Elected officials, Planning Commissioners and designated City Staff, Board Members, other commissioners and designated consultants are required to file an FPPC Form 700 "Statement of Economic Interests" for Calendar Year 2016 to the City Clerk's Office no later than 4:30 p.m., Monday, April 3, 2017.

If you assumed office between **October 1, 2016 and December 31, 2016**, and filed an assuming office statement, you are not required to file an annual statement until **April 2, 2018**. That annual statement will cover the day you assumed office through December 31, 2017.

Candidate campaign finance reports are available for the public to review at the City Clerk's Office.

Since 2014, GO-Biz has awarded over \$400 Million to 574 companies that are projected to create over 60,000 jobs and make \$13.5 billion in investments. DEER VALLEY HIGH STUDENT NAMED WINNER IN CONTRA COSTA COUNTY "POETRY OUT LOUD" CONTEST - KIARA CHATMAN WINS LOCAL COMPETITION THAT EMPHASIZES LANGUAGE SKILL AND PUBLIC SPEAKING

Kiara Chatman, a senior at Deer Valley High in Antioch, took first place in the Contra Costa County "Poetry Out Loud" competition for the second year in a row. The event was held at the Las Lomas High School Theatre in Walnut Creek on February 11th. The Runner-up position went to senior Camila Morales-Jimenez from El Cerrito High in El Cerrito, and Third Place to sophomore Wesley Little from Monte Vista High in Danville. The three were among thousands of students across the state to participate in the national recitation contest, a program started by the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) and run by the California Arts Council and locally by the Arts & Culture Commission of Contra Costa County (AC5) to engage high-school students in the presentation of poetry through memorization and performance. Chatman advances to the California state finals in Sacramento on March 12 & 13. At stake are hundreds of dollars on the state competition level and thousands at the national finals of Poetry Out Loud.

"To learn a great poem by heart is to make a friend for life," said John Barr, president of the Poetry Foundation. "The national recitation program brings fresh energy to an ancient art form by returning it to the classrooms of America."

The Poetry Out Loud program seeks to foster the next generation of literary readers by capitalizing on the latest trends in poetry: recitation and performance. Poetry Out Loud competitions start in the classroom, then at the school, region, state, and national finals, similar to the structure of the spelling bee. The national initiative is part of an attempt to bring literary arts to students, a critical need in U.S. schools, according to a 2004 NEA report *Reading at Risk* that found a dramatic decline in literary reading, especially among younger readers.

RECREATION UPDATES:

- This week, residents participated in the Wills, Trusts and Estate Planning workshop at the Antioch Community Center. Enrolled participants learned strategies on how to make sure their families are safe and financially secure during life changes.
- On Monday, Water Park staff finalized cashier position interviews that will take place on Tuesday, March 7th.
- On Monday, Water Park Maintenance staff completed the annual submittals for the Hazardous Materials Business Plan for the Antioch Water Park. This submittal is required for chemicals stored, used, and disposed as they relate to Water Park Operations on an annual basis.
- On Tuesday, staff worked with the webmaster to update the water park page of the of the City of Antioch website. The majority of the updates have been completed including the new map of the park.
- On Thursday, staff participated in the Chamber of Commerce and Antioch Schools Pathway to Careers Expo at the Antioch Community Center. This career expo allowed the Water Park to actively promote programs and job opportunities to the community.
- On Friday, 12 participants began a 2nd session of Anime and Manga Art. This

imaginative art of Japan is being offered by the Recreation Department and is very popular with young teens. Techniques taught showed ways to draw people and characters expressively and accurately. Character building helped to bring characters to life.

- This week, registration opened for the adult softball leagues organized by the Department. Softball is an excellent adult fitness activity so gather your team together for one of several leagues. Registration is accepted until March 16th.
- Last week, the second draft of the summer activity guide was submitted to the designer for edits and revision. Start planning now for summer camps, swimming lessons and more!

- On Friday, 20 seniors enjoyed Karaoke Friday! They sang songs and danced to music before lunch and socialization.
- On Monday, staff produced marketing material for the upcoming, Volunteer Appreciation Award Ceremony, as well as, created a rough draft of this year's "Volunteer Appreciation Certificates".
- On Tuesday, staff created mailing labels for the March/April newsletter, as well as, created a packet of flyers for the month of March which include information about upcoming trips, special programming, and holiday closures.
- On Tuesday, 46 seniors celebrated Mardi Gras and enjoyed dancing to festive music, singing Karaoke, and some even came dressed in Mardi Gras attire and wore beads.
- On Tuesday, a representative from the Nutrition Program came to observe the CoCo Café Lunch Program. The Center received a positive report and the kitchen staff was given high praise for doing a great work.
- On Wednesday, Antioch Senior Center and Senior Services Staff had their monthly meeting. The Custodial Check List was reviewed and will be implemented on Monday, March 6th to help staff track and maintain their Antioch Senior Center duties in keeping a clean facility.

