



RECOMMENDED ACTION

It is recommended that the City Council:

- 1. Receive the redistricting presentation and public comment on the draft redistricting maps and
- 2. Select two redistricting maps for the City in preparation for selection of the final map on February 8, 2022.

FISCAL IMPACT

DISCUSSION

The purpose of this presentation is to provide information to the public on redistricting, to solicit input from the public regarding the drafting of district maps, and to select the final redistricting map for the City.

An interactive discussion will be led by our demographers, Karin MacDonald and Jane Hood of Q2 Data & Research LLC, who will make a comprehensive, informative presentation to give the City Council and members of the public a full understanding of the redistricting process. The presentation will distinguish between districting and redistricting, provide an overview of the laws governing the redistricting process, explain criteria for redistricting, address redistricting timelines and public involvement.


Before adopting a final map of district boundaries, at least four hearings must be held for the public to provide input about the composition of City Council districts. These hearing requirements include at least: (1) one hearing before any maps are drawn, (2) two hearings after maps are drawn, and (3) one hearing or workshop to be held on a Saturday, Sunday, or after 6 p.m. on a weekday. The City Council redistricting public hearing dates include the following: Tuesday, October 12, 2021, Saturday, October 16, 2021, Tuesday, November 9, 2021, Tuesday, December 14, 2021, Tuesday, January 11, 2022, Tuesday, January 25, 2022 and Tuesday, February 8, 2022.

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

















HUMAN TRAFFICKING AWARENESS MONTH

JANUARY 2022

WHEREAS, Human trafficking is a form of abuse in which force, fraud or coercion is used to control victims for the purpose of commercial sexual or labor exploitation affecting people of all gender, age, and backgrounds;

WHEREAS, The impact of human trafficking is wide-ranging and whether domestic or international, victims experience trauma, violence, manipulation, fraud and coercion at the hands of their traffickers and is often the most vulnerable members of our communities who are affected by human trafficking;

WHEREAS, As of December 31, 2020, 11,500 cases were reported nationally to the National Human Trafficking Resource Center, with a majority of cases reported in California;

WHEREAS, The City of Antioch is not immune to human trafficking. While underreported, over the last four years, over 500 victims of human trafficking were identified and served by the Contra Costa Human Trafficking Coalition and several partner agencies including Community Violence Solutions, STAND! for Families Free of Violence, Bay Area Legal Aid, International Rescue Committee and Calli House;

WHEREAS, Contra Costa County's Alliance to End Abuse acknowledges that fighting exploitation and human trafficking is a shared community responsibility and continues to build its collaboration by linking with local, regional and federal agencies; and

WHEREAS, The City of Antioch is working to raise awareness so individuals will become more informed, identify ways their behavior contributes to a patriarchal culture that supports systemic abuse of vulnerable populations that include women and people of color.

NOW, THEREFORE I, LAMAR A. 

California's Civil Rights Agency

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Resident's Right to Safe & Exclusive Possession

- Every residential lease in California has two implied terms:
- **Covenant of Quiet Enjoyment** provides that a tenant must be free from substantial interference with their use of the property
- Warranty of Habitability provides that rental units must be fit to live in
- These protections have been codified in state law: 0
- Civil Code 1927 covenant of quiet enjoyment
- Civil Code 1941, 1941.1 warranty of habitability
- Civil Code 1941.3 window and door lock requirements
- Health & Safety Code 17920.3, 17920.10 habitability standards
- Civil Code 1942, 1942.3, 1942.4 habitability remedies and penalties



Resident's Right to Safe & Exclusive Possession

- Right to enter a rental unit is limited by Civil Code 1954 to the following
- To make or supply necessary or agreed repairs or services.
- Exhibit the dwelling unit to prospective purchasers, mortgagees, tenants, workers,
- Conduct a walk-through inspection pursuant to the security deposit law.
- When the tenant has abandoned or surrendered the premises.
- Pursuant to court order or in case of an emergency.
- Other specific statutory purposes (e.g., test smoke detector, read a water meter)
- 24 hours' prior written notice generally required specifying the date, approximate time, and purpose of the entry 0
- Landlord may not abuse the right of access or use it to harass the tenant 0

Eviction Protections

- COVID-19 Tenant Relief Act (CTRA) (Code of Civil Procedure 1179.01, et seq) provides permanent eviction protection for non-payment of March 2020 — September 2021 rent if due to a COVID hardship
- COVID-19 Rental Housing Recovery Act (Code of Civil Procedure 1179.08, et seq) requires landlords to apply for ERAP before evicting for non-payment beginning October 1, 2021 0
- tenancy based upon acts against a tenant or a tenant's household member Code of Civil Procedure 1161.3 prohibits a landlord from terminating a that constitute domestic violence 0
- Civil Code 1946.8 prohibits evicting a tenant based on their act of summoning law enforcement assistance or emergency assistance as, or on behalf of, victim of abuse, a victim of crime, or an individual in an emergency 0



Harassment & Retaliation Protections

Civil Code 1942.5 makes it unlawful for a landlord to:

- increase rent,
- decrease services,
- cause a lessee to quit involuntarily,
- bring an action to recover possession, or
- threaten to do any of those acts,

for the purpose of retaliating against the tenant based on their lawful and peaceful exercise of any right under the law, including:

- Making a complaint about habitability





Unsettled Trades 501,232.35 Maturity Distribution





RECOMMENDED ACTION

It is recommended that the City Council adopt the ordinance for a zoning map amendment from Planned Development District (PD) to Planned Development District (PD-20-01).

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ANTIOCH TO REZONE THE APPROXIMATELY 11.72 ACRE WILD HORSE MULTIFAMILY PROJECT SITE (APN 041-022-003) FROM PLANNED DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT (PD 86-3.1) TO PLANNED DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT (PD-20-01)

The City Council of the City of Antioch does ordain as follows:

SECTION 1:

The City Council determined on January 11, 2022, that, pursuant to Section 15074 of the Guidelines of the California Environmental Quality Act, and after full consideration of the Environmental Impact Report (EIR) and Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program (MMRP) prepared for project, and on the basis of the whole record before it, the EIR and MMRP for the Wild Horse Multifamily Project should be adopted.

SECTION 2:

At its regular meeting of December 1, 2021, the Planning Commission recommended that the City Council adopt the Ordinance to rezone the subject property from Planned Development District to Planned Development District (PD-20-01) for the Wild Horse Multifamily Project.

SECTION 3:

The real property described in Exhibit A, attached hereto, is hereby rezoned from Planned Development District (PD 86-3.1) to Planned Development (PD-20-01) for the Wild Horse Multifamily Project, and the zoning map is hereby amended accordingly.

SECTION 4:

The development standards, as defined below, for the subject property (APN 051-140-002), known as the Wild Horse Multifamily Project, are herein incorporated into this ordinance, and are binding upon said property.

The allowed uses, as defined below, for the subject property (APN 041-022-003), known as the Wild Horse Multifamily Project, are herein incorporated into this ordinance, and are binding upon said property.

Multi-Family Residential Uses. Allowed uses within Wild Horse Multifamily Project shall be those uses as allowed in the R-20 Medium Density Residential District as established in Section 9.5.3803 of the City of Antioch Municipal Code.

Similar Use Determination. Additional uses not specifically listed in the following table maybe be allowed where the Community Development Director determines a proposed use is substantially similar to a listed use. Such use would be subject to any reviews and limitations noted herein for the listed use that is identified as similar.

SECTION 6:

The City Council finds that the that the proposed zone reclassification will allow uses more suitable uses for the site than the present classification; that the subject property is suitable to the use permitted in the proposed zone change; that said permitted uses are not detrimental to the public or surrounding properties; and that the proposed zone change is in conformance with the Antioch General Plan.

SECTION 7:

This ordinance shall take effect and be enforced thirty (30) days from and after the date of its adoption and shall be published once within fifteen (15) days upon passage and adoption in a newspaper of general circulation printed and published in the City of Antioch.



SUBJECT:

Second Reading: Ordinance Amending the Antioch Municipal Code

to Require Safe Storage of Firearms in Residences

RECOMMENDED ACTION

It is recommended that the City Council adopt the proposed safe gun storage ordinance, attached hereto as Exhibit A, requiring Antioch residents to safely store firearms in their residences.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is no anticipated direct or indirect fiscal impact as a result of this item.

DISCUSSION

California law makes it a crime for a gun owner to store a loaded firearm in a home, or within an area of the owner's control, and do so when the owner knows, or should know, that a child could access it without a parent's permission. (California Penal Code, § 25100.) This means if an owner knows that a child can access a stored gun, the owner should: (1) make certain that it is unloaded, and (2) store it in a place outside of the child's access (like a locked container with a combination lock or a key lock). A violation of the above law is a misdemeanor offense. The crime is punishable by up to one year in county jail. This punishment will increase if a child accesses the weapon and causes harm, great bodily injury, or death. (*Ibid.*)

California law also makes it a criminal offense for a firearm owner to: (1) store a loaded gun in a home, or within an area of the owner's control, and do so when the owner knows, or should know, that a person prohibited from possessing a firearm under state law or federal law could access it. (*Ibid.*) This means if an owner knows that an adult who cannot possess a firearm can get to the stored weapon, the owner should: (1) make certain that it is unloaded, and (2) store it in a place outside of the adult's access (like in a locked container). A violation of the above law is charged as a misdemeanor. The crime is punishable by up to one year in county jail. This punishment increases if an adult

accesses the weapon and causes harm, great bodily injury, or death. (*Ibid*.) In such cases, the crime can be charged as a felony and lead to custody in state prison for up to three years. Several California jurisdictions have adopted "safe gun storage" ordinances to bolster firearm safety in the home.

A 2017 Pew Research Center survey found that 42% of adults live in a gun-owning household.¹ The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention report that in 2019, there were 39,707 firearm-related deaths in the United States.² In 2019, firearms were used in 23,941 suicides in the United States.³ However, applying trigger locks or using lockboxes to store unsupervised firearms in the home can reduce firearm related violence and accidents.

The City Council directed staff to prepare a safe firearms storage ordinance for the City of Antioch. The proposed ordinance requires any person in a residence in Antioch to store firearms in a locked container or disable them with an appropriate safety device in the home. Keeping a firearm locked when it is not being carried prevents unauthorized users, including children, from accessing and using firearms which can reduce unintentional discharges, firearm theft, and suicide.

