The California Primary Election was held on June 7<sup>th</sup>. The County Elections website <u>www.contracostacore.us</u> will be providing updates for the next several weeks until all mailin and provisional ballots have been verified and counted. Updated unofficial election results have Antioch's Measure E passing while Measure G is failing.

While Candidate Filing Period for two Council Members, Mayor, City Clerk and City Treasurer does not officially begin until July 18<sup>th</sup>, several residents have already filed a Form 501 "Candidate Intention Statement" and some have already filed a Form 410 "Statement of Organization Recipient Committee" to obtain a FPPC ID number and begin collecting contributions. City Clerk Arne Simonsen was awarded a \$750 scholarship by the Northern California City Clerks Association to attend Technical Training for Clerks (Series 400) at UC Riverside June 21 – 24, 2016. Although Deputy City Clerk did not receive a scholarship this time, she will also be attending.

The City Clerk processed 24 of the 33 boxes of files received from the Capital Improvement Department. Each box of files required that the inventory sheets be verified; the Box be entered into the Records Log, assigning a "Location" and "Box" number, Department and description of its contents; stamping the Location & Box number on each file; stamping the outside of each box with its "Location" & "Box" number; loading each box (which weighs between 10 and 45 pounds) into a truck; taking them to the Records Warehouse; unloading the truck and putting them in the Records Warehouse; and then placing each box in its proper location. Total time to process each box is about 20 minutes. Nine more boxes are awaiting processing.

#### **RECREATION UPDATES**

- On Monday, more than 100 youth started Summer Camp Season traditional Coyote Hills Summer Day Camp, art, dance, music and more. Registration is open for the rest of summer camp programs. Fun for the summer, lessons for a lifetime so let our experienced camp staff keep your kids engaged.
- On Monday, 25 young teens started the first of three Jr. Lifeguard Camps. Once certified, some of these Jr. Lifeguards will join the lifeguard staff as volunteers and assist with making sure all Water Park guests are having a good experience.

- Last week, 450 children ages 5-13 started the Junior Giants summer baseball league at Antioch Community Park. - On Monday, eight more volunteers completed the second volunteer orientation at the Water Park. These young teens will be joining the Water Park team soon!
- On Tuesday, more than 10 people enjoyed Toddler Tuesday swim for ages 6 month to 6 years in the Tad Pool at the Antioch Water Park. Many families come out to let their young ones splash around in the water and get more comfortable being around water.
- On Monday, the Water Park received this seasons new refillable birthday party cups. These cups are a new design and will be given to all those who purchase birthday party tickets.
- On Wednesday, the recreation maintenance team made various repairs to expansion joint sealant throughout the Water Park complex. Ongoing monitoring and repair of these joints help to prolong the life of our infrastructure.
- On Thursday, Contra Costa County Environmental Health Department conducted a permit final inspection on the pool deck repair work at the Tad Pool. Opening this repaired area will allow for a much more complete park visitor experience!
- On Friday, The City's mechanical contractor installed new Swamp Coolers to serve the Water Park Concessions building. This new unit replaces original equipment that has served the City for over 20 years.
- Last week, staff increased promotions and planning for *Skate Park Demo Day* which will be held on July 9<sup>th</sup> at the Antioch Skate Park.
- Last week, staff continued to promote the Juneteenth Celebration planned for Waldie Plaza on June 18.
- On Thursday, the Antioch Council of Teens (ACT) made a presentation to the Antioch Parks and Recreation Commission about their start-up activities, summer meetings, school projects, and goals for engaging with the community.
- The Parks and Recreation Commission reviewed vision and concept plans for Waldie Plaza in preparation for future grant opportunities and other funding possibilities to update the plaza and event staging area.
- On Monday, Lifeguard Staff responded to a medical emergency at the Antioch Water Park. Staff provided immediate care as they were trained, and because of their quick response they assisted in saving a life. Fire and Police personnel complimented the staff on their work, their training and their professionalism.

#### Senior Center Services

- On Wednesday, 15 Seniors enjoyed the movie of the week *Mad Max*, which was enjoyed by everyone!
- On Thursday, 16 seniors participated in the AARP senior driver's refresher course on. The safe driving course helps seniors with insurance costs also.
- Last week, staff prepared the first draft of the July/August newsletter. It will be ready for final proofing next week.

