#### **RECREATION UPDATES**

- Last week, Recreation staff submitted a new Emergency Action Plan for the Water Park to the Contra Costa County Environmental Health Department. Several industry professionals provided feedback on the new plan, which includes detailed procedures and actions to ensure a healthy summer experience for all visitors.
- **BE COOL BY THE POOL** this year and purchase your annual water park pass before the fees increase! Water Park buyouts are selling fast you can rent the water park for your group or business to celebrate a memorable occasion!
- Last week, the 2016 Summer Recreation Guide arrived in Antioch mailboxes. Plan your summer now and stay close to home for great family fun. On-line registration begins April 18<sup>th</sup>.
- On Tuesday, a third live scan fingerprinting session was held at the Antioch Water Park for new hires and volunteers for the 2016 season. The Antioch Water Park expects to employ over 100 high school and college aged seasonal staff.
- On Wednesday, the 2016 Employee Handbook for Water Park seasonal staff was completed and is now in the editing phase.
- Last week, staff prepped for the last Lifeguard training course being offered this spring. The class has openings so encourage young adults to apply for the class and a summer job; class begins April 22<sup>nd</sup>.

- On Thursday, recreation staff presented the Antioch Council of Teens to Dallas Ranch Middle School Students. The kick-off event for this program will be on May 23<sup>rd</sup>!
- On Friday, recreation staff co-hosted an ActiveNet Roundtable in Danville for the California Park and Recreation Society. Many recreation agencies shared information and talked about system problems, solutions, and ways to better utilize the ActiveNet registration software.
- On Tuesday, staff completed the annual filter maintenance tasks for the Boulder Pool.
- On Tuesday, staff met with the City's Park Maintenance Landscape contractor to review pending projects and contract deficiencies. The Contractor is making necessary repairs.
- On Wednesday, the City's Anusul system contractor completed semi-annual ansul service and annual hood cleaning services for the kitchen fire suppression systems at the Senior Center, Community Center and Water Park.
- On Thursday, staff completed soil preparations for the new Tad Pool grass area.
   Sod will be installed next week.
- On Friday, staff changed out the sand for the Tad Pool filter. Sand is replaced periodically to assure the highest quality filtration and patron experience.
- Throughout the week staff completed monthly AED readiness checks and trained staff at various City locations on the check process for future inspections.
- Last week, 23 youth participated in classes to see the world through art! These
  unique art classes create projects inspired by different world cultures using a wide
  variety of styles, materials and themes. Art styles included drawing, painting,
  collage and more.
- Contractor agreements are being drafted for the Summer Recreation classes and activities; look for your recreation guide in the mail.
- Last week, staff completed the 2<sup>nd</sup> round of interviews for Recreation Leaders working with the children enrolled in its Coyote Hills Summer Day Camp.
- On Saturday, more than 50 youth started the spring basketball clinics for 1<sup>st</sup> through 6<sup>th</sup> graders. March Madness continues!
- Last week, the new members of the Parks and Recreation Commission completed their oath of office, orientation, and official filing. They are ready for their first Commission meeting.

# Senior Center Services

 Last week, 368 affordable healthy meals were served through the C.C. Café. Lunch and socialization help prevent heart attacks, depression, asthma and congestive heart failure. No membership or income requirements are required to eat at the C.C. Cafe. All supplies are provided by the County for participating cafes. Staff collects the daily nutrition deposits and submits them to finance.

