approved by the City Engineer.

- 12) That the property owner agrees to participate in the Streetlight and Landscape District and to accept a level of annual assessments sufficient to maintain the street lights and landscaping within the project area at the buildout of the project area. It is currently estimated that such an assessment is approximately \$210/unit/year.
- 13) That the slopes, medians, and any open space areas be developed by the developer as required by the City Engineer and maintained by a landscape maintenance district at no cost to the City.
- 14) That all fencing adjacent to public areas (open space, right-of-way, etc.) be chain link, masonry, or other substantial material as approved by the City Engineer.
- 15) That a 15-foot wide tree planting easement be provided across the front of all single family lots and that one 15 gallon tree be located within such easement prior to building final. The City Engineer shall determine type and location of the tree.
- 16) That fire hydrants be furnished and installed, of a type and at a location approved by the City Engineer.
- 17) That provisions for mail delivery in the subdivision area be worked out by staff and the developer prior to the approval of the final map (developer to install mail box posts).
- 18) That the grading plan for this development be approved by the City Engineer.
- 19) That all elevations shown on the improvement plans be on the USGS 1929 sea level datum.
- 20) That use of construction equipment be restricted to weekdays between the hours 8:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M., or as approved in writing by the City Engineer.
- 21) That the grading operation shall take place at a time, and in a manner, so as not allow erosion and sedimentation. The slopes shall be landscaped and reseed as soon as possible after the grading operation ceases. Erosion measures shall be implemented during all construction phases in accordance with an approved erosion and sedimentation control plan.
- 22) That all lots and slopes drain to approved drainage facilities as approved by the City Engineer.
- 23) That standard dust control methods and designs be used to stabilize the dust generated by construction activities.

- 24) That energy conservation methods and designs be used in the planning and construction of these homes.
- 25) That water conservation measures, including low volume toilets, flow restrictors in showers and in the use of drought tolerant landscaping be used.
- 26) That the roof drain collection system be connected to an underground drainage system and be discharged through curb drains.
- 27) That all weather access roads and water supply be provided prior to commencing any combustible construction, as required by the Fire Chief.
- 28) That a Conditional Letter of Map Revision be obtained from FEMA prior to recording the final map for any lot located within a flood hazard zone and that as builts and additional information required by FEMA as a prerequisite to issuance of a Letter of Map Revision be submitted prior to City acceptance of subdivision improvements for maintenance.
- 29) That all required easements or rights-of-way for off tract improvements be obtained by the developer at no cost to the City of Antioch.
- 30) The Tentative Map approval is subject to the time lines established in the State of California Subdivision Map Act.
- 31) That conditions required by the City Council, which call for a modification or any change to the site plan submitted, be corrected to show those conditions and all standards and requirements of the City of Antioch prior to any submittal for a building permit. No building permit will be issued unless the site plan meets the requirements stipulated by the City Council and the standards of the City.
- 32) That all existing and proposed utilities be undergrounded in accordance with the Antioch Municipal Code, except existing P.G.& E. towers, if any.
- 33) That all two-car garages be 20 feet wide, clear inside dimensions.
- 34) That all lots have a minimum of one on-street parking space located in front of the lot or in the cul-de-sac parking island.
- 35) That underground utilities be designed to flow approximately parallel to the centerline of the street, or as approved by the City Engineer.
- 36) That all road right-of-way be located 10 feet behind each face-of-curb

- 37) That a minimum of 20 feet of tangent behind the intersecting face of curb be provided at all roadway intersections.
- 38) That all grading be accomplished in a manner that precludes surface water drainage across any property line.
- 39) That all lots be graded to drain positively from the rear to the street as approved by the City Engineer.
- 40) That all lot sidelines shall be perpendicular to the fronting street centerline, or as approved by the City Engineer.
- 41) That all underground utilities be rerouted as required to run under public roadways or through public open parcels, or as approved by the City Engineer.
- 42) That all proposed drainage facilities, including open ditches, be constructed of Portland Concrete Cement.
- 43) That all easements of record, which affect individual parcels within this project, be removed prior to recordation of the final map.
- 44) That the houses contain rain gutters and downspouts, with the downspouts and runoff of adjacent water to foundations being collected into an underground conduit, and be discharged as approved by the City Engineer.
- 45) That proposed street names be submitted for review and approval by the Planning Commission.
- 46) That the Regional Traffic Impact Fee be paid, as well as all other applicable fees.
- 47) That any drainage concerns expressed by Flood Control are complied with.

PROJECT SPECIFIC CONDITIONS

- 48) A use permit application is required to review the spiritual facility proposal. Approval of a use permit by the Planning Commission, and approval of architectural elevations by the Design Review Board are required prior to the issuance of either a grading and/or building permit for the spiritual facility location.
- 49) Development of the custom single-family lots shall be consistent with the requirements of the R-6 Zoning District (Single-Family Low Density Residential).
- 50) That all off-site grading is subject to the approval of the adjacent property owners, and the City Engineer.

- 51) That the following requirements of the federally mandated NPDES program (National Pollutant DISCHARGE Elimination System) be complied with, or as required by the City Engineer:
 - a) That an application for a State of California "General Construction Activity Storm Water Permit" be submitted to the Regional Resources Control Board, and a copy of the Notice of Intent be submitted to the City, prior to any construction activity on this site.
 - b) Limiting construction access routes and stabilizing access points.
 - c) Stabilizing areas denuded due to construction (prior to the wet season, October 1 through May 1) by using suitable practices including, but not limited to temporary or permanent seeding, mulching, sod stabilization, vegetative buffer strips, protection of trees, plastic covering, application of ground base on areas to be paved.
 - d) Protecting adjacent properties by appropriate use of vegetative buffer strips, sediment barriers or filters, dikes or mulching, or by a combination of these measures and other appropriate measures.
 - e) Delineating clearing limits, easements, setbacks, sensitive or critical areas and their buffers, trees and drainage courses by marking them in the field.
 - f) Stabilizing and preventing erosion from temporary conveyance channels and outlets.
 - g) Using sediment controls and filtration to remove sediment from water generated by dewatering.
 - h) Using proper construction material and construction waste storage, handling and disposal practices.
 - i) Using proper vehicle and equipment cleaning, fueling and maintenance practices.
 - j) Controlling and preventing discharge of all potential pollutants, including, but not limited to, pesticides, petroleum products, nutrients, solid wastes, and construction chemicals, that occur on site during construction.
 - k) Preparing a contingency plan in the event of unexpected rain or BMP failure including, but not limited to, an immediate response plan, storing extra or alternative control materials on-site (stakes, fences, hay bales), notifying the local agency, etc.

- I) Education and Training For developments with no property owner association or community association, practical information materials on good housekeeping of hazardous products, proper use and disposal for hazardous products, and prohibited discharge practices and materials must be provided, initially by the developer, to the first residents/occupants/tenants, and thereafter by the City public education program.
- m) Labeling Storm Drain Facilities The phrase "No Dumping Drains to River" must be embossed/stamped on a new storm drain inlets to alert the public to the destination of storm water and to prevent direct discharge of pollutants into the storm drain. Watercourses should be similarly labeled by posting signs.
- n) Runoff Control to the extent practicable, maintain post-development peak runoff rate and average volume of runoff at levels that are similar to predevelopment levels. The developer must design the proposed project accordingly.
- 52) That the following requirements of the Contra Costa County Fire Protection District be met, or as approved by the District and City staff:
 - a) That the developer shall provide an adequate and reliable water supply for fire protection with a minimum fire flow of 2000 GPM. Required flow shall be delivered from not more than 1 hydrant flowing while maintaining 20 pounds residual pressure in the main.
 - b) That the developer shall provide hydrants as approved by the City Engineer. Number of hydrants and locations will be determined by the office upon submittal of 3 copies of a tentative map or site plan.
 - c) Provide access roadways with all-weather driving surfaces of not less than 36 feet unobstructed width, and not less than 13 feet - 6 inches of vertical clearance, to within 150 feet of travel distance to all portions of the exterior walls of every building. Access roads shall not exceed 16 percent grade, shall have a minimum outside turning radius of 32 feet, and must be capable of supporting the imposed loads of fire apparatus.
 - d) Access roads and hydrants as required above shall be installed and in service prior to combustible construction.
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 - e) Approved premises identification shall be provided. Such numbers shall contrast with their background and be readily visible from the street.
 - f) A pro-rata fee of \$235.00 per house shall be assessed to partially off set expenditures for additional necessary fire services.

- g) The developer shall provide roof coverings with a minimum Class C rating. Untreated wood shake or shingles are not allowed.
- h) The developer shall remit all required fees and assessments to the Fire District for review of the subdivision/development plan application.
- 53) That any sale of a portion (or portions) of this project to multiple developers include the necessary agreement and/or grading easements to assure that project-wide grading conforms to the approved map and conditions of this resolution.
- 54) A decorative masonry wall is required on the east property lines of lots 4 through 9. The wall shall be located at the top of the adjacent down slope. The applicant shall construct the wall at the time of construction of infrastructure improvements for the subdivision. The design and engineering of the wall shall be subject to staff approval.
- 55) That a final landscape plan for the project be submitted for review and approval. This plan shall show the extent of landscaping for all open space parcels and landscaping within the public right-of-way.
- 56) That all sewerage flow by gravity to intersecting street or as approved by the City Engineer.
- 57) That the required 50 foot sight distance triangles be maintained at all intersections and that no object greater than 3 feet in height be placed in that triangle.
- 58) That the main commercial site entrance at the intersection of Contra Loma Blvd. and Gatter Drive shall be a street type entrance with 30-foot radius curb returns or as approved by the City Engineer.
- 59) That a center cul-de-sac parking area be provided in each cul-de-sac.
- 60) That the architectural guidelines for this subdivision be modified to address the following conditions. The final wording shall be reviewed and approved by staff.
 - a) That existing trees on the property protected by the Tree Preservation Ordinance be protected from damage during all site improvements. Homes on lots containing protected trees shall be developed in such a manner as to preserve said trees unless the property owner obtains a permit for removal as required by the Ordinance.

