HUMAN RESOURCES UPDATES

On January 26th three (3) new Police Officer Trainees will start the Academy.

At the January 13th Council meeting, a community member commented about the employee's coming off of furlough being a "paid vacation when it's retro pay." Just to clarify, there is no retroactive pay for employees returning to a 40 hour work week. The 40 hour work week started on January 11th, which is the first day of the first full pay period in January. All employees will receive their first non-furloughed paycheck on January 30th. No employee has received and no employee will receive any retroactive pay due to the end of furloughs.

FINANCE DEPARTMENT UPDATES

The California Department of Finance has approved the Antioch Public Financing Authority's refunding of the 2002 Antioch Development Agency Bonds. Under the refunding transaction, the Successor Agency to the Antioch Development Agency will reimburse the City for new bond payments, which will save the taxing entities approximately \$5 million over 17 years. The City will benefit by over \$500,000 over this time period on the refunding and also save an additional \$839,000 by refunding the ABAG loan that built the Lone Tree Event Center. That's a benefit of over \$1.3 million over the next 16 years due to lower interest rates.

ARTS AND CULTURE UPDATES

February - March Art Exhibit at Umpqua Bank - The Arts & Cultural Foundation of Antioch's continues their partnership with Antioch's Umpqua Bank and features seven artists in their upcoming exhibit. The new exhibit begins December 1st and continues through January 30th. The free artist reception is Wednesday, February 4th, from 5:30 - 6:30 PM. RECREATION UPDATES:

- On January 15, the Parks and Recreation Commission held their first meeting of 2015. They appointed the Chair and Vice-Chair, and highlighted community initiatives to connect to throughout the year.
- Staff met with interested members of Council and the community to explore new opportunities to engage teens and young adults in 2015, including options to create advisory councils and host forums.
- Staff completed the review of the first draft of the Spring Recreation Guide. Look for a new and improved brochure early February!
- Staff continues planning for enrichment programs for First Five. The First Five Partnership begins again in spring 2015.
- Winter class and program records indicate that there is a 15% increase in class registration from January 2014.
- Last week, Recreation Staff met with the Human Resources Department to prepare for hiring at the Water Park. Available positions include Cashiers, Lifeguards, Swim Instructors, Cooks, and Deck Crew. Applications can be picked up at the Antioch Community Center or online beginning February 11. Don't miss the opportunity to gain valuable work experience close to home.
- On January 9, aquatics staff held the first Winter Lifeguard In-Service Training in the heated Water Park Dome. The Dome creates an indoor swimming atmosphere to keep participants warm during the winter months. Lifeguards practiced safety and rescue techniques to ensure participant safety and comfort during aquatics programs.
- Last week, the City's electrical contractor completed lighting repairs in the Prewett Park parking lot and walking trail.
- Staff cleaned and prepared the Community Park concession stand for the first tournament of 2015 on January 17th.
- Last week, staff replaced a failed booster pump motor that serves the Lap pool boiler.
- On January 13, staff conducted an in house CPR/AED, First Aid, and Blood Borne Pathogens class for 25 employees in the Recreation and Community Development Departments.
- Recreation Maintenance staff and Public Works staff collaborated on the final clean up of the Prewett Park Holiday Tree drop off location.
- Last week, staff began event planning in preparation for the San Francisco Giants World Champions Trophy Tour, which arrives at the Antioch Community Center on Tuesday, January 27th from 4:00 to 6:00 pm. Everyone is invited to come and support the Antioch Jr. Giants!

Senior Center Services

- Last week, staff tracked over 270 inquiries by phone and in person for the free AARP Tax-Aide preparation. This service enables low income seniors 60 years of age or older, and the general public, to have their taxes done at no cost.
- Last week, 367 affordable, healthy meals were served which was an increase of 74 from the previous week.

- On January 13, City Staff attended the Antioch Senior Citizen’s Club Board of Directors meeting. Staff provided input and direction on various topics such as upcoming Club activities, events, 2015 membership drive, and donations and solicitations.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT UPDATES

Planning/Building:

- Staff attended a meeting with Caltrans and the Contra Costa Transportation Authority to discuss State Route 4 Widening project landscaping. A presentation is being prepared for Planning Commission and City Council meeting in February or early March.
- Staff held an orientation meeting with the newly appointed Planning Commissioner.