#### Drought Updates:

While this winter brought us enough rainfall and snow pack to make it through the dry season, conservation is still vital and many prohibited uses are still being enforced. Visit <u>www.antiochwater.com</u> for the list of prohibited water uses.

Final 2015 Urban Water Management Plan is available. The City of Antioch's 2015 Urban Water Management Plan (UWMP) documents the City's planning activities to ensure adequate water supplies to meet existing and future demands for water. The UWMP presents forecasted supplies and demands, describes the City's conservation programs, and identifies recycled water opportunities to the year 2035.

Last Week's Irrigation Repairs and Service:

• Parks Citywide: Water is now running at 72% of 2013 summer water use, with the exception of the Recycled Water Parks which are at 100% with no water restrictions. Those Parks are: City, 1000 A St.; Chichibu, 3200 Longview Road; Fairview, 1100 Crestview Dr.; and Mountaire, 2600 Sunset Lane.

- Recycled Water Parks: Second quarter inspections were done at our 4 recycled water parks. (City, Chichibu, Fairview and Mountaire)
- City Park: 7 sprinklers were replaced.
- Chichibu Park: A leaking lateral pipe was repaired and 6 broken sprinklers were replaced.
- Fairview Park: An inoperative turf valve and 4 broken sprinklers were replaced.
- Mountaire Park: 3 inoperative sprinklers were replaced.
- Lone Tree Way 4 sprinklers repaired, 2 sprinklers adjusted, 2 irrigation valves flushed out and 2 irrigation valves rebuilt.
- Thistlewood Ct. 3 sprinklers repaired.
- Rachel Ct. 4 sprinklers repaired and 2 nozzles replaced.
- L St. 6 sprinklers capped.
- Thumb Mountain Ct. 1 irrigation valve rebuilt and 1 lateral line repaired.
- Prewett Ranch Dr. 6 sprinklers repaired and 1 lateral repaired.
- Roundup Ct. 1 irrigation valve rebuilt.
- Dallas Ranch Rd. 9 sprinklers repaired and 1 lateral line repaired.
- Terrace View Dr. 1 irrigation valve rebuilt.
- Hillcrest Ave. 2 sprinklers repaired.
- Gentrytown Dr. 4 sprinklers repaired and 1 controller reprogrammed.
- Deer Valley Rd. 1 irrigation controller reprogrammed.
- Buchanan Rd. 2 sprinkler repaired and 2 irrigation valves rewired.
- All landscape irrigation controllers located in the medians and right-of-ways have been reprogrammed to summer settings.

# **PUBLIC WORKS UPDATES**

## Administration

- At long last, State Route 4 has been restriped with the ultimate lane configurations and is open to traffic. There will continue to be temporary lane closures as the final roadway improvements are completed and for the ongoing BART construction. The highway, interchange, and City street portion of the work will be substantially complete by the end of June. Landscaping installation along Highway 4 and at interchanges has been delayed due to the drought but is planned to move forward later this year. BART is scheduled to be open to the public in 2018 however you may see BART cars running up and down the tracks for testing.
- The Marina was officially designated as a San Francisco Bay Area Water Trail Launch Site. This designation serves to give the public access to the water for nonmotorized water craft such as kayaks and canoes. The Marina staff hopes to increase access and outreach with future construction of launches and low freeboard docks. For more information regarding the San Francisco Water Trail and its mission visit: <u>http://sfbaywatertrail.org</u>.
- Contra Costa Water District (CCWD) announced that they have signed a settlement agreement with the California Department of Water Resources (DWR), which

according to CCWD will "protect its customers, facilities, and operations if the Bay Delta Conservation Plan/WaterFix (CWF), aka the 'twin tunnels', is built." The March 29th CCWD News Release also states, "The agreement is an insurance policy to protect the unique water quality and supply issues raised by CCWD". As a result of this settlement, CCWD has withdrawn its protest of the DWR Petition to Change Diversion locations proposed as part of the CWF. The documents related to this settlement are posted on the CCWD website

http://www.ccwater.com/317/Bay-Delta-Conservation-Plan-Comments. The CCWD Board of directors held a meeting on April 6<sup>th</sup> to explain the details of the agreement and respond to questions from the public. They have also mailed out a letter to each customer explaining the settlement. Antioch residents will receive a copy of the letter as we purchase our raw water from CCWD before treating it and distributing to our customers.

