The Antioch Police Department is excited to announce the 70th installment of the Neighborhood Cleanup Program. This is a collaborative community effort which involves active participation from The Antioch Police Department Crime Prevention Commission; Neighborhood Watch Program; Volunteers in Police Service; community volunteers and the Public Works Department.

The City of Antioch Neighborhood Cleanup program is not just for residential neighborhoods. It is a program that will change venues on a monthly basis and it will include business and commercial areas as well. Neighborhoods that are free of trash and refuse are inviting, and a clean community instills a sense of community pride.

The 70th Neighborhood Cleanup event will occur on Saturday, May 7th from 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. at the Live Oak School parking lot. We will be cleaning the neighborhoods between G and F Streets from 17th to 11th Street.

Volunteers will receive instructions and the equipment necessary to accomplish the goal. The targeted area is within walking distance. Excluding inclement weather, future Neighborhood Cleanup events are scheduled for the first Saturday of every month and the locations will be announced in advance. Remember, cleaning up your neighborhood can make life better for your family, your neighbors and your community!

The California Primary Election will be held on Tuesday, June 7th. The forms are hanging on the wall and no postage is required to mail them. Antioch voters will be interested in two City of Antioch ballot measures and the races for District 3 and District 5 County Supervisor, along with the State Assembly, State Senate, Congressional, Senatorial and Presidential primaries. - On Sunday, the final Lifeguard Training course ended. There are 40 new lifeguards from the spring classes ready to start the new season at the Antioch Water Park! These new employees are all high school or college aged residents and for many of them it is their first job.

- On Monday, 15 seniors participated in a class on mind and body health presented by the Northern California Alzheimer's Association on Monday.
- On Tuesday, the door to the breezeway between the Antioch Senior Center and the Nick Rodriguez Community Center was replaced. This fire door had fallen into disrepair and needed to be replaced; special thank you to the Public Works Department for assisting with the repair.
- On Wednesday, more than 20 seniors participated in our movie mania and came to watch Pawn Sacrifice.
- On Wednesday, Kaiser Permanente hosted an information table for Seniors who had questions about Medi-Cal.

- Last week, staff began purchasing the decorations and materials in preparation for the 34th Annual Senior Picnic to take place on Friday, May 20th.

CDBG:

- The 2016-17 Action Plan will go before the City Council May 10th.
- Work is ensuing to input the Action Plan into the IDIS HUD computer system. This is the first year that the Action Plans, CAPERS and Consolidated Plans are linked and new reports are to be produced from the HUD system.

Housing:

- The housing market continues to heat up and the City is benefitting, as persons with Antioch homebuyer and rehabilitation assistance loans refinance or sell their homes and payoff City loans. The Housing Consultant is working with lenders and others for over \$70K in payoffs and received one small payoff of about \$2,500.
- Housing Consultant continues to enter additional information on each loan to complete all fields of new Housing Loan monitoring system by CDS.

Homeless:

- The series of workshops to design the new Coordinated Entry system for all homeless services in Contra Costa County is almost concluded, with only one workshop remaining. The final workshop is on Implementation (Wed May 11th, 9-12:00 p.m.). Attending are provider agencies in the homeless continuum of care. If you are interested in learning more about these meetings, please call Teri House, Chair of the Homeless Advisory Board, at 925-779-7037.
- A new partnership has been initiated with the County Medical Center senior management, the Council on Homelessness and Contra Costa Continuum of Care providers of housing. This is part of a growing recognition, nationwide and within Contra Costa County that it is less expensive to house people than to pay for all of the ramifications of dealing with their needs as homeless persons.
A key stakeholder group, including the County Homeless Program staff, Housing Authority of CC, Director of the County hospital, Director of Healthcare for the Homeless, two nonprofit homeless housing providers, and Antioch's Housing Consultant, attended a HUD-sponsored technical assistance training last week. This effort was to learn more about federal and state efforts to coordinate housing placement and health care provision and to learn about new sources of funding that will pay for services to help support homeless clients in maintaining their housing and their health. Discussed at the meeting was the Medi-Cal 2020 waiver, a five-year renewal of California's Section 1115 Medicaid Waiver, which could provide the state with more than \$6.2 billion in new federal funding through programs that will shift the focus away from hospital-based and inpatient care towards outpatient, primary and preventative care. The Homeless Continuum of Care expects to be fully engaged in the development of the Whole Person Care Pilot application as well, another source of potential funding for homeless services.

