The Antioch Police Department is excited to announce the 69th installment of the Neighborhood Cleanup Program. This is a collaborative community effort which involves active participation from The Antioch Police Department Crime Prevention Commission; Neighborhood Watch Program; Volunteers in Police Service; community volunteers and the Public Works Department.

The City of Antioch Neighborhood Cleanup program is not just for residential neighborhoods. It is a program that will change venues on a monthly basis and it will include business and commercial areas as well. Neighborhoods that are free of trash and refuse are inviting, and a clean community instills a sense of community pride.

The 68th Neighborhood Cleanup event will occur on Saturday, March 5th from 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. at Lucena Way and Lopez Dr. We will be cleaning the neighborhoods along Lopez Dr. from Gentrytown Dr. to Carmona Way.

The City Attorney submitted the Title & Summary for the Initiative submitted by proponent, Jim Lanter, to the City Clerk. The City Clerk provided it to the proponent for publication of the Notice of Intent to Circulate Petition in newspaper of general circulation (EC 9205) for Antioch (East County Times). The proponent must next submit the affidavit of publication of the notice of intention and ballot title and summary within 10 days after the date of publication (EC 9206).

The California Primary Election will be held on Tuesday, June 7th. If you have recently moved to Antioch or want to change your registration, Voter Registration forms are available at the Antioch City Clerk's Office on the first floor of City Hall. The forms are hanging on the wall and no postage is required to mail them. Antioch voters will be interested in two City of Antioch ballot measures and the races for District 3 and District 5 County Supervisor, along with the State Assembly, State Senate, Congressional, Senatorial and Presidential primaries. Get involved, register, study the issues, question the candidates and make your vote count!

Our office received 4 California Public Records Act requests this week and forwarded them to the appropriate departments for a response. Two responses were handled in the Clerk's Office.

Mayor Pro Tem Lori Ogorchock filed a FPPC Form 501 with the City Clerk to run for Mayor in November. She also filed a FPPC Form 410 creating a campaign finance committee with the Secretary of State and City Clerk.

Antioch Chamber of Commerce Chair Dr. Sean Wright filed a FPPC Form 501 to run for Mayor in November. He also filed a FPPC Form 410 creating a campaign finance committee with the Secretary of State and City Clerk.

The City Clerk was contacted by the County Elections Office to discuss the possibility of setting up an early voting station at the Prewett Community Center. The County Elections Office is considering setting up 6 early voting stations around the County. Secretary of State Alex Padilla discussed this initiative with the League of California Cities' Administrative Services Policy Committee, on which City Clerk Arne Simonsen has been a member for the past three years.

RECREATION UPDATES

- Last week, staff entered more than 225 classes and activities for Summer 2016! Get ready to experience new and exciting programs and events. Adults and children can start now with Spring activities and **Soar Into Recreation** right through summer.
- Staff met and interviewed potential contractors for the new season of classes and activities. One exciting new addition to the summer line-up includes a series of cooking experiences for youth and adults. Get ready to get cooking!
- Last week, 14 youth participants began the “Realistic Drawing” class for 8-11 year olds. How realistic can your art get? These students learned about the creation of three-dimensional art forms, as well as how to use skills of observation, proportion, perspective, shading and more.
- On Wednesday, the seasonal Water Park Manager, Head Lifeguard, and Head Cashier positions were filled for the 2016 year. All positions were filled by returning staff interested in promoting to new jobs and roles. Antioch has a large contingency of excellent young adults working in the community.
- On Wednesday, staff visited Antioch High School to promote summer positions within the Recreation Department to juniors enrolled in the Careers in Teaching Course.
- On Thursday, returning Water Park staff participated in the first orientation meeting for the 2016 season including the livescan finger printing process.
- On Monday, staff updated information and signage inside the Water Park and at the front counter in preparation for the 2016 season.
- On Tuesday and Wednesday afternoon, lifeguard staff had in-service training to prepare for the spring programs beginning Saturday in preparation for the return of Spring programs this Saturday. It is time to **BE COOL BY THE POOL** in 2016!
- Antioch Water Park season passes are on sale. The discount rate is \$50 before opening day – a bargain for summer-long fun for the entire family.
- On Wednesday, staff met with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to plan a new citywide youth event in September that will focus on nature in our community.
- Throughout the week, staff reserved Water Park Buyouts and continued scheduling interviews for part time staff.
- Throughout the week, staff continued to make progress on projects that are being completed prior to opening the Water Park. This week’s highlights included preparing the Sport Pool for fitness classes and swim lessons and preparing the Lap Pool for the new heater installation.