February 2016 brought us to the end of the initial water conservation mandate issued by the State of California. The City of Antioch was required to conserve 28% based on 2013 usage through the month of February 2016. Thanks to your outstanding efforts, our total cumulative reduction since July 2015 is 29.78%. At the end of January 2016, the State extended its mandatory conservation order through October 2016. Final guidance is still being worked out as the State monitors the snow pack and reservoir levels through this winter. Please continue to conserve this valuable resource and plan on conserving throughout 2016. Outdoor water conservation will be the primary focus of the City's program, as well as fines for wasteful practices as identified in the Water Conservation Resolution adopted by the City Council on May 12<sup>th</sup>, 2015. All Antioch customers were mailed a letter explaining the program and prohibitions, as well as 2013 monthly water usage. Examples of prohibitions are: three day per week residential outdoor watering, no watering between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., shut off nozzles required on all hoses, and drinking water available only upon request at restaurants. Contra Costa Water District has incentives, such as residential high-efficiency clothes washer rebates, water-efficient landscape rebates and smart sprinkler timer rebates. ## Engineering & Development Services

- City-owned cell sites, various locations: Staff is performing site visits and review of land leases, 100% construction drawings, consent letters, photo-sims and related technical reports and materials in response to various applications for equipment upgrades and site modifications.
- Laurel Ranch, a 186-unit housing development by Richland Communities, located at the eastern terminus of existing Laurel Road and west of Highway 4: Staff is reviewing the final development plan and preparing project conditions of approval.

- Nelson Ranch Subdivision 6893, end of Wildhorse Road: Staff performed a site inspection and provided a punch list in response to the developer's request for release of the warranty bond.
- Olive Groves Subdivision, 263 single-family detached senior housing units with assisted living facility, commercial uses and open space south of Sand Creek and east of Deer Valley Road: Residential portion gated with private streets. Staff is preliminarily reviewing the PDP-16-01 application.
- Park Ridge Phase I, a 123-unit housing development by Davidon Homes, located west of Canada Valley Road and east of Highway 4: The subdivision plan and map checks have been completed and staff is working with the developer to form a district to fund offsite improvements.
- SR4 (Segment 2) Contra Loma Blvd. Interchange/'G' Street Overcrossing Project: The project has been accepted by the State. The eastbound Contra Loma Blvd. onramp is closed temporarily for SR4 mainline construction. Staff is meeting with Caltrans to resolve the issues in City right-of-way.
- SR4 (Segment 3A) 'A' Street/Lone Tree Way Interchange, Cavallo Road/Garrow Drive Undercrossing Project: Work continues on the 'A' St./Lone Tree Way and Cavallo Road Overcrossings and the new Sunset Drive from Bryan Avenue to "A" Street extension. Slope paving and sidewalk reconstruction is underway. The lefthand turn from westbound Bryan Ave. to southbound A St. has been permanently closed to traffic due to construction of a new raised median and a signalized intersection at Rossi Avenue and A Street. There will be lane closures in the northbound and southbound directions of A Street/Lone Tree Way between Rossi Avenue and E. Tregallas Road from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m. The eastbound off-ramp to Lone Tree Way will be closed Wed. - Thurs., 11 p.m. – 5 a.m., and Fri. midnight – 5 a.m. The eastbound on-ramp from Lone Tree Way will be closed Wed. – Thurs., 7 p.m. – 6 a.m., and Fri., 10 p.m. – 8 a.m. The westbound off-ramp to A Street will be closed Wed. - Thurs., 7 p.m. - 5 a.m., and Fri., 10 p.m. - 9 a.m. The westbound on-ramp from A Street will be closed Wed. -Thurs., 10 p.m. – 4 a.m., and Fri., 11 p.m. – 6 a.m. Pedestrians and motorists are advised to exercise caution while travelling through these areas.
- SR4 (Segment 3B) Hillcrest Avenue Interchange and BART Tunnel Project: Work continues on the Hillcrest Avenue Bridge widening, the Pedestrian Overcrossing (POC) and the Maintenance of Works (MOW) Tunnel. The new Slatten Ranch Road westbound (WB) loop on-ramp is open to traffic and the Hillcrest WB on-ramp is temporarily closed for construction. There will be lane closures in the eastbound and westbound directions of Larkspur Drive between Hillcrest Avenue and Wildflower Drive, Sunset Drive between Hillcrest Avenue and Devpar Court, and Hillcrest Avenue between Larkspur Drive and Sunset Drive, from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m. Pedestrians and motorists are advised to exercise caution while travelling through this area.
- BART Parking Lot and Maintenance Facility: Staff approved the design for a proposed 12" sanitary sewer main from the new Maintenance Facility, north of the S.P.R.R. railroad line to the southerly extension of Willow Avenue and is reviewing grant deeds for public easement dedications. Staff returned comments to BART's