Drought Updates:

During the month of April, Public Works staff addressed the following violations:

Water Waste Complaints:	4	How many public complaints of water waste or violation of conservation rules were received during the reporting month?
Contact Follow-ups:	4	How many contacts (written or verbal) were made with customers for actual or alleged water waste or for a violation of water conservation rules?
Warning Actions:	4	How many formal warning actions (e.g.: written notifications, warning letters, and door hangers) were issued for water waste or for a violation of conservation rules?
Other Penalties Issued:	4	How many penalties were issued for violations of local ordinances and/or the Water Boards' statewide prohibitions (e.g., watering on wrong day of week, letting water runoff into sidewalk/street, watering within 48 hours of a rain event, etc.)?

Spring Irrigation tips:

If you haven't already done it, inspect your irrigation system to make sure nothing has broken over the winter. Early Spring is a good time to plant new plants. Visit contracosta.watersavingplants.com/ to find the right water saving plants for your yard! It will give them time to become established before the heat of summer is upon us.

May - Water lawns 3 days/week, shrubs 2 days/week

Last Week's Irrigation Repairs and Service:

- Parks Citywide: All City parks are now watering.
- Arbor Day Tree Planting: The annual Arbor Day and Tree City Celebration Event took place this past Friday, April 29, 2016, at Mira Vista Park, 3000 S. Francisco Way, beginning at 3:30 pm. The Event was hosted by the Riverview Garden Club, in conjunction with the City of Antioch Parks Dept. Also presented was a US Flag Ceremony, by our Local Boy Scout Troop 247. Plenty of good food and fun was had by all. This event highlighted Antioch's 12th consecutive year as a Tree City USA.
- Delta Diamond: The baseball field turf is almost completely renovated. Tentative re-opening is scheduled for later this month.

- Hillcrest/Meadow Creek Parks: Drinking fountains were repaired.
- Mira Vista Hills Park: A leaking drinking fountain is temporarily shut off, pending repairs.
- Hillcrest Ave. - 30 sprinklers repaired, 1 lateral line repaired, 1 irrigation valve rebuilt and 3 caps replaced.
- James Donlon Blvd. – 9 sprinklers repaired.

PUBLIC WORKS UPDATES

Administration

- Contra Costa Water District (CCWD) announced that they have signed a settlement agreement with the California Department of Water Resources (DWR), which according to CCWD will “protect its customers, facilities, and operations if the Bay Delta Conservation Plan/WaterFix (CWF), aka the ‘twin tunnels’, is built.” The March 29th CCWD News Release also states, “The agreement is an insurance policy to protect the unique water quality and supply issues raised by CCWD”. As a result of this settlement, CCWD has withdrawn its protest of the DWR Petition to Change Diversion locations proposed as part of the CWF. The documents related to this settlement are posted on the CCWD website <http://www.ccwater.com/317/Bay-Delta-Conservation-Plan-Comments>. The CCWD Board of directors held a meeting on April 6th to explain the details of the agreement and respond to questions from the public. They have also mailed out a letter to each customer explaining the settlement. Antioch residents will receive a copy of the letter as we purchase our raw water from CCWD before treating it and distributing to our customers.
- February 2016 brought us to the end of the initial water conservation mandate issued by the State of California. The City of Antioch was required to conserve 28% based on 2013 usage through the month of February 2016. Thanks to your outstanding efforts, our total cumulative reduction since July 2015 is 29.78%. **At the end of January 2016, the State extended its mandatory conservation order through October 2016.** Final guidance is still being worked out as the State monitors the snow pack and reservoir levels through this winter. Please continue to conserve this valuable resource and plan on conserving throughout 2016. Outdoor water conservation will be the primary focus of the City’s program, as well as fines for wasteful practices as identified in the Water Conservation Resolution adopted by the City Council on May 12th, 2015. All Antioch customers were mailed a letter explaining the program and prohibitions, as well as 2013 monthly water usage. Examples of prohibitions are: three day per week residential outdoor watering, no watering between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., shut off nozzles required on all hoses, and drinking water available only upon request at restaurants. Contra Costa Water District has incentives, such as residential high-efficiency clothes washer rebates, water-efficient landscape rebates and smart sprinkler timer rebates. More information on water conservation programs and ideas on how to conserve water can be found at www.ccwater.com or www.antiochwater.com. Customers who

