### VI. BUSINESS

### Discussion on Cyclist Safety

Public Comments were received from Linnette Kidd, Robert Prinz, Bruce Olsen, and Alexander Broom.

Commissioner Del Castillo advocated for a Bicycle Master Plan, citing that design changes are needed to change vehicle behavior. He also advocated for a review of existing projects. He also suggested that the Commission make a presentation to City Council on this subject. The commission then discussed these ideas and asked ACM Helfenberger how they could potentially be implemented. ACM Helfenberger responded that the Parks and Recreation Commission (acting as the Bicycle Pedestrian Advisory Committee) makes recommendations to City Council any changes to projects or policy would need to be agendized and approved by City Council. Chair King suggested a policy on bicycle infrastructure. Commissioner Ellis and other suggested seeking grants for improvements. Commissioner Del Castillo suggested hearing more from bicycle advocates on short term improvements that could be implemented. Commissioner King outlined the resources required as well as staff coordination to follow through on these ideas. Commissioner Del Castillo suggested forming an Ad-Hoc Committee on the topic. ACM Helfenberger suggested that Chair King have an offline conversation with the Mayor on this topic because the City Council has also expressed interest in exploring this topic. This would allow both bodies to coordinate their efforts. The conversation concluded with a consensus that the Commission would like to receive general information on current bicycle-related projects, current regulations, and the creation of an Ad-Hoc committee to explore the topic further.

### 2. Overview of Funds Available for Park Improvements

At 8:07pm, the Chair requested a 5-minute recess. At 8:13pm, the Commission returned to order with Commissioners Del Castillo, Ellis, Eubanks, Hunt, and King present.

ACM Helfenberger provided an overview of funds available for park improvement as well as a description of restrictions on those funds. There was a particular focus on Development Impact Fees, since those fees are tied to a specific list of projects as described in the Nexus Study adopted in 2014. The Commission requested a copy of the study, which ACM promised to send. The Commission expressed interest in having an update to the Nexus Study to ensure that the projects are relevant to today's population and that they be reduced in scope to make them more achievable.

### 3. Update on "City Resources" Page for the Recreation Guide

ACM Helfenberger provided an update on a request made by Commissioner Ellis to add a "City Resources" page in the Recreation Guide. The request has been completed and the resources page will be included in the fall activity guide.

### VII. COMMUNICATIONS (Announcements and Correspondence)

### 1. Staff Communication

ACM Helfenberger shared that the Water Park would be open for general admission through September 3. He also shared upcoming events including the final summer concert on 8/22, Big Truck Day on 9/19, Coastal Cleanup Day on 9/21, and Rhythms by the River on 9/28. He also announced that the Bicycle Garden is under development and will be coming to the Commission in September for an update. He also provided a brief update on the Contra Loma Estates Park renovation which is currently underway.

### 2. Commission Communication

Commissioner Del Castillo attended a Water Park After Dark event expressed appreciation for the event. Chair King commended Parks and Recreation on the level of activities available to the community. Vice-Chair Ellis echoed this sentiment and also praised the Junior Giants program.

Acting Director Buenting introduced the project and presented the improvements and how grant funds would be used. Several clarifying questions were asked and answered. Commissioner Del Castillo asked about asking for increased funding for future projects. Director Buenting responded that the projects are more competitive at the current size. Commissioner Del Castillo requested a more thoughtful process for future projects, as he feels that this project is a band-aid fix.

2. Albers Property Subdivision 9515 Residential Project Determination of Dedication of Land or Payment of Park-In-Lieu Fees

Acting Director Buenting introduced the project. The development will result \$441,000 in Park in Lieu Fees. Commissioner Del Castillo asked about the role of the Commission in this process. Commissioner Ellis asked what happens to the funds. Director Helfenberger responded that they go into a fund for new parks or to renovate existing parks. A discussion was held on how the fees are determined and how the park-in-lieu program works.

Motion to recommend a determination that Albers Property Subdivision 9515 single family residential project is subject to a payment of \$441,000 of park land dedication park-in-lieu fees.



Recommendation to City Council

### **RECOMMENDED ACTION**

It is recommended that the Parks and Recreation Commission review the recommendation for Civic Enhancement Grants from the Civic Enhancement Grant Ad-Hoc Committee and make a final recommendation to City Council for approval and authorization.

### FISCAL IMPACT

The budget allocation for the Civic Enhancement Grant Program is \$50,000 for Fiscal Year 2024-2025.

### **DISCUSSION**

The FY24-25 Budget includes continued funding for the Civic Enhancement Grants Program to support community events and improvement projects that originate with Non-Profit organizations in Antioch. It is the City's goal to assist Non-Profit organizations by creating and implementing a grant program to fund civic events and enhancement projects in an objective manner. The Parks and Recreation Commission makes final recommendations for grant approval to the City Council, which ultimately authorizes the grant allocations.

