WHEREAS, National Women's History Month provides an opportunity for schools and communities to increase knowledge held by our children and our community of women's roles in history and their contributions to the development of this nation;

WHEREAS, the story of American women is the story of women of all ages, races, and cultural backgrounds who led campaigns for equality and civil rights, advanced professional and educational opportunities, founded entirely new enterprises, and contributed significantly to the arts, sciences, and humanistic causes;

WHEREAS, despite these contributions, the role of American women in history has been consistently overlooked and undervalued in the literature, teaching, and study of American history; and

WHEREAS, the 2024 theme for National Women's History Month is "Women Who Advocate for Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion" which directly recognizes women throughout the country who understand that, for a positive future, we need to eliminate bias and discrimination entirely from our lives and institutions.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, LAMAR A. HERNANDEZ-THORPE, Mayor of the City of Antioch, hereby proclaim March 2024 is "Women's History Month" in the City of Antioch. I encourage all Antioch Residents to observe March as Women's History Month with appropriate programs, ceremonies, and activities.

PRESCRIPTION DRUG ABUSE AWARENESS MONTH

March 2024

WHEREAS, when used as prescribed by a doctor, prescription medicines such as stimulants, sedatives and opioids can be helpful in treating many illnesses, but when these medications are misused, they can have serious consequences;

WHEREAS, many prescription drugs can alter a person’s thinking and judgment, and can lead to health risks, including addiction, drugged driving, infectious disease, and adverse effects on pregnancy;

WHEREAS, anyone who takes prescription opioids can become addicted to them. As many as one in four patients receiving long-term opioid therapy in a primary care setting struggles with an opioid use disorder (OUD);

WHEREAS, prescription opioid overdose deaths also often involve benzodiazepines, which are central nervous system depressants that the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommend avoiding while taking prescription opioids, due to the risk of overdose;

WHEREAS, in 2022 in Contra Costa County, there were 463,914 opioid prescriptions given to patients which is an age-adjusted rate of 318 per 1,000 residents;

WHEREAS, in 2022, a total of 21,316 emergency department visits occurred in California that were related to any opioid overdose and 348 of those visits occurred in Contra Costa County. According to the CDC, 106,699 drug overdose deaths occurred nationally in 2022, 80,411 were from opioids and 169 of those opioid related overdose deaths occurred in Contra Costa County;

WHEREAS, synthetic opioids other than methadone (primarily fentanyl) and stimulants such as methamphetamine were the main drivers of drug overdose deaths in the United States in 2022;

WHEREAS, to help prevent substance abuse disorder and overdose deaths, the Antioch City Council encourages community members to dispose of their expired and unwanted prescription drugs throughout the year and safety store those still needed; and

WHEREAS, the Contra Costa County Medication Education and Disposal Safety (MEDS) Coalition engages all community members in the county to participate in Prescription Drug Abuse Awareness Month activities to raise prescription drug safety awareness.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, LAMAR A. HERNANDEZ-THORPE, Mayor of the City of Antioch, hereby declare that March 2024 is “Prescription Drug Abuse Awareness Month” in the City of Antioch. I encourage all citizens to participate in prescription drug abuse related prevention programs and activities. The Antioch City Council also encourages all community members to pledge to, “Spread the Word... One Pill Can Kill”.

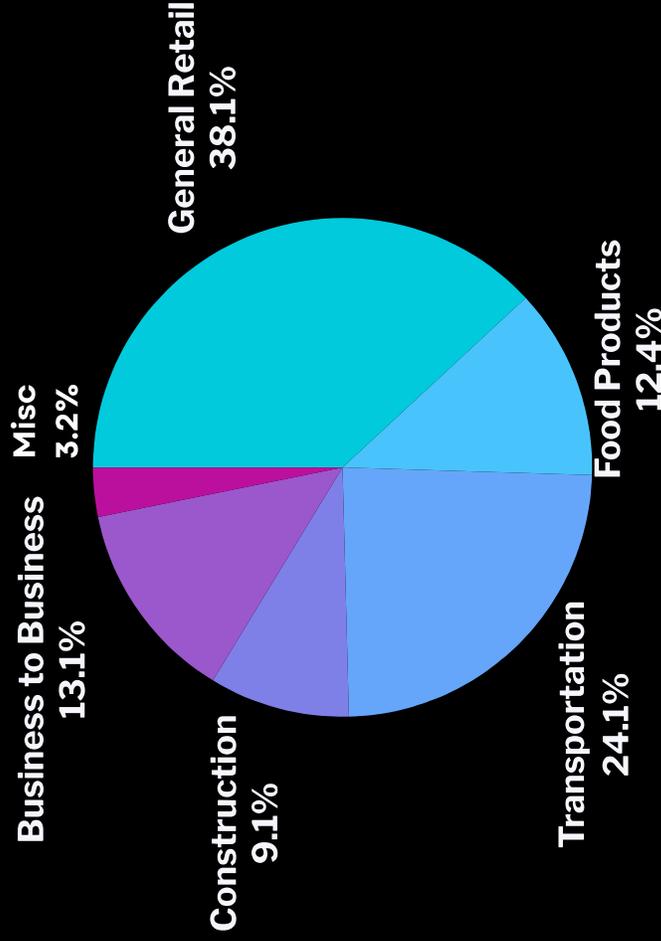

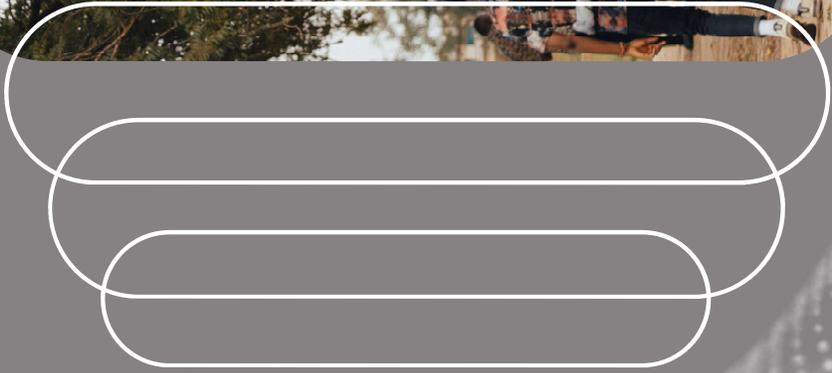

In response to Leslie May, Outside Legal Counsel Diaz explained AB2449 as it related to the provisions for teleconferencing.

In response to Councilmember Ogorchock, Outside Legal Counsel Diaz also explained that if an item came back to the legislative body as a cure, they would follow the same voting rules. Additionally, he noted a JPA was a separate governmental agency and he advised JPA members to consult with City Attorney Smith prior to disclosing anything to Council. He confirmed that text messages and emails between members were subject to public record requests.

In response to Councilmember Torres-Walker, Outside Legal Counsel Diaz discussed laws governing disruptions during public comment.

Andrew Becker questioned if there was a cure for an instance in which a member of the public was denied access to a Councilmember.

Mayor Hernandez-Thorpe reported that Council had agreed the composition of the Antioch Police Oversight Commission (APOC) would consist of a representative from each district and three at-large individuals representing Antioch Unified School District (AUSD), and the business and faith-based communities. He reported each Councilmember participated in the interview process, which included a panel of other members of the community. He announced that they had been unsuccessful at fulfilling a representative from AUSD and the business community so the appointments for one-year terms would be filled until the next interview process when they would seek individuals to serve in that capacity. He announced a swearing-in ceremony for appointees would be held at 11:00 A.M. on February 14, 2024, at City Hall.

Mayor Hernandez-Thorpe nominated Alicia Dianne Lacey-Oha to the APOC for a one-year term, expiring November 2024 and Acting City Clerk Rosales read her biography.

A motion was made by Councilmember Ogorchock and seconded by Councilmember Torres-Walker to appoint Alicia Dianne Lacey-Oha to the Antioch Police Oversight Commission for a one-year term, expiring November 2024.

Mayor Hernandez-Thorpe opened the floor to public comment.

Ralph Hernandez, Antioch resident, stated he did not support moving forward with appointments to the Commission at this time.

Several speakers spoke in support of appointing Alicia Dianne Lacey-Oha to the APOC.

Mayor Hernandez-Thorpe nominated Porshe Taylor to the APOC for a two-year term, expiring November 2025 and Acting City Clerk Rosales read her biography.

Several speakers spoke in support of the appointment of Porshe Taylor to the APOC.

Several speakers spoke in support of Leslie May's appointment to the APOC.

On motion by Councilmember Torres-Walker, seconded by Councilmember Ogorchock, the City Council members present unanimously adopted a resolution approving the Mayor's appointment of Leslie May to the Antioch Police Oversight Commission for a two-year term, expiring November 2025.

Mayor Hernandez-Thorpe nominated Mahogany Spears to the APOC for a three-year term, expiring November 2026 and Acting City Clerk Rosales read her biography.

Councilmember Ogorchock reported this recommendation was made by young adults and youth who served on the interview panel and supported the appointment of Ms. Spears because of her professional experience.

RESOLUTION NO. 2024/12

On motion by Councilmember Ogorchock, seconded by Councilmember Torres-Walker, the City Council members present unanimously adopted a resolution approving the Mayor's appointment of Mahogany Spears to the Antioch Police Oversight Commission for a three-year term, expiring November 2026.

Mayor Hernandez-Thorpe nominated Treva Hadden to the APOC for a three-year term, expiring November 2026 and Acting City Clerk Rosales read her biography.

A speaker spoke in support of appointing Treva Hadden's to the APOC.

RESOLUTION NO. 2024/13

On motion by Councilmember Torres-Walker, seconded by Councilmember Ogorchock, the City Council members present unanimously adopted a resolution approving the Mayor's appointment of Treva Hadden to the Antioch Police Oversight Commission for a three-year term, expiring November 2026.

Mayor Hernandez-Thorpe nominated Harry Thurston to the APOC for a three-year term, expiring November 2026 and Acting City Clerk Rosales read his biography.

A speaker spoke in support of appointing Harry Thurston to the APOC.

RESOLUTION NO. 2024/14

On motion by Councilmember Torres-Walker, seconded by Councilmember Ogorchock, the City Council members present unanimously adopted a resolution approving the Mayor's appointment of Harry Thurston to the Antioch Police Oversight Commission for a three-year term, expiring November 2026.

Councilmember Torres-Walker expressed her appreciation to those who applied and the interview panel who selected candidates. She discussed the importance of accountability and transparency for the APD. She suggested the City consider hiring a Diversity and Equity Officer. Mayor Hernandez-Thorpe congratulated residents on the successful creation of the APOC and expressed his appreciation for those who had advocated for change. He noted this was an important step for rebuilding public safety in Antioch. He reiterated that the swearing-in ceremony for appointees would be held tomorrow at 11:00 A.M. at City Hall.

Assistant City Clerk Garcia administered the Oath of Office to Alicia Dianne Lacey-Oha, Devin Williams, Porshe Taylor, Leslie May, Mahogany Spears, Treva Hadden and Harry Thurston.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Due to the amount of speaker requests, Mayor Thorpe reduced speaker times to two-minutes.

Sara Blanco, Frank Sterling, Brendon O'laskey, Rising Juntos, Hadi Ghaus, Antioch resident, Omair Alam, Ahmad, Antioch resident, Dr. Shaikh, Mushda Farez, Contra Costa & Palestine and Leslie May requested Council agendize a resolution in support of a ceasefire in Gaza.

Rocheall Pierre, Rising Juntos and Monument Impact, requested Council agendize a Just Case for Eviction Ordinance.

Judith Ortiz, Monument Impact, requested Council agendize a Just Cause for Eviction Ordinance and a resolution in support of a ceasefire in Gaza.

Hilda Poulson, Alameda for Cease Fire, Fransisco Torres, Reimagine Antioch and Teki Flow congratulated the City on the formation of the APOC. They requested Council agendize a resolution in support of a ceasefire in Gaza.

Erika Raulston congratulated the City on the formation of the APOC. She requested Council agendize a Just Cause for Eviction Ordinance.

Ralph Hernandez, Antioch resident, commended Mayor Hernandez-Thorpe for changing his name to include his parents' last name and discussed cultural traditions of the Hispanic Latino community.

Al Dargma spoke in support of utilizing tax dollars to benefit American citizens. He requested Council agendize a resolution in support of a ceasefire in Gaza.

Eddie Gums, Archie Brumfield, Necole Arrington, ACCE Antioch, Kamilah Miller, ACCE and Tachina Garrett ACCE, discussed historical events in honor of Black History Month.

Daniel Solorio discussed the fiscal impact of Antioch Unified School Bond Measure B.

Devin Williams discussed historical events in honor of Black History Month and spoke in support of the people in Palestine.

Melissa Case wished everyone a Happy Black History Month and spoke in support of the formation of the APOC. She commented on the delay in bringing police body cameras to APD. Mayor Hernandez-Thorpe responded that the body camera agenda item included tasers which the majority of Council had opposed.

Cassandra Quinto Collins thanked Mayor Hernandez-Thorpe for visiting her after her son's death and the City Council for passing police reform policies.

An unidentified speaker discussed his efforts to bring affordable housing units to Antioch. He urged Council and staff to be part of the process.

An unidentified speaker invited the public to visit her social media and discussed past threats against community members. She requested Council agendaize a Just Cause for Evictions Ordinance, a resolution in support of a ceasefire in Gaza and invest in public safety/community resources.

CITY COUNCIL COMMITTEE REPORTS/COMMUNICATIONS

Councilmember Torres-Walker reported on her attendance at a Human Rights and Racial Equity Ad Hoc Committee meeting.

Councilmember Ogorchock reported on her attendance at a Human Rights and Racial Equity Ad Hoc Committee meeting and a Mayor and Councilmember Conference. She discussed the financial implications of the California Business Roundtable.

MAYOR'S COMMENTS

Mayor Hernandez-Thorpe announced he would be attending a Tri Delta Transit meeting later this month. He reported the CCTA committee met, and he was appointed to the Contra Costa Transportation Ad Hoc Committee to develop a new transportation plan for Contra Costa County. He announced he was hosting a Black History Closing Celebration and Key to the City event honoring local civil rights leaders at 6:30 P.M. on February 29, 2024, at Delta Bay Community Church.

On motion by Councilmember Ogorchock, seconded by Councilmember Torres-Walker, the City Council members present unanimously approved the Council Consent Calendar with the exception of Items I, J and M, which were removed for further discussion.

Item I – An unidentified speaker expressed concern for costs associated with the tree trimming service.

Acting Director of Public Works/City Engineer Buenting explained that the project went out to bid and the proposal from The Professional Tree Care Company was appropriate. He noted additional work needed to be addressed and this was the lowest responsible bidder.

On motion by Councilmember Ogorchock, seconded by Mayor Hernandez-Thorpe, the City Council members present unanimously approved Item I.

Item J – Councilmember Ogorchock stated she did not support extra street sweeping services and would not vote to approve it this evening.

A motion was made by Councilmember Torres-Walker, seconded by Mayor Hernandez-Thorpe to postpone Item J.

Speakers spoke in support of Item J.

In response to Councilmember Ogorchock, Councilmember Torres-Walker explained that this proposal had been scaled down and it would improve street conditions and pedestrian safety within Districts 1 and 2, currently underserved and underrepresented.

Councilmember Ogorchock stated given the information provided, she would be willing to support extra street sweeping services.

A vote taken on the previous motion to postpone Item J was unanimously approved by the Councilmembers present.

Item M – Acting Assistant City Manager Helfenberger announced the Rotary Club of the Delta was inadvertently left off the list. He requested Council include a grant in the amount of \$1,000.00 so they could provide home repairs for the elderly.

A motion was made by Councilmember Ogorchock, seconded by Councilmember Torres-Walker, to approve Item M with the addition of a \$1,000.00 grant for the Rotary Club of the Delta.

An anonymous speaker spoke in support of funding all the Civic Enhancement Grants.

Mayor Hernandez-Thorpe explained that this item started as a pilot program and supported increasing grants in the future. He noted there were other grant opportunities in Antioch.

A vote taken on the previous motion to approve Item M with the addition of a \$1,000.00 grant for the Rotary Club of the Delta was unanimously approved by Councilmembers present.

3. PG&E SERVICE CENTER (PD-21-05, UP-21-14, DR2023-0022)

Acting Planning Manager Merideth presented the staff report dated February 13, 2024, recommending the City Council take the following actions: 1) Adopt the resolution approving the PG&E Service Center Project Initial Study/Mitigated Negative Declaration (IS/MND), Response to Comments, and Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program (MMRP). 2) Introduce by title only and waive the further reading of the ordinance rezoning the project site to Planned Development (PD). 3) Adopt the resolution approving a Final Development Plan, Use Permit, and Design Review.

Mayor Hernandez-Thorpe opened the public hearing.

Brett Badelle, Local Government Affairs Representative / PG&E, introduced himself and stated they would incorporate the feedback received for this project from the Planning Commission. He introduced Richard Price, Principal / DGA who presented the PowerPoint presentation of the PG&E Antioch Service Center Development Plan, Use Permit and Design Review.

A speaker encouraged PG&E to secure their site across the street and suggested they consider investing in a service center as well as warming and cooling centers.

Laura Kindsvater, Antioch resident, requested PG&E consider increasing native keystone species in their landscape plans.

Alexander Broom spoke in support of increasing native plant species, securing their neighboring parcel and increasing solar capacity.

Mr. Badelle stated he appreciated the feedback and noted PG&E was committed to the community.

Mayor Hernandez-Thorpe closed the public hearing.

Councilmember Torres-Walker requested a list of the native plant species. She discussed the importance of community engagement for corporations.

In response to Councilmember Torres-Walker, Mr. Badelle reported they were working internally to secure the site across the street. He stated he would follow up offline to make sure this matter was addressed properly. He offered to provide Council with his contact information.

Acting Director of Community Development Scudero confirmed that representatives from PG&E had reached out to Code Enforcement regarding how to better secure the site across the street.

Councilmember Ogorchock spoke in support of the project and recognized PG&E for their local hire practice. She suggested keystone native plants make up 75 percent of the landscape plan and requested PG&E consider adding more solar panels.

Mr. Price confirmed that there would be additional solar and solar ready areas.

Mayor Hernandez-Thorpe stated the project was promising and requested PG&E secure the property across the street.

Councilmember Ogorchock also requested PG&E consider adding a service center.

RESOLUTION NO. 2024/21

On motion by Councilmember Ogorchock, seconded by Councilmember Torres-Walker, the City Council members present unanimously adopted the resolution approving the PG&E Service Center Project Initial Study/Mitigated Negative Declaration (IS/MND), Response to Comments, and Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program (MMRP).

On motion by Councilmember Ogorchock, seconded by Councilmember Torres-Walker, the City Council members present unanimously introduced by title only and waive the further reading of the ordinance rezoning the project site to Planned Development (PD).

In response to Mayor Hernandez-Thorpe, Mr. Price provided a timeline for the project.

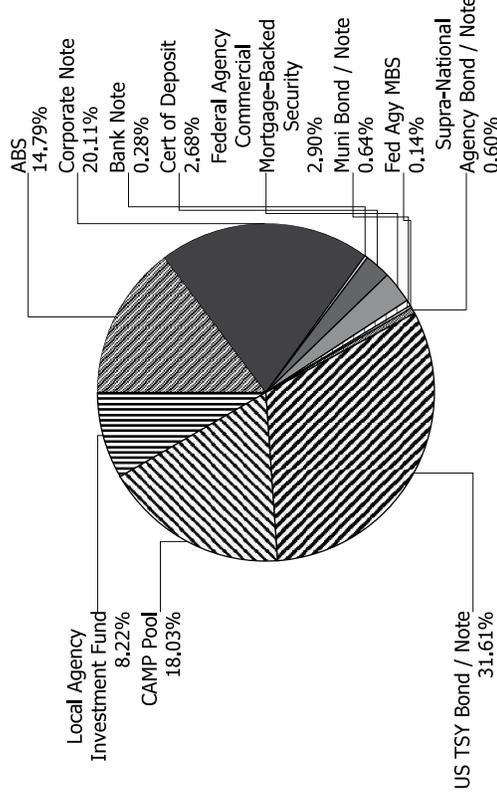

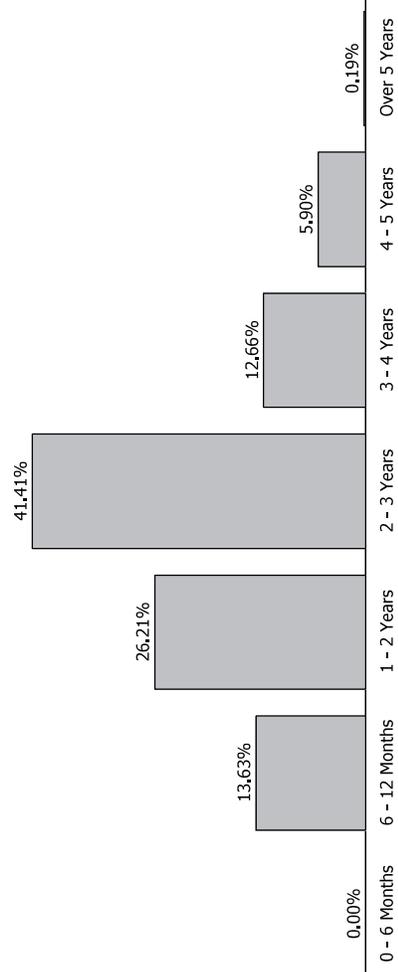

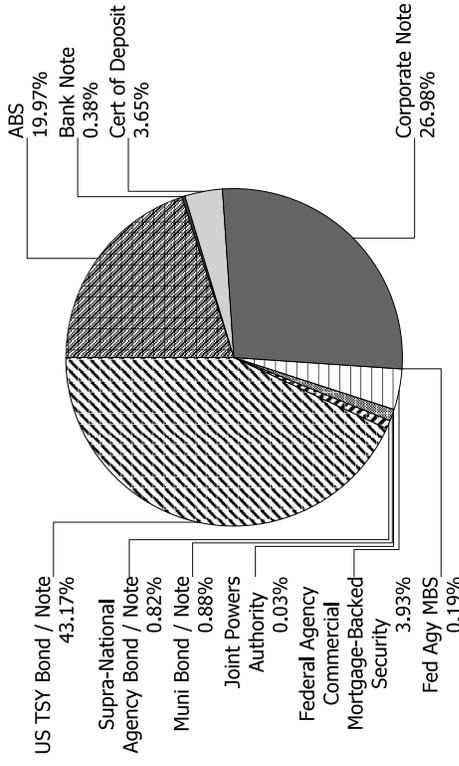

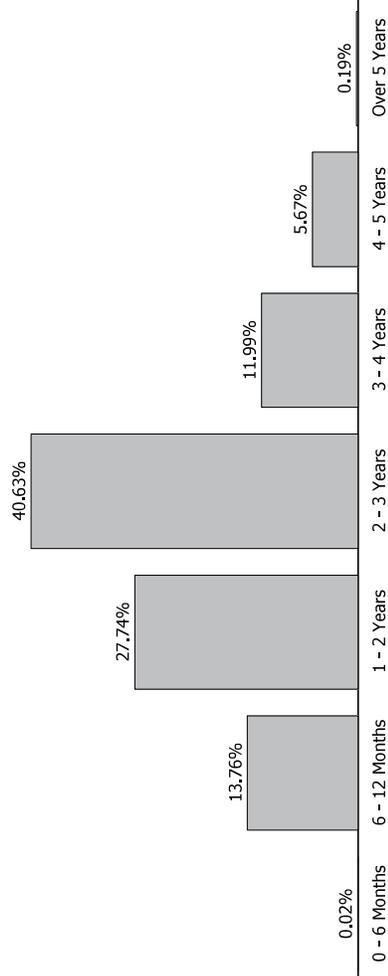

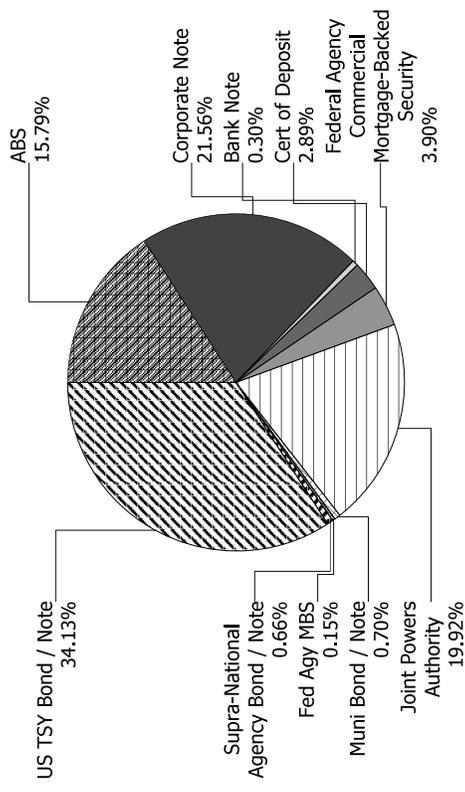

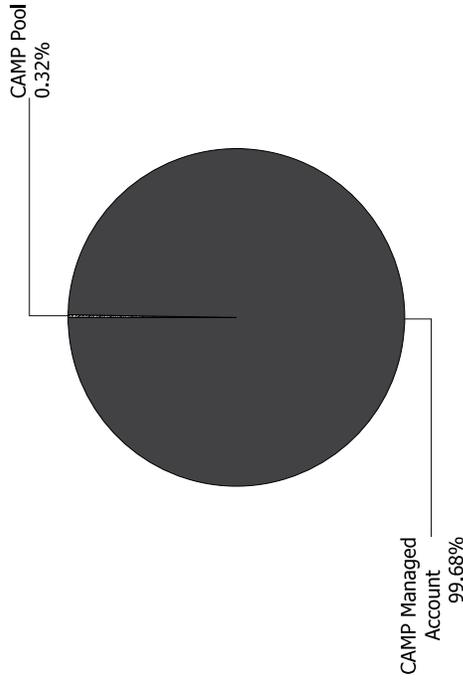

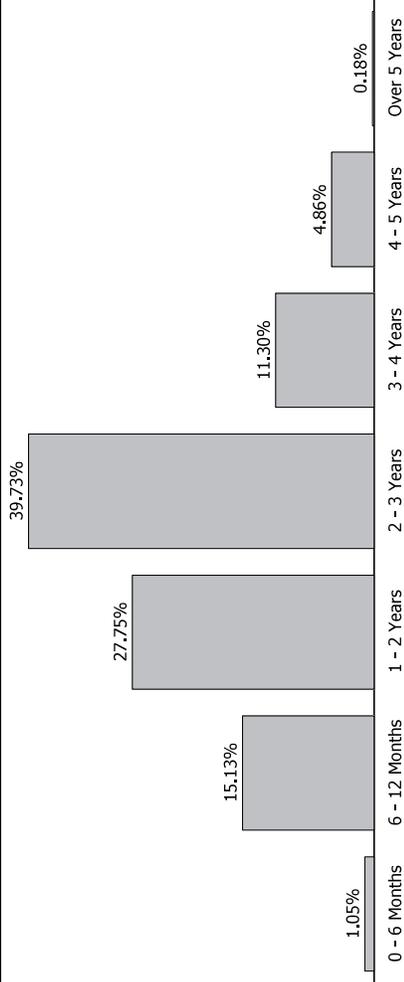

SUBJECT: Adopt the Ordinance of the City Council of the City of Antioch, California, Adding Chapter 4 to Title 4 (Public Safety) of the Antioch Municipal Code Relating to Organizing or Advertising Street Racing, Sideshows, and Reckless Driving Exhibitions

RECOMMENDED ACTION

It is recommended that the City Council adopt the Ordinance adding Chapter 4 to Title 4 (Public Safety) to the Antioch Municipal Code, which prohibits organizing or advertising street racing, sideshows, and reckless driving exhibitions.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is no fiscal impact associated with the recommended action.

DISCUSSION

On November 14, 2023, the City Council considered, as a discussion item, a proposed Ordinance prohibiting spectators at illegal street races, sideshows, or reckless driving exhibitions on or in public highways or offstreet parking facilities within the City. During that discussion, the City Council provided direction that the Council did not want to criminalize the act of being a spectator at an illegal race, instead Council sought to focus on the actions of more culpable individuals, such as individuals who may directly organize or advertise such activities.

On February 27, 2024, the City Council introduced by title only and waived further reading of an Ordinance that would prohibit advertising or organizing various types of illegal street races, sideshows, or reckless driving exhibitions on or in public highways or offstreet parking facilities within the City.

At the March 12, 2024 meeting, the City Council will consider whether to adopt the Ordinance adding Chapter 4 to Title 4 (Public Safety) of the Antioch Municipal Code, which prohibits organizing or advertising street racing, sideshows, and reckless driving exhibitions.

Analysis

The California Vehicle Code (CVC) criminalizes engaging in motor vehicle speed contests, speed exhibitions, and reckless driving, including aiding and abetting these activities. Under state law, violators are guilty of a misdemeanor and face penalties including up to 90 days in jail, a fine of \$1,000, or both, 40 hours of community service, and suspension of a perpetrator's driver's license for three to six months. Increased penalties are imposed on repeat violators or violations resulting in serious bodily injury.

Despite law enforcement efforts to enforce the existing State regulations, the City's streets have been the site of continuing illegal sidschows, speed contests, and exhibitions of speed over several years. These events attract spectators. The presence of spectators encourages street racing to continue, which creates a public nuisance that generates noise, air pollution, an increase in traffic accidents, property crimes and damage, personal injuries, deaths, and calls for law enforcement and emergency medical services. California DMV reported a significant increase in 2021 in the number of reckless driving citations statewide and an 80% increase in excessive speed violations. The California Highway Patrol has reported as of May 2023 that, in the past five years, 264 collisions statewide attributed to street racing and sidschows, resulting in 30 fatalities and 124 serious injuries. Therefore, illegal street racing poses an imminent risk to the health and safety of participants, spectators, and the general public.

The Ordinance attempts to discourage illegal sidschows, street races, and exhibitions of speed within the City, by regulating the organizing or advertising of such activities. The following activities would be specifically prohibited:

- Knowingly organizing a street race, sidschow, reckless driving exhibition, or exhibition of speed conducted within the City on a public street, highway, or in an offstreet parking facility.
- Advertising, within the City, a street race, sidschow, or exhibition of speed conducted or to be conducted in the City on a public street, highway, or in an offstreet parking facility.
- Advertising online, including on social media, a street race, sidschow, or exhibition of speed conducted or to be conducted in the City on a public street, highway, or in an offstreet parking facility.

The Ordinance targets a clear, limited population and gives proper notice to individuals as to which activities are lawful and which activities are unlawful. Advertising illegal activity is not constitutionally protected speech. The Ordinance includes proper exclusions to prevent interference with or inhibition of any lawful exercise of constitutionally protected rights of freedom of press and freedom of speech.