- Last week, JFK University was on site at the Nick Rodriguez Community Center to paint their office. Their formal partnership with the City began last month and they will be conducting counseling classes for seniors and their families.
- On Monday, Rising Sun Energy Services hosted an information table to provide seniors with cost saving resources for their home; 10 seniors participated.
- On Tuesday, 20 seniors listened to a presentation from "Senior Centers Without Walls," a national program to assist Seniors who are home bound.
- On Wednesday, more than 100 seniors participated in the Annual Senior Volunteer Recognition lunch and program. The Antioch Senior Center Volunteer of the year for 2015 is Mary Ambrosino. Mary was honored by all of the seniors present, as well as her Niece and Nephew, her great Niece and great Nephew. Several dignitaries and members of the City Council stopped by to congratulate Mary.
- On Thursday, AARP was on site for their final day of appointments to assist seniors with their 2015 tax returns. All available appointments were filled.
- Last week, submitted the May/June Antioch Senior Center Newsletter to the printer.
- To date the Senior Club has received new and renewal membership applications from 776 seniors. Membership is only \$20 for the year; sign up friends and family who enjoy meeting new friends and staying active and healthy.

#### **Environmental Resources:**

Environmental Enforcement: April 7-13 – Over 57 actions were taken this week. 9 abatement notices sent out to properties without garbage service. We fielded 21 phone calls about existing cases and sent out 11 courtesy notices to properties where the abated garbage service has ended and service needs to be established by the tenant or owner to avoid further fines and abatements.

 The next General Meeting of the Contra Costa Homeless Continuum of Care is April 15, 2016, and all are invited. We will continue with panel presentations about the criminal justice system and homeless persons. Meetings are held in the ZA room at 30 Muir Road, Martinez from 10 am -12 pm.

# **Drought Updates:**

In March, Antioch Water Customers used 35% less than in 2013. Great job everyone! This takes our cumulative total to 30.18% since last summer. Our State mandated reduction goal was reduced from 28% to 27% moving forward, so keep up the great work and remember as we move into spring the following prohibitions:

- Watering of outdoor landscapes in a manner that causes excessive runoff such that water flows onto adjacent property, non-irrigated areas, private and public walkways, roadways, parking lots, or structures
- b. Watering of outdoor landscapes during and up to 48 hours after measurable rainfall.
- c. Watering of outdoor landscapes more than three days per week as follows:
  - Even addresses assigned days to irrigate are Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday
  - Odd addresses assigned days to irrigate are Wednesday, Friday, Sunday
  - Watering of outdoor landscapes during the daylight hours of 9:00 am 5:00 pm.
- d. Washing a vehicle, trailer or boat using a hose without a shut off nozzle.
- e. Washing paved or other hard-surfaced areas, including sidewalks, walkways, driveways, patios, and parking areas.
- f. Use of water for non-recirculating decorative fountains or filling decorative lakes or ponds.
- g. Using a hose without an automatic shutoff nozzle.
- h. Failing to repair a controllable leak.

#### Spring Irrigation tips:

If you haven't already done it, inspect your irrigation system to make sure nothing has broken over the winter. Early Spring is a good time to plant new plants. Visit <a href="mailto:contracosta.watersavingplants.com/">contracosta.watersavingplants.com/</a> to find the right water saving plant for your yard! It will give them time to become established before the heat of summer is upon us.

March & April – Turn your controller back on if it hasn't rained in the past week. Make sure to turn it off again if it rains. Water lawns 2 days/week, shrubs 1 day/week

May - Water lawns 3 days/week, shrubs 2 days/week

# <u>Last Week's Irrigation Repairs and Service:</u>

#### Administration

- Contra Costa Water District (CCWD) announced that they have signed a settlement agreement with the California Department of Water Resources (DWR), which