Environmental Resources:

- Environmental Enforcement: there were over 66 actions taken on cases. Eight cases were closed. Twenty-five property owners were sent abatement notices. Approximately 20 properties were inspected to verify occupancy prior to sending out abatement notices.
- Eco-happenings:
 - Staff met with the Y-PLAN club at Antioch High School to brainstorm about possible projects for them this year.
 - Pacheco Brothers has begun the installation of the next round of recycling barrels in City parks
 - Staff is inspecting certified motor oil recycling collection centers as part of our Used Oil Payment Program grant requirements with the State.
 - Staff met with HERO PACE Program representatives to discuss next steps for marketing the program.

CDBG & Housing Programs:

- Reviewing and qualifying 34 CDBG applications totaling \$1,475,536 in requests for 2015-17, with approximately \$588,000 (excludes Admin) available to allocate.

- Letters going out this week to Vista Diablo residents on the status of their applications for subsidy, with information on the Antioch subsidy ending as of September 2017, and resources to help them find affordable housing if they are unable to stay after the subsidy ends.
- Processed two loan subordinations as consumers continue to refinance their homes to take advantage of low interest rates.
- Attended training for new Coordinated Assessment tool to be launched in Contra Costa County by the end of January. This tool, the Vulnerability Index - Service Prioritization Decision Assistance Tool (VI-SPDAT), will assist all the homeless service providers in the County in jointly allocating their housing resources more appropriately and to those with the greatest need and vulnerability, and assist the County in understanding the kinds of housing and supportive services that are needed at this time by homeless residents.
- The Homeless Point In Time Count will occur during the last week in January. Extensive outreach will be conducted to locate and interview homeless persons throughout the County, asking a set of questions mandated by HUD. Some persons will also be administered the VI-SPDAT tool.
- Zero: 2016 Initiative in CCC will launch at the same time as the Homeless Point in Time Count. The goal is to end Veteran homelessness in our County by Dec 2015, and end chronic homelessness by Dec 2016. Ending homelessness is defined as having enough housing and supportive services resources developed in CCC to be able to meet the needs of these persons as they become homeless.

PUBLIC WORKS UPDATES

Engineering & Development Services

- Almondridge East Subdivision 8880 (81-unit single family home development by KB Homes), located between East 18th Street and Oakley Road, east of Phillips Lane and west of the State Highway 160 –A new traffic signal is being installed at the intersection of E. 18th Street and Phillips Lane.
- Buchanan Crossings Shopping Center, a 103,139 square foot commercial center on a 13.5-acre site located at the northwest corner of Somersville Road and Buchanan Road – The developer submitted revised onsite plans that show ‘value engineering’ elimination of a Phase 2 drainage basin, addition of an 8’ diameter underground storm drain detention pipe system and the realignment of a drive aisle near the main entrance to the shopping center. In addition to reviewing this submittal, staff is processing recordation of the parcel map, appurtenant easement and right-of-way dedications and quitclaim deed and a permit application with the USBR.
- Cellular Providers on City-owned Property – Staff is processing Metro PCS’ request to decommission two of its cell sites on City-owned parcels at Antioch City Park and 4506 Via Dora Drive. Staff is working with American Tower to process 3 consent letters and one administrative use permit for their cell sites. Staff is plan checking Verizon modifications at their Via Dora site. Verizon Wireless submitted a letter of intent (suggesting lease terms) and a letter of authorization (requesting access for testing and surveys) following a site visit to City open space hilltop property near Folsom Drive.
- Contra Loma Estates HOA Privatization – Staff scheduled Contra Loma Estates Homeowner’s Association application for a permit to install security gates and

fencing at the entrances to their subdivision for the March 4th Planning Commission public hearing agenda, pending submittal by the applicant.