ORDINANCE NO. __

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ANTIOCH, CALIFORNIA, ADDING CHAPTER 4 TO TITLE 4 (PUBLIC SAFETY) OF THE ANTIOCH MUNICIPAL CODE RELATING TO ORGANIZING OR ADVERTISING STREET RACING, SIDESHOWS, AND RECKLESS DRIVING EXHIBITIONS

WHEREAS, motor vehicle speed contests and exhibitions of speed, more commonly referred to as “street races,” and common acts of reckless driving often occur during, or when preparations are being made for, such illegal street races. This includes pre-race events referred to as “sideshows” or motorcycle “stunting” in which groups of people block streets and sidewalks to form sideshow or stunt areas in conjunction with street races;

WHEREAS, street races, sideshows, and motorcycle stunting pose an immediate threat to the health and safety of the public, interfere with pedestrian and vehicular traffic, create a public nuisance, and inhibit private business owners from enjoying the use of their property within the City;

WHEREAS, groups of racers, sideshow participants, stunters, and spectators gather on the streets and in off-street parking facilities and, among other things, block traffic on the streets and sidewalks in order to form a racetrack, sideshow or stunt area, and otherwise encourage, aid, and abet the street racing process;

WHEREAS, illegal street racers accelerate to high speeds, which increases the risk of harm to oncoming traffic, pedestrians, or other vehicles, and the racers drive quickly from street to street, race for several hours, and then move to different locations upon the arrival of law enforcement;

WHEREAS, these activities often result in an increase in traffic accidents, property crimes and damage, personal injuries, deaths, and calls for law enforcement and emergency medical service;

WHEREAS, these illegal street racing activities pose an imminent risk to the health and safety of participants, spectators, and the general public;

WHEREAS, pursuant to California Vehicle Code sections 23103, *et seq.*, and 23109, *et seq.*, motor vehicle speed contests, reckless driving, exhibitions of speed conducted on public streets and highways, and reckless driving conducted on public streets, highways, and off-street parking facilities, as well as aiding and abetting in some of these violations, are already illegal under California law;

WHEREAS, the City’s streets have been the site of continuing illegal sideshows, speed contests, and exhibitions of speed over several years, despite law enforcement efforts to prevent and abate these illegal events through the enforcement of existing traffic laws;

WHEREAS, illegal street racing, sideshows, and motorcycle stunting attract many spectators, and the presence of spectators at these events encourages street racing to continue and creates an environment in which illegal activities can flourish;

WHEREAS, illegal street racing, sideshows, and motorcycle stunting can generate revenue for organizers and advertisers;

WHEREAS, advertising illegal activity is not constitutionally protected speech; and

WHEREAS, the City desires to discourage illegal sideshows, street races, and exhibitions of speed by criminalizing the organizing or advertising of such activities within the City.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ANTIOCH DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. INCORPORATION OF RECITALS. The foregoing recitals are true, correct, and incorporated by reference as if set forth in full herein.

Section 2. PURPOSE. The purpose of this Ordinance is to discourage and prevent street racing, sideshows, reckless driving exhibitions, and related activities by prohibiting persons from organizing or advertising such events, and providing appropriate enforcement measures to protect the public and deter this criminal activity.

Section 3. ADDITION OF CHAPTER 4. Chapter 4 is hereby added to Title 4 (Public Safety) of the Antioch Municipal Code to read as follows:

“Chapter 4”

Street Racing, Sideshows, and Reckless Driving Exhibitions

- 4-4.101 Findings and Purpose**
- 4-4.102 Definitions**
- 4-4.103 Nonexclusive Remedy**
- 4-4.104 Organizing or Advertising Sideshows, Street Races, and Reckless Driving Prohibited**
- 4-4.105 Relevant Circumstances to Prove a Violation**
- 4-4.106 Enforcement**

4-4.101 Purpose and Incorporation of Recitals

- (A) The streets within the City have been the site of continuing illegal sideshows, speed contests, and exhibitions of speed over several years despite law enforcement efforts to prevent and abate these illegal events through the enforcement of existing traffic laws. Illegal motor vehicle sideshows, speed contests and exhibitions of speed are fueled

by the activities of organizers and advertisers and create an environment in which these, as well as other, illegal activities can flourish. Often, such events generate profit for their organizers and advertisers. The intent and purpose of this Chapter is to discourage the organization and advertising of illegal vehicle sideshows, speed contests, and exhibitions of speed in the City. This Chapter targets a clear, limited population and gives proper notice to individuals as to which activities are lawful and which activities are unlawful. The dangers associated with spectating and participating in illegal sideshows, street races, and exhibitions of speed will be discouraged in part by discouraging organization and advertising of such events in the City.

- (B) This Chapter is not intended to interfere with or inhibit any exercise of constitutionally protected rights of freedom of press and freedom of speech such as (but not limited to) peaceful expressions of political or religious opinions, not involving offensive personal conduct. The City Council finds and declares that advertisements for illegal events such as street racing, motor vehicle sideshows, speed contests, and exhibitions of speed are not legally protected speech.
- (C) This Chapter is intended to compliment state laws governing the regulation of speed contests, exhibitions of speed, and sideshows. This Chapter is not intended to preempt state laws governing the regulation of illegal motor vehicle sideshows, speed contests, and exhibitions of speed events.

4-4.102 Definitions

For purposes of this Chapter, unless a word's context clearly requires otherwise, the following definitions apply:

A. "Advertise" means to promote, publish, announce, or declare the occurrence or fact of an event, for the purpose of either: (i) increasing attendance by participants or spectators at such event or future events of a substantially similar nature; or (ii) soliciting payment, funds, contributions, donations, entry fees, or other consideration. Advertising may be done in writing or orally, by sign, card, or notice, whether electronically or via physical media.

B. "Driver" means any person who drives a motor vehicle.

C. "Event" means an illegal motor vehicle speed contest, exhibition of speed, or sideshow, as those terms are defined in the California Vehicle Code.

D. "Exhibition of speed" means any unlawful motor vehicle exhibition of speed as defined by California Vehicle Code Section 23109(c), as may be amended,

whether or not the exhibition of speed is attended by persons other than the drivers performing such unlawful activity.

E. “Motor vehicle” means a vehicle as defined in California Vehicle Code Section 670, as may be amended.

F. “Motor vehicle speed contest” means any unlawful motor vehicle speed contest, as defined by California Vehicle Code Section 23109(a), as may be amended, whether or not the race is attended by persons other than the drivers racing the vehicles on City streets.

G. “Offstreet parking facility” has the same meaning as set forth in subdivision (c) of California Vehicle Code Section 12500, as may be amended, and includes any public or private parking facility open and accessible to members of the public.

H. “Person” includes any natural person and any legal person, including but not limited to a corporation, partnership, or limited liability company.

I. “Preparations for,” or “Organizing,” any sideshow, street race or reckless driving exhibition includes, but is not limited to, any of the following acts done for the purpose of a sideshow, street race or reckless driving exhibition:

1. One (1) or more motor vehicles and persons have arrived at a predetermined location on a public street or highway or in an offstreet parking facility;
2. Two (2) or more persons have gathered on, or adjacent to, a public street or highway;
3. Two (2) or more persons have gathered in an offstreet parking facility;
4. One (1) or more persons have impeded the free use of a public street, highway, or offstreet parking facility by acts, words, or physical barriers;
5. One (1) or more motor vehicles have lined up on a public street, highway, or offstreet parking facility with motors running;
6. One (1) or more drivers is revving a motor vehicle’s engine or causing the motor vehicle’s tires to spin; or
7. A person is standing or sitting in a location to act as a race starter.

J. “Reckless driving exhibition” means any exhibition of reckless driving as defined in Vehicle Code Section 23103, as may be amended.

K. “Sideshow” means an event in which two or more persons block or impede traffic on a highway for the purpose of performing motor vehicle stunts, street racing, or reckless driving for spectators referred to in subdivision (i)(2)(A) of the California Vehicle Code Section 23109, as may be amended.

L. “Street race” or “street racing” means any motor vehicle speed contest or motor vehicle exhibition of speed referred to in subdivisions (a) and (c) of California Vehicle Code Section 23109, as may be amended.

4-4.103 Nonexclusive Remedy

This Chapter is not the exclusive regulation of nor penalty for participation in a motor vehicle speed contest, exhibition of speed, stunting, sideshow, reckless driving exhibition, or similar illegal activity. This Chapter supplements and is in addition to any other regulatory codes, statutes, and ordinances heretofore or hereinafter enacted by the City, the State, or any other legal entity or agency having jurisdiction.

4-4.104 Organizing or Advertising Street Races, Sideshows, and Reckless Driving Exhibitions Prohibited

A. It shall be unlawful for any person to knowingly organize a street race, sideshow, reckless driving exhibition, or exhibition of speed conducted within the City on a public street, highway, or in an offstreet parking facility.

B. It shall be unlawful for any person to advertise, within the City, a street race, sideshow, or exhibition of speed conducted or to be conducted in the City on a public street, highway, or in an offstreet parking facility.

C. It shall be unlawful for any person to advertise online, including on social media, a street race, sideshow, or exhibition of speed conducted or to be conducted in the City on a public street, highway, or in an offstreet parking facility.

D. Exceptions. This Section shall not apply in any of the following instances:

1. Where its application would result in an interference with or inhibition of any lawful exercise of constitutionally protected rights of freedom of press and freedom of speech. Speech promoting or encouraging imminent lawless conduct is not protected speech.
2. Nothing in this section prohibits law enforcement officers or their agents from sharing information about known or suspected events in which an illegal street race, sideshow, reckless driving exhibition, and/or exhibition of speed occurred, may occur, or may be occurring.
3. Geographic proximity to a street race, sideshow, reckless driving exhibition, or exhibition of speed alone is insufficient evidence to meet the criteria to be found guilty of organizing.

4-4.105 Relevant Circumstances to Prove a Violation

A. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, factors to consider in determining if a violation of this Chapter has occurred may include, but are not limited to, any of the following:

1. The person charged has previously participated in, advertised, organized, promoted, or facilitated a street race, sideshow, exhibition of speed, or reckless driving exhibition;
2. The person charged has previously aided and abetted street racing, sideshows, exhibitions of speed, or reckless driving exhibitions;
3. To the fullest extent permissible by law, evidence of prior act(s) may be considered to show the plan, opportunity, intent, knowledge, identity, and/or propensity of the person charged to organize or advertise a street race, sideshow, or a reckless driving exhibition if the prior act(s) occurred within three (3) years of the presently charged offense.

B. In addition to the circumstances set out in subsection (A), above, and notwithstanding any other provision of law, to prove a violation of this Chapter, admissible evidence may also include, but is not limited to, any of the following:

1. The nature and description of the scene, including the number and configuration of traffic lanes;
2. The number of people at the scene;
3. The number and descriptions of motor vehicles at the scene.

C. For purposes of subsection (B), above, "Scene" refers to the location of a sideshow, street race, reckless driving exhibition, or exhibition of speed, or the location of preparations for such an event.

4-4.106 Enforcement

Any person who violates this chapter is guilty of a misdemeanor subject to a maximum of six (6) months in jail, a fine of \$1,000, or both, unless at the discretion of the district attorney or a court of competent jurisdiction, the violation is reduced to an infraction. The City may seek compliance with this chapter by any remedy allowed under this Code and any other remedy allowed by law, including but not limited to the administrative citation procedures set forth in Antioch Municipal Code § 1-5. The amount of the administrative fine is \$1,000 for each violation."

Section 4. CEQA COMPLIANCE. The City Council finds that the adoption and implementation of this ordinance is exempt from the provisions of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) under CEQA Guidelines section 15061(b)(3) because it can be seen with certainty that there is no possibility that the

Ordinance may have a significant effect on the environment, under CEQA Guidelines section 15064(e), which exempts purely economic regulations, and under Public Resources Code Section 21080(b)(4) regarding actions to mitigate or prevent an emergency.

Section 5. SEVERABILITY. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, or phrase of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance. The City Council hereby declares that it would have passed this Ordinance, and each and every section, subsection, sentence, clause, or phrase not declared invalid or unconstitutional without regard to whether any portion of the Ordinance would be subsequently declared invalid or unconstitutional.

Section 6. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Ordinance shall become effective thirty (30) days after its adoption by the City Council.

Section 7. CERTIFICATION. The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this Ordinance and shall cause the same to be published or posted as prescribed by law.

SUBJECT: Extension of Vesting Tentative Subdivision Map 9501 & Design Review Approvals for Creekside Vineyards at Sand Creek (GP-19-06, PD-19-02)

RECOMMENDED ACTION

It is recommended that the City Council adopt a resolution approving a two-year extension of the Vesting Tentative Subdivision Map (VTSM 9501) and design review approvals for the Creekside Vineyards at Sand Creek project.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is no direct fiscal impact because of this action.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW

An Environmental Impact Report (EIR) was adopted and certified on March 23, 2021.

DISCUSSION

On March 23, 2021, the City Council approved the project known as the Creekside Vineyards at Sand Creek project. The project includes the development of a 220-unit residential community and associated improvements on approximately 58.9 acres of the 158.2-acre project site, as well as 1.8-acres of off-site improvements. The project site is located south of the future extension of Sand Creek Road in the southeastern portion of the city (APN: 057-050-024). The approved VTSM 9501 subdivides the project site into 220 single-family residential lots, as well as parcels for associated improvements as well as open space.

The City Council adopted Resolution 2021/52, which approved VTSM 9501, Design Review, and Resource Management Plan for Creekside Vineyards at Sand Creek. Specific entitlement approvals include an Environmental Impact Report, General Plan Amendment, Master Development Plan/Rezone, Vesting Tentative Subdivision Map, Design Review, and Resource Management Plan.

Previous Extension

The applicant requested an extension of the original project approvals in September 2022.

The Conditions of Approval in Resolution 2021/52 include General Condition A 1 for project expiration:

This approval expires two years from the date of approval by the City Council (March 23, 2023), unless a building permit has been issued and construction has diligently commenced thereon and has not expired, or an extension has been approved by the Zoning Administrator. Requests for extensions must be received in writing with the appropriate fees prior to the expiration of this approval. No more than one one-year extension shall be granted.

Chapter 4 "Subdivisions" and Article 3 "Tentative Maps" of the Antioch Municipal Code (AMC) includes expiration and extension policies for approved tentative maps. This provision also requires the recommendation of the Planning Commission to the City Council for the extension approval of one additional year.

9-4.314 EXPIRATION AND EXTENSION.

An approved or conditionally approved tentative map shall expire 24 months after its approval or conditional approval. Upon an application of the subdivider filed prior to the expiration of the tentative map, and following the recommendation of the Commission, the time at which the map expires may be extended by the Council for a period of one additional year.

VTSM 9501 was approved on March 23, 2021, and was set to expire March 23, 2023. The applicant requested an extension of the map pursuant to AMC 9-4.314. The City Council granted this request on December 13, 2022. The current expiration date for the VTSM is March 23, 2024.

Second Extension

On January 22, 2024, the City received a second request for an extension of the VTSM 9501 and design review approvals due to the delays in obtaining permits for the United States Army Corps of Engineers and the California Department of Fish and Wildlife. The applicant is now requesting a two-year extension to ensure that all permitting is completed within the extension timeframe.

While the AMC allows for one, one-year extension, the Subdivision Map Act, which governs subdivisions throughout the State of California, provides that a city may extend a tentative map for an additional amount of time not to exceed six years (Gov. Code § 66542.6(e).) This maximum six-year extension is in addition to the AMC's extension.

As outlined in the applicant's request, the applicant is working through permitting with Federal and State agencies. There are no changes to the proposed project that would warrant changes to the conditions of approval. California continues to face a housing shortage and this project furthers the production of housing within the City of Antioch. Staff recommends approving the extension to allow the applicant time to secure all necessary permits.

The Planning Commission voted 5-0, with one member absent, to adopt the resolution recommending the City Council approve the extension.

If approved, the new expiration date will be March 23, 2026. The previously approved Conditions of Approval will be carried forward without any change and as originally approved by the City Council in March 2021.

RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ANTIOCH APPROVING THE TWO-YEAR EXTENSION OF THE VESTING TENTATIVE SUBDIVISION MAP AND DESIGN REVIEW APPROVALS OF THE CREEKSIDE VINEYARDS AT SAND CREEK PROJECT (GP-19-06, PD-19-02)

WHEREAS, the City of Antioch (“City”) received an application from GBN Partners, LLC (“Applicant”) and approved a General Plan Amendment; Master Development Plan/Rezone; Vesting Tentative Subdivision Map; Design Review; and Resource Management Plan for the development of a 220-unit residential community and associated improvements on approximately 58.9 acres of the 158.2-acre project site, as well as 1.8-acres of off-site improvements, which is known as the Creekside/Vineyards at Sand Creek Project (“Project”) (GP-19-06, PD-19-02);

WHEREAS, the project site consists of a 158.2-acre parcel located south of the future extension of Sand Creek Road in the southeastern portion of the City of Antioch, California;

WHEREAS, the project site is bordered by the City of Antioch/Contra Costa County line to the south and the City of Antioch/City of Brentwood limit to the east and is identified by Assessor’s Parcel Number (APN) 057-050-024. Sand Creek is located to the north of the site, and State Route (SR) 4 is located approximately 0.38-mile east of the site. The project site is situated within the Sand Creek Focus Area of the General Plan;

WHEREAS, a Final Environmental Impact Report and Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program was prepared in accordance with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) Guidelines Section 15162, and approved by the City Council on March 23, 2021, based on findings of fact and adopting a Statement of Overriding Considerations and Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program;

WHEREAS, the Vesting Tentative Subdivision Map, Design Review, and Resource Management Plan were approved by the City Council on March 23, 2021;

WHEREAS, the applicant received approval of Design Guidelines for the Project establishing guidelines for future development within the Creekside/Vineyards at Sand Creek Project on March 23, 2021;

WHEREAS, the applicant received approval of a Resource Management Plan for the Project as called for in Section 10.3.2.(e) of the Antioch General Plan and consistent with the “Framework for a Resource Management Plan for the Sand Creek Focus Area” contained in General Plan Appendix A. RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ANTIOCH
APPROVING OF THE VESTING TENTATIVE SUBDIVISION MAP, DESIGN REVIEW,
AND RESOURCE MANAGEMENT PLAN FOR THE CREEKSIDE/VINEYARDS AT
SAND CREEK PROJECT

WHEREAS, the City of Antioch ("City") received an application from GBN Partners, LLC ("Applicant") seeking City approval of the following: a General Plan Amendment; Master Development Plan/Rezone; Vesting Tentative Subdivision Map; Design Review; and Resource Management Plan for the development of a 220-unit residential community and associated improvements on approximately 58.9 acres of the 158.2-acre project site, as well as 1.8-acres of off-site improvements, which is known as the Creekside/Vineyards at Sand Creek Project ("Project") (GP-19-06, PD-19-02);

WHEREAS, the project site consists of a 158.2-acre parcel located south of the future extension of Sand Creek Road in the southeastern portion of the City of Antioch, California;

WHEREAS, the project site is bordered by the City of Antioch/Contra Costa County line to the south and the City of Antioch/City of Brentwood limit to the east and is identified by Assessor's Parcel Number (APN) 057-050-024. Sand Creek is located to the north of the site, and State Route (SR) 4 is located approximately 0.38-mile east of the site. The project site is situated within the Sand Creek Focus Area of the General Plan;

WHEREAS, a Final Environmental Impact Report and Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program was prepared in accordance with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) Guidelines Section 15162, and considered by the Planning Commission on February 17, 2021;

WHEREAS, the proposed Vesting Tentative Subdivision Map, Design Review, and Resource Management Plan were considered by the Planning Commission on February 17, 2021, and the Planning Commission recommended approval to the City Council;

WHEREAS, on March 23, 2021, the City Council certified the Final Environmental Impact Report, based on findings of fact and adopting a Statement of Overriding Considerations and Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program;

WHEREAS, the applicant has prepared Design Guidelines for the Project in order to customize the City of Antioch's Residential Design Guidelines specifically for the Project and to establish guidelines for future development within the Creekside/Vineyards at Sand Creek Project;

WHEREAS, the applicant has prepared a Resource Management Plan for the Project as called for in Section 10.3.2.(e) of the Antioch General Plan and consistent with the "Framework for a Resource Management Plan for the Sand Creek Focus Area" contained in General Plan Appendix A. The Resource Management Plan incorporates the biological resources mitigation measures identified in the Final Environmental Impact Report; and

WHEREAS, the City Council duly gave notice of public hearing as required by law and on March 23, 2021, held a public hearing on the matter, and received and considered evidence, both oral and documentary.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council does hereby make the following findings for approval of a Vesting Tentative Subdivision Map:

1. That the subdivision, design and improvements are consistent with the General Plan, as required by Section 66473.5 of the Subdivision Map Act and the City's Subdivision Regulations. The site has a General Plan Designation of Medium Low Density Residential and is zoned Planned Development and the subdivision will accommodate uses that are consistent with the General Plan on each of the lots created by the subdivision;
2. That the subdivision proposed by the Vesting Tentative Map complies with the rules, regulations, standards and criteria of the City's Subdivision Regulations. The proposed subdivision meets the City's criteria for the map. The City's Planning and Engineering staff have reviewed the Vesting Tentative Map and evaluated the effects of the subdivision proposed and have determined that the Vesting Tentative Map as conditioned complies with and conforms to all the applicable rules, regulations, standards, and criteria of the City's Subdivision Regulations; and
3. The Conditions of approval protect the public safety, health and general welfare of the users of the project and surrounding area. In addition, the conditions ensure the project is consistent with City standards.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council does hereby approve the Vesting Tentative Subdivision Map (Exhibit A), Phasing Map (Exhibit B), Design Guidelines (Exhibit C), and Resource Management Plan (Exhibit D), subject to the following conditions of approval:

A. GENERAL CONDITIONS

1. The development shall comply with the City of Antioch Municipal Code, unless a specific exception is granted thereto, or is otherwise modified in these conditions.
2. Concurrent with the first submittal of grading or improvement plans, the applicant shall submit a site plan exhibit showing the site plan as modified by conditions and approvals.
3. This approval expires two years from the date of approval by the City Council (March 23, 2023), unless a building permit has been issued and construction has diligently commenced thereon and has not expired, or an extension has been approved by the Zoning Administrator. Requests for extensions must be received in writing with the appropriate fees prior to the expiration of this approval. No more than one one-year extension shall be granted.
4. The applicant shall defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the City in any action brought challenging any land use approval or environmental review for the Project. In addition, applicant shall pay any and all costs associated with any challenge to the land use approval or environmental review for the Project, including, without limitation, the costs associated with any election challenging the Project.
5. A final and unchallenged approval of this project supersedes previous approvals that have been granted for this site.
6. Permits or approvals, whether discretionary or ministerial, will not be considered if the applicant is not current on fees, reimbursement and/or other payments that are due the City.
7. All advertising signs shall be consistent with the Sign Ordinance or as approved by the Community Development Director.
8. All required easements or rights-of-way for improvements shall be obtained by the applicant at no cost to the City of Antioch. Advance permission shall be obtained from any property or, if required from easement holders, for any work done within such property or easements.
9. All easements of record that are no longer required and affect individual lots or parcels within this project shall be removed prior to or concurrently with the recordation of the final map or subsequent separate document as approved by City Engineer.

B. VESTING TENTATIVE MAP CONDITIONS

1. The Vesting Tentative Map approval is subject to the timelines established in the State of California Subdivision Map Act.
2. Approval is based upon substantial conformance with the Vesting Tentative Map dated December 13, 2019.
3. Approval of this Vesting Tentative map shall not constitute the approval of any improvements shown on the Vesting Tentative map and shall not be construed as a guarantee of future extension or re-approvals of this or similar maps, nor is it an indication of future availability of water or sewer facilities or permission to develop beyond the capacities of these facilities.

C. DISTRICTS AND ANNEXATION

1. Prior to filing of a final map for recording, the applicant shall annex into CFD 2018-02 (Police Protection).
2. The property shall annex into CFD 2018-01 (Public Services) and accept a level of annual assessments enough to maintain public facilities in the vicinity of the project area at no cost to the City. The annual assessment shall cover the actual annual cost of maintenance as described in the Engineer's Report.
3. The applicant shall agree to participate and/or assist in the formation of a Community Facilities District (CFD) to fund the incremental cost of fire protection and ambulance service delivery. The developer shall contact the Office of the Fire Chief for specific details on the CFD.

D. HOMEOWNERS ASSOCIATION AND CC&RS

1. The applicant shall establish a Homeowners Association (HOA) for this project in conformance with the regulations set forth by the California Department of Real Estate. The HOA shall be responsible for maintaining:
 - All front yard landscaping.
 - All HOA owned parcels unless maintained by another HOA (Parcels 'A', 'B', 'C', 'D', 'E', 'F', 'G', 'H', 'I', 'J', 'K', 'L', 'M', 'N', 'O' and 'P').
 - Storm drain facilities (pipes, structures and Parcel 'D' basin)
 - Streets labelled 'A', 'B', 'C', 'D', 'E', 'F', 'G' and 'H'.

- The City shall be reimbursed for maintenance of landscape, roadway (including striping and signing), concrete (including sidewalk, curb, gutter and curb ramps), storm drain facilities, street lighting, and all other HOA facilities and amenities not maintained by the HOA to an acceptable City level.
2. Subject to approval by the state, the Codes, Covenants and Restrictions (CC&Rs) for the subdivision shall include a provision indicating that the City of Antioch is named as a third-party beneficiary with the right, but not the obligation, to enforce the provisions of the CC&Rs relating to the maintenance and repair of the property and improvements, including but not limited to landscaping, streets, curbs, gutters, street lights, parking, open space, storm water facilities and the prohibition of nuisances. The City shall have the same rights and remedies as the Association, Manager or Owners are afforded under the CC&Rs, including but not limited to rights of entry. This right of enforcement is in addition to all other legal and equitable remedies available to the City, including the right to refuse to issue building permits for any building or structure that is not in compliance with applicable federal, state or local laws, regulations, permits or approvals. Neither action nor inaction by the City shall constitute a waiver or relinquishment of any rights or remedies. In addition, the CC&Rs shall include a provision that any design approvals required by the CC&RS for construction, reconstruction and remodeling are in addition to any approvals needed from the City as well. Further, the CC&Rs cannot be terminated or amended materially without the prior written consent of the Community Development Director and the City Attorney of the City of Antioch. Material changes are those that would change the fundamental purpose of the development including but not limited to:
- City approvals of uses or external modifications.
 - Property ownership or maintenance obligations including, but not limited to, common areas, storm water and landscaping.

The CC&Rs for this project shall be reviewed and approved by the City Attorney and the Community Development Director prior to the issuance of the first building permit.

3. The property shall annex into or establish and participate in a Lighting and Landscape District (LLD) and accept a level of annual assessments enough to maintain:
- a. The streetlights along frontage of public streets.
 - b. Landscaping along frontage of public streets.

E. CONSTRUCTION CONDITIONS

1. The use of construction equipment shall be as outlined in the Antioch Municipal Code and is restricted to weekdays between the hours 8:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M., or as approved in writing by the City Manager. Requests for alternative days/time may be submitted in writing to the City Engineer for consideration.
2. The project shall be in compliance with and supply all the necessary documentation for Antioch Municipal Code § 6-3.2: Construction and Demolition Debris Recycling.
3. Standard dust control methods and designs shall be used to stabilize the dust generated by construction activities. The applicant shall post dust control signage with a contact number of the applicant, City staff, and the air quality control board.
4. The site shall be kept clean of all debris (boxes, junk, garbage, etc.) at all times.

F. SITE AND PROJECT DESIGN

1. Provisions for mail delivery and locations of mailbox facilities shall be reviewed by the USPS and approved by the City Engineer prior to the approval of the final map.
2. All proposed improvements shall be constructed to City standards or as approved by the City Engineer.
3. All public streets shall intersect at approximately 90 degrees and meet the requirements of Caltrans Highway Design Manual for Intersection Design Standards (Topic 405), as approved by the City Engineer.
4. All driveways shall be perpendicular or radial to the street centerline, or as approved by the City Engineer.
5. Maximum driveway slope shall be 12% or as approved by the City Engineer.
6. All driveways shall be a minimum of five feet (5') from the curb return.
7. All public road right-of-way shall be located ten feet (10') behind the face-of-curb.
8. Curb ramps shall meet the latest version of Caltrans ramps.

9. Monolithic sidewalks with beveled curb shall be six inches (6") thick and reinforced as approved by the City Engineer. Sidewalks at driveway approaches shall be ADA complaint. Minimum sidewalks widths shall be as follows:
 - Adjacent to beveled curb, 4 feet excluding curb (bevel curb to be 12" deep by 3" high with ½" lip and 18" gutter).
 - Adjacent to vertical curb, 4.5 feet excluding curb.
10. Sight distance triangles shall be maintained per Antioch Municipal Code § 9-5.1101 Site Obstructions at Intersections, or as approved by the City Engineer.
11. A minimum of twenty feet (20') tangent shall extend beyond the return at intersections at public streets, or as approved by the City Engineer.
12. All lot sidelines shall be perpendicular or radial to the fronting street centerline at public streets for a distance of 20 feet, or as approved by the City Engineer.
13. Rear and side yard fencing shall be provided for all units. All fences shall be located at the top of slope, or as approved by the City Engineer.
14. In cases where a fence is to be built in conjunction with a retaining wall, and the wall face is exposed to a side street, the fence shall be setback a minimum of three feet (3') behind the retaining wall per Antioch Municipal Code § 9-5.1603, or as approved by the City Engineer.
15. The proposed street names listed below shall be approved by Planning Commission prior to recordation of the first final map. Changes to street names shall require Planning Commission review and approval.
 - Hillcrest Avenue (Existing).
 - Streets 'A', 'B', 'C', 'D', 'E', 'F', 'G' 'H' and 'I'.
 - Court 'A'.
16. The applicant shall provide a "checklist" of universal design accessibility features to home buyers as required by Health and Safety Code § 17959.6.
17. All improvements for each lot (water meters, sewer cleanouts, etc.) shall be contained outside of the driveway and within the lot and the projection of its sidelines, or as approved by the City Engineer.

18. One (1) on-street parking space per lot shall be located within close proximity to the unit served, as shown on the vesting tentative map dated December 13, 2019, or as approved by the City Engineer.
19. Cul-de-sac parking shall be provided as required by the City Engineer.
20. All fencing adjacent to open space (trails and basins) shall be wrought iron or other material as approved by the City Engineer. All fences shall be located at the top of slope, or as approved by the City Engineer
21. All two-car garages shall be a minimum of twenty feet by twenty feet (20' x 20') clear inside dimensions or as approved by the Community Development Director.
22. The applicant and then the HOA, once the CC&Rs are operative, shall maintain all undeveloped areas within this subdivision in an attractive manner, which shall also ensure fire safety.

G. UTILITIES

1. Public utilities shall be constructed to their ultimate size and configuration with the road construction in which they are to be located.
2. All existing and proposed utilities shall be undergrounded (e.g. transformers and PMH boxes) and subsurface in accordance with the Antioch Municipal Code, except the existing PG&E towers or as approved by the City Engineer.
3. All sewage shall flow by gravity to the intersecting street sewer main.
4. Sewer main system shall be designed to drain northerly on Hilcrest Avenue and connect to the existing or proposed future 15" sanitary sewer main at Heidorn Ranch Road through 'B' Street or as approved by the City Engineer.
5. Sewer system for interior private streets shall all be 8" unless approved by City Engineer otherwise.
6. All public utilities, including storm drain pipes and ditches, shall be installed in streets avoiding between lot locations. All proposed drainage facilities, including open ditches, be constructed of Portland Concrete Cement or as approved by the City Engineer.