- according to CCWD will "protect its customers, facilities, and operations if the Bay Delta Conservation Plan/WaterFix (CWF), aka the 'twin tunnels', is built." The March 29th CCWD News Release also states, "The agreement is an insurance policy to protect the unique water quality and supply issues raised by CCWD". As a result of this settlement, CCWD has withdrawn its protest of the DWR Petition to Change Diversion locations proposed as part of the CWF. The documents related to this settlement are posted on the CCWD website <a href="http://www.ccwater.com/317/Bay-Delta-Conservation-Plan-Comments">http://www.ccwater.com/317/Bay-Delta-Conservation-Plan-Comments</a>. The CCWD Board of directors held a meeting on April 6<sup>th</sup> to explain the details of the agreement and respond to questions from the public.
- February 2016 brought us to the end of the initial water conservation mandate issued by the State of California. The City of Antioch was required to conserve 28% based on 2013 usage through the month of February 2016. Thanks to your outstanding efforts, our total cumulative reduction since July 2015 is 29.78%. At the end of January 2016, the State extended its mandatory conservation order through October 2016. Final guidance is still being worked out as the State monitors the snow pack and reservoir levels through this winter. Please continue to conserve this valuable resource and plan on conserving throughout 2016. Outdoor water conservation will be the primary focus of the City's program, as well as fines for wasteful practices as identified in the Water Conservation Resolution adopted by the City Council on May 12<sup>th</sup>, 2015. All Antioch customers were mailed a letter explaining the program and prohibitions, as well as 2013 monthly water usage. Examples of prohibitions are: three day per week residential outdoor watering, no watering between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., shut off nozzles required on all hoses, and drinking water available only upon request at restaurants. Contra Costa Water District has incentives, such as residential high-efficiency clothes washer rebates, water-efficient landscape rebates and smart sprinkler timer rebates. More information on water conservation programs and ideas on how to conserve water can be found at www.ccwater.com or www.antiochwater.com. Customers who are not in compliance with drought restrictions can be reported to the Antioch Drought Hotline at (925) 779-6140.

#### **Engineering & Development Services**

- Almondridge East Subdivision 8880, an 81-unit single family home development by KB Homes, located between East 18<sup>th</sup> Street and Oakley Road, east of Phillips Lane and west of the State Highway 160: Staff is reviewing plot plans for ongoing new home construction and provided a punch list for offsite improvements (bond reduction purposes).
- Buchanan Crossings Shopping Center, a 103,139 square foot commercial center on a 13.5-acre site located at the northwest corner of Somersville Road and Buchanan Road: Environmental clearances and USBR permitting requirements for the Phase 2 development are in progress. Staff is processing a request for reimbursement for Somersville Road widening and bond release for Phase 1 improvements.

- City-owned cell sites, various locations: Staff continues to perform site visits and review land leases, 100% construction drawings, consent letters, photo-simulations and related technical reports and materials for equipment upgrades and site modifications.
- Laurel Ranch, a 186-unit housing development by Richland Communities, located at the eastern terminus of existing Laurel Road and west of Highway 4: Staff is reviewing the final development plan, working out design details of a regional trail, and preparing project conditions of approval.
- Olive Groves Subdivision, 263 single-family detached senior housing units with assisted living facility, commercial uses and open space south of Sand Creek, east of Deer Valley Road. Residential portion gated with private streets. Staff is reviewing plans and preparing comments for a Preliminary Development Plan (PDP-16-01).
- Park Ridge Phase I, a 123-unit housing development by Davidon Homes, located west of Canada Valley Road and east of Highway 4: Staff is working with the developer to form a benefit district for improvements that will benefit multiple properties.
- SR4 (Segment 3A) 'A' Street/Lone Tree Way Interchange, Cavallo Road/Garrow Drive Undercrossing Project: Work continues on the 'A' St./Lone Tree Way Interchange, the Cavallo Road Overcrossings, and the new Sunset Drive extension from Bryan Avenue to "A" Street. Slope paving and sidewalk reconstruction is underway. Pedestrians and motorists are advised to exercise caution while travelling through these areas. The Resident Engineer for Caltrans/ CCTA estimates a mid-June completion date.
- SR4 (Segment 3B) Hillcrest Avenue Interchange and BART Tunnel Project: Work continues on the Hillcrest Avenue Bridge widening, the Pedestrian Overcrossing (POC) and the Maintenance of Works (MOW) Tunnel. The contractor began reconstruction of Sunset Drive immediately west of Hillcrest Avenue. Work continues on other improvements. The Resident Engineer for Caltrans/CCTA estimates a mid-June completion date.
- Aviano, an approved 533 unit housing development located west of the current terminus of Hillcrest Avenue, east and north of Dozier-Libby Medical High School: Staff is working with developer on park extension. The first phase of construction documents has been resubmitted to City for 2<sup>nd</sup> plan check and is under review.
- Working with consultant on finalizing sewer study for FUA 1.
- Tabora Gardens, a senior apartment complex on James Donlon and Tabora Drive.
   Plans submitted for 1<sup>st</sup> review.
- Child Care Education Building in Williamson Ranch Plaza: Plans submitted for 1<sup>st</sup> review.

