Appointees are required to file a FPPC Form 700 "Statement of Economic Interests" within 30 days of their appointment by the City Council.

The **California Primary Election** will be held on **Tuesday, June 7<sup>th</sup>**. If you have recently moved to Antioch or want to change your registration, **May 23<sup>rd</sup> is the last day to register to vote in the June Primary**. Voter Registration forms are available at the City Clerk and Deputy City Clerk's Offices at City Hall. Antioch voters will be interested in two City of Antioch ballot measures (**Measure E and Measure G**), the races for **District 3 and District 5 County Supervisor, State Assembly, State Senate, Congressional, U.S. Senatorial and Presidential primaries**. Get involved, register, study the issues, question the candidates and make your vote count!

You can save yourself the postage and drop off your **Mail-in (Absentee) Ballot at the City Clerk's Counter** Monday through Friday from 8:30 am to 4:30 pm in the secure red Ballot Box.

**Early voting is also available to any registered Contra Costa Voter at the Prewett Water Park Multipurpose Room beginning May 31st.** Just bring along your Contra Costa Voter Information Guide that has your name and address on it and you can vote prior to the June 7<sup>th</sup> Primary. If you live in Antioch, but work in Walnut Creek or San Ramon, there are early voting stations in 5 other cities where you can cast your vote (if you normally would vote at your local precinct on Election Day).

While Candidate Filing Period for two Council Members, Mayor, City Clerk and City Treasurer (depending on the outcome of Measure G which would change the Treasurer from elected to appointed) does not officially begin until July 18<sup>th</sup>, several residents have already filed a Form 501 "Candidate Intention Statement" and some have already filed a Form 410 "Statement of Organization Recipient Committee" to obtain a FPPC ID number and begin collecting contributions. ## RECREATION UPDATES

- On Sunday, 250 people attended the Water Park Open House – called “Sunday Funday” and featured International Pool Safety Day. Free recreational swim in the Lap Pool was offered along with tours of the facility, free swim lesson placement testing, and a demonstration of lifeguarding skills by the staff. CCWD Canal Patrol came out to give information as well as Rising Sun solar energy program.
- On Monday, the Parks & Recreation Director gave a presentation about programs, services, and community safety in parks to the Crime Prevention Commission.
- On Wednesday, new cashiers were trained on the ActiveNet software system in the Tech Room at the Antioch Community Center while retuning staff organized and cleaned the concessions stand.
- On Thursday, staff prepared the accounting room for the new season by counting cash, stocking cash drawers, and learning about the new Garda change program. Head Cashiers were trained on the cash safety system and how to be ready for their arrival.
- On Thursday, Lifeguards began their intensive safety training.
- **BE COOL BY THE POOL** this year and purchase your annual water park pass before the fees increase! For only \$50 per person you and your family can beat the heat, keep kids busy, and stay fit and healthy all summer. Discount sales end in one week!
- Last week, Antioch Middle School Staff and Recreation Staff were in communication about the new Antioch Council of Teens (ACT) meeting on May 23<sup>rd</sup>. Staff is anticipating a large number of Middle School students to attend!
- Throughout the week, recreation maintenance staff worked on contracts for an emergency slide repair. An engineering site visit was conducted and certified repair drawings will be forthcoming.
- On Wednesday, the City's electrical contractor completed repair work to parking lot wiring that was damaged as a result of the Prewett Community Park playground construction project.
- On Thursday, Recreation maintenance staff completed the installation of new drinking fountains throughout the Water Park. These new fountains were a joint

project between Recreation and Environmental Resources and include bottle filling spigots to allow park guests to fill a reusable water bottle instead of purchasing disposable bottles of water.