- b) The minimum house size for this subdivision shall be 1,800 sq. ft. for up to four lots and 2,000 sq. ft. for the remaining six lots. Lots three and four the minimum square footage will be 1,600 1,800 sq. ft.
- c) Roofing material shall be concrete tile or high definition composition shingle roofing. Buildings shall be finished in stucco or real wood siding.
- d) Landscape requirements shall be included in the CC&R's for this subdivision. Landscaping shall substantially conform to existing landscaping in Centennial Park.
- e) Lots 2, 3, 4, 9, 10, and 11 shall be restricted to single story homes.
- f) Community Development Department staff shall review and approve architectural and landscaping plans at the time of building permit submittal.
- g) One member of the architectural review committee shall be a licensed architect.
- 61) A Lot Line Adjustment shall be required should proposed fencing not be placed on the existing property line in order to maintain the existing yards of homes in the Mira Vista subdivision. The subdivider shall be responsible for all work and cost involved with this action.
- 62) The CC&R's for this subdivision shall reflect all applicable conditions and shall be subject to staff review and approval prior finalization.
- 63) The subdivision shall be required to join Mello Roos District 94-1 or provide alternate school mitigation as determined by the Antioch Unified School District.
- 64) The applicant shall pay an economic development fee as required by the Measure U Urgency Ordinance or any subsequent extension or replacement ordinance.
- 65) Any masonry wall constructed as a result of this project shall be subject to staff design and engineering review.
- 66) The almond trees located adjacent to lot 87, located in the Centennial Park subdivision, shall be preserved and not removed or damaged as a result of nearby grading.
- 67) The applicant will work with staff to negotiate a development agreement to determine an allocation to be granted as well as contribution toward Prewett Park, prior to the final map being submitted to the City Council.

Mayor Freitas thanked Councilmembers Simonsen and Davis for their consideration and recommendations regarding the CDBG funds.

Upon making the motion, Mayor Freitas passed the gavel to Mayor Pro Tem Kalinowski to conduct the completion of Council's action.

Assistant Planner Wehrmeister presented the staff report dated April 19, 2001, recommending the City Council: 1) Adopt the Negative Declaration; and 2) Approve the proposed Tentative Map to subdivide two parcels into thirteen parcels subject to conditions contained in the staff reports and the resolution.

Councilmember Conley expressed his concern regarding the City being protected for their portion of the funding for Prewett Park. Director of Community Development Ward clarified

this project would not be subject to Prewett Park fees. City Attorney Galstan added the City and developer could negotiate a development agreement to address funding for Prewett Park.

Councilmember Simonsen requested project specific condition #64 be amended to include language for a future economic development fee.

Councilmember Davis expressed concern Measure U had not been applied to this project. Community Development Director Ward clarified the impacts from this project were deemed insignificant through the Negative Declaration process.

Mayor Freitas opened the public hearing.

Bernard Mosbacher, speaking on behalf of the applicant, reviewed the proposed project. He stated the intent was to create 12 upscale custom home lots to be sold individually. He clarified the builder had requested a reduction in square footage to provide an opportunity for elderly who would be downsizing their homes for retirement. He stated a higher end and diverse architecture would maintain the property values in the area. He also explained the applicant was willing to provide an entryway monument to designate this project as a separate development, noting they were working with neighbors to preserve as many trees as possible on the property. He further noted they were in agreement with all conditions contained in the staff report and were willing to work with the City to mitigate any concerns regarding Measure U.

With no further speakers, Mayor Freitas closed the public hearing.

Councilmember Kalinowski expressed concern regarding the square footage reduction as well as the Council assuring funding was at the correct level regarding Measure U.

Mr. Mosbacher clarified the applicant did not want to be limited to higher square footage adding it was possible to make a 1700 square foot home look and fit into the concept of this subdivision using creative, upscale architecture. He stated he had designed parking in accordance with City standards.

In response to Councilmember Conley, Assistant Planner Wehrmeister clarified under the ordinance, single infill lot development does not require Design Review Board consideration and the architectural review guidelines will insure the development would have a high quality design.

Councilmember Conley voiced his support of Design Review Board review for approval of these homes. Mr. Mosbacher requested should these homes go before the Design Review Board, they be accompanied by their architectural guidelines to insure standards were maintained.

City Engineer Brandt clarified the cul-de-sacs have parking islands providing six parking spaces.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that Council approve a one-year time extension for the Dhyanyoga Center Subdivision subject to the conditions contained in the attached resolution.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

In April of 2001 the City Council approved a tentative subdivision map to subdivide the property located on the west side of Contra Loma Blvd, 1,100 feet north of James Donlon Blvd. into thirteen lots, twelve custom single-family lots and one 3.44-acre lot proposed to contain a spiritual facility. This project was subject to the Measure U interim ordinance. The project was conditioned to negotiate a Development Agreement to determine an allocation to be granted as well as a contribution toward Prewett Park prior to the final map being submitted to the City Council as a mechanism for complying with Measure U. Alternatively, the applicant applied for a residential allocation through the RDA process and was granted a full allocation by the Council on July 8, 2003.

In order to address this project's community park contribution this extension has been conditioned to require payment of a fee equal to an interim fee currently in place (about \$4,000 / unit) or an adopted community park fee, which the Council is expected to act on in the next several months. The Council required a contribution to community parks because the Mello Roos district that this subdivision will annex into has no community park contribution component. The condition added to this extension is a clarification of the condition placed on the tentative map and is consistent with conditions placed on other residential projects that either do not have a community park contribution as a part of their Mello Roos assessment or are not within the Antioch School District boundaries.

The applicant maintains that the \$6,000 per unit community benefit fee offered as a community benefit under the Residential Development Allocation (RDA) process should be considered adequate to address the community park contribution required of the tentative map.

It is staff's opinion that the intent of the tentative map condition is to require a fee that would specifically contribute to Prewett Park. The monetary contribution offered as a community benefit during the RDA process is not directed towards particular community improvement(s) or program(s). Therefore it is staff's recommendation that the project pay a community park fee in addition to the community benefit fee offered during the RDA proceedings.

The applicant is requesting that the single story height restriction on Lots 9, 10, and 11 be removed. Since approval of the tentative map, civil engineering drawings have been tentatively completed and submitted to the Engineering Division for plan check. The final grade of the lots in question is lower than originally anticipated and would allow for construction of two story homes on the lots that would not impact the privacy of the existing residential neighbors (see profiles attached to the May 28th letter).

Staff has reviewed the grading plans and profiles and is not opposed to the applicant's request. The granting of the request would also allow larger homes in terms of overall square footage to be constructed on the lots. Minimum home size was a concern at the tentative map stage and the project was conditioned to not allow homes smaller that 1,700 s.f. In fact, a 1,700 s.f. single story home could be difficult to place on the lots in question due to their unique shape and/or tree preservation requirements.

After considering the proposal, the Planning Commission voted to recommend approval of the one year map extension with conditions requiring payment of a community park fee in addition to the \$6,000 fee offered during the RDA proceedings and allowing Lots 9, 10, and 11 to be developed with two story dwellings.

FISCAL IMPACT

The additional funds generated by the Community Park Fee will assist in further development of Prewett Park.

Tina,

We are requesting an amendment to the above-mentioned condition to delete the single story restriction on lots 9, 10 and 11. The civil engineering plans have been prepared and submitted for final map approval and the grading in the area of these lots is now to be closer to the existing grade than originally anticipated. The original intent was if these lots were to be graded at the same grade or higher than the adjacent Centennial Park homes that the proposed homes would not look down into the existing yards. In reality just the opposite is happening at these lots. The existing homes are at a higher elevation than the new homes. The new homes pad elevations range from 7 feet to 11 feet below the existing homes pad elevations. This is nearly a floor level to more than a floor level below the adjacent homes.

This has all been shown in the attached lot profiles we have provided. Please note that lot 9 falls centered on the property line between the two adjacent lots and would not have a great impact on the homes on those lots. The same condition also happens on lot 10 and actually has far less impact since the existing cul-de-sac is within 20 feet of the property. Lot 11 has the requirement of the existing trees along the fence line to be saved and will act as a barrier between the two parcels. This lot is also the one, which has the greatest elevation differential between the existing and the proposed.

In closing we feel this request is fair and we are not asking for any more entitlements than are already realized by the existing homes. We are not blocking any views nor will we be encroaching on the privacy of the adjacent homeowners any more than they do on their existing neighbors or would on the proposed project.

CONTINUED PUBLIC HEARINGS

2. PW 652 – DHYANYOGA CENTERS, INC. requests approval of a one year tentative map extension. The approved tentative map allows the

subdivision of thirteen lots, twelve custom family lots and one 3.44 acre lot. The applicant is also requesting a modification of the conditions of approval to allow two story homes on certain lots that were previously restricted to single story homes. The project site is located on the west side of Contra Loma Blvd., approximately 1,100 feet north of James Donlon Blvd. (APN 076-031-036 and -038)

Resolution No. 03-22

Associate Planner Wehrmeister presented the staff report dated May 29, 2003 recommending that the Planning Commission recommend that the City Council approve a one year extension for PW 652 subject to the conditions contained in the staff report's attached resolution.

In response to Commissioner Martin, Associate Planner Wehrmeister clarified that this is an extension for PW 652, which implies that the original conditions are applicable to the project.

Bernard Mosbacher, Architect representing Dhyanyoga Center stated that they are requesting a change to the requirement on the single story building heights on lots #9-11 due to the fact that the final grade of the lots in question is lower then originally anticipated and would not impact the privacy of the existing residential neighbors. He clarified when they went into the RDA hearings they originally had an agreement for \$3000.00 per lot community benefit fee and it was increased to \$6000.00 per lot. He noted they feel that the \$6000.00 per unit fee should be adequate to address the community park contribution required of the tentative map. He noted the addition of a \$4000.00 per lot park fee would burden the project due to the fact that they do not have the number of lots to spread the extra costs to. He further noted Dhyanyoga Center is developing this property to sell the lots to help build the church facility. He stated when they had development agreement discussions with staff and the park fees were for \$1800.00 per lot.

In response to Commissioner Henry, Mr. Mosbacher stated that with the cost of the bare land and the increased construction costs for custom homes, the additional \$4000.00 would make it difficult to market the lots.

Associate Planner Wehrmeister clarified that \$4000.00 per unit is the higher end of the interim park fee and it is based on square footage of the homes and comparable to the Mello Roos District fee. She noted that the applicant proposed the \$6000.00 per unit community benefit fee. She added that it is staff's position that the proposed RDA benefit for this project is comparable to what the other applications have proposed Chairperson Weber reminded the Commission that this is an application for a 1year extension on a previously approved tentative map.

Commissioner Moore stated that when they considered the community benefits fees at the RDA committee level it was his understanding that the park fees were not included in the package.

Mr. Mosbacher stated that they were informed during the RDA committee process to provide a community benefit in which the city would decide where the fees would be distributed.

In response to Chairperson Weber, Senior Planner Oshinsky clarified that the City Council would ultimately determine if the community benefit fee will include the parks fee and how that fee will be divided.

Chairperson Weber reminded the Commission that item #1 of the resolution provides the City Council the ability to address the issue of the park fee for this application.

Commissioner Azevedo stated that he feels it is important to for the Planning Commission to determine if the applicant will be paying a park fee in addition to their RDA community benefit fee.