- Delta Bowl Parking Lot – Staff is processing a plan check for a new parking lot.
- Golden Bow Estates HOA Privatization (PW 652) – Staff is reviewing Golden Bow Estates Homeowner’s Association application for a permit to install security gates and fencing at the entrance to their subdivision.
- Nelson Ranch Unit 1 Subdivision 6893 (102-unit single family home development by Standard Pacific Housing) located northeasterly of Wild Horse Road and Ridgeline Drive and southwesterly of State Route 4 – The developer has resubmitted Wild Horse Road Extension plan revisions for staff review and approval.
- Wilkinson-VanSandt LLA (PW 443-06-14) – Staff is reviewing a lot line adjustment for 4316 and 4325 Berryessa Ct.
- The SR4 (Segment 3A) ‘A’ Street/Lone Tree Way Interchange – Cavallo Road/Garrow Drive Undercrossing Project. Bridge construction is underway by the SR4 Contractor at the Lone Tree Way/”A” Street and Cavallo Road undercrossings. Lone Tree Way/”A” Street undercrossing will be closed nightly from 10 p.m. to 5 a.m., Tuesday January 20th through Saturday January 24th, for installation of bridge falsework.
- eBART Parking Lot and Maintenance Facility – The Contractor has requested permit final on the encroachment permit for Slatten Ranch Road improvements. Staff is reviewing plans and easement dedications for a proposed 12” sanitary sewer main, from the new Maintenance Facility north underneath the S.P.R.R. railroad line and along the extension of Willow Avenue from Oakley Road.
- SR4 Lone Tree Way Widening / Sand Creek Road Interchange Project – The contractor is installing stamped concrete, irrigation and landscaping in the Lone Tree Way/SR4 “Bypass” median during the month of January.
- Davidon Homes Park Ridge Phase I consisting of 123 residential units located west of Canada Valley Road and east of Highway 4 – Plans and maps have been resubmitted for second review.
- Laurel Ranch 109 unit housing development at Highway 4 and Laurel Road – Engineering has prepared comments for the preliminary development plan review by City Council.
- Heidorn Village 112 unit housing development at Heidorn Ranch Road and Prewett Ranch Drive – Creating conditions of approval for tentative map.
- Wal-Mart expansion – Processing easements and vacation of existing easements.
- Deer Valley Business Park, Commercial development fronting Country Hills Drive between Lone Tree Way and Deer Valley Road – Processing abandonment of existing easement.
- The Vineyards at Sand Creek, a proposed 641 unit housing development located on Sand Creek Road between Heidorn Ranch Road and Hillcrest Avenue – Staff continues to meet with the developer to discuss various site and infrastructure issues.
- Aviano, a proposed 533 unit housing development located on Sand Creek Road West of future Hillcrest Avenue – Staff continues to meet with the developer to discuss various site and infrastructure issues. The revised tentative map has been submitted for review and staff is updating conditions of approval.

Capital Improvements Division

- Sanitary Sewer Main Replacement at Various Locations – RGW Construction is installing new sanitary sewer facilities on West 19th Street.
- Piping Reconfiguration of Canal Pumps 2 and 4 and Pump 2 Replacement – Con-Quest Contracting has ordered piping materials. Replacement pump submittals are under review.
- Williamson Ranch Plaza Water Main Replacement – D.R. Lemings is expected to begin construction activities next week.
- West Antioch Creek Channel Improvements – Plats and legal descriptions for properties and easements needed for this project have been finalized. The Contra Costa County Public Works Real Property Division is moving forward with property and easement acquisitions. Comments provided by the Contra Costa County Flood Control District are being incorporated into the project plans.
- Sunset Booster Pump Station Replacement – Staff met with Kimley-Horn to discuss the 95% draft project plans and specifications.
- Community Development Block Grant Downtown Roadway Pavement Rehabilitation – Project plans and specifications are available for purchase at a cost of \$75 per set. Copies may be obtained by logging on www.blueprintexpress.com/antioch or by calling BPXpress Reprographics at (707) 745-3593. The public bid opening for this project is scheduled for January 20, 2015, at 2:00 p.m. in the City Council Chambers located at 200 “H” Street.
- Ninth Street Roadway Improvements – Project plans and specifications are available for purchase at a cost of \$75 per set. Copies may be obtained by logging on www.blueprintexpress.com/antioch or by calling BPXpress Reprographics at (707) 745-3593. The public bid opening for this project is scheduled for January 20, 2015, at 2:00 p.m. in the City Council Chambers located at 200 “H” Street.
- Rubberized Cape Seal Program – Staff opened public bids January 13th and the project will be presented to Council for consideration at their February 10th meeting.
- 2015/2016 Transportation Development Act (TDA) grant – Staff has identified 35 new curb ramp locations to be included in the 2015/2016 TDA grant application for pedestrian and bicycle funding. The county TDA subcommittee reviewed and provided comments on the City’s grant application.
- Safe Routes to School Grant (Cavallo/Garrow/E. Tregallas curb ramps) – Staff has completed the design and is in the process of developing the bid package. The project will be out for bid in February 2015 and construction is scheduled for April 2015.
- Transportation Impact Fee Study – The City Council approved EPS Consultant Services to develop a Transportation Development Impact Fee study. The study is scheduled to start in February 2015 and completed within a 12 month period.
- Antioch Fishing Pier Shade Structure – SRP Company completed the new railings, benches and shade structure. The project is scheduled to be completed this month.
- Preventative Pavement Maintenance Program – Staff has identified a list of streets for pavement “Dig Out” repairs to repair pothole and pavement failure areas. The City Council approved additional funding for the Preventative Pavement Maintenance Program to fund the pavement repairs needed for these streets. Construction of the project is scheduled for April 2015.