#### Capital Improvements Division

Country Hills Drive and Vista Grande Drive Water Main Replacement: A-S
Pipelines, Inc. is scheduled to commence exploratory excavation of existing

- underground utilities on Vista Grande Drive between Lone Tree Way and Country Hills Drive on April 18<sup>th</sup>.
- Water Main Replacement at Various Locations: D&D Pipelines has completed all work associated with this project. The work is scheduled to be considered for acceptance at the April 12<sup>th</sup> City Council meeting.
- West Antioch Creek Channel Improvements: Purchase agreement documents are being executed between the City and the Twenty-Third District Agricultural Association for right of way and easements within the footprint of the Contra Costa Fairgrounds. Contra Costa Real Property Division continues to negotiate the purchase property and easements located at 1400 and 1420 West 10<sup>th</sup> Street. U.S. Fish and Wildlife is continuing to review the project's Biological Assessment.
- Water Treatment Plant Electrical Upgrades: A meeting between Staff and TJC and Associates is scheduled for April 13<sup>th</sup> to discuss facility electrical improvement recommendations and project phasing options. An arc flash study is expected to be finalized in a month. Associated Power Solutions will be adjusting electrical breaker settings in the near future.
- Urban Water Management Plan: West Yost and Associates is preparing a revised Urban Water Management Plan that will include comments and recommendations provided by Staff.
- Marina Boat Launch Facility Restroom: This project is scheduled to be discussed at the California Department of Parks and Recreation, Division of Boating and Waterways Commission meeting in early May. Staff will be meeting with members of the Commission later this month.
- Brackish Water Desalinization Plant: Staff met with Carollo Engineers and the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) to discuss the State Revolving Fund loan application. SWRCB has requested additional information that Staff is currently compiling. Carollo Engineers has begun further evaluation of the City water intake facility.
- Transportation Impact Fee Study: Staff is working with the consultant, EPS, to finalize the land use forecasts, the transportation improvement list, the network to be used in the traffic model, and proposed fee. The final draft Fee Study will be presented to the City Council for public review and comments in May 2016.
- Prewett Water Park Improvements: The contractor is submitting contract documents and material submittals required prior to construction. Both projects are expected to be completed in September 2016.
- Pavement Management Technical Assistance Program (P-TAP) Grant: The City
  was awarded \$95,000 in grant funding from MTC for AMS Consulting services to
  assist the City in implementing and maintaining the annual Pavement Management
  Program System by inspecting the pavement conditions of arterial, collector and
  residential streets and provide us with design recommendations for pavement
  rehabilitation projects. AMS Consulting will start the pavement survey and
  inspection work this month.

- 2016 CalRecycle Rubberized Pavement Grant: The City was awarded \$250,000 of grant funding for the 2016 Pavement Management Program, which will include potential streets recommended to receive Rubberized Cape Seal treatments.
- 2016 Transportation Development Act (TDA) Grant: The City received \$70,000 of TDA grant funding for Pedestrian and Bicyclist improvement projects for the installation of new sidewalks and bike lanes along Carpinteria Drive from Graphite Court to Garrow Bridge. Staff is preparing plans and specifications for the project.