In response to Commissioner Moore, Mr. Mosbacher clarified that the they would not want the Planning Commission to impose a condition that the City Council can not reverse.

Senior Planner Oshinksky clarified that the park fee was part of the original tentative map approval and item #1 of the resolution before the Planning Commission this evening indicates that the park fee would be determined by the City Council.

William Saunders, Antioch resident, stated that they were guaranteed that the applicant would not build two-story homes adjacent to their neighborhood and expressed concern that they would impact their quality of life and decrease their property values.

Associate Planner Wehrmeister clarified that if the resolution is approved tonight per staff's recommendation, the only single story lots would be #2-4, which are adjacent to previous speakers property.

Chris Beckwith expressed concern regarding the impact of the dust from this property on his residence and noted it may take 10 years for the development of these individual lots. He stated church members would be developing some of

these lots and questioned whether there is an ordinance prohibiting them from developing a commune type setting.

Bernard Mosbacher clarified that they did inform the residents at the community meeting that they would use as many single story homes as possible especially on the north end of the site abutting the residential neighborhood. He noted the remaining two story lots would not impact the adjacent residential development. He noted that over 1 year ago they put fill on the site, which the city is aware of and when they do their grading it will be pulled and engineered fill. He clarified that these will be custom homes and they have no control over when they will be built. He clarified that some of the church members would be buying and developing lots as their personal residences and they are not a cult. He noted there are design guidelines on the structures as well as guidelines for maintenance for each individual lot.

In response to Commissioner Moore, Mr. Mosbacher stated that the individual lot owners could request an amendment to the resolution to build a two-story house and it would be up to the Planning Commission to approve or deny that request.

In response to Commissioner Martin, Mr. Mosbacher stated that they addressed the dust issue per the city's request when they brought the fill in.

Chairperson Weber closed public hearing.

In response to Commissioner Moore, Associate Planner Wehrmeister clarified that she believes the intent of project specific condition #67 of Resolution 2001/38 was that the fee was to go toward community parks.

Commissioner Moore stated he is not prepared to support the language in the resolution as it pertains to the parks fee noting that he feels the fee should be above and beyond the normal fees paid for development.

A motion was made by Commissioner Long, seconded by Commissioner Berglund to recommend that the City Council approve PW 652 a one year tentative map extension subject to the conditions contained in the staff reports attached resolution. Modifying condition #1 to read:

#1 That a community park fee shall be paid prior to the issuance of residential building permits for this subdivision. The fee shall be equal to the interim fee or future adopted community park fee at the City Council's discretion

Following discussion the Planning Commission members were in support of the City Council imposing an additional park fee, equal to the interim fee or the future adopted community park fee in addition to the \$6000.00 community benefit fee.

In response to Commissioner Martin, Commissioner Moore suggested that the resolution should clearly indicate that the RDA community benefit fee can not be used to satisfy condition #67 of the previous resolution.

In response to Commissioner Moore, Associate Planner Wehrmeister clarified that if there is a request from the lot owners to modify the conditions of approval they would have to renotice and the request would come before the Planning Commission for a public hearing.

Following discussion Commissioner Long with acceptance from Commissioner Berglund amended the previous motion to include the following language:

On motion by Commissioner Long, seconded by Commissioner Berglund, the Planning Commission recommended the City Council approve PW 652 a one year tentative map extension subject to the conditions contained in the staff reports attached resolution. Modifying condition #1 to read:

#1 That a community park fee shall be paid in addition to the agreed upon RDA proposal prior to the issuance of residential building permits for this subdivision. The fee shall be equal to the interim fee or future adopted community park fee at the City Council's discretion.

Subject: Adoption of an Urgency Ordinance Establishing a Temporary Moratorium on the Establishment and Operation of Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailers

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the City Council adopt the attached urgency ordinance establishing a temporary moratorium on the establishment and operation of any new Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailers to become effective immediately (4/5 vote required).

BACKGROUND INFORMATION & DISCUSSION

Public Nuisance Complaints

Over the past several years, both the Community Development Department and the Police Department have received numerous complaints regarding loitering and crime associated with Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailers (as defined in the attached ordinance, also known as smoke shops). A review of one year of Police Department calls for service indicates that the twelve Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailers listed in the ordinance findings generated 96 calls for service including incidents involving burglary and attempted burglary, armed robbery, fights and disturbances including those involving juveniles, petty theft, assault, threats, loitering, panhandling, harassment, stolen vehicles, and passing counterfeit bills.

Underage Tobacco Use

Many Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailers are located in close proximity to schools, parks, and residential neighborhoods. Seven of the twelve listed Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailers are located within several blocks of schools. Youth access to tobacco products and paraphernalia is concerning. According to the California Health Department's Food and Drug Branch, the sales rate to minors in Contra Costa County overall is 22%. In other words, stores in Contra Costa County on average sell tobacco to youth one in every four times they try to buy cigarettes.

Violations of State and Local Laws regarding Paraphernalia

The California Health and Safety Code Section 11364.5 and Title 5, Chapter 16 of the Antioch Municipal Code contain provisions regulating the manner of sale of paraphernalia. A Code Enforcement inspection of ten Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailers found that <u>all</u> were in violation of these State and local laws which require that paraphernalia be kept and displayed in

a separate room or enclosure and that access by anyone under the age of 18 not accompanied by a parent or legal guardian is prohibited. Most Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailers display paraphernalia in the general sales area of the store in violation of State and local law. Paraphernalia is defined in State and local law as: all equipment, products, and materials of any kind which are intended for use or designed for use, in planting, propagating, cultivating, growing, harvesting, manufacturing, compounding, converting, producing, processing, preparing, testing, analyzing, packaging, repackaging, storing, containing, concealing, injecting, ingesting, inhaling, or otherwise introducing into the human body a controlled substance. "Paraphernalia" includes, but is not limited to, all of the following:

- 1. Kits intended for use or designed for use in planting, propagating, cultivating, growing or harvesting of any species of plant which is a controlled substance or from which a controlled substance can be derived.
- 2. Kits intended for use or designed for use in manufacturing, compounding, converting, producing, processing, or preparing controlled substances.
- 3. Isomerization devices intended for use or designed for use in increasing the potency of any species of plant which is a controlled substance.
- 4. Testing equipment intended for use or designed for use in identifying, or in analyzing the strength, effectiveness or purity of controlled substances.
- 5. Scales and balances intended for use or designed for use in weighing or measuring controlled substances.
- 6. Diluents and adulterants, such as quinine hydrochloride, mannitol, mannite, dextrose, and lactose, intended for use or designed for use in cutting controlled substances.
- 7. Separation gins and sifters intended for use or designed for use in removing twigs and seeds from, or in otherwise cleaning or refining, marijuana.
- 8. Blenders, bowls, containers, spoons, and mixing devices intended for use or designed for use in compounding controlled substances.
- 9. Capsules, balloons, envelopes, and other containers intended for use or designed for use in packaging small quantities of controlled substances.
- 10. Containers and other objects intended for use or designed for use in storing or concealing controlled substances.
- 11. Hypodermic syringes, needles, and other objects intended for use or designed for use in parenterally injecting controlled substances into the human body.
- 12. Objects intended for use or designed for use in ingesting, inhaling, or otherwise introducing marijuana, cocaine, hashish, or hashish oil into the human body, such as the following:
 - a. Metal, wooden, acrylic, glass, stone, plastic, or ceramic pipes with or without screens, permanent screens, hashish heads, or punctured metal bowls.

- b. Water pipes.
- c. Carburetion tubes and devices.
- d. Smoking and carburetion masks.
- e. Roach clips, meaning objects used to hold burning material, such as a marijuana cigarette that has become too small or too short to be held in the hand.
- f. Miniature cocaine spoons, and cocaine vials.
- g. Chamber pipes.
- h. Carburetor pipes.
- i. Electric pipes.
- j. Air-driven pipes.
- k. Chillums.
- I. Bongs.
- m. Ice pipes or chillers.

Violations of Local Laws regarding Self Serve Tobacco Displays

The California Business and Professions Code Section 22962 and Antioch Municipal Code Section 6-8.13 prohibit sale or display of any tobacco product by means of a self-service display rack, counter-top or shelf that allows any self-service customer access to any tobacco product. All tobacco products must be offered for sale exclusively by means of seller assistance and shall be located exclusively in a locked case, located behind counters out of reach of customers, or in a similar location that is inaccessible to customers, requiring seller assistance for the customer to obtain access to the tobacco products. Three of the inspected Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailers were in violation these regulations. This is particularly concerning given the ease of access to youth. Many Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailers also sell candy, snacks and other products that are attractive to youth.

Violations of Local Laws regarding Tobacco Advertising and General Advertising

Section 9-5.519 of the Antioch Municipal Code regulates tobacco related signage and states that advertising promoting tobacco products is prohibited when located within 1,600 feet of an elementary or secondary school, public playground or playing field when visible from the public street or sidewalk. One of the inspected Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailers was in violation of this Code.

Section 9-5.508(L)(2) prohibits signage, either temporary or permanent, where placed within, upon, or over any public street right-of-way, parking area, sidewalk, required landscaping or utility pole. One of the inspected Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailers was in violation of this Code.

Urgency Ordinance

The Zoning Ordinance does not currently specifically define or regulate Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailers. Therefore, Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailers are considered general or specialty retailers and are permitted uses in a variety of commercial districts.

The Municipal Code does contain regulations regarding various aspects and issues related to tobacco and paraphernalia sales such as those discussed above and included in Title 6, Chapter 8 related to smoking in general; however, the Code does not include regulations as to the time, place, or manner for Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailers such as proximity to schools and parks and over concentration. Staff needs additional time to study these issues. Therefore, staff is recommending adoption of the proposed moratorium pursuant to Government Code Section 65858 that would prohibit any more of these uses in Antioch while these issues are being reviewed. Existing uses would not be impacted by this Urgency Ordinance, but are discussed below. Note that retail businesses larger than 5,000 s.f. having less than 5% of their sales area devoted to tobacco or paraphernalia are exempt from the definition of Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailer.

Existing Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailers

Both Code Enforcement and Police Department staff has been drastically reduced, with Code Enforcement being completely eliminated for a period of approximately three years. This means that proactive enforcement of local and State laws regulating Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailers has not been possible and as evidenced by the notices of violation issued by Code Enforcement these businesses are not voluntarily complying with State and local laws.

Staff is reviewing existing regulations given the extensive non-compliance issues with State and local laws described above. Part of this review would look at whether the noncompliance is a staffing/enforcement issue or whether further regulations more specifically tied to the public nuisance provisions in the Municipal Code would be appropriate and legal.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is no significant fiscal impact anticipated with the adoption of the proposed urgency ordinance. There will be staff time expended to prepare the land use ordinance addressing Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailers and to review and make recommendations regarding regulations for existing businesses.