7. Prior to the recordation of the first final map, the applicant shall submit hydrology and hydraulic analyses with a storm water control plan to Contra Costa County Flood Control District and the City of Antioch for review and approval and pay all related drainage fees at no cost to the City as directed by the City Engineer.
8. The main storm drain system shall flow generally in a northeasterly direction into a detention basin system and eventually flow into Sand Creek through a proposed 60" storm drain outfall subject to the approval of the Contra Costa County Flood Control District and the City of Antioch.
9. The secondary storm drain system along Hillcrest Avenue shall flow generally in a northerly direction into a 48" storm drain and proposed clean water outfall system and eventually flow into Sand Creek subject to the approval of the Contra Costa County Flood Control District and the City of Antioch.
10. The detention basin and associated improvements shall be constructed prior to issuance of first building permit for residential structures.
11. The applicant shall provide adequate water pressure and volume to serve this development. This will include a minimum residual pressure of 20 psi with all losses included at the highest point of water service and a minimum static pressure of 50 psi or as approved by the City Engineer. See Fire Requirements for additional water flow conditions.
12. Water systems shall be designed as a looped distribution system, if not already connecting as a looped system, developer shall be responsible for installing any water mains to create a looped system at no cost to the City.
13. No utility system lines and crossings shall run in between two lots.
14. The houses shall contain rain gutters and downspouts that direct water away from the foundation as approved by the City Engineer.
15. Prior to acceptance of public utilities, the developer shall provide GPS coordinates of all in and above ground assets. This includes all Water Distribution Utility features, Collection Utility features, Storm Water Utility features, and inverts associated with these features. Developer is to also include GPS coordinates of metal subdivision entryway signs, street signs, light poles, and irrigation controllers. These GPS coordinates must be taken on a survey-grade sub-meter GPS data receiver/collector and provided in GIS shapefile format using the North American 1983 Coordinate System.

H. LANDSCAPING

1. Landscaping on all slopes, medians, C.3 basins and open space areas shall be approved by the City Engineer and shall be installed, at no cost to the City.
2. The type and location of trees shall be as outlined in the project's Design Guidelines (Exhibit C).
3. Prior to issuance of residential building permits, developer shall submit typical front yard landscape plan(s) to demonstrate compliance with water conserving landscape requirements. Developer shall submit a landscape plan for each residential lot that City shall review for compliance with typical landscape plan(s) and approve prior to issuance of building permit.
4. Based on drought conditions, the City Engineer has the authority to delay some or all of the landscape Conditions of Approval.

I. FIRE REQUIREMENTS

1. The applicant shall comply with the following conditions provided by the Contra Costa County Fire Protection District:
 - a. Fire access roadways of less than 28-feet unobstructed width shall have NO PARKING – FIRE LANE signs posted, or curbs painted red with the words NO PARKING – FIRE LANE clearly marked, per 22500.1 CVC unless approved by the Fire Department and the City Engineer.
 - b. The cul-de-sacs or turnarounds shall have an outside turning radius of a minimum of a 45' or as approved by the City Engineer. Should the sidewalk be included in the turning radius, it shall be clear of streetlights, fire hydrants and other obstructions.
 - c. The applicant shall provide an adequate reliable water supply for fire protection with a minimum fire flow of 1750 GPM. Required flow shall be delivered from not more than one hydrant flowing simultaneously for the duration of 120 minutes while maintaining 20-pounds residual pressure in the main. (508.1), (B105) CFC
 - d. The applicant shall provide hydrants of the East Bay type, which shall be maintained by the City. Approximate hydrant locations will be determined by the Fire District and approved by the City Engineer.

- e. Emergency apparatus access roadways and hydrants shall be installed, in service, and inspected by the Fire District prior to construction or combustible storage on site. (501.4) CFC. Gravel roads are not considered all-weather roadways for emergency apparatus access. The first lift of asphalt concrete paving shall be installed as the minimum subbase materials and capable of supporting the designated gross vehicle weight specified above.
- f. Premises identification shall be provided. Such numbers shall contrast with their background and be a minimum of four inches high with ½-inch stroke or larger as required to be readily visible from the street. (505.1) CFC, (501.2) CBC
- g. Plan review and inspection fees shall be submitted at the time of plan review submittal. Checks may be made payable to Contra Costa County Fire Protection District (CCCFFPD).
- h. All proposed homes shall be protected with an approved automatic fire sprinkler system complying with the 2013 edition of NFPA 13D or Section R313.3 of the 2013 California Residential Code. Submit a minimum of two (2) sets of plans for each model home to this office for review and approval prior to installation. (903.2) CFC, (R313.3) CFC.
- i. The developer shall submit a computer-aided design (CAD) digital file copy of the site plan to the Fire District upon final approval of the site improvements plans or subdivision map. CAD file shall be saved in the latest AutoCAD.DXF file format. (501) CFC
- j. Submit plans to: Contra Costa County Fire Protection District, 2010 Geary Road, Pleasant Hill, CA 94523.
- k. A Community Facilities District (CFD) for fire protection is required for the Fire District to support this project. The developer shall contact the Office of the Fire Chief for specific details on the CFD.

J. FEES

- 1. The applicant shall pay all City fees which have been established by the City Council and as required by the Antioch Municipal Code.
- 2. The applicant shall pay all pass-through fees. Fees include but are not limited to:

- a. East Contra Costa Regional Fee and Financing Authority (ECCRFFA) Fee in effect at the time of building permit issuance.
- b. Contra Costa County Fire Protection District Fire Development Fee in place at the time of building permit issuance.
- c. Contra Costa County Map Maintenance Fee in affect at the time of recordation of the final map(s).
- d. Contra Costa County Flood Control District Drainage Area fee.
- e. School Impact Fees.
- f. Delta Diablo Sanitation Sewer Fees.
- g. Contra Costa Water District Fees.

K. MODEL HOMES

1. If developer requests model homes or sales trailer, prior to the placement of any sales trailers, plans shall be submitted to the Engineering Department for review and approval. Any trailer shall be placed out of the public right-of-way and shall have its own parking lot.
2. The model home complex parking lot location and design shall be subject to the City Engineer's approval.
3. The model home landscaping shall be drought tolerant, with total area of spray irrigation for the complex not to exceed 50 percent of the landscaping area.

L. GRADING

1. Prior to the approval of the grading plan(s), the City Engineer shall determine if it is necessary to engage soils and structural engineers, as well as any other professionals, deemed necessary to review and verify the adequacy of the building plans submitted for this project. If deemed necessary by the City Engineer, this condition may include field inspections by such professionals to verify implementation of the plans. Costs for these services shall be borne by the applicant.
2. The grading operation shall take place at a time, and in a manner, so as not to allow erosion and sedimentation. The slopes shall be landscaped and reseeded as soon as possible after the grading operation ceases. Erosion measures shall be implemented during all construction phases in accordance with an approved erosion and sedimentation control plan.
3. A grading permit shall be pulled prior to any grading operations.
4. All lots and slopes shall drain to approved drainage facilities as approved by the City Engineer.

5. All grading shall be accomplished in a manner that precludes surface water drainage across any property line.
6. All lots shall be graded to drain positively from the rear to the street or as approved by the City Engineer.
7. The swales adjacent to the house structure shall have a minimum of a two percent (2%) slope or as directed by the City Engineer.
8. All off-site grading is subject to the coordination and approval of the affected property owners and the City Engineer. The applicant shall submit written authorization to "access, enter, or grade" adjacent properties prior to performing any work.
9. Any sale of a portion (or portions) of this project to multiple developers shall include the necessary agreement and/or grading easements to assure that project-wide grading conforms to the approved map and conditions of this resolution.
10. The grading plan for this development shall be approved by the City Engineer.
11. All elevations shown on the plans shall be on NAVD 88 as approved by the City Engineer.
12. Retaining or sound walls shall not be constructed in City right-of-way or other City maintained parcels unless approved by the City Engineer.
13. All retaining and sound walls shall be of masonry construction.
14. All retaining walls shall be reduced in height to the maximum extent practicable and the walls shall meet the height requirements in the front yard setback and sight distance triangles as required by the City Engineer.
15. The back-to-back or side-to-side grading transitions from lot-to-lot shall have a maximum slope of 2:1 and shall be accommodated entirely on the lower lot or as approved by the City Engineer.
16. The minimum concrete gutter flow slope shall be 0.75%.
17. All property lines shall be located at the top of slope.

M. CONSERVATION/NPDES

1. Water conservation measures, including low volume toilets, flow restrictors in showers and the use of drought tolerant landscaping, shall be used.
2. The project shall comply with all Federal, State, and City regulations for the National Pollution Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) (AMC§6-9). (Note: Per State Regulations, NPDES Requirements are those in affect at the time of the Final Discretionary Approval.) Under NPDES regulations, the project is subject to provision C.3: New development and redevelopment regulations for storm water treatment. Provision C.3 requires that the project include storm water treatment and source control measures, as well run-off flow controls, so that post-project runoff does not exceed estimated pre-project runoff. C.3 regulations require the submittal of a Storm Water Control Plan (SWCP) that demonstrates how compliance will be achieved. The SWCP shall be submitted simultaneously with the project plans. For the treatment and flow-controls identified in the approved SWCP, a separate Operation and Maintenance Plan (O&M) shall be submitted and approved before the Building Department will issue Certificate of Occupancy permits. Both the approved SWCP and O&M plans shall be included in the project CC&Rs. Prior to building permit final and issuance of a Certificate of Occupancy, the applicant shall execute any agreements identified in the Storm Water Control Plan that pertain to the transfer of ownership and/or long-term maintenance of storm water treatment or hydrograph modification BMPs. Already stated in COAs below, 5.c and 5.h.w.
3. Additional information regarding the project SWCP is necessary and modifications to the SWCP shown on the proposed Vesting Tentative Map may be required in order to comply with C.3 regulations.
4. The following requirements of the federally mandated NPDES program (National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System) shall be complied with as appropriate, or as required by the City Engineer:
 - a. Prior to issuance of permits for building, site improvements, or landscaping, the applicant shall submit a permit application consistent with the applicant's approved Storm Water Control Plan, and include drawings and specifications necessary for construction of site design features, measures to limit directly connected impervious area, pervious pavements, self-retaining areas, treatment BMPs, permanent source control BMPs, and other features that control storm water flow and potential storm water pollutants.

- b. The Storm Water Control Plan shall be certified by a registered civil engineer, and by a registered architect or landscape architect as applicable. Professionals certifying the Storm Water Control Plan shall be registered in the State of California and submit verification of training, on design of treatment measures for water quality, not more than three years prior to the signature date by an organization with storm water treatment measure design expertise (e.g., a university, American Society of Civil Engineers, American Society of Landscape Architects, American Public Works Association, or the California Water Environment Association), and verify understanding of groundwater protection principles applicable to the project site (see Provision C.3.i of Regional Water Quality Control Board Order R2 2003 0022).
- c. Prior to building permit final and issuance of a Certificate of Occupancy, the applicant shall submit, for review and approval by the City, a final Storm Water BMP Operation and Maintenance Plan in accordance with City of Antioch guidelines. This O&M plan shall incorporate City comments on the draft O&M plan and any revisions resulting from changes made during construction. The O&M plan shall be incorporated into the CC&Rs for the Project.
- d. Prior to building permit final and issuance of a Certificate of Occupancy, the applicant shall execute and record any agreements identified in the Storm Water Control Plan which pertain to the transfer of ownership and/or long-term maintenance of storm water treatment or hydrograph modification BMPs.
- e. Prevent site drainage from draining across sidewalks and driveways in a concentrated manner.
- f. Collect and convey all storm water entering, and/or originating from, the site to an adequate downstream drainage facility without diversion of the watershed. Submit hydrologic and hydraulic calculations with the Improvement Plans to Engineering Division for review and approval.
- g. Prior to issuance of the grading permit, submit proof of filing of a Notice of Intent (NOI) by providing the unique Waste Discharge Identification Number (WDID#) issued from the Regional Water Quality Control Board.
- h. Submit a copy of the Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP) for review to the Engineering Department prior to issuance of a building and/or grading permit. The general contractor and all subcontractors and suppliers of materials and equipment shall implement these BMP's. Construction site cleanup and control of construction debris shall also be addressed in this program. Failure to comply with the approved

construction BMP may result in the issuance of correction notices, citations, or a project stop work order.

- i. Install appropriate clean water devices at all private storm drain locations immediately prior to entering the public storm drain system. Always implement Best Management Practices (BMP's).
- j. Install on all catch basins "No Dumping, Drains to River" decal buttons.
- k. If sidewalks are pressure washed, debris shall be trapped and collected to prevent entry into the storm drain system. No cleaning agent may be discharged into the storm drain. If any cleaning agent or degreaser is used, wash water shall be collected and discharged to the sanitary sewer, subject to the approval of the sanitary sewer District.
- l. Include erosion control/storm water quality measures in the final grading plan that specifically address measures to prevent soil, dirt, and debris from entering the storm drain system. Such measures may include, but are not limited to, hydro seeding, gravel bags and siltation fences and are subject to review and approval of the City Engineer. If no grading plan is required, necessary erosion control/storm water quality measures shall be shown on the site plan submitted for an on-site permit, subject to review and approval of the City Engineer. The applicant shall be responsible for ensuring that all contractors and subcontractors are aware of and implement such measures.
- m. Sweep or vacuum the parking lot(s) a minimum of once a month and prevent the accumulation of litter and debris on the site. Corners and hard to reach areas shall be swept manually.
- n. Ensure that the area surrounding the project such as the streets stay free and clear of construction debris such as silt, dirt, dust, and tracked mud coming in from or in any way related to project construction. Areas that are exposed for extended periods shall be watered regularly to reduce wind erosion. Paved areas and access roads shall be swept on a regular basis. All trucks shall be covered.
- o. Clean all on-site storm drain facilities a minimum of twice a year, once immediately prior to October 15 and once in January. Additional cleaning may be required if found necessary by City Inspectors and/or City Engineer.

5. Per State Regulations, all impervious surfaces including off-site roadways to be constructed as part of the project, are subject to C.3 requirements.

N. FINAL SUBDIVISION MAP REQUIREMENTS

1. The Final Subdivision Map submittal per each individual phase, excluding the initial large lot Parcel Map intended for the subdivision of parcels for phasing, shall include all the required information described in Title 9, Chapter 4, Article 5: Final Maps, of the Antioch Municipal Code, including, but not limited to:
 - a. Improvement security in one of the following forms:
 - i. Bond or bonds issued by one or more duly authorized corporate securities in an amount equal to 100% of the total estimated costs of the improvements for faithful performance, and in an amount equal to 100% of the total estimated costs of the improvements for labor and materials.
 - ii. A deposit, either with the city or a responsible escrow agent or trust company, at the option of the City Engineer, of money or negotiable bonds of the kind approved for securing deposits of public moneys, in the amounts and for security as specified above, to be released in the same manner as described above for bonds.
 - iii. An irrevocable letter of credit in form acceptable to the City Attorney issued by a financial institution acceptable to the City Attorney in an amount equal to 100% of the total estimated costs of the improvements for faithful performance, no part thereof to be released until such time as specified by state law.
 - b. An original, signed subdivision agreement, to be executed by the subdivider or his agent, guaranteeing the completion of the construction of the improvements required by the governing body within a specified time and payment therefore, satisfactory to the City Attorney as to legality and satisfactory to the City Engineer as to amount.
 - c. A letter from the Tax Collector showing that all payable taxes have been paid and a bond for the payment of taxes then a lien but not yet payable, as required by the Subdivision Map Act.

- d. A cash payment, or receipt therefore, of all the fees required for the checking and filing of the maps and the inspections of the construction; payment for the street signs to be furnished and installed by the city, if required by the subdivider; a cash deposit for the payment of such fire hydrant rental fees as may be established by the respective fire districts or water company or district having jurisdiction; and any other applicable fees or deposits.
- e. Deeds for the easements or rights-of-way for road purposes map.
- f. Written evidence acceptable to the city, in the form of rights of entry or permanent easements across private property outside the subdivision, permitting or granting access to perform the necessary construction work and permitting the maintenance of the facility.
- g. Agreements acceptable to the city, executed by the owners of existing utility easements within the proposed roads rights-of-way, consenting to the dedication of roads or consenting to the joint use of the rights-of-way as may be required by the city for the purpose use and convenience of the roads.
- h. A surety bond acceptable to the city, guaranteeing the payment of the taxes and assessments which will be a lien on the property, as set forth in the Subdivision Map Act, when applicable.
- i. Payment of map maintenance fee.
- j. Payment of the assessment district apportionment fee, if applicable.
- k. Consent and election form for annexation into Police Services Fee CFD.
- l. Evidence of payment of Contra Costa County Flood Control District fees.
- m. A preliminary soil report, prepared by a civil engineer who is registered by the state, based upon adequate test borings or excavations of every subdivision, as defined in Cal. Gov't Code §§ 66490 and 66491. The preliminary soil report may be waived if the City Engineer shall determine that, due to the knowledge of such department as to the soil qualities of the subdivision, no preliminary analysis is necessary.

2. Concurrent with submittal of the first Final Subdivision Map, the applicant shall submit a consent and election form for annexation into all required districts, including Community Facilities District and Lighting and Landscape District.
3. All easements of record that are no longer required and affect individual lots or parcels within this project site shall be removed prior to or concurrently with the recordation of the Final Subdivision Map.

O. MITIGATION MONITORING AND REPORTING PROGRAM

1. The developer shall comply with all mitigation measures identified in the Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program.

P. PROJECT SPECIFIC CONDITIONS

1. All private streets shall be HOA maintained.
2. All private streets shall have sidewalks on both sides to the satisfaction of the City Engineer.
3. Right-of-way shall be acquired from Pacific Gas & Electric (PG&E) for the construction and dedication of Hillcrest Avenue to the City at no cost to the City.
4. Roadways may be configured for storm water treatment directed towards center medians, designs shall be as approved by City Engineer.
5. A four (4)-lane Hillcrest Avenue bridge over Sand Creek shall have a width of 92' edge to edge or as approved by the City Engineer.
6. Hillcrest Ave shall have a right-of-way width of 112' and designed with a minimum traffic index (TI) of 8 and a minimum pavement thickness of 6" AC over 16" Class II AB.
 - The Creekside Project shall dedicate the entire 112' right-of-way width for Hillcrest Avenue.
 - The Creekside Project shall build Interim Hillcrest Avenue, which shall include full frontage improvements on the east and west side including curb, gutter, 6' sidewalk, and landscaping.
 - Construction of northbound and southbound #2 travel lanes shall include bike lanes, interim 40'-wide concrete median curb, center median LED streetlights, and center median landscaping.
 - Ultimate Hillcrest Avenue in a four (4) lane configuration including ultimate median islands shall be the responsibility of future development.

- Medians and shoulders shall be landscaped to the satisfaction of the City Engineer.
7. Slope on westerly frontage of Hillcrest Avenue shall be 3:1 maximum.
 8. An emergency vehicle access shall be provided and design shall be satisfactory to Contra Costa County Fire Protection District and as approved by the City Engineer.
 9. Curb ramps shall be installed per current ADA standards on the corners of the intersections for the following locations:
 - 'I' Street and Hillcrest Avenue
 10. 'I' street shall be a public street and have a full right-of-way width of 60'.
 11. A reimbursement agreement shall be conditioned onto future development of adjacent properties (APNs 057-050-021 & 057-042-006) in order to provide reimbursement for the fair share of design and construction costs of 'I' street and oversized utilities. Total costs shall be submitted to the City after completion of construction and fair share amounts shall be determined and approved by the City Engineer.
 12. Minimum pavement thickness and design for this development shall be as follows:
 - Public Streets ('I' Street): width of 60', TI = 6, and 4" AC over 12" CL II AB.
 - Private Streets (Streets labelled 'A', 'B', 'C', 'D', 'E', 'F', 'G' and 'H'): widths may vary subject to the approval of the City Engineer, TI = 6, 4" and AC over 12" CL II AB.
 13. Trail system pathways shall be a minimum width of 10' feet with concrete or asphalt concrete.
 14. 6' masonry sound wall shall be installed on the backs of all residential lots and sides of corner lots along the frontage of Hillcrest Avenue. Decorative stone veneer pilasters shall be located at regular intervals of between 8 and 25 feet, to the satisfaction of the Community Development Department staff. Pilasters may be located further than 25 feet apart provided additional vertical design enhancements are vertical design enhancements are

provided and reviewed and approved by the Planning Commission as part of the Design Review process.

15. Fencing around stormwater detention basin, Parcel 'D' shall be wrought iron fencing or as approved by the City Engineer.
16. Project shall comply with all recommendations from the Traffic Impact Analysis (TIA) and Environmental Impact Report (EIR).
 - A new traffic signal to be installed at the intersection of 'B' Street and Hillcrest Avenue (Main entry to the development).
 - Sand Creek Road/Hillcrest Avenue traffic signal to be modified.
 - Any other traffic related modifications, lane widening, turn lanes as identified in the Traffic Impact Analysis (TIA), including payment of regional fees.
 - All costs shall be borne by the developer.
17. All park and picnic equipment and materials are to follow current City standards or as approved by the City Engineer.
18. No in-between lot openings shall be allowed for ingress/egress or utility crossings.
19. As recommended by the Parks and Recreation Commission, the following conditions shall apply:
 - a. The Creekside Vineyards at Sand Creek project shall meet its park land dedication requirements through the payment of park-in-lieu fees in the amount of \$330,000;
 - b. The "private park" shall meet all the City's Park Design Standards current at the time of the park's construction; and
 - c. The City will consider a park-in-lieu fee credit based on the detail park parcels "B" and "C" submittal incorporating the "local park basic elements" and meeting the qualification criteria per Code Section 9-4.1010(C) and (D)(6).
20. The project shall be built in conformance with the Design Guidelines (Exhibit C) unless modified by conditions of approval. Any deviation from or modification to the Design Guidelines shall be approved by the Planning Commission.

Q. PHASING CONDITIONS

1. Prior to development of any phase of the subdivision, the applicant shall secure a use permit and design review approval from the Planning Commission for that phase.
2. The order and phasing boundaries of project construction shall conform to the proposed Phasing Plan, dated December 10, 2019, Exhibit A to this resolution. Proposed changes to the Phasing Plan shall be submitted to the City prior to or in conjunction with the use permit application required for the affected phase(s). Changes in the Phasing Plan are subject to approval by the Zoning Administrator or the Planning Commission. Use permit applications are subject to approval by the Planning Commission.

3. **Phase One:**

Prior to the issuance of the 1st building permit within Phase One, the following improvements shall be completed to the satisfaction of the City Engineer:

- a. Hillcrest Avenue from the intersection at Sand Creek Road south to 'B' Street, including the bridge over Sand Creek.
- b. Interim Hillcrest Avenue shall be constructed with east and west side curb, gutter, sidewalk and landscaping including Parcel H, 12' northbound and southbound #2 travel lanes with 8' bike lanes, interim 40'-wide landscaped median with concrete median curbs, median LED streetlights, and all utilities from the bridge over Sand Creek to the south curb returns of 'B' Street. The transition from the bridge section shall be as approved by the City Engineer. Improvements shall include conduits and pull boxes for the portion of a traffic signal at Hillcrest Avenue and 'B' Street located within the improvement limits, all as approved by the City Engineer.
- c. 'B' Street (Neighborhood Entry): 'B' Street shall be fully constructed from Hillcrest Avenue to the Community Site including lighting and median and right of way landscaping.
- d. Parcel B (Community Site): The community park design shall be approved by the Parks and Recreation Commission and/or Planning Commission, in conformance with Antioch Code Article 10, Section 9-4.1001 thru 1014.

- e. Parcel C (Park): The park and trail design shall be approved by the Parks and Recreation Commission and/or Planning Commission, in conformance with Antioch Code Article 10, Section 9-4.1001 thru 1014.
- f. Parcel G (Park): The park design shall be approved by the Parks and Recreation Commission and/or Planning Commission, in conformance with Antioch Code Article 10, Section 9-4.1001 thru 1014.
- g. Parcel D (Detention Basin): Parcel 'D' shall be fully constructed.

Prior to the issuance of the 75th building permit and the 30th Certificate of Occupancy, the following improvements shall be completed to the satisfaction of the City Engineer:

- h. Heidorn Ranch Road EVA Connection as required by CCCFPD.
- i. Parcel B (Community Site): Park shall be fully constructed.
- j. Parcel C (Park): Park shall be fully constructed.
- k. Parcel G (Park): Park shall be fully constructed.

4. **Phase Two:**

Prior to the issuance of the 1st building permit for a lot within Phase Two, the following shall be completed to the satisfaction of the City Engineer:

- a. Hillcrest Avenue/'B' Street Traffic Signal: The applicant shall fully construct a traffic signal at the intersection of Hillcrest Avenue and 'B' Street. Upon concurrence of the applicant and the City, the applicant may deposit payment into the City's traffic signal account for traffic signal design and construction.
- b. Remaining portion of interim Hillcrest Avenue through to 'G' Street shall be fully constructed with east side and west curb, gutter, sidewalk and landscaping including Parcel I, 12' northbound and southbound #2 travel lanes with 8' bike lanes, interim 40'-wide landscaped median with concrete median curbs, median LED streetlights, and all utilities, including interconnect conduit and pull boxes. Improvements shall include conduits and pull as approved by the City Engineer.

5. **Phase Three:**

Prior to the issuance of the 1st building permit for a lot within Phase Three, the following shall be completed to the satisfaction of the City Engineer:

- a. 'I' Street: 'I' Street shall be fully constructed from Hillcrest Avenue westerly to the Phase boundary, including lighting. The easterly connection to Hillcrest Avenue will be in an interim manner, as approved by the City Engineer.
- b. Parcel O (Detention Basin): Parcel 'O' shall be fully constructed.
- c. Parcel J (Park): The park design shall be approved by the Parks and Recreation Commission and/or Planning Commission, in conformance with Antioch Code Article 10, Section 9-4.1001 thru 1014.

Prior to the issuance of the 10th Certificate of Occupancy for a lot within Phase Three, the following shall be completed to the satisfaction of the City Engineer:

- d. Parcel J (Park): Park shall be fully constructed.

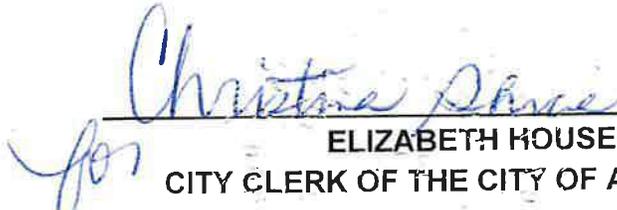

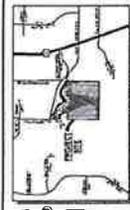

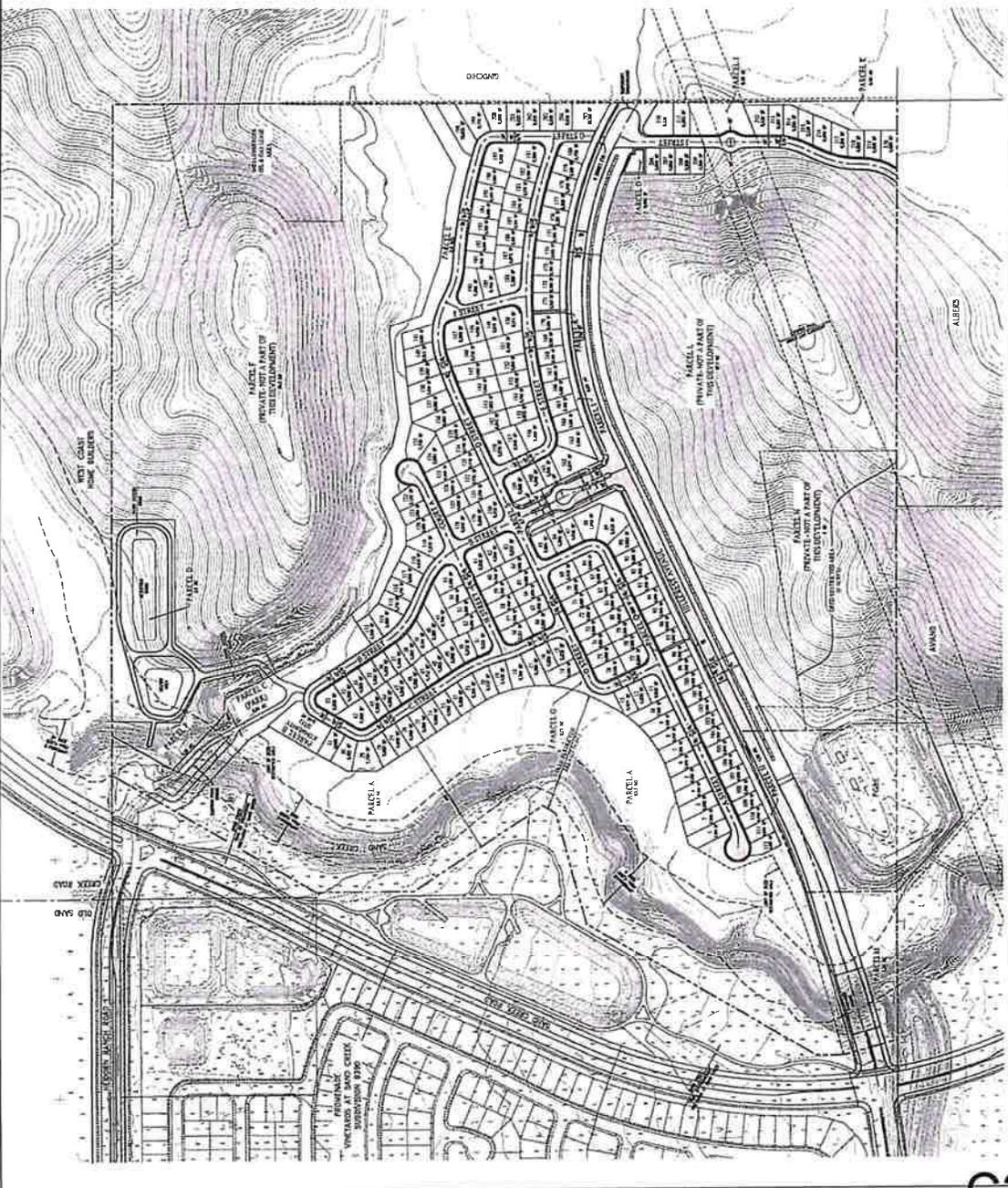

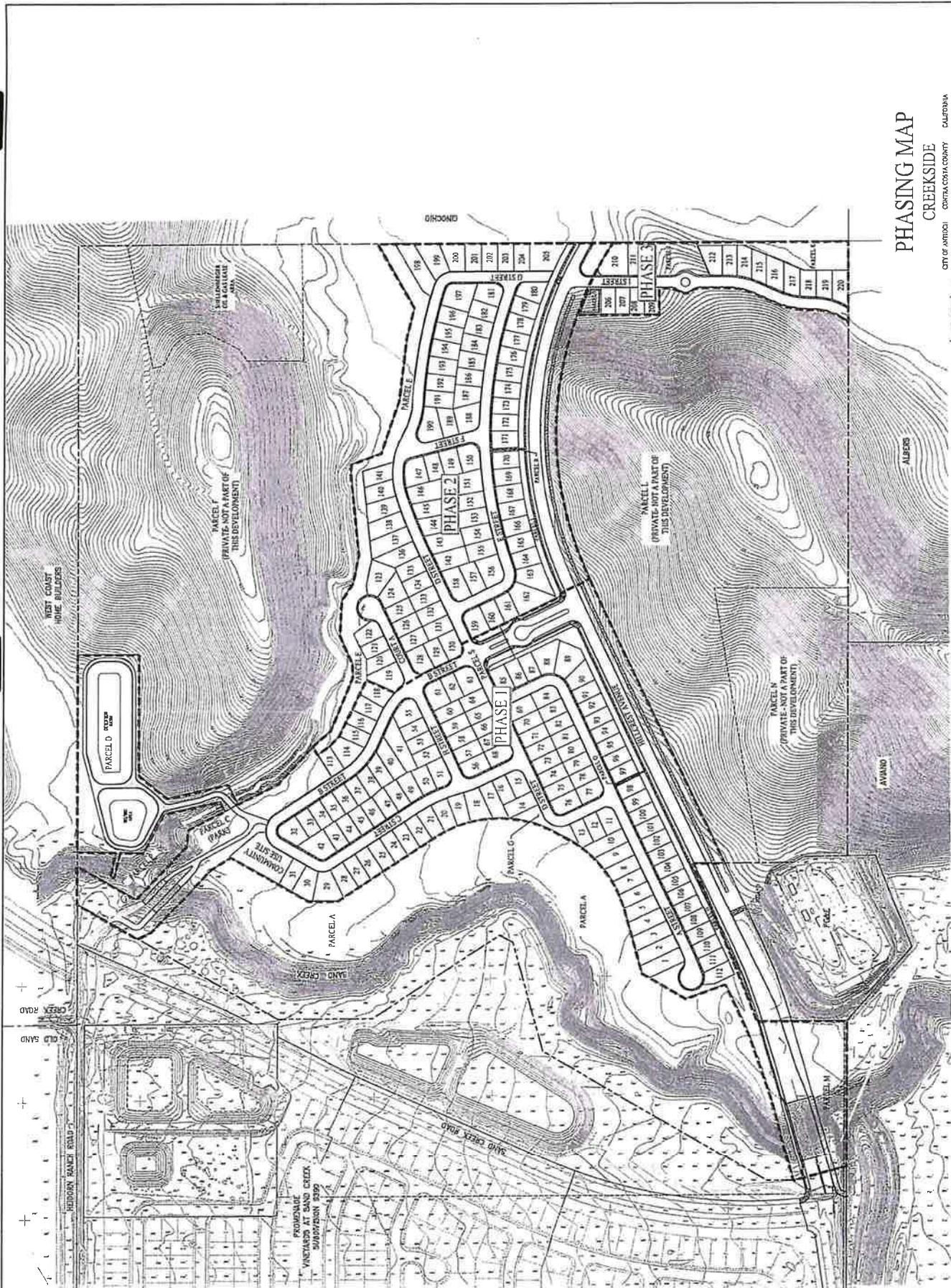
**VESTING TENTATIVE MAP

1. INTRODUCTION

The Resource Management Element of the City of Antioch's General Plan requires the preparation of a "Resource Management Plan" for properties located within the Sand Creek Focus Area. Specifically, the General Plan states: "Because of the sensitivity of the habitat areas within the Sand Creek Focus Area, and to provide for mitigation of biological resources impacts on lands in natural open space, as well as for the long-term management of natural open space, a project-specific Resource Management Plan based on the Framework Resource Management Plan attached as Appendix A to this General Plan shall be prepared and approved prior to development of the Sand Creek Focus Area properties." (Section 4.0, Land Use, City of Antioch General Plan).