- Last week, the older grades participating in Jr. Warriors Basketball completed their season with final games and family celebrations to recognize achievements in learning new skills, staying fit during winter months, and meeting new friends.
- On Wednesday, staff engaged Ruah Ministries in a discussion about hosting a Juneteenth Event this year. Stay tuned for more information about a community-wide celebration.
- On Thursday, the City of Antioch was recognized at the California Park & Recreation Society District 3 Awards Luncheon. Long-time civic leader Leo Fontana was recognized for his community contributions and Recreation staff member Lisa Arcidiacono was awarded a professional grant.

Senior Center Services

- Last week, 318 affordable healthy meals were served through the C.C. Café. Lunch and socialization help prevent heart attacks, depression, asthma and congestive heart failure. No membership or income requirements are required to eat at the C.C. Cafe. All supplies are provided by the County for participating cafes.
- On Monday, ten seniors enjoyed a beautiful and memorable trip to Black Diamond Mines Regional Preserve where they enjoyed vistas, walking and meeting a naturalist. Transportation was provided by East Bay Regional Park District and the Parks Express program.
- On Monday, Rising Sun Energy Services hosted a table to provide information about cost saving and energy resources for older adults. This group hopes to return monthly and engage with seniors and other visitors.
- On Tuesday, “Clear Captions” was at the Senior Center providing information to seniors with difficulty hearing; a free voice-to-text telephone that will put into text the real-time conversation one is having over the phone. This service is provided at no cost for qualifying seniors.
- On Wednesday, staff attended the “East County Resource and Networking” event to connect with other “Senior Service Professionals.”
- On Thursday, staff met with ALZ ASSOC. about providing services at the Senior Center on a regular basis.

CDBG:

- HUD has announced the allocations for 2016-17. The City of Antioch will receive \$748,448, which is relatively flat funding with a slight decrease of \$162.

Housing:

- CDS has completed work on the new Housing Loan Compliance system, with all Antioch loans uploaded. Training and data review to occur over the next few weeks.

Homeless:

- On Tuesday, the Contra Costa Council on Homelessness conducted a retreat to integrate a number of new people to the Council. Chair Teri House (Consultant, City of Antioch) welcomed new members Captain Diane Aguinaga (Antioch Police Department), Gary Kingsbury (Antioch Shelter Project), Dan Sawislak (Executive Director of Resources for Community Development), Louise Bourassa (Executive Director, Contra Costa Interfaith Housing), Tracy Cassio (Homeless Program Manager, Veterans Health Administration, Martinez), Gabriel Lemus (County CDBG/ESG Manager), and provisional appointee Doug Leich (Multi-Faith Action Team/SHELTER Inc. Board of Director member). Existing members include Brenda Kain (City of Concord CDBG Manager), Janet Kennedy (Consultant), Kevin Corrigan (Contra Costa County), Valerie Sloven (Consumer Advocate), and Joseph Villarreal (Director, Housing Authority of CCC). The Council is staffed by Lavonna Martin, Chief of Homeless Services, County), and Jaime Jenett (Policy Advisor, County).
- The Homeless Point in Time Count has concluded and data is being entered into the Homeless Information Management System. A report is expected to be available by the end of March.
- The next General Meeting of the Contra Costa Homeless Continuum of Care is April 15, 2016, and all are invited. We will continue with panel presentations about the criminal justice system and homeless persons. Meetings are held in the ZA room at 30 Muir Road, Martinez from 10 am -12 pm.

DROUGHT UPDATES:

There are only a few spots left in the Lose a Lawn workshop scheduled for March 19th at Prewett Family Park. Staff is working in partnership with Contra Costa Water District to offer this free workshop to residents interested in learning more about rebate programs and design assistance for re-landscaping. Pre-registration is required, visit www.ccwater.com and go to the calendar.