Community Development Block Grant (CDBG):

Review and evaluation of all applications by the Council Subcommittee is underway, and agency interviews have been scheduled for April 7th and 21st. Council will consider the Subcommittee recommendations in a Public Hearing on May 9th, and the Action Plan will be submitted to HUD on May 12th. The allocations are for the three-year grant cycle of 2017-18, 18-19, and 19-20, with renewal of funding for agencies that are satisfactorily meeting their goals and in compliance with regulations.

Housing:

Recent rent increases in Antioch have prompted more people to inquire about tenant/landlord counseling services or fair housing issues. The City of Antioch contracts with Bay Area Legal Aid (BayLegal) and Echo Housing is their partner with an office in

Antioch. If anyone suspects that they have been discriminated against, or has questions about the legality of something that a landlord is doing, they can call Echo Housing toll-free at 855-275-3246.

Homeless:

The Planning and Policy Manager, Jaime Jenett, of the County's new Health, Housing and Homeless Services Division explained the newly redesigned Coordinated Entry system for Contra Costa at this week's Council meeting and fielded a wide array of questions about the new system, which has been redesigned to coordinate the entry points for consumers and better coordinate and standardize homeless services throughout the various nonprofit and County service providers.

City Code Enforcement, Police CET Team, and key Recreation and Public Works staff will meet with the new CORE Outreach Teams on Tuesday March 7th. Staff are eager to learn how best to coordinate with and refer to the CORE teams and maximize the resources for homeless persons in the City.

Drought Updates:

While this season's rain has things looking good for this year, water conservation and preparing for the next dry year are always important. If you let your lawn die and are planning to re-landscape, consider a low water design.

Registration for the Sunday, May 7, 2017 <u>Bringing Back the Natives Garden Tour</u> is now open! This year's tour will fill quickly; <u>register now</u> to reserve your place. Forty one <u>bird</u> <u>and butterfly-friendly, pesticide-free, water conserving, low maintenance gardens</u> that contain 60% or more native plants will be open on Sunday, May 7, 2017, from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. at various locations throughout Alameda and Contra Costa counties. Twenty-five of these gardens have not been on the Tour before. More than fifty garden talks will be offered throughout the day.

Engineering & Development Services

• Aviano, a 533-unit housing development by Aviano Farms, located west of the current terminus of Hillcrest Avenue, east and north of Dozier-Libby Medical High

School: Staff is reviewing Phase 1 (3rd submittal) construction documents and plans. Staff received an estimate from the City's consultant to review Phase 2 map & plans. A Development Agreement was filed at the County Recorder's office.

- BART Maintenance Facility (MF). A sanitary sewer line connection for the MF is under construction, expected to be completed by the beginning of May. Staff is processing appurtenant public sanitary sewer easements.
- Habit Burger, 2424 Mahogany Way: Permits have been issued and construction is underway.
- Heidorn Village, a 117-unit housing development by Mission Peak Homes, located on 20.3 acres on the west side of Heidorn Ranch Road at the eastern terminus of Prewett Ranch Road: A Development Agreement was filed at the County Recorder's office.
- Park Ridge Phase I, a 123-unit housing development by Davidon Homes, located west of Canada Valley Road and east of Highway 4: The developer is grading the site and installing underground utilities. Staff is reviewing model home plans.
- Rahmany Lot Line Adjustment, 4420 Belvedere Way: The City Council approved a Property Purchase Agreement on 2/14/17. A resolution to vacate and authorize the City Manager to sign the grant deed to transfer the property was approved by the City Council on 2/28/17. Staff is processing the property purchase.
- SR4 (Segment 2) Contra Loma Blvd. Interchange/'G' Street Overcrossing Project: The project has been accepted by the State. Staff is working with Caltrans to complete the City's punch list.
- SR4 (Segment 3A) 'A' Street/Lone Tree Way Interchange, Cavallo Road/Garrow Drive Undercrossing Project: Staff is working with Caltrans to complete the City's punch list.
- SR4 (Segment 3B) Hillcrest Avenue Interchange and BART Tunnel Project: Sidewalks and handicap ramps are under construction. Staff is working with the CCTA to complete the City's punch list.
- Vineyard Self Storage by Recess Development Co., located at the NW corner of E. 18th Street and Vineyard Drive: Staff is processing a lot merger for the applicant.