- Cavallo Road and Country Hills Drive Pavement Rehabilitation – Staff is working the design. Construction is scheduled for May 2015.

Traffic Engineering

- Engineering and Traffic Surveys – TJKM traffic consultants have collected speed and traffic count information on the roadway segments identified as requiring an Engineering and Traffic Survey. Collision data has been analyzed and field reviews have been completed. The consultant will complete the draft report with recommendations on speed limit changes for staff review in mid January. These surveys are required on major streets in order for the police department to use radar for speed enforcement.
- Somersville Road – Permanent striping installation has been completed. Street lights poles have been erected and lighting fixtures will be installed as weather permits. Installation of the above-ground traffic signal equipment (poles and cabinets) is underway.

Water Treatment Plant

- Replaced the ARV's and saddles at Donlon and Larkspur tanks.
- Cleaned solar bees out on the reservoir. Also cleaned the staff gage on the tower.
- Cleaned rain gutters on the pump stations.
- Installed new energy saving lighting in the shed at the Plant

Water Distribution

- There were 289 stops for water service including disconnections.
- There were a total of 54 USA tickets completed for utility location.
- Meter reading for the month has started and is on schedule. Three new meter installations are complete.
- Annual backflow test program has started.
- Water crews are continuing to haul green waste from the Fulton Yard and maintain the backfill material area and dumpster area for Allied Waste.
- Water Crews replaced a fire hydrant on Oakley Rd.
- Water field tech continues responding to customer related calls citywide.
- Water crews replaced a 1" backflow preventer on Verne Roberts Cir.
- Water crews repaired a 4" sewer lateral on Mountaire Cir.
- Water crews repaired a 4" sewer lateral on Elizabeth Ln.
- Water crews replaced a 1" water service on Golden Hills Ct.
- Stores staff entered 230 line items of stock transactions that were distributed to various divisions/departments.
- Water staff 2nd shift continues the citywide fire hydrant preventative maintenance program.
- Stores staff continues performing preventative maintenance on citywide doors/locks and currently reworked WTP River Pump Station deadbolts and locks.
- Stores staff certified six fire extinguishers for "The Dome" at Prewett Water Park.
- Stores staff has begun assembling and boxing the yearly uniform orders for Public Works personnel.

Public Works Maintenance Operations – Parks and Landscape

- Playground and Park Safety Inspections: Completed at Contra Loma Estates, Fairview, Jacobsen and Prosserville Parks.
- Park Fencing: Repairs were made to 100 feet of park fencing, including new posts, damaged in a vehicle accident over the Christmas holiday.
- Park Landscape Improvements: Heidorn Park (5100 Deerspring Way) has a total of 32 new Red Floral Carpet roses planted at the corner of Vista Grande Drive.
- Park Maintenance Repairs: Country Manor Park has a new water fountain bubbler at the playground restroom.
- Park Light Inspection Survey: All 32 parks have been inspected. Failed lamps have been replaced at 28 of the 32 parks. This program began on December 29, 2014 and is 87% complete.
- Mira Vista Park (3000 South Francisco Boulevard) has a new Community Playground. The grand opening took place on Monday, January 5, 2015. The event was well attended by the public and City representatives from Council, Park Commission, Parks and Recreation and Public Works. Refreshments and a brief overview of the new Miracle Playground installation was presented.
- Leaf Removal: From Golf Course Road and the south side of Lone Tree Way.
- Irrigation leaks were attended to and repaired.
- Annual Roadside Spray Program: Initiated and ongoing with the Streets Division.
- Storm Response: Removed 2 downed trees (James Donlon, Deer Valley Rd.) and numerous tree limbs throughout the city due to high winds.
- Spot Spraying: Police building, L Street, Contra Loma Blvd., Hillcrest Ave. and Ridgeline Dr.
- New Controller Installation: Lone Tree Way median across from Sylvia's Country Kitchen.