The requirements of this ordinance do <u>not</u> apply when a firearm is legally carried on the person, or otherwise in his or her immediate possession and control, nor when the firearm is in the immediate possession and control of a peace officer. The ordinance as proposed does not create a substantial to burden to persons lawfully carrying and storing firearms in the home, but it requires safe firearm storage in an effort to decrease the risk of harm to children and the entire community.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ANTIOCH ADDING SECTIONS 4-6.04, 4-6.05, and 4-6.06 TO CHAPTER 6 OF TITLE 4 OF THE ANTIOCH MUNICIPAL CODE, RELATING TO STORAGE OF FIREARMS IN A RESIDENCE

- **WHEREAS**, the City of Antioch ("City") does not presently regulate firearm storage within residential locations;
- **WHEREAS**, firearm injuries have a significant adverse public health and safety impact nationally, regionally, and locally;
- **WHEREAS**, improperly stored firearms may result in accidental firearm injuries and/or deaths, particularly in homes with children;
- **WHEREAS**, in California, numerous people die each year from injuries related to firearms, and many more are hospitalized for non-fatal gunshot wounds;
- WHEREAS, having a loaded or unlocked firearm in the home has been associated with an increased risk of firearm-related injury and death, as well as theft of the firearm;
- **WHEREAS**, a firearm stored while loaded or unlocked increases the risk of an accidental shooting;
- **WHEREAS**, quick access to a loaded firearm heightens the risk that a young person's impulsive decision to commit suicide may be carried out without reflection or seeking help, and that the impulsive attempt will be fatal;
- **WHEREAS**, utilizing gun locks or lock boxes when storing firearms in the home reduces the risk of firearm injury and death, as well as theft;
- WHEREAS, keeping a firearm locked when it is not being carried ensures that it cannot be accessed or used by others without the owner's knowledge or permission, decreasing the risk that the gun will be used to commit suicide, homicide, or inflict injury, whether intentionally or unintentionally;
- **WHEREAS**, the International Association of Chiefs of Police and the American Academy of Pediatrics recommend the safe storage of firearms;
- **WHEREAS**, both gun control and gun rights activists, including the National Rifle Association, endorse the use of locking devices when storing firearms to ensure that unauthorized and untrained persons cannot access firearms to inflict injury or cause death;

WHEREAS, requiring stored, unsupervised firearms to be secured with gun locks or in a locked container does not substantially burden the right or ability to use firearms for self-defense in the home;

WHEREAS, the proposed locking requirements apply to firearms that are not being legally carried. Legal firearm owners and adults over 18 may still carry loaded and unlocked firearms in their home at any time. The safe storage requirements also permit legal owners to store their firearms fully loaded if they wish;

WHEREAS, firearm security does not preclude quick access. Portable lockboxes with simplex or biometric locks can store loaded handguns such that they are always within easy reach on counters, tables, or nightstands. Such safely stored handguns may be more quickly and easily retrieved for use in self-defense than unlocked handguns hidden away in seldom-used or remote locations; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that requiring safe storage of firearms would constitute a sensible safety regulation and would not be unduly burdensome for firearm owners.

The City Council of the City of Antioch, California, does hereby ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Recitals. The above recitals are incorporated as though set forth in this section.

SECTION 2. Adoption. Sections 4-6.04, 4-6.05, and 4-6.06 are hereby added to the Antioch Municipal Code, to read as follows:

§ 4-6.04 STORAGE OF FIREARMS IN A RESIDENCE

Except when carried on his or her person, or otherwise in his or immediate control and possession, no person shall keep a firearm (as defined in California Penal Code section 16520, as it may be amended from time to time) in any residence in Antioch owned or controlled by that person unless the firearm is stored in a locked container (as defined in California Penal Code section 16850, as it may be amended from time to time) or the firearm is disabled with a safety device listed on the California Department of Justice's roster of firearm safety devices (as defined in California Penal Code sections 16540 & 23635, as may be amended from time to time).

§ 4-6.05 VIOLATIONS

The violation of this Chapter shall constitute an infraction. This Chapter may be enforced as described in Title 1 of this Code.

§ 4-6.06 EXCEPTIONS AND OTHER LAWS

The requirements of section 4-6.04 do not apply when a firearm is carried on the person of, or is otherwise in the immediate control and possession of, an individual in accordance with applicable local, state, and/or federal laws.

This Chapter does not apply when a firearm is carried on the person of, or is otherwise in the immediate control and possession of a peace officer (as defined in California Penal Code sections 830 et seq, as may be amended from time to time).

It is not the intention of this Chapter to regulate any conduct if the regulation of such conduct has been preempted by state or federal law.

SECTION 3. CEQA. The adoption of this Ordinance is exempt from the provisions of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Section 15061(b)(3), which provides that CEQA only applies to projects which have the potential for causing a significant effect on the environment. Where it can be determined that the proposed project will not have a significant adverse effect on the environment, the project is not subject to CEQA. This Ordinance sets requirements for safe storage of firearms in residential locations, and does not propose nor authorize any action or specific project that would have the potential to cause a significant adverse effect on the environment.

SECTION 4. Severability. Should any provision of this Ordinance, or its application to any person or circumstance, be determined by a court of competent jurisdiction to be unlawful, unenforceable, or otherwise void, that determination shall have no effect on any other provision of this Ordinance or the application of this Ordinance to any other person or circumstance and, to that end, the provisions hereof are severable.

<u>SECTION 5.</u> Publication; Effective Date. This Ordinance shall take effect and be enforced within thirty (30) days from and after the date of its adoption by the City Council at a second reading and shall be posted and published in accordance with the California Government Code.

SUBJECT: Second Reading of Ordinance Amending the Antioch Municipal

Code Sections 9-5.3803 and 9-5.3834 to Prohibit Oil and Gas Drilling, Production, and Exploratory Operations as Permitted Uses

in the M-2 and S Zones

RECOMMENDED ACTION

It is recommended that that the City Council adopt the ordinance, attached hereto as Attachment A, amending the Antioch Municipal Code Sections 9-5.3803 and 9-5.3834 to remove oil and gas drilling, production, and exploratory operations as permitted uses in the "heavy industrial" (M-2) zone and in the designated portion of the Sand Creek Focus Area of the "S" Study District.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is no anticipated direct fiscal impact as a result of this item because there are no presently authorized oil and gas operations in the zones affected by the proposed ordinance, nor are there any pending applications for land use entitlements that will be affected. There may be an indirect fiscal impact in the future, to the extent the City will no longer permit operation of oil and gas drilling or production facilities that may otherwise have increased employment opportunities or revenue to the City in the form of taxes. However, there are no present or pending land use entitlements for oil and gas drilling or production purposes, and other industrial uses that bring employment and revenue opportunities to the City will continue to be permitted in the M-2 zone.

DISCUSSION

The Antioch Municipal Code presently authorizes oil and gas drilling, production, and exploratory operations in the M-2 zone, which is an industrial district, after obtaining a use permit, and as a temporary use within a portion of the Sand Creek Focus Area of the "S" Study District. There are presently no active oil and gas operations in the M-2 zone. Nor are there any pending land use entitlement applications to undertake oil and gas operations in that zone. Within the City as a whole, there is a deemed complete application at the Creekside Vineyards at Sand Creek project location for a zoning text amendment and use permit to allow oil and gas exploration. The applicant requested to

put the application on hold in May 2020 and no further action has occurred. In March 2021, the City Council approved the Creekside Vineyards at Sand Creek residential project. The proposed oil and gas exploration plans show that the potential exploration would occur in an area outside of the approved residential development envelope of the site.

The "S" Study District refers to the property now owned and entitled as part of "The Ranch" development in the Sand Creek Focus Area. The Ranch includes exclusively residential and commercial uses in its project entitlements and Development Agreement. The entitlements and Development Agreement function as a binding limitation on land uses for the project, so unless the project proponent/landowner requested modification of the entitlements and Development Agreement to allow oil and gas uses upon City approval – which would effectively abandon the current entitlements – no oil and gas uses are feasible on the property. Further, approximately 2/3 of The Ranch project is within 1,500 feet of existing homes, which would separately restrict the ability to use the site for oil and gas drilling and production purposes.

Oil and gas drilling and production can have significant environmental and health effects on the community. For example, oil and gas production can substantially increase air pollution in the areas where permitted, and fossil fuel extraction contributes to emissions that create long-term climate change effects.

Antioch prides itself on its recreational opportunities, affordability, and the wellbeing of its residents; precluding oil and gas operations within City limits will protect the ability of Antioch's residents to enjoy clean air and water, and live and work in a healthy and commercially thriving community.

There is no immediate or anticipated effect to existing or proposed oil and gas uses within the City limits and restricting such uses would most likely have positive health and environmental effects for the entire community.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ANTIOCH AMENDING SECTIONS 9-5.3803 AND 9-5.3834 OF ARTICLE 38 OF CHAPTER 5 OF THE ANTIOCH MUNICIPAL CODE RELATING TO ZONING RESTRICTIONS FOR OIL AND GAS DRILLING

WHEREAS, the City of Antioch ("City") presently authorizes oil and gas drilling and production in the "heavy industrial" (M-2) zone, with a Use Permit issued by the Planning Commission;

WHEREAS, the City presently regulates oil and gas drilling and recovery in the Sand Creek Focus Area of the "S" Study District as a temporary use;

WHEREAS, the City now desires to remove oil and gas drilling, production, and recovery as authorized uses in the M-2 zone and authorized temporary uses in the "S" Study District; and

WHEREAS, there are presently no active oil and gas drilling or production operations within the City's M-2 or "S" Study District, and no approved requests for land use entitlements to construct or operate such oil and gas drilling or production facilities.

The City Council of the City of Antioch, California, does hereby ordain as follows:

<u>SECTION 1.</u> Recitals. The above recitals are incorporated as though set forth in this section.

SECTION 2. Amendment. Section 9-5.3803 of the Antioch Municipal Code, "Table of Land Use Regulations", is hereby amended so that "oil & gas drilling" and "oil and gas production" are no longer permitted in the M-2 zone. A copy of the amended Table of Land Use Regulations is attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein.

SECTION 3. Amendment. Subsection (B) is hereby deleted from Section 9-5.3834 of the Antioch Municipal Code, and previous subsections (A)(1) and (A)(2) will now be renumbered as subsections (A) and (B), so that Section 9-5.3834 shall now read as follows:

"§ 9-5.3834 STUDY DISTRICT (S).