Irrigation Repairs and Service:

- Park Water Reductions: ALL Park Irrigation Controllers are off, including City and Gentrytown Parks.
- City Park: The Soccer Turf Field is undergoing a complete renovation, and is temporarily closed to the public.
- Delta Diamond: Due to the heavy rains last Wednesday night, the water is off currently on the new turf seed.
- Heidorn Park: The leaking RP to the park restrooms was repaired.
- Mira Vista Hills Park: The water is shut down awaiting repairs to a leaking QC valve.
- Deer Valley Rd. - Replaced 1 irrigation valve.
- Buchanan Rd. - Repaired 2 sprinklers.

- Via Dora Dr. - Removed 1 irrigation valve and capped line.
- Lone Tree Way - Rebuilt 1 irrigation valve.

PUBLIC WORKS UPDATES

Administration

- Due to the current and predicted El Niño rains (we hope), Public Works has procured extra sand bags and sand, as well as ensuring staff is ready for action 24/7. The City website will have additional information about what the City is doing and how the community can better prepare for the possibility of a severe winter.
- In spite of the much needed recent rains, the State has communicated that the drought is still ongoing and mandatory water conservation has been extended to October 2016. The City of Antioch is being required to reduce its 2015-2016 water usage by 28% in using 2013 as the base year. Outdoor water conservation will be the primary focus of the City's program, as well as fines for wasteful practices as identified in the Water Conservation Resolution adopted by the City Council on May 12th. All Antioch customers were mailed a letter explaining the program and prohibitions, as well as 2013 monthly water usage. Examples of prohibitions are: three day per week residential outdoor watering, no watering between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., shut off nozzles required on all hoses, and drinking water available only upon request at restaurants. Contra Costa Water District has incentives, such as residential high-efficiency clothes washer rebates, water-efficient landscape rebates and smart sprinkler timer rebates. More information on water conservation programs and ideas on how to conserve water can be found at www.ccwater.com or www.antiochwater.com. Customers who are not in compliance with drought restrictions can be reported to the Antioch Drought Hotline at (925) 779-6140.

Engineering & Development Services

- Almondridge East Subdivision 8880, an 81-unit single family home development by KB Homes, located between East 18th Street and Oakley Road, east of Phillips Lane and west of the State Highway 160: Staff is reviewing plot plans for ongoing new home construction and provided a punch list for offsite improvements (bond reduction purposes).
- Buchanan Crossings Shopping Center, a 103,139 square foot commercial center on a 13.5-acre site located at the northwest corner of Somersville Road and Buchanan Road: CVS and Grocery Outlet stores are open for business and other building pads are in development and planning stages. Environmental clearances and USBR permitting requirements for the Phase 2 development are in progress. Staff is processing a request for reimbursement for Somersville Road widening.
- City Sports Club, located at 5001 Lone Tree Way: Staff to review building and parking lot construction for certificate of occupancy.
- City-owned cell sites, various locations: Staff is performing site visits and review of land leases, 100% construction drawings, consent letters, photo-simulations and

related technical reports and materials for equipment upgrades and site modifications.

