RECREATION UPDATES

- Last week, staff completed 80 new hire and rehire packets that will be used during the 2016 Water Park seasonal staff recruitment period. Do not let your teens wait until April or May to look for summer employment. We are accepting applications now and all hiring is complete by late April.
- Water Park staff is completing inventory this week and ordering supplies, equipment, and uniforms for the summer 2016 season.
- On Tuesday, staff created a video commercial project promoting summer job opportunities at the Water Park which will be played at Deer Valley High School. The commercial director is a current student at Deer Valley High School and seasonal employee at the Water Park. There are many talented teens in Antioch!
- Last week marked the opening of the reservation period for Water Park rentals and “full buyouts.” Openings for complete water park buyouts are booked well in advance and sell out quickly so do not delay. **BE COOL BY THE POOL** in 2016!
- Water Park staff continues updating the policies and procedures, and training schedules to ensure a safe and enjoyable summer for guests and staff.
- More than 66 residents have started off the *year* with an exciting *fitness* goal by joining fitness classes at the Antioch Community Center. Some groove to the Latin beats in Zumba fitness, others join the stress relieving relaxation of Yoga, and some have used Strength Training classes to increase bone density and control weight. You can find a fitness class to help you with your individual goals this year – contact the Recreation Staff, they are always available to help.
- Last week, more than 50 youth joined the youth dance program and were excited to show their moves! For many young children dance is the first group activity where they interact with others their age and learn the dynamics of being in a group, all very important life skills! Participants enjoy performing a choreographed dance to the delight of their families at the end of the eight week session.
- On Tuesday, staff met with the Arts and Cultural Foundation of Antioch and the Ruah Community Outreach, Inc. leadership to begin planning for the *Black History Month Special Exhibit* at Nick Rodriguez Community Center. Mark your calendar – the exhibit opens February 6, 2015 for two weeks.
- On Thursday, staff received final permit approvals to begin the bid process for construction of the Spray Park addition at the Water Park and the playground at Prewett Community Park.

Senior Center Services

- On Friday, Recreation Specialist Gina Lombardi-Gravert said farewell to the seniors. She accepted a new position with the City of Martinez. The seniors welcomed interim Recreation Specialist Mike Heller.
- Last week, more than 372 affordable healthy meals were served through the C.C. Café. This was an addition of 57 more meals over last week. This program helps prevent heart attacks, depression, asthma and congestive heart failure. No membership or income requirements are required to eat at the C.C. Cafe.

- Staff met with Contra Costa County, East Bay Works Senior Employment, to explore the opportunity to add more part time employees in a variety of roles at the Senior Center.
- On Monday, staff met with the Lions Center for the Visually Impaired to discuss an eyeglasses program for the Seniors who need assistance.
- On Tuesday, staff attended the special meeting of the Antioch Senior Citizen’s Club Board of Directors meeting and provided input and direction on various programs and topics.

Planning:

- On January 12, the City Council approved Heidorn Village, a 117 unit residential subdivision located east of the current terminus of Prewett Ranch Dr.
- The Planning Commission will be hosting a public workshop on January 20 at the Prewett Community Center. The topic will be the Sand Creek Focus Area and there will be a number of hands-on opportunities for residents to provide direct input into the development of policy for the area.

Environmental Resources:

Environmental Enforcement: Jan 7-13, there were over 35 actions taken on existing cases. 7 properties were signed up for 6 months of garbage service. 16 courtesy notices were mailed out for properties where the abated service is ending. Four cases were closed. Republic services will be updating our database for this program with the next batch of homes to address over the next couple of weeks.

Eco-Happenings:

- Save the Date: Lose a Lawn workshop scheduled for March 19th at Prewett Family Park. Staff is working in partnership with Contra Costa Water District to offer this free workshop to residents interested in learning more about rebate programs and design assistance for re-landscaping
- The tree-cycling drop off lots are now closed for the season. If you still have your cut tree to discard, you can use your yard waste cart or call to schedule an extra pick up. Flocked trees can be picked up for a fee of \$40 or as one of your two, free, large-item pickups. **Questions?** Call Republic Services at (925) 685-4711.

CDBG:

- Quarterly reports are due from agencies January 15th
- Renewal applications were opened January 4th and are due February 8, 2016, at 5:00 p.m. No new applications will be taken, as this is the second year of a two year grant cycle.
- Monitoring by Antioch and other Consortium members is underway and will continue through February.

Housing:

- Levy group proposes to purchase and make improvements to Casa Blanca Apartments at 1000 Claudia Court, an existing low-income housing development. They will be coming before Council February 9th to request permission to submit their application to the State for low-income tax credits.