Within the "S" Study District, all properties are entitled to and restricted by the requirements of the previous county zoning designations that applied to the property prior to the date of annexation by the city.

(A) All land uses existing on the date of annexation by the city shall be allowed to continue and expand as would otherwise have been allowed under the previous county zoning designations, including the keeping of animals and other uses of land permitted under county ordinances prior to the date of annexation by the city.

(B) No individual application for approval of a development project, other than what would have been allowed under the previous county zoning designations, may be approved in advance of approval by the city of a specific plan, or an alternative planning process as determined by the City Council." SECTION 4. CEQA. - 1. Single-family dwellings existing prior to the effective date of this section are permitted uses, conforming to the R-20 zone; however, development of new single-family dwelling units, other than replacement of existing single-family dwellings, are prohibited within the R-20 zone.
- 2. Use may be permitted as an ancillary use if it is incidental to an otherwise permitted or conditionally permitted use within this zoning district.
- 3. Legally established churches existing prior to the effective date of this section are permitted uses, conforming to the PBC, C-O, C-1, C-2, and C-3 zone; however, development of new religious assembly uses, other than replacement of existing uses, is

prohibited within these zoning districts.

- 4. Funeral services are limited to "J" Street, Fourth Street, and the area between Fourth and Fifth Streets.
- 5. May be located only on sites adjacent to freeway interchanges.
- 6. May be located along Somersville Road north of the SR-4 freeway.
- 7. Marine repair only. Permitted as an ancillary service for waterfront activities.
- Boat sales and repair only.
- 9. In the case of the Emergency Shelter Overlay District, where no letter or number is included in the table for a particular land use, the regulations of the base zone apply. Emergency shelters are permitted by right in the Emergency Shelter Overlay District if they meet all standards of § 9-5.3835, Emergency Shelters, of this article.
- 10. Hospices and residential care facilities providing care for up to six patients are a permitted use in any district where residential uses are allowed.
- 11. Up to 20 units/acre permitted by right subject to compliance with all other applicable standards.
- 12. Subject to a conditional use permit on a site at least one quarter mile from any type of residential care facility, social service institution, welfare institution, or a similar type of facility; at least one mile from another correctional facility; and at least 1,000 feet from a school, library, public park, recreation area or any property zoned or used for residential development. See § 9-5.3838, Correctional Facilities, for additional requirements.
- 13. Cannabis business requires approval of a use permit by the City Council upon recommendation by the Planning Commission. See § 9-5.3845.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

It is recommended that the City Council adopt the attached resolution authorizing the submission of applications for CalRecycle grants for a period of 5 years.

FISCAL IMPACT

The Community Development Department intends to apply for an SB 1383 implementation grant which could result in the City receiving up to \$150,000. As there are many other CalRecycle grants available, such as rubberized asphalt and playground surface programs, the total fiscal impact of not approving the resolution could be much higher.

DISCUSSION

CalRecycle offers funding opportunities to local governments to address a variety of waste streams. The previous City Council authorization to apply for these grants expired in 2019. At this time, the Community Development Department is working to apply for an SB 1383 implementation grant and needs this resolution to enable execution of grant applications and award agreements. CalRecycle allows local jurisdictions to have one resolution authorizing submission of grant applications for up to five (5) years. If the resolution is approved, it will be applicable to the following grant programs:

- Farm and Ranch Solid Waste Cleanup and Abatement Grant
- Food Waste Prevention and Rescue Grant
- Household Hazardous Waste Grant
- Local Enforcement Agency Grant

- Local Government Waste Tire Enforcement Grant
- Organics Grant

RECOMMENDED ACTION

It is recommended that the City Council adopt a resolution:

- 1. Approving the ninth amendment to the Consultant Service Agreement with Walter Bishop Consulting to provide support to the City on water rights issues, and to assist in the management of the Brackish Water Desalination Project which increases the contract by \$168,000 for a total contract amount of \$664,000 and extends the term of the Agreement to December 31, 2023; and
- 2. Authorizing and directing the City Manager or designee to execute the ninth amendment to the Agreement with Walter Bishop Consulting in a form approved by the City Attorney.

FISCAL IMPACT

Adoption of this resolution will increase the existing contract with Walter Bishop Consulting ("WBC") by \$168,000 for a total contract amount of \$664,000. A total of \$464,437.21 has been expended from WBC's contract to date. Funding for these professional services is included in the fiscal year 2021/22 Water Enterprise Fund budget.

DISCUSSION

Walter Bishop has a long history of being an industry leader in the area of water, specifically in the State of California and our region. During his tenure as General Manager of Contra Costa Water District, Mr. Bishop's vision and expertise in negotiations led to the permitting and construction of the Los Vaqueros Reservoir. Since 2013, Mr. Bishop has been a member of the City's water rights' consultant team. Mr. Bishop provides Antioch with key advice and strategy for issues related to protecting the City's water rights, including support for the Brackish Water Desalination Project.

Staff is recommending an amendment to WBC's Agreement to include continued support to the City on water rights issues, participation in discussions with the State pertaining to

the City's intake and delta water supply and continued assistance in the construction management of the Brackish Water Desalination Project.

WHEREAS, on May 13, 2013, Walter Bishop Consulting ("WBC") entered into an agreement for Professional Consulting Services ("Agreement") to assist in negotiations for the City's Water Rights in the amount of \$10,000;

WHEREAS, on January 7, 2014, City amended the Agreement in the amount of \$15,000 bringing the total compensation to an amount not to exceed \$25,000;

WHEREAS, on August 7, 2014, City amended the Agreement in the amount of \$20,000.00 bringing the total compensation to an amount not to exceed \$45,000;

WHEREAS, on September 8, 2015, City amended the Agreement in the amount of \$50,000 bringing the total compensation to an amount not to exceed \$95,000;

WHEREAS, on July 26, 2016, City amended the Agreement in the amount of \$75,000 bringing the total compensation to an amount not to exceed \$170,000;

WHEREAS, on January 23, 2018, City amended the Agreement in the amount of \$70,000 bringing the total compensation to an amount not to exceed \$240,000;

WHEREAS, on October 23, 2018, City amended the Agreement in the amount of \$84,000 bringing the total compensation to an amount not to exceed \$324,000;

WHEREAS, on November 26, 2019, City amended the Agreement in the amount of \$84,000 bringing the total compensation to an amount not to exceed \$408,000;

AMENDMENT NO. 9 TO AGREEMENT FOR PROFESSIONAL CONSULTING SERVICES

THIS NINTH AMENDMENT TO THE AGREEMENT FOR CONSULTANT SERVICES is entered into this 25th day of January, 2022, by and between the CITY OF ANTIOCH, a municipal corporation ("CITY") and WALTER BISHOP CONSULTING, their address is 18 Amanda Lane, Lafayette, CA 94549 ("Consultant").

RECITALS

WHEREAS, on May 13, 2013, Walter Bishop Consulting, entered into an Agreement for Professional Consulting Services to assist in negotiations for the City's Water Rights ("Agreement") in the amount of \$10,000.00;

WHEREAS, on January 27, 2014, City amended the Agreement to increase the compensation for Walter Bishop Consulting for actual costs in the amount of \$15,000.00 bringing the total compensation to an amount not to exceed \$25,000.00;

WHEREAS, on August 7, 2014, City amended the Agreement to increase the compensation for Walter Bishop Consulting for actual costs in the amount of \$20,000.00 bringing the total compensation to an amount not to exceed \$45,000.00;

WHEREAS, on September 8, 2015, City amended the Agreement to increase the compensation for Walter Bishop Consulting for actual costs in the amount of \$50,000.00 bringing the total compensation to an amount not to exceed \$95,000.00;

WHEREAS, on July 26, 2016, City amended the Agreement to increase the compensation for Walter Bishop Consulting for actual costs in the amount of \$75,000.00 bringing the total compensation to an amount not to exceed \$170,000.00;

WHEREAS, on January 23, 2018, City amended the Agreement to increase the compensation for Walter Bishop Consulting for actual costs in the amount of \$70,000 bringing the total compensation to an amount not to exceed \$240,000;

WHEREAS, on October 23, 2018, City amended the Agreement to increase the compensation for Walter Bishop Consulting for actual costs in the amount of \$84,000 bringing the total compensation to an amount not to exceed \$324,000;

WHEREAS, on November 26, 2019, City amended the Agreement to increase the compensation for Walter Bishop Consulting for actual costs in the amount of \$84,000 bringing the total compensation to an amount not to exceed \$408,000; and

WHEREAS, on February 9, 2021, City amended the Agreement to increase the compensation for Walter Bishop Consulting for actual costs in the amount of \$88,000 bringing the total compensation to an amount not to exceed \$496,000.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE PARTIES DO MUTUALLY AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

1. Section 1 "SERVICES" the first paragraph shall be amended to read as follows:

"Subject to the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement, Consultant shall furnish all technical and professional services including labor, materials, equipment, transportation, supervision, and expertise to provide to City the services described in the Scope of Work attached as Exhibit A to the Agreement, Exhibit A to Amendment No. 1, Exhibit A to Amendment No. 2, Exhibit A to Amendment No. 3, Exhibit A to Amendment No. 4, Exhibit A to Amendment No. 5, Exhibit A to Amendment No. 6, Exhibit A to Amendment No. 7, Exhibit A to Amendment No. 8 and Exhibit A to Amendment No. 9 of the Agreement at the time and place and in the manner specified therein. In the event of a conflict in or inconsistency between the terms of this Agreement and the Exhibits, the Agreement shall prevail."

2. Section 1.1 "Term of Services" shall be amended to read as follows:

"The term of this Agreement shall begin on the date first noted above and shall end on **December 31, 2023**, and Consultant shall complete the work described in Exhibit A to the Agreement, Exhibit A to Amendment No. 1, Exhibit A to Amendment No. 2, Exhibit A to Amendment No. 3, Exhibit A to Amendment No. 4, Exhibit A to Amendment No. 5, Exhibit A to Amendment No. 6, Exhibit A to Amendment No. 7, Exhibit A to Amendment No. 8 and Exhibit A to Amendment No. 9 of the Agreement prior to that date, unless the term of the Agreement is otherwise terminated or extended, as provided for in Section 8 of the Agreement shall not affect the City's right to terminate the Agreement, as provided for in Section 8 of the Agreement."