- Throughout the week, staff placed and received several start up orders for the Water Park Concessions Operations. Concessions staff prepped the stand for opening weekend.
- Throughout the week, Recreation maintenance staff supported the two Prewett Community Park construction projects in various ways.
- Last week, flyers were delivered to Antioch Elementary schools promoting Summer Camp programs that begin the week of June 13<sup>th</sup>. Registration is open for all camps!
- Last week, staff drafted the event flyer for “Juneteenth – Celebrating Heritage, Culture, and Music,” which is set for June 18<sup>th</sup> at Waldie Plaza beginning at 2:00pm.
- Last week, staff participated in a webinar about how to turn website visitors into regular participants. With over 70% of visitors leaving most websites and never coming back, staff explored the factors that could turn potential participants away websites—and away from our programs. Strategies were taught on the four things that matter most!
- On Thursday, the Parks and Recreation Director attended a meeting on logistics for emergency operations that was hosted by Contra Costa County. Last week, staff finalized the speakers and performers for Juneteenth, which is scheduled for June 18<sup>th</sup> at Waldie Plaza beginning at 2:00pm.
- On Thursday, the Parks and Recreation Commission held their regular meeting including a tour of the Water Park and a presentation on water park preparations for opening day.

### Senior Center Services

- Last week, 417 affordable healthy meals were served through the C.C. Café. Lunch and socialization help prevent heart attacks, depression, asthma and congestive heart failure. No membership or income requirements are required to eat at the C.C. Cafe. All supplies are provided by the County for participating cafes. Staff collects the daily nutrition deposits and submits them to finance.
- On Monday, 12 seniors joined the Alzheimer Association and heard a presentation on how memory works and how to maximize our ability to remember things as we age. The class is conducted with fun and humor and teaches seniors how to create habits that will enable them to better remember.
- On Wednesday, 15 seniors enjoyed Movie Mania. This week the featured film was “The Way.”
- On Thursday, staff worked on the set-up and preparations for the 34<sup>th</sup> Annual Senior Picnic.
- On Friday, more than 170 Seniors and Volunteers participated in the 34<sup>th</sup> Annual Senior Picnic. Dr. Leo Fontana acted as the Master of Ceremonies and this year’s theme was ‘Down on the Farm.’ Everyone had a good time!

- To date the Senior Club has received new and renewal membership applications from 847 seniors. Membership is only \$20 for the year; sign up friends and family who enjoy meeting new friends and staying active and healthy.

Environmental Enforcement: May 12-18 – 16 actions were taken this week. Staff is currently working on closing out existing cases and transitioning to Code Enforcement addressing enforcement of mandatory garbage and recycling service requirements.

## **CDBG:**

The 2016-17 City of Antioch Action Plan was submitted, along with those of all the other Consortium members, on May 16<sup>th</sup> by the deadline. The program will conduct final monitoring visits for the year, and ready for closeout on June 30<sup>th</sup>. The Consolidated Annual Performance Evaluation Report (CAPER) for FY 2015-16 is due to HUD no later than September 30<sup>th</sup>.

## **Housing:**

After last week's first construction conference with all funding parties of the Satellite Tabora Gardens development, the timeline was adjusted slightly. The bid solicitation package is scheduled to be published 6/3/16 and bids to be due to the general contractor by 7/8/16. Information will then be finalized for the construction loan, which shall be reviewed by Wells Fargo. Closing is estimated to occur mid-August. A date for the groundbreaking will be determined in July.

Housing Consultant continues to enter additional information on each loan to complete all fields of new Housing Loan monitoring system by CDS.

## **Homeless:**

County, city, and agency staff continue to meet to find a suitable location for East Contra Costa County's CARE Center, a multi-service center to address the needs of homeless persons. Multiple potential funding sources will become available soon, and there is an urgent need to devise a solution very soon.

## **Drought Updates:**

### Spring Irrigation tips:

If you haven't already done it, inspect your irrigation system to make sure nothing has broken over the winter. Early spring is a good time to plant new plants. Visit [contracosta.watersavingplants.com/](http://contracosta.watersavingplants.com/) to find the right water saving plants for your yard! It will give them time to become established before the heat of summer is upon us.

