RECREATION UPDATES

- The East County Regional Group (First Five) and the Recreation Department "swim and sports" partnership opened for registration. This annual collaboration provides spring and summer activity classes designed for children under 5. These programs and services help children 0-5 reach their greatest potential.
- Last week, the youth Taekwondo and Kenpo Karate classes began a new session of programs. More than 90 youth participated in fall and winter sessions where participants gained self-respect, self-control, self-defense, self esteem, focus, confidence, and courtesy skills.
- Last week, staff began reviewing applications from the 2014 Water Park employees
 who are interested in returning for employment during the 2015 season. Multi-year
 employees build long-lasting relationships with residents and improve services
 provided by the City.
- Staff began scheduling and planning lifeguard in-service trainings for the 2015 water park season. These weekly trainings are mandatory and ensure that lifeguards keep their skills fresh and ready for emergency response and guest comfort.
- Last week, staff created a master schedule of aquatics classes for the Summer Recreation Guide. Water safety and fitness classes are a great way to get fit and stay safe year round.
- More summer recreation activities for youth and adults were finalized this week in preparation for the production process of the Summer Recreation Guide

- The Water Park is now accepting applications for the 2015 Season. Available positions include lifeguard, swim instructor, concessions cashier, cook, front desk cashier and deck crew. Applications can be picked up at the Antioch Community Center. The Water Park is the largest employer of youth and teens in Antioch. This is a great opportunity to gain basic job skills to last a lifetime.
- Last week, staff completed repairs to the pool dome. The fitness pool is back in action just in time for more winter weather!
- Throughout the week the maintenance staff continued ongoing water park maintenance projects in preparation for the quickly approaching summer season.
- The Recreation Department received a letter from Contra Costa County Emergency Medical Services recognizing the City for the installation of an AED (Automated External Defibrillator) at the Community Park Sports Complex. This addition, which the City made over the summer, demonstrates a continued commitment to the safety of all park visitors.
- Last week, drop-in open gym started up again for ages 17 and older at the Antioch Community Center basketball on Sundays and volleyball on Tuesdays. Drop-in sports are an excellent health and fitness opportunity for adults at any skill level.
- Last week, staff met with the Antioch Riverview Garden Club to explore collaboration and partnership possibilities in the future.
- On Thursday February 19, the Parks and Recreation Commission held their regular meeting. The East County Regional Group of First Five Contra Costa made a presentation on their "Antioch park assessment" project that was undertaken and completed by all volunteer parents who visited every Antioch park.

Senior Center Services

- Last week, 317 affordable, healthy meals were served. No membership or income requirements are needed to eat a nutritious lunch at the C.C. Cafe.
- On Friday, more than 110 members of the Antioch Senior Citizens Club "Caught the Love Bug" with a Valentine celebration, and they enjoyed activities, music and sweet treats for all!
- Last week, 103 members improved their health and stayed fit by participating in the
 various exercise classes offered to Antioch Senior Citizens Club members. Classes
 are offered Monday, Wednesday and Friday for all ability levels and range from lowimpact to advanced exercise. Muscular strength, breathing, stretching, and range
 of movement for daily living are included in each class.
- Staff tracked 64memberships that were renewed last week for the 2015 Antioch Senior Citizens Club.
- Last week the Alzheimer's Support Group hosted their meeting, which is organized to provide support for individuals and family caregivers that are dealing with a person who experiences memory loss.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT UPDATES

Planning/Building:

- At their regular meeting on February 18th the Planning Commission was joined by newly appointed Commissioner Martha Parsons. Following a public hearing, the Commission approved a use permit for East Bay Indoor Soccer, a youth indoor soccer league facility located at 1825 W. 10th Street. Representatives from CalTrans and the Contra Costa Transportation Authority gave a presentation on planned landscaping improvements for the Highway 4 widening project. The City Council will receive that presentation at their meeting on Tuesday, February 24th.

Environmental Resources:

Environmental Enforcement: For February 5-17, there were over 168 actions taken on cases. 22 of these actions were site inspections to determine if properties are occupied prior to sending abatement notices. 66 abatement notices were mailed out for lack of garbage service. 31 cases were closed.