Homeless:

- Homeless Point in Time Count, mandated by HUD, count the number of people who report that they were homeless on the night of January 27th. Homeless Outreach teams will reach persons living in encampments, while volunteers will go to identified public areas. Interviewers will complete a simple questionnaire with each person, and the data will be entered into the Homeless Information Management System.

Volunteers are being sought to assist in East County, and must be age 18 and older. Antioch will host the East County meeting to train volunteers, on Saturday January 23rd from 9-11 a.m. at the Nick Rodriguez Center. All interested persons are invited.

- New members to the Council on Homelessness, including Antioch PD Captain Diane Aguinaga, are expected to be formally appointed to the Council in February.
- Anyone interested in ending homelessness in Contra Costa County is invited to the quarterly General Meeting of the Council on Homelessness this Friday, January 15th from 10-12 in the ZA room, located at 30 Muir Road in Martinez. The quarterly general membership meeting is a forum for communication and coordination about the implementation of the County's Strategic Plan to prevent and end homelessness, educating the community on homeless issues, and for orchestrating a vision on ending homelessness in the County, and advocating on federal, state, and local policy issues affecting people who are homeless or at-risk of homelessness.

DROUGHT UPDATES:

For the first week of January, our conservation efforts were at 3.34%. This brings our reported cumulative total to 31.675%. Our state mandated reduction of 28% has to be maintained through February, 2016. To keep us above that, now it is time to move that effort indoors! Irrigation Repairs and Service:

- Park Water Reductions: All City Parks were inspected for compliance to Winter water shutdown. All 32 Parks were found in a Rain Shutdown.
- Chaparral Park: Is slated for a replacement 3" backflow, and is currently shut down, along with our pump, until this upgrade is completed.
- Chichibu Park: The main is shut off, pending repairs to park irrigation.
- Williamson Ranch: The main is currently shut off, pending replacement of Shrub valve C-17, that was leaking.

PUBLIC WORKS UPDATES

Administration

- Due to the current and predicted El Niño rains, Public Works has procured extra sand bags and sand, as well as ensuring staff is ready for action 24/7. The City website has additional information about what the City is doing and how the community can better prepare for the possibility of a severe winter. Sandbags can be obtained at the Public Works Department 1201 West 4th Street for \$1 filled and or \$0.50 unfilled.
- The City of Antioch is being required to reduce its 2015 water usage by 28% in 2015 using 2013 as the base year. Outdoor water conservation will be the primary focus of the City's program, as well as fines for wasteful practices as identified in the Water Conservation Resolution adopted by the City Council on May 12th. All Antioch customers will be mailed a letter explaining the program and prohibitions, as well as 2013 monthly water usage. Examples of prohibitions are: three day per week residential outdoor watering, no watering between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and

5:00 p.m., shut off nozzles required on all hoses, and drinking water available only upon request at restaurants. Contra Costa Water District has incentives, such as residential high-efficiency clothes washer rebates, water-efficient landscape rebates and smart sprinkler timer rebates. More information on water conservation programs and ideas on how to conserve water can be found at www.ccwater.com or www.antiochwater.com. Customers who are not in compliance with drought restrictions can be reported to the Antioch Drought Hotline at (925) 779-6140.

- Final Statistics for the Delta Diablo Residential Recycled Water Fill Station Pilot Project – July through December 2015; the total water used by Antioch, Bay Point and Pittsburg residents combined was 2,045,426 gallons. 1,227,331 gallons of this amount were used by Antioch residents.