May - Water lawns 3 days/week, shrubs 2 days/week

### Last Week's Irrigation Repairs and Service:

- Parks Citywide: All City Parks are now watering. Water is now running at 50% of summer water use.
- Hillcrest Park: 2 turf valves were installed and 3 broken sprinklers replaced.
- Mira Vista Park: A turf valve was replaced.
- Mira Vista Hills Park: A leaking drinking fountain is temporarily shut down, pending water line repairs.
- Police Department: 2 irrigation valves rebuilt, 3 molded caps replaced and 1 controller wire repaired.
- Marina: 2 lateral lines repaired and 2 sprinklers repaired.
- Judsonville Dr: 1 leaking mainline repaired, 1 sprinkler repaired and 1 sprinkler capped.
- Vierra Dr: 1 sprinkler repaired.
- Hillcrest Ave: 1 lateral line repaired, 4 molded caps replaced and 9 sprinklers repaired.
- Rocky Pt: 2 sprinklers repaired and 6 molded caps replaced.
- Deer Valley Rd: 21 molded caps replaced, 7 nozzles replaced and 1 sprinkler repaired.
- Dallas Ranch Rd: 1 sprinkler repaired.
- James Donlon Blvd: 1 sprinkler repaired.
- Maintenance Service Center: 10 sprinklers repaired.
- Lone Tree Way: 9 molded caps replaced, 3 sprinklers repaired.

## **PUBLIC WORKS UPDATES**

### Administration

- Contra Costa County Public Works Department will perform roadwork on Vasco Road from the Alameda County line north to Camino Diablo Road on June 1 and 2, 2016. The work will occur between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m., to replace roadway delineators. The purpose of the delineators and rumble strips is to increase driver awareness and safety when travelling through this commute corridor. This work may be rescheduled based on weather conditions. Electronic message boards will alert drivers of the scheduled work. There will be traffic control through the work area and drivers can expect delays.

- Contra Costa Water District (CCWD) announced that they have signed a settlement agreement with the California Department of Water Resources (DWR), which according to CCWD will “protect its customers, facilities, and operations if the Bay Delta Conservation Plan/WaterFix (CWF), aka the ‘twin tunnels’, is built.” The March 29th CCWD News Release also states, “The agreement is an insurance policy to protect the unique water quality and supply issues raised by CCWD”. As a result of this settlement, CCWD has withdrawn its protest of the DWR Petition to Change Diversion locations proposed as part of the CWF. The documents related to this settlement are posted on the CCWD website <http://www.ccwater.com/317/Bay-Delta-Conservation-Plan-Comments>. The CCWD Board of directors held a meeting on April 6<sup>th</sup> to explain the details of the agreement and respond to questions from the public. They have also mailed out a letter to each customer explaining the settlement. Antioch residents will receive a copy of the letter as we purchase our raw water from CCWD before treating it and distributing to our customers.
- February 2016 brought us to the end of the initial water conservation mandate issued by the State of California. The City of Antioch was required to conserve 28% based on 2013 usage through the month of February 2016. Thanks to your outstanding efforts, our total cumulative reduction since July 2015 is 29.78%. **At the end of January 2016, the State extended its mandatory conservation order through October 2016.** Final guidance is still being worked out as the State monitors the snow pack and reservoir levels through this winter. Please continue to conserve this valuable resource and plan on conserving throughout 2016. Outdoor water conservation will be the primary focus of the City’s program, as well as fines for wasteful practices as identified in the Water Conservation Resolution adopted by the City Council on May 12<sup>th</sup>, 2015. All Antioch customers were mailed a letter explaining the program and prohibitions, as well as 2013 monthly water usage. Examples of prohibitions are: three day per week residential outdoor watering, no watering between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., shut off nozzles required on all hoses, and drinking water available only upon request at restaurants. Contra Costa Water District has incentives, such as residential high-efficiency clothes washer rebates, water-efficient landscape rebates and smart sprinkler timer rebates. #### Engineering & Development Services

- City-owned cell sites, various locations: Staff is performing site visits and review of land leases, 100% construction drawings, consent letters, photo-sims and related technical reports and materials for equipment upgrades and site modifications.
- Laurel Ranch, a 186-unit housing development by Richland Communities, located at the eastern terminus of existing Laurel Road and west of Highway 4: Staff is reviewing the final development plan and preparing project conditions of approval.