The program also includes an option to request City facilities/ services as part of the application to allow organizations access without having to use awarded funds for this purpose. These in-kind requests are noted on the Proposed Funding List in the "Appx. Value of City Facilities/ Services" column. The value of these services are in addition to the recommended funding amount.

Applications for the Civic Enhancement Grant Program were published on September 13, 2023, and due October 14, 2024. The City received 28 applications for grant funding to support projects and/or programs in 2025. The City Council authorized \$50,000 in FY24-25 to fund the civic enhancement grant program. The total amount of funding requested is \$2,096,626.

On October 24, 2024, the Parks and Recreation Commission appointed three members to serve on the Ad-Hoc Committee to review the applications and recommend funding amounts for the grant applications. The Committee met on November 7, 2024, and November 13, 2024 to review the applications. The Committee's funding recommendation is included on the attached Proposed Funding List.

The attached documents provide summary information including the program policy, list of applicants, amount of funding requested, value of City facilities/ services requested, and amount of funding recommended. The Ad-Hoc Committee recommended 19 proposed projects & programs receive partial funding requested, with five to receive inkind support through City facilities and services. One application was selected to receive City facilities only.

- Improvements to or operation of arts and cultural facilities
- General city beautification

### Applications are due October 14, 2024, 5:00pm.

While pleased to contribute toward enhancement activities, the city is interested in investing where other funding entities also contribute to the cost of programs, events and projects. Please describe in detail the program, event or project that you would like the City to support; other funders and supporters, and the positive impact it will have on the community. If your proposal is for a program or event to be held at a City facility, please include the approximate facility fees separately on the form. This will allow the City to waive facility/permit fees rather than have the organization pay them from any awarded grant funds.

Funding disbursements will be made after the nonprofit has been notified from the City. The city reserves the right to adjust grant awards based upon budgetary circumstances following the adoption of the Fiscal Budget.

The application package must include the following:

### **Policy Introduction**

The City of Antioch offers one-time grants to provide funding that support operations, marketing and promotions for Antioch special events, historic and cultural activities, and facilities that enhance civic pride and strengthens community engagement within the City. Grants are funded by revenues from City Transient Occupancy Taxes (TOT) and/or the General Fund and approved by the City Council. Applications will be reviewed by the City and the Antioch City Council makes the final grant award decisions.

Funds may only be used for:

- Activities performed directly for the benefit and enjoyment of Antioch residents; open to the public and all citizens and/or underserved youth/communities.
- Improvements to or operation of arts and cultural facilities
- General city beautification

Applications may also include a request to use City facilities for programs or events. These costs should be listed separately on the application. This will allow the City to waive facility/permit fees rather than have the organization pay them from any awarded grant funds. Applicants and grant recipients must meet certain reporting requirements and deadlines. This may include reports of how grant funds from previous fiscal years and or grantors were used.

### **Applicant eligibility**

To be eligible for civic enhancement grants, organizations must be a non-profit corporation, or have a qualifying fiscal agent with tax-exempt status under section 501(c)(3), 501(c)(4), or 501(c)(6) of the Internal Revenue Code. Organizations/ Fiscal Agent must provide a copy of their current 501(c)(3), 501(c)(4), or 501(c)(6) IRS determination letter when submitting an application. Private individuals are not eligible to submit applications for programs, events or projects.

### How to apply

Applications for grants are only accepted during the submission period, which will end October 14, 2024. City funds that are budgeted for grants must be committed by June 30, 2024, which is the end of the Fiscal Year.

- Organizations must meet all the applicant requirements detailed in the current application packet. Read the instructions and all application materials very carefully.
- Complete and submit all of the application materials listed on the grant application checklist. Applications missing any of the required materials will not be considered for



funding. Please note that official budget reports and fiscal statements from the nonprofit organization may be required under the final grant contract.

### **Application forms**

Applications for Civic Enhancement Grants will be available after July 1<sup>st</sup> each year. The application may be downloaded from the City of Antioch website: <a href="https://www.antiochca.gov/recreation">www.antiochca.gov/recreation</a>.

### **Types of grants**

- Activities performed directly for the benefit and enjoyment of all Antioch residents;
   open to the public and all citizens and/or underserved youth/communities.
- Improvements to or operation of arts and cultural facilities in Antioch
- General city beautification within Antioch

All events proposed for funding must be:

- Open to the public and/or underserved youth/communities
- Take place within the over-arching boundaries of the Antioch City Limits
- Committed and/or scheduled between July 1 and June 30 of the fiscal year for which the grant is awarded

At the Parks and Recreation Commission Regular Meeting of August 15, 2024, the Commission held a discussion on cyclist safety. During the discussion, the Commission reached a consensus to create an Ad-Hoc Committee for the purposes of exploring this issue in more depth and identifying potential bicycle safety improvements.