Public Works Maintenance Operations – Street Maintenance

- Signs: 12 signs replaced due to poor reflectivity.
- Potholes: 5 filled.
- Saw Service Cuts: 1,750' of asphalt in preparation for paving service cut repairs.
- Pave Service Cuts: 31 service cuts paved, approximately 180 tons of asphalt.
- Graffiti removed from City property in numerous areas.
- Annual Weed Abatement Spray Program: Initiated and ongoing with the Parks Division.

Public Works Maintenance Operations – Collections Division

- The Collections team received 7 calls for service, televised 9 laterals, and cleaned over 11,492 linear feet of sewer lines.
- The Collections team televised 19 laterals in preparation of the cape seal project.
- Completed data transfer to our new CCTV sewer inspection van.
- A trench was dug on the southwest corner of the corporation yard for the alarm system extension.
- Two Collections crew members assisted the Streets division with paving service cuts this week.
- Two Collections staff members were re-certified in Pipe Line Assessment.
- Management is in the process of updating the City's SSMP (Sewer System Management Plan) and OERP (Overflow Emergency Response Plan).

- Management is in the process of designing and building the Overflow Emergency Response Trailer.
- Staff is reviewing the new Sewer System Master Plan.
- Staff is reviewing and updating our quarterly sewer main cleaning schedules.

Public Works Maintenance Operations – Fleet Maintenance

- Preventative Maintenance: 12 services on City vehicles as scheduled.
- Unscheduled Repairs: 42 miscellaneous repairs to City vehicles.

Marina

- The Marine Science Institutes' research vessel, "Robert G. Brownlee," is berthed at the Antioch Marina throughout the month of January providing educational ecology tours and information on the California Delta to local school children.
- Advertising and outreach: Craigslist weekly ad posted in the Sacramento, Bay Area, Stockton, Santa Cruz and Monterey areas.
- Received and responded to one inquiry and processed one application.
- Hyacinth and wood debris removal continues throughout the marina basin.
- Meter reads completed for monthly billing.

POLICE DEPARTMENT UPDATES

- On 01/11/15, at about 8:35 p.m., an 80-year old male was found wandering the area of G Street and W. Madill Street. He was cold and shaking. The male was incoherent and not able to tell officers where he lived or even what city he was in. Officers were eventually able to return the subject to his family a few blocks away. They were unaware he had snuck out of the house.
- On 01/12/15, at about 1:00 p.m., an employee of a grocery store located in the 1800 block of A Street confronted a subject inside the store who was acting suspicious. The subject became upset and brandished a pocket knife and long screwdriver at the employee, while threatening to stab him. Officers responded and located the responsible on W. 19th Street. The subject fled on foot and was eventually caught by additional responding officers. He was sent to county jail for brandishing, threats, and a parole violation.
- On 01/12/15, at about 3:15 p.m., an Antioch K-9 officer and his trainee were driving Code 3 (with lights and siren) to a call of a man with a gun. As they were traveling through the intersection of G Street and W. 10th Street, they were broadsided by a vehicle driven by a 17-year old Brentwood resident. It was determined the juvenile did not see or hear the emergency lights and siren, and struck the patrol car after illegally passing vehicles that had stopped to allow the patrol through the

intersection. Neither the 17-year old nor the officers were injured. However, K-9 “Leroy” suffered a lacerated lip that required 5-stitches.

- On 01/12/15, at about 8:45 p.m., an officer driving a patrol car equipped with license plate reader (LPR) technology received a hit notifying him of a stolen vehicle that just passed him in the opposite direction. The officer attempted to stop the vehicle and short pursuit ensued. The vehicle pursuit ended on Fitzuren Road, and all three occupants fled on foot. All were apprehended, and officers recovered numerous driver’s licenses and fraudulent gift cards. The subjects were sent to county jail.
- On 01/15/15, at about 5:00 a.m., a male subject entered a convenience store located in the 1100 block of E. 18th Street and stole several items. The clerk followed the male out of the store in an attempt to get the male to pay for the items. Another male subject, who was waiting in a parked vehicle for the first male, got out and threatened to shoot the clerk if he didn’t leave them alone. The clerk backed off, called the police, and provided the license plate of the vehicle as it drove away. Officers responded to the registered owner’s residence and took the driver into custody as he arrived home. He was the only occupant of the vehicle at the time and he refused to identify the other involved male. He was sent to county jail.