#### Water Treatment Plant

- Cleaned Solar Bees out on the municipal reservoir. Solar Bees circulate the water in the reservoir; cleaning the Solar Bees prevents weeds from restricting the circulation. Also cleaned the staff gage on the tower.
- Pulled and sent out #4 canal pump. Pump will be rebuilt to "like-new" condition.
- Communication signal from the river pump has been brought into the water plants' SCADA controls. Information on SCADA will monitor pumping status, flows and total production.

- Debris: Picked up eight yards of debris in City rights of way.
- Lane Delineators: Replaced 1,525 raised pavement markers at various locations.
- Striping: Painted 122 stencils and 920 feet of 12 inch crosswalks.

#### Public Works Utilities - Collections Division

- Calls for Sewer Service: Received and responded to seven calls for service from the public. Responding crews televised 210 linear feet of public sewer laterals connecting to the City's sewer system.
- Sewer Mains: Daily preventative maintenance performed on over 5,529 linear feet of sewer main lines.

- Quarterly Sewer Main Cleaning: The route schedule is under review to increase inspection frequency of identified 'hot spots' and integrate a proactive preventative cleaning schedule for the 'hot spots.'
- Sewer Lateral Maintenance Program (SLMP): Repaired three laterals that were severely damaged requiring immediate repair. Crews also televised six laterals.
- Manhole Inspection Program: Crews inspected 29 manholes. Manholes are inspected for loose lids, debris, locking mechanisms, and status of infrastructure for future maintenance and rehabilitation. We are updating the program and processes for integration in our computerized maintenance management system.
- Sanitary Sewer Overflow (SSO) Reduction Program: Staff is working on formal inspection criteria to inspect manholes in rural areas. The use of "SMART Manholes" in strategic areas will be utilized that will alert leadership staff within the division of potential SSOs. This program will also address the need for locking mechanisms.
- Closed Caption Televising (CCTV): Crews televised 3,793 feet of sewer main lines.
   The CCTV Preventative Maintenance crew inspects sewer mains to identify the condition and causes of blockages and SSOs.
- National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES): Crews removed 0.87 yards of trash and debris and an abandoned boat from various creeks and channels. Sprayed half an acre and weed abated one acre of entry way access to channels. These activities ensure the City meets the Federal Clean Water Act requirements of municipalities discharging storm water into waterways. Proactive preventative maintenance is restricted to the months of April through October.

Boykin attempted to leave the lot and her open driver's door bumped the principal, knocking him to the ground. Both sides had conflicting views of the incident. A traffic collision report was taken. Boykin had a suspended driver's license and no insurance. She was cited and her vehicle was impounded.

Our officer responded to Bay Point and was able to obtain a confession from Tinoifili regarding the stolen vehicle and the earlier pursuit. Tinoifili was booked into county jail by CHP with additional charges from APD. Lt.

He was arrested and his true identity was discovered. Hill was sent to county jail.

#### **CITY MANAGER'S NOTES**

On Monday, I attended the quarterly Contra Costa Economic Partnership (CCEP) Board Meeting in Walnut Creek. The key topic of discussion was the proposed ½ cent sales tax for transportation projects sponsored by the Contra Costa Transportation Authority (CCTA). I and the other City Managers on the CCEP Board made the case for a 23% return to source provision for revenue from the tax if passed.

On Thursday, I attended the Contra Costa County Public Managers Association (PMA) Meeting in Walnut Creek. (No surprise) The key topic of discussion was the proposed ½ cent sales tax for transportation projects sponsored by the CCTA. With CCTA staff in attendance and presenting the status of the proposed measure, all City Managers in the county are supporting a 23% return to source provision for maintenance of local streets and roads, with no strings attached. All Contra Costa cities and the county are short on funding for basic maintenance of the public infrastructure.

This morning, Ron Bernal and I attended the Contra Costa Continuum of Care quarterly meeting, which featured: (1) Antioch Police Captain Diane Aguinaga moderating a panel discussion on the impacts of local ordinances on homeless issues and (2) Antioch's Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) consultant Terri House leading a discussion on best practices dealing with homelessness issues.