OPTIONS

The Council may choose not to adopt the urgency ordinance.

ORDINANCE NO.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ANTIOCH ADOPTING AN INTERIM URGENCY ZONING ORDINANCE PURSUANT TO CALIFORNIA GOVERNMENT CODE SECTION 65858 PROHIBITING THE ISSUANCE OF PERMITS, LICENSES OR APPROVALS FOR CONSTRUCTION, ESTABLISHMENT OR OPERATION OF TOBACCO AND PARAPHERNALIA RETAILERS WITHIN THE CITY ON AN INTERIM BASIS PENDING CONSIDERATION OF AMENDMENTS TO TITLE 9 OF THE ANTIOCH MUNICIPAL CODE FOR A PERIOD OF FORTY-FIVE DAYS AND DECLARING THE URGENCY THEREOF

The City Council of the City of Antioch does ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Interim Urgency Zoning Ordinance. This ordinance is adopted pursuant to the authority of Section 65858 of the Government Code of the State of California, the Antioch City Municipal Code and applicable laws.

<u>SECTION 2</u>. Findings. The Antioch City Council hereby finds, determines and declares as follows:

A. The City of Antioch holds the right to make and enforce all laws and regulations not in conflict with general laws, and the City holds all rights and powers established by state law.

B. The City has received and anticipates additional requests for the construction, establishment and operation of Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailer businesses (as defined herein) within the City. However, the provisions of the City Municipal Code that may regulate the construction, operation and establishment of Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailer businesses in the City are inadequate and need review, study, and revision. The current provisions also fail to fully take into account the impacts related to the location and manner of construction, establishment and operation of Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailer businesses, and the related public health, safety, and welfare concerns, including but not limited to the impacts they may have on parking, surrounding uses, and the community.

C. Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailer businesses often have local school students and minors as their target market, and thereby may encourage the assembly of significant numbers of minors without supervision by parents or guardians, not to mention use of tobacco products or illegal substances. Seven of the twelve Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailers listed below are located within several blocks of schools. Further, given concerns about attendance at the Antioch Unified School District such congregation of students should not be allowed during regular school hours.

D. The City Council of the City of Antioch is concerned with exposure of youth to tobacco products and prevalence of smoking among youth:

- 1. In California, 11.9% of the adult population¹ and 14.6% of teenagers² currently smoke.
- 2. Although it is unlawful to sell tobacco products and/or tobacco paraphernalia to minors,³ 5.6% of California retailers surveyed do sell to minors.⁴ These numbers are more concerning locally. According to the California Health Department's Food and Drug Branch, the sales rate to minors in Contra Costa County overall is 22%⁵. In other words, stores in Contra Costa County on average sell tobacco to youth one in every four times they try to buy cigarettes.

E. The City Council of the City of Antioch is also concerned with the increased calls for service, increasing reports of violent criminal behavior and related detrimental neighborhood effects associated with Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailers. The City of Antioch needs additional time to study this issue and determine if concentration and/or location of Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailers in close proximity to other uses with generally high rates of calls for service such as bars or liquor stores would exasperate these concerns. The City of Antioch is also concerned about uses with high rates of calls for service in proximity to youth including schools and parks.

F. The City of Antioch, as well as neighboring cities, have experienced criminal activity associated with Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailers, including incidents involving burglary and attempted burglary, armed robbery, fights and disturbances including those involving juveniles, petty theft, assault, threats, loitering, panhandling, harassment, stolen vehicles, and passing counterfeit bills. For example, the Antioch Police Department has documented a significant amount of calls for service involving a variety of crimes in these businesses and within the shopping centers in which Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailers are located. Included below as findings are representational incidents associated with Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailers for the 12 month period from May 9, 2012 – May 9, 2013 (not all businesses were in operation for the entire period):

- Cigarette 4 Less, 3142 Contra Loma Blvd: two (2) calls for service related 1. to an alarm and an alleged fight between juveniles in the area.
- 2. Cigarette 4 Less, 2549 San Jose Drive: eleven (11) calls for service related to alarms, petty thefts, a civil complaint and an assault.
- 3. Smoke Shop, 4532 Lone Tree Way: five (5) calls for service related to a robbery, petty thefts, unfounded 911 call and a fight inside the store.

- 4. Smoke Shop DBA Cigarette 4 Less, 2767 Lone Tree Way: two (2) calls for service related to an armed robbery and false alarm.
- 5. Cigarette 4 Less, 2727 Hillcrest Ave: five (5) calls for service related to alarms, a threat complaint, armed robbery and a suspicious circumstance.
- 6. Sycamore Smoke & More, 1096 Sycamore Drive: thirty-one (31) calls for service related to unwanted guests, loitering complaints, assaults, panhandling and fighting.
- 7. Cigarette 4 Less, 3708 Lone Tree Way: six (6) calls for service related to alarms, juvenile disturbance and a burglary of the business.
- 8. Tower Zone Smoke Shop, 2717 Contra Loma Blvd.: five (5) calls for service related to an armed robbery, petty theft and 911 hang-up.
- 9. Lone Tree Cigarette & More Inc., 4839 Lone Tree Way Suite C: eight (8) calls for service related to alarms, armed robbery, petty theft, harassment and suspicious persons.
- 10. Smoke Shop Mini Market, 1515 A Street: eleven (11) calls for service related to threats, loitering, juvenile disturbance, panhandling, stolen cars, an alarm, counterfeit bill and petty theft.
- 11. Discount Cigarette & Cigar Store, 1615 A Street: nine (9) calls for service related to an alarm, a fight in the parking lot in front of the business, medical call, burglary, unwanted guest, a suspicious person, a suspicious circumstance and a fraud (counterfeit) complaint.
- 12. Fusion Novelties, 1336 Sunset Drive: one (1) call for service related to a vandalism broken window.

G. In addition to the increased calls for service and increasing reports of violent criminal behavior described above, the City Council is also concerned that Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailers are not complying with applicable State and local laws related to tobacco and paraphernalia sales. Code Enforcement staff has inspected the businesses listed below and found violations of California Health and Safety Code 11364.5 and Antioch Municipal Code Title 5, Chapter 16 related to paraphernalia sales; Municipal Code Section 9-5.519 related to tobacco advertising; Municipal Code 9-5.508 related to general advertising; and California Business and Professions Code 22962 and Municipal Code 6-8.13 related to self service display of tobacco:

1. Buchanan Smoke Shop, 2329A Buchanan Road: notice of violation for illegal display of paraphernalia. This location opened in April 2013 and is therefore not listed above as they did not have calls for service during the 12 month period.

- 2. Lone Tree Cigarette & More Inc., 4839 Lone Tree Way Suite C: notice of violation for illegal display of paraphernalia and tobacco related signs.
- 3. Cigarette 4 Less, 3142 Contra Loma Blvd: notice of violation for illegal display of paraphernalia, general signage, and self service tobacco.
- 4. Smoke Shop DBA Cigarette 4 Less, 2767 Lone Tree Way: notice of violation for illegal display of paraphernalia, and self service tobacco.
- 5. Cigarette 4 Less, 2727 Hillcrest Ave: notice of violation for illegal display of paraphernalia.
- 6. Cigarette 4 Less, 3708 Lone Tree Way: notice of violation for illegal display of paraphernalia, and self service tobacco.
- 7. Tower Zone Smoke Shop, 2717 Contra Loma Blvd.: notice of violation for illegal display of paraphernalia.
- 8. Smoke Shop Mini Market, 1515 A Street: notice of violation for illegal display of paraphernalia.
- 9. Discount Cigarette & Cigar Store, 1615 A Street: notice of violation for illegal display of paraphernalia.
- 10. Fusion Novelties,1336 Sunset Drive: notice of violation for illegal display of paraphernalia.

H. Without the enactment of this Ordinance, multiple applicants could quickly receive entitlements which would allow additional Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailers that pose a threat to the public health, safety, and welfare. The City Council hereby determines that the Municipal Code is in need of updating to protect the public health, safety, and welfare from dangers caused by Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailers. The City requires additional time to prepare, evaluate and adopt reasonable regulations regarding the construction, placement, concentration and operation of Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailers so that such regulations are applied in a nondiscriminatory manner.

I. In order to prevent the frustration of these studies and the implementation of new regulations, the public interest, health, safety, and welfare require immediate enactment of this Ordinance. The absence of this Ordinance would impair the orderly and effective implementation of contemplated Municipal Code amendments, and any further authorization of these uses within the City during the period of the interim zoning regulations may be in conflict with or may frustrate the contemplated updates and revisions of the Municipal Code. J. Based on the foregoing, the City finds that there is a current and immediate threat to the public health, safety, or welfare and that this Ordinance is necessary in order to protect the City from the potential effects and impacts of Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailers in the City, potential increases in crime, impacts on parking availability in the business areas of the City, the aesthetic impacts to the City, and other similar or related effects on property values and the quality of life in the City's neighborhoods.

K. The City Council further finds that this interim zoning regulation is a matter of local and City-wide importance and is not directed towards any particular business that currently seeks to construct or operate a Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailer business.

L. The City Council finds that this Ordinance is authorized by the City's police powers. The City Council further finds that the length of the interim zoning regulations imposed by this Ordinance will not in any way deprive any person of rights granted by state or federal laws, because the interim zoning regulation is short in duration and essential to protect the public health, safety and welfare.

SECTION 3. Interim Regulations. The following provisions are hereby adopted as interim zoning standards pertaining to the review or approval of any entitlements or the issuance of any permits or licenses pursuant to the Antioch Municipal Code for Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailers. The approval of any entitlements or the issuance of any permit or license in the City in conflict with these provisions is expressly prohibited:

- Α. Restricted Activities. For a period of forty-five (45) days following the enactment of this Ordinance, no person shall be issued a permit, license or land use entitlement for the construction, placement, or operation of new Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailer businesses within the City. The City Manager or his or her designee shall review any application for a permit, license or land use entitlement to determine applicability of the provisions of this Ordinance. City Staff, City boards and City commissions are directed to refrain from issuing any application for any permits, licenses or land use entitlement, including, but not limited to, use permits, variances, building permits, licenses and certificates of occupancy, necessary for construction, placement, or operation of a Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailer business. These prohibitions shall remain in effect during the forty-five (45) days following enactment of this Ordinance. Existing Tobacco and Paraphernalia Retailer businesses may continue to operate at their current locations provided that they are in compliance with State law and the Antioch Municipal Code.
- **B. Definitions.** In addition to the definitions contained in the City's Municipal Code, the following words and phrases shall, for the purposes of this Ordinance, be defined as follows, unless it is clearly apparent from the context that another meaning is intended. Should any of the definitions be

in conflict with the current provisions of the Municipal Code, the following definitions shall prevail:

- 1. **TOBACCO AND PARAPHERNALIA RETAILER** shall mean any establishment that sells any substance containing tobacco including but not limited to cigarettes, cigars, chewing tobacco and dipping tobacco, cigarette papers, or any other instruments or paraphernalia as defined in this ordinance. Retail businesses larger than 5,000 s.f. having less than 5% of their sales area devoted to tobacco or paraphernalia are exempt from this definition.
- 2. **PARAPHERNALIA** shall have the definition set forth in California Health & Safety Code section 11014.5, as that section may be amended from time to time.