The purpose of the Resource Management Plan is to (1) determine the significance of the resources found onsite and their relationship to resources in the surrounding area; (2) define areas that should be maintained as open space, based on the significance of the onsite resources and their relationship to resources in the surrounding area; and (3) identify mechanisms to protect and manage open spaces. [City of Antioch General Plan, § 10.3.2e] The General Plan includes a "Framework Resources Management Plan" (Framework) [City of Antioch General Plan, Appendix A]. The Framework provides the criteria that subsequent Resource Management Plans should use to evaluate the significance of any onsite natural resources within the Sand Creek Focus Area, and their relationship to the surrounding area, and to determine the appropriate amount and type of mitigation for impacts to onsite natural resources.

The Framework takes a broad and integrated approach to natural resources within the Sand Creek Focus Area. The approach is based on three, specifically enumerated, principles of conservation biology, which this Resource Management Plan has employed. First, the onsite biological resources are considered in terms of their contribution to natural communities at a regional scale. Second, the framework utilizes the concept of landscape corridors to link existing areas of preserved habitat. Third, methods for minimizing and mitigating the adverse effects of development are addressed under the Framework. These three principles are addressed in this Resource Management Plan for the Creekside project, presented below.

2. PROPERTY LOCATION AND SETTING

The approximately 158.2-acre proposed project site, which is all of Assessor's Parcel Number (APN) 057-050-024, is located west of Highway 4 and south of Lone Tree Way in the City of Antioch, Contra Costa County, California (Figures 1 and 2). The Development Area is 58.9 acres onsite, and 1.9 acres offsite, with the remaining 97.5 acres remaining as private open space. The site is generally rectangular; however, the northern boundary is an irregular shape, following the alignment of Sand Creek. Sand Creek flows west to east adjacent to the northern boundary of the project site and eventually flows into Marsh Creek in the City of Brentwood. The project site has been dry-land farmed since the 1930s and consists primarily of non-native vegetation, although it is also subject to a number of energy and communication easements and is within the historical boundaries of the Brentwood Oil & Gas Field.

The project site is surrounded by undeveloped land to the east, south, and west. The northern boundary of the project site includes a 400-foot wide, 23.7-acre, "Sand Creek Buffer Area" that

includes a portion of Sand Creek and approximately 200 feet on either side of the creek's centerline. The area immediately west of the proposed development area includes approximately 8 acres that are subject to a deed restriction that generally prevents any future disturbance of this 8 acres (dedicated open space). The east side of the project site is also generally bordered by undeveloped land. Like the project site, the adjacent undeveloped areas are subject to numerous energy and communication easements and are within the historical boundaries of the Brentwood Oil & Gas Field. Currently, there is one active oil and gas lease area (the "Shellenberger Lease"), which is located near the project site's southeastern border. Old utility access roads and existing pipelines run below ground and cross Sand Creek.

The project site is located in an area of Antioch that is rapidly transitioning from agricultural uses to residential and commercial development. The parcel directly north of the project site is the Vineyards at Sand Creek/Promenade Project Site ("Promenade Project"), a 650-unit residential development that is currently under construction. The "Aviano Development Project," which is also currently under construction is located to the northwest of the project site. To the west is a PG&E facility and privately-owned land planned for future residential development in the City of Antioch's General Plan. Figures 2 and 3 provides an aerial photograph that shows the project site features and the surrounding land uses.

3. PROPOSED PROJECT

The Creekside Project is the second phase of the Vineyards at Sand Creek Residential Community (the first phase being the Promenade Project) and includes the development of approximately 220 single-family units on the approximately 58.6-acre project site. The project will include housing, landscaped areas, roadways, and utility improvements, as illustrated on the attached exhibit entitled: *Biological Resources Analysis: Project Description Areas for Creekside*, prepared by CBG, dated November 7, 2019 (Attachment A).

The main water quality detention basin area is proposed east of the residential area, adjacent to Sand Creek. Two detention basins will collect and treat stormwater for the majority of the residential development. Treated stormwater from these two basins will flow north into Sand Creek via an outfall structure constructed on the south side of the existing outfall facility previously constructed by the Promenade Project.

A second "clean water" outfall into Sand Creek is proposed adjacent to a southern extension of Hillcrest Avenue (bridge, roadway and utilities), north of the residential area. Natural drainage from the northern portion of the adjacent western hillslope will be collected and discharged via this outfall structure. A third "clean water" stormwater outfall (dispersal point) is proposed east of the residential area, at the far southern end of the project site. Natural drainage from the southern portion of the western hillslope will be collected, treated and dispersed.

Dry utilities and water lines will be installed within the proposed Hillcrest Avenue bridge to connect to utilities in Hillcrest Avenue. A second EVA/pedestrian bridge will be constructed adjacent to and 25-foot west of the existing PG&E bridge in the northeastern corner of the site; water, sewer, and dry utilities will be attached to that EVA/pedestrian bridge to connect with existing utilities in Heidorn Ranch Road.

This development also will require offsite grading on approximately 11 acres located adjacent to the project site (“Offsite Grading Areas”). The Offsite Grading Areas, shown on Attachment A, will be contoured and hydroseeded.

4. MITIGATION

The City’s Draft Environmental Impact Report for the Creekside/Vineyards at Sand Creek Project (EIR) (City of Antioch, July 2020) found the project will impact 60.7 acres that provide suitable habitat for special status species, and that the appropriate mitigation for these impacts is the preservation, at a minimum 1:1 ratio, of suitable offsite habitat or through the purchase of species mitigation credits or by participation in the East Contra Costa County Habitat Conservation Plan and Natural Communities Conservation Plan (HCP/NCCP) if available. As described in the City’s Draft EIR, the offsite habitat must provide certain habitat qualities, such as grasslands and proximity to occupied dispersal habitat or known breeding habitat. GBN Partners, LLC is currently evaluating potential mitigation property that will satisfy the EIR mitigation measures. Consistent with the EIR, an offsite mitigation site would need to be managed to benefit a complement of known locally occurring listed species, including California red-legged frogs (*Rana draytonii*), the California tiger salamander (*Ambystoma californiense*), and San Joaquin kit fox (*Vulpes macrotis*).

5. NATURAL COMMUNITIES

The Framework identifies four natural communities within the Sand Creek Focus Area that must be considered: (1) Grassland; (2) stream and riparian; (3) chaparral, scrub and rock outcrop; and (4) oak woodland and savannah. According to the Framework, these natural communities support “umbrella” and other special status species. The Framework addresses the relationship between these natural communities and the existing preserved lands located in regional proximity to the Focus Area. Resource Management Strategies for each of the natural communities are also addressed by the Framework. Each of the natural communities, their presence on the Creekside property, and the applicability of the Framework’s Resource Management Strategies are discussed below.

5.1 Grassland Community

The Framework defines grassland communities as areas that are vegetated by both annual and perennial grasses, with lesser amounts of forbs that are commonly used as rangeland. Grassland communities include areas that have been “lightly cultivated for dryland farming in some years, which retain key ecological characteristics of grassland under this use.” The Framework excludes areas “that have been intensively cultivated in most years” from grassland communities [City of Antioch General Plan, App. A, p.4]. In the east Contra Costa County area immediately surrounding the Focus Area, the Framework recognizes relatively narrow bands of grasslands that extend west from the Altamont Pass area to the southeast of the Focus Area, through the cities of Brentwood and Antioch, and along the north flank of Mt. Diablo and into East Bay Regional Park District (EBRPD) lands to the west of the Focus Area [City of Antioch General Plan, App. A, p.4].

Habitats and species the Framework typically associates with the grassland community include a small number of vernal pools (some with vernal pool fairy shrimp (*Branchinecta lynchi*)) located

in the eastern part of the Focus Area, San Joaquin kit fox, California tiger salamander, burrowing owl (*Athene cunicularia*), and Alameda whipsnake (*Masticophis lateralis euryxanthus*) (in grasslands within several hundred feet of chaparral, scrub and rock outcrops) [City of Antioch General Plan, App. A, pp. 5-7]. The San Joaquin kit fox and burrowing owl are considered “umbrella” species by the Framework, although the Framework recognizes that the Focus Area is at the northerly edge of the kit fox’s range and the kit fox’s presence within the Focus Area would only be on an irregular basis in very small numbers. The Framework describes the distribution of burrowing owls in and around the Focus Area as variable.

Significant areas of grasslands west, northwest and south of the Focus Area have been set aside in regional parks and permanent open spaces. The Framework recommends preserving grasslands in and around the Focus Area that are connected to these existing grasslands. Within the Focus Area, the Framework classifies strategic grassland communities that should be targeted for preservation. Grasslands east of Deer Valley Road (the Creekside project site is in this area) are classified as the least important for preservation, areas in the Lone Tree Valley between Deer Valley Road and Empire Mine Road have intermediate strategic value (where adjoining land uses are urban on one side), and areas west of Empire Mine Road and in Horse Valley have the highest strategic value (where adjoining parkland and open space are preserved for natural values) [City of Antioch General Plan, App. A, p.10]. Outside of the Focus Area, the Framework recommends closing the “gap” between Cowell Ranch and Black Diamond Mines Regional Preserve by preserving the grassland community within Horse Valley and Deer Valley, and lands between those two valleys [City of Antioch General Plan, App. A, p.10].

Consistent with these recommendations, the Framework identifies the following Resource Management Strategies for Grassland Corridors in the Focus Area [City of Antioch General Plan, App. A, p.11]:

- Designate a portion of the lands in the Focus Area adjacent to EBRPD (shown on Figure 8 of the Framework) preserved lands as natural open space.
- Designate the Horse Creek watershed portion (shown on Figure 8 of the Framework) of the Focus Area as natural Open Space.
- Provide incentives to preserve linkages and corridors between EBRPD lands and existing open grasslands to the south of the Focus Area.

5.1.1 GRASSLAND COMMUNITIES AT THE CREEKSIDE PROJECT SITE

The Creekside project site has been actively farmed for more than 80 years, and does not represent a true “grassland community” under the Framework. However, it has retained some ecological characteristics of a grassland community. Although the site has been disked routinely since the 1930s greatly reducing the probability of western burrowing owl to occur, the margins of the farmed areas of the project site provides suitable habitat conditions, albeit marginal habitat, for this owl.

The site also provides potential migration habitat for San Joaquin kit fox, although the site does not provide suitable sized burrows for denning, based on surveys conducted by M&A biologists.

The closest CNDDDB record for this species was recorded in the 1970s and is located 2.75 miles south of the project site (Occurrence No. 936). However, independently conducted surveys cited in *Relative Abundance of Endangered San Joaquin Kit Fox (Vulpes macrotis mutica) Based on Scat-Detection Dog Surveys* (Smith et. al. 2006) were unable to document presence of San Joaquin kit fox in Contra Costa County, suggesting that it is likely that San Joaquin kit fox is extirpated from Contra Costa County.

The closest record for California tiger salamander occurs 0.25- mile south of the project site (CNDDDB Occurrence No. 856). California tiger salamander larvae are recorded to occur in a pond at this location. There are eight additional California tiger salamander records known from within two miles of the project site. Regardless, the project site has been disked and farmed annually since the early 1930s. Ground squirrel control has been actively practiced on the project site for decades and accordingly, subterranean refugia available for California tiger salamander is rare, at best, in the vicinity of the project site. Due to an absence of suitable refugia on the farmed project site, it does not provide suitable over- summering upland habitat for California tiger salamander. In addition, the project site supports no potential (aquatic) breeding habitat that could be used by this salamander. As such, no suitable California tiger salamander breeding or over-summering habitat will be affected by the proposed project.

The closest record for Alameda whipsnake is located 3.5 miles west of the project site (CNDDDB Occurrence No.68). The project site does not provide “core habitat” for the Alameda whipsnake (i.e., there are no chaparral and coastal scrub communities within the project site), and the closest core habitat is located approximately 3 miles from the project site. As such, no suitable Alameda whipsnake habitat will be affected by the proposed project.

As the Creekside project site is not adjacent to EBRPD lands or other preserved open space areas, most of the Resource Management Strategies listed above do not apply to the project site. However, the project will preserve linkages and wildlife corridors; Sand Creek, located just north of the project site, provides a valuable wildlife corridor with suitable cover, foraging, water resources, and migration pathways that lead to other natural habitats. Wildlife corridors are linear and/or regional habitats that provide connectivity to other natural vegetation communities within a landscape fractured by urbanization and other development. Wildlife corridors have several functions: 1) they provide avenues along which wide-ranging animals can travel, migrate, and breed, allowing genetic interchange to occur; 2) populations can move in response to environmental changes and natural disasters; and 3) individuals can recolonize habitats from which populations have been locally extirpated (Beier and Loe 1992). All three of these functions can be met if both regional and local wildlife corridors are accessible to wildlife. Sand Creek provides a local wildlife corridor for common mammals and birds such as raccoon (*Procyon lotor*), opossum (*Didelphis virginiana*), gray fox (*Urocyon cinereoargenteus*), coyote (*Canis latrans*), red-tailed hawk (*Buteo jamaicensis*), great horned owl (*Bubo virginianus*) and Nuttall’s woodpecker (*Picoides nuttallii*) among many others. Medium and large mammal movements along this creek will remain unaffected by the proposed project. Also, the diverse riparian woodland provides important avian habitat that is used seasonally by migrant species and year-round by resident birds. The project as currently proposed would not adversely impact wildlife movement corridors.

5.2 Stream and Riparian Community

The Framework defines the stream and riparian community as areas where water flows in discrete paths, ranging from small swales to substantial streams. Within the Focus Area, this community comprises less than 2% of the landscape, but is widely distributed [City of Antioch General Plan, App. A, p.7]. The stream and riparian community in the Focus Area flows from west to east, and drains to watersheds located outside of the Focus Area. Sand Creek is the primary stream community, and a portion of upper Horse Valley Creek is located in the southern extension of the Focus Area. The stream and riparian community within the Focus Area does not provide a key linkage and movement corridor for many species, but the California red-legged frog is identified as a species associated with the Focus Area's riparian community. [City of Antioch General Plan, App. A, pp.7-8].

The Resource Management Strategies for stream and riparian communities within the Framework recommends an open space corridor on both sides of Sand Creek, within which no grading or other development would occur [City of Antioch General Plan, App. A, p.14]. The Framework does not require complete avoidance of the creek or specify the size of the open space corridor, but it does suggest evaluating whether the General Plan's recommended 250 foot creek corridor (roughly 125 feet on either side of the creek centerline) is sufficient to buffer the creek from any adjoining golf and residential development.

5.2.1 STREAM AND RIPARIAN COMMUNITIES AT THE CREEKSIDE PROJECT SITE

Sand Creek flows west to east just north of the project site boundary. The creek receives urban runoff from developments to the northwest, and from a larger as yet undeveloped watershed further to the northwest. The average distance between ordinary high water marks (OHWM) in Sand Creek is 12 feet and it is approximately 70 to 150 feet wide between the top-of-banks. Sand Creek is incised approximately 20 feet down below the existing grade of the project site; it has steeply-sloped banks and a flood plain terrace near the top of banks on each side of the thalweg. Scattered riparian woodland is associated with Sand Creek. Tree species found in the riparian woodland along Sand Creek include valley oak (*Quercus lobata*), California buckeye (*Aesculus californica*), bluegum eucalyptus (*Eucalyptus globulus*), arroyo willow (*Salix lasiolepis*), and big-leaf maple (*Acer macrophyllum*). The open non-canopied habitats within Sand Creek allow for localized occurrences of herbaceous and shrubby understories. California rose (*Rosa californica*) grows in dense thickets along portions of the creek, while sneezeweed (*Helenium puberulum*), California sagebrush (*Artemisia californica*), California mugwort (*Artemisia douglasiana*), and white sweetclover (*Melilotus albus*) are scattered along the creek banks and at the water line. Annual beardgrass (*Polypogon monspeliensis*), cattails (*Typha latifolia*), brown-headed rush (*Juncus phaeocephalus* ssp. *paniculatus*), Baltic rush (*Juncus balticus* ssp. *ater*) and water cress (*Nasturtium officinale*) grow in scattered locations in the creek channel as well.

The closest known CNDDDB record of California red-legged frog is 0.70-mile west of the project site within Sand Creek (CNDDDB Occurrence No. 933). In addition, there are three additional CNDDDB records of this frog within 2 miles of the project site. Consequently, Sand Creek is regarded as occupied, and the lands adjacent to the creek including the project site constitute potential upland dispersal habitat for this frog.

The project as currently proposed would not adversely impact wildlife movement corridors since the Creekside Project will remain outside of a 400-ft wide (23.7-acre) Sand Creek Buffer Area that is subject to an existing deed restriction that will preserve the Buffer Area in its existing undeveloped condition. The two outfall structures and the two clear span bridges over Sand Creek will not impact the value of this wildlife corridor.

5.3 Chaparral, Scrub and Rock Outcrop Community

According to the Framework, the chaparral, scrub and rock outcrop community occurs on thin-soiled areas that may contain chaparral, grasses, and broadleaved herbs, or may support minimal vegetation [City of Antioch General Plan, App. A, p.8]. The rock outcrop community is generally limited to ridgetops, and excludes grassland and oak woodland or savannah on deeper soils. Within the Focus Area, this community is found primarily in the western part of the Focus Area, and otherwise extends eastward only on the ridges on either side of Sand Creek. The Framework associates the Alameda whipsnake with this community, in the southwestern part of the Focus Area [City of Antioch General Plan, App. A, p.8].

5.3.1 CHAPARRAL, SCRUB AND ROCK OUTCROP COMMUNITIES AT THE CREEKSIDE PROJECT SITE

The project site does not support a chaparral, scrub or rock outcrop community.

5.4 Oak Woodland and Savannah Community

The Framework defines the oak woodland and savannah community as typified by one or more species of oaks, and generally located on moist north-facing slopes [City of Antioch General Plan, App. A, p.9]. Non-native trees and vegetation, such as eucalyptus trees are excluded from the community by the Framework. No sensitive species are associated with the oak woodland and savannah community within the Focus Area.

5.4.1 OAK WOODLAND AND SAVANNAH COMMUNITIES AT THE CREEKSIDE PROJECT SITE

There are a number of eucalyptus and other non-native trees on the project site. Scattered riparian woodland is associated with Sand Creek, an intermittent creek that runs west to east along the northern project site's border. Tree species found in the riparian woodland along Sand Creek include valley oak (*Quercus lobata*) trees, among other riparian species. However, there are no oaks on the site, and it does not support an oak woodland and savannah community.

6. MITIGATION FOR IMPACTS TO NATURAL COMMUNITIES

As described in the Framework, impacts to natural communities and their associated special status species from development within the Sand Creek Focus Area is unavoidable [City of Antioch General Plan, App. A, p.11]. However, the magnitude or intensity of the impact from development within the Focus Area is not uniform across the Focus Area. The Framework designates the land within the Focus Area into one of three "Impact Zones" (Zone 1, Zone 2, Zone 3) [City of Antioch General Plan, App. A, pp. 13, and shown on Figure 9 of the Framework].

The Framework recommends in-kind mitigation, with a minimum 1:1 mitigation ratio. By way of example, the Framework explains that mitigation for impacts to California tiger salamander breeding and over-summering habitat "would be required to preserve grassland habitats that

support conditions for the tiger salamander in an amount that is equal to or greater than the acreage of the impacted site. Conversely, if the tiger salamander was absent from that site, the preservation lands would not need to contain the specific habitat values for this species" [City of Antioch General Plan, App. A, p.3].

The Framework also recognizes the value of preserving higher quality habitat. Zone 3 lands will generally require the most mitigation, and similarly, the preservation of Zone 3 lands will be given additional mitigation credit, or value, and less mitigation may be required to encourage the preservation of Zone 3 habitats.

These mitigation goals are reflected in the Framework's Resource Management Strategies for Key Grassland Sensitive Resources in the Focus Area [City of Antioch General Plan, App. A, p.12] which encourage:

- Sufficient mitigation for impacts resulting from individual development proposals to adequately protect the habitat of key grassland sensitive resources.
- Carefully tailored mitigation to reflect the relative importance of the specific lands proposed for development.
- Incentives to encourage the purchase of mitigation lands in those areas deemed to be of greater strategic importance to maintaining the integrity of the grassland resources in the region.

The Resource Management Strategies for the Stream and Riparian Community encourage off-site compensatory mitigation for impacts to Sand Creek, particularly on lands designated for grassland community mitigation [City of Antioch General Plan, App. A, p.14].

The Creekside project site is designated as Impact Zone 1, which generally requires the least mitigation (1:1 in-kind mitigation). As described above, the proposed project will impact approximately 60 acres of marginal grassland community ecological characteristics, but nonetheless does provide suitable upland dispersal habitat for the California red-legged frog, suitable habitat for California tiger salamander, and potential migration habitat for the San Joaquin kit fox.

Under the Framework, mitigation for the project's permanent impacts to grasslands should consist of approximately 60.7 acres of land of the same ecological value.

In accordance with the EIR, the project will preserve ecologically suitable mitigation property, at a minimum 1:1 ratio, or secure habitat mitigation credits or participate in the HCP/NCCP if available, prior to the start of construction. The mitigation site will be managed to benefit a complement of known locally occurring listed species, including California red-legged frogs, the California tiger salamander, and San Joaquin kit fox.

7. MANAGEMENT OF PRESERVED LANDS

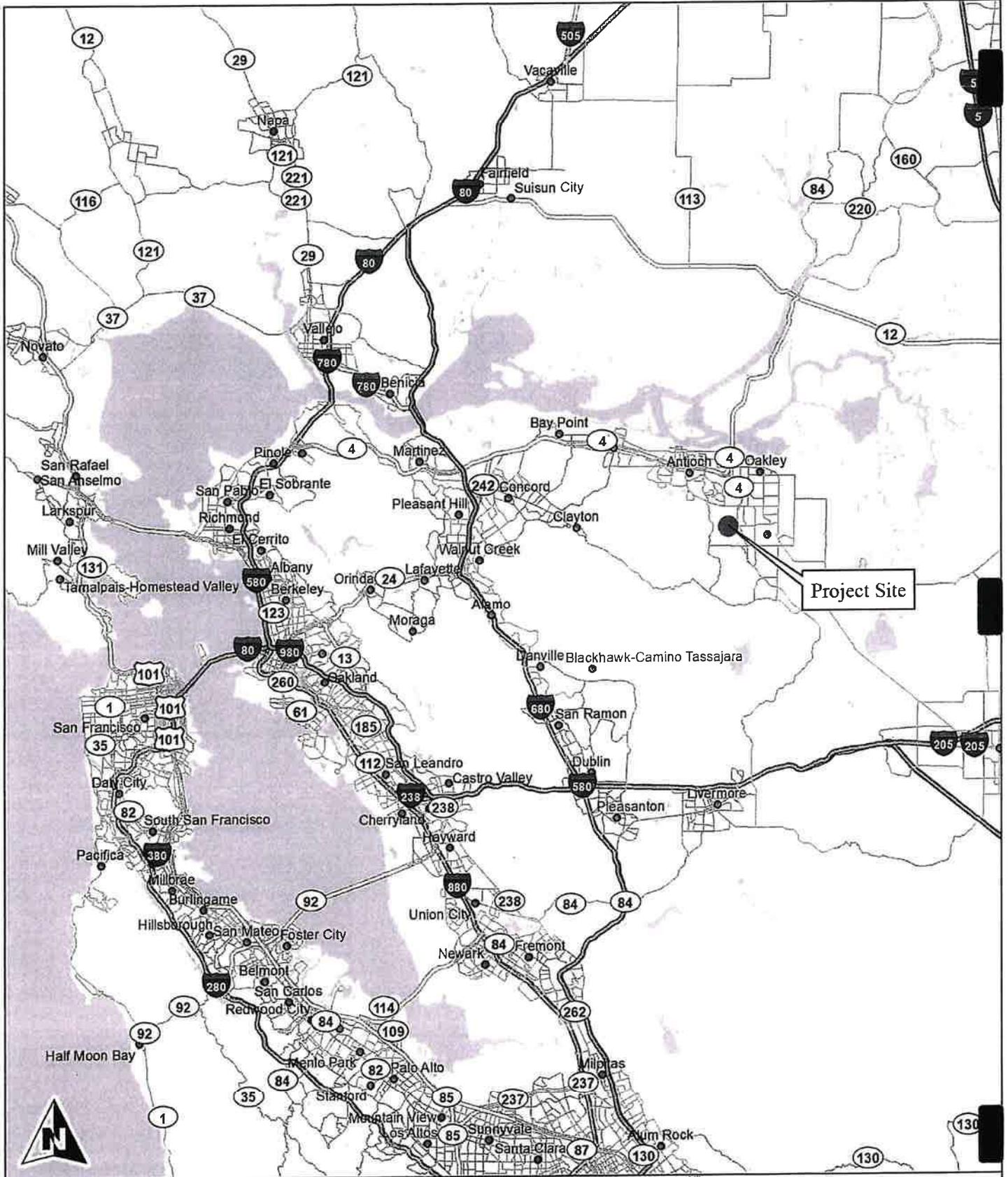
Once lands have been identified for preservation, the Framework recommends preparing a site-specific management plan that addresses the site's key sensitive species, permitted activities (e.g., cattle grazing, new trails in the future), grazing management (if applicable), activities that will not be permitted on the site (such as use of rodenticide, dicing, recreational activities that would require substantial alteration of the habitat, etc.), and the funding mechanism (such as an endowment) to pay for the site's long-term management.

The EIR is consistent with this recommendation, and if mitigation credits are not used, a conservation easement granted to a qualified conservation organization will be recorded over suitable mitigation property, a habitat management plan will be prepared and submitted to the City, and an endowment will be established to pay for the long-term management, maintenance, and monitoring of the mitigation site as described in the City's EIR. Management and monitoring within the mitigation site is likely to include invasive species monitoring (only those species categorized as "high" invasiveness by CAL-IPC) and vegetation management to control such invasive species, grazing to manage vegetation height and abundance, trash removal, fencing maintenance, and special-status species surveys. The habitat management plan will specify the habitat objectives the plan is intended to achieve, a monitoring schedule, the contents and frequency of any monitoring reports. Allowed and prohibited uses, such as when and where the application of pesticides is permitted and prohibited, areas where grazing is not permitted, and other site-specific actions will be addressed in the plan, and in the conservation easement. The conservation easement will also address prohibited activities, such as, commercial or industrial uses, construction and other ground disturbing activities, mining activities, subdivision of the site, removing vegetation other than for habitat management purposes, and most recreational or agricultural activities.

The plan will include sufficient information to determine the cost of implementing the short-term and long-term management and monitoring actions. The project proponent will establish an operational, non-wasting endowment that will provide the Grantee, or other approved land manager with sufficient funds for implementing the plan.