3. Section 2 "COMPENSATION" the first sentence shall be amended to read as follows:

"CITY hereby agrees to pay Consultant a sum not to exceed \$664,000, notwithstanding any contrary indications that may be contained in Consultant's proposal, for services to be performed and reimbursable costs incurred under this Agreement."

All other terms and conditions of the Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.

- Participate on team for future operations agreement for DDSD Brine disposal.
- Supervise and instruct Samantha Salvia, a member of Antioch Delta/Brackish Water Team.
- Advise City Manager as requested on regional, state and national water issues.
- Advise as requested on water rate issues.

Cost of Proposal:

- Work will be billed monthly at \$335/hr. for the year 2022 and \$340/hr. for the year 2023 which is all inclusive of direct, indirect labor cost, overhead and profit. Expenses will be billed with no markup, and mileage will be at the approved annual IRS rate.
- The estimated budget for the contract is \$168,000. This is based on a \$7,000/month level of work for the 24 months.

ATTACHMENT "C"

CONSULTING SERVICES AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF ANTIOCH AND WALTER BISHOP CONSULTING

THIS AGREEMENT for consulting services is made by and between the City of Antioch ("City") and Walter Bishop Consulting ("Consultant") as of May 13, 2013.

Section 1. SERVICES. Subject to the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement, Consultant shall provide to City consulting services related to the Delta, City's water rights and agreement with the Department of Water Resources, State of California. To this end, Consultant shall attend meetings and talk with stakeholders. Consultant shall keep City regularly appraised of these activities by email or phone. Any specific task beyond these activities shall be approved in advance by the City, through its City Manager, Public Works Director/City Engineer. , Unless specifically agreed upon in writing, compensation for any additional task must remain under the \$10,000 cost not to exceed cap set forth in Section 2 and be memorialized in writing or email to the City Manager, Public Works Director/City Engineer and City Attorney. Any public statement shall be approved in advance by the City Manager.

- 1.1 <u>Term of Services.</u> The term of this Agreement shall begin on the date first noted above and shall end when terminated, as provided for in Section 8.
- 1.2 <u>Standard of Performance.</u> Consultant shall perform all services required pursuant to this Agreement in the manner and according to the standards observed by a competent practitioner of the profession in which Consultant is engaged in the geographical area in which Consultant practices its profession.

Section 2. COMPENSATION. City hereby agree to pay Consultant \$275 per hour for services for a total sum not to exceed Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) including reimbursable costs with any reimbursables in excess of \$100 requiring City approval in advance. The parties further agree that compensation hereunder is intended to include the costs of contributions to any pensions and/or annuities to which Consultant and its employees, agents, and subcontractors may be eligible.

- **Invoices.** Consultant shall submit invoices, not more often than once a month during the term of this Agreement, based on the cost for services performed and reimbursable costs incurred prior to the invoice date. Invoices shall include a description of the services performed and the person doing the work. Invoices shall be submitted from the start of this Agreement to the Public Works Director.
- 2.2 <u>Payment Schedule.</u> City shall have 30 days from the receipt of an invoice that complies with all of the requirements of Section 2.1 to pay Consultant.

Section 3. FACILITIES AND EQUIPMENT. Except as set forth herein, Consultant shall, at its sole cost and expense, provide all facilities and equipment that may be necessary to perform the services required by this Agreement. City shall make available to Consultant only the facilities and equipment listed in this section, and only under the terms and conditions set forth herein.



- <u>Section 4.</u> <u>INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS.</u> Before beginning any work under this Agreement, Consultant, at its own cost and expense, shall procure and maintain the insurance policies required by this section throughout the term of this Agreement.
 - 4.1 <u>Workers' Compensation.</u> Consultant has indicated he does not employees, so he is not required to carry Workers Compensation Insurance. If Consultant hires employees during the term of this Agreement, then Consultant shall, at its sole cost and expense, maintain Statutory Workers' Compensation Insurance for any and all persons employed directly or indirectly by Consultant.
 - 4.2. <u>Liability Umbrella Coverage.</u> Consultant, at its own cost and expense, shall maintain a liability umbrella coverage policy for the term of this Agreement in an amount not less than ONE MILLION DOLLARS (\$1,000,000.00) per occurrence, combined single limit coverage for risks associated with the work contemplated by this Agreement. Such coverage shall include but shall not be limited to, protection against claims arising from bodily and personal injury, including death resulting therefrom, and damage to property resulting from activities contemplated under this Agreement, including the use of owned and non-owned automobiles. Proof of insurance shall be provided to the City.
 - 4.3 <u>Automobile Liability Insurance.</u> Consultant, at its own cost and expense, shall maintain automobile liability insurance for the term of this Agreement in an amount not less than ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$100,000) per occurrence.

Section 5. {reserved}

Section 6. STATUS OF CONSULTANT.

- 6.1 <u>Independent Contractor.</u> At all times during the term of this Agreement, Consultant shall be an independent contractor and shall not be an employee of City.
- **Consultant No Agent.** Except as City may specify in writing, Consultant shall have no authority, express or implied, to act on behalf of City in any capacity whatsoever as an agent.

Section 7. LEGAL REQUIREMENTS.

- 7.1 Governing Law. The laws of the State of California shall govern this Agreement.
- **7.2** Compliance with Applicable Laws. Consultant and any subcontractors shall comply with all laws applicable to the performance of the work hereunder.
- 7.3 <u>Licenses and Permits.</u> Consultant represents and warrants to City that Consultant and its employees, agents, and any subcontractors have all licenses, permits, qualifications, and approvals of whatsoever nature that are legally required to practice their respective professions. In addition to the foregoing, Consultant and any subcontractors shall obtain and maintain during the term of this Agreement valid Business Licenses from City.



Nondiscrimination and Equal Opportunity. Consultant shall not discriminate, on the basis of a person's race, religion, color, national origin, age, physical or mental handicap or disability, medical condition, marital status, sex, or sexual orientation, against any employee, applicant for employment, subcontractor, bidder for a subcontract, or participant in, recipient of, or applicant for any services or programs provided by Consultant under this Agreement. Consultant shall comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws, policies, rules, and requirements related to equal opportunity and nondiscrimination in employment, contracting, and the provision of any services that are the subject of this Agreement, including but not limited to the satisfaction of any positive obligations required of Consultant thereby.

Section 8. TERMINATION AND MODIFICATION.

8.1 <u>Termination.</u> City may cancel this Agreement at any time and without cause upon written notification to Consultant. Consultant may cancel this Agreement upon 30 days' written notice to City and shall include in such notice the reasons for cancellation.

In the event of termination, Consultant shall be entitled to compensation for services performed to the effective date of termination; City, however, may condition payment of such compensation upon Consultant delivering to City any or all documents, photographs, computer software, video and audio tapes, and other materials provided to Consultant or prepared by or for Consultant or the City in connection with this Agreement.

- **Amendments.** The parties may amend this Agreement only by a writing signed by all the parties.
- **8.3** Assignment and Subcontracting. Consultant shall not subcontract or assign any portion of the performance contemplated and provided for herein, without prior written approval of the Contract Administrator.
- 8.4 Options upon Breach by Consultant. If Consultant materially breaches any of the terms of this Agreement, City' remedies shall include, but not be limited to, Immediately terminate the Agreement

Section 9. KEEPING AND STATUS OF RECORDS.

- 9.1 Records Created as Part of Consultant's Performance. All reports, data, maps, models, charts, studies, surveys, photographs, memoranda, plans, studies, specifications, records, files, or any other documents or materials, in electronic or any other form, that Consultant prepares or obtains pursuant to this Agreement and that relate to the matters covered hereunder shall be the property of the City.
- **9.2** Consultant's Books and Records. Consultant shall maintain any and all ledgers, books of account, invoices, vouchers, canceled checks, and other records or documents evidencing or relating to charges for services or expenditures and disbursements charged



- to the City under this Agreement for a minimum of three (3) years, or for any longer period required by law, from the date of final payment to the Consultant to this Agreement.
- 9.3 <u>Inspection and Audit of Records.</u> Any records or documents that Section 9.2 of this Agreement requires Consultant to maintain shall be made available for inspection, audit, and/or copying at any time during regular business hours, upon oral or written request of the City.

Section 10 MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS.

- 10.1 <u>Venue.</u> In the event that either party brings any action against the other under this Agreement, the parties agree that trial of such action shall be vested exclusively in the state courts of California in the County of Contra Costa or in the United States District Court for the Northern District of California.
- 10.2 <u>Severability.</u> If a court of competent jurisdiction finds or rules that any provision of this Agreement is invalid, void, or unenforceable, the provisions of this Agreement not so adjudged shall remain in full force and effect.
- 10.3 <u>No Implied Waiver of Breach.</u> The waiver of any breach of a specific provision of this Agreement does not constitute a waiver of any other breach of that term or any other term of this Agreement.
- 10.4 <u>Successors and Assigns.</u> The provisions of this Agreement shall inure to the benefit of and shall apply to and bind the successors and assigns of the parties.
- 10.5 <u>Use of Recycled Products.</u> Consultant shall prepare and submit all reports, written studies and other printed material on recycled paper to the extent it is available at equal or less cost than virgin paper.
- 10.6 Conflict of Interest. Consultant may serve other clients, but none whose activities within the corporate limits of City or whose business, regardless of location, would place Consultant in a "conflict of interest," as that term is defined in the Political Reform Act, codified at California Government Code Section 81000 et seq.
 - Consultant shall not employ any official of City in the work performed pursuant to this Agreement. No officer or employee of City shall have any financial interest in this Agreement that would violate California Government Code Sections 1090 *et seq.*
- **Solicitation.** Consultant agrees not to solicit business at any meeting, focus group, or interview related to this Agreement, either orally or through any written materials.
- 10.8 <u>Contract Administration.</u> This Agreement shall be administered by Ron Bernal ("Contract Administrator"). All correspondence shall be directed to or through the Contract Administrator or his or her designee.

Map Related to the Construction of Hillcrest Avenue

RECOMMENDED ACTION

It is recommended that the City Council adopt the Resolution (Attachment A) approving revisions to the Conditions of Approval for the Creekside - Vineyards at Sand Creek Project Vesting Tentative Subdivision Map, related to the construction of Hillcrest Avenue.