PUBLIC WORKS UPDATES

Administration

• PG&E has begun work on their 27-mile Contra Costa to Moraga 230 Kilovolt transmission line upgrades. This 27-mile project will begin in Antioch. Work which will involve raising transmission towers and replacing existing lines began in January and is scheduled to continue through May in Antioch. Crews and contractors will use helicopters and truck-mounted cranes to perform the work. Work will generally occur daily between 7:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. PG&E will be utilizing a portion of Chichibu Park and another site near the Mira Vista Hills Reservoir off Cambridge Drive during much of the construction in Antioch as staging and construction locations for their operations. Engineering & Development Services

- Almondridge East Subdivision 8880, an 81-unit single family home development by KB Homes, located between East 18th Street and Oakley Road, east of Phillips Lane and west of the State Highway 160: Staff is reviewing plot plans for new home construction.
- Buchanan Crossings Shopping Center, a 103,139 square foot commercial center on a 13.5-acre site located at the northwest corner of Somersville Road and Buchanan Road: Staff is plan checking revised onsite plans and is processing recordation of the parcel map, appurtenant easements, right-of-way dedications and quitclaim deed, and permit application with the USBR. Grading has begun.
- Cellular Providers on City-owned Property: Metro PCS has requested decommissioning of their City Park and Via Dora sites. Verizon Wireless is applying for a new cell site near Folsom Drive. AT&T is pursuing a lease modification for their James Donlon site. Crown Castle is seeking to renegotiate a lease for their Putnam Drive site.
- Contra Loma Estates HOA Privatization: Contra Loma Estates HOA has applied for a permit to privatize their interior roads and install security gates and fencing at the entrances to their subdivision. Staff has requested additional documentation. Planning Commission and City Council approvals are required.
- Delta Bowl Parking Lot: Staff is plan checking a new parking lot.
- Golden Bow Estates HOA Privatization (PW 652): Golden Bow Estates HOA has applied for a permit to privatize their interior roads and install security gates and fencing at the entrance to their subdivision. Planning Commission and City Council approvals are required.
- Laurel Ranch, a 186-unit housing development by Richland Communities, located at the eastern terminus of existing Laurel Road and west of Highway 4: The developer is preparing a final development plan submittal.
- Nelson Ranch Unit 1 Subdivision 6893, a 102-unit housing development by Standard Pacific Housing, located northeasterly of Wild Horse Road and Ridgeline Drive and southwesterly of State Route 4: Staff returned signed off-tract Wild Horse Road improvement plans to the developer.
- Wilkinson-VanSandt LLA: Application has been made for a lot line adjustment between 4316 and 4325 Berryessa Ct.
- SR4 (Segment 3A) 'A' Street/Lone Tree Way Interchange, Cavallo Road/Garrow Drive Undercrossing Project: Bridge construction is underway by the SR4 Contractor at the Lone Tree Way/"A" Street and Cavallo Road undercrossings.
- eBART Parking Lot and Maintenance Facility: The Contractor has requested permit final on the encroachment permit for Slatten Ranch Road improvements. Staff is reviewing plans and easement dedications for a proposed 12" sanitary sewer main, from the new Maintenance Facility north underneath the S.P.R.R. railroad line and along the extension of Willow Avenue from Oakley Road.
- SR4 Lone Tree Way Widening, Sand Creek Road Interchange Project: The Contractor expects to complete the installation of stamped concrete, irrigation and landscaping in the Lone Tree Way/SR4 "Bypass" median by mid-February.

- Davidon Homes Park Ridge, Phase I consisting of 123 residential units located west of Canada Valley Road and east of Highway 4: plans and maps have been resubmitted for second review.
- Wal-Mart expansion: processing easements and vacation of existing easements.
- Deer Valley Business Park, commercial development fronting Country Hills Drive between Lone Tree Way and Deer Valley Road: processing abandonment of existing easement.
- The Vineyards at Sand Creek, a proposed 641 unit housing development located on Sand Creek Road between Heidorn Ranch Road and Hillcrest Avenue: Staff continues to meet with the developer to discuss various site and infrastructure issues.
- Aviano, a proposed 533 unit housing development located on Sand Creek Road west of future Hillcrest Avenue: Staff continues to meet with the developer to discuss various site and infrastructure issues. The revised tentative map has been submitted for review and staff is updating conditions of approval.
- The Ranch, a proposed 1,667 unit housing development located between Deer Valley Road and Empire Mine Road: staff is preparing comments for preliminary development plan.

