This is the City Manager's Report for the week ending May 25, 2018.

CITY MANAGER

Almost 50 years in the making BART to Antioch is ready to roll. Along with a large number



of elected officials and dignitaries, I attended the Hillcrest BART Station Ribbon Cutting Ceremony where speeches were made and free preview rides on the new BART to Antioch Diesel Multiple Unit (DMU) trains were provided. The BART to Antioch extension officially begins carrying passengers on Saturday, May 26th. This video showcases the new service and provides a walk-through of navigating the transfer platform just east of the Pittsburg/Bay Point Station. It was an historic day for the City and gives our community direct access to the rest of the Bay Area. Equally as important is the economic development stimulus this asset will provide as we continue our efforts to attract business and industry to our region. On May 17th, Police Department staff gave a presentation to Rotary on the Antioch Police Explorer Program and the positive impact it has had with the youth in our



community. The program is designed for young women and men with interest in law enforcement. It focuses on civic duty, discipline, and develops leadership qualities in our youth. The Explorers receive training in various police topics, compete at competitions, and attend the Solano County Cadet Academy, annually. They provide service to the community by

assisting with our safety events and crime prevention efforts in addition to attending police department and city-sponsored activities. The Rotary group was impressed with our Explorers and the goals of our program. At the end of the presentation, Rotary made a very generous donation to our program. Last Saturday, Antioch hosted the Clean Slate Event at Antioch Middle School. This restorative justice initiative is designed to assist people in clearing or reducing convictions from their permanent record. Our event was the first in east Contra Costa County and the first ever in partnership with a police department. The event was jointly hosted by the Antioch Police Department, District Attorney's Office, and the Public Defender's Office. It was an excellent opportunity for our community members to resolve prior legal issues and move forward in a positive direction.



By addressing these issues, citizens removed potential barriers to employment, education, and housing opportunities. The event was well attended by Antioch and other east county community members. Chief Brooks and District Attorney Diana Becton were in attendance in support of the event. 
Animal Services


City Council Meetings are held every 2nd and 4th Tuesday of each month in the Council Chambers, 200 H Street, starting at 7:00 p.m.

On Wednesday, May 16, the Planning Commission approved a Use Permit (UP-18-03) for the Palabra de Dios Community Center. This new facility will offer community focused workshops and classes, as well as general assembly uses at the existing amusement center at 501 Auto Center Drive. The site currently contains a miniature golf course, batting cages, video arcade, and go-kart track. With the new use in place, the

batting cages and miniature golf course will remain open to the public, and a variety of classes will be offered, including music, art, and dance. The assembly space will be located in the former video arcade building and will be available to community groups, such as religious congregations or community groups.

On Tuesday, May 22, the City Council introduced an ordinance establishing a new Cannabis Business (CB) Zoning Overlay District and accompanying the text. This ordinance provides areas in the City of Antioch where individuals may apply for a City Council Use Permit to establish a Cannabis Business. Each new Cannabis Business must be



located at least 600' from a school, City park, or residential district and must meet specific findings for approval. City staff will continue to work on additional guidelines to direct potential applicants and provide greater certainty about these new uses. The ordinance is expected to take effect around July 31, 2018. The CB Zoning Overlay District generally includes the industrial/commercial areas between the San Joaquin River and East 18th Street and the Verne Roberts Circle area. The map of the approved CB Zoning Overlay District is shown below.

Capital Improvements / Engineering Division



Construction has commenced on the West Antioch Creek Channel Improvements project located near the intersection of West 10th and 'O' Streets. This project will include expanding an under capacity portion of the channel between West 8th and West 10th Streets to reduce the chronic, localized flooding in this area. The existing undersized arch culverts under West 10th Street will be replaced with a larger

reinforced concrete box culvert system, and the narrow concrete ditch between West

10th Street and West 8th Street will be replaced with an unlined open channel. As part of this work, West 10th Street will be closed to through traffic at 'O' Street for approximately three months. A construction detour between 'L' Street and Auto Center Drive will be implemented to direct through traffic to West 4th Street. Access to all businesses and residents on West 10th Street between 'L' Street and Auto Center Drive will be maintained throughout the construction operation. We ask for your patience during construction and that you obey all traffic control and warning signs that are placed for the safety of workers and the public.

BART opens for service this Saturday!

The wait is almost over for East County residents. BART to Antioch will open for passenger service on Saturday, May 26, 2018.

New service is fast, clean, and comfortable

The service between the Pittsburg/Bay Point Station and Antioch is 10 miles long and adds two new stations. The extension will be able to carry an estimated 2,400 people in each direction, per hour, during rush hours. "This is a new dawn for transit in this part of the Bay Area," said BART Director Joel Keller, who serves East Contra Costa County



and led efforts to bring the extension to the region. "Making this visionary project a reality took the long-term dedication of East County residents, and the commitment of many local, regional, state, and federal leaders." BART to Antioch is part of the Highway 4 Widening Project, which expanded Highway 4 between Pittsburg and Brentwood. The \$525 million cost of the extension is about half of the \$1 billion cost estimated for extending BART's traditional electric-powered line.

Quiet DMU trains offer a smooth ride

The extension marks the first time BART is using Diesel Multiple Units or DMU train cars. They meet the US Government's strictest emissions standards and use renewable diesel, an advanced biofuel produced from bio-based sources such as vegetable oil. The DMUs run on their own tracks in the median of State Route 4 and connect with the existing BART system at a Transfer Platform just east of the Pittsburg Bay Point Station. At the Transfer Platform, riders exit one train and walk across the platform to board the other train. BART passengers trying to reach the Pittsburg Center Station or the Antioch Station will remain in the BART train to reach the Transfer Platform. The Transfer Platform is only reachable by train. The trains boast a variety of amenities including digital signs, automated audio announcements, and modern climate control systems for those hot summer months.

On May 22nd City Council Meeting Council votes for Cannabis Business (CB) overlay district option one map (link below) that includes Wilbur Avenue and Verne Roberts Circle. <u>5/22/18 item 4.</u> Businesses that apply to open in the designated areas (map included) will require City Council approval. Details of the

operational guidelines and regulations will also come back for approval at a later date. The 2nd reading of the ordinance will come back to council on June 26th, 2018.