Capital Improvements Division

- Downtown Sanitary Sewer Rehabilitation: A-S Pipelines, Inc. is constructing new sanitary sewer manholes and repairing and replacing deteriorated sewer service laterals on West 7th and West 8th Streets.
- Zone I Transmission Pipeline Rehabilitation at HWY 4: R.J. Gordon Construction, Inc. is compiling project material submittals.
- Water Treatment Plant Disinfection Improvements: The first addendum to the project contract documents was issued on February 27th. Project plans and specifications are available for purchase at a cost of \$200 per set. Copies may be obtained by logging on www.blueprintexpress.com/antioch or by calling BPXpress Reprographics at (707) 745-3593. The public bid opening for this project is scheduled for March 21st at 2:00 p.m. in the City Council Chambers located at 200 'H' Street.

- Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Downtown Roadway Pavement Rehabilitation: Staff is developing the final set of project plans and specifications.
- West Antioch Creek Channel Improvements: Condemnation negotiations are proceeding regarding acquisition of property and easements located at 1400 and 1420 West 10th Street. Discussions are continuing with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Services regarding permitting issues.
- Brackish Water Desalinization Plant: The City has received the executed agreement from State Water Resources Control Board for a \$1,000,000 State Revolving Fund loan for preliminary design activities of this project. Staff is reviewing Carollo Engineers' proposal for performing engineering consulting services for the next phase of pre-design work.
- North East Annexation Infrastructure Improvements: BKF Engineering is working on cost estimates for the new infrastructures improvements needed in the Northeast Annexation area. Staff will be meeting with BKF to review the cost estimates and the projected construction schedule for these improvements.
- Transportation Impact Fee Study: EPS has developed several scenarios for the fees; the draft Fee Study received council direction to circulate the draft study for public and developers' review.
- Retaining Walls Rehabilitation: The contractor completed the retaining wall on Contra Loma Boulevard and has started the construction on the James Donlon retaining wall. Construction is expected to be completed by April 2017.
- Pavement Preventative Maintenance Program: Staff has submitted a grant application to the Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery (CalRecycle) to fund the FY 2018 Rubberized Cape Seal project in the amount of \$350,000. The grant funding results are expected in April 2017. Staff is working on the design of Lone Tree Way and Golf Course Road (2017 Rubberized Cape Seal project). Construction is expected to start in July 2017 and be completed by September 2017.
- Antioch Pavement Management Street Survey: AMS Consulting Services has performed a comprehensive citywide pavement condition survey of all city streets. The draft report was submitted to staff on February 10th for review. Staff will provide comments on the draft and use the final report to develop future roadway pavement rehabilitation projects.
- 'L' Street Pathway to Transit, State Route 4 to the Marina: Staff submitted a \$2,279,000 grant application to One Bay Area Grant (OBAG 2) Program for federal funding to provide bike and pedestrian improvements on "L" Street from State Route 4 to the Antioch Marina. Applications are currently being reviewed and results are expected in April.
- Staff is working on the draft 2017-2022 Five Year Capital Improvement Program (CIP). The draft CIP will be reviewed at the Planning Commission meeting on March 15th and Parks & Recreation Commission on March 16th.

Water Distribution

- Responded to 198 stops for water service including disconnections.
- Had a total of 65 USA tickets completed for utility location.
- Meter reading has been completed on time for the month.
- Continue to respond to Water Conservation hotline reports.
- Replaced and down sized a backflow and water meter on Apollo Ct.
- Replaced a leaking 1" water service on Manzanita Way.
- Raised four water valve cans to grade in several locations.
- Continue to monitor water quality on Sakurai Street.
- Continue the valve exercise program (downtown area).
- Completed worker safety training regarding methods for proper hand safety.
- State mandated annual backflow testing is on schedule.
- Continue to provide water connect and disconnect services to Finance Department.
- Hauled off green waste for recycles, as well as cleaned up at the City's Fulton yard.
- Performed citywide preventative maintenance on fire hydrants.
- Central Stores staff cleared graffiti, trash and household goods from the Fulton Shipyard Rd. boat launch area. This is an ongoing problem.
- Central Stores staff cleared graffiti and debris from the Amtrak platform and surrounding area. This is an ongoing problem.

Public Works Operations – Parks and Landscape

- Playground and Park Safety Inspections: Completed at Knoll, Markley Creek, Meadow Creek, Meadowbrook and Mountaire Parks.
- Park Irrigation: Water is off at Chichibu and Dallas Ranch Parks. All other City parks are in rain shutdown mode at the irrigation controllers.
- Knoll Park: Multiple pine tree failures occurred during the storm causing substantial damage to the restroom roof; we will begin the repairs this week.
- Williamson Ranch Park: A parking lot gate was severely damaged in a vehicle accident and removed.
- Tree Removal Permits: Approved permits for 2820 Sweeney Road and 2835 Chardonnay Way.
- Tree Assessment Reports: Completed at 3101 Rio Grande Dr. and D Street adjacent to 301 W. 6th Street.
- Tree and Branch Failures: A tree and a branch failure to two different Monterey Cypress trees took place at Jacobsen Park on Friday. The failed branch was removed and the tree failure removal is pending work to be done by PG&E crews.
- Repaired eight irrigation leaks on City property.
- Trim Crews: Johnson Trail and Mesa Ridge Trail.
- Spot Spray: W. 4th St. at Auto Center Dr., L St., I St. parking lot, Marina parking lot, Deer Valley Rd., James Donlon Blvd. and the Police Department facility.
- Storm Related Tree Removals: Removed trees at the end of G Street (behind the theater) and at James Donlon Boulevard.