Engineering & Development Services

- Almondridge East Subdivision 8880, an 81-unit single family home development by KB Homes, located between East 18th Street and Oakley Road, east of Phillips Lane and west of the State Highway 160: Staff is reviewing plot plans for ongoing new home construction.
- Buchanan Crossings Shopping Center, a 103,139 square foot commercial center on a 13.5-acre site located at the northwest corner of Somersville Road and Buchanan Road: CVS and Grocery Outlet stores are open for business and other building pads are in development and planning stages. Environmental clearances and USBR permitting requirements for the Phase 2 development are in progress.
- City Sports Club, located at 5001 Lone Tree Way: Building and parking lot construction is nearing completion.
- DeNova Homes Mixed Use Project at Hillcrest Ave./Wildflower Dr.: Mixed use project consisting of 9.5 acres commercial, 8 acres multi-family, and 2.2 acres single family development. The Planning Commission discussed DeNova's PDP-15-01 application on August 19th. The developer has been reaching out to the neighborhood for input into the project. An application with an updated site plan is anticipated in February or March.
- Laurel Ranch, a 186-unit housing development by Richland Communities, located at the eastern terminus of existing Laurel Road and west of Highway 4: Staff is reviewing the final development plan and preparing project conditions of approval.
- Oakley Knolls Subdivision 9353, a 31-lot development by Discovery Builders, located north of Oakley Road 1,300 feet west of Phillips Lane: Staff prepared conditions of approval for a tentative map application.
- Park Ridge Phase I, a 123-unit housing development by Davidon Homes, located west of Canada Valley Road and east of Highway 4: Staff returned comments to the 4th submittal map and plans.
- SR4 (Segment 2) Contra Loma Blvd. Interchange/'G' Street Overcrossing Project: The project is nearing completion and punch list items are being addressed by the contractor. Pedestrians and motorists are advised to exercise caution while travelling through this area.

- SR4 (Segment 3A) 'A' Street/Lone Tree Way Interchange, Cavallo Road/Garrow Drive Undercrossing Project: Work continues on the 'A' St./Lone Tree Way and Cavallo Road Overcrossings and the new Sunset Drive from Bryan Avenue to "A" Street extension. Pedestrians and motorists are advised to exercise caution while travelling through these areas.
- SR4 (Segment 3B) Hillcrest Avenue Interchange and BART Tunnel Project: Work continues on the Hillcrest Avenue Bridge widening, the Pedestrian Overcrossing (POC) and the Maintenance of Works (MOW) Tunnel. The new Slatten Ranch Road westbound (WB) loop on-ramp is open to traffic and the Hillcrest WB on-ramp is temporarily closed. Pedestrians and motorists are advised to exercise caution while travelling through this area.
- BART Parking Lot and Maintenance Facility: Staff approved the design for a proposed 12" sanitary sewer main from the new Maintenance Facility, north of the S.P.R.R. railroad line to the southerly extension of Willow Avenue and is reviewing grant deeds for public easement dedications. Staff returned comments to BART's Ownership and Maintenance of Utilities Agreement for storm drainage improvements.
- Deer Valley Business Park, commercial development fronting Country Hills Drive between Lone Tree Way and Deer Valley Road: Staff is processing abandonment of existing easement and establishment of new easements.
- The Vineyards at Sand Creek, a proposed 641 unit housing development located on Sand Creek Road between Heidorn Ranch Road and Hillcrest Avenue: The tentative map has been approved by Planning Commission and is being scheduled for consideration by the City Council.
- Quail Cove, a proposed 32 unit housing located on the south side of Prewett Ranch Drive west of Heidorn Ranch Road: The tentative map has been submitted and staff is creating conditions of approval.
- Aviano, an approved 533 unit housing development located west of the current terminus of Hillcrest Avenue, east and north of Dozier-Libby Medical High School. Staff is working with developer on the extension of Chaparral Park. The first phase of construction documents have been submitted for 1st review.

Capital Improvements Division

- Water Main Replacement at Various Locations: D&D Pipelines continues to install new water facilities on Sunset Drive.
- Fulton Shipyard Road Sewage Drainage Station: JD Partners is scheduled to commence construction later this month.
- Water Treatment Plant Disinfection Improvements: CDM Smith is developing the 90% draft project plans and specifications.
- Water Treatment Plant Electrical Upgrades: TJC and Associates and their sub-consultants are conducting a site investigation of the electrical facilities at the Water Treatment Plant.
- Cathodic Protection Assessment: JDH Corrosion Consultants, Inc. is reviewing existing site improvement plans of areas containing cathodically protected City

facilities. A field investigation of the existing facilities is scheduled to commence next week.