- Park Ridge Phase I, a 123-unit housing development by Davidon Homes, located west of Canada Valley Road and east of Highway 4: The subdivision plan and map checks have been completed. A benefit district is being reviewed by staff.
- SR4 (Segment 2) Contra Loma Blvd. Interchange/'G' Street Overcrossing Project: The project has been accepted by the State. The eastbound Contra Loma Blvd. on-ramp is closed temporarily for SR4 mainline construction.
- SR4 (Segment 3A) 'A' Street/Lone Tree Way Interchange, Cavallo Road/Garrow Drive Undercrossing Project: Work continues on the 'A' St./Lone Tree Way interchange, the Cavallo Road overcrossings, and the Sunset Drive extension from Bryan Avenue to "A" Street. Slope paving and sidewalk reconstruction is underway. Staff is working with Caltrans to remove blight from the parcel located at the end of the A Street westbound off-ramp. The left-hand turn from westbound Bryan Ave. to southbound A St. has been permanently closed to traffic due to construction of a new raised median and a signalized intersection at Rossi Avenue and A Street. There will be lane closures in the eastbound and westbound directions of Sunset Drive between Hillcrest Avenue and Devpar Court on Saturday through Friday from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m. There will be lane closures on A Street between State Route 4 and Rossi Avenue on Saturday through Friday from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. in the northbound direction and 8:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. in the southbound direction. Pedestrians and motorists are advised to exercise caution while travelling through these areas.
- SR4 (Segment 3B) Hillcrest Avenue Interchange and BART Tunnel Project: Work continues on the Hillcrest Avenue Bridge widening, the Pedestrian Overcrossing (POC) and the Maintenance of Works (MOW) Tunnel. There will be lane closures in the eastbound and westbound directions of Larkspur Drive between Hillcrest Avenue and Wildflower Drive on Saturday through Friday from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m. There will be lane closures in the northbound and southbound directions of Hillcrest Avenue between Larkspur Drive and Sunset Drive on Saturday through Friday from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m. Pedestrians and motorists are advised to exercise caution while travelling through this area.
- BART Parking Lot and Maintenance Facility: Staff approved the design for a proposed 12" sanitary sewer main from the new Maintenance Facility, north of the S.P.R.R. railroad line to the southerly extension of Willow Avenue and is reviewing grant deeds for public easement dedications. Staff returned comments to BART's Ownership and Maintenance of Utilities Agreement for storm drainage improvements.
- Aviano, an approved 533 unit housing development located west of the current terminus of Hillcrest Avenue, east and north of Dozier-Libby Medical High School: Staff has completed the 3<sup>rd</sup> plan check on the construction documents for the first phase of the project.
- Sewer study for FUA 1 is complete. Staff has approved the draft document and is waiting for final report from engineer.
- Working on creating Community Facilities Districts for the Sand Creek Focus Area.

- Tabora Gardens: Senior apartment complex on James Donlon and Tabora Drive. Returned 1st plan check comments for revision.
- Child Care Education Building in Williamson Ranch Plaza: Returned 1st plan check comments for revision.
- Delta Villa Estates: Mobile home park off of East 18<sup>th</sup> Street. Processing summarily vacation of offer of dedication for roadway purposes.

#### Capital Improvements Division

- Country Hills Drive and Vista Grande Drive Water Main Replacement: A-S Pipelines, Inc. has completed the installation of the water main on Vista Grande Drive between Lone Tree Way and Country Hills Drive. The connection to the existing pipeline at the intersection of Vista Grande Drive and Lone Tree Way is expected to be tapped this week. Pressure and bacteriological testing of the new facility will commence next week.
- West Antioch Creek Channel Improvements: Contra Costa Real Property Division continues to negotiate the purchase of property and easements located at 1400 and 1420 West 10<sup>th</sup> Street. U.S. Fish and Wildlife is continuing to review the project's Biological Assessment.
- Zone I Transmission Pipeline Rehabilitation at HWY 4: Staff is reviewing 50% draft project plans and specifications provided by RMC Water and Environment.
- Water Treatment Plant Electrical Upgrades: TJC and Associates is finalizing electrical improvement recommendations and proposed project phasing. Associated Power Solutions will be adjusting electrical breaker settings later this month. The arc flash hazard assessment will be finalized following the breaker adjustments.
- Water Treatment Plant Disinfection Improvements: Staff and CDM Smith are evaluating the feasibility using ammonia sulfate in lieu of aqueous ammonia within the future disinfection operation.
- Brackish Water Desalinization Plant: Carollo Engineers is reviewing existing water quality information and evaluating the water intake facility. State Water Resources Control Board is reviewing the City's State Revolving Fund loan application.
- Urban Water Management Plan: A public hearing to discuss the draft Urban Water Management Plan is scheduled for May 24<sup>th</sup> in the City Council Chambers located at 200 "H" Street. The City Council will consider formally adopting the plan following the public hearing.
- Marina Boat Launch Facility Restroom: The City executed grant agreement has been sent to the California Department of Parks and Recreation, Division of Boating and Waterways.
- Prewett Park Spray Ground and Playground Improvements: Sierra Valley Construction mobilized on site and started the construction work. Both projects are scheduled to be completed in September 2016.
- 2016 Pavement Management Program: Staff opened bids for the Pavement Plugs and Leveling Courses at Various Locations project, which will include major arterial streets, such as Lone Tree Way, James Donlon Blvd., Somersville Road, Buchanan