Ownership and Maintenance of Utilities Agreement for storm drainage improvements.

- Aviano, an approved 533 unit housing development located west of the current terminus of Hillcrest Avenue, east and north of Dozier-Libby Medical High School: The Chaparral Park extension and new neighborhood park will be reviewed at June 6<sup>th</sup> Park and Recreation Commission. First phase of construction documents submitted. Staff is reviewing plans for 3<sup>rd</sup> plan check.
- Working on creating Community Facilities Districts for Sand Creek Focus Area.
- Tabora Gardens, a senior apartment complex on James Donlon and Tabora Drive: Staff returned 2<sup>nd</sup> plan check comments for revision.
- Child Care Education Building in Williamson Ranch Plaza: The 2<sup>nd</sup> plan check is underway by staff.

#### Capital Improvements Division

- Country Hills Drive and Vista Grande Drive Water Main Replacement: A-S Pipelines, Inc. is connecting the new water facilities to the existing system on Vista Grande Drive between Lone Tree Way and Country Hills Drive. The location of the new water main on Country Hills Drive between Vista Grande Drive and Canada Valley Drive has been laid out and exploratory excavations of the existing underground utilities in this area will commence in the near future.
- West Antioch Creek Channel Improvements: Contra Costa Real Property Division continues to negotiate the purchase of property and easements located at 1400 and 1420 West 10<sup>th</sup> Street. U.S. Fish and Wildlife is continuing to review the project's Biological Assessment.
- Cathodic Protection Assessment: Staff met with JDH Corrosion Consultants, Inc. and is investigating the existing cathodic protection devices in the southeastern portion of the City.
- Zone I Transmission Pipeline Rehabilitation at HWY 4: RMC Water and Environment is incorporating Staff comments into the draft project plans and specifications.
- Water Treatment Plant Electrical Upgrades: Associated Power Solutions adjusted the electrical breaker settings at the Water Treatment Plant and installed warning labels on the electrical equipment. TJC and Associates is developing the arc flash hazard assessment for the Plant.
- Water Treatment Plant Disinfection Improvements: Staff and CDM Smith are evaluating the feasibility using ammonia sulfate in lieu of aqueous ammonia as part of the future disinfection operation at the Water Treatment Plant.
- Brackish Water Desalinization Plant: Carollo Engineers is reviewing existing water quality information and evaluating the water intake facility. State Water Resources Control Board is reviewing the City's State Revolving Fund loan application.
- North East Annexation Infrastructure Improvements: Staff is reviewing a proposal for consulting services from BKF Engineering to provide engineering services and to prepare preliminary plans, estimates and studies for the planning and the design of infrastructure improvements needed to serve the newly annexed Area 1 and 2B.

- 2016 Pavement Management Program: Staff opened bids for the \$2.6 million asphalt pavement roadway rehabilitation project, which will include major arterial streets such as Lone Tree Way, James Donlon Blvd., Somersville Road, Buchanan Road, Golf Course Road, Hillcrest Ave. and various residential streets north of HWY 4. MCK Services Inc. is expected to start the construction on June 27, 2016 and be completed by September 2016.
- Transportation Impact Fee Study: Staff is working with the consultant, EPS, to finalize the land use forecasts, the transportation improvement list, the network to be used in the traffic model, and proposed fee. The final draft Fee Study will be presented to the City Council for public review and comments in July 2016.
- Prewett Park Improvements (Spray Ground and Playground): Construction is underway for a new all abilities spray ground at the water park and an all abilities playground near the east parking lot. Both projects are scheduled to be completed in September 2016.