SECTION 4. CEQA. This ordinance is not a project within the meaning of Section 15378 of the State CEQA (California Environmental Quality Act) Guidelines, because it has no potential for resulting in physical change in the environment, directly or ultimately. In the event that this Ordinance is found to be a project under CEQA, it is subject to the CEQA exemption contained in CEQA Guideline section 16061 (b) (3) because it can be seen with certainty to have no possibility of a significant effect on the environment.

<u>SECTION 5.</u> <u>Severability</u>. If any section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Ordinance is, for any reason, held to be invalid or unconstitutional by the decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance. The City Council hereby declares that it would have adopted this Ordinance, and each section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, subdivisions, sentences, clauses, phrases, or portions thereof be declared invalid or unconstitutional.

SECTION 6. Effective Date. This interim ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its adoption and shall continue in effect for forty-five (45) days from the date of its adoption by not less than a four-fifths vote of the Antioch City Council, and shall thereafter be of no further force and effect, unless, after notice pursuant to Government Code Section 65090 and public hearing, the Antioch City Council extends this Ordinance, and the interim zoning regulations adopted thereby, pursuant to Government Code Section 65858.

<u>SECTION 7</u>. <u>Report of Council</u>. Ten days prior to the expiration of this Ordinance, or any extension thereof, this Council shall issue a written report describing the measures taken to alleviate the condition which led to the adoption of this ordinance, or any extension thereof.

<u>SECTION 8</u>. <u>Declaration of Urgency</u>. This ordinance is hereby declared to be an urgency measure necessary for the immediate protection of the public health, safety

and welfare. This Council hereby finds that there is a current and immediate threat to the public health, safety and welfare. The reasons for this urgency are declared and set forth in Section 2 of this Ordinance and are incorporated herein by reference.

<u>SECTION 9</u>. <u>Publication; Certification</u>. The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this Ordinance and cause same to be published in accordance with State law.</u>

STAFF REPORT TO THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL FOR CONSIDERATION AT THE COUNCIL MEETING OF MAY 28, 2013

SUBJECT: Revenue Ballot Measures

RECOMMENDATION: The following action is recommended in order for the City Council to consider at its June 11, 2013 meeting a resolution calling a Special Election for November 5, 2013 on a ballot measure to temporarily increase the sales tax by ¹/₂ cent for 10 years subject to an independent audit, Citizens' Oversight Committee and annual budget reporting, due to the City's fiscal emergency and need for additional revenue to fund needed City services including police, code enforcement and street repair:

1. Motion to read by title only and introduce the "Ordinance of the City of Antioch Imposing a Transactions and Use Tax to be Administered by the State Board of Equalization" (Attachment A) (two-thirds vote)

ACTION: Motion to provide direction to staff on business license tax options:

- 1. <u>Citizens' Initiative</u>: With the Initiative, the citizens can gather signatures from registered Antioch voters after publishing a notice. If sufficient signatures are verified by County Elections, then the Initiative would be presented to the City Council to determine whether to order a report or to place it on the ballot at a future election date determined by the Council; or
- Council Ballot Measure for \$240 business license tax on residential landlords: Direct staff to work with the Initiative proponent to draft a City Council ballot measure and ordinance that could be structured as follows:
 - a. Confirm (and possibly freeze) current gross receipts business license tax
 - b. Impose tax on residential landlords per the following alternate formula:
 - i. \$ 240 per unit per year for 1 to 25 units
 - ii. \$ 120 per unit per year for 26 to 50 units
 - iii. \$ 75 per unit per year for 51 to 150 units
 - iv. \$ 50 per unit per year for over 150 units; or
- 3. <u>Council Ballot Measure on Residential Landlord Business License Tax</u>– Direct staff to work with all of the stakeholders, including the California Apartment Association, to develop a ballot measure for a landlord business license tax, which would also confirm the current business license tax; or
- 4. <u>Council Ballot Measure applying business license tax based on gross</u> <u>receipts to residential landlords</u>: Direct staff to draft a ballot measure and ordinance to confirm the current gross receipts business license tax formula applicable to all businesses including residential landlords for consideration at the November 2013 election.

BACKGROUND:

Given concerns about service levels in light of the City's significant revenue declines due in part to the national economic recession and housing market crisis, the City Council has been discussing revenue ballot measures at several meetings. In particular, discussions occurred at City Council meetings on February 26, March 12, March 26 and May 14, 2013, along with the Council's budget study sessions. Those staff reports and attachments can be found on the City's website at <u>www.ci.antioch.ca.us</u>. For ease of reference, the City of Antioch Budget Fact Sheets are provided again (Attachment B).

City's Fiscal Challenges

Although the Fiscal Year 2012/13 budget may close "in the black" (expenditures not exceeding revenues), serious budget issues remain:

- The City's General Fund revenues (primarily property tax and sales tax) have dropped almost \$13 million since 2007 (excluding one-time monies). This caused severe cuts to City services and less accessibility to the public given the weekly closures of City Hall. Providing pre-recession services and accessibility would require at least \$11.3 million in additional revenues each fiscal year.
- In Fiscal Year 2014, the City is projected to spend \$3.6 million more than it is receiving in revenues. This results in an "unbalanced" budget and deficit spending, which forces the City to use reserves to meet a minimum level of services. The deficit spending is projected to increase to \$4.7 million in Fiscal Year 2015 resulting in almost no reserves/no fund balance.
- Sound financial practice, as established by the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA), recommends a fund balance equal to at least two months worth of operating expenditures in order to provide financial stability in times of economic crisis, catastrophic incidents and litigation matters among other things. This is similar to a personal savings account consumers are recommended to have to cover mortgage, insurance, utilities, etc. in times of financial instability due to catastrophic events like job loss, disability, recession, etc. In fiscal year 2014, the City should have at least \$6.6 million in reserves and based on projections, the City will be approximately \$1.3 million short.
- In Fiscal Year 2010, the City's General Fund transferred \$1.5 million in replacement funds set aside to be used to replace the City's aging vehicles and computer systems. Three years later, these funds have still not been re-paid. Repayment of these funds would cause an immediate \$1.5 million loss in General Fund balance/reserves further increasing deficit spending (that is further increasing expenditures over revenue). As a result of this borrowing, replacement of aging vehicles and computer equipment has been deferred, increasing the need for continued maintenance costs in order to extend the useful lives as long as possible.

The City has taken extreme measures to address the \$13 million decrease in General Fund revenues since 2007 and to mitigate increasing budget shortfalls, including:

- operating at 40% staffing reduction through layoffs, retirements and not filling vacancies including the elimination of code enforcement staff, community services officers (CSOs), traffic and other special police units;
- decreasing management salaries and employee work hours through furloughs and reduced overtime for all employees since July 2009;
- increasing employee contributions towards retirement costs and drastically reducing medical after retirement benefits for new employees;
- eliminating employee cost of living increases for the period of 2009 to 2011;
- reducing supply and equipment costs and deferring vehicle and equipment maintenance; and
- reducing funding and services at the Animal Shelter and Recreation Programs.

Despite these significant expenditure cuts through lay-offs, service reductions and furloughs, serious budget issues remain. These budget concerns only intensify if services are restored to meet community needs. These community needs include:

- Violent crime in Antioch increased 30.6 % compared to 2011 and property crime saw a 22.8% increase compared to 2011. The City's overall Part 1 crime saw a 24.2% increase in 2012. Response time to Priority 1 calls saw an over 2 minute increase from 2011 (from 8:57 minutes to 11:04 minutes). The Police Department is currently staffed with 87 officers when it is authorized for 102 officers. The City last had 89 sworn officers back in 1995 when the City population was only 74,925 instead of 103,833and the calls for service were only 47,677 and not 81,572.
- The City receives an average of 25 calls per week for Code Enforcement services that cannot be returned in a timely manner.
- A 2011 Pavement Management Program Budget Options Report (Pavement Management Update) indicated that the City, with its approximately 700 miles of streets, had a backlog of over \$52,000,000 worth of needed street rehabilitation and maintenance.

Proposed Revenue Measures

Accordingly, the City Council focused on two potential revenue measures for the November 2013 ballot: sales tax and business license tax. Although these measures would be general taxes, their passage would create additional funding for the Council's stated priorities of public safety, community beautification/code enforcement and economic development. It is anticipated that these priorities would at least initially be

accomplished primarily through funding staffing in the Police Department and Code Enforcement. Information regarding Police Department staffing costs has been provided (Attachment C), along with general budget information.

To place a general tax measure on the ballot when there is no City Council Member election, such as November 2013, the City Council must unanimously determine that there is an "emergency" requiring that the tax measure be considered sooner. Although the City's fiscal year FY 2012-13 budget is expected to close without a deficit, FY 2013/14 budget is currently projected to have a structural deficit of nearly \$3.6 million and that does not include the expense of restoring the services that the community needs. The City has avoided deficit spending the last few years due to staffing vacancies primarily in the Police Department. However, if the City were to recruit police officers quickly enough to fill all of the vacancies in the next fiscal year, expenditures would significantly exceed revenue projections. Authorization of any additional police officer positions would increase this structural budget gap, creating an immediate fiscal emergency because the City would be significantly deficit spending and soon unable to meet its obligations. When that occurs a city goes bankrupt.

Likewise, if the City were to restore the Code Enforcement division to its previous staffing of 11 persons, then there would be an immediate fiscal emergency because reserves would be depleted and the City would be deficit spending and soon unable to meet its obligations. When that occurs a city goes bankrupt.

Likewise, if the City were to repair and replace aging public infrastructure, such as streets, as the community needs and as outlined in the City's General Plan, Capital Improvement Plan, and Pavement Management Update, there would be an immediate fiscal emergency as all reserves would be depleted and the City would be deficit spending and soon unable to meet its obligations. When that occurs, a city goes bankrupt.

Community Survey

As previously discussed, there are two phases to any revenue measure or what some experts describe as "a two-lap marathon." The first phase/lap is the City in its general governance role determining whether the community is satisfied with service levels, particularly given comments about police department and code enforcement staffing. Through public meetings, community surveys and dialog, the City Council decides whether to place a revenue measure on the ballot for the voters' consideration.