Road, Golf Course Road, Hillcrest Ave. and various residential streets north of HWY 4. The apparent low bidder was MCK Services of Concord. The City Council will consider award of the project at the May 24, 2016 meeting. Construction is expected to start in June 2016 and completed by September 2016.

- Transportation Impact Fee Study: Staff is working with the consultant, EPS, to finalize the land use forecasts, the transportation improvement list, the network to be used in the traffic model, and proposed fee. The final draft Fee Study will be presented to the City Council for public review and comments in June 2016.
- 2016 Capital Improvement Program: Staff is working on the draft 2016 CIP budget and the five year program. The draft CIP was reviewed by the City Council on May 10<sup>th</sup>, and will be reviewed by the Planning Commission on May 18<sup>th</sup> and by the Parks and Recreation Commission on May 19<sup>th</sup>.

### Water Treatment Plant

- Cleaned Solar Bees out on the municipal reservoir. Solar Bees circulate the water in the reservoir; cleaning the Solar Bees prevents weeds from restricting the circulation. Also cleaned the staff gage on the tower.
- Installed new covers over the tube settlers on the north basin at "B" plant.
- The municipal reservoir will continue to be out of service through the month of May. This will provide adequate time for the chemical treatment to kill all the aquatic weed growth in the reservoir. We will continue to receive all our water from the canal.
- "A" plant has been down for winter service and will remain out of service until the reservoir is ready to be placed back in service.
- We are operating "B" plant at a flow rate of 15 MGD.

### Water Distribution

- Water Distribution staff had 319 stops for water service including disconnections.
- Water Distribution staff had a total of 65 USA tickets completed for utility location.
- Water Distribution meter reading for the month of May is on schedule.
- Water Distribution staff issued three drought notices this week.
- The State Water Board has Extended Emergency Water Conservation Regulations through October 2016.
- Water Distribution staff continues to monitor water meters, conservation and usage at all City buildings and parks.
- Water Distribution staff continues to respond to drought hotline inquiries.
- Water Distribution staff responded to customer calls regarding water maintenance issues city wide.
- Water Distribution staff repaired an irrigation main on Deer Valley Rd.
- Water Distribution staff repaired an irrigation main on Hemlock Dr.
- Water Distribution staff repaired a 2" R.P. on Hillcrest Ave.
- Water Distribution staff replaced a 1 ½" meter on Buchanan Rd.
- Water Distribution staff removed a pressure regulatory valve on Hillcrest Ave.

- Water Distribution staff replaced a 1” water service on Buttercup Ct.
- Water Distribution staff began raising iron on Terranova Drive.
- Water Distribution staff continues State mandated annual backflow testing.
- Water Distribution staff performed preventative maintenance on fire hydrants city wide.
- Water Distribution staff hauled off green waste for recycles, as well as cleaned up debris at the city’s Fulton yard.
- Central Stores staff cleared debris, graffiti and household items from Fulton Shipyard Rd. boat ramp area.
- Central Stores staff cleared debris and graffiti from Amtrak platform.
- Central Stores issues 95 line items from stock and ordered 11 non stock items for various divisions.