are not in compliance with drought restrictions can be reported to the Antioch Drought Hotline at (925) 779-6140.

Engineering & Development Services

- Almondridge East Subdivision 8880, an 81-unit single family home development by KB Homes, located between East 18th Street and Oakley Road, east of Phillips Lane and west of the State Highway 160: Staff is reviewing plot plans for ongoing new home construction and provided a punch list for offsite improvements (for bond reduction purposes).
- Buchanan Crossings Shopping Center, a 103,139 square foot commercial center on a 13.5-acre site located at the northwest corner of Somersville Road and Buchanan Road: CVS and Grocery Outlet stores are open for business and other building pads are in development and planning stages. Environmental clearances and USBR permitting requirements for the Phase 2 development are in progress. Staff is processing a request for reimbursement for Somersville Road widening and bond release for Phase 1 improvements.
- City-owned cell sites, various locations: Staff is performing site visits and review of land leases, 100% construction drawings, consent letters, photo-sims and related technical reports and materials for equipment upgrades and site modifications.
- Laurel Ranch, a 186-unit housing development by Richland Communities, located at the eastern terminus of existing Laurel Road and west of Highway 4: Staff is reviewing the final development plan and preparing project conditions of approval.
- Nelson Ranch Subdivision 6893, end of Wildhorse Road: Staff performed a site inspection and provided a punch list in response to the developer's request for release of the warranty bond.
- Olive Groves Subdivision, 263 single-family detached senior housing units with assisted living facility, commercial uses and open space: Residential portion gated with private streets. Staff is preliminarily reviewing the PDP-16-01 application.
- Park Ridge Phase I, a 123-unit housing development by Davidon Homes, located west of Canada Valley Road and east of Highway 4: The subdivision plan and map checks have been completed. A benefit district is being reviewed by staff.
- SR4 (Segment 2) Contra Loma Blvd. Interchange/'G' Street Overcrossing Project: The project has been accepted by the State. The eastbound Contra Loma Blvd. on-ramp is closed temporarily for SR4 mainline construction.
- SR4 (Segment 3A) 'A' Street/Lone Tree Way Interchange, Cavallo Road/Garrow Drive Undercrossing Project: Work continues on the 'A' St./Lone Tree Way Interchange and Cavallo Road Undercrossing and the new Sunset Drive from Bryan Avenue to "A" Street extension. Slope paving and sidewalk reconstruction is underway. Staff is working with Caltrans to remove blight from the parcel located at the end of the A Street westbound off-ramp. The left-hand turn from westbound Bryan Ave. to southbound A St. has been permanently closed to traffic due to construction of a new raised median and a signalized intersection at Rossi Avenue and A Street. Lane closures are ongoing in the northbound and southbound directions of A Street between SR4 and Rossi Avenue, from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

in the northbound direction and 8:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. in the southbound direction. BART continues to require traffic control on Cavallo Road for track work overhead. Pedestrians and motorists are advised to exercise caution while travelling through these areas.