FISCAL IMPACT

The proposed amendments would not change the City of Antioch's responsibility to fund or construct Hillcrest Avenue. Through this action, the City is not committing to any future funding or action to construct Hillcrest Avenue. As such, there will be no fiscal impact from this action.

DISCUSSION

On March 23, 2021, the City Council approved the Creekside–Vineyards at Sand Creek project, a 158.2-acre residential development, through adoption of Resolution 2021/52. This project includes construction of 220 single-family homes on private streets. The site is located south of the current terminus of Hillcrest Avenue within the Sand Creek Focus Area, as denoted in the Antioch General Plan. The parcel is identified as Contra Costa County Assessor's parcel number: APN 057-050-024.

The approval included multiple conditions specifying the scope and responsibility for the construction of Hillcrest Avenue, an identified four-lane arterial, through the property. Specifically, Condition P.6 required the dedication of a 112' right-of-way and that the applicant construct Hillcrest Avenue with full frontage improvements (curb, gutter, sidewalk and landscaping) on both the outer eastern frontage adjacent to the project and the outer western frontage, with a 40'-wide landscaped median. The applicant was also required to construct one 12'-wide lane with an 8'-wide bicycle lane in both the northbound and southbound directions. The lanes would be aligned with the outer curbs, leaving a 40'-wide median which would contain center median curbs, LED streetlights and decorative landscaping.

The applicant now requests amendment to these conditions of approval to allow an alternative interim alignment and modified improvements. Under this alternative, the applicant would still be required to dedicate the full 112'-wide right-of-way, but would be able to construct the new roadway wholly within the eastern half of the right-of-way, adjacent to the project. Specifically, the applicant would be required to construct (from east to west) a 6' sidewalk, 9.5' landscape strip, curb and gutter, 8' northbound bike lane, 12' northbound lane, 12' southbound lane, 8' southbound bike lane, curb and gutter, 5' landscape strip, and 5' sidewalk. In total, the easternmost 56' of the 112' right-of-way would be developed for this roadway. In addition, this alternative allows for a two-lane bridge at Sand Creek instead of the previously required four-lane bridge. Under this alternative, the applicant would not be obligated to construct any portion of the remaining improvements in the western portion of the right-of-way. If an engineer's report projects additional traffic demand that requires the expansion of Hillcrest Avenue to four lanes, then a future developer would be responsible for such expansion.

CEQA

Before the City Council can adopt the resolution approving the amended Conditions of Approval for the Project, the City Council must consider an addendum to the Environmental Impact Report prepared for the project under the California Environmental Quality Act, which addendum is attached to this report as Attachment D.

RESOLUTION NO. 2022/**

RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ANTIOCH APPROVING ALTERNATIVE INTERIM RIGHT-OF-WAY IMPROVEMENTS FOR THE CREEKSIDE-VINEYARDS AT SAND CREEK PROJECT

WHEREAS, on March 23, 2021, the City of Antioch ("City") adopted Resolution 2021/52, approving the application from GBN Partners, LLC ("Applicant") seeking City approval of the following: a General Plan Amendment; Master Development Plan/Rezone; Vesting Tentative Subdivision Map; Design Review; and Resource Management Plan for the development of a 220-unit residential community and associated improvements on approximately 58.9 acres of the 158.2-acre project site, as well as 1.8-acres of off-site improvements, which is known as the Creekside/Vineyards at Sand Creek Project ("Project") (GP-19-06, PD-19-02);

WHEREAS, on June 18, 2021, the Applicant submitted a letter protesting certain conditions of approval regarding construction of Hillcrest Avenue through the Project;

WHEREAS, on September 15, 2021, the City of Antioch and the Applicant entered into a tolling agreement to allow time for the City and Applicant to resolve the dispute concerning these conditions of approval;

WHEREAS, the Applicant now requests formal amendment to the conditions of approval to accommodate an alternative improvement design;

WHEREAS, an Addendum to the Environmental Impact Report certified by the City Council on March 23, 2021 is provided and determines that the proposed action will not have an adverse impact on the environment or warrant additional environmental review under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), which is included as Exhibit;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council of the City of Antioch does hereby make the following findings for approval or amendment to a Tentative Subdivision Map:

- 1. That the subdivision, design and improvements, as amended, are consistent with the General Plan, as required by Section 66473.5 of the Subdivision Map Act and the City's Subdivision Regulations. The site has a General Plan Designation of Medium Low Density Residential and is zoned Planned Development and the subdivision will continue to accommodate uses that are consistent with the General Plan on each of the lots created by the subdivision;
- 2. That the subdivision and improvements, as amended, proposed by the Vesting Tentative Map complies with the rules, regulations, standards, and criteria of the City's Subdivision Regulations. Specifically, the proposed subdivision, as amended, complies with and conforms to all the applicable rules, regulations, standards, and criteria of the City's Subdivision Regulations; and

3. The conditions of approval, as amended, protect the public safety, health and general welfare of the users of the project and surrounding area. In addition, the conditions ensure the project is consistent with City standards.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council does hereby approve the following amendments to the Vesting Tentative Subdivision Map (Exhibit A), Phasing Map (Exhibit B), subject to the following amended conditions of approval:

A.10 The design, construction, financing and phasing of the Hillcrest Avenue improvements described below shall be in accordance with that certain Settlement Agreement entered into by and between the City of Antioch and the subdivider, dated , 2022 (the "Settlement Agreement"). In the event of any conflict between the Settlement Agreement and these conditions of approval, the terms of the Settlement Agreement shall prevail.

UTILITIES

G.4 Sewer main system shall be designed to drain northerly on Hilcrest Avenue and connect to the existing or proposed future 15" sanitary sewer main at Heidorn Ranch Road through 'B' Street or as approved by the City Engineer.

PROJECT SPECIFIC CONDITIONS

- P.3 Right-of-way shall be acquired from Pacific Gas & Electric (PG&E) for the construction and dedication of Hillcrest Avenue to the City at no cost to the City.

 The City shall cooperate with Developer if a condemnation is determined to be the best alternative for all parties.
- P.5 A four (4) lane two (2)-lane Hillcrest Avenue bridge over Sand Creek shall have a width of 92' 65' edge to edge and a length as approved by the City Engineer.
- P.6 Hillcrest Ave shall have a right-of-way width of 112' and designed with a minimum traffic index (TI) of 8 and a minimum pavement thickness of 6" AC over 16" Class II AB.
 - Hillcrest Ave, including the bridge over Sand Creek, shall be designed and constructed as described in that certain Settlement Agreement entered into by and between the City and GBN Partners, LLC, as of , 2022.
 - The Creekside Project shall dedicate the entire 112' right-of-way width for Hillcrest Avenue.
 - The Creekside Project shall build Interim Hillcrest Avenue, which shall include full frontage improvements on the east and west side including curb, gutter, 6' sidewalk, and landscaping.
 - Construction of a 40' wide curb to curb two (2)-lane roadway.

- Construction of improvements on the west side including curb, gutter, 5' sidewalk, and landscaping.
- Construction of northbound and southbound #2 travel lanes the 40' wide curb to curb two (2)-lane roadway shall include bike lanes, interim 40'-wide concrete median curb, center median appropriate streetlights that meet with the approval of the City Engineer, and center median landscaping.
- Ultimate Hillcrest Avenue in a four (4) lane configuration including ultimate median islands shall be the responsibility of future development.
- Medians and s Shoulders shall be landscaped to the satisfaction of the City Engineer.



CITY OF ANTIOCH CEQA ADDENDUM FOR THE CREEKSIDEVINEYARDS AT SAND CREEK PROJECT ANTIOCH, CALIFORNIA JANUARY 2022

Introduction

The City of Antioch proposes to modify the conditions of approval for the Vesting Tentative Map contained in City Council Resolution 2021/52 to allow an alternative improvement design and schedule for the dedication and construction of Hillcrest Avenue through the Creekside-Vineyards at Sand Creek project.

Project Description

On March 23, 2021, the City Council adopted Resolution 2021/51, certifying the Environmental Impact Report (EIR) for the Creekside-Vineyards at Sand Creek project, a 158.2-acre residential development. The project was subsequently approved through adoption of Resolution 2021/52. The project includes construction of 220 single-family homes in a residential neighborhood with private streets. The site is located south of the current terminus of Hillcrest Avenue within the Sand Creek Focus Area, as denoted in the Antioch General Plan. The parcel is identified as Contra Costa County Assessor's parcel number: APN 057-050-024.

The approval included multiple conditions specifying the scope and responsibility for the construction of Hillcrest Avenue, an identified four-lane arterial, through the property. Specifically, Condition P.6 required the dedication of a 112' right-of-way and that the applicant construct Hillcrest Avenue with full frontage improvements (curb, gutter, sidewalk and landscaping) on both the outer eastern frontage adjacent to the project and the outer western frontage, with a 40'-wide landscaped median. The applicant was also required to construct one 12'-wide lane with an 8'-wide bicycle lane in both the northbound and southbound directions. The lanes would be aligned with the outer curbs, leaving a 40'-wide median which would contain center median curbs, LED streetlights and decorative landscaping.

The applicant now requests amendment to these conditions of approval to allow an alternative interim alignment and modified improvements. Under this alternative, the applicant would still be required to dedicate the full 112'-wide right-of-way, but would be able to construct the new roadway wholly within the eastern half of the right-of-way, adjacent to the project. Specifically, the applicant would be required to construct (from east to west) a 6' sidewalk, 9.5' landscape strip, curb and gutter, 8' northbound bike lane, 12' northbound lane, 12' southbound lane, 8' southbound bike lane, curb and gutter, 5' landscape strip, and 5' sidewalk. In total, the easternmost 56' of the 112' right-of-way would be developed for this roadway. In addition, alternative allows for a two-lane bridge at Sand Creek instead of the previously required fourlane bridge. Under this alternative, the applicant would not be obligated to construct any portion of the remaining improvements in the western portion of the right-of-way.

The Project

The City, as lead agency for the project under the California Environmental Quality Act (Pub. Resources Code §§ 21000 et seq. ("CEQA")), has determined that the proposed amendments to the conditions of approval constitute a minor modification and clarification to the EIR and warrant preparation of an Addendum to the certified EIR, pursuant to Section 15164 of the State CEQA Guidelines (14 Cal. Code Regs., §§15000 et seq.). This Addendum is supported by the information and analysis contained herein.