#### Public Works Operations – Parks and Landscape

- Citywide Fire Abatement: Lone Tree Zone 1 was completed and crews have begun Zone 2. Fire Abatement Disking began with the Mokelumne Trail, which was completed, as well as Lone Tree Zones 2 and 3. Fire Abatement Disking is 30% complete.
- Delta Diamond: The baseball field turf is almost completely renovated. Tentative re-opening is scheduled for June 6, 2016.
- Hillcrest Park: Installed two turf valves and replaced three broken sprinklers.
- Mira Vista Park: Replaced a turf valve.
- Mira Vista Hills Park: Temporarily turned off a leaking drinking fountain pending water line repairs.
- Tree Removal Permits: No tree removal permits were issued this week.
- Irrigation: Repaired 93 irrigation leaks on City property.
- Spot Spray: Slatten Ranch Dr., Empire Ave, the Marina, Downtown, and 10<sup>th</sup> St.
- Trim Crews: Washington Way, Fredrickson Ln., Lone Tree Way, Mokelumne Dr., James Donlon Blvd., Vista Grande Dr., and Viera Ave.
- Courts Trimmed: Zones 4565 (North of James Donlon and West of Lone Tree Way) and 4511 (Williamson Ranch Area).

#### Public Works Operations – Street Maintenance

- Graffiti Abatement: Removed graffiti from City property in numerous areas.
- Signs: Replaced 15 existing signs due to poor reflectivity.
- Potholes: Filled four potholes.
- Debris: Picked up one yard of debris in City rights of way.
- Asphalt Overlay: Paved an overlay on Terranova Dr. using 266 tons of asphalt.
- Cape Seal Project: Crew continues to mark streets for level course work.
- Thermo: Maintained yellow school crosswalks utilizing 1,900 pounds of thermo-paint.

### Public Works Utilities – Collections Division

- Calls for Sewer Service: Received and responded to seven calls for service from the public. Responding crews televised four linear feet of public sewer laterals connecting to the City's sewer system.
- Sewer Mains: Daily preventative maintenance performed on over 43,981 linear feet of sewer main lines.
- Quarterly Sewer Main Cleaning: The route schedule is under review to increase inspection frequency of identified 'hot spots' and integrate a proactive preventative cleaning schedule for the 'hot spots'.
- Sewer Lateral Maintenance Program (SLMP): Repaired a lateral that was severely damaged requiring immediate repair and televised a lateral.
- Manhole Inspection Program: Crews inspected 130 manholes. Manholes are inspected for loose lids, debris, locking mechanisms, and status of infrastructure for future maintenance and rehabilitation. We are updating the program and processes for integration in our computerized maintenance management system.
- Sanitary Sewer Overflow (SSO) Reduction Program: Staff is working on formal inspection criteria to inspect manholes in rural areas. The use of "SMART Manholes" in strategic areas will be utilized that will alert leadership staff within the division of potential SSOs. This program will also address the need for locking mechanisms.
- Closed Caption Televising (CCTV): Crews televised 1,265 feet of sewer main lines. The CCTV Preventative Maintenance crew inspects sewer mains to identify the condition and causes of blockages and SSOs.
- National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES): Crews removed 43 yards of trash from various creeks and channels. Picked up four yards of illegal dumping. Weed abated 18.1 acres of high water line access to channels. These activities ensure the City meets the Federal Clean Water Act requirements of municipalities discharging storm water into waterways. Proactive preventative maintenance is restricted to the months of April through October.

### Public Works Operations – Fleet Division

- Preventative Maintenance: Nine services on City vehicles as scheduled.
- Unscheduled Repairs: 50 unscheduled, necessary repairs to City vehicles.
- Sold seven City vehicles at auction.

### Public Works Operations – Municipal Marina

- The Marina has one application pending for permanent berthing, responded to four enquiries and provided two facility tours.
- Marina staff began the recertification of the "Clean Marina" program. The Clean Marina program is an ongoing endeavor, by a marina industry alliance determined to provide environmentally clean facilities and protect the state's coastal and inland waters from pollution through compliance of best management practices.