- SR4 (Segment 3B) Hillcrest Avenue Interchange and BART Tunnel Project: Work continues on the Hillcrest Avenue Bridge widening, the Pedestrian Overcrossing (POC) and the Maintenance of Works (MOW) Tunnel. The new Slatten Ranch Road westbound (WB) loop on-ramp is open to traffic and the Hillcrest WB on-ramp is temporarily closed for construction. There will be lane closures on Larkspur Drive in the eastbound and westbound directions between Hillcrest Avenue and Wildflower Drive, Monday through Friday, from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Pedestrians and motorists are advised to exercise caution while travelling through this area.
- BART Parking Lot and Maintenance Facility: Staff approved the design for a proposed 12" sanitary sewer main from the new Maintenance Facility, north of the S.P.R.R. railroad line to the southerly extension of Willow Avenue and is reviewing grant deeds for public easement dedications. Staff returned comments to BART's Ownership and Maintenance of Utilities Agreement for storm drainage improvements.
- Aviano, an approved 533 unit housing development located west of the current terminus of Hillcrest Avenue, east and north of Dozier-Libby Medical High School: Staff is working with developer on the Chaparral Park extension. First phase of construction documents submitted. Reviewing plans for 3rd plan check.
- Sewer study for FUA 1 is complete.
- Working on creating Community Facilities Districts for maintenance of proposed landscape and lighting improvements in the Sand Creek Focus Area.
- Tabora Gardens: Senior apartment complex on James Donlon and Tabora Drive. Returned 1st plan check comments for revision.
- Child Care Education Building in Williamson Ranch Plaza: Plans submitted for 1st review.

Capital Improvements Division

- Country Hills Drive and Vista Grande Drive Water Main Replacement: A-S Pipelines, Inc. is installing new water facilities on Vista Grande Drive between Lone Tree Way and Fairside Avenue.
- West Antioch Creek Channel Improvements: Purchase agreement documents have been executed between the City and the Twenty-Third District Agricultural Association for right of way and easements within the footprint of the Contra Costa Fairgrounds. Contra Costa Real Property Division continues to negotiate the purchase of property and easements located at 1400 and 1420 West 10th Street. U.S. Fish and Wildlife is continuing to review the project's Biological Assessment.
- Zone I Transmission Pipeline Rehabilitation at HWY 4: Staff is reviewing 50% draft project plans and specifications provided by RMC Water and Environment.
- Water Treatment Plant Electrical Upgrades: TJC and Associates is finalizing electrical improvement recommendations and proposed project phasing.

Associated Power Solutions will be adjusting electrical breaker settings later this month. The arc flash hazard assessment will be finalized following the breaker adjustments.

- Brackish Water Desalinization Plant: Carollo Engineers is acquiring and reviewing existing water quality information and evaluating the water intake facility. State Water Resources Control Board is reviewing the City's State Revolving Fund loan application.
- Urban Water Management Plan: West Yost and Associates is preparing a revised Urban Water Management Plan that will include comments and recommendations provided by Staff.
- Marina Boat Launch Facility Restroom: This project is scheduled to be discussed at the California Department of Parks and Recreation, Division of Boating and Waterways Commission meeting on May 11th.
- The City was awarded \$250,000 of CalRecycle grant funding for the Rubberized Pavement Grant Program. The project will include various streets recommended to receive Rubberized Cape Seal treatments. Construction of the project is expected to start in June 2017.
- Prewett Park Spray ground and Playground Improvements: Sierra Valley Construction mobilized on site and started the construction work. Both projects are scheduled to be completed in September 2016.
- North East Annexation Infrastructure Improvements: Staff is reviewing a proposal for consulting services from BKF Engineering to provide engineering services and to prepare preliminary plans, estimates and studies for the planning and the design of infrastructure improvements needed to serve the recently annexed Area 1 and 2B.
- 2016 Pavement Management Program: Staff is soliciting for bids \$2.6 million of asphalt pavement roadway rehabilitation project, which will include major arterial streets, such as Lone Tree Way, James Donlon Blvd., Somersville Road, Buchanan Road, Golf Course Road, Hillcrest Ave. and various residential streets north of HWY 4. The construction is expected to start in June 2016 and completed by September 2016. Project documents are available for purchase at a cost of \$50 per set. Copies may be obtained by logging on www.blueprintexpress.com/antioch or by calling BPXpress Reprographics at (707) 745-3593. The public bid opening for this project is scheduled for May 10th at 2:00 p.m. in the City Council Chambers located at 200 "H" Street.
- 2016 Transportation Development Act (TDA) Grant: The City received \$70,000 of TDA grants from MTC for the Pedestrian and Bicyclist Improvements project, which will include construction of sidewalks, curb and gutter and bike lanes along Carpinteria Drive from Barmouth Drive to Garrow Drive. The project areas are being surveyed and design will begin shortly. Construction of the project is scheduled to start in August 2017.
- Transportation Impact Fee Study: Staff is working with the consultant, EPS, to finalize the land use forecasts, the transportation improvement list, the network to be used in the traffic model, and proposed fee. The final draft Fee Study will be presented to the City Council for public review and comments in June 2016.