## Water Treatment Plant

- Cleaned Solar Bees out on the municipal reservoir. Solar Bees circulate the water in the reservoir; cleaning the Solar Bees prevents weeds from restricting the circulation. Also cleaned the staff gage on the tower.
- Started installing the last section of basin covers on the second half of "B" plant north basin. Covers will block out UV sunlight to help with the disinfection process.
- Calibrated turbidity meters at "A" plant.
- Installed a new section of pipe that runs up to the elevated tank. This section of pipe is the injection point for chemicals that are added to the water for settling.

## Water Distribution

- Water Distribution staff had 241 stops for water service including disconnections.
- Water Distribution staff had a total of 50 USA tickets completed for utility location.
- Water Distribution meter reading has started for the month of June and is on schedule.
- Water Distribution staff issued four drought notices this week.
- The State Water Board has extended water conservation prohibitions through January 2017.
- Water Distribution staff continues to monitor water meters, conservation and usage at all City buildings and parks.
- Water Distribution staff continues to respond to drought hotline inquiries.
- Water Distribution staff responded to customer calls regarding water maintenance issues city wide.
- Water Distribution staff replaced a hydrant on Lone Tree Way at Clearbrook Road.
- Water Distribution staff replaced a backflow device on Lone Tree Way.
- Water Distribution staff assisted the contractor with new water main tie-in on Vista Grande at Catanzaro.
- Water Distribution staff replaced a 1" water service on Brookside Drive.
- Water Distribution staff continues State mandated annual backflow testing.

- Water Distribution staff performed preventative maintenance on fire hydrants city wide.
- Water Distribution staff hauled off green waste for recycling, as well as cleaned up debris at the city's Fulton yard.
- Central Stores staff cleared debris, graffiti and household items from Fulton Shipyard Rd. boat ramp area.
- Central Stores staff cleared debris and graffiti from Amtrak platform.
- Central Stores issued 500 line items from stock and received 120 stock items. Stores also placed 13 orders for non stock items.

# Public Works Operations – Parks and Landscape

- Citywide Fire Abatement: The City Fire Abatement Program continued this week with Citywide Zone 9; Country Manor Park was completed; and Hillcrest Zone 2 has begun.
- Fire Abatement Disking work is now 100% complete.
- Playground and Park Safety Inspections: Completed at Chichibu, City, Eagleridge, Fairview and Mountaire Parks. Follow-up inspections were performed at Hansen Park.
- Recycled Water Parks: Performed second quarter inspections at the City's four recycled water parks, which include City, Chichibu, Fairview and Mountaire Parks.
- Antioch Community Park: Installed new skid-resistant flooring, as well as graffiti resistant wall paneling for the concession stand restrooms.
- Canal Park: Installed new swing hanger bushings on all belt swings.
- Chichibu Park: Ordered a new women's restroom door, which is scheduled for installation on June 17<sup>th</sup>. Requested replacement for the damaged modesty panels in the men's restroom. Estimates are pending. Repaired a leaking lateral pipe and replaced six broken sprinklers.
- City Park: Replaced seven sprinklers.
- Fairview Park: Replaced an inoperative turf valve and four broken sprinklers.
- Mountaire Park: Replaced three inoperative sprinklers.
- Volunteer Projects: Installed four new Doggie Waste Stations in two parks. This project was spear-headed by Boy Scout Troop 247, Jude Kiruuta for his Eagle Scout rating. Our hats off to Jude, for a job well done!
- Tree Removal Permits: No Tree Removal Permits were issued this week.
- Irrigation: Repaired 58 irrigation leaks on City property.
- Spot Spray: Lone Tree medians, Contra Loma medians and Deer Valley medians.
- Trim Crews: Black Diamond Dr., Fredrickson Ln., Lone Tree medians, Lone Tree rights of way, and Indian Hills Drive.
- Courts Trimmed: Zone 4566 (north of James Donlon between Contra Loma and Gentrytown Dr).
- Irrigation Controllers: Reprogrammed all irrigation controllers to the summer program.
- New Controller Installation: Hillcrest Ave.
- Weed Abatement: Larkspur Dr. and Wilbur Ave.