In accordance with State CEQA Guidelines Section 15064(a), an EIR must be prepared if there is substantial evidence that a project may have a significant effect on the environment. Once a project or program EIR has been certified or a negative declaration adopted for a project, a subsequent EIR or negative declaration may be prepared only if there is substantial evidence that there are substantial changes to the project or the project circumstances as outlined pursuant to Sections 15162 of the State CEQA Guidelines. Pursuant to State CEQA Guidelines Section 15164, an addendum may be prepared if "some changes or additions are necessary but none of the conditions described in Section 15162 calling for preparation of a subsequent EIR have occurred."

As detailed below, the City has determined that the minor project changes contemplated by the Revised Hillcrest Improvements do not require a subsequent EIR or negative declaration under State CEQA Guidelines Section 15162, and the City has further determined that the certified EIR, and this Addendum adequately address the potential environmental impacts of the Revised Hillcrest Improvements. Accordingly, the City proposes to adopt this Addendum for the purpose of making minor modifications and clarifications to the EIR in order to reflect the Revised Hillcrest Improvements.

Prior CEQA Analyses and Determinations

Creekside/Vineyards at Sand Creek Project EIR. The Draft Environmental Impact Report (DEIR) for the Creekside-Vineyards at Sand Creek project was circulated for a 45-day public review on July 20, 2020. The City distributed to public agencies and the general public the Revised Draft Environmental Impact Report ("DEIR") for the project. The DEIR (SCH # 2020039044) was prepared under the direction of the City in accordance with the requirements of CEQA and the State CEQA Guidelines and was submitted to the State Clearinghouse on July 20, 2020. In October 2020, the Final Environmental Impact Report ("FEIR") was distributed to respond to written and oral comments received on the Revised Draft EIR. The EIR was certified and the project approved on March 23, 2021.

The EIR analyzed the potential environmental impacts associated with implementation of the Project. The EIR identified project impacts and assigned appropriate mitigation measures. A statement of overriding consideration was adopted by the City Council for significant impacts in the areas of Air Quality and GHG Emissions and Transportation. The FEIR and DEIR are incorporated herein by reference and are available at https://ceqanet.opr.ca.gov/2020039044/4

Current CEQA Analysis and Determination that an Addendum Is Appropriate for this Project

The City has determined that an addendum is the appropriate CEQA clearance document for the proposed project. Prior to making this determination, the City reviewed the certified EIR to determine if any further environmental review is required for the Revised Hillcrest Improvements. In addition, the City thoroughly evaluated any third-party evaluation and analysis, which, concludes that the as-built construction would be rendered compliant with the Revised Hillcrest Improvements pursuant to the proposed amendment, and has not and will not adversely cause adverse environmental impacts. Accordingly, the City has determined that no subsequent EIR or negative declaration is required for this project.

No Subsequent Review is Required per State CEQA Guidelines Section 15162. State CEQA Guidelines Section 15162 identifies the conditions requiring subsequent environmental review. If, after certification of an EIR, altered conditions or changes or additions to a project occur, CEQA provides three mechanisms to address these changes: a subsequent EIR, a supplement to an EIR, and an addendum to an EIR.

Section 15162 of the State CEQA Guidelines describes the conditions under which a *subsequent* EIR would be prepared. In summary, when an EIR has been certified for a project, no subsequent EIR shall be prepared for that project unless the lead agency determines, on the basis of substantial evidence in light of the whole record, one or more of the following:

- (1) substantial changes are proposed in the project which will require major revisions of the previous EIR due to the involvement of new significant environmental effects or a substantial increase in the severity of previously identified effects;
- (2) substantial changes occur with respect to the circumstances under which the project isundertaken which will require major revisions of the previous EIR due to the involvement of new significant environmental effects or a substantial increase in the severity of previously identified significant effects; or
- (3) new information of substantial importance, which was not known and could not have been known with the exercise of reasonable diligence at the time the previous EIR wascertified as complete, shows any of the following:
 - (A) the project will have one or more significant effects not discussed in the previousEIR;
 - (B) significant effects previously examined will be substantially more severe than shown in the previous EIR;
 - (C) mitigation measures or alternatives previously found not to be feasible would in fact be feasible, and would substantially reduce one or more significant effects of the project, but the project proponents decline to adopt the mitigation measures or alternatives; or
 - (D) mitigation measures or alternatives which are considerably different from those analyzed in the previous EIR would substantially reduce one or more

significant effects on the environment, but the project proponents decline to adopt the mitigation measure or alternative.

Section 15163 of the State CEQA Guidelines states that a lead agency may choose to prepare a *supplement* to an EIR rather than a subsequent EIR if:

- (1) any of the conditions described above for Section 15162 would require the preparation of a subsequent EIR, and
- only minor additions or changes would be necessary to make the previous EIR adequately apply to the project in the changed situation.

Section 15164 of the State CEQA Guidelines states that a lead agency may prepare an addendum to a previously certified EIR if some changes or additions are necessary but none of the conditions described above for Section 15162 calling for preparation of a subsequent EIR have occurred.

After a review of these conditions, the City has determined that no subsequent EIR or negative declaration is required for this project. This is based on the following analysis:

a) Are there substantial changes to the project involving new or more severe significant impacts?

There are no substantial changes to the project involving new or more severe environmental impacts. Staff has compared the environmental impacts of the Project as described in the EIR with the anticipated environmental impacts from the proposed changes to the Project and determined that no substantial changes to the project would occur. Specifically, the EIR anticipated an interim two-lane configuration and did not assume a particular alignment.

(b) Are there substantial changes in the conditions under which the project is undertaken involving new or more severe significant impacts?

There are no substantial changes in the conditions assumed in the EIR that would involve new or more severe significant impacts based on the approval of the Revised Hillcrest Improvements. The March 2021 Fehr & Peers memorandum cited that "Recent studies have shown that this extension would operate well within available vehicle capacity as a two-lane roadway (one lane in each direction) under near-term and long-term conditions."

(c) Is there new information of substantial importance, which was not known and could not have been known at the time of the previous EIR that shows the project will have a significant effect not addressed in the previous EIR; or previous effects are more severe; or, previously infeasible mitigation measures are now feasible but the applicant declined to adopt them; or mitigation measures considerably different from those in the previous EIR would substantially reduce significant effects but the applicant declines to adopt them?

There is no new information that indicates that new or more severe significant effects would occur.

(d) If no subsequent EIR-level review is required, should a subsequent negative declaration be prepared?

No subsequent negative declaration or mitigated negative declaration is required because there are no significant or potentially significant impacts of the project beyond those identified in the EIR. No new or revised mitigation measures would be required to reduce the environmental impacts of the Revised Hillcrest Improvements.

Conclusion. This Addendum is adopted pursuant to State CEQA Guidelines Section 15164. This Addendum summarizes the City's analysis of the project (the Revised Hillcrest Improvements) as described above. Through the adoption of this Addendum, the City determines that the above project changes do not require a subsequent EIR or negative declaration under State CEQA Guidelines Section 15162. The City further determines that the Project EIR and any other relevant project documents, and this Addendum adequately address the potential environmental impacts of the Revised Hillcrest Improvements. As provided in Section 15164 of the State CEQA Guidelines, this Addendum need not be circulated for public review, but shall be considered with the prior environmental documents before making a decision on this project.

Ordinance Amending the Antioch Municipal Code by Adding

Section 9-5.3848, Regarding Temporary Cannabis Events on

Public Property

RECOMMENDED ACTION

It is recommended that the City Council waive the first reading and introduce by title only an ordinance amending the Antioch Municipal Code by adding Section 9-5.3848 regarding temporary cannabis events on public property and provide direction to staff.

FISCAL IMPACT

The proposed action may generate increased revenue by allowing limited temporary cannabis events linked with retail sales by Antioch licensed cannabis businesses.

DISCUSSION

The state Department of Cannabis Control ("Department") has the discretion to authorize a temporary cannabis event. Only the holder of a temporary cannabis event license issued by the Department may hold a temporary cannabis event, which is subject to additional restrictions as a Type 14 cannabis license holder. Restrictions on a temporary cannabis event include limited duration and hours, Department approval of security, prohibition on sales of tobacco or alcohol at the event, restrictions on storage and marking of cannabis, track-and-trace regulations, and exclusion of minors.

One possible location for a temporary cannabis event is the Contra Costa Event Park (the "County Fairgrounds"), located at 1201 West 10th Street in Antioch, which is a District Agricultural Association site that holds fairs, expositions, and exhibitions to highlight various industries, enterprises, resources, and products of the state. The City could also approve other locations for an event to be held.

Although the City may not have land use control over the County Fairgrounds, the Department of Cannabis Control requires approval by the applicable city or county for an event to be held on that type of public property.

The proposed ordinance will grant discretion to the City Council to allow a temporary cannabis event at the Contra Costa Event Park.

A temporary cannabis event may include retail sales. To assure the City benefits from a temporary cannabis event within its boundaries, the proposed ordinance would impose a condition that any retail sales only be conducted pursuant to a cannabis retail license issued by the City.

The Department requires submittal of a security plan for a temporary cannabis event. However, to protect any interests unique to the City, the proposed ordinance would require the event organizer to provide not only a security plan, but also a traffic control plan, satisfactory to the City. Likewise, while the Department requires evidence of insurance, the proposed ordinance would require the event organizer to provide insurance satisfactory to the City Attorney prior to the event.

The Department has the discretion to immediately halt the temporary cannabis event if certain violations occur. The proposed ordinance includes a similar restriction on the event so that the City can be assured that the event and the event organizer comply with the City's terms and conditions.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ANTIOCH ADDING SECTION 9-5.3848 TO THE ANTIOCH MUNICIPAL CODE REGARDING TEMPORARY CANNABIS EVENTS ON PUBLIC PROPERTY

The City Council of the City of Antioch does ordain as follows:

SECTION 1:

Beginning in 2018, the City Council has adopted several ordinances relating to cannabis businesses within the City. These ordinances govern the permanent locations of various types of cannabis businesses.

SECTION 2:

The State of California, through the Department of Cannabis Controls, allows temporary cannabis events on specified conditions at certain locations. The City has evaluated this type of temporary, limited event and determined that it could be beneficial to the City, its residents, and businesses by offering educational and cultural opportunities at the event, as well as additional revenue for the City and tis social equity programs.