- 2016 Capital Improvement Program: Staff is working on the draft 2016 CIP budget and the five year program. The draft CIP will be reviewed by the City Council on May 10th, Planning Commission on May 18th and by the Parks and Recreation Commission on May 19th.

Water Treatment Plant

- Cleaned Solar Bees out on the municipal reservoir. Solar Bees circulate the water in the reservoir; cleaning the Solar Bees prevents weeds from restricting the circulation. Also cleaned the staff gage on the tower.
- Poured a concrete base for a light post at Cambridge pump station and installed the light post to be used for the wireless antenna.
- Water quality in the river is very good but we had to stop pumping from the river while we isolate and treat the reservoir for weeds. Next week a company will come in and treat the reservoir. The reservoir will be out of service all of next week. During this time we will be pumping from the Contra Costa Canal for all of the City's water demand.
- Added six inches of sand to the drying beds. The drying beds are used to capture solids when the centrifuge is being worked on.

- Water Distribution staff had 342 stops for water service including disconnections.
- Water Distribution staff had a total of 51 USA tickets completed for utility location.
- Water Distribution meter reading has started for the month of May is on schedule.
- Water Distribution staff issued no drought notices this week.
- The State Water Board has Extended Emergency Water Conservation Regulations through October 2016.
- Water Distribution staff continues to monitor water meters, conservation and usage at all City buildings and parks.
- Water Distribution staff continues to respond to drought hotline inquiries.
- Water Distribution staff responded to customer calls regarding water maintenance issues city wide.
- Water Distribution staff replaced a fire hydrant on Lone Tree Way.
- Water Distribution staff raised iron on Catanzaro Way.
- Water Distribution staff prepared for removal of a regulatory valve on Hillcrest Ave.
- Water Distribution staff updated mapping of the water distribution system on Lone Tree Way.
- Water Distribution staff continues State mandated annual backflow testing.
- Water Distribution staff performed preventative maintenance on fire hydrants city wide.
- Water Distribution staff hauled off green waste for recycles as well as cleaned up debris at the city's Fulton yard.
- Central Stores staff cleared debris, graffiti and household items from Fulton Shipyard Rd. boat ramp area.

- Central Stores staff cleared debris and graffiti from Amtrak platform.
- Central Stores issued 136 line items from stock and ordered 19 non stock items for various divisions.

The event was hosted by the Riverview Garden Club, in conjunction with the City of Antioch Parks Department. A U.S. Flag Ceremony was presented by our Local Boy Scout Troop 247. Plenty of good food and fun was celebrated by all. This event highlighted Antioch's 12th consecutive year as a Tree City USA.
- Almondridge Park: Removed a broken pond step and installed a new one.
- Diablo West Park: Installed two new swings along with replacement chains.
- Gentrytown Park Delta Diamond: The baseball field turf is almost completely renovated. Tentative re-opening is scheduled for later this month.
- Fire Abatement: Begins this week, Hillcrest area by Hidden Glen Dr.
- Hillcrest/Meadow Creek Parks: Repaired the drinking fountains.
- Jacobsen Park: Installed a new tot swing along with replacement chains.
- Markley Creek Park: Removed an 18' Ornamental Pear tree for safety reasons.
- Mira Vista Hills Park: Temporarily turned off a leaking drinking fountain pending repairs.
- Tree Removal Permits: No Tree Removal Permits were issued this week.