- Laurel Ranch, a 186-unit housing development by Richland Communities, located at the eastern terminus of existing Laurel Road and west of Highway 4: Staff is reviewing the final development plan and preparing project conditions of approval. Staff is working with the developer to reduce illegal trespassing on the unimproved site.
- Nelson Ranch Subdivision 6893, end of Wildhorse Road: Staff performed a site inspection and is preparing a punch list in response to developer's request for warranty bond release.
- Park Ridge Phase I, a 123-unit housing development by Davidon Homes, located west of Canada Valley Road and east of Highway 4: Staff returned 6th submittal map check to the design surveyor for corrections.
- Taco Bell, 1706 'A' Street: The new restaurant is open for business. Staff is working with developer to restrict left-turns into business from "A" Street.
- SR4 (Segment 2) Contra Loma Blvd. Interchange/'G' Street Overcrossing Project: The project has been presented to State for acceptance. The eastbound Contra Loma Blvd. on-ramp will remain closed temporarily for SR4 mainline construction.
- SR4 (Segment 3A) 'A' Street/Lone Tree Way Interchange, Cavallo Road/Garrow Drive Undercrossing Project: Work continues on the 'A' St./Lone Tree Way interchange and Cavallo Road Overcrossings and the new Sunset Drive extension from Bryan Avenue to "A" Street. Slope paving and sidewalk reconstruction is underway. Pedestrians and motorists are advised to exercise caution while travelling through these areas.
- SR4 (Segment 3B) Hillcrest Avenue Interchange and BART Tunnel Project: Work continues on the Hillcrest Avenue Bridge widening, the Pedestrian Overcrossing (POC) and the Maintenance of Works (MOW) Tunnel. The new Slatten Ranch Road westbound (WB) Loop on-ramp is open to traffic and the Hillcrest WB on-ramp is temporarily closed. New signage is being added to improve the flow for the northbound Hillcrest to eastbound Slatten Ranch right turn that backs up in the morning commute. Pedestrians and motorists are advised to exercise caution while travelling through this area.
- BART Parking Lot and Maintenance Facility: Staff approved the design for a proposed 12" sanitary sewer main from the new Maintenance Facility, north of the S.P.R.R. railroad line to the southerly extension of Willow Avenue and is reviewing grant deeds for public easement dedications. Staff returned comments to BART's Ownership and Maintenance of Utilities Agreement for storm drainage improvements.
- The Vineyards at Sand Creek, a proposed 641 unit housing development located on Sand Creek Road between Heidorn Ranch Road and Hillcrest Avenue: The tentative map has been approved by City Council.
- Aviano, an approved 533 unit housing development located west of the current terminus of Hillcrest Avenue, east and north of Dozier-Libby Medical High School: Staff is working with developer on the Chaparral Park expansion. The first phase of

construction documents were submitted for review and have been returned to engineer for updating.

- Staff is working with the developer's consultant on finalizing sewer study for FUA 1.

Capital Improvements Division

- Water Main Replacement at Various Locations: Trench patch paving has been completed on Sunset Drive. D&D Pipelines will be adjusting utilities to grade and replacing traffic striping in early March.
- West Antioch Creek Channel Improvements: Contra Costa County Public Works Real Property Division is finalizing legal documents pertaining to land acquisitions within the footprint of the Contra Costa Fairgrounds. A revised purchase agreement is being developed for the properties located at 1400 and 1420 West 10th Street. A biological assessment has been prepared by Nomad Ecology and submitted to U.S. Fish and Wildlife.
- Zone I Transmission Pipeline Rehabilitation at HWY 4: A pre-design meeting between Staff and RMC Water and Environment is scheduled for March 2nd.
- Urban Water Management Plan Treatment: Staff is performing a water loss audit in accordance with AWWA standards.
- Brackish Water Desalinization Plant: An application for a State Revolving Fund loan from the State Water Resources Control Board for the next phases of planning, engineering, and environmental certification was submitted on February 20th.
- Water Treatment Plant Disinfection Improvements: The 30-day review period of the project's CEQA document concludes March 4th. A meeting between Staff and CDM Smith to discuss the 90% draft project plans and specifications is scheduled for February 29th.
- Groundwater Assessment: Luhdorff & Scalmanini Consulting Engineers is reviewing historical information pertaining to the groundwater pumping within the City of Antioch.
- Country Hills Drive and Vista Grande Drive Water Main Replacement: A-S Pipelines, Inc. is compiling the required documentation for the execution of the contract for the installation of new domestic water facilities on Country Hills Drive from Vista Grande Drive to Canada Valley Road and Vista Grande Drive from Lone Tree Way to Country Hills Drive.
- 2015 Transportation Development Act (TDA) Grant: JD Partners completed the construction of 27 new curb ramps along Bluerock Drive and West Tregallas Road and additional ramps along San Joaquin Avenue. The City Council will consider the final acceptance of the project at the March 8th meeting.
- Transportation Impact Fee Study: Staff is working with the consultant, EPS, to finalize the land use forecasts and the transportation improvement list and network to be used in the traffic model. The final draft Fee Study will be presented to the City Council for public review and comments in May 2016.
- Prewett Water Park Improvements: RHAA completed the design of the final improvements at Prewett Water Park. Staff received the project permit approvals from the County Health Department and the Fire Department. Project plans and

specifications are available for purchase by logging on www.blueprintexpress.com/antioch or by calling BPXpress Reprographics at (707) 745-3593. The public bid opening for this project is scheduled for March 8th at 2:00 P.M. in the City Council Chambers located at 200 "H" Street.