SECTION 3:

Section 9-5.3848 is added to state as follows:

§ 9-5.3848 TEMPORARY CANNABIS EVENTS

The City Council may authorize a temporary cannabis event if the event meets all of the following terms and conditions:

- (A) The event is held either at the Contra Costa Event Park, 1201 West 10th Street, Antioch, CA 94509 or at a district agricultural association event.
- (B) Any retail sales are conducted pursuant to a valid cannabis business license allowing retail sales and issued by the City.
- (C) The event complies with state law and regulations.
- (D) The event will be conducted by the holder of a cannabis event organizer license and will be a licensed temporary cannabis event.
- (E) The event organizer agrees to submit traffic control and security plans to the City and to comply with the City's directions for traffic control and security before, during, and after the event.

(F) The event organizer provides insurance protecting the City in an amount and type, and with an admitted surety, satisfactory to the City Attorney at least 90 days prior to the event.

Failure by the event organizer to comply with any of the above terms and conditions shall constitute the basis for the City, whether through action of the Council, the City Manager, the City Attorney, or the Chief of Police, to revoke the City Council's authorization for the event and to provide written notice thereof to the event organizer and the Department of Cannabis Control.

Because the temporary cannabis event may only be held on property owned by the state, the county, or a district agricultural association, Section 9-5.3845 does not apply to this type of event.

SECTION 4: Severability:

If any section, subsection, provision or part of this ordinance, or its application to any person or circumstance, is held to be unconstitutional or otherwise invalid, the remainder of this ordinance, and the application of such provision to other person or circumstances, shall not be affected thereby and shall remain in full force and effect and, to that end, the provisions of this ordinance are severable.

SECTION 5. CEQA:

The above amendments to the City's Municipal Code are not considered a project under the California Environmental Quality Act under the common sense exemption (CEQA Guidelines §15061(b)(3) because the proposed amendments will not have a direct or reasonably foreseeable indirect physical change or effect on the environment.

SECTION 6:

This ordinance shall take effect and be enforced thirty (30) days from and after the date of its adoption and shall be published once within fifteen (15) days upon passage and adoption in a newspaper of general circulation printed and published in the City of Antioch.

§ 15600. Cannabis Event Organizer License.

- (a) To obtain a temporary cannabis event license, the event organizer must first apply for and obtain a cannabis event organizer license.
- (b) A cannabis event organizer licensed under this section shall comply with chapter 1 of this division except for sections 15006, 15007, 15010, 15019, 15025, 15027, 15034, 15038, 15042, 15044, and 15046-15052.1.

- (a) A temporary cannabis event license authorizes a licensed cannabis event organizer to hold a temporary cannabis event where the onsite sale and consumption of cannabis goods is authorized at the location indicated on the license during the dates indicated on the license.
- (b) Violations of the requirements applicable to temporary cannabis events may result in disciplinary action against the cannabis event organizer license or any other licenses held by a licensee participating in the temporary cannabis event and responsible for a violation under this division or the Act.
- (c) A temporary cannabis event license shall only be issued for a single day or up to 4 consecutive days. No temporary cannabis event license will be issued for more than 4 days.
- (d) An application for a temporary cannabis event license shall be submitted to the Department no less than 60 calendar days before the first day of the temporary cannabis event.
- (e) A temporary cannabis event may only be held at a county fair event, district agricultural association event, or at another venue expressly approved by a local jurisdiction for the purpose of holding a temporary cannabis event.
- (f) A temporary cannabis event license shall not be issued for a premises that is licensed for the sale of alcohol or tobacco.
- (g) If the list of licensees and employees participating in the temporary cannabis event changes after the application is submitted or after the licensee is issued, the applicant shall submit with the Licensee Notification and Request Form, Notifications and Requests Regarding Regulatory Compliance, DCC-LIC-028 (New 9/21), incorporated herein by reference, an updated list and an updated diagram, as required in section 15002.1(b)(5), to the Department no less than 72 hours before the event. Licensees not on the list submitted to the Department shall not participate in the temporary cannabis event.
- (h) The licensed cannabis event organizer shall hire or contract for security personnel to provide security services at the licensed temporary cannabis event. All security personnel hired or contracted for by the licensee shall be at least 21 years of age, licensed by the Bureau of Security and Investigative Services, and comply with chapters 11.4 and 11.5 of division 3 of the Business and Professions Code. Security personnel shall be present on the licensed premises at all times cannabis goods are available for sale and/or cannabis goods consumption is allowed on the licensed premises.
- (i) A licensed cannabis event organizer shall maintain a clearly legible sign not less than 7 inches by 11 inches in size, reading "No Persons Under 21 Allowed" at or near each public entrance to any area where the sale or consumption of cannabis goods is allowed. The lettering of the sign shall be no less than 1 inch in height.
- (j) All cannabis waste generated at a temporary cannabis event shall be collected and disposed of in accordance with the requirements of section 17223. The licensed cannabis event organizer may contract or arrange for the collection and disposal of cannabis waste generated during the temporary cannabis event.
- (k) A licensed cannabis event organizer and all other licensees participating in a temporary cannabis event are required to comply with section 15037 and all other applicable requirements in the Act and this division pertaining to record keeping.
- (/) The Department may require the event organizer and all participants to cease operations without delay if, in the opinion of the Department or local law enforcement, it is necessary to protect the immediate public health and safety of the people of the state. Upon notification from the Department that the event is to cease operations, the event organizer shall immediately stop the event and all participants shall be removed from the premises within the time frame provided by the Department.

(m) Upon notification from the Department, the event organizer shall immediately expel from the event any person selling cannabis goods without a license from the Department that authorizes the participant to sell cannabis goods. The event organizer or their representative shall remain with the person being expelled from the premises at all times until he or she vacates the premises. If the person does not vacate the premises, the Department may inform the event organizer that the event must cease operations. Upon notification from the Department that the event is to cease operations, the event organizer shall immediately stop the event and all participants shall be removed from the premises within the time frame provided by the Department.

- (a) Only persons age 21 or older may purchase and consume cannabis goods at a temporary cannabis event. Prior to selling cannabis goods to a customer, the licensee making the sale shall confirm, using valid identification as specified in section 15404 of this division, the age and identity of the customer.
- (b) All sales of cannabis goods at a temporary cannabis event must occur in a retail area as designated in the premises diagram pursuant to section 15002.1(b)(5) of this division.
- (c) Each sale at a temporary cannabis event shall be performed by a licensed retailer, a licensed non-storefront retailer, or licensed microbusiness that is authorized to engage in retail sales. The cannabis event organizer may also sell cannabis goods at the temporary cannabis event if the organizer separately holds a license authorizing the retail sale of cannabis goods.
 - (1) Licensed retailers or licensed microbusinesses shall only conduct sales activities within their specifically assigned area, identified in the diagram of the physical layout of the temporary cannabis event.
 - (2) Mobile sales activities via wagon, cart, or similar means are prohibited at the temporary cannabis event site.
- (d) Licensed retailers or licensed microbusinesses must prominently display their temporary cannabis event location number and state license within plain sight of the public.
- (e) All sales at a temporary cannabis event shall occur on the dates stated on the license and shall occur at the location stated on the license. All onsite sales of cannabis goods must comply with the hours of operation requirements of section 15403 of this division.
- (f) Sale of alcohol or tobacco shall not be allowed on the licensed temporary cannabis event premises.
- (g) The cannabis goods sold onsite at a temporary cannabis event shall be transported by a licensed distributor or licensed microbusiness in compliance with the Act and this division. All shipments of cannabis goods and non-cannabis goods intended for sale at a temporary cannabis event must be checked by the temporary cannabis event organizer staff to prevent prohibited items, such as alcohol and tobacco, from entering the licensed premises.
- (h) Except small amounts of cannabis goods used for display, all cannabis goods for sale at a temporary cannabis event shall be stored in a secure, locked container that is not accessible to the public. Cannabis goods being stored by a licensee at a temporary cannabis event shall not be left unattended. Licensees may share the secure, locked container; however, each licensee using the container shall be held responsible for any violations of this section and subject to disciplinary action.
- (i) All cannabis goods made available for sale at a cannabis event shall comply with all requirements for the retail sale of cannabis goods within the Act and section 15406 of this division.
- (j) All cannabis goods made available for sale at a temporary cannabis event shall comply with all track and trace requirements within the Act and this division.
- (k) All cannabis goods used for display at a temporary cannabis event shall comply with the requirements of section 15405 of this division.
- (/) All cannabis goods sold at a temporary cannabis event shall comply with section 15413 of this division.
- (m) All customer returns of cannabis goods at a temporary cannabis event shall comply with section 15410 of this division.
- (n) The daily sales limits under section 15409 of this division apply to all sales made at a temporary cannabis event.

- (o) A licensed retailer shall only provide free cannabis goods to a person at a temporary cannabis event if the licensed retailer complies with all requirements of section 15411 of this division.
- (p) The licensed cannabis event organizer shall be responsible for ensuring that all rules and requirements for the onsite sale of cannabis goods are followed.
- (q) Any compensation paid from a licensed retailer to a licensed cannabis event organizer for participation in a temporary cannabis event shall not be determined based on, or be contingent on, the sale of cannabis goods.

SUBJECT: Submission of Application for California Violence Intervention and

Prevention (CalVIP) Grant Program

RECOMMENDED ACTION

It is recommended that the City Council adopt the resolution (Attachment A) authorizing the submission of applications for the California Violence Intervention and Prevention grants for a period of 5 years.

FISCAL IMPACT

The adoption of the resolution will allow the City to apply for additional CalVIP Grant Program funds that can be utilized to support, expand, and replicate evidence-based violence reduction initiatives that seek to interrupt cycles of violence in adversely impacted communities throughout the City of Antioch.

DISCUSSION

According to Antioch Police Department crime statistics in 2021 (Attachment B), the City of Antioch experienced a 40% surge in gun violence. Although the number of Uniform Crime Report Part I crimes, such as arson, robberies, rapes dropped the first nine months of 2021 compared to the same period in 2020, homicides increased from seven to eight and aggravated assaults, which involved gun violence increased exponentially 39.8%, from 264 to 369. Based on current gun violence data, it can be predicted that gun violence will increase in the coming year. 1 CalVIP Grant Program funding would be earmarked and allocated to reduce gun violence in adversely impacted communities throughout the City of Antioch and focus on the target population that could benefit from CalVIP funding.

