As the City of Antioch Interim City Manager, one of my responsibilities is to attend community and public events to represent our wonderful city. On Tuesday, March 29, 2022, I had both the privilege and honor to join, along with dignitaries, local government officials, and trade partners, Dave, Trent, and Lori Sanson, owners of DeNova Homes and founders of Yellow Roof Foundation, in a ribbon-cutting ceremony unveiling the very first Yellow Roof community of affordable homes, in Old Town Pittsburg. The community is appropriately named **Gonsalves Village** in honor of East Bay business leader and Yellow Roof supporter Mr. Steve Gonsalves, President and CEO of Conco.

According to it's founders, the mission of Yellow Roof, a 501(c)(3) public charity non-profit organization, is to **assist those families** who are hardworking, contributing members of their community, but are experiencing difficult times due to both unforeseen and unexpected circumstances beyond their control. Yellow Roof Foundation has both enthusiastically and compassionately worked with the City of Pittsburg on the creation of Gonsalves Village, which showcases three single-family residences. The residences are **beautifully designed**, single-story style structures in a prime location in Pittsburg, with excellent access to employment and transportation centers.

As the City of Antioch mayor, in conjunction with the city council, continues to work hard to find innovative and **fiscally sound solutions** to both the Bay Area housing crisis and our unhoused residents' predicament, the Yellow Roof Foundation Founders are partnering with our city leaders to provide a place for our families who are on the verge of becoming homeless.

By partnering with city government officials, private business owners, non-profit organizations, trade partners, and consolidating city resources, we, too, as a compassionate community, can give hope to the unhoused so they can dream of a better tomorrow and future for their children. It is said that "words have meaning, and names have power." The name Yellow Roof Foundation has proven that it, too, has the power to transform individuals' lives and restore a sense of dignity by compassionately illustrating that "there's no place like home."

FENTANYL DANGERS

Fentanyl is one of the most dangerous synthetic drugs currently in circulation. According to the DEA, fentanyl is a **synthetic opioid** drug approximately 100 times more potent than morphine and 50 times more potent than heroin. More recently, there has been a re-emergence of trafficking, distribution, and abuse of illicitly produced fentanyl and fentanyl analogs with an associated dramatic increase in **overdose fatalities** nationally, ranging from 2,666 in 2011 to 31,335 in 2018.

Illegal fentanyl is sold in the following forms: as a powder, dropped on blotter paper-like small candies, in eye droppers or nasal sprays, or made into pills that look like actual prescription opioids. In the event anyone encounters a substance believed to be fentanyl, please **DO NOT TOUCH IT OR APPROACH IT** and immediately dial 911.

CITY CLERK HISTORY

In honor of **Antioch's 150th anniversary**, here is some history about early Antioch City Council Meetings!

The Honorable **Roswell Butler Hard** was elected as Contra Costa County Supervisor 1866-1868 and Sheriff from 1867 and 1869. He built his large **two-story brick house** on Front (First) Street in 1869 using bricks from Antioch's first brick factory. It was considered the nicest and most costly home in the area at the time. It served as the **meeting place** for the first board of trustees (called the city council today) for the newly incorporated City of Antioch. Roswell Butler Hard was elected mayor at this meeting! Known now as the "Roswell Butler Hard House," this **historic building** is owned by the City of Antioch. Although it remains vacant, there are plans to **renovate** the building and use it for satellite city hall offices.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

TIME TO PREPARE FOR FIRE SEASON

The City of Antioch's NPDES Division began working on Fire Breaks next to our City creeks on April 4th. The crew's work consists of clearing dead branches, debris, and trash and mowing down the **tall weeds and grass** to prevent wildfires in the upcoming dry months. Currently, crews are working around **West Antioch Creek** near Sycamore Avenue and will be continuing toward the Markley Creek area and then towards Hwy 4 in the coming weeks.

Crews will begin annual creek maintenance once finished with our large fire break areas. Our creek maintenance season is from April 15 to October 31. During that time, we have our **NPDES crews and contractors**, i.e., AI Fresco Landscape and MJH construction, help accomplish our goals for the year. We will start on the south side of town and continue moving towards the river shortly.

BRACKISH WATER DESAL PLANT UPDATE

Construction continues at the **Water Treatment Plant** as crews remove and replace the concrete ceiling of a **treated water storage basin** to make modifications for the City's new Brackish Water Desalination Plant.





ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

CUT THE COMMUTE

The Economic Development Departments of East Contra Costa County cities of Antioch, Brentwood, Oakley, and Pittsburg are **collaborating** on an economic development initiative to help residents "Cut the Commute." The team is asking residents to **identify their commute** destination and other information in a one-minute survey to target businesses with a high concentration of employees in



the region to consider expanding or relocating to East Contra Costa County.

The Economic Development Departments of East Contra Costa County know that many of its residents commute daily to offices in and around the greater Bay Area. Due to the pandemic, employers are now **considering new ways** to address the needs of their employees, including deciding where employees report to work daily. The information collected during the survey period will provide valuable insight to the cities, and the **overall initiative** is intended to decrease commute times for East Contra Costa County residents by attracting larger employers of existing residents to expand in the region.