Capital Improvements Division

- Sanitary Sewer Main Replacement at Various Locations: RGW Construction is installing new sanitary sewer service laterals on Deodar Avenue and Chestnut Avenue.
- Williamson Ranch Plaza Water Main Replacement: D.R. Lemings is installing new water main facilities on the western side of Williamson Ranch Plaza.
- Curb, Gutter and Sidewalk Repair Program: Anchor Concrete continued to remove and replace deteriorating, damaged and uneven concrete throughout the city. Over the past week a total of 390 square feet of sidewalk and 54 lineal feet of curb and gutter were repaired.
- West Antioch Creek Channel Improvements: The revised Streambed Alteration and Routine Maintenance Agreements have been sent to the California Department of Fish and Wildlife Services. The Contra Costa County Public Works Real Property Division is continuing work related to the property and easement acquisitions.
- Marina Boat Launch Facility, Third Boarding Float: Project plans and specifications have been finalized. City has requested authorization to advertise the project for construction from the California Department of Parks and Recreation, Division of Boating and Waterways.
- Community Block Grant Downtown Roadway Pavement Rehabilitation: A contract was awarded to the low bidder, MCK Services, Inc., at the February 10th City Council meeting to perform asphalt and concrete rehabilitation on West Second Street from 'J' to 'L' Streets, West Third Street, between 'I' and 'J' Streets, West Fifth Street from 'J' to 'L' Streets and 'K' Street from West Second and West Tenth Streets. Thirteen new curb ramps will also be installed in these areas.

- Ninth Street Roadway Improvements: A contract was awarded to the low bidder, MCK Services, Inc., at the February 10th City Council meeting to perform asphalt and concrete rehabilitation on West Ninth Street from 'A' to 'H' Streets. Eighteen new curb ramps will also be installed on this portion of West Ninth Street.
- Rubberized Cape Seal Program: The City Council awarded the 2015 Pavement Maintenance Cape Seal project to the low bidder, American Pavement Systems.
 Construction is scheduled to start June 8, 2015 and be completed by July 31, 2015.
- 2015/2016 Transportation Development Act (TDA) grant: Staff submitted the final grant application to MTC to install 35 new curb ramp locations along "A" Street, Blue Rock Drive and West Tregallas Road.
- Safe Routes to School Grant (Cavallo/Garrow/E. Tregallas curb ramps): Staff opened bids for the installation of 85 curb ramps and sidewalk improvements along Cavallo Road, Garrow Drive, East Tregallas Road and Drake Street. The City Council will consider awarding the construction contract at the February 24th meeting. Construction is scheduled to start in April 2015.
- Transportation Impact Fee Study: Kick off meeting for the study is set for February 24th. The study is scheduled to be completed within a 12 month period.
- Preventative Pavement Maintenance Program: Staff has identified a list of streets for pavement "Dig Out" repairs to repair pothole and pavement failure areas. Staff opened bids for the project on February 17th. The City Council will consider awarding the construction contract at the March 10th meeting. Construction of the project is scheduled for April 2015.
- Cavallo Road and Country Hills Drive Pavement Rehabilitation: Project plans and specifications are available for purchase at a cost of \$75 per set. Copies may be obtained by logging on www.blueprintexpress.com/antioch or by calling BPXpress Reprographics at (707) 745-3593. The public bid opening for this project is scheduled for March 10, 2015, at 2:00 P.M. in the City Council Chambers located at 200 "H" Street. Construction is scheduled for May 2015.
- Prewett Park Improvements: Staff has solicited requests for proposals for consultant services for the design of the final improvements at Prewett Park, which will include a splash/spray park, multi-age group outdoor playground, lighted basketball sport court with security fencing, group picnic area with a shade structure, and a digital marquee monument sign. Construction is anticipated to start in January 2016.