To this end, the City Council authorized the City Manager to conduct a professional, statistically correct community survey. The results of the professional telephone survey were presented at the May 14, 2013 City Council meeting. In general, the community is concerned about the lack of City services and particularly police services which make up 67% of the City's General Fund budget. There was strong support for a sales tax increase for 10 years at both ½ and ¾ cent.

The second phase/lap for a revenue measure after the City Council places it on the ballot is the campaign to support that revenue measure, in which the City cannot advocate for the revenue measure but can provide information. Thus, community members and

stakeholders run that second lap if there is a desire to advocate for the successful passage of the revenue measure and increased services.

Sales Tax Measure

Information regarding a sales tax measure was previously provided to the City Council, including information on estimated projected sales tax revenues (Attachment D) and County-wide sales tax information (Attachment E). Of the 19 cities in the County, Concord, Hercules, Orinda, Pinole, Pittsburg, Richmond and San Pablo already have a sales tax of 9.0% and Moraga and El Cerrito have a sales tax of 9.5%.

At the May 14, 2013 staff meeting, City Council directed staff to prepare a ballot measure and ordinance for a temporary ½ cent sales tax increase for 10 years, subject to an independent audit, Citizens' Oversight Committee (7 Antioch residents) and annual budget reporting.

The California Board of Equalization requires the City Council to introduce and adopt a Sales Tax Ordinance before calling for an election to place it on a ballot. Accordingly, staff recommends that the Council take the first step – introduction of the ordinance – at this meeting. The second step for a future meeting is the adoption of the ordinance (2/3 vote required) and a resolution declaring a fiscal emergency and calling for a Special Election on November 5, 2013 (unanimous vote).

If the voters approve the Ordinance, then the City and Board of Equalization would enter into agreements for the administration of the additional sales tax. Collection of the tax would begin on April 1, 2014.

Business License Tax Measure

Many of the current provisions in the Antioch Municipal Code regarding the business license tax were imposed even before the 1966 Code and should be updated to reflect current uses and laws. Generally, the business license tax is based on the following formula:

\$25 for gross receipts up to \$20,000
\$1.25 per \$1000 of gross receipts for gross receipts from \$20,000 to \$1 million
\$1,250 plus \$.20 per \$1000 of gross receipts over \$1 million

There is also a business license application fee set through the Master Fee Schedule. Historically, the tax was imposed on apartment owners. Staff had proposed extending this tax to owners of rentals of single-family residences (e.g. houses, townhouses, condominiums, duplexes, etc.), given that such rentals constitute a business being conducted in Antioch.

A separate Rental Inspection Program was established in 2007 with inspection fees, but was abandoned when the recession forced the layoff of the Code Enforcement division.

Initiative

As mentioned at the last Council meeting, a Notice of Intent to Circulate a Petition for a Business License Tax on Residential Landlords had been filed with the City Clerk (Attachment F). The citizen's Initiative would impose a \$240 per unit, per year business license tax on residential landlords instead of the current gross receipts formula currently used to tax apartment landlords. As required by the California Elections Code, the City Attorney has provided the Initiative's proponent, Mr. Hans Ho, a ballot title and summary. Once the proponent publishes a notice of the Petition in a newspaper of general circulation, the proponent can gather signatures from registered Antioch voters who agree that the Initiative should be placed on the ballot. If sufficient signatures are verified by the County Elections Division, then the Initiative would be presented for the City Council to place it on a future ballot at an election date determined by the Council. The City Council can also ask staff to prepare a report on the Initiative.

Discussions with Initiative Proponent

At the last Council meeting, the Council directed staff to meet with the Initiative's proponent and backers to discuss whether the Initiative language could be melded with a prior staff recommendation to confirm the current gross receipts business license tax formula applicable to all businesses including residential landlords and a general update of the decades-old ordinance provisions.

The backers of the Initiative told City staff that they were adamantly opposed to a more complicated update of the entire business license tax ordinance. However, they were willing to confirm the existing gross receipts formula for the tax (and freeze it for a period of time if desired by the City Council recognizing that increases require voter approval). The backers also wanted to set a dollar amount for the tax, but did agree to a graduated schedule that would be less of an increase from the tax amounts currently imposed on apartments:

\$ 240 per unit per year for 1 to 25 units
\$ 120 per unit per year for 26 to 50 units
\$ 75 per unit per year for 51 to 150 units

\$ 50 per unit per year for over 150 units

Streamlined language regarding exceptions, implementing rules and process for amendment were also discussed.

Staff has been told by the backers of the Initiative that if the Council places an acceptable compromise measure regarding the business license tax on the ballot, then they will not continue with the efforts to place the original Initiative on the ballot. Otherwise, they intend to gather signatures to place the original Initiative on the ballot. It is expected that the Initiative backers will attend the May 28 Council meeting and the Council may want to confirm this understanding during the public meeting.

Email from the California Apartment Association

The City recently received the attached email from the California Apartment Association (CAA) voicing concerns about the proposed business license tax and a request to be included in the development of a ballot measure (Attachment G). A meeting was held on Wednesday, May 22 involving the City, an Initiative backer and representatives of the CAA. The CAA expressed serious concerns about the business license tax proposed with the Initiative and the compromise. Staff anticipates formal feedback from CAA at the Council meeting on May 28. A list of larger apartment buildings in Antioch is attached (Attachment H).

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

Estimated cost of an election is \$4.75 per registered voter with Antioch having approximately 43,000 voters. A successful ballot measure would raise revenue for the City, but the amount and timing of receipt would depend on the measure.

OPTIONS:

State law requires a resolution placing a matter on the ballot to be adopted at least 88 days before the election and practically the County Elections Division requires even more time. At this time, it appears that the first meeting in July would be the last regular meeting to consider such a resolution, assuming the need for two readings of an ordinance as well.

ORDINANCE NO.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF ANTIOCH IMPOSING A TRANSACTIONS AND USE TAX TO BE ADMINISTERED BY THE STATE BOARD OF EQUALIZATION

The City Council of the City of Antioch does ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. ADDITION TO THE MUNICIPAL CODE. Article 4 is added to Chapter 5 of Title 3 of Antioch the Municipal Code to read as follows:

ARTICLE 4: TRANSACTIONS AND USE TAX

Section 3-5.401. <u>TITLE.</u> This article shall be known as the "Antioch Transactions and Use Tax Ordinance." The city of Antioch hereinafter shall be called "City." This article shall be applicable in the incorporated territory of the City.

Section 3-5.402. <u>OPERATIVE DATE.</u> "Operative Date" means the first day of the first calendar quarter commencing more than 110 days after the adoption of this ordinance.

Section 3-5.403. <u>PURPOSE</u>. This article is adopted to achieve the following, among other purposes, and directs that the provisions hereof be interpreted in order to accomplish those purposes:

A. To impose a retail transactions and use tax in accordance with the provisions of Part 1.6 (commencing with Section 7251) of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code and Section 7285.9 of Part 1.7 of Division 2 which authorizes the City to adopt this tax ordinance which shall be operative if a majority of the electors voting on the measure vote to approve the imposition of the tax at an election called for that purpose.

B. To adopt a retail transactions and use tax ordinance that incorporates provisions identical to those of the Sales and Use Tax Law of the State of California insofar as those provisions are not inconsistent with the requirements and limitations contained in Part 1.6 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code.

C. To adopt a retail transactions and use tax ordinance that imposes a tax and provides a measure therefore that can be administered and collected by the State Board of Equalization in a manner that adapts itself as fully as practicable to, and requires the least possible deviation from, the existing statutory and administrative procedures followed by the State Board of Equalization in administering and collecting the California State Sales and Use Taxes.

D. To adopt a retail transactions and use tax ordinance that can be administered in a manner that will be, to the greatest degree possible, consistent with the provisions of Part 1.6 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, minimize the cost of collecting the transactions and use taxes, and at the same time, minimize the burden of record keeping upon persons subject to taxation under the provisions of this article. Section 3-5.404. <u>CONTRACT WITH STATE.</u> Prior to the Operative Date, the City shall contract with the State Board of Equalization to perform all functions incident to the administration and operation of this transactions and use tax article; provided, that if the City shall not have contracted with the State Board of Equalization prior to the operative date, it shall nevertheless so contract and in such a case the Operative Date shall be the first day of the first calendar quarter following the execution of such a contract.

Section 3-5.405. <u>TRANSACTIONS TAX RATE</u>. For the privilege of selling tangible personal property at retail, a tax is hereby imposed upon all retailers in the incorporated territory of the City at the rate of one-half of one percent (.50%) of the gross receipts of any retailer from the sale of all tangible personal property sold at retail in said territory on and after the operative date of this article.

Section 3-5.406. <u>PLACE OF SALE.</u> For the purposes of this article, all retail sales are consummated at the place of business of the retailer unless the tangible personal property sold is delivered by the retailer or his agent to an out-of-state destination or to a common carrier for delivery to an out-of-state destination. The gross receipts from such sales shall include delivery charges, when such charges are subject to the state sales and use tax, regardless of the place to which delivery is made. In the event a retailer has no permanent place of business in the State or has more than one place of business, the place or places at which the retail sales are consummated shall be determined under rules and regulations to be prescribed and adopted by the State Board of Equalization.

Section 3-5.407. <u>USE TAX RATE</u>. An excise tax is hereby imposed on the storage, use or other consumption in the City of tangible personal property purchased from any retailer on and after the Operative Date of this article for storage, use or other consumption in said territory at the rate of one-half of one percent (.50%) of the sales price of the property. The sales price shall include delivery charges when such charges are subject to state sales or use tax regardless of the place to which delivery is made.

Section 3-5.408. <u>ADOPTION OF PROVISIONS OF STATE LAW.</u> Except as otherwise provided in this article and except insofar as they are inconsistent with the provisions of Part 1.6 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, all of the provisions of Part 1 (commencing with Section 6001) of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code are hereby adopted and made a part of this article as though fully set forth herein.

Section 3-5.409. <u>LIMITATIONS ON ADOPTION OF STATE LAW AND</u> <u>COLLECTION OF USE TAXES.</u> In adopting the provisions of Part 1 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code:

A. Wherever the State of California is named or referred to as the taxing agency, the name of this City shall be substituted therefor. However, the substitution shall not be made when:

1. The word "State" is used as a part of the title of the State Controller, State Treasurer, State Board of Control, State Board of Equalization, State Treasury, or the Constitution of the State of California; 2. The result of that substitution would require action to be taken by or against this City or any agency, officer, or employee thereof rather than by or against the State Board of Equalization, in performing the functions incident to the administration or operation of this article.