BACKGOUND

Assembly Bill (AB) 1603 (Chapter 735, Statues of 2019), also known as the Break the Cycle of Violence Act, was signed by Governor Gavin Newsom on October 11, 2019. This bill codified the CalVIP grant program and the authority and duties of the State of California Board of State and Community Corrections (BSCC) in administering the program, including the establishment of a grant selection advisory committee (the CalVIP ESC), selection criteria for the grants, and reporting requirements to the Legislature. It narrows the focus of the CalVIP grant to include initiatives that improves public health and safety line by supporting effective violence reduction initiatives in communities that are disproportionally impacted by gun violence, particularly group-member involved in homicides, shootings, and aggravated assaults.

During the grant period, the CalVIP grants will be awarded for a 42-month term, from 7/1/2022 to 12/31/2025. The first three years (7/1/2022 to 6/30/25) are for implementation and service delivery. The last six months (7/1/2025 to 12/31/2025) are for completion of the financial audit and final evaluation report.

Based on the eligibility requirements, only cities that are disproportionally impacted by violence and Community Based Organizations that serve the residents of those cities are eligible to apply for a CalVIP grant. Additionally, eligible cities that serve the residents of adversely impacted cities may apply for up to \$6 million with a specific set-aside for small scope Community Based Organizations that are eligible to apply for up to \$400,000. The total available funding through this CalVIP Request for Proposals is \$209,650,000.

CalVIP grants must be used to support, expand, and replicate evidence-based reduction initiatives that seek to interrupt cycles of violence. Strategies eligible for funding could include but are not limited to: hospital based-violence intervention programs, youth violence reduction programs, evidence-based street outreach programs, and focused deterrence strategies.

Target population and impacted communities are the beneficiary of grant funds. Initiatives funded by CalVIP must be primarily focused on providing violence intervention and prevention services to the small segment of the population and impacted communities that are identified as having the highest risk of perpetrating or being victimized by gun violence in the near future. City applicants must agree to distribute at least 50% of the grant funds it receives to one or more of the following: a) Community Based Organizations or b) public agencies that are primarily dedicated to community safety or violence prevention. If granted, CalVIP grantees will be required to submit quarterly progress reports, a Local Evaluation Plan (6 months post-award) and a Final Local Evaluation Report.²

Potential Transition of City Fleet to Zero Emission Vehicles

RECOMMENDED ACTION

It is recommended that the City Council discuss and provide direction to City staff.

FISCAL IMPACT

This recommended action has no direct fiscal impact at this time.

DISCUSSION

During the City Council meeting on October 12, 2020, City Council requested a discussion on requiring all vehicles purchased by the City to be zero emission vehicles ("ZEV").

Background

On September 23, 2020, California Governor Gavin Newsom signed executive order N-79-20 stating "It shall be the goal of the State that 100 percent of in-state sales of new passenger cars and trucks will be zero-emission by 2035. It shall be a further goal of the State that 100 percent of medium and heavy-duty vehicles in the State be zero-emission by 2045 for all operations where feasible and by 2035 for drayage trucks. It shall be further a goal of the State to transition to 100 percent zero-emission off-road vehicles and equipment by 2035 where feasible." With this executive order in place, Antioch will need to plan its transition to an all-ZEV fleet. Staff is seeking direction from City Council on the timing of the transition.

The City currently has 201 vehicles in our fleet. Of these, one (1) vehicle is all electric and eight (8) are hybrids. The City's fleet ranges from passenger cars and trucks to heavy-duty vehicles. There are currently two (2) charging stations at the Water Treatment Plant for City use only and one (1) charging station at City Hall for the public's use.

Existing Policy

The City currently does not have a ZEV policy. The City's Climate Action and Resilience Plan (adopted by City Council, May 2020) discusses transportation electrification. This plan has action items to:

- 1. Strategically expand electric vehicle ("EV") charging stations;
- 2. Provide financial incentives and support outreach for programs and policies that encourage the switch to EV;
 - a. Clean Cars for all
 - b. Education on the benefits of electric vehicles
 - c. Special privileges for EV parking spots; and
- 3. Provide an Electric Vehicle buying guide for City of Antioch vehicle purchases or incorporate EV purchases into a Sustainable Purchasing Guide for City procurement.

The City's Municipal Climate Action Plan (adopted by City Council, May 2011), Section 6.2, discusses the City's fleet inventory. This section lists potential fleet measures that can be used for possible reduction in carbon dioxide emissions. The options that were evaluated considered changing to B20 biodiesel fuel for diesel fleet, implementing a no idling ordinance for the municipal fleet, and replacing passenger vehicles with Compressed Natural Gas (CNG), electric vehicles, and hybrid vehicles.

Potential Impacts

If the City desires to begin implementation of a ZEV policy, there would need to be a transitional period that would allow City staff to continue to purchase vehicles that are not ZEV while infrastructure needs to support a fully electric vehicle fleet are evaluated. These infrastructure needs would include, but not be limited to, installation of charging stations at City facilities, and electrical system upgrades onsite and offsite to handle the additional electrical load. This study would also identify the benefits of switching to ZEV such as reduced fuel purchases, reduced routine maintenance, and most importantly, improvements to the environment.

The City has a wide variety of vehicle and equipment that do not current have ZEV options. There are also some concerns with the performance abilities of ZEV for Police Interceptors which will need to be researched. Fleet staff will also need additional training and equipment to properly maintain ZEV.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

It is recommended that the City Council adopt a resolution approving the New Class Specification for Community Resources Director, assigning a salary range, and assigning the classification to the Management (Executive) Bargaining Unit.

FISCAL IMPACT

The salary range (without benefits) for one (1) Community Resources Director is \$149,808 - \$182,076. The total annual range of cost of funding (1) Community Resources Director is (Step A – Step E) \$275,069 - \$327,382. The cost of this position is included in the General Fund Fiscal Year 2021-23 Budget.

DISCUSSION

The Community Resources Director position was approved by City Council on June 22, 2021 with the adoption of the Fiscal Year 2021-23 Budget. This classification will plan, direct, manage, and oversee the activities and operations of the Community Resources Department which include, youth services, environmental resources, Community Development Block Grant (CDBG); unhoused resident services; community crisis intervention response; violence intervention and prevention; Animal Services; and code enforcement. Some of the duties include:

- Develops, implements, and maintains management systems, procedures and standards for program evaluation; monitors developments related to City community response services; evaluates the impact on City operations; analyzes data and composes reports that include program evaluation results that are presented to the City Manager and City Council.
- Administers, directs, and recommends the Department's annual operating budget; develops and monitors grant funded programs; analyzes fiscal data to identify and project resource needs; obtains needed resources; approves the forecast of funds needed for staffing, equipment, materials, and supplies; monitors and approves expenditures and implements budgetary adjustments as appropriate and necessary.

 Coordinates with other departments, elected officials, federal, state, county, local, Community-Based Organizations, private and non-governmental safety or healthcare agencies to develop community response plans and programs related to behavioral health, medical, services for the unhoused community, school response, youth services, violence prevention, etc.

COMMUNITY RESOURCES DIRECTOR

SUMMARY DESCRIPTION

Under general administrative direction of the City Manager, plans, directs, manages, and oversees the activities and operations of the Community Resources Department including, youth services, environmental resources, Community Development Block Grant (CDBG); unhoused resources; mental health crisis response; violence intervention and prevention; code enforcement; and Animal Services, and to perform other duties as assigned; coordinates activities with other departments and outside agencies; and provides highly responsible and complex administrative support to the City Manager.

REPRESENTATIVE DUTIES

The following duties are typical for this classification. Incumbents may not perform all of the listed duties and/or may be required to perform additional or different duties from those set forth below to address business needs and changing business practices.

- Assume full management responsibility for all Community Resources Department services and activities including youth services network, environmental resources, Community Development Block Grant (CDBG); unhoused resident services; community crisis intervention response; violence intervention and prevention; Animal Services, and code enforcement.
- 2. Create, recommend, implement and administer departmental policies and procedures, goals, objectives, and priorities for each assigned service area.
- 3. Establish, within City policy, appropriate service and staffing levels; monitor and evaluate the efficiency and effectiveness of service delivery methods and procedures; allocate resources accordingly.
- 4. Assess and monitor workload, administrative and support systems, and internal reporting relationships; identify opportunities for improvement; direct and implement changes.
- 5. Plan, direct, and coordinate, through assigned staff, the Community Resource Department's goals and objectives; assign projects and programmatic areas of responsibility; review and evaluate work methods and procedures; meet with key staff to identify and resolve problems.
- 6. Develop, implement, and maintain management systems, procedures and standards for program evaluation; monitor developments related to City community response services; evaluate the impact on City operations; analyze data and compose reports that include program evaluation results that are presented to the City Manager and City Council.
- 7. Select, train, motivate, and evaluate assigned personnel; provide or coordinate staff training; work with employees to correct deficiencies; implement discipline and termination procedures.
- 8. Administer, direct, and recommend the Department's annual operating budget; develop and monitor grant funded programs; analyze fiscal data to identify and project resource needs; obtain needed resources; approve the forecast of funds needed for staffing, equipment,

- materials, and supplies; monitor and approve expenditures and implement budgetary adjustments as appropriate and necessary.
- 9. Procure goods and services to accomplish the work of the department, including the preparation of Requests for Proposals and Qualifications; administer agreements for consulting services; conduct research and prepare reports.
- 10. Initiate or conduct special studies as assigned and prepare reports with recommendations for appropriate action.
- 11. Prepare and present staff reports and other necessary correspondence.
- 12. Coordinate with other departments, elected officials, federal, state, county, local, Community-Based Organizations, private and non-governmental safety or healthcare agencies to develop community response plans and programs related to behavioral health, medical, services for the unhoused community, school response, youth services, violence prevention, etc.
- 13. Attend and participate on a variety of boards, commissions, committees, and professional group meetings; maintain awareness of new trends and developments in the fields related to community resources; incorporate new developments as appropriate.
- 14. Respond to and resolve difficult and sensitive citizen inquiries and complaints.
- 15. Pursue grant opportunities and actively seek to leverage available local funds with regional, State and Federal
- 16. Perform other duties and related assignments as required.