Public Works Operations – Street Maintenance

- Graffiti Abatement: Removed graffiti from City property in numerous areas.
- Signs: Replaced 31 existing signs due to poor reflectivity.
- Potholes: Filled ten potholes.
- Debris: Picked up a yard of debris in City rights of way.

- Thermo: Maintained yellow school crosswalks utilizing 3,450 pounds of thermopaint.
- Asphalt Surface Overlay: Crews overlaid Parker Ln. consisting of 84 tons of asphalt and prepared Terranova Dr. for a surface overlay.

Public Works Utilities – Collections Division

- Calls for Sewer Service: Received and responded to five calls for service from the public. Responding crews televised 35 linear feet of public sewer laterals connecting to the City's sewer system.
- Sewer Mains: Daily preventative maintenance performed on over 15,802 linear feet of sewer main lines.
- Quarterly Sewer Main Cleaning: The route schedule is under review to increase inspection frequency of identified 'hot spots' and integrate a proactive preventative cleaning schedule for the 'hot spots'.
- Sewer Lateral Maintenance Program (SLMP): Repaired one lateral that was severely damaged requiring immediate repair and televised one lateral.
- Manhole Inspection Program: Crews inspected 65 manholes. Manholes are inspected for loose lids, debris, locking mechanisms, and status of infrastructure for future maintenance and rehabilitation. We are updating the program and processes for integration in our computerized maintenance management system.
- Sanitary Sewer Overflow (SSO) Reduction Program: Staff is working on formal inspection criteria to inspect manholes in rural areas. The use of "SMART Manholes" in strategic areas will be utilized that will alert leadership staff within the division of potential SSOs. This program will also address the need for locking mechanisms.
- Closed Caption Televising (CCTV): Crews televised 8,489 feet of sewer main lines. The CCTV Preventative Maintenance crew inspects sewer mains to identify the condition and causes of blockages and SSOs.
- National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES): Crews removed 5 yards of trash from various creeks and channels, picked up 8 yards of illegal dumping and weed abated 9.8 acres of entry way access to channels. These activities ensure the City meets the Federal Clean Water Act requirements of municipalities discharging storm water into waterways. Proactive preventative maintenance is restricted to the months of April through October.

Public Works Operations – Fleet Division

- Preventative Maintenance: 14 services on City vehicles as scheduled.
- Unscheduled Repairs: 56 unscheduled, necessary repairs to City vehicles.

Public Works Operations – Municipal Marina

- The Marina approved an application for permanent berthing, received an application for permanent berthing, responded to six inquiries, and provided two facility tours.
- Annual Marina Customer Appreciation Day BBQ Potluck was held on April 30th. Antioch Marina customers and guests enjoyed a great BBQ along with fellow

- Marina staff began the recertification of the “Clean Marina” program. The Clean Marina program is an ongoing endeavor by a marina industry alliance determined to provide environmentally clean facilities and protect the state’s coastal and inland waters from pollution through compliance of best management practices. - Maintenance: Repainted the safety curbs and removed trash from the enclosures. Repaired the dock cart and replaced the oil reservoir on the pump out.
- Advertising and Outreach: Approved advertisements placed in Yachtsman magazine reaching over 40,000 boaters. Craigslist advertisements placed in Bay Area, Stockton, Sacramento, Monterey, and Santa Cruz listings. Advertising Annual Boat Launch Ramp Passes for \$100 on Craigslist.

black Lexus crashed into a power pole and several power, phone, and cable lines down in the street and on houses. The driver of the vehicle was in fact gone. We blocked the roadway off and stood by until PG&E could respond to shut the power off. After the power was turned off, a check of the vehicle's registration revealed it was a vehicle an officer stopped earlier with 30 year old Antione Rice driving. Rice is on parole. VIPS were called in for traffic control and officers responded to the last known address for Rice but were unable to locate him.