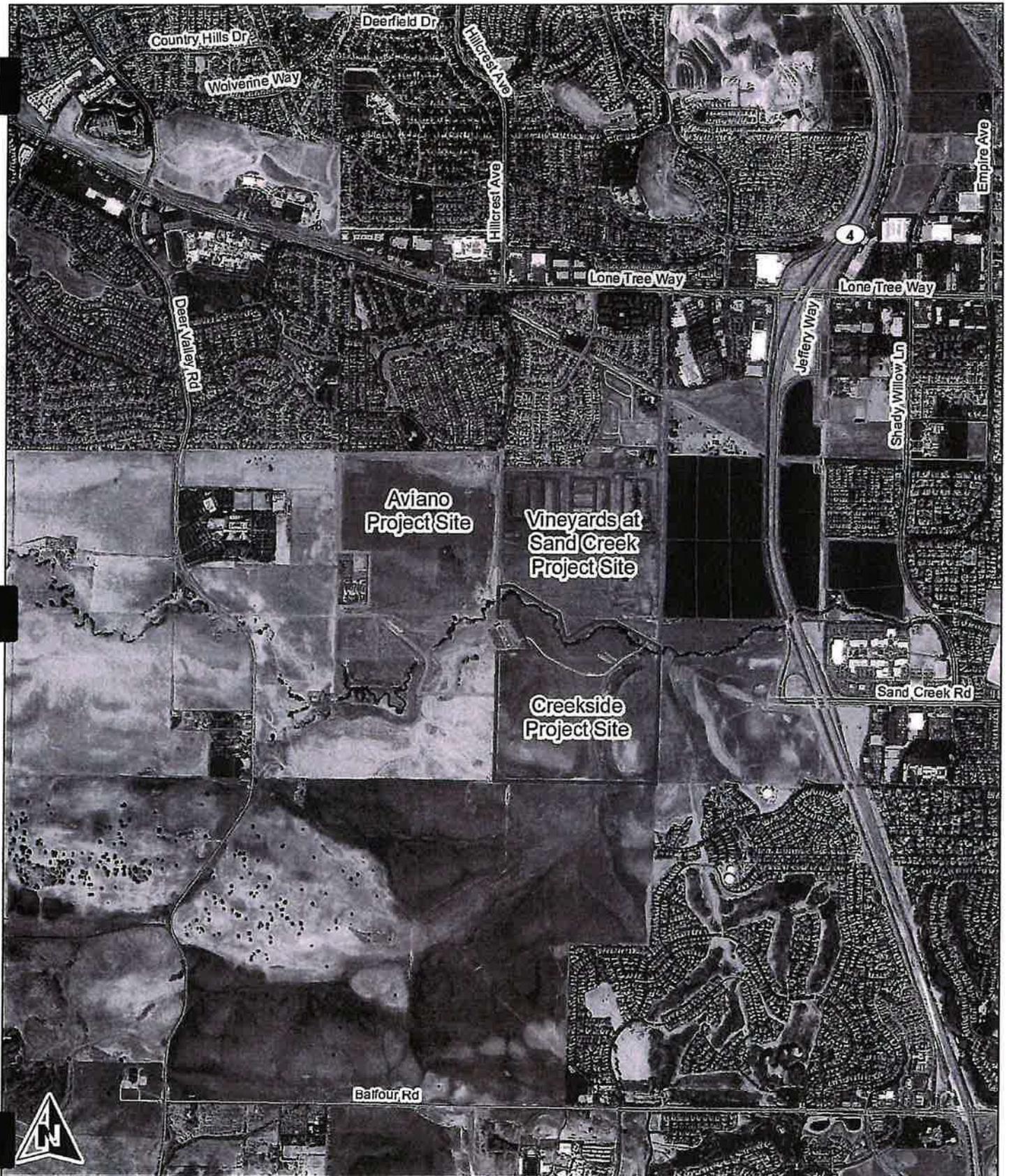

SUBJECT: Consideration of a Cooperative Agreement between the City of Antioch and the Contra Costa Transportation Authority for the L Street Pathway to Transit – Bicycle and Pedestrian Improvement Project Funded in Part by a Safe Streets and Roads for All Grant; P.W. 234-15

RECOMMENDED ACTION

It is recommended that the City Council adopt the resolution:

1. Approving the Cooperative Agreement between the City of Antioch and the Contra Costa Transportation Authority for the L Street Pathway to Transit - Bicycle and Pedestrian Improvement Project;
2. Approving an amendment to the fiscal year 2023/2024 Operating Budget to increase the funding for the L Street Pathway to Transit – Bicycle and Pedestrian Improvement Project by \$4,952,000 from Road Maintenance and Rehabilitation Account funds;
3. Authorizing the expenditure of up to \$4,952,000 of RMRA funds to pay an advancement to the Contra Costa Transportation Authority for estimated costs for each phase of project delivery for the L Street Pathway to Transit - Bicycle and Pedestrian Improvement Project, which is required to receive a \$13,008,000 Safe Streets and Roads for All Grant; and
4. Authorizing the Acting City Manager to execute the agreement.

FISCAL IMPACT

City Staff, in partnership with Contra Costa Transportation Authority (“CCTA”), have identified the L Street Pathway to Transit – Bicycle and Pedestrian Improvement Project (“Project”) as a candidate for the federal Safe Streets and Roads for All (“SS4A”) Grant Program. The approved grant amount for the Project is \$13,008,000 with a total Project estimate of \$17,960,000.

Adoption of this resolution will authorize to amend the budget to include funding in the amount of \$4,952,000 utilizing RMRA funds for the Project. This action will require reallocating funding currently assigned to the Capital Improvement pavement rehabilitation and resurfacing projects resulting in the delivery of these projects possibly being delayed.

DISCUSSION

City staff, in partnership with CCTA have identified the Project as a viable project to submit for this SS4A Grant Program.

On August 26, 2022, the City Council approved the City to pursue SS4A Grant Funding Program and committing \$3,252,000 of Measure J, Gas Tax or RMRA local funds.

In the summer of 2022, the CCTA led a multi-agency, collaborative effort to submit the "Bicycle and Pedestrian Safety Improvements to Improve Equity Countywide in Contra Costa Project Application" to the U.S. Department of Transportation's ("USDOT's") Safe Streets and Roads for All Discretionary Grant Program.

In February 2023, the USDOT announced that the CCTA had been awarded \$28.9 million to deliver five projects that make neighborhoods throughout the county safer to walk and bike in.

The Antioch L Street Pathway to Transit - Bicycle and Pedestrian Improvement Project, a City component of the overarching CCTA project, will construct improvements on L Street between West 9th Street and Sycamore Drive to increase pedestrian and bicycle accessibility. Significant impediments restrict pedestrian and bicycle travel along this corridor. This is predominantly due to the lack of sidewalk adjacent to the Contra Costa Fairgrounds. The Project would widen the roadway between 10th and 18th Streets to four-lanes and provide safe bicycle access through the area. New concrete curb, gutter and sidewalk will be constructed along the unimproved section fronting the Contra Costa Fairgrounds. Additional work will consist of constructing ADA compliant curb ramps, reconfiguring pavement striping to improve safety and operations along the corridor, installation of new landscape and hardscape amenities to beautify the thoroughfare and implementation of intersection improvements including traffic signal modifications at West 10th Street, West 18th Street and Sycamore Drive.

The SS4A grant amount dedicated to this project is \$13,008,000, and the proposed agreement commits the City to pay \$4,952,000 from other non-federal sources for the required match for the federal grant and for costs incurred by the CCTA for project management, and all phases of project delivery including environmental clearance, plans, specifications, and estimates for right-of-way and construction.

The CCTA will be the lead in all phases of project delivery as required by the USDOT and Federal Highway Administration, the agency administering the grant program.

At this time, City staff requests that the City Council consider authorization to execute the Cooperative Agreement between the CCTA for the L Street Pathway to Transit – Bicycle and Pedestrian Improvement Project and the commitment of local funds.

WHEREAS, City staff, in partnership with Contra Costa Transportation Authority ("CCTA"), have identified the Antioch L Street Pathway to Transit – Bicycle and Pedestrian Improvement ("Project") as a viable project to submit for this grant program;

WHEREAS, this grant requires a commitment of local funds in the amount of \$4,952,000;

WHEREAS, in summer 2022, CCTA led a multi-agency, collaborative effort to submit the "Bicycle and Pedestrian Safety Improvements to Improve Equity Countywide in Contra Costa Project Application" to the U.S. Department of Transportation's ("USDOT's") Safe Streets and Roads for All ("SS4A") Discretionary Grant Program;

WHEREAS, in February 2023, the USDOT announced that the CCTA had been awarded \$28.9 million to deliver five projects that make neighborhoods throughout the county safer to walk and bike in;

WHEREAS, the Project, a City component of the overarching CCTA project, will construct improvements on L Street between West 9th Street and Sycamore Drive to increase pedestrian and bicycle accessibility;

WHEREAS, the Project will widen the roadway between 10th and 18th Streets, construct concrete curb, gutter and sidewalk, construct ADA compliant curb ramps, reconfigure pavement striping, install new landscape and hardscape amenities and implement intersection improvements including traffic signal modifications at West 10th Street, West 18th Street and Sycamore Drive;

WHEREAS, the preliminary cost estimate for the project is currently estimated to be \$17,960,000;

WHEREAS, the SS4A grant amount dedicated to this project is \$13,008,000, and the proposed agreement commits the City to pay \$4,952,000 from other non-federal sources for the required match for the federal grant and for costs incurred by the CCTA for project management, and all phases of project delivery including environmental clearance, plans, specifications, and estimates (PS&E), right-of-way (ROW) and construction;

WHEREAS, the CCTA will be the lead in all phases of project delivery as required by the USDOT and Federal Highway Administration, the agency administering the grant program;

WHEREAS, the City has considered approving the Cooperative Agreement between the City of Antioch and the Contra Costa Transportation Authority for the L Street Pathway to Transit - Bicycle and Pedestrian Improvement Project;

I. PARTIES

A. THIS COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT ("Agreement") effective on [date], is made and entered into by and between the Contra Costa Transportation Authority (AUTHORITY) and the City of Antioch (CITY), (AUTHORITY and CITY may be referred to herein as a "Party" and collectively "Parties").

II. RECITALS

A. WHEREAS, CITY intends to build Phase 2 improvements on I. Street between 9th Street and Sycamore Drive, about 0.5-mile section. These improvements include new sidewalks under the railroad tracks and along the fairground, installing ADA compliant curb ramps, re-striping to allow for multi-modal facilities between 9th Street and Sycamore Drive, improving multimodal safety and operations along the corridor, and intersection improvements including traffic signal modifications at 10th Street, E18th Street and Sycamore Drive. Other improvements include new bus stops and bus shelters, trail access and connection to bike facilities and sidewalks (PROJECT) – a detailed description of the PROJECT is set forth in Attachment A; and

B. WHEREAS, the PROJECT will be designed and constructed using design-bid-build procurement method; and

C. WHEREAS, the CITY has agreed to contribute funds toward the PROJECT and has allocated \$4,952,000 from Local Funds, to pay for the required match for the Federal funds and for costs incurred by AUTHORITY for Project Management, and all phases of project delivery needed including Planning (including grant application and coordination with USDOT), completion of all necessary environmental review under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) (collectively "Environmental Clearance"), preparation of plans, specifications and estimates (PS&E), right-of-way (ROW) and Construction of the PROJECT; and

- D. WHEREAS, the AUTHORITY has secured \$13,008,000 in United States Department of Transportation (USDOT) funding from the Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) Discretionary Grant Program for the PROJECT; and
- E. WHEREAS, the Parties consider PROJECT to be a high priority project of mutual interest and are willing to cooperate in the implementation of the PROJECT; and
- F. WHEREAS, the Parties wish to enter into this Agreement to delineate roles, responsibilities, and funding commitments relative to the project development, ROW and construction phases of the PROJECT; and
- G. WHEREAS, the PROJECT is estimated to cost a total of \$17,960,000 as shown in ATTACHMENT B; and
- H. WHEREAS, the CITY desires the AUTHORITY provide project planning, delivery services and program management services for all PROJECT activities including coordination with USDOT on funding requirements and execution of PROJECT agreement(s), procurement of required consultants and contractors to complete all activities described in ATTACHMENT B, and oversight of said work, to access SS4A funding in the amount of \$13,008,000, and understands it is the sole responsibility of CITY to reimburse 100% of actual and reasonable AUTHORITY costs associated with these activities, within the maximum CITY funding amount specified herein; and
- I. WHEREAS, AUTHORITY will notify the CITY once the AUTHORITY learns that costs will exceed the estimated amount defined in ATTACHMENT B. Parties will negotiate increased CITY funding or other funding sources, or options to down scope the PROJECT to meet available funding, and
- J. WHEREAS, it is mutually understood that the PROJECT will likely proceed in phases including: (i) project planning, (ii) preliminary design and CEQA/NEPA environmental clearance, (iii) design (PS&E), ROW including utility relocations, and (iv) construction, construction management, and closeout. The work scope, budget and timelines of deliverables for each phase will be stipulated in individual task orders for each phase. The task order will define the advanced amount of funds required from the CITY for the phase being delivered. The advanced amount is necessary to meet the match requirement by the federal grant, reduce PROJECT administrative burden, and minimize cashflow impacts on the AUTHORITY, per ATTACHMENT C.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Parties agree to the following:

III. AUTHORITY RESPONSIBILITIES

AUTHORITY agrees:

- A. To provide planning and program management services for all PROJECT activities including coordination with USDOT on funding requirements and execution of PROJECT agreement(s), procurement of required consultants and contractors in accordance with applicable federal funding requirements to complete all activities described in ATTACHMENT B, inclusion of required federal clauses in all federally funded consultant and contractor agreements, and oversight of said work.
- B. To procure the services of a consultant team, in consultation with CITY, to prepare the environmental document (CEQA and NEPA), to develop 35%, 65%, 95%, and Final Plans, Specifications, & Estimates (PS&E), and to provide design support during construction, construction management, and closeout.
- C. To coordinate with CITY for CEQA and NEPA approval of the environmental document, as required, and support the CITY as the lead agency for both CEQA and NEPA.
- D. To provide utility coordination services and work with the CITY on required documents, utility relocations and agreements. Should there be ROW or easement acquisition, AUTHORITY will procure a consultant for right-of-way acquisition services. AUTHORITY will seek an amendment to cover the cost of these services.
- E. Left Blank Intentionally
- F. To designate a responsible staff member that will be AUTHORITY'S representative in attending all meetings between the parties or pertaining to the PROJECT, providing and receiving day-to-day communication.
- G. AUTHORITY Executive Director is authorized to act on behalf of AUTHORITY under this Agreement.
- H. To provide CITY an opportunity to review and comment on, and approve the project delivery documents including procurement documents, environmental documents, PS&E (at the various stages of completion), construction bid and construction administration documents, project budget and consultant contracts and costs.
- I. To provide CITY an opportunity to participate in consultant selection for services procured by AUTHORITY.
- J. To provide CITY an opportunity to review and comment on all PROJECT agreements entered into by AUTHORITY and pertaining to CITY.
- K. To provide no less than quarterly reports through the duration of the USDOT grant agreement performance period.

- L. To include CITY in Project Development Team (PDT) meetings and related communications on PROJECT progress as well as to provide CITY with copies of PDT meeting minutes and action items.
- M. Performance of services under the consultant and construction contracts for PROJECT shall be subject to the technical direction of the AUTHORITY's Executive Director, or designee, with input and consultation from CITY.
- N. To facilitate and coordinate obtaining required agreements from USDOT including authorization for expenditure of funds, prior to advertising for professional or construction contracts for PROJECT.
- O. To seek reimbursement from USDOT on work performed on any phase of the PROJECT which will be funded by Federal sources as shown in ATTACHMENT C. The actual cost of a specific phase may ultimately vary from the estimates provided and the final reimbursement amount shall be adjusted based on the Federal funding agreements.
- P. To prepare and submit invoices to CITY for expenditures related to planning activities incurred by AUTHORITY prior to execution of USDOT agreement.
- Q. To prepare and submit a Task Order to CITY , for CITY review and approval, describing the work scope, budget and timelines of deliverables prior to initiation of Project Development and Construction phases. The Task Order will define the amount of CITY funding commitment that will be advanced to AUTHORITY for the phase being delivered.
- R. To provide CITY an opportunity to review proposed contract change orders during construction which such approval shall be provided within two working days. Failure to respond within two working days constitutes a waiver of the right to object to the proposed change order.
- S. To establish and maintain an accounting system conforming to Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) to support AUTHORITY's request for reimbursement, payment vouchers, or invoices which segregate and accumulate costs of project management, Environmental Clearance, PS&E, ROW including utility relocations, construction, construction administration and closeout work elements and produce monthly reports which clearly identify reimbursable costs, matching fund costs, indirect cost allocation, and other allowable expenditures by AUTHORITY.
- T. To prepare a final accounting of expenditures, including a final invoice for the actual Project Management cost (AUTHORITY and Project Management Oversight staff), Environmental Clearance, PS&E, ROW, and construction costs expended for the PROJECT. The final accounting of expenditures and invoice shall be submitted no later than one hundred and twenty (120) calendar days following the completion of work including resolution of any claims and shall be submitted to CITY. The invoice shall include a statement that these PROJECT funds were used in conformance with this Agreement and USDOT requirements

and for all PROJECT-specific and support activities, as approved by CITY and described herein.

- U. To provide CITY copies of approved contractor invoices and payment vouchers no less than twice annually until PROJECT completion, but not to exceed quarterly.
- V. To cooperate in having a PROJECT-specific audit of all PROJECT expenditures if requested by the CITY. The audit is intended to justify and validate that all funds expended on the PROJECT were used in conformance with this Agreement. The auditor shall be selected by CITY.
- W. To reimburse CITY for costs that are determined by subsequent audit to be unallowable within ninety (90) calendar days of AUTHORITY receiving notice of audit findings, which time shall include an opportunity for AUTHORITY to respond to and/or resolve the finding. Should the finding not be otherwise resolved and AUTHORITY fails to reimburse monies due to CITY within ninety (90) calendar days of audit finding, or within such other period as may be agreed between both Parties hereto, in addition to any other right or remedy of the CITY under this Agreement or applicable law, the CITY reserves the right to withhold future payments for the PROJECT due to AUTHORITY from any source under CITY's control.
- X. To procure and maintain insurance coverage (or a program of self-insurance of equivalent character and coverage) of the types and in the amounts identified in ATTACHMENT D and name the CITY as an additional insured for all work performed by AUTHORITY on CITY's behalf. Further, AUTHORITY will ensure that all consultants and subconsultants hired to perform work on the PROJECT name the CITY as an additional insured and procure and maintain insurance coverage of the types and in the amounts identified in ATTACHMENT D, and that all such consultants and subconsultants agree to indemnify the CITY to the same extent that indemnification is provided to AUTHORITY.
- Y. To attend City Council, Committee, Commission, and public meetings to present design recommendations, PROJECT updates and other information, as needed provided sufficient notice is given.

IV. CITY RESPONSIBILITIES

CITY agrees:

- A. To jointly enter into utility agreements with Authority and any affected utilities if utility facilities need to be relocated or new service connections are required to facilitate the PROJECT, acknowledging that the PROJECT represents a "proper governmental use" of any public street affected by the PROJECT and thus utilities will be responsible for any relocation required on such street pursuant to and subject to the terms of the applicable utilities' franchise agreements.

- B. To enter into any required maintenance agreements, subject to terms acceptable to the CITY, and prepare, acquire and execute any required easements for PROJECT prior to construction.
- C. To pay an advancement to AUTHORITY for estimated costs for each phase of the PROJECT as specified in Task Order submitted by AUTHORITY and approved by the CITY. The actual cost of a specific phase may ultimately vary from the estimates provided in ATTACHMENT B; however, under no circumstances is the total combined CITY contribution to exceed \$4,952,000 without an amendment to this Agreement.
- D. When conducting an audit of the costs claimed under the provisions of this Agreement, to rely to the maximum extent possible on any prior audit of AUTHORITY performed pursuant to the provisions of State and Federal laws. In the absence of such an audit, work of other auditors will be relied upon to the extent that work is acceptable to CITY when planning on conducting additional audits.
- E. To act as Lead Agency for purposes of CEQA/NEPA, as applicable.
- F. To designate a responsible staff member that will be CITY's representative in attending all meetings between the parties or pertaining to the PROJECT, receiving day-to-day communication and reviewing the PROJECT documents.
- G. To review and provide comments on Environmental Clearance document, PS&E, construction bids, construction management contract and closeout documents within 30 working days, or other durations as mutually agreed between Parties, of receiving the review request from AUTHORITY.
- H. City Manager is authorized to act on behalf of CITY under this Agreement, to the extent approved by City Council.
- I. Subject to applicable law and funding restrictions, CITY has the ultimate authority to make final decisions on changes to the design and procurement methods.
- J. To formally accept the PROJECT through City Council action following completion.
- K. To facilitate public meetings, meetings with the City Council, Committees, Commissions and the public regarding the PROJECT.
- L. To make reasonable efforts to secure funding and reimburse the AUTHORITY for cost increases on the PROJECT. Upon notification by the AUTHORITY of cost increases, CITY will secure the funding or negotiate with AUTHORITY to reduce the scope if additional funding is not available.

V. MUTUAL RESPONSIBILITIES

The Parties agree:

A. Performance Period

a. This Agreement shall go into effect on (DATE) (the "Effective Date"). This Agreement shall end 12 months following acceptance of the PROJECT by the CITY and reimbursement of all costs to AUTHORITY, unless extended by written amendment. See article H under Section V.

B. To abide by all applicable federal, state and local laws and regulations pertaining to the PROJECT as of the Effective Date of this Agreement.

C. To abide by all Terms and Conditions contained in the Agreement between USDOT and AUTHORITY for the programming and authorization to expend funding from the fiscal year 2022 Safe Streets and Roads for All Grant program. (ATTACHMENT D).

D. In the event AUTHORITY determines cost for any PROJECT phase work may exceed the amounts identified in Attachment B of this Agreement, AUTHORITY shall inform CITY of this determination and thereafter the Parties shall work together in an attempt to agree upon an amendment to either modify the scope of the PROJECT or the amounts identified in this Agreement, or both. Under no circumstances is the total CITY contribution to exceed \$4,952,000 without an amendment to this Agreement.

E. Eligible PROJECT reimbursements shall include only those costs incurred by AUTHORITY for PROJECT-specific work activities that are described in this Agreement.

F. Neither AUTHORITY nor any officer, director, employee or agent thereof is responsible for any injury, damage or liability occurring or arising by reason of anything done or omitted to be done by CITY and under or in connection with any work, authority or jurisdiction delegated to CITY under this Agreement. It is understood and agreed that, pursuant to Government Code Section 895.4, CITY shall fully defend, indemnify and save harmless AUTHORITY, its officers, directors, employees or agents from all claims, suits or actions of every name, kind and description brought for or on account of injury (as defined by Government Code Section 810.8) occurring by reason of anything done or omitted to be done by CITY under or in connection with any work, authority or jurisdiction delegated to CITY under this Agreement.

G. Neither CITY nor any officer, director, employee or agent thereof is responsible for any injury, damage or liability occurring or arising by reason of anything done or omitted to be done by AUTHORITY and under or in connection with any work, authority or jurisdiction delegated to AUTHORITY under this Agreement. It is understood and agreed that, pursuant to Government Code Section 895.4, AUTHORITY shall fully defend, indemnify and save harmless CITY, its officers, directors, employees or agents from all claims, suits or actions of every name, kind and description brought for or on account of injury (as defined by Government Code Section 810.8) occurring by reason of anything done or omitted to be done

by AUTHORITY, its officers, employees, consultants, contractors or agents under or in connection with any work, authority or jurisdiction delegated to AUTHORITY under this Agreement.

- H. This Agreement shall end 12 months following acceptance of the PROJECT by the CITY and reimbursement of all costs to AUTHORITY, unless extended by written amendment, except that the indemnification provisions shall remain in effect until terminated or modified, in writing, by mutual agreement. Notwithstanding any other provision herein, to the extent consistent with the terms and obligations hereof, any Party may terminate this Agreement at any time, with or without cause, by giving thirty (30) calendar days written notice to all the other Parties. In the event of a termination, the Party terminating this Agreement shall be liable for any costs or other non-cancellable obligations it may have incurred or the non-terminating Party may have incurred for the benefit of the terminating Party under the terms of the Agreement prior to termination. In the case of such termination, the AUTHORITY shall transfer ownership of all work product developed under this Agreement to the CITY and shall, at the CITY's request, assign consultant or contractor agreements related to the PROJECT and entered into by the AUTHORITY hereunder to the CITY.
- I. The Recitals to this Agreement are true and correct and are incorporated into this Agreement.
- J. All signatories hereto warrant that they are duly authorized to execute this Agreement on behalf of said Parties and that by executing this Agreement, the Parties hereto are formally bound to this Agreement.
- K. Except on subjects preempted by federal law, this Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California. Venue shall be in Contra Costa County. All Parties agree to follow all local, state, and federal laws and ordinances with respect to the performance of this Agreement.
- L. The Parties agree that each Party and any authorized representative, designated in writing to the Parties, and upon reasonable notice, shall have the right during normal business hours to examine all Parties' financial books and records with respect to this Agreement. The Parties agree to retain their books and records for a period of three (3) years from the later of; a) the date on which this Agreement terminates; or b) the date on which such book or record was created.
- M. If any clause or provision of this Agreement is illegal, invalid or unenforceable under applicable present or future laws, then it is the intention of the Parties that the remainder of this Agreement shall not be affected but shall remain in full force and effect.
- N. This Agreement cannot be amended or modified in any way except in writing, signed by all Parties hereto.
- O. Neither this Agreement, nor any of the Parties' rights, obligations, duties, or authority hereunder may be assigned in whole or in part by either Party without the prior written consent of the other Party in its sole, and absolute, discretion. Any such attempt of assignment shall be deemed void and of no force and effect.

- P. No waiver of any default shall constitute a waiver of any other default whether of the same or other covenant or condition. No waiver, benefit, privilege, or service voluntarily given or performed by a Party shall give the other Party any contractual rights by custom, estoppel, or otherwise.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION & PROPOSED IMPROVEMENTS

The project will build Phase 2 improvements on L Street between 9th Street and Sycamore Drive in the City of Antioch, about 0.5-mile section. These improvements include new sidewalks under the railroad tracks and along the fairground, installing ADA compliant curb ramps, re-striping to allow for multi-modal facilities between 9th Street and Sycamore Drive, improving multimodal safety and operations along the corridor, and intersection improvements including traffic signal modifications at 10th Street, E18th Street and Sycamore Drive. Other improvements include new bus stops and bus shelters, trail access and connection to bike facilities and sidewalks. "L" Street is on a Tri-Delta Transit bus route that serves and connects the PDA and the Equity Priority Area and serves Contra Costa County low and moderate housing development around "J" Street. "L" Street terminates at the entrance to the existing multi use Delta Trail/waterfront promenade which connects and serves the Antioch Amtrak Station.

Insurance Requirements

[Contractor or Consultant] shall not commence work for the Authority until it has secured all insurance required under this Section and has provided evidence satisfactory to the Authority. In addition, [Contractor or Consultant] shall not allow any subconsultant to commence work on any subcontract until it has secured all insurance required under this Section.

a. Commercial General Liability

(i) [Contractor or Consultant] shall take out and maintain, during the performance of all work under this Agreement, in amounts not less than specified herein, Commercial General Liability Insurance, in a form and with insurance companies acceptable to the Authority.

(ii) Coverage for Commercial General Liability insurance shall be at least as broad as the following:

(1) Insurance Services Office Commercial General Liability coverage (Occurrence Form CG 00 01) or exact equivalent.

(iii) Commercial General Liability Insurance must include coverage for the following:

(1) Bodily Injury and Property Damage

(2) Personal Injury/Advertising Injury

(3) Premises/Operations Liability

(4) Products/Completed Operations Liability

(5) Aggregate Limits that Apply per Project

(6) Explosion, Collapse and Underground exclusion deleted

(7) Contractual Liability with respect to this Agreement

(8) Property Damage

(9) Independent Consultants Coverage

(iv) The policy shall contain no endorsements or provisions limiting coverage for: (1) contractual liability; (2) cross liability exclusion for claims or suits by one insured against another; (3) products/completed operations liability; or (4) contain any other exclusion contrary to the Agreement.

(v) The policy shall give the Authority, the City, their officials, officers, employees, agents and the Authority designated volunteers additional insured status using ISO endorsement forms CG 20 10 10 01 and 20 37 10 01, or endorsements providing the exact same coverage.

(vi) The general liability program may utilize either deductibles or provide coverage excess of a self-insured retention, subject to written approval by the Authority, and provided that such deductibles shall not apply to the Authority as an additional insured.

b. Automobile Liability

(i) At all times during the performance of the work under this Agreement, [Contractor or Consultant] shall maintain Automobile Liability Insurance for bodily injury and property damage including coverage for owned, non-owned and hired vehicles, in a form and with insurance companies acceptable to the Authority.

(ii) Coverage for automobile liability insurance shall be at least as broad as Insurance Services Office Form Number CA 00 01 covering automobile liability (Coverage Symbol 1, any auto).

(iii) The policy shall give the Authority, the City, their officials, officers, employees, agents and Authority designated volunteers additional insured status.

(iv) The business automobile liability program may utilize either deductibles or provide coverage excess of a self-insured retention, subject to written approval by the Authority, and provided that such deductibles shall not apply to the Authority as an additional insured.

c. Workers' Compensation/Employer's Liability

EXHIBIT "1"

(i) [Contractor or Consultant] certifies that he/she is aware of the provisions of Section 3700 of the California Labor Code, which requires every employer to be insured against liability for workers' compensation or to undertake self-insurance in accordance with the provisions of that code, and he/she will comply with such provisions before commencing work under this Agreement.

(ii) To the extent [Contractor or Consultant] has employees at any time during the term of this Agreement, at all times during the performance of the work under this Agreement, [Contractor or Consultant] shall maintain full compensation insurance for all persons employed directly by him/her to carry out the work contemplated under this Agreement, all in accordance with the "Workers' Compensation and Insurance Act," Division IV of the Labor Code of the State of California and any acts amendatory thereof, and Employer's Liability Coverage in amounts indicated herein. [Contractor or Consultant] shall require all subconsultants to obtain and maintain, for the period required by this Agreement, workers' compensation coverage of the same type and limits as specified in this Section.

d. Professional Liability (Errors and Omissions)

At all times during the performance of the work under this Agreement [Contractor or Consultant] shall maintain professional liability or Errors and Omissions insurance appropriate to its profession, in a form and with insurance companies acceptable to the Authority and in an amount indicated herein. This insurance shall be endorsed to include contractual liability applicable to this Agreement and shall be written on a policy form coverage specifically designed to protect against acts, errors or omissions of [Contractor or Consultant]. "Covered Professional Services" as designated in the policy must specifically include work performed under this Agreement. The policy must "pay on behalf of" the insured and must include a provision establishing the insurer's duty to defend.

e. Pollution Liability [DELETE SECTION IF NOT APPLICABLE]

(i) Pollution Liability is required should any of the Services involve pollutants or hazardous materials. Liability coverage shall include coverage for the environmental risks associated with the Project and expenses related to such, including bodily injury, property damage, on and off site clean-up, transporting, carrying or storing pollutants, and coverage for non-owned disposal sites.

(ii) The policy shall give the Authority, the City, their officials, officers, employees, agents and Authority designated volunteers additional insured status.

(iii) The pollution liability program may utilize either deductibles or provide coverage excess of a self-insured retention, subject to written approval by the Authority, and provided that such deductibles shall not apply to the Authority as an additional insured.

f. Minimum Policy Limits Required

(i) The following insurance limits are required for the Agreement:

Commercial General Liability \$2,000,000 per occurrence/\$4,000,000 aggregate for bodily injury, personal injury, and property damage

Automobile Liability \$1,000,000 combined single limit

Employer's Liability \$1,000,000 per occurrence

Professional Liability \$3,000,000 per claim and aggregate (errors and omissions)

(ii) Defense costs shall be payable in addition to the limits.

(iii) Requirements of specific coverage or limits contained in this Section are not intended as a limitation on coverage, limits, or other requirement, or a waiver of any coverage normally provided by any insurance. Any available coverage shall be provided to the parties required to be named as Additional Insured pursuant to this Agreement.

g. Evidence Required

Prior to execution of the Agreement, [Contractor or Consultant] shall file with the Authority evidence of insurance from an insurer or insurers certifying to the coverage of all insurance required herein. Such evidence shall include original copies of the ISO CG 00 01 (or insurer's equivalent) signed by the insurer's representative and Certificate of Insurance (Acord Form 25-S or equivalent), together with required endorsements. All evidence of insurance shall be signed by a properly authorized officer, agent, or qualified representative of the insurer and shall certify the names of the insured, any additional insureds, where appropriate, the type and amount of the insurance, the location and operations to which the insurance applies, and the expiration date of such insurance.

h. Policy Provisions Required

(i) [Contractor or Consultant] shall provide the Authority at least thirty (30) calendar days prior written notice of cancellation of any policy required by this Agreement, except that [Contractor or Consultant] shall provide at least ten (10) calendar days prior written notice of cancellation of any such policy due to non-payment of premium. If any of the required coverage is cancelled or expires during the term of this Agreement, [Contractor or Consultant] shall deliver renewal certificate(s) including the General Liability Additional Insured Endorsement to the Authority at least ten (10) calendar days prior to the effective date of cancellation or expiration.