3. In those sections, including, but not necessarily limited to sections referring to the exterior boundaries of the State of California, where the result of the substitution would be to:

a. Provide an exemption from this tax with respect to certain sales, storage, use or other consumption of tangible personal property which would not otherwise be exempt from this tax while such sales, storage, use or other consumption remain subject to tax by the State under the provisions of Part 1 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, or;

b. Impose this tax with respect to certain sales, storage, use or other consumption of tangible personal property which would not be subject to tax by the state under the said provision of that code.

4. In Sections 6701, 6702 (except in the last sentence thereof), 6711, 6715, 6737, 6797 or 6828 of the Revenue and Taxation Code.

B. The word "City" shall be substituted for the word "State" in the phrase "retailer engaged in business in this State" in Section 6203 and in the definition of that phrase in Section 6203.

Section 3-5.410. <u>PERMIT NOT REQUIRED.</u> If a seller's permit has been issued to a retailer under Section 6067 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, an additional transactor's permit shall not be required by this article.

Section 3-5.411. EXEMPTIONS AND EXCLUSIONS.

A. There shall be excluded from the measure of the transactions tax and the use tax the amount of any sales tax or use tax imposed by the State of California or by any city, city and county, or county pursuant to the Bradley-Burns Uniform Local Sales and Use Tax Law or the amount of any state-administered transactions or use tax.

B. There are exempted from the computation of the amount of transactions tax the gross receipts from:

1. Sales of tangible personal property, other than fuel or petroleum products, to operators of aircraft to be used or consumed principally outside the county in which the sale is made and directly and exclusively in the use of such aircraft as common carriers of persons or property under the authority of the laws of this State, the United States, or any foreign government.

2. Sales of property to be used outside the City which is shipped to a point outside the City, pursuant to the contract of sale, by delivery to such point by the retailer or his agent, or by delivery by the retailer to a carrier for shipment to a consignee

at such point. For the purposes of this paragraph, delivery to a point outside the City shall be satisfied:

a. With respect to vehicles (other than commercial vehicles) subject to registration pursuant to Chapter 1 (commencing with Section 4000) of Division 3 of the Vehicle Code, aircraft licensed in compliance with Section 21411 of the Public Utilities Code, and undocumented vessels registered under Division 3.5 (commencing with Section 9840) of the Vehicle Code by registration to an out-of-City address and by a declaration under penalty of perjury, signed by the buyer, stating that such address is, in fact, his or her principal place of residence; and

b. With respect to commercial vehicles, by registration to a place of business out-of-City and declaration under penalty of perjury, signed by the buyer, that the vehicle will be operated from that address.

3. The sale of tangible personal property if the seller is obligated to furnish the property for a fixed price pursuant to a contract entered into prior to the operative date of this article.

4. A lease of tangible personal property which is a continuing sale of such property, for any period of time for which the lessor is obligated to lease the property for an amount fixed by the lease prior to the operative date of this article.

5. For the purposes of subparagraphs (3) and (4) of this section, the sale or lease of tangible personal property shall be deemed not to be obligated pursuant to a contract or lease for any period of time for which any party to the contract or lease has the unconditional right to terminate the contract or lease upon notice, whether or not such right is exercised.

C. There are exempted from the use tax imposed by this article, the storage, use or other consumption in this City of tangible personal property:

1. The gross receipts from the sale of which have been subject to a transactions tax under any state-administered transactions and use tax ordinance.

2. Other than fuel or petroleum products purchased by operators of aircraft and used or consumed by such operators directly and exclusively in the use of such aircraft as common carriers of persons or property for hire or compensation under a certificate of public convenience and necessity issued pursuant to the laws of this State, the United States, or any foreign government. This exemption is in addition to the exemptions provided in Sections 6366 and 6366.1 of the Revenue and Taxation Code of the State of California.

3. If the purchaser is obligated to purchase the property for a fixed price pursuant to a contract entered into prior to the operative date of this article.

4. If the possession of, or the exercise of any right or power over, the tangible personal property arises under a lease which is a continuing purchase of such property for any period of time for which the lessee is obligated to lease the property for an amount fixed by a lease prior to the operative date of this article.

5. For the purposes of subparagraphs (3) and (4) of this section, storage, use, or other consumption, or possession of, or exercise of any right or power over, tangible personal property shall be deemed not to be obligated pursuant to a contract or lease for any period of time for which any party to the contract or lease has the unconditional right to terminate the contract or lease upon notice, whether or not such right is exercised.

6. Except as provided in subparagraph (7), a retailer engaged in business in the City shall not be required to collect use tax from the purchaser of tangible personal property, unless the retailer ships or delivers the property into the City or participates within the City in making the sale of the property, including, but not limited to, soliciting or receiving the order, either directly or indirectly, at a place of business of the retailer in the City or through any representative, agent, canvasser, solicitor, subsidiary, or person in the City under the authority of the retailer.

7. "A retailer engaged in business in the City" shall also include any retailer of any of the following: vehicles subject to registration pursuant to Chapter 1 (commencing with Section 4000) of Division 3 of the Vehicle Code, aircraft licensed in compliance with Section 21411 of the Public Utilities Code, or undocumented vessels registered under Division 3.5 (commencing with Section 9840) of the Vehicle Code. That retailer shall be required to collect use tax from any purchaser who registers or licenses the vehicle, vessel, or aircraft at an address in the City.

D. Any person subject to use tax under this article may credit against that tax any transactions tax or reimbursement for transactions tax paid to a district imposing, or retailer liable for a transactions tax pursuant to Part 1.6 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code with respect to the sale to the person of the property the storage, use or other consumption of which is subject to the use tax.

Section 3-5.412. <u>AMENDMENTS.</u>

A. All amendments subsequent to the effective date of this ordinance to Part 1 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code relating to sales and use taxes and which are not inconsistent with Part 1.6 and Part 1.7 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, and all amendments to Part 1.6 and Part 1.7 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, shall automatically become a part of this article, provided however, that no such amendment shall operate so as to affect the rate of tax imposed by this article.

B. Pursuant to California Elections Code section 9217 or any successor statute, the City Council of the City of Antioch may amend or appeal this article, but not increase or extend the rate of tax imposed by the article, without the approval of the voters of the City of Antioch voting on such question.

Section 3-5.413. <u>ENJOINING COLLECTION FORBIDDEN.</u> No injunction or writ of mandate or other legal or equitable process shall issue in any suit, action or proceeding in any court against the State or the City, or against any officer of the State or the City, to prevent or enjoin the collection under this article, or Part 1.6 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, of any tax or any amount of tax required to be collected.

Section 3-5.414. <u>USE OF TAX PROCEEDS</u>. All proceeds of the tax levied and imposed under this article shall be paid into the General Fund for use by the City of Antioch.

Section 3-5.415. <u>ANNUAL AUDIT</u>. By no later than December 31st of each year, the City's independent auditors shall complete a financial audit report to include the revenue raised and expended by this tax to be reflected in the City's budget.

Section 3-5.416. <u>CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE</u>. A Citizens' Oversight Committee shall be established to review the receipt and expenditure of the revenue from this transactions and use tax, including the annual auditor's report. The Committee's review shall be completed in conjunction with the City's budget process. The Committee's report on its review, whether oral or written, shall be considered by the City Council at a public meeting. Any written report shall be a matter of public record. The Committee shall consist of seven members who shall be Antioch residents. The terms of the Committee members may be staggered but no term shall be less than two years. The City Council may adopt a resolution regarding the appointment of the Committee members and more specific duties of the Committee.

Section 3-5.417. <u>TERMINATION DATE</u>. The authority to levy the tax imposed by this article shall expire ten (10) years from the Operative Date.

SECTION 2. <u>SEVERABILITY</u>. If any provision of this ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the remainder of the ordinance and the application of such provision to other persons or circumstances shall not be affected thereby.

SECTION 3. CEQA. This transactions and use tax to be submitted to the voters is a general tax that can be used for any legitimate governmental purpose. As such, under CEQA Guidelines section 15378(b)(4), the tax is not a project within the meaning of CEQA because it creates a government funding mechanism that does not involve any commitment to any specific project that may result in a potentially significant impact on the environment. Therefore, under CEQA Guidelines section 15060, review under CEQA is not required.

SECTION 4. EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance relates to the levying and collecting of the City transactions and use taxes and shall not take effect until approved by the majority of the voters voting at the general municipal election to be held on November 5, 2013.

SECTION 5. <u>CERTIFICATION: PUBLICATION</u>. Upon approval by the voters, the City Clerk shall certify to the passage and adoption of this Ordinance and shall cause it to be published according to law and transmitted to the Board of Equalization.

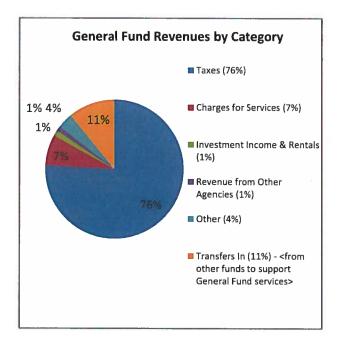

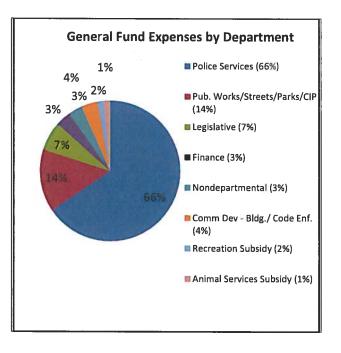

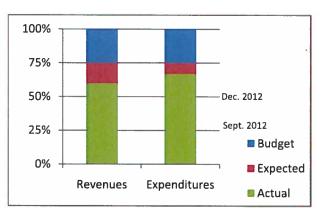

Revenues appear significantly below the target due to the timing of the City's property and sales tax in lieu receipts. The first allocation of 50% of the annual amount was received until January 2013 with the second installments to be received in May. The total revenue budgeted for these two items totals \$7.5M. This demonstrates the need to maintain adequate reserves, or fund balances, to cover the cash flows for operating costs due to the uneven timing of receipts.

Expenditures are slightly below expectations due to the timing of expenditures and current year vacancy savings. The projected savings are incorporated into the revised budget being presented to Council in the budget study sessions (see the next section). In addition, subsidies to Animal Services and Recreation Services do not occur until June when the actual amount needed to subsidize the programs is known.