• Tree Removals: Country Manor Park, Marina, Davison Dr. and Gentrytown Drive.

## Public Works Operations – Street Maintenance

- Graffiti Abatement: Removed graffiti from City property in numerous areas.
- Signs: Replaced eight existing signs due to poor reflectivity.
- Potholes: Filled one pothole.
- Striping: Painted 8,824 feet of double yellow lines, 1,972 feet of 12 inch bars and 192 stencils. Painted 28,015 feet of white stacking and bike lanes. Painted red curb for 55 courts.

Public Works Utilities – Collections Division

- Calls for Sewer Service: Received and responded to eight calls for service from the public. Responding crews televised 105 linear feet of public sewer laterals connecting to the City's sewer system.
- Sewer Mains: Daily preventative maintenance performed on over 29,370 linear feet of sewer main lines.
- Quarterly Sewer Main Cleaning: The route schedule is under review to increase inspection frequency of identified 'hot spots' and integrate a proactive preventative cleaning schedule for the 'hot spots'.
- Sewer Lateral Maintenance Program (SLMP): No laterals were repaired. Crews televised three laterals.
- Manhole Inspection Program: Crews inspected 96 manholes. Manholes are inspected for loose lids, debris, locking mechanisms, and status of infrastructure for future maintenance and rehabilitation. We are updating the program and processes for integration in our computerized maintenance management system.
- Sanitary Sewer Overflow (SSO) Reduction Program: Staff is working on formal inspection criteria to inspect manholes in rural areas. The use of "SMART Manholes" in strategic areas will be utilized that will alert leadership staff within the division of potential SSOs. This program will also address the need for locking mechanisms.
- Closed Caption Televising (CCTV): Crews televised 5,621 feet of sewer main lines. The CCTV Preventative Maintenance crew inspects sewer mains to identify the condition and causes of blockages and SSOs.
- National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES): Crews removed 8.5 yards of trash and green waste. Repaired 20 feet of cyclone fencing in various locations. Sprayed 3.3 acres of access roadways and open space to channels. Weed abated 2.4 acres of low water line access to channels. These activities ensure the City meets the Federal Clean Water Act requirements of municipalities discharging storm water into waterways. Proactive preventative maintenance is restricted to the months of April through October.

## Public Works Operations – Fleet Division

- Preventative Maintenance: Eight services on City vehicles as scheduled.
- Unscheduled Repairs: 63 unscheduled, necessary repairs to City vehicles.

Public Works Operations - Municipal Marina

- The Marina received one pending application for permanent berthing and responded to three berthing inquiries.
- The Marina was officially designated as a San Francisco Bay Area Water Trail Launch Site. This designation serves to give the public access to the water for non-motorized water craft such as kayaks and canoes.
- The Marina Fuel system upgrade project: A new gas/diesel combination fuel dispenser was placed. Electrical wiring and system setup is currently underway. Once operational, the fuel dispenser will be able to dispense automatically at the swipe of a credit card with the pay kiosk offering Marina customer's faster reliable service.
- Maintenance: Removed logs and debris from the marina basin and serviced the irrigation system and trimmed the grounds. The knee boards were painted, as well as the fuel kiosk box. The Marina staff is in process of replacing and painting fuel dock boards.
- Advertising and Outreach: Approved advertisements placed in Yachtsman magazine reaching over 40,000 boaters. Craigslist advertisements placed in Bay Area, Stockton, Sacramento, Monterey, and Santa Cruz listings. Advertising Annual Boat Launch Ramp Passes for \$100 on Craigslist.

#### Public Works Operations – Facility Maintenance Division

- Public Works: Installed two new windows in the stores building and installed a new air-hose reel for the vehicle shop.
- Police Department: Installed LED flood lights in the dispatch area.
- Lynn House: Assisted the elevator technicians.
- Community Park: Floor and wall refinishing has been completed.
- G Street tree lighting: Inspected an electrical issue.