(ii) The Commercial General Liability Policy, Automobile Liability Policy and Pollution Liability Policy shall each contain a provision stating that [Contractor or Consultant]'s policy is primary insurance and that any insurance, self-insurance or other coverage maintained by the Authority, City or any named insureds shall not be called upon to contribute to any loss.

(iii) The retroactive date (if any) of each policy is to be no later than the effective date of this Agreement. [Contractor or Consultant] shall maintain such coverage continuously for a period of at least three (3) years after the completion of the work under this Agreement. [Contractor or Consultant] shall purchase a one (1) year extended reporting period

A) if the retroactive date is advanced past the effective date of this Agreement; B) if the policy is cancelled or not renewed; or C) if the policy is replaced by another claims-made policy with a retroactive date subsequent to the effective date of this Agreement.

(iv) All required insurance coverages, except for the professional liability coverage, shall contain or be endorsed to waiver of subrogation in favor of the Authority, the City, their officials, officers, employees, agents, and volunteers or shall specifically allow [Contractor or Consultant] or others providing insurance evidence in compliance with these specifications to waive their right of recovery prior to a loss. [Contractor or Consultant] hereby waives its own right of recovery against the Authority, and shall require similar written express waivers and insurance clauses from each of its subconsultants.

(v) The limits set forth herein shall apply separately to each insured against whom claims are made or suits are brought, except with respect to the limits of liability. Further the limits set forth herein shall not be construed to relieve [Contractor or

Consultant] from liability in excess of such coverage, nor shall it limit [Contractor or Consultant]'s indemnification obligations to the Authority or City and shall not preclude the Authority from taking such other actions available to the Authority under other provisions of the Agreement or law.

i. Qualifying Insurers

(i) All policies required shall be issued by acceptable insurance companies, as determined by the Authority, which satisfy the following minimum requirements:

(1) Each such policy shall be from a company or companies with a current A.M. Best's rating of no less than A:VII and admitted to transact in the business of insurance in the State of California, or otherwise allowed to place insurance through surplus line brokers under applicable provisions of the California Insurance Code or any federal law.

j. Additional Insurance Provisions

(i) The foregoing requirements as to the types and limits of insurance coverage to be maintained by [Contractor or Consultant], and any approval of said insurance by the Authority, is not intended to and shall not in any manner limit or qualify the liabilities and obligations otherwise assumed by [Contractor or Consultant] pursuant to this Agreement, including but not limited to, the provisions concerning indemnification.

(ii) If at any time during the life of the Agreement, any policy of insurance required under this Agreement does not comply with these specifications or is canceled and not replaced, the Authority has the right but not the duty to obtain the insurance

it deems necessary and any premium paid by the Authority will be promptly reimbursed by [Contractor or Consultant] or the Authority will withhold amounts sufficient to pay premium from [Contractor or Consultant] payments. In the alternative, the Authority may cancel this Agreement.

(iii) The Authority may require [Contractor or Consultant] to provide complete copies of all insurance policies in effect for the duration of the Project.

(iv) Neither the Authority, the City nor any of their officials, officers, employees, agents or volunteers shall be personally responsible for any liability arising under or by virtue of this Agreement.

k. Subconsultant Insurance Requirements [Contractor or Consultant] shall not allow any subconsultants to commence work on any subcontract until they have provided evidence satisfactory to the Authority that they have secured all insurance required under this Section. Policies of commercial general liability insurance provided by such subconsultants shall be endorsed to name the Authority and the City as an additional insured using ISO form CG 20 38 04 13 or an endorsement providing the exact same coverage. If requested by [Contractor or Consultant], the Authority may approve in writing different scopes or minimum limits of insurance for particular subconsultants.

Indemnification

a. To the fullest extent permitted by law, [Contractor or Consultant] shall defend (with counsel of the Authority's choosing), indemnify and hold the Authority, the City, their officials, officers, employees, volunteers, and agents free and harmless from any and all claims, demands, causes of action, costs, expenses, liability, loss, damage or injury of any kind, in law or equity, to property or persons, including wrongful death, in any manner arising out of, pertaining to, or incident to any acts, errors or omissions, or willful misconduct of [Contractor or Consultant], its officials, officers, employees, subconsultants or agents in connection with the performance of [Contractor or Consultant]'s Services, the Project or this Agreement, including without limitation the payment of all damages, expert witness fees and attorney's fees and other related costs and expenses. Consultant's obligation to indemnify shall not be restricted to insurance proceeds, if any, received by [Contractor or Consultant], the Authority, the City, their officials, officers, employees, agents, or volunteers.

b. If [Contractor or Consultant]'s obligation to defend, indemnify, and/or hold harmless arises out of [Contractor or Consultant]'s performance of "design professional" services (as that term is defined under Civil Code Section 2782.8), then, and only to the extent required by Civil Code Section 2782.8, which is fully incorporated herein, [Contractor or

Consultant]'s indemnification obligation shall be limited to claims that arise out of, pertain to, or relate to the negligence, recklessness, or willful misconduct of [Contractor or Consultant], and upon [Contractor or Consultant] obtaining a final adjudication by a court of competent jurisdiction, [Contractor or Consultant]'s liability for such claim, including the cost to defend, shall not exceed [Contractor or Consultant]'s proportionate percentage of fault.

California Labor Code Requirements

a. [Contractor or Consultant] is aware of the requirements of California Labor Code Sections 1720 et seq. and 1770 et seq., which require the payment of prevailing wage rates and the performance of other requirements on certain "public works" and "maintenance" projects (Prevailing Wage Laws). If the Services are being performed as part of an applicable "public works" or "maintenance" project, as defined by the Prevailing Wage Laws, and if the total compensation is \$1,000 or more, [Contractor or Consultant] agrees to fully comply with such Prevailing Wage Laws. [Contractor or Consultant] shall defend, indemnify and hold the Authority, its officials, officers, employees and agents free and harmless from any claims, liabilities, costs, penalties or interest arising out of any failure or alleged failure to comply with the Prevailing Wage Laws. It shall be mandatory upon [Contractor or Consultant] and all subconsultants to comply with all California Labor Code provisions, which include but are not limited to prevailing wages (Labor Code Sections 1771, 1774 and 1775), employment of apprentices (Labor Code Section 1777.5), certified payroll records (Labor Code Section 1771.4 and 1776), hours of labor (Labor Code Sections 1813 and 1815) and debarment of contractors and subcontractors (Labor Code Section 1777.1). The requirement to submit certified payroll records directly to the Labor Commissioner under Labor Code section 1771.4 shall not apply to work performed on a public works project that is exempt pursuant to the small project exemption specified in Labor Code Section 1771.4.

b. If the Services are being performed as part of an applicable "public works" or "maintenance" project, then pursuant to Labor Code Sections 1725.5 and 1771.1, [Contractor or Consultant] and all subconsultants performing such Services must be registered with the Department of Industrial Relations (DIR). [Contractor or Consultant] shall maintain registration for the duration of the Project and require the same of any subconsultants, as applicable. This Project may also be subject to compliance monitoring and enforcement by the DIR. It shall be [Contractor or Consultant]'s sole responsibility to comply with all applicable registration and labor compliance requirements. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the contractor registration requirements mandated by Labor Code Sections 1725.5 and 1771.1 shall not apply to work performed on a public works project that is exempt pursuant to the small project exemption specified in Labor Code Sections 1725.5 and 1771.1.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

It is recommended that the City Council adopt a resolution:

1. Awarding the maintenance services agreement to Clean Lakes Inc. for aquatic vegetation management at the Antioch Municipal Reservoir for up to 5 years for a total amount of up to \$815,401.50 consisting of \$163,080.30 per calendar year for three years totaling \$489,240.90 and an option to extend an additional two (2) years totaling \$326,160.60; and
2. Authorizing the Acting City Manager to execute the agreement with Clean Lakes Inc. in a form approved by the City Attorney.

FISCAL IMPACT

Funding for the agreement with Clean Lakes Inc. to perform aquatic vegetation management for the Antioch Municipal Reservoir is included in the fiscal year 2023/24 and fiscal year 2024/25 Water Enterprise Fund operating budget. Funding for subsequent years of the agreement will be requested as part of the City's biennial budget process.

DISCUSSION

The City of Antioch owns and operates a 53-acre reservoir located directly east of the northern end of Golf Course Road. This facility is used for treating potable water for the community. The aquatic vegetation growth within the reservoir has become unappealing and harbors an environment for unwanted vegetative growth.

This maintenance services agreement provides ongoing assessments of aquatic vegetation growth stages, recommendations regarding preventative treatment of aquatic vegetation and treatment of aquatic vegetation before it can become problematic for community aesthetics or the drinking water supply.

On December 8, 2023, City staff posted a request for qualifications on the City's website, builders exchange email lists, and directly contacted three (3) firms requesting qualifications for aquatic vegetation management.

On January 19, 2024, qualifications were received from one (1) contractor, Clean Lakes Inc., for the desired contracting services. Based on the content of the qualifications, Clean Lakes Inc. was selected as the qualified firm to provide the services required for the Project. Staff has subsequently met with representatives from Clean Lakes Inc. to develop the attached scope of work and cost proposal.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION: Clean Lakes, Inc. (CLI) is submitting this proposal in response to the Antioch Municipal Reservoir Aquatic Vegetation Management Request for Qualifications P.W. 453-2.

COVER LETTER: A Cover Letter has been included with this Proposal.

INTRODUCTION: CLI understands this project will include furnishing all labor, equipment and materials necessary to prevent the growth of aquatic vegetation and treat the reservoir for algae as needed within the 53 acre Antioch Municipal Reservoir. CLI's Pest Control Advisor (PCA) will provide recommendations for ongoing treatments or services to control the aquatic vegetation growth in the reservoir to achieve the city's goal of maintaining and improving the beneficial uses of the reservoir while complying with the regulatory environment as it applies to the management activities. CLI is familiar with the site characteristics from historical treatments our company has performed on Antioch Municipal Reservoir since 2016.

Clean Lakes, Inc. (CLI) staff has been providing aquatic ecosystem restoration and maintenance services to governmental and private sector clients worldwide since the 1970's. The scope of services provided by CLI includes collaborating in research and development, development of aquatic vegetation management programs, environmental monitoring of aquatic plant communities, aquatic ecosystem mapping, implementing invasive species control programs (mechanical, biological, and through the use of US-EPA approved aquatic herbicides and algaecides), as well as services in marsh restoration, aquatic plant control, and water quality monitoring. Our expertise also extends to compliance with laws and regulations including regulatory matters associated with the Pesticide General Permit (PGP) implemented under state or federal National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) requirements. CLI's corporate office is located in Martinez, CA.

SCOPE OF WORK: CLI's Scope of Services for this project includes all of the tasks required to prevent the growth of aquatic vegetation and treat the reservoir for algae as needed within the Antioch's 53 acre Municipal Reservoir through the use of US-EPA approved aquatic herbicides and algaecides. CLI's Pest Control Advisor (PCA) will provide recommendations for ongoing

treatments or services to control aquatic vegetation growth in the reservoir to achieve the project goals.

Reservoir Surveys: Based on historical data and work experience on Antioch Municipal Reservoir, CLI recommends performing monthly surveys throughout the year to understand and monitor the current conditions of the reservoir. The ultimate goal performing monthly surveys is to identify vegetation species, growth areas, % coverage and or algae blooms in the early stages so that control measures can be implemented prior to nuisance growths developing. The data collected from the monthly surveys will be used to develop treatment plans based on current conditions and discussions with the City.

Submerged Aquatic Vegetation Control: CLI recommends performing early season fluridone treatments for the control of submerged aquatic vegetation. An initial 20 part per billion (ppb) fluridone application would be performed when the target plants growth stage warrants treatment (early spring). A 10 ppb bump treatment would be performed approximately 20 to 30 days following the initial application. The early season fluridone treatments have the potential to control the submerged vegetation for the season. Any mid to late season nuisance growths of submerged aquatic vegetation would be spot treated with an approved aquatic herbicide. The initial fluridone treatment followed up by spot treatments using contact herbicides would achieve a slow plant die off that will have low impacts on the treatment plant operations. There are no drinking water use restrictions with fluridone applications under 20 ppb.

Algae Control: Planktonic or filamentous algae growths would be identified during monthly surveys and addressed based on densities with a SeClear Algaecide and Water Quality Enhancer) or Cutrine Plus algaecide to keep small infestations from becoming whole lake issues, if possible (SeClear Product Label attached).

Nutrient Inactivation: Algae issues within the reservoir are primarily driven by high nutrient levels within the water body causing algae blooms to occur. CLI recommends being proactive and performing nutrient deactivation treatments to decrease the amount of phosphorus in the water column using EutroSORB WC, a proprietary aqueous blend of phosphate binding minerals

for rapid and permanent inactivation of phosphorus from the water column. This will not eliminate algae blooms or eliminate the need to use algaecides, but would rather help reduce nutrient levels within the water column, and potentially algae bloom density, frequency, and algaecide usage. EutroSORB WC is very effective at binding phosphorus. Each PDU of EutroSORB WC will inactivate 0.1 lbs. of phosphorus from the water column. It only takes 10 PDUs of EutroSORB WC to inactivate one (1) 1 lb. of phosphorus rapidly and permanently. One (1) pound of phosphorus in water can support 500 pounds of algae growth. CLI will provide all herbicides and algaecides required for this project. This work plan is broken down with a schedule below.

PROJECT SCHEDULE: The sequential specific tasks required to complete the project are outlined as follows:

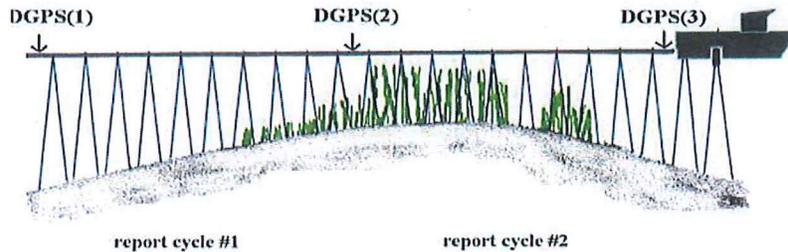
- **Task 1:** Perform monthly surveys of the Antioch Reservoir to ensure an accurate assessment of the aquatic vegetation growth conditions present prior to the start of work. The monthly (pretreatment survey) survey will also provide a baseline for comparison to a post monthly survey (post treatment).

- Aquatic Plant Monitoring Monthly:
CLI will utilize Submerged Aquatic Vegetation (SAV) mapping technology (BioBase System) to record SAV characteristics in the treatment areas. This will be performed using a Lowrance HDS-10 Digital Echo sounder System with a Structure Scan Module to record data of the aquatic weed profile in the control plots Pre-

Treatment. Data will be collected in both the SLG (traditional sonar on HDS line) and the .SL2 (multi-channel structure scan) formats as outlined below:



The data collected will be processed for treatment and monthly comparison data. This survey and the data to be collected will be utilized to evaluate Pre-Treatment aquatic vegetation coverage, height in the water column, and bio-volume to support Post-Treatment efficacy evaluations.

- The Monthly SAV mapping data will be used to support the development of submerged aquatic vegetation treatment maps.
- The Monthly SAV survey support the documentation of pre and post-treatment data to evaluate control efficacy.
- Task 1 will be performed 1 time per month.

- **Task 2:** Following the completion and review of the Monthly survey data, CLI will submit monthly reports with the survey data collected and recommend any actions required to prevent nuisance aquatic vegetation and algae issues.

- **Task 3 (March – April):** Perform fluridone aquatic vegetation or algae control treatments if required. Evaluate and if desired perform the spring EutroSORB application.

- **Task 4 (June – September):** Perform spot treatments on areas with submerged aquatic vegetation regrowth, perform algae treatments as required, evaluate and if desired perform the summer EutroSORB application.

- **Task 5 (October – February):** Aquatic vegetation and algae growth issues should be minimal during this time period. Monthly surveys will be performed for aquatic vegetation and potential algae blooms. Treatments may be needed to keep small vegetation areas from becoming lake wide issues. Evaluate and if desired perform the fall EutroSORB application.
- **Option Task 6:** The EutroSORB applications as outlined above would be optional, and would be geared to support the overall reduction in nutrient levels within the reservoir, and in turn would have the potential over time to support the reduction in algae growth.

EQUIPMENT TO BE USED: CLI's Vessels equipped with the Littline Variable-Depth Water Injection System. CLI would utilize one of our survey vessels equipped with mapping survey technology to perform the monthly survey.

SUBJECT: Agreement with Westside Landscape & Concrete, Inc. for Firebreak Mowing and Disking Services – Proposal No. 988-0221-24A

RECOMMENDED ACTION

It is recommended that the City Council adopt a resolution:

1. Awarding a Maintenance Services Agreement for Firebreak Mowing and Disking Services throughout the City to Westside Landscape & Concrete, Inc.;
2. Approving the agreement with Westside Landscape & Concrete, Inc. of Newman, CA for a three (3) year term for an amount up to \$581,349 with an option to extend two (2) additional years for an amount up to \$391,566 for a total contract amount not to exceed \$972,915 over a five (5) year period;
3. Authorizing the Acting City Manager to execute the agreement in a form approved by the City Attorney; and
4. Authorizing the Acting City Manager to make the necessary budget amendment to the approved operating budgets in the additional amounts of \$28,000 in FY 2023/24 and \$29,000 in FY 2024/25 for Firebreak Mowing and Disking Services.

FISCAL IMPACT

Funding for the Firebreak Disking and Mowing Services Project ("Project") is allocated within the Street Light and Landscape Maintenance Fund, General Fund, and Water Enterprise Fund. Due to price increases for services, a budget amendment is required to the approved FY 2023/24 budget in the amount of \$28,000 and to the approved FY 2024/25 in the amount of \$29,000 budget to complete all needed firebreak services. Funding for the remaining years of the agreement will be subject to the biennial budget approval process.

DISCUSSION

The City of Antioch contracts for weed abatement and vegetation management of City owned open spaces to maintain a minimum of 30 or 60 feet between public open spaces

and privately owned properties. The program minimum standards are mandated and inspected by Contra Costa County Fire Protection District (“CCCFPD”) on or before July 1st of each year. Future changes to the mandate will be paid for under the contingency component of the contract.

The City’s firebreak and disking areas are specifically defined under the contract. Open spaces are mowed with flail mowers and disking equipment. Areas that are not accessible by powered mowing and disking equipment are made fire safe with handwork. Future new developments with City accepted maintenance areas will be added under the contingency component for ‘Flail Mowing’ and ‘Disking’ operated equipment and ‘Handwork’ since they are not included in the existing defined areas of the contract. Some additional extra hours may be needed due to unpredictable weather conditions, new developments and additional CCCFPD mandates.

Staff published the Firebreak Mowing and Disking Services Request for Proposal (“RFP”) on January 24, 2024. The proposal was distributed via the local newspaper, builders exchange email lists, and on the City’s website. This RFP closed on February 21, 2024. Public Works received three (3) qualified, complete, and competitive proposal submittals.

Staff scored all proposals and determined that Westside Landscape & Concrete, Inc. of Newman, CA provides the best value for Firebreak Mowing and Disking Services. The recommended action is to award the contract to Westside Landscape & Concrete, Inc. as described in the Draft Maintenance Service Agreement attached hereto as Exhibit 1.

WHEREAS, the City maintains various open space parcels of land throughout the City;

The proposal was distributed via the local newspaper, builders exchange email list, and on the City's website. This RFP closed on February 21, 2024. Public Works received three (3) qualified, complete and competitive proposal submittals;

WHEREAS, staff members scored all proposals and determined that Westside Landscape & Concrete, Inc. of Newman, CA provides the best value to the City of Antioch for Firebreak Mowing and Disking Services in an amount of \$847,915 and \$125,000 in contingency work for a total amount not to exceed \$972,915; and

WHEREAS, the City has considered authorizing the Acting City Manager to make the necessary budget amendment to the approved operating budgets in the additional amounts of \$28,000 in FY 2023/24 and \$29,000 in FY 2024/25 for Firebreak Mowing and Disking Services and to execute the agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council of the City of Antioch, hereby:

1. Awards the Maintenance Services Agreement for Firebreak Mowing and Disking Services throughout the City to Westside Landscape & Concrete, Inc;
2. Approves the Agreement with Westside Landscape & Concrete, Inc. of Newman, CA for a three (3) year term for an amount up to \$581,349 with an option to extend two (2) additional years for an amount up to \$391,566 for a total contract amount not to exceed \$972,915 over a five (5) year period;
3. Authorizes the Acting City Manager to execute the Agreement in a form approved by the City Attorney; and
4. Authorizes the Acting City Manager to make the necessary budget amendments in the additional amounts of \$28,000 in FY 2023/24 and \$29,000 in FY 2024/25 for Firebreak Mowing and Disking Services.

CITY OF ANTIOCH MAINTENANCE SERVICES AGREEMENT

1. PARTIES AND DATE.

This Agreement ("**Agreement**") is made and entered into this 12th day of March, 2024 ("**Effective Date**") by and between the City of Antioch, a municipal corporation organized under the laws of the State of California with its principal place of business at 200 H Street, Antioch California 94509 ("**City**") and Westside Landscape & Concrete, Inc., with its principal place of business at 27107 CA-33, Newman CA, 95360 ("**Contractor**"). City and Contractor are sometimes individually referred to as "**Party**" and collectively as "**Parties**" in this Agreement.

2. RECITALS.

2.1 Contractor.

Contractor desires to perform and assume responsibility for the provision of certain maintenance services required by the City on the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement. Contractor represents that it is experienced in providing Firebreak Mowing and Disking services to public clients, that it and its employees or subcontractors have all necessary licenses and permits to perform the Services in the State of California, and that is familiar with the plans of City. Contractor shall not subcontract any portion of the work required by this Agreement, except as expressly stated herein, without prior written approval of City. Subcontracts, if any, shall contain a provision making them subject to all provisions stipulated in this Agreement.

2.2 Project.

City desires to engage Contractor to render such services for the Firebreak Mowing and Disking project ("Project") as set forth in this Agreement.

3. TERMS.

3.1 Scope of Services and Term.

3.1.1 General Scope of Services. Contractor promises and agrees to furnish to the City all labor, materials, tools, equipment, services, and incidental and customary work necessary to fully and adequately supply the professional Firebreak Mowing and Disking maintenance services necessary for the Project ("Services"). The Services are more particularly described in Exhibit "A" attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference. All Services shall be subject to, and performed in accordance with, this Agreement, the exhibits attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference, and all applicable local, state and federal laws, rules and regulations.

3.1.2 Term.

The term of this Agreement shall be from **March 12, 2024 to June 30, 2027 with the option to extend two (2) additional years until June 30, 2029**, unless earlier terminated as provided herein. Extension of the contract into the optional two (2) years is at the sole discretion of The City and/or its

designee. The City reserves the right to review the Contractor's performance at the end of each year and cancel all or part of the Agreement.

3.2 Responsibilities of Contractor.

3.2.1 Control and Payment of Subordinates; Independent Contractor. The Services shall be performed by Contractor or under its supervision. Contractor will determine the means, methods and details of performing the Services subject to the requirements of this Agreement. City retains Contractor on an independent contractor basis and not as an employee. Contractor retains the right to perform similar or different services for others during the term of this Agreement. Any additional personnel performing the Services under this Agreement on behalf of Contractor shall also not be employees of City and shall at all times be under Contractor's exclusive direction and control. Contractor shall pay all wages, salaries, and other amounts due such personnel in connection with their performance of Services under this Agreement and as required by law. Contractor shall be responsible for all reports and obligations respecting such additional personnel, including, but not limited to: social security taxes, income tax withholding, unemployment insurance, disability insurance, and workers' compensation insurance.

3.2.2 Schedule of Services. Contractor shall perform the Services expeditiously, within the term of this Agreement, and in accordance with the Schedule of Services set forth in Exhibit "B" attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference. Contractor represents that it has the professional and technical personnel required to perform the Services in conformance with such conditions. In order to facilitate Contractor's conformance with the Schedule, City shall respond to Contractor's submittals in a timely manner. Upon request of City, Contractor shall provide a more detailed schedule of anticipated performance to meet the Schedule of Services.

3.2.3 Conformance to Applicable Requirements. All work prepared by Contractor shall be subject to the approval of City.

3.2.4 City's Representative. The City hereby designates Carlos Zepeda, or his or her designee, to act as its representative for the performance of this Agreement ("City's Representative"). City's Representative shall have the power to act on behalf of the City for all purposes under this Agreement. Contractor shall not accept direction or orders from any person other than the City's Representative or his or her designee.

3.2.5 Contractor's Representative. Contractor hereby designates Jaime Alvarado, or his or her designee, to act as its representative for the performance of this Agreement ("Contractor's Representative"). Contractor's Representative shall have full authority to represent and act on behalf of the Contractor for all purposes under this Agreement. The Contractor's Representative shall supervise and direct the Services, using his best skill and attention, and shall be responsible for all means, methods, techniques, sequences and procedures and for the satisfactory coordination of all portions of the Services under this Agreement.

3.2.6 Coordination of Services. Contractor agrees to work closely with City staff in the performance of Services and shall be available to City's staff, consultants and other staff at all reasonable times.

3.2.7 Standard of Care; Performance of Employees. Contractor shall perform all Services under this Agreement in a skillful and competent manner, consistent with the standards generally recognized as

being employed by professionals in the same discipline in the State of California. Contractor represents and maintains that it is skilled in the professional calling necessary to perform the Services. Contractor warrants that all employees and subcontractors shall have sufficient skill and experience to perform the Services assigned to them. Finally, Contractor represents that it, its employees and subcontractors have all licenses, permits, qualifications and approvals of whatever nature that are legally required to perform the Services, including a City Business License, and that such licenses and approvals shall be maintained throughout the term of this Agreement. As provided for in the indemnification provisions of this Agreement, Contractor shall perform, at its own cost and expense and without reimbursement from the City, any services necessary to correct errors or omissions which are caused by the Contractor's failure to comply with the standard of care provided for herein. Any employee of the Contractor or its sub-contractors who is determined by the City to be uncooperative, incompetent, a threat to the adequate or timely completion of the Project, a threat to the safety of persons or property, or any employee who fails or refuses to perform the Services in a manner acceptable to the City, shall be promptly removed from the Project by the Contractor and shall not be re-employed to perform any of the Services or to work on the Project.

3.2.8 Period of Performance and Liquidated Damages. Contractor shall perform and complete all Services under this Agreement within the term set forth in Section 3.1.2 above ("Performance Time"). Contractor shall perform the Services in strict accordance with any completion schedule or Project milestones described in Exhibits "A" or "B" attached hereto, or which may be provided separately in writing to the Contractor. Contractor agrees that if the Services are not completed within the aforementioned Performance Time and/or pursuant to any such completion schedule or Project milestones developed pursuant to provisions of this Agreement, it is understood, acknowledged and agreed that the City will suffer damage. Pursuant to Government Code Section 53069.85, Contractor shall pay to the City as fixed and liquidated damages, and not as a penalty, the sum of **Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00)** per day for each and every calendar day of delay beyond the Performance Time or beyond any completion schedule or Project milestones established pursuant to this Agreement.

3.2.9 Disputes. Should any dispute arise respecting the true value of any work done, of any work omitted, or of any extra work which Contractor may be required to do, or respecting the size of any payment to Contractor during the performance of this Agreement, Contractor shall continue to perform the Work while said dispute is decided by the City. If Contractor disputes the City's decision, Contractor shall have such remedies as may be provided by law.

3.2.10 Laws and Regulations; Employee/Labor Certifications. Contractor shall keep itself fully informed of and in compliance with all local, state and federal laws, rules and regulations in any manner affecting the performance of the Project or the Services, including all Cal/OSHA requirements, and shall give all notices required by law. Contractor shall be liable for all violations of such laws and regulations in connection with Services. If the Contractor performs any work knowing it to be contrary to such laws, rules and regulations and without giving written notice to the City, Contractor shall be solely responsible for all costs arising therefrom. City is a public entity of the State of California subject to certain provisions of the Health & Safety Code, Government Code, Public Contract Code, and Labor Code of the State. It is stipulated and agreed that all provisions of the law applicable to the public contracts of a municipality are a part of this Agreement to the same extent as though set forth herein and will be complied with. These include but are not limited to the payment of prevailing wages, the stipulation that eight (8) hours' labor shall constitute a legal day's work and that no worker shall be permitted to work in excess of eight (8) hours during any one calendar day except as permitted by law. Contractor shall defend, indemnify

and hold City, its officials, officers, employees and agents free and harmless, pursuant to the indemnification provisions of this Agreement, from any claim or liability arising out of any failure or alleged failure to comply with such laws, rules or regulations.

3.2.10.1 Employment Eligibility; Contractor. By executing this Agreement, Contractor verifies that it fully complies with all requirements and restrictions of state and federal law respecting the employment of undocumented aliens, including, but not limited to, the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986, as may be amended from time to time. Such requirements and restrictions include, but are not limited to, examination and retention of documentation confirming the identity and immigration status of each employee of the Contractor. Contractor also verifies that it has not committed a violation of any such law within the five (5) years immediately preceding the date of execution of this Agreement, and shall not violate any such law at any time during the term of the Agreement. Contractor shall avoid any violation of any such law during the term of this Agreement by participating in an electronic verification of work authorization program operated by the United States Department of Homeland Security, by participating in an equivalent federal work authorization program operated by the United States Department of Homeland Security to verify information of newly hired employees, or by some other legally acceptable method. Contractor shall maintain records of each such verification, and shall make them available to the City or its representatives for inspection and copy at any time during normal business hours. The City shall not be responsible for any costs or expenses related to Contractor's compliance with the requirements provided for in Section 3.2.10 or any of its sub-sections.

3.2.10.2 Employment Eligibility; Subcontractors, Sub-subcontractors and Consultants. To the same extent and under the same conditions as Contractor, Contractor shall require all of its subcontractors, sub-subcontractors and consultants performing any work relating to the Project or this Agreement to make the same verifications and comply with all requirements and restrictions provided for in Section 3.2.10.1.

3.2.10.3 Employment Eligibility; Failure to Comply. Each person executing this Agreement on behalf of Contractor verifies that they are a duly authorized officer of Contractor, and understands that any of the following shall be grounds for the City to terminate the Agreement for cause: (1) failure of Contractor or its subcontractors, sub-subcontractors or consultants to meet any of the requirements provided for in Sections 3.2.10.1 or 3.2.10.2; (2) any misrepresentation or material omission concerning compliance with such requirements (including in those verifications provided to the Contractor under Section 3.2.10.2); or (3) failure to immediately remove from the Project any person found not to be in compliance with such requirements.

3.2.10.4 Labor Certification. By its signature hereunder, Contractor certifies that it is aware of the provisions of Section 3700 of the California Labor Code which require every employer to be insured against liability for Workers' Compensation or to undertake self-insurance in accordance with the provisions of that Code, and agrees to comply with such provisions before commencing the performance of the Services.

3.2.10.5 Equal Opportunity Employment. Contractor represents that it is an equal opportunity employer and it shall not discriminate against any subcontractor, employee or applicant for

EXHIBIT "1"

employment because of race, religion, color, national origin, handicap, ancestry, sex or age. Such non-discrimination shall include, but not be limited to, all activities related to initial employment, upgrading, demotion, transfer, recruitment or recruitment advertising, layoff or termination.