- Country Hills Drive and Vista Grande Drive Water Main Replacement: Construction bids were publically opened on January 12, 2016. The apparent low bidder was A-S Pipelines, Inc. Project bids are currently under review.
- 2015 Transportation Development Act (TDA) Grant: JD Partners completed the construction of 27 new curb ramps along Bluerock Drive and West Tregallas Road and is now working on new ramps along San Joaquin Avenue. The City Council will consider the final acceptance of the project at the February 9, 2016 meeting.
- Transportation Impact Fee Study: Staff is working with the consultant, EPS, to finalize the land use forecasts and the transportation improvement list and network to be used in the traffic model. The final draft Fee Study will be presented to the City Council for public review and comments in May 2016.
- Prewett Water Park Improvements: RHAA is under contract for the design of the final improvements at Prewett Water Park. Staff has received the project permit application from the County Health Department and is waiting for the Fire Department permit. RHAA is working on the final design plans and specifications of the spray ground and the playground facility. The bid packages for both projects are expected to be out for bid in February 2016 and construction is expected to be completed by September 2016.
- Northeast Annexation Infrastructure Improvements: Staff is drafting a Request for Proposal for consulting services to provide engineering services and to prepare preliminary plans, estimates and studies for the planning and the design of infrastructure improvements needed to serve the newly annexed Area 1 and 2B.
- Pavement Management Technical Assistance Program (P-TAP) Grant: Staff has submitted a \$95,000 grant application to MTC for consulting services to assist the City in implementing and maintaining the annual Pavement Management Program System by inspecting the pavement conditions of arterial, collector and residential streets and provide us with design recommendations for pavement rehabilitation projects.
- 2016 CalRecycle Rubberized Pavement Grant: CalRecycle has issued the Notice of Funding Availability for the Rubberized Pavement Grant Program. Staff has submitted an application for \$250,000 in grant funding for the 2016 Pavement Management Program, which will include potential streets recommended to receive Rubberized Cape Seal treatments.
- 2016 Transportation Development Act (TDA) Grant: MTC is soliciting applications for the 2016/2017 TDA grant for Pedestrian and Bicyclist improvement projects. The City Council will consider a resolution of support for the \$130,000 grant funding application at the January 12th meeting. The grant application will include funding for curb ramps upgrades to meet ADA requirements, installation of new sidewalks at needed locations and for bicyclist improvements along Cavallo Road, "A" Street, "G" Street, Putnam Street and Carpinteria Drive. The grant application will be reviewed by the Parks and Recreation Commission as the City's Bicycle Advisory Committee at the January 21, 2016 meeting.

- Professional Services for Public Infrastructure and Design: The City is soliciting Qualifications from Traffic Engineering, Civil Engineering, and Planning/Landscape Architecture firms for upcoming projects. Proposals for the first project, the L Street Path of Transit Corridor, are also being solicited.
- Traffic Signal Improvements at Wild Horse Road/Folsom Drive and W. Tenth Street/L Street: Staff is preparing plans and specifications for a new traffic signal at Wild Horse Road/Folsom Drive and a traffic signal modification at W. Tenth Street/L Street. The bid package is expected to be out for bid in February 2016.

Water Treatment Plant

- Cleaned Solar Bees out on the municipal reservoir. Solar Bees circulate the water in the reservoir; cleaning the Solar Bees prevents weeds from restricting the circulation. Also cleaned the staff gage on the tower. This is reoccurring and ongoing.
- Cleaned the Reclaim and the Equalization tanks.
- Completed hosing out and cleaning of "A" basin.

Water Distribution

- Water crews had 289 stops for water service including disconnections.
- Water crews had a total of 57 USA tickets completed for utility location.
- Meter reading has started for the month of January and is on schedule.
- There were 17 drought notices issued this week.
- Water crews continue to monitor water meters, conservation and usage at all City buildings and parks.
- Water Distribution personnel continue to respond to drought hotline inquiries.
- Water field techs responded to customer calls regarding water related issues city wide.
- Water crews repaired two 12" water valves on Lone Tree Way.
- Water crews replaced a pressure regulating valve on Minaker Dr.
- Water crews repaired a water main on E. 13th St.
- Water crews put a hydrant back in service on Putnam St.
- Water crews repaired a 6" water main on Lone Tree Way.
- Water crews repaired a 6" water main valve on Minta Ln.
- Central Stores issued 358 lines of inventory from stock to various divisions.
- Central Stores is currently working with Environmental Services to get the City back up to date on greenhouse gas emissions inventories and other climate programs. This involves providing fuel type, miles traveled and fuel consumption for the City's Fleet for a specific time period, as well as 2015.
- Stores ordered manhole materials for a Collections Division project.
- Central Stores placed an order for new City flags to reflect the current logo. Once received, they will replace the aging flags we currently have.
- Central Stores ordered gloves to prevent "needle stick" when cleaning up debris from encampment sites for NPDES/WAP crews.

- Central Stores continues to remove graffiti and household debris from Amtrak and Fulton Boat Ramp areas.