Traffic Engineering

 Engineering and Traffic Surveys: Staff is proposing several speed limit changes and cleanup of the municipal code section 4-5.1501 (Speed Limits) based on the Engineering and Traffic Surveys recently completed. The Ordinance will be introduced at the February 24th City Council meeting and consideration will be on the March 10th City Council meeting. The proposed changes will be presented to the City Council for adaption. • Staff is coordinating the installation of an electric vehicle recharging station at the City Hall parking lot, 200 "H" Street. Installation is anticipated in late February. The station will be part of the "ChargePoint" system and available to the public.

Water Treatment Plant

- Installed a new sluice gate in "B" plant's applied water channel.
- Cleaned solar bees out on the reservoir. Also cleaned the staff gage on the tower. This is reoccurring and ongoing.
- Completed programming the motorized control valve at Hillcrest pump station. The valve will be operated from SCADA to take treated water from CCWD's MPP line.
- Installed the 100 HP motor and attached it to zone 2, number 1 pump.
- Water quality in the San Joaquin River was good enough for the river pump to be turned on February the 12th and ran until February 18th as the reservoir was full.
 Staff continues to pump from the river as water quality and reservoir capacity permits.

Water Distribution

- There were 173 stops for water service including disconnections.
- There were a total of 16 USA tickets completed for utility location.
- Meter reading for the month of February is on schedule.
- Annual backflow test program continues and is on schedule.
- Water crews continue replacing worn or stopped meters.
- Water crews are continuing to maintain the backfill material area and dumpster area at Fulton Yard.
- Water crews replaced a six inch backflow on West Fourth St.
- Water crews replaced a one inch water service on West 13th St.
- Water staff second shift continues city wide fire hydrant preventative maintenance program.
- Water Dept. staff replaced a fire hydrant on San Jose Dr.
- Stores staff cleared graffiti from two wall panels at the Fulton Shipyard boat ramp facility.
- Stores staff continues removing debris from Amtrak Station.

Public Works Maintenance Operations - Parks and Landscape

- Storm Response: Sunday, February 9, 2015, numerous trees and branch failures took place leading to inconvenienced park users at Antioch Community and Gentrytown parks. Fortunately, the clean-up and removal process was expeditiously accomplished, thanks to our dedicated Public Works staff, and with our contracted partners at Pacheco Brothers Gardening and Stewart's Tree Service. Kudos to all involved in this emergency response effort.
- Playground and park safety inspections: Completed at Antioch Community, Gentrytown, Hillcrest, Mira Vista, and Village East Parks.

HIGHWAY 4 FULL CLOSURE NEAR ANTIOCH, CA FEBRUARY 19, 2015

ANTIOCH, CA -- The California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) and the Contra Costa Transportation Authority (CCTA) are constructing two new connector ramps, one connecting westbound State Route (SR)-4 to northbound SR-160, and one connecting southbound SR-160 to eastbound SR-4 in Contra Costa County. Part of this construction work entails the adjustment of temporary bridge supports that span over SR-4. In order to ensure crew and public safety during this work, the contractor will close all lanes of SR-4 in the eastbound and westbound directions between the SR-4/SR-160 connector ramp and Laurel Road. These closures are scheduled to take place on the evenings of February 25th, 26th and 27th from 11:59 pm to 5:00 am

The detour for this work will be as follows:

- Eastbound motorists will be directed off the highway at the SR-160 off-ramp and redirected to return to eastbound SR-4 via the Laurel Road on-ramp. Please see attached.
- Westbound motorists will be directed off the highway at the Laurel Road on-ramp and redirected to westbound SR-4 via the entrance of southbound SR-160. Please see attached.


Motorists are advised to expect delays and allow extra time for their commute. Please drive with caution through the detours and leave a safe traveling distance between your vehicle and the vehicle ahead of you.

The Highway 4 projects include improvements that will help revitalize eastern Contra Costa County. The projects expand Highway 4 from four to eight lanes between Loveridge Road and SR-160, add two connector ramps between Highway 4 and Highway 160, and add a BART extension from Pittsburg to Antioch (eBART). This will greatly improve transit accessibility for the region and help reduce traffic congestion and enhance the quality of life for the more than 250,000 residents of eastern Contra Costa County. The projects have been carefully staged to keep 130,000 vehicles per day moving as major construction and demolition work continue, and include over \$1.3 billion in State, Federal, Contra Costa Measure C & J sales tax, regional bridge tolls, and other local funds.