3.2.10.6 Air Quality. Contractor must fully comply with all applicable laws, rules and regulations in furnishing or using equipment and/or providing services, including, but not limited to, emissions limits and permitting requirements imposed by the California Air Resources Board (CARB). Contractor shall specifically be aware of the CARB limits and requirements' application to "portable equipment", which definition is considered by CARB to include any item of equipment with a fuel-powered engine. Contractor shall indemnify City against any fines or penalties imposed by CARB or any other governmental or regulatory agency for violations of applicable laws, rules and/or regulations by Contractor, its subcontractors, or others for whom Contractor is responsible under its indemnity obligations provided for in this Agreement.

3.2.10.7 Water Quality.

(A) Management and Compliance. To the extent applicable, Contractor's Services must account for, and fully comply with, all local, state and federal laws, rules and regulations that may impact water quality compliance, including, without limitation, all applicable provisions of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act (33 U.S.C. §§ 1300); the California Porter-Cologne Water Quality Control Act (Cal Water Code §§ 13000-14950); laws, rules and regulations of the Environmental Protection Agency and the State Water Resources Control Board; the City's ordinances regulating discharges of storm water; and any and all regulations, policies, or permits issued pursuant to any such authority regulating the discharge of pollutants, as that term is used in the Porter-Cologne Water Quality Control Act, to any ground or surface water in the state.

(B) Liability for Non-Compliance. Failure to comply with the laws, regulations and policies described in this Section is a violation of law that may subject Contractor or City to penalties, fines, or additional regulatory requirements. Contractor shall defend, indemnify and hold the City, its officials, officers, employees, volunteers and agents free and harmless, pursuant to the indemnification provisions of this Agreement, from and against any and all fines, penalties, claims or other regulatory requirements imposed as a result of Contractor's non-compliance with the laws, regulations and policies described in this Section, unless such non-compliance is the result of the sole established negligence, willful misconduct or active negligence of the City, its officials, officers, agents, employees or authorized volunteers.

(C) Training. In addition to any other standard of care requirements set forth in this Agreement, Contractor warrants that all employees and subcontractors shall have sufficient skill and experience to perform the Services assigned to them without impacting water quality in violation of the laws, regulations and policies described in this Section. Contractor further warrants that it, its employees and subcontractors will receive adequate training, as determined by City, regarding the requirements of the laws, regulations and policies described in this Section as they may relate to the

EXHIBIT "1"

Services provided under this Agreement. Upon request, City will provide Contractor with a list of training programs that meet the requirements of this paragraph.

3.2.11 Insurance. Contractor shall not commence work for the City until it has provided evidence satisfactory to the City it has secured all insurance required under Exhibit "D" (Insurance Requirements), attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference. In addition, Contractor shall not allow any subcontractor to commence work on any subcontract until it has secured all insurance required therein.

3.2.12 Safety. Contractor shall execute and maintain its work so as to avoid injury or damage to any person or property. In carrying out its Services, the Contractor shall at all times be in compliance with all applicable local, state and federal laws, rules and regulations, and shall exercise all necessary precautions for the safety of employees appropriate to the nature of the work and the conditions under which the work is to be performed. Safety precautions as applicable shall include, but shall not be limited to: (A) adequate life protection and lifesaving equipment and procedures; (B) instructions in accident prevention for all employees and subcontractors, such as safe walkways, scaffolds, fall protection ladders, bridges, gang planks, confined space procedures, trenching and shoring, equipment and other safety devices, equipment and wearing apparel as are necessary or lawfully required to prevent accidents or injuries; and (C) adequate facilities for the proper inspection and maintenance of all safety measures.

3.2.13 Bonds.

3.2.13.1 Performance Bond. If required by law or otherwise specifically requested by City in Exhibit "D" attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference, Contractor shall execute and provide to City concurrently with this Agreement a Performance Bond in the amount of the total, not-to-exceed compensation indicated in this Agreement, and in a form provided or approved by the City. If such bond is required, no payment will be made to Contractor until it has been received and approved by the City.

3.2.13.2 Payment Bond. If required by law or otherwise specifically requested by City in Exhibit "D" attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference, Contractor shall execute and provide to City concurrently with this Agreement a Payment Bond in the amount of the total, not-to-exceed compensation indicated in this Agreement, and in a form provided or approved by the City. If such bond is required, no payment will be made to Contractor until it has been received and approved by the City.

3.2.13.3 Bond Provisions. Should, in City's sole opinion, any bond become insufficient or any surety be found to be unsatisfactory, Contractor shall renew or replace the affected bond within 10 days of receiving notice from City. In the event the surety or Contractor intends to reduce or cancel any required bond, at least thirty (30) days prior written notice shall be given to the City, and Contractor shall post acceptable replacement bonds at least ten (10) days prior to expiration of the original bonds. No further payments shall be deemed due or will be made under this Agreement until any replacement bonds required by this Section are accepted by the City. To the extent, if any, that the total compensation is increased in accordance with the Agreement, the Contractor shall, upon request of the City, cause the amount of the bonds to be increased accordingly and shall promptly deliver satisfactory evidence of such increase to the City. To the extent available, the bonds shall further provide that no change or alteration of the Agreement (including, without limitation, an increase in the total compensation, as referred to

above), extensions of time, or modifications of the time, terms, or conditions of payment to the Contractor, will release the surety. If the Contractor fails to furnish any required bond, the City may terminate this Agreement for cause.

3.2.13.4 Surety Qualifications. Only bonds executed by an admitted surety insurer, as defined in Code of Civil Procedure Section 995.120, shall be accepted. The surety must be a California-admitted surety with a current A.M. Best's rating no less than A:VIII and satisfactory to the City. If a California-admitted surety insurer issuing bonds does not meet these requirements, the insurer will be considered qualified if it is in conformance with Section 995.660 of the California Code of Civil Procedure, and proof of such is provided to the City.

3.2.14 Accounting Records. Contractor shall maintain complete and accurate records with respect to all costs and expenses incurred under this Agreement. All such records shall be clearly identifiable. Contractor shall allow a representative of City during normal business hours to examine, audit, and make transcripts or copies of such records and any other documents created pursuant to this Agreement. Contractor shall allow inspection of all work, data, documents, proceedings, and activities related to the Agreement for a period of three (3) years from the date of final payment under this Agreement.

3.3 Fees and Payments.

3.3.1 Compensation. Contractor shall receive compensation, including authorized reimbursements, for all Services rendered under this Agreement at the rates set forth in Exhibit "C" attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference. The total compensation for a three (3) year term for an amount up to **\$581,349.00 (\$ Five Hundred Eighty-One Thousand Three Hundred and Forty-Nine Dollars)** with an option to extend two (2) additional years for an amount up to **\$391,566.00 (\$ Three Hundred Ninety-One Five Hundred Sixty-Six Dollars)** for a total contract amount not to exceed **\$972,915.00 (\$ Nine Hundred Seventy-Two Thousand Nine Hundred Fifteen Dollars)** without written approval of City's Finance Director. Extra Work may be authorized, as described below, and if authorized, will be compensated at the rates and manner set forth in this Agreement.

3.3.2 Payment of Compensation. Contractor shall submit to City a monthly itemized statement which indicates work completed and hours of Services rendered by Contractor. The statement shall describe the amount of Services and supplies provided since the initial commencement date, or since the start of the subsequent billing periods, as appropriate, through the date of the statement. City shall, within thirty (30) days of receiving such statement, review the statement and pay all approved charges thereon.

3.3.3 Reimbursement for Expenses. Contractor shall not be reimbursed for any expenses unless authorized in writing by City.

3.3.4 Extra Work. At any time during the term of this Agreement, City may request that Contractor perform Extra Work. As used herein, "Extra Work" means any work which is determined by City to be necessary for the proper completion of the Project, but which the parties did not reasonably anticipate would be necessary at the execution of this Agreement. Contractor shall not perform, nor be compensated for, Extra Work without written authorization from City's Representative.

3.3.5 California Labor Code Requirements

EXHIBIT "1"

a. Contractor is aware of the requirements of California Labor Code Sections 1720 et seq. and 1770 et seq., which require the payment of prevailing wage rates and the performance of other requirements on certain "public works" and "maintenance" projects ("Prevailing Wage Laws"). If the Services are being performed as part of an applicable "public works" or "maintenance" project, as defined by the Prevailing Wage Laws, and if the total compensation is \$1,000 or more, Contractor agrees to fully comply with such Prevailing Wage Laws. Contractor shall defend, indemnify and hold the City, its officials, officers, employees and agents free and harmless from any claims, liabilities, costs, penalties or interest arising out of any failure or alleged failure to comply with the Prevailing Wage Laws. It shall be mandatory upon the Contractor and all subcontractors to comply with all California Labor Code provisions, which include but are not limited to prevailing wages (Labor Code Sections 1771, 1774 and 1775), employment of apprentices (Labor Code Section 1777.5), certified payroll records (Labor Code Sections 1771.4 and 1776), hours of labor (Labor Code Sections 1813 and 1815) and debarment of contractors and subcontractors (Labor Code Section 1777.1). The requirement to submit certified payroll records directly to the Labor Commissioner under Labor Code section 1771.4 shall not apply to work performed on a public works project that is exempt pursuant to the small project exemption specified in Labor Code Section 1771.4.

b. If the Services are being performed as part of an applicable "public works" or "maintenance" project, then pursuant to Labor Code Sections 1725.5 and 1771.1, the Contractor and all subcontractors performing such Services must be registered with the Department of Industrial Relations. Contractor shall maintain registration for the duration of the Project and require the same of any subcontractors, as applicable. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the contractor registration requirements mandated by Labor Code Sections 1725.5 and 1771.1 shall not apply to work performed on a public works project that is exempt pursuant to the small project exemption specified in Labor Code Sections 1725.5 and 1771.1.

c. This Agreement may also be subject to compliance monitoring and enforcement by the Department of Industrial Relations. It shall be Contractor's sole responsibility to comply with all applicable registration and labor compliance requirements. Any stop orders issued by the Department of Industrial Relations against Contractor or any subcontractor that affect Contractor's performance of Services, including any delay, shall be Contractor's sole responsibility. Any delay arising out of or resulting from such stop orders shall be considered Contractor caused delay and shall not be compensable by the City. Contractor shall defend, indemnify and hold the City, its officials, officers, employees and agents free and harmless from any claim or liability arising out of stop orders issued by the Department of Industrial Relations against Contractor or any subcontractor.

3.4 Termination of Agreement.

3.4.1 Grounds for Termination. City may, by written notice to Contractor, terminate the whole or any part of this Agreement at any time and without cause by giving written notice to Contractor of such termination, and specifying the effective date thereof, at least seven (7) days before the effective date of such termination. Upon termination, Contractor shall be compensated only for those services which have been adequately rendered to City, and Contractor shall be entitled to no further compensation. Contractor may not terminate this Agreement except for cause.

3.4.2 Effect of Termination. If this Agreement is terminated as provided herein, City may require Contractor to provide all finished or unfinished documents and data and other information of any kind prepared by Contractor in connection with the performance of Services under this Agreement. Contractor shall be required to provide such document and other information within fifteen (15) days of the request.

3.4.3 Additional Services. In the event this Agreement is terminated in whole or in part as provided herein, City may procure, upon such terms and in such manner as it may determine appropriate, services similar to those terminated.

3.4.4 Agreement Subject to Appropriation of Funds. The Contractor understands and accepts that at all times; the Agreement is subject to appropriation of funds by the Antioch City Council. The Agreement may terminate without penalty, liability or expense of any kind to the City at the end of any fiscal year if funds are not appropriated for the next succeeding fiscal year. If funds are appropriated for a portion of the fiscal year, the Agreement will terminate, without penalty, liability or expense of any kind at the end of the term for which funds are appropriated. The City has no obligation to make appropriations for the Agreement in lieu of appropriations for new or other agreements. City budget decisions are subject to the discretion of the Mayor and City Council. Contractor's assumption of risk of possible non-appropriation is a part of the consideration for the Agreement. This section controls against any and all other provisions of the Agreement.

3.5 General Provisions.

3.5.1 Delivery of Notices. All notices permitted or required under this Agreement shall be given to the respective parties at the following address, or at such other address as the respective parties may provide in writing for this purpose:

Such notice shall be deemed made when personally delivered or when mailed, forty-eight (48) hours after deposit in the U.S. Mail, first class postage prepaid and addressed to the party at its applicable address. Actual notice shall be deemed adequate notice on the date actual notice occurred, regardless of the method of service.

3.5.2 Indemnification.

3.5.2.1 Scope of Indemnity. To the fullest extent permitted by law, Contractor shall defend, indemnify and hold the City, its officials, officers, employees, volunteers and agents free and harmless from any and all claims, demands, causes of action, costs, expenses, liability, loss, damage or injury of any kind, in law or equity, to property or persons, including wrongful death, in any manner arising out of, pertaining to, or incident to any alleged acts, errors or omissions of Contractor, its officials, officers, employees, subcontractors, consultants or agents in connection with the performance of the Contractor's Services, the Project or this Agreement, including without limitation the payment of all consequential damages, expert witness fees and attorneys' fees and other related costs and expenses. Notwithstanding the foregoing, to the extent Contractor's Services are subject to Civil Code Section 2782.8, the above indemnity shall be limited, to the extent required by Civil Code Section 2782.8, to claims that arise out of, pertain to, or relate to the negligence, recklessness, or willful misconduct of the Contractor.

3.5.2.2 Additional Indemnity Obligations. Contractor shall defend, with counsel of City's choosing and at Contractor's own cost, expense and risk, any and all claims, suits, actions or other proceedings of every kind covered by Section 3.5.2.1 that may be brought or instituted against City or its officials, officers, employees, volunteers and agents. Contractor shall pay and satisfy any judgment, award or decree that may be rendered against City or its officials, officers, employees, volunteers and agents as part of any such claim, suit, action or other proceeding. Contractor shall also reimburse City for the cost of any settlement paid by City or its officials, officers, employees, agents or volunteers as part of any such claim, suit, action or other proceeding. Such reimbursement shall include payment for City's attorneys' fees and costs, including expert witness fees. Contractor shall reimburse City and its officials, officers, employees, agents, and/or volunteers, for any and all legal expenses and costs incurred by each of them in connection therewith or in enforcing the indemnity herein provided. Contractor's obligation to indemnify shall survive expiration or termination of this Agreement, and shall not be restricted to insurance proceeds, if any, received by the City, its officials, officers, employees, agents, or volunteers.

3.5.3 Governing Law; Government Code Claim Compliance. This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of California. Venue shall be in Contra Costa County, California. In addition to any and all Agreement requirements pertaining to notices of and requests for compensation or payment for extra work, disputed work, claims and/or changed conditions, Contractor must comply with the claim procedures set forth in Government Code sections 900 et seq. prior to filing any lawsuit against the City. Such Government Code claims and any subsequent lawsuit based upon the Government Code claims shall be limited to those matters that remain unresolved after all procedures pertaining to extra work, disputed work, claims, and/or changed conditions have been followed by Contractor. If no such Government Code claim is submitted, or if any prerequisite contractual requirements are not otherwise satisfied as specified herein, Contractor shall be barred from bringing and maintaining a valid lawsuit against the City.

3.5.4 Time of Essence. Time is of the essence for each and every provision of this Agreement.

3.5.5 City's Right to Employ Other Contractors. City reserves right to employ other contractors in connection with this Project.

EXHIBIT "1"

3.5.6 Successors and Assigns. This Agreement shall be binding on the successors and assigns of the parties.

3.5.7 Assignment or Transfer. Contractor shall not assign, hypothecate or transfer, either directly or by operation of law, this Agreement or any interest herein without the prior written consent of the City. Any attempt to do so shall be null and void, and any assignees, hypothecates or transferees shall acquire no right or interest by reason of such attempted assignment, hypothecation or transfer.

3.5.8 Construction; References; Captions. Since the Parties or their agents have participated fully in the preparation of this Agreement, the language of this Agreement shall be construed simply, according to its fair meaning, and not strictly for or against any Party. Any term referencing time, days or period for performance shall be deemed calendar days and not work days. All references to Contractor include all personnel, employees, agents, and subcontractors of Contractor, except as otherwise specified in this Agreement. All references to City include its officials, officers, employees, agents, and volunteers except as otherwise specified in this Agreement. The captions of the various articles and paragraphs are for convenience and ease of reference only, and do not define, limit, augment, or describe the scope, content or intent of this Agreement.

3.5.9 Amendment; Modification. No supplement, modification or amendment of this Agreement shall be binding unless executed in writing and signed by both Parties.

3.5.10 Waiver. No waiver of any default shall constitute a waiver of any other default or breach, whether of the same or other covenant or condition. No waiver, benefit, privilege, or service voluntarily given or performed by a Party shall give the other Party any contractual rights by custom, estoppel or otherwise.

3.5.11 No Third-Party Beneficiaries. Except to the extent expressly provided for in Section 3.5.7, there are no intended third-party beneficiaries of any right or obligation assumed by the Parties.

3.5.12 Invalidity; Severability. If any portion of this Agreement is declared invalid, illegal, or otherwise unenforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining provisions shall continue in full force and effect.

3.5.13 Prohibited Interests. Contractor maintains and warrants that it has not employed nor retained any company or person, other than a bona fide employee working solely for Contractor, to solicit or secure this Agreement. Further, Contractor warrants that it has not paid nor has it agreed to pay any company or person, other than a bona fide employee working solely for Contractor, any fee, commission, percentage, brokerage fee, gift or other consideration contingent upon or resulting from the award or making of this Agreement. Contractor further agrees to file, or shall cause its employees or subcontractors to file, a Statement of Economic Interest with the City's Filing Officer as required under state law in the performance of the Services. For breach or violation of this warranty, City shall have the right to rescind this Agreement without liability. For the term of this Agreement, no member, officer or employee of City, during the term of his or her service with City, shall have any direct interest in this Agreement, or obtain any present or anticipated material benefit arising therefrom.

3.5.14 Cooperation; Further Acts. The Parties shall fully cooperate with one another, and shall take any additional acts or sign any additional documents as may be necessary, appropriate or convenient to attain the purposes of this Agreement.

3.5.15 Attorneys' Fees and Costs. If any action in law or equity, including an action for declaratory relief, is brought to enforce or interpret the provisions of this Agreement, the prevailing Party shall be entitled to recover from the losing party attorney's fees and costs in an amount determined to be reasonable by a court of competent jurisdiction.

3.5.16 Authority to Enter Agreement. Contractor has all requisite power and authority to conduct its business and to execute, deliver, and perform the Agreement. Each Party warrants that the individuals who have signed this Agreement have the legal power, right, and authority to make this Agreement and bind each respective Party.

3.5.17 Counterparts. This Agreement may be signed in counterparts, each of which shall constitute an original.

3.5.18 Entire Agreement. This Agreement contains the entire Agreement of the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof, and supersedes all prior negotiations, understandings or agreements. This Agreement may only be modified by a writing signed by both parties.

3.5.19 Wage Theft Prevention.

3.5.19.1 Contractor, and any subcontractor it employs to complete work under this Agreement, shall comply with all applicable federal, state and local wage and hour laws. Applicable laws may include, but are not limited to, the Federal Fair Labor Standards Act and the California Labor Code.

3.5.19.2 BY SIGNING THIS AGREEMENT, CONTRACTOR AFFIRMS THAT IT HAS DISCLOSED ANY FINAL JUDGMENTS, DECISIONS OR ORDERS FROM A COURT OR INVESTIGATORY GOVERNMENT AGENCY, FINDING IN THE FIVE (5) YEARS PRIOR TO EXECUTING THIS AGREEMENT THAT CONTRACTOR OR ITS SUBCONTRACTORS HAS VIOLATED ANY APPLICABLE WAGE AND HOUR LAWS. CONTRACTOR FURTHER AFFIRMS THAT IT OR ITS SUBCONTRACTOR(S) HAS EITHER FULLY SATISFIED EACH JUDGMENT, DECISION OR ORDER, OR, IF ANY JUDGMENT, DECISION OR ORDER HAS NOT BEEN FULLY SATISFIED, CONTRACTOR AFFIRMS THAT IT OR ITS SUBCONTRACTOR(S) IS CURRENTLY SATISFYING SAID JUDGMENT, DECISION OR ORDER THROUGH A PAYMENT OR ALTERNATIVE PLAN APPROVED BY THE APPLICABLE COURT/GOVERNMENT AGENCY AND THAT CONTRACTOR OR ITS SUBCONTRACTOR(S) ARE IN COMPLIANCE WITH SAID PLAN AS OF THE DATE OF EXECUTING THIS AGREEMENT.

3.5.19.3 If at any time during the term of this Agreement, a court or investigatory government agency issues a final judgment, decision or order finding that Contractor or a subcontractor it employs to perform work under this Agreement has violated any applicable wage and hour law, or Contractor learns of such a judgment, decision, or order that was not previously disclosed in its bid/proposal, Contractor shall inform the City no more than fifteen (15) calendar days after the judgment, decision or order becomes final or from the date of learning of the final judgment, decision or order. Contractor or its subcontractor(s) shall, within thirty (30) calendar days after notifying the City, either (i) fully satisfy any such judgment, decision, or order and provide the City with documentary evidence of satisfying said judgment, decision or order; or (ii) provide the City documentary evidence of a payment or other alternative plan approved by the

court/government agency to satisfy the judgment, decision or order. If the Contractor or its subcontractor is subject to a payment or other alternative plan, the Contractor or its subcontractor shall continue to submit documentary evidence every thirty (30) calendar days during the term of the Agreement demonstrating continued compliance with the plan until the judgment, decision or order has been fully satisfied.

3.5.19.4 For purposes of this Section, a "final judgment, decision, or order" refers to one for which all appeals have been exhausted or the time period to appeal has expired. Relevant investigatory government agencies include: the United States Department of Labor, the California Division of Labor Standards Enforcement, the City, or any other governmental entity or division tasked with the investigation and enforcement of wage and hour laws.

3.5.19.5 Failure to comply with any part of this Section constitutes a material breach of this Agreement. Such breach may serve as a basis for immediate termination of this Agreement and/or any other remedies available under this Agreement and/or law.

3.5.19.6 Notice provided to the City shall be addressed to: Attention: City Manager, P. O. Box 5007, Antioch, CA 94531-5007. The Notice provisions of this Section are separate from any other notice provisions in this Agreement and, accordingly, only notice provided to the above address satisfies the notice requirements in this Section.

SCOPE OF SERVICES

II SPECIFICATIONS

i. Customer Service & Quality Assurance

Any work or assigned duties that are not performed to our standards and/or contractual agreement or the regulating agency may result in delay, reduction, or discount at the contractor's expense. The judgment for reduced payment or discount shall be at the City's sole discretion. In addition, the City may move to the next lowest responsible bidder if the City is not happy with the services or communication supplied by the contractor. All complaints about services rendered will be processed by the Deputy Public Works Director or designee/s. Any damages or fines placed upon the City of Antioch due to delays or poor performance by the contractor will be paid by the contractor. Funds will be deducted from payment to the contractor.

ii. Contractor Will Provide

Contractor to be capable of responding to requests by both email and cell phone. The Contractor shall have a representative available to meet with the City of Antioch representative from Monday through Friday 7am – 4:30 pm, except holidays and a safe and motivated crew capable of performing all work per specifications. Contractor is to keep the City informed of working locations daily, so that the City representative can inspect the work throughout the process. At least one crew member must speak English; Contractor shall provide all labor, equipment and materials required to perform the work as specified in a safe and productive manner. Contractor will be responsible for onsite safety, traffic control and quality control. Contractor must abide by all California Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices specified traffic control standards. All work must be in accordance with all state and local laws, codes, and specifications. Workers must always wear reflective vests. Vehicles must be clearly labeled with company name and vehicles numbers.

iii. Scope of Work

To provide all labor, equipment and incidentals to complete firebreak and disking weed abatement along City open spaces, trails and rights-of-ways as specified and described in the list of firebreak and disking locations in this RFP. Furthermore, work to be performed under the specification and as mandated by Contra Costa County Fire Protection District (CCCFPD) minimum weed abatement standards included herein (attachment C) and as mandated by the CCCFPD's most current revised standards for all contract years. It is incumbent upon the contractor to keep current on those standards and be responsible for compliance. The use of herbicides shall not be used in lieu of manual weed abatement. Area maps are included as Attachment "B" with Area Descriptions to assist in area identifications.

If late rain causes a delay in completion of work between disking and hand weed abatement, contractor may be required to re-work areas to meet CCCFPD standards. If

work is not completed up to current year standards no compensation will be paid to the contractor until the work has been completed up to standards. If the re-work was of no fault of the contractor, then the City will pay compensation on a time and materials basis. The City's representative will make the final decision relating to work being up to standard.

If any material such as soil or vegetation from the weed abatement handwork, mowing or disking operations enters any V-ditch, said contractor shall remove all material from the V-ditch prior to inspection from the City's representative. No payment will be made until all material has been removed from the V-Ditch and it has been inspected by both the contractor and the City representative. The contractor is to report any V-ditches that are full of dirt or debris prior to work being completed. If material or debris enters the drain inlets on the V-Ditch the contractor will be required to clean them at no expense to the City. THE GOAL IS TO KEEP THE V-DITCHES CLEAN, CLEAR AND OPEN FOR STORM WATER TO FLOW.

iv. Hours of Operation

Work can be accomplished between 7:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. Per Antioch Municipal Code, Section 5-17-05, construction noise is limited on weekends, no construction noise prior to 7:00 am and after 6:00 pm, and further limited to 8:00 am and 5:00 pm if 300 feet from occupied dwellings. Work may be performed on Saturdays; however, there shall be no noise producing activities until after 8:00 a.m. No work is allowed on Sundays.

v. Work Plan - Schedule

The contractor will be required to give the City of Antioch priority scheduling and attention for this project. Contractor shall provide City representative with a written work schedule of firebreak areas and written update on a weekly basis as to the progress of the crews. All changes to the schedule will be communicated as soon as possible. The City and Contractor will meet and discuss the starting date, starting locations, and workflow, on or before April 1st of each contract year for all the firebreak areas described in this RFP. **Contractor shall not begin work without prior authorization from the City.** All firebreak areas listed in "ATTACHMENT 'B' FIREBREAK & DISKING ZONES WITH AREA DESCRIPTIONS" of this RFP, must be completed by June 30th of each contract year.

vi. Contract Terms and Conditions

This contract will be effective April 1, 2024 through June 30, 2026. It is anticipated that the contractor will work under a three-year Agreement with the City. Upon successful review, at the end of the three (3) years, the City may renew the Agreement for up to two (2), (FY 2026/27 and FY2027/28), additional years at the price quoted in this RFB. The agreement for additional years is at the sole discretion of the City and shall be performed at the price quoted in this RFP. Liquidated damages of **Five Hundred Dollars (\$500) per Calendar day** will be applied if project is not completed by the date agreed upon.

vii. Limitations

If it should be necessary to add additional areas of work, the following schedule shall be followed:

- 1.) Firebreak work orders given to the contractor by the City of Antioch during the period of April 1st through June 16th must be completed by June 30th per contract year and all invoices must be received by the City contract representative by July 31st each contract year.
- 2.) Firebreak work orders given to the contractor during the period of June 17th through June 30th must be completed by July 7th per contract year and the invoice must be received by the City contract representative by July 31st each contract year.
- 3.) Firebreak work orders given to the contractor after July 7th per contract year must be completed within seven (7) days and the invoice must be received by the City contract representative by July 31st each contract year.
- 4.) All additional work will be billed at the hourly rate for extra work, as provided for in this bid proposal. The City and the Contractor will meet and agree on the location and amount of time to complete any additional work as authorized by the City.

viii. Equipment & Supplies

The contractor agrees to provide and maintain all equipment required to perform the above services. The contractor's equipment shall always be of top quality and in good working order. The contractor is required to supply enough equipment to complete the project on schedule.

For Disking Areas: Recommend Tractor: D-2 or larger with front blade, truck and trailer, and an 8-foot disk minimum or Four-wheel drive tractor with 8-foot minimum hydraulic disk.

ix. Examination of Parcels, Conditions, Etc.

The bidder must carefully inspect all parcels, locations, and conditions prior to bidding work. The City of Antioch will in no case be responsible for any loss or any unforeseen costs that may be suffered by the contractor because of the contractor's failure to inform itself of all conditions pertaining to the work. Areas are subject to change due to development.

x. Invoicing

With the request for payment each month, Contractor shall provide a list of areas completed. Also included shall be a list of work to be completed the next month. No payment will be made without a completed work schedule for the month, deficiencies noted and corrected, and the work plan for the next month. All information is to be provided in email format and paper copy if desired by City designee. Bidder is required

to include the type of work, zone/area numbers and descriptions, and completion date on each invoice:

- **Disking – by zone and area (example below):**

DA. 611 2320 Water Tanks

DA1. Deerfield water tank on Via Dora Drive across from 4505 Via Dora Drive inside fence lines and area in back of tank. Note: watch out for sprinklers at edges of landscape.

- **Firebreak– by zone and area (example below):**

FI. 256 4563 District 2A-3

FI1. Lot next to 500 Gary on the corner of Cavallo Road and Gary Avenue, complete abatement. FI2. Behind 1800 to 1816 Trembath Street

The City reserves the right to add other areas for an additional cost or to remove some areas and receive a cost savings on those areas removed from the contract list.

xi. Firebreaks

Minimum width –Disked Firebreaks shall be thirty (30) feet wide with 15-foot cross-breaks in areas greater than 5 acres - from fence lines or structures unless otherwise specified on the work orders or by the most current version of the CCCFPD Minimum Weed Abatement Standards. Areas smaller than 5 acres require complete abatement.

xii. Handwork

Contractor shall provide sufficient personnel and equipment to maintain a steady pace to complete all firebreaks by June 30th of each contract year, unless otherwise mandated by CCCFPD. If work does not occur on schedule it is understood that the City will suffer damage. It being impractical and infeasible to determine the amount of actual damage, it is agreed that the contractor shall pay to the City the sum of **five hundred (\$500.00) dollars per day** for each calendar day delay in finishing the contract as specified in section “vi. Contract Terms and Conditions” of this Request For Bid (RFB).

Contractor will mulch or remove all excess debris caused by the cutting of the firebreaks so there is insufficient fuel to sustain or allow the spread of fire. Material that is not mulched to the satisfaction of the City inspector and/or CCCFPD shall be re-mulched by said contractor at Contractor’s expense.

All equipment shall be equipped with spark arrestors as to not set fire to any part of property whether public or private.

Fire extinguishers shall be present on all jobsites at all times, and all personnel will be trained in the operation of the extinguishers.

Vehicles that are used to transport people and equipment are limited to asphalt or concrete trails and roadways. At no time are these vehicles to be parked off the pavement, on any part of open space, due to the dry and windy conditions that exist in Antioch.

Contractor is responsible for training all operators of hand equipment and shall be trained in the safe and proper use of the equipment he or she is operating.

xiii. Flail Mowers

Flail Mowers may be used instead of disking, weed eaters or hand tools to cut the firebreaks as long as the work can be completed in a safe manner. Unless otherwise specified on the work orders or by the most current version of the CCCFPD Minimum Weed Abatement Standards, mowed fuel breaks shall be 60 feet wide and mowed cross breaks 30 feet wide due to ability of the remaining surface material to support a fire growth. If additional areas are requested/required by the City to be mowed, the contractor will be requested to give an hourly rate for flail mowing for any additional areas.

xiv. City Will Provide

Inspection – The City’s representative will answer questions and inspect work for contract compliance.

xv. Budget

The City has budgeted approximately \$140,000 per contract year for this job. An additional \$25,000 will be added to the purchase order for any additional work that the City may require. The additional allocation of funds is not a promise or guarantee of work. It is only in place for additional or contingency work.