Public Works Operations – Parks and Landscape

- Playground and Park Safety Inspections: Completed at Contra Loma Estates and Gentrytown Parks. A follow-up inspection was completed at Williamson Ranch Park.
- Park Lighting Survey: Completed the annual inspection of all park and park restroom lighting. Repairs and lamp replacements are in progress.
- Park Water Reductions: All the City parks were inspected to make sure the irrigation was turned off for the rainy season.
- Park Vandalism: Repairing park sign graffiti at Contra Loma Estates, Gentrytown, Hillcrest and Williamson Ranch Parks. Anyone with information in regard to this is asked to call and report to Antioch Public Works at (925) 779-6950.
- Tree Removal Permits: No permits were issued this week.
- Irrigation: Repaired three irrigation leaks on City property, which completes 2,970 irrigation repairs since June 10, 2015.
- Leaf Removal: Canada Valley Rd., Downtown Areas and the A St. Extension.
- Roadside Spraying: No spraying due to the rainy weather.
- Tree Trimming: Lynn House.
- Hyacinth Removal: Marina boat launch.

Public Works Operations – Streets Maintenance

- Graffiti Abatement: Removed graffiti from City property in numerous areas.
- Signs: Replaced 102 existing signs due to poor reflectivity.
- Debris: Picked up one and a half yards of debris in the right of way.
- Potholes: Filled 58 potholes.
- Flood Control: Assisted flood control by cleaning mud from sidewalks and roadways on L St. between W. 18th St. and Sycamore Dr.

Public Works Maintenance Operations – Collections Division

- Calls for Sewer Service: Received and responded to six calls for service from the public. Responding crews televised 1,750 linear feet of public sewer laterals connecting to the City's sewer system.
- Sewer Mains: Daily preventative maintenance performed on over 9,475 linear feet of sewer main lines.
- Quarterly Sewer Main Cleaning: The route schedule is under review to increase inspection frequency of identified 'hot spots' and integrate a proactive preventative cleaning schedule for the 'hot spots.'
- Sewer Lateral Maintenance Program (SLMP): Crews televised 50 laterals. No laterals were in need of repair.
- Manhole Inspection Program: Crews inspected 58 manholes. Manholes are inspected for loose lids, debris, locking mechanisms, and status of infrastructure for

future maintenance and rehabilitation. We are updating the program and processes for integration in our computerized maintenance management system.

- Sanitary Sewer Overflow (SSO) Reduction Program: Staff is working on formal inspection criteria to inspect manholes in rural areas. The use of “SMART Manholes” in strategic areas will be utilized that will alert leadership staff within the division of potential SSOs. This program will also address the need for locking mechanisms.
- Closed Caption Televising (CCTV): Crews televised 2,413 feet of sewer main lines. The CCTV Preventative Maintenance crew inspects sewer mains to identify the condition and causes of blockages and SSOs.
- National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES): Crews removed ten yards of trash and debris, 21 shopping carts, and two mattresses from various creeks and channels. Inspected and cleaned 11 trash capture devices with 26 yards of debris removed from storm drain catch basins. These activities ensure the City meets the Federal Clean Water Act requirements of municipalities discharging storm water into waterways.

Public Works Operations – Fleet Division

- Preventative Maintenance: 12 services on City vehicles as scheduled.
- Unscheduled Repairs: 34 unscheduled, necessary repairs to City vehicles.

Public Works Operations – Municipal Marina

- New Occupancy: The Marina received one application for permanent berthing, responded to four berthing enquiries and gave two facility tours.
- Website: The new Marina website is attracting web traffic with over 24 new views this week and over 2,526 total views. View the new Marina website at: <http://ci.antioch.ca.us/antioch-marina>. Customers can now pay online, apply for berthing, and schedule overnight reservations.
- Maintenance: Removed hyacinth and debris from the Marina basin, as well as trash and debris from the Marina grounds. Replaced 22 bolts along the boat launch ramp floats.
- The Marine Science institute’s vessel, the Robert G. Brownlee is back for 2016, offering educational tours for local school children. The educational tours focus on the California Delta ecology and Delta specific species. For more information, please see their website at: <http://www.sfbaymsi.org>.
- Despite the cold wet weather, the Marina is experiencing a lot of public use compared to this time last year. Fishermen, dog walkers, bird watchers, and families utilize the Marina trail and facilities. As a reminder, the Marina Office is open seven (7) days a week, the walking trail is open during daylight hours, and the boat launch ramp is available 24 hours a day. The Marina looks forward to your visit!
- Advertising and Outreach: Approved advertisements placed in Yachtsman magazine reaching over 40,000 boaters. Craigslist advertisements placed in Bay

Area, Stockton, Sacramento, Monterey, and Santa Cruz listings. Advertising current fuel prices on Craigslist and the Marina website.

POLICE DEPARTMENT UPDATES
