When it Rains, It Pours

Preparing for the next rainy day

The recent storms remind us of the adage, "when it rains, it pours." During the week of December 27, 2022, Contra Costa County experienced one of the worst storms in its history. Antioch did not escape the brunt of the storm's powerful impact. According to the County Administrator of Contra Costa County, extreme peril to the safety of our residents and property reached unprecedented dangerous levels caused by the uncommonly extreme weather conditions consisting of enormous rainfall and high cyclone winds. These perilous conditions resulted in citywide flooding, downed trees, street damage, and destruction to our aged, and antiquated storm water infrastructure. These times call for the City to look to our emergency operations plan to keep our residents safe and safeguard our properties.

With the large amount of rainfall we experienced in such a short period, our City has some pressing challenges to overcome. One challenge is the cost of repairing the damage caused by the storm. Recently, the City conservatively estimated that the damage to our City's streets, roads, and outdoor trails could exceed 4 million dollars in repair costs. With the huge cost of repairs, the

extensive property damage, and potential upcoming storms, the County Administrator of Emergency Services has proclaimed a county emergency. This declaration of emergency will place our City in a better position to recoup costs incurred in the form of reimbursement for any repairs.

I want to thank our entire Public Works
Department crews who worked around the clock
to keep our storm drains and public streets open,
our city staff who tirelessly worked to open and
manage our emergency shelter site, the private
security officers who stood post at the unhoused
emergency shelter, our county partners, the CORE
team, and Red Cross.

Lastly, I want to thank Mayor Lamar Thorpe and our city council members who provided calm leadership during the storm, and our Assistant City Manager, Rosanna Bayon Moore, who ensured all the moving parts worked in unison to serve our residents during these moments. These unsung and dedicated individuals went beyond the call of duty to preserve life and property.

Because of the all-weather surface, these fields have remained open and used by soccer, softball, and baseball teams. Deer Valley High School has moved their Men's and Women's Soccer games to Antioch Community Park for the remainder of their season due to the conditions of their school field. Dog Licensing



All dogs over four months of age must have a rabies vaccination and a City of Antioch Dog License. Dog Licenses must be purchased within 30 days of establishing residency in Antioch or when adding a new dog to your home. For your convenience, Antioch Dog Licenses may be purchased online, in person, or by mail. To purchase online, visit www.petdata.com/cs/ant.

To purchase by mail, send a current rabies vaccination certificate, a spay/neuter certificate, and a check for the correct amount to Antioch Animal Services, 300 L Street, Antioch, CA 94509. To purchase a dog license in person, call (925) 779-6989 to schedule. Appointments are available Tues. – Sat. from 10 AM – 5 PM. The last appointment each day is at 4:30 PM and we are closed on Sundays, Mondays, and Holidays. Be sure to bring a current rabies vaccination certificate and a spay/neuter certificate when you visit. 6th Cycle Housing Element

On Tuesday, January 24, the City Council will consider approval of the 6th Cycle Housing Element. The Housing Element is a land use and housing policy document that cities produce to demonstrate their compliance with regional housing goals. These goals are established through the Regional Housing Needs Allocation (RHNA) process in coordination with jurisdictions from the eight counties of the San Francisco bay area. At the conclusion of the most recent cycle in 2022, the City of Antioch was allocated a housing goal of 3,016 units.

The Planning Division of the Community Development Department worked with professional consultants to develop a plan that achieves this goal. Following a thorough analysis and community outreach, policies were developed that, if implemented, would enable the production of these housing units. The proposed policies include rezoning property for higher-density residential development and pursuing new pro-housing programs. A copy of these documents, and more, are available here



Storm Response Reminder



Use Caution

Avoid low-water areas, creeks, and floodplains, and be aware that high winds and saturated grounds can combine to cause trees and branches to fail suddenly. When out and about (walking or driving), be aware of your surroundings and stay clear of trees during and after storms. You can report trees blocking travel lanes by calling Police Dispatch at (925) 778-2441 or 911. Please stay away from downed power lines. Always assume they are energized and dangerous. Report downed lines to 911.

Drive Safely

Driving through a flooded area puts your vehicle at risk of stalling out and becoming stuck in the water, so please do not drive through standing water. When driving in heavy storm conditions, give yourself plenty of extra time to get to your destination and maintain a safe distance between yourself and the vehicle in front of you. If you are driving and you hit standing water and begin to hydroplane, immediately take your foot off the gas pedal and let your vehicle slow until you regain control. If your windshield wipers are on, your headlights must also be on.

Sandbags

Antioch maintains a 24-hour sandbagging station at its Corporation Yard at 1401 West 4th Street. Sandbags are free to Antioch residents. Residents who cannot fill their own, such as seniors and persons with disabilities, can make arrangements to pick up pre-filled bags by calling (925) 779-6950 during business hours.

On September 13th, the Antioch City Council adopted the "Reinvest Antioch" Economic Development Program – Action Plan and Toolkit. With the adoption of this document, the process of creating an economic development strategy is concluded, and staff will now begin the implement phases of the Action Plan.

- 5. Direct Project Investment/Public-Private Partnerships
- 6. Leveraging Housing Demand to Promote Economic Development
- 7. Regional Interface/Advocacy
- 8. Funding/Resource Expansion
- 9. Coordination with City (and Other) Foundational Functions




Youth Services Division