- North East Annexation Infrastructure Improvements: Staff is drafting a Request for Proposal for consulting services to provide engineering services and to prepare preliminary plans, estimates and studies for the planning and the design of infrastructure improvements needed to serve the newly annexed Area 1 and 2B.
- Pavement Management Technical Assistance Program (P-TAP) Grant: The city was awarded grant funding from MTC for consulting services to assist the City in implementing and maintaining the annual Pavement Management Program System by inspecting the pavement conditions of arterial, collector and residential streets and provide us with design recommendations for pavement rehabilitation projects.
- 2016 CalRecycle Rubberized Pavement Grant: CalRecycle has issued the Notice of Funding Availability for the Rubberized Pavement Grant Program. Staff has submitted an application for \$250,000 of grant funding for the 2016 Pavement Management Program, which will include potential streets recommended to receive Rubberized Cape Seal treatments.
- 2016 Transportation Development Act (TDA) Grant: MTC is soliciting applications for 2016/2017 TDA grants for Pedestrian and Bicyclist improvement projects. The City Council approved a resolution of support for the \$130,000 grant funding application at the January 12th meeting; the Parks and Recreation Commission approved a resolution of support at their January 21st meeting. The grant application includes funding for curb ramp upgrades to meet ADA requirements, installation of new sidewalks at needed locations and for bicyclist improvements along Cavallo Road, "A" Street, "G" Street, Putnam Street and Carpinteria Drive.
- Traffic Signal Improvements at Wild Horse Road/Folsom Drive and W. Tenth Street/L Street: Staff is preparing plans and specifications for a new traffic signal at Wild Horse Road/Folsom Drive and a traffic signal modification at W. Tenth Street/L Street. The bid package is expected to be out in April 2016.
- Staff received 13 statements of qualifications and proposals from traffic engineers, civil engineers and landscape architects/planners for on-call services and the L Street Path to Transit Corridor. Staff has reviewed the documents and is establishing a list of consultants to perform these services on an as-needed basis.

Water Treatment Plant

- Cleaned Solar Bees out on the municipal reservoir. Solar Bees circulate the water in the reservoir; cleaning the Solar Bees prevents weeds from restricting the circulation. Also cleaned the staff gage on the tower.
- Completed wiring on the pier for the new flow meter.
- Repaired the four inch air line that allows air to blow off debris on the river pump fish screen. During low tide staff worked to get under the river pump building to repair the pipe.
- Completed installing new material on drying bed #3.

- Installed a new wireless antenna on the Hillcrest tank.

Water Distribution

- Water crews had 302 stops for water service including disconnections.
- Water crews had a total of 84 USA tickets completed for utility location.
- Meter reading for the month of February is now complete.
- There were seven drought notices issued this week.
- The State Water Board has Extended Emergency Water Conservation Regulations through October 2016.
- Water crews continue to monitor water meters, conservation and usage at all City buildings and parks.
- Water Distribution personnel continue to respond to drought hotline inquiries.
- Water field techs responded to customer calls regarding water maintenance issues city wide.
- Water crews performed repairs to an irrigation system leak at City Hall.
- Water crews raised valve can iron on Contra Loma Blvd. and on Poppy Way.
- Water crews replaced a 1" water service on Honeysuckle Circle.
- Water crews repaired two 2" backflows on James Donlon Blvd.
- Water crews attended backflow certification training and exam preparation classes for water distribution state certification.
- Water crews are performing directional flushing of water mains on Sunset Dr. for water quality.
- Water crews repaired a 3" backflow on Reseda Way.
- Water crews performed preventative maintenance on fire hydrants city wide.
- Water staff hauled off green waste for recycles as well as cleaned up debris at the City's Fulton yard.
- Central Stores staff continues to remove graffiti from Amtrak platform and Fulton Shipyard Rd. boat ramp areas.
- Central Stores assisted Vehicle Maintenance with troubleshooting a problem with programming two vehicles for passive fueling.