• Storm Related Tree Limb Removals: Tree limbs were removed from Country Hills Dr., Indian Hills Dr., Carpinteria Dr., Deer Valley Rd. bike lanes, Hillcrest Ave. bike lanes and the City Hall parking lot.

Public Works Operations – Street Maintenance

- Removed graffiti from numerous areas around the City.
- Replaced 12 existing signs due to poor reflectivity or line of sight issues.
- Installed two 'No Panhandling' signs at the intersection of Lone Tree Way and Slatten Ranch Shopping Center.
- Filled 193 potholes.
- Removed seven yards of debris in the roadway and at illegal dumping sites.
- Assisted with flood control during storms.
- Cleaned 460 storm catch basins with debris in a broad sweep of the City's main roads and downtown business district.

Public Works Utilities – Collections Division

- Calls for Sewer Service: Received and responded to seven calls for service from the public.
- Sewer Mains: Daily preventative maintenance performed on over 15,386 linear feet of sewer main lines.
- Quarterly Sewer Main Cleaning: The route schedule is under review to increase inspection frequency of identified priority locations and integrate a proactive preventative cleaning schedule for these pipelines.
- Repaired two laterals that were severely damaged requiring immediate repairs. Crews also televised two laterals.
- Manhole Inspection Program: Inspected 104 manholes. Manholes are inspected for loose lids, debris, locking mechanisms, and status of infrastructure for future maintenance and rehabilitation. Staff is updating the program and processes for integration in our computerized maintenance management system.
- Closed Caption Televising (CCTV): Televised 12,672 feet of sewer main lines. The CCTV Preventative Maintenance crew inspects sewer mains to identify the condition and causes of blockages and sanitary sewer overflows (SSOs).
- Lateral Inspection Program: Inspected 17 sewer lateral sites. They televised eight laterals which equates to 280 linear feet of public sewer laterals.
- SMART Manhole Devices: These devices monitor flow/level and alert staff to potential sewer backups or flow problems. We had several alerts due to the heavy rain events, none of which went to alarm status.
- National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System: Removed 123 yards of household and green waste in various creeks and channels. These activities ensure the City meets the federal Clean Water Act requirements of municipalities discharging storm water into waterways.
- Lake Alhambra Inspection: Inspected and cleaned debris screens on the east and south side of the lake.

- Inspected 10 storm catch basins throughout the city. Crews cleared debris from the top of the grates to alleviate flooding and determined if catch basins were full of debris and a vacuum truck was needed.
- Cleaned storm trash capture devices throughout the city.

Public Works Operations – Fleet Division

- Preventative Maintenance: 14 services on City vehicles as scheduled.
- Scheduled Repairs: 19 scheduled repairs on City vehicles.
- Unscheduled Repairs: 29 unscheduled, but necessary repairs to City vehicles.

Public Works Operations – Municipal Marina

- The Marina staff responded to one permanent berthing application and responded to seven berthing inquiries and gave two tours of the facility.
- Provided San Francisco Water Trail's Planning Division with a signed contract for a new kayak launch facility along with other documents to begin the procurement process.
- Electric meter reads and billing for March are complete.
- Marina Maintenance: Performed continual storm clean up of debris throughout the marina property and parking lot. Continued to trim hedges along the back trail and all walkways to keep them clear. Repaired loose boards along C Dock berths and reattached railings in several berths. Removed several piles of debris along back trail. Replaced four light bulbs along B Dock. Removed debris and logs out of the Marina basin.
- Advertising and Outreach: Approved advertisements placed in Yachtsman magazine reaching over 40,000 boaters mentioning Boat U.S. partnership discounts. Craigslist advertisements placed in Bay Area, Stockton, Sacramento, Monterey, and Santa Cruz listings. We are advertising Annual Boat Launch Ramp Passes for \$100 and the Automated Self fueling station and operational hours on Craigslist.

Public Works Operations – Facility Maintenance Division

- City Hall: Troubleshot an electrical problem in the Council Chamber ceiling lights. Repaired a toilet seat and checked for water leaks in the women's basement restroom.
- PD: Adjusted and lubricated an 'S1' jail door. Installed a television and white board in the Investigations Division. Replaced some lights in the lobby.
- Animal Services: Removed an old washing machine and repaired the floor underneath. Also installed new water valves for the new washing machine.
- Lynn House: Removed fallen tree branches from the right side of the building.