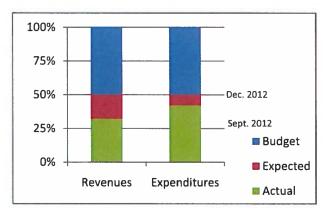

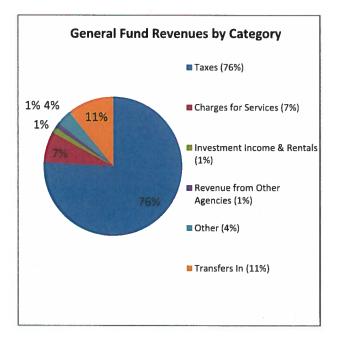
The main operating fund of the City is the General Fund which funds most of the day-to-day services the City provides. Since the recession began in late 2007, deteriorating home values and decreased consumer spending have seriously eroded the General Fund's two main sources of revenue – property and sales taxes – that pay for the vital services that affect the safety, health and welfare of our citizens. In addition, State grabs of local funds have reduced revenues, as has low interest yields on invested funds.

Thus, General Fund revenues have decreased by approximately \$13 million since fiscal year 2006– 07 and the City has reduced expenditures by approximately \$7 million through a variety of measures including the following actions:

- Laid off 41 employees and not filled most vacant positions
- Sought additional grant funding (but grants do not typically cover operating costs)
- Decreased management salaries and employee work hours through furloughs and reduced overtime
- Postponed employee cost of living increases and deferred compensation and Police Department salary increases
- Eliminated non-mandatory training

- Reduced supply and equipment costs
- Deferred vehicle & equipment maintenance
- Reduced funding to the Animal Shelter and Recreation Programs
- Negotiated with labor groups for employees to contribute a higher percentage towards retirement costs
- Reduced retirement benefits for new employees

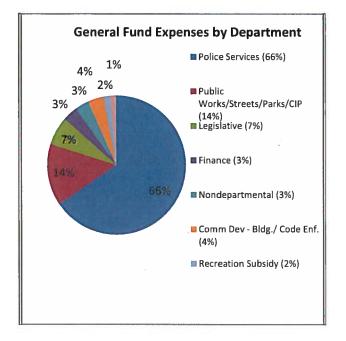

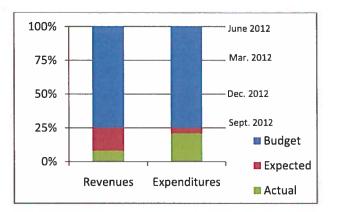
Fund Balance

Fund balance represents the net of assets and liabilities of the government and is often referred to as reserves. It is a measure of the financial stability of a City. It is important to maintain an adequate level to fund operating expenditures for a period of time in the event of a significant natural or economic event, and to cover cash flows for uneven revenue streams such as property tax. Having too low or no fund balance can result in a state of fiscal emergency or bankruptcy for a city.

The City of Antioch has adopted a fund balance policy requiring the unassigned fund balance of the General Fund to be at least 10% of total operating revenues with a goal of reaching and maintaining a level of 15%. At the close of fiscal year 2011–12, the unassigned fund balance was \$8,110,949, or 23.11% of operating revenues. At the close of the current fiscal year, it is projected to be \$5,719,689, or 16.55%. This is a significant decline over the prior fiscal year and means that the City is using reserves to cover all the expenditures for the current year. Or stated another way, the City is not generating enough revenues to cover current year operating costs.

Current Year Budget Status

The budget is monitored continually by City staff. A helpful tool in this analysis is to compare expected budget results on a quarterly basis to actual performance and determining the cause of any significant variances. A budget to actual comparison for the period ended 9/30/12 follows:



Based on the chart above, actual revenues and expenditures in September should be at 25% of the budgeted levels. Revenues appear significantly below the target due to the timing of the City's property tax receipts. The first allocation of 55% of the annual property tax amount will not be received until December 2012. This demonstrates the need to maintain adequate reserves, or fund balances, to cover the cash flows for operating costs until the first significant source of revenue is received.

Expenditures are slightly below expectations due to the timing of expenditures. Subsidies to Animal Services and Recreation Services do not occur until June when the actual amount needed is known. A better picture of how the City is tracking to projections will be seen at 12/31/2012 after the first installment of property tax is received.

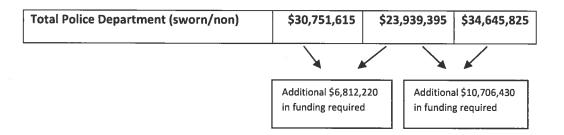

In addition to the personnel costs, hiring additional officers beyond what is currently funded requires additional costs for safety equipment and vehicles. A detail of those costs is provided below.

Vehicle cost represents initial purchase price but will need to be replaced every five years and therefore funds should be set aside annually thereafter for replacement. Safety equipment is an annual cost based on the total number of officers funded beyond the current level.

Code Enforcement Staffing

The City has six (6) code enforcement FTE positions. The cost of filling all six of these positions would be \$621,000 annually. Salaries based on rates scheduled to be in effect March 2014 per MOU for a Code Enforcement Officer without a certificate and based on furloughed hours.

Notice of Intent to Circulate Petition Pursuant to Elections Code Section 9202

Notice is hereby given by the person whose name appears hereon of his intention to circulate the petition within the City of Antioch for the purpose of giving the voters a chance to adopt the attached Landlord Rental Fee Ordinance. A statement of the reasons for the proposed action contemplated in the petition is as follows:

The City of Antioch has suffered a serious loss of general fund money during the recent recession due to large reductions in sales and property tax, coupled with the elimination of its redevelopment funds. The citizens of Antioch have felt the effects of fewer dollars being spent on police officers for example, and are becoming concerned about personal safety in the community.

One source of potential income for cities is the business license fee. Currently, people in the business of renting housing in Antioch are charged a total business license fee of no more than \$1,200 per year for the privilege of conducting this business within our community, even though the cost of providing police services alone - - forget about the cost of the other city services paid by the general fund - - is more like \$240 per household.

By adopting this ordinance, the citizens of the City of Antioch will assure that people in the business of renting housing in Antioch will pay their fair share towards the cost of city services paid for by the general fund.

NOTE: The proposed ordinance is attached and the \$200 refundable fee is enclosed as required by Elections Code Section 9202.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF ANTIOCH ADDING A LANDLORD RENTAL FEE TO THE CODE OF ORDINANCES

The people of the City of Antioch do ordain as follows:

Section 1. <u>Title.</u> This Ordinance shall be known and referred to as the "Landlord Rental Fee Ordinance."

<u>Section 2.</u> Purpose. This Ordinance is adopted to amend the business license fee for residential landlords in order to partially defray the financial impact of rental housing on the city's general fund.

Section 3. Recitals. It is determined and declared that:

A. Under the Antioch Code of Ordinances as written before enactment of this Landlord Rental Fee Ordinance, residential landlords were assessed an annual business license fee in an amount based on their gross annual income;

B. Subject to cost-of-living adjustments, the highest amount a residential landlord was required to pay was \$1,250 per year (plus 20¢ per thousand dollars of annual income over \$1,000,000);

C. The current general fund balance is well below what is required to provide an adequate level of basic services for the approximately 103,000 people who currently reside in Antioch;

D. For example, the Antioch Police Department is currently unable to afford the additional police officers needed to meet appropriate staffing levels;

E. Rental properties make up approximately 1/3 of the city's housing stock; and

F. Adoption of this Ordinance sets a more realistic fee for the privilege of engaging in the business of renting residential dwelling units in Antioch.

Section 4. Municipal Code Amendment.

The Antioch Municipal Code is hereby amended by adding the Landlord Rental Fee to read in its entirety as follows:

"All those in the business of renting residential dwelling units (e.g. living quarters) shall pay an annual license fee of \$240 per year for each residential

dwelling unit they are renting or have available for rent within the city, except for: (i) the following types of living quarters as defined in Section 9-5.203: adult hotel or motel, bed and breakfast inn, family care home, family day care home (big and small), hospital, hotel, motel, residential convalescent facility, senior housing and senior group housing; (ii) living quarters which must be exempt as a matter of law, if any; and (iii) living quarters which the city council reasonably determines to be substantially similar in nature to one of the excepted living quarters listed above and that exemption is otherwise appropriate. The finance director may promulgate administrative policies and procedures to effectively assess this fee."

Section 5. Effective Date.

This Ordinance shall go into effect ten (10) days after the date on which the election results are declared by the City Council.

Section 6. Construction.

To the maximum extent authorized by law, this Ordinance shall be interpreted in a manner consistent with the right of initiative reserved to the people by the California Constitution. Without limiting the foregoing, nothing in this Ordinance is intended nor shall be construed to supersede, diminish or otherwise conflict with applicable requirements of state or federal law.

Section 7. Future Amendments.

Pursuant to article II, section 10(c) of the California Constitution, the provisions contained in this Ordinance may be amended by a four-fifths vote of the City Council only to the extent such amendments further or expand the intent and objectives set forth in this Ordinance. All other amendments or any proposed repeal of the provisions contained in this Ordinance shall become effective only when approved by the voters.

Section 8. Severability.

If any provision of this Ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstances is held invalid, that determination of invalidity shall not effect other provisions or application of the Ordinance that can be given effect without the invalid provision, and to this end the provisions of this Ordinance are severable. The voters of the city hereby declare that they would have adopted this Ordinance and each portion thereof regardless of the fact that an invalid portion or portions may have been present in the Ordinance.

We were notified of a potential "fee" for rental property owners approximately a month ago. We were recently contacted again by some of our members as development of a potential ballot measure was requested by the City Council. It appears that Council asked that you work with a grass-roots citizens group on creating this ballot measure but they left out the rental property owner stakeholders. Since we represent a significant number of rental property owner stakeholders that would be directly impacted by this ballot measure we would like to meet with you and also be included in the development of a ballot measure that impacts our members businesses.

Please let me know when we might be able to meet and discuss this issue. A question we have is, "What exactly is the city looking to do?" Impose a new fee or change the current fee schedule for rental housing? If I am reading your business license fee schedule correctly it states that businesses with sales and/or services are required to have a business license and pay a business license fee (tax) based on gross receipts. I did not find any exemption in the current schedule for rental housing.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the City Council receives and files the attached applications, and the Mayor appoint and Council approve the appointment of three commissioners.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Following a newspaper article and an ongoing announcement on the City homepage advertising the three vacancies, there were a total of eight applicants. Of the eight applicants, two are current Commissioners who were just appointed in January 2013 to finish out the partial terms of two Commissioners who'd resigned in mid-term. Given that the two existing Commissioners were interviewed just four months ago, prior to the interview process the Mayor opted to only interview candidates who aren't currently sitting members of the Commission. Of the six remaining applicants, four failed to attach a resume as instructed and one failed to provide written proof of a physical address in Antioch as requested so they were declared ineligible (and notified of their ineligibility), which leaves one new candidate and the two existing Commissioners as eligible for the three vacancies that will expire in June 2017.

Mayor Harper and I interviewed the new applicant on May 23, 2013. The three applicants are as follows:

- Rhoda Parhams (current EDC member)
- Adam J. Vares (new applicant)