Public Works Operations – Parks and Landscape

- Playground and Park Safety Inspections: Completed at Chaparral, Heidorn and Williamson Ranch Parks.
- Park Water Reductions: The water is off for all City parks including City and Gentrytown Parks.
- City Park: The soccer field turf is undergoing a complete renovation and is temporarily closed to the Public.
- Dallas Ranch Park: Installed two new basketball nets.
- Gentrytown Park Delta Diamond: The baseball field turf and infield is undergoing renovation and is temporarily closed to the public.
- Heidorn Park: Repaired a water leak in the park restrooms.
- Tree Removal Permits: A Tree Removal Permit was issued for 825 E. 18th St.

- Irrigation: Repaired five irrigation leaks on City property.
- Leaf Removal: Hillcrest rights of way and James Donlon Blvd.
- Roadside Spray: Completed.
- Spot Spray: Lone Tree Way, James Donlon, Hillcrest medians and Somersville Rd.
- Trim Crews: District 1A (Redwood Drive and Sequoia Drive area) and Water Treatment Plant.
- Debris Removal: Deerfield Corridor.

Public Works Operations – Street Maintenance

- Graffiti Abatement: Removed graffiti from City property in numerous areas.
- Signs: Replaced 44 existing signs due to poor reflectivity.
- Lane Delineators: Replaced 550 raised pavement markers at various locations.
- Debris: Picked up 21 yards of debris on Wilbur Ave., Oakley Rd., and Viera Rd. in City rights of way.
- Potholes: Filled 116 potholes.

Public Works Utilities – Collections Division

- Calls for Sewer Service: Received and responded to seven calls for service from the public. Responding crews televised 315 linear feet of public sewer laterals connecting to the City's sewer system.
- Sewer Mains: Daily preventative maintenance performed on over 23,754 linear feet of sewer main lines.
- Quarterly Sewer Main Cleaning: The route schedule is under review to increase inspection frequency of identified 'hot spots' and integrate a proactive preventative cleaning schedule for the 'hot spots'.
- Sewer Lateral Maintenance Program (SLMP): Crews repaired two laterals that were severely damaged requiring immediate repair. Crews televised nine laterals.
- Manhole Inspection Program: Crews inspected 84 manholes. Manholes are inspected for loose lids, debris, locking mechanisms, and status of infrastructure for future maintenance and rehabilitation. We are updating the program and processes for integration in our computerized maintenance management system.
- Sanitary Sewer Overflow (SSO) Reduction Program: Staff is working on formal inspection criteria to inspect manholes in rural areas. The use of "SMART Manholes" in strategic areas will be utilized that will alert leadership staff within the division of potential SSOs. This program will also address the need for locking mechanisms.
- Closed Caption Televising (CCTV): Crews televised 2,362 feet of sewer main lines. The CCTV Preventative Maintenance crew inspects sewer mains to identify the condition and causes of blockages and SSOs.
- National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES): Crews removed 20 yards of trash and debris and 13 shopping carts from various creeks and channels; inspected and cleaned 1,017 linear feet of v-ditches, removing eight yard of debris; and abated weeds where our creeks and channels flow into the river. These

activities ensure the City meets the Federal Clean Water Act requirements of municipalities discharging storm water into waterways.

Public Works Operations – Fleet Division

- Preventative Maintenance: 16 services on City vehicles as scheduled.
- Unscheduled Repairs: 33 unscheduled, necessary repairs to City vehicles.

Public Works Operations – Municipal Marina

- New Occupancy: The Marina has one permanent application pending, responded to two berthing enquiries and gave one facility tour.
- Billing: Meter reads and billing for February is complete.
- Maintenance: Removed hyacinth and debris from the Marina basin. Replaced light bulbs on B dock.
- The Marine Science institute's vessel, the Robert G. Brownlee is back for 2016, offering educational tours for local school children. The educational tours focus on the California Delta ecology and Delta specific species. For more information, please see their website at: <http://www.sfbaymsi.org>.
- Advertising and Outreach: Approved advertisements placed in Yachtsman magazine reaching over 40,000 boaters. Craigslist advertisements placed in Bay Area, Stockton, Sacramento, Monterey, and Santa Cruz listings. Advertising current fuel prices on Craigslist and the Marina website. Advertising annual boat launch ramp passes for \$100 on Craigslist.