Contractor shall provide its insurance broker(s)/agent(s) with a copy of these requirements and request that they provide Certificates of Insurance complete with copies of all required endorsements.

Contractor shall furnish City with copies of original endorsements affecting coverage required by this Exhibit D. The endorsements are to be signed by a person authorized by that insurer to bind coverage on its behalf. All endorsements and certificates are to be received and approved by City before work commences. City has the right to require Contractor's insurer to provide complete, certified copies of all required insurance policies, including endorsements affecting the coverage required by these specifications.

___ Insurance appropriate to the Contractor's profession, with limit no less than _____ per occurrence or claim, _____ aggregate

Workers' Compensation Insurance:

X Insurance as required by the State of California, with Statutory Limits, and Employer's Liability Insurance with limit of no less than **\$1,000,000.00** per accident for bodily injury or disease. *(Not required if Contractor provides written verification it has no employees. Waiver needed.)*

The Employer's Liability policy shall be endorsed to waive any right of subrogation as respects the City, its elected and appointed officials, officers, attorneys, agents, and employees.

Builder's Risk (Course of Construction):

Contractor's Pollution Legal Liability:

Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to City.

Cyber Liability Insurance

Coverage shall be sufficiently broad to respond to the duties and obligations as is undertaken by Contractor in this Agreement and shall include, but not be limited to, claims involving infringement of intellectual property, including but not limited to infringement of copyright, trademark, trade dress, invasion of privacy violations, information theft, damage to or destruction of electronic information, release of private information, alteration of electronic information, extortion, and network security.

The policy shall provide coverage for breach response costs as well as regulatory fines and penalties, and credit monitoring expenses with limits sufficient to respond to these obligations.

Surety Bonds:

Contractor shall provide the following Surety Bonds:

- Bid Bond
- X Performance Bond
- X Payment Bond

The Payment Bond and Performance Bond shall be in a sum equal to the contract price. Bonds shall be duly executed by a responsible corporate surety, authorized to issue such bonds in the State of California and secured through an authorized agent with an office in California.

Other Insurance Provisions:

The insurance policies are to contain, or be endorsed to contain the following provisions:

 X **Additional Insured Status and Primary/Non-Contributory Language:**

Contractor's general liability and automobile liability policies shall be primary and shall not seek contribution from the City's coverage and be endorsed to add the City and its officers, officials, employees, and agents as additional insureds under such policies using Insurance Services Office form CG 20 10 (or equivalent) on

the general liability policy. For construction projects, an endorsement providing completed operations coverage for the additional insured on the general liability policy, ISO form CG 20 37 (or equivalent), is also required.

The limits of insurance required in this Agreement may be satisfied by a combination of primary and umbrella or excess insurance. Any umbrella or excess insurance shall contain or be endorsed to contain a provision that such coverage shall also apply on a primary and non-contributory basis for the benefit of City (if agreed to in a written contract or agreement) before the City's own insurance or self-insurance shall be called upon to protect it as a named insured.

___ Loss Payee Status – Builder's Risk/Course of Construction Insurance (applicable to Construction Contracts only)

Contractor may submit evidence of Builder's Risk insurance in the form of Course of Construction coverage. Such coverage shall name the City as a loss payee as their interest may appear.

___ Notice of Cancellation, Suspension or Otherwise Voiding Policies:

Each insurance policy required above shall contain or be endorsed to contain that coverage shall not be suspended, voided, canceled or reduced in coverage or in limits except with thirty (30) days' prior written notice by certified mail, return receipt requested to the City.

___ Waiver of Subrogation:

Contractor hereby grants to City a waiver of any right to subrogation which any insurer of said Contractor may acquire against the City by virtue of the payment of any loss under such insurance. Contractor agrees to obtain any endorsement that may be necessary to affect this waiver of subrogation, but this provision applies regardless of whether or not the City has received a waiver of subrogation endorsement from the insurer. The Workers' Compensation Policy shall be endorsed with a waiver of subrogation in favor of the City for all work performed by Contractor, its employees, agents and subcontractors.

___ Completed Operations

For Construction Agreements, Contractor shall maintain insurance as required by this Agreement to the fullest amount allowed by law and shall maintain insurance for a minimum of five (5) years following the completion of this project. In the event Contractor fails to obtain or maintain completed operations coverage as required by this Agreement, the City at its sole discretion may purchase the coverage required and the cost will be paid by Contractor.

THE FOLLOWING PROVISIONS APPLY TO ALL AGREEMENTS

Deductibles and Self-Insured Retentions ("SIR"):

Any deductibles or self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by City. The City may require the Contractor to purchase coverage with a lower deductible or retention or provide proof of ability to pay

losses and related investigations, claim administration, and defense expenses within the retention. At the option of the City, either (1) the insurer shall reduce or eliminate such deductibles or self-insured retentions as respects the City, its elected and appointed officials, officers, attorneys, agents, and employees; or (2) the Contractor shall procure a bond guaranteeing payment of losses and related investigations, claim administration and defense expenses.

All SIRs must be disclosed to Risk Management for approval and shall not reduce the limits of liability.

Policies containing any SIR provision shall provide or be endorsed to provide that the SIR may be satisfied by either the named insured or the City.

City reserves the right to obtain a full-certified copy of any insurance policy and endorsements. Failure to exercise this right shall not constitute a waiver of right to exercise later.

Acceptability of Insurers:

Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a current A.M. Best's rating of no less than A-:VII, unless otherwise acceptable to City.

Claims Made Policies: (note - should be applicable only to professional liability, see below)

1. The Retroactive Date must be shown and must be before the date of the contract or the beginning of contract work.
2. Insurance must be maintained, and evidence of insurance must be provided for at least five (5) years after completion of contract of work.
3. If coverage is canceled or non-renewed, and not replaced with another claims-made policy form with a Retroactive Date prior to the contract effective date, the Contractor must purchase "extended reporting" coverage for a minimum of five (5) years after completion of work.
4. A copy of the claims reporting requirements must be submitted to the City for review.
5. If the services involve lead-based paint or asbestos identification/remediation, the Contractor's Pollution Liability Policy shall not contain lead-based paint or asbestos exclusions. If the services involve mold identification/remediation, the Contractor's Pollution Liability Policy shall not contain a mold exclusion, and the definition of Pollution shall include microbial matter, including mold.

Subcontractors:

Contractor shall require and verify that all subcontractors maintain insurance meeting all the requirements stated herein, and Contractor shall ensure that City is an additional insured on insurance required from subcontractors.

Subcontractor agrees to be bound to Contractor and City in the same manner and to the same extent as Contractor is bound to City under this Agreement and any other contract documents. Subcontractor further agrees to include the same requirements and provisions of this Agreement, including the indemnity and insurance requirements, with any sub-subcontractor to the extent they apply to the scope of the sub-subcontractor's work. A copy of the City indemnity and insurance provisions will be furnished to the subcontractor upon request.

Verification of Coverage:

Contractor shall furnish the City with original certificates and amendatory endorsements or copies of the applicable policy language effecting coverage required by this clause. All certificates and endorsements are to be received and approved by the City before work commences. However, failure to obtain the required documents prior to the work beginning shall not waive the Contractor's obligation to provide them. The City reserves the right to require complete, certified copies of all required insurance policies, including endorsements required by these specifications, at any time.

Special Risks or Circumstances

City reserves the right to modify these requirements, including limits, based on the nature of the risk, prior experience, insurer, coverage or other special circumstances.

Failure to Comply:

Each insurance policy required above shall contain or be endorsed to contain that any failure to comply with reporting provisions of the policies shall not affect coverage provided to the City, its elected and appointed officials, officers, attorneys, agents, and employees.

Applicability of Coverage:

Each insurance policy required above shall contain or be endorsed to contain that the Contractor's insurance shall apply separately to each insured against whom claim is made or suit is brought, except with respect to the limits of the insurer's liability.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

It is recommended that the City Council adopt a resolution:

1. Approving a second amendment to increase the construction agreement with Foundry Construction Inc. by \$5,890 for a total agreement amount of \$489,356; and
2. Authorizing the Acting City Manager to execute the second amendment in a form approved by the City Attorney.

FISCAL IMPACT

Adoption of this resolution will increase the construction agreement with Foundry Construction Inc. for the Maintenance Service Center Warehouse Improvements ("Project") in the amount of \$5,890 from \$483,466 to a total contract amount of \$489,356. Funding for this action is included within the approved FY 2023/24 Water Enterprise Fund operating budget.

DISCUSSION

On November 15, 2022, City Council awarded the contract for the Maintenance Service Center Warehouse Improvements to Foundry Construction Inc. in the amount of \$430,000. This Project consists of interior renovations to the City of Antioch's Maintenance Service Center Warehouse, including construction of partitions and a mezzanine level, millwork, lighting, plumbing and water pollution control.

On August 23, 2023, the City Council approved an amendment to increase the contract agreement with Foundry Construction Inc. in the amount of \$53,466 for a total amount of \$483,466.

Staff received additional quotes from Foundry Construction Inc. for further design modifications that were required to complete the project, which includes re-routing the warehouse data rack, furnishing and modifying aluminum door frames, and installing electrical wiring for the fire sprinkler alarm bell.

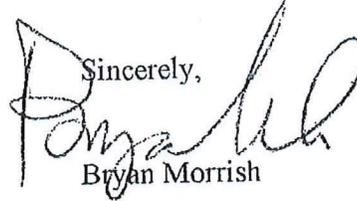

FISCAL IMPACT

DISCUSSION

The Planning Commission is a seven (7) member advisory body that makes recommendations to the City Council on the physical development of the City. The Commission reviews and makes recommendations on all provisions of the General Plan, land subdivisions, and zoning as specified by the Zoning Code and as set forth in the State Government Code and by the California Environmental Quality Act. The Planning Commission also has the authority to approve Use Permits, Variances and Design Review Applications. Planning Commissioners are appointed by the Mayor to four (4) year terms.

In general law cities where the office of the mayor is an elective office pursuant to Article 5 (commencing with Section 34900) of Chapter 7 of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 4, the mayor, with the approval of the city council, shall make all appointments to boards, commissions, and committees, unless otherwise specifically provided by statute. Under Antioch Municipal Code §2-5.201, the Mayor shall nominate candidates for membership on all boards and commissions. Nominees shall be appointed to each board and commission upon receiving approval of at least a majority vote of the City Council.

The City Clerk's Office advertised to fill the vacancy in the usual manner. Currently, there is one Full-Term vacancy, 4-year term, on the Planning Commission. Two applications were received and provided to Mayor Hernandez-Thorpe to interview.

Mayor Hernandez-Thorpe is nominating Seth Webber Corcoran for the Full-Term vacancy, 4-year term, expiring October 2027.

The biography and background of the candidate will be presented at the City Council meeting.

SUBJECT: Dissolve the Human Rights and Racial Equity Ad Hoc Committee and Provide Direction to Staff on the Formation of a New Ad Hoc Committee or Standing Committee

RECOMMENDED ACTION

It is recommended that the City Council provide a status update from the Human Rights and Racial Equity Ad Hoc Committee and take the following actions:

- 1) Dissolve the Human Rights and Racial Equity Ad Hoc Committee; and
- 2) Provide direction to staff to:
 - a. Prepare a resolution for a new ad hoc committee focused on the development of human rights policies for the City; or
 - b. Prepare a resolution for a Human Rights and Racial Equity Standing Committee; or
 - c. Take no action.

FISCAL IMPACT

The recommended action has no direct fiscal impact on City finances.

DISCUSSION

The Human Rights and Racial Equity Ad Hoc Committee worked with the City Manager and the City Attorney to consider proposing an ordinance to form a Human Rights and Racial Equity Commission (the “Commission”), which would work to promote mutual respect, understanding and tolerance among all persons within the City.

After researching the City of Antioch’s municipal code in comparison with other cities municipal codes, the ad hoc committee realized that the City may benefit from exploring and proposing policies regarding human rights in an ordinance for adoption by the Antioch Municipal Code prior to creating a Human Rights and Racial Equity Commission.

Our research demonstrates that some cities have policies spanning educational programs, discrimination in employment, housing, business establishments and city facilities and services. Policies may also extend to complaints, filing of disputes, proceedings, and enforcement (See Attachment A). These policies would provide a foundation for building a community where relationships among diverse people are valued by all, the voices of underrepresented groups are heard, discrimination is not tolerated, and residents can work together to resolve issues concerning discrimination and alienation.

If the City Council provides direction to staff to prepare a resolution forming a new ad hoc or standing committee, it could proactively engage in research, action planning, education, and community outreach to develop policies that protect the rights of all people to have an equal opportunity to live, work, and prosper within the City. Following the consideration of these policies, the new ad hoc or standing committee could make a presentation to the City Council seeking feedback on the potential adoption of human rights policies by the City.

9.35.190 Severability; conformance with state and federal laws.

9.35.010 Policy.

(a) The city is dedicated to preserving the rights of all persons to have an equal opportunity to live, work, and prosper in the community. It is the policy of the city that all persons shall be free from all forms of unlawful discrimination and harassment as prohibited under this article, or federal or state law.

(b) It is the intent of the city in enacting this article to confirm that the fundamental rights of citizens include the right to live unfettered by unlawful discrimination and harassment and this right is consistent with the American ideals of individual freedom, liberty, and responsibility for one's own actions. Furthermore, it is the intent of the city in enacting this article that access to remedies and resolution under existing federal and state laws on unlawful discrimination will be enhanced by providing a local forum for the resolution of complaints, and that it is necessary and proper to enact local regulations establishing a voluntary process for timely resolution of complaints of discrimination that arise within the city.

(c) This article shall not be construed to confer any right or privilege on a person which is conditioned or limited by law nor to impose regulations which are beyond the power of the city to regulate and/or which are preempted by federal and/or state law, nor is this article to be construed to protect conduct which is otherwise unlawful under city, state, or federal law or regulation.

(d) It is the policy of the city that, insofar as federal and state law is applicable to matters of unlawful discrimination, voluntary compliance therewith should be fostered by the city Human Relations Commission utilizing the procedures set forth herein.

9.35.010 Education.

(a) The Human Relations Commission is authorized to plan, promote, and develop community-oriented education programs and events to foster positive human relations, equal opportunity, and greater understanding and appreciation of the city's cultural, ethnic, and racial diversity. The city reserves the right to independently plan and develop such programs.

(b) Proposed educational programs and events developed by the Human Relations Commission, and which are to be funded in whole or in part by the city, shall be submitted to the City Council prior to the adoption of the budget for the fiscal year in which the proposed educational programs and events will be held. Failure of the city to fund a proposed educational program or event shall not preclude the Human Relations Commission from seeking private sources of funding for the events.

(c) Educational goals and objectives may include, but need not be limited to, the following:

- (1) Support the rights of all persons to be free from all forms of discrimination prohibited by city, state, and federal law;
- (2) Develop programs and events which foster positive human relations through greater community education and understanding;
- (3) Encourage private persons, groups, organizations, and businesses to promote better human relations and equal opportunity.

(d) Education programs and events may include, but are not limited to, the following:

- (1) Community forums;
- (2) Speakers, lecturers;
- (3) Events which recognize and promote the city's cultural, ethnic, and racial diversity;
- (4) Essay, art, or other contests;
- (5) Annual Human Relations Commission recognition and awards dinner;
- (6) Annual award to the person, business, or other organization who best exemplifies the city's goals of promoting better human relations;
- (7) Participation in events and programs sponsored by other agencies, businesses, and organizations.

9.35.030 Scope of article.

This article applies to all discriminatory practices, harassment, and inter-group tensions resulting therefrom covered by the provisions of this article. Nothing in this article, however, shall be interpreted or applied so as to create any power, duty, defense, exception, or exemption in conflict with the preemptive effect on any federal or state law. It is the intent of the City Council that this article be interpreted broadly so as to address as much discrimination as possible.

9.35.040 Definitions.

Discrimination.

(1) Any act, policy, or practice which selects a person or class of persons for differential treatment on arbitrary bases as set forth in federal and state civil rights laws, as they may be amended from time to time, and cases interpreting them, including but not limited to the following:

a. Federal law.

1. The United States Constitution.
2. The Civil Rights Act of 1964.
3. The Rehabilitation Act of 1973.
4. The American with Disabilities Act of 1990.

b. State law.

1. The California Constitution.
2. The Unruh Civil Rights Act/The Ralph Civil Rights Act of 1976.
3. The Fair Employment and Housing Act.

(2) This listing of federal and state laws that contain examples of protected classes is intended to be illustrative and not restrictive.

(3) "Discrimination" includes the assertion of an otherwise valid reason for selection as a subterfuge for prohibited discrimination. For purposes of this article, "discrimination" shall also include references to "unlawful discrimination," "discrimination on an arbitrary basis," and all logical derivations of the word "discriminate."

Employee. Any individual employed by, or seeking employment from, an employer or terminated by an employer, but does not include any individual employed by his parents, spouse, or child, or any individual employed under a special license in a nonprofit sheltered workshop or rehabilitation facility.

Employer. Any person regularly employing five or more persons, or any person acting as an agent of an employer directly or indirectly.

Employment agency. Any person or business that procures employees or opportunities to work for compensation.

Harassment. Includes, but is not limited to:

- (1) Verbal harassment (e.g., epithets, derogatory comments, or slurs on the basis set forth in this article);
- (2) Physical harassment (e.g., assault impeding or blocking movement, or any physical interference with normal work or movement when directed at an individual on the basis set forth in this article);
- (3) Visual forms of harassment (e.g., derogatory posters, cartoons, or drawings on the basis set forth in this article);
- (4) Sexual harassment (e.g., unwanted sexual advances which condition an employment benefit upon an exchange of sexual favors).

In applying this subsection, the rights of free speech and association shall be accommodated consistent with this subsection.

Labor organization. Includes any organization which exists and is constituted for the purpose, in whole or in part, of collective bargaining or of dealing with employers concerning grievances, terms or conditions of employment, or other mutual aid or protection.

Person. Any natural person or a firm, corporation, partnership, or other organization or group of persons however organized, including the city.

Transaction in real property. Exhibition, listing, advertising, negotiating, financing, agreeing to transfer or transferring, whether by sale, lease, sublease, rent, assignment, or other agreement, of any interest in real property or improvements thereon, including but not limited to leaseholds and other real chattels.

The above definitions are intended to complement rather than conflict with corresponding provisions of federal and state law.

9.35.050 Defenses, exceptions and exemptions.

- (a) Any practice which has a discriminatory effect and which would otherwise be prohibited by this article shall not be deemed unlawful if it can be established that such practice is not intentionally devised or operated to contravene the prohibitions of this article and can be justified by business necessity.
- (b) Religious organizations shall be exempt from the provisions of this article to the extent permitted by law.
- (c) Nothing contained in this article shall be construed to prohibit promotional activities designed primarily to encourage participation by protected groups (i.e., senior citizen discounts, children's discounts, and other similar practices), unless otherwise prohibited by law.
- (d) It shall not be unlawful to refuse to rent or lease a portion of an occupied dwelling unit to a person as a roomer or boarder when the dwelling is also occupied by the lessor.
- (e) It shall not be unlawful for an employer to observe the conditions of a bona fide seniority system or a bona fide employee benefit system such as a retirement, pension, or insurance plan which is not a subterfuge to evade the purposes of this article.
- (f) It shall not be unlawful for an owner to limit occupancy of a building or mobile home park to tenants on the basis of age as permitted by federal and state law.
- (g) Prohibited discriminatory practice does not include acts based upon a person's marital status which are reasonably related to a valid statutory purpose.
- (h) It shall not be unlawful to limit attendance to classes or programs conducted by an educational institution based upon a valid educational objective or purpose.
- (i) It shall not be unlawful for any person to carry out a legally valid affirmative action plan devised as remedial or corrective action in response to past discriminatory practices within the workplace.
- (j) Any employee whose employer has in place a formal written grievance procedure or other system to redress alleged improprieties covered by this article shall utilize and exhaust such procedure prior to proceeding under the provisions of this article.
- (k) This article shall not apply to public agencies not subject to the jurisdiction of this article.

9.35.060 Discrimination in employment.

(a) *Prohibited activity.* It shall be unlawful to commit any act of discrimination against an employee or person, or class of persons, in the employment context as prohibited by the statutes and laws set forth in the definition of “discrimination” in section [9.35.040](#) of this article, including acts by an employer, employment agency, or labor organization.

(b) *Bona fide occupational qualifications not prohibited; burden of proof.*

(1) Nothing contained in this section shall be deemed to prohibit selection or rejection based upon a bona fide occupational qualification.

(2) In any action brought under this article, if a party asserts that an otherwise unlawful discriminatory practice is justified as a bona fide occupational qualification, that party shall have the burden of proving that:

a. The discrimination is in fact a necessary result of a bona fide occupational qualification;
and

b. There exists no less discriminatory means of satisfying the occupational qualification.

9.35.070 Discrimination in housing.

(a) *Prohibited activity.* It shall be unlawful to commit any act of discrimination against a person or class of persons with regard to any transaction in real property, including but not limited to the purchase, sale, rental, or listing of housing, that constitutes discrimination prohibited by the statutes and laws set forth in the definition of “discrimination” in section 47-34 of this article.

(b) *Exceptions.* Nothing in this article shall be deemed to permit any rental or occupancy of any dwelling unit or commercial space otherwise prohibited by law.

9.35.080 Discrimination by business establishments.

It shall be unlawful to commit any of the following acts in a discriminatory manner against a person or class of persons:

(1) To deny, directly or indirectly, any person the full and equal enjoyment of the goods, services, facilities, privileges, advantages, and accommodations of any business establishment of every kind whatsoever;

(2) To make, print, publish, advertise, or disseminate in any manner, or cause to be made, printed, published, advertised, or disseminated, any notice, statement, or advertisement with respect to any business establishment which indicates that the full enjoyment of such establishment will be unlawfully refused an individual.

9.35.090 Discrimination in provision of city facilities and services.

It shall be unlawful to deny to any person, on a discriminatory basis, full and equal enjoyment of any city facility, service, or program funded or otherwise supported by the city.

9.35.100 Harassment.

(a) For purposes of this section, “harassment” shall be that conduct defined in the definition of “harassment” in section [9.35.040](#).

(b) Harassment of an applicant or an employee by an employer, the employer’s agents or supervisors is unlawful.

(c) (1) Harassment of an applicant or an employee by an employee other than those listed in subsection (a) is unlawful if the employer or the employer’s agents or supervisors know of such conduct and fail to take immediate and appropriate corrective action. Proof of such knowledge may be direct or circumstantial.

(2) If the employer, the employer’s agents or supervisors did not know but should have known of the harassment, knowledge may be imputed, unless the employer can establish that he took reasonable measures to prevent harassment from occurring. Such measures may include, but are not limited to, affirmatively raising the subject of harassment, expressing strong disapproval, developing appropriate sanctions, informing employees of their right to, and explaining how to, raise the issue of harassment under this article or state or federal law and developing methods to sensitize all concerned.

(d) An employee who has been harassed on the job by a co-employee should inform the employer or other covered entity of the harassment. However, an employee’s failure to inform the employer is not a defense to the harassment.

(e) Harassment outside of the workplace of an individual or group of individuals is unlawful, including harassment in public or at any business establishment.

9.35.110 Complaints, resolution of disputes, and enforcement.

(a) Filing of written complaint.

(1) Any person who believes that he has been subjected to unlawful discrimination or harassment in violation of this article may file a written complaint pursuant to this section.

(2) Complaints shall be filed either in writing, with a designated staff person, to the Human Relations Commission or by the taking of a complaint over the telephone. Complaints received over the telephone by city staff shall be reduced to writing by the staff person on a complaint form prepared and approved by the Human Relations Commission. The complainant shall be provided a copy of the complaint. Complaints shall remain confidential, unless the confidentiality is waived by the complainant or unless disclosure is otherwise required by law.

(b) Processing of housing and employment complaints. If a complaint alleges a violation of section [9.35.060](#) (employment) or section [9.35.070](#) (housing), the complaint shall first be referred to the local state or federal agency identified by the city as the appropriate agency to handle the complaint for consultation and advice to the city and complainant.

(c) Dispute resolution process.

(1) *Resolution by Human Relations Commission staff person.* If the complaint appears to fall within the purview of this article, a staff member assigned to the Human Relations Commission shall attempt to mediate and resolve the complaint on an informal basis. The staff shall disseminate information and cause such investigation to occur as they deem appropriate and shall endeavor to resolve and/or refer the complaint within 15 days of receipt.

(2) *Referral to Human Relations Commission Complaint Resolution Committee.* If the complaint cannot be resolved by staff, the complaint shall be referred to the Complaint Resolution Committee (the "Committee"). The Committee shall be established pursuant to rules of procedure adopted by the Commission and shall consist of three members of the Commission. An additional member of the Commission shall serve as an alternate. The Commission may establish more than one committee.

a. Review and investigation of complaint by Complaint Resolution Committee. Within 15 days of referral, the Committee shall review the complaint, establish a schedule for mediation of the complaint, and determine whether further investigation is warranted. The Committee may utilize investigators on a compensated or pro bono basis.

b. Action by Committee after investigation is completed.

1. Dismissal of complaint. If the Committee finds that the person charged in the complaint has not engaged in such unlawful practice or conduct, it shall notify the parties to the complaint, in writing, of its determination and the complaint shall be dismissed.

2. Conciliation and persuasion. If the Committee determines that probable cause exists for the allegations made in the complaint, the Committee may endeavor to eliminate the unlawful practice charged in the complaint by means of conciliation and persuasion. The Committee may meet with the parties separately, together, or both, in pursuit of resolution.

3. Referral to outside mediation. The Committee may refer a complaint to a trained mediator on a compensated or pro bono basis. The mediator shall attempt to mediate and resolve the complaint and forward a written synopsis of his efforts, including findings, to the Committee. If mediation resolves the complaint, the Committee shall close the complaint as being resolved.

4. Complaint not resolved by outside mediator. If the outside mediator is unable to resolve the complaint, the mediator shall prepare written findings and refer the results of the mediation to the Committee. The Committee may continue to attempt to resolve the complaint.

(3) *Unresolved complaints.* If there has been no resolution of the complaint, either by staff, by the Complaint Resolution Committee, or by the efforts of the outside mediator, and 60 days have elapsed since the initial filing of the complaint, the Complaint Resolution Committee may do any of the following:

a. Refer the complaint to the appropriate federal or state agency for resolution;

b. Close the complaint as being unresolved;

c. If the parties do not consent to review by the Human Relations Commission, the Committee may refer the complaint to the City Attorney and request a determination as to whether legal action or referral to a state or federal agency is appropriate to cause the respondent to cease and desist the discriminatory practice or harassment.

d. If the parties consent in writing to the referral, the Committee may refer the complaint and the results of its investigation and findings to the Commission for decision and recommendation pursuant to subsection (4) below.

(4) *Determination of complaint by Human Relations Commission.* In the event the complaint is referred to the Commission, the Commission shall hold a public meeting to consider the matter. The Commission shall endeavor to render its decision on the matter raised in the complaint within 180 days of the original filing of the complaint. Following its review of the complaint and investigation, the Commission shall render a decision, including written findings of fact and a recommendation. The decision, findings, and recommendation shall be mailed to the parties within 30 days of the decision.

a. Human Relations Commission action. If there has been no resolution of the complaint, the Commission may take any action set forth in subsection (c)(3) of this section.

b. Reconsideration of decision. The decision of the Commission shall be final, unless a party to the complaint files a request for reconsideration. The request shall be made in writing within seven days following the receipt by the requesting party of the Commission's decision. The Commission shall notify the parties, in writing, whether or not it will reconsider its decision. If the Commission grants reconsideration, the notice shall state the time and date that the matter will be reconsidered.

9.35.120 Rules of procedure of Human Relations Commission.

The Commission shall, by resolution, adopt procedures to carry out the purposes of this article. The resolution shall not be effective until approved by the City Council. Housekeeping or minor administrative changes to the approved resolution may be accomplished by motion of the Commission and need not be approved by the City Council; however, the City Council reserves the right to review any amendment to the rules of procedure.

9.35.130 Confidentiality of proceedings.

All proceedings, complaints, and conferences with Commission staff and the Committee are considered settlement or mediation efforts within the meaning of state law, including Evidence Code § [1152](#) et seq., and shall be exempt from disclosure to the extent permitted by law. Proceedings before the Commission are not confidential.

9.35.140 Retaliation prohibited.

No person shall retaliate against any other person for seeking to enforce the provisions of this article. Any such retaliation shall be deemed an act of discrimination or harassment under this article.

9.35.150 Other remedies.

(a) *Private right of action.* Any person or class of persons whose rights are violated pursuant to this article may, to the extent allowed by law, bring a civil action against the person or persons engaging in such violation. Upon a finding of liability, the court shall award actual damages, but not less than \$500.00. The prevailing party is entitled to reasonable costs and reasonable attorney's fees. No punitive or exemplary damages may be awarded pursuant to this article.

(b) *Public enforcement.*

(1) The city may enforce the provisions of this article pursuant to section [1.05.210](#) of this Code. In the event the city enforces this article pursuant to section [1.05.210](#) of this Code, the city, as prevailing party, is entitled to recover reasonable costs, including court costs, investigation costs, and/or mediation costs, and reasonable attorney's fees.

(2) If the court finds against the defendant, the court shall assess a civil penalty against the defendant and payable to the city in the amount of \$500.00 and shall also award actual damages, but not less than \$500.00, to the person or class of persons whose rights were violated pursuant to this article.

(c) *Injunctive relief.* Any person who suffers from an act in violation of any provision of this article may seek a temporary restraining order, preliminary or permanent injunction issued by a court of competent jurisdiction to preserve the status quo or enjoin any future violations of the unlawful practice. Such action may be brought by an aggrieved party or by the city either in conjunction with an action for damages, as provided in subsections (a) and (b), or as the sole remedy.

(d) *Exhaustion of administrative remedy not required.* A complaint to the Commission is not a prerequisite to the filing of an administrative complaint or a civil action in a state or federal court.

(e) *Effect of other actions on complaint resolution process.* In the event a civil action is filed pursuant to subsection (a), (b), or (c), or a complaint is filed with a federal or state agency, the complaint resolution process under this article shall stop and the matter will be considered closed. In no event shall a complaint be processed for a matter where a court or administrative agency has rendered a final decision.

(f) *Emergency relief.* If, at any time after a complaint has been filed, city staff, the Committee, or the Human Relations Commission determines that appropriate civil action to preserve the status quo or to prevent irreparable harm appears advisable, the matter may be referred to the City Attorney for appropriate legal action or referral to a state or federal agency. The parties shall be notified of the referral to the City Attorney.

9.35.160 Time limit for filing civil actions.

Civil actions under this article must be filed within one year from the time the complainant alleges that the unlawful practice or conduct occurred.

9.35.170 Criminal liability for violations.

Notwithstanding any provision of this Code to the contrary, a violation of any provision of this article is neither a crime nor an infraction. This section is not to be construed to relieve a person of any criminal liability under other provisions of law.

9.35.180 Posting of notices.

Every employer, labor organization, employment agency, and business establishment shall post a notice that discrimination is prohibited by this article. The Human Relations Commission shall develop the contents of said notice so as to effectuate the purposes of this article.

9.35.190 Severability; conformance with state and federal laws.

This article was developed cognizant of the existence of state and federal laws that regulate discrimination and harassment. It is the intent of the city that this law complement existing law and not conflict with same. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this article is held to be invalid or unconstitutional for any reason by the decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of the article. The City Council hereby declares that it would have adopted this article and each section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, sentences, clauses, phrases, or portions be declared invalid or unconstitutional.