- On 4/30/16 at 12:42 am, an officer observed a Nissan traveling at a high rate of speed on William Reed. The vehicle traveled west onto Sycamore Dr. and drove west bound in the east bound lanes to pass another vehicle. The officer initiated a traffic stop and prior to stopping the driver, 30 year old James Gomez threw a bottle of Vodka from the vehicle. Gomez was contacted and found to be on felony formal probation for DUI. After several field tests, Gomez was arrested for DUI. Gomez's probation indicated that he has to submit to a chemical test upon request and or when arrested for DUI. Gomez refused to provide a sample to Officers. Gomez was handcuffed in the jail and the blood tech was still unable to get a sample due to Gomez's lack of cooperation. Officers were eventually able to get the sample. Gomez was immediately transported to county jail after. Gomez has more than 3 prior DUI convictions since 2010.
- On 4/29/16 at 7:12 pm, an officer observed 25 year old Marquis Walker was urinating against a pillar in the Grocery Outlet parking lot located at 1818 A St. After Marquis was done urinating, he began to walk away with an unsteady gate. The officer contacted Marquis and noticed he showed signs of being under the influence of alcohol. When asked, Marquis advised he consumed three beers and two shots. He was arrested and transported to county jail for a sobering period.
- On 4/29/16 at 7:41 am, citizens called police on 35 year old Cherylynda Pastor because she was inside a parked car at W 2nd and I St. "tweaking." Upon arrival, police checked the plate and learned that it was reported stolen. Pastor was detained without incident, and admitted to driving the car. Pastor had a poor story about how she came into possession of the car, and she was booked into the county.
- 4/29/16 at 5:49 am, 23 year old William Millard was contacted on a pedestrian stop in a known neighborhood for stolen vehicles. Millard had car dirt and grease all over his clothes and hands. Millard had a large bulge in his waistline and was using his hand to hold the item in place. Millard was advised to remove his hand from his waistline and a license plate fell to the ground. A check of the license plate revealed it belonged to an Audi registered in Antioch. The Audi's owner was contacted and it was discovered the Audi was in fact an unreported stolen vehicle. Millard was also in possession of a screwdriver and shaved keys. Millard did not admit to the theft of the Audi. An extensive area check for the Audi in the immediate surrounds area was conducted with negative results at this time. Millard was transported to county jail and listed as a suspect in our stolen vehicle case.
- On 4/28/16 at 10:28 pm, an officer observed a miniature dirt bike traveling south on Mokelumne Drive with the driver not wearing a helmet. He attempted a traffic stop on the dirt bike and the dirt bike did not yield. The officer pursued the dirt bike for .6

miles at speeds between 10-20MPH before he was terminated. The mini dirt bike then turned from a street surface onto a trail and was not located.

- On 4/28/16 at 11:06 pm, the victim was parked at Dillard Way and Gentrytown Dr. "smoking weed" when he was approached on his passenger side by a male holding a gun. The male stated "give me everything you got". The victim got scared and fled from the vehicle leaving his keys in the ignition. He eventually called 911 and stated he was carjacked. We responded to the location where he described the incident and found his car and keys still at the location. There was no take and the suspect was not located. The victim's vehicle was returned to him.
- On 4/28/16 at 6:09 pm, the victim was working inside a retail store located in the 2900 block of Delta Fair Blvd. and was the only employee working when two subjects, a male and female, entered the store. The victim stated that the male began asking questions about jeans the store had for sale selected one pair of pants. The male handed the pair of pants to the female and then asked the victim about some different pants as the female began to walk towards the front of the store. The victim stated the male was trying to distract him as the female placed the jeans into a Foot Locker bag and began to walk out of the store. When the female exited through the front door of the store, the security alarm sounded. The male and female fled and began to get into a white vehicle while the victim told them to stop. When the victim tried to take a photo of the vehicle's license plate, the male grabbed the victim from behind placing him into a choke hold. He told the victim that no one stole anything and released the victim. The male then entered the passenger side of the vehicle and they drove away. The victim was not injured and was able to provide a partial plate of the suspect's vehicle.
