

CITY MANAGER'S WEEKLY UPDATE JUNE 22, 2018



Mayor and Members of the City Council: This is the City Manager's Report for the week ending June 22, 2018.

CITY MANAGER

Due to the extreme weather this weekend, this is just a reminder that the Antioch Community Center and Water Park are options for our citizens to go for emergency cooling.

I spent Thursday with our government relations firm, Federal Advocates in Washington DC with Mayor Sean Wright and Council Member Tony Tiscareno. We had great meetings with our elected officials (special thanks to our Congressman Jerry McNerney and Congressman Mark DeSaulnier for their time on a busy day for them). We also met with the Departments of Justice, Homeland Security, and the Environmental Protection Agency, and the US Interagency Council on Homelessness staff members to find avenues of funding support for our community. It was nice to be able to take BART from Antioch to the San Francisco International Airport and back again.

Along with the City Managers of Pittsburg, Oakley and



Brentwood, I met with Contra Costa Transportation Authority (CCTA), and Contra Costa County economic development and Airport Authority representatives to discuss the Northern Waterfront Initiative and the Jobs Highway linking Brentwood to Tracy. The goal of this collaborative effort is to bring jobs to East Contra Costa County. Key infrastructure and a development of a regional defined action plan were the subject of this meeting.

I was honored to participate in the Special Olympics Torch Run along with the Antioch Police Department and our Explorers. Taking the hand-off from Oakley PD at the Oakley/Antioch city limit and handing off the torch to Pittsburg PD at the Pittsburg city limits was a great experience I hope to be able to in the years ahead.

POLICE

On 6/13/18, several of our officers were given awards by Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD). This is a nonprofit organization in the United States and Canada that seeks to stop drunk driving and underage drinking, strives for stricter impaired driving laws, and provides support for those affected by drunk driving. Officers Hopwood and Torres were each recognized for 9 DUI arrests, and Officer Sahnic was awarded for his 12 arrests in 2017. Many of our officers make these types of arrests



during the course of their regular duty; however, Officers Hopwood, Torrez and Sahnic distinguished themselves by having some of the highest arrests for drunk drivers this last year. We are thankful for MADD and the hard work of our officers to keep drunk and impaired drivers off our roads.



Retired-Captain Aguinaga and the Antioch Police Department were recently featured in an Ancestry.com video. The video briefly documents some of the history of the Antioch Police department and the

women and men who have served our community in years gone by. Captain Aguinaga, an avid history buff with an interest in genealogy, came across a large cache of photos, long forgotten in a stack of nondescript boxes in the corner of the police department. COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Planning

On Tuesday, May 22, the City Council introduced an ordinance establishing a new Cannabis Business (CB) Zoning Overlay District and accompanying text. This ordinance provides areas in the City of Antioch where individuals may apply for a City Council Use Permit to establish



a Cannabis Business. Each new Cannabis Business must be located at least 600' from a school, City park, or residential district and must meet specific findings for approval. The ordinance is expected to take effect around July 31, 2018.

The CB Zoning Overlay District generally includes the industrial/commercial areas between the San Joaquin River and East 18th Street and the Verne Roberts Circle area. The map of the approved CB Zoning Overlay District is shown below. The City Council's second and final reading of the Ordinance will occur on June 26, 2018, and City staff will take effect on July 26, 2018. In addition, staff intends to bring Cannabis Guidelines to the City Council for review and approval on July 24, 2018. These guidelines will express the City's expectations for future applicants about the operation of cannabis businesses and will offer staff, the Planning Commission, and City Council a basis for reviewing applications. Street Maintenance



Our Street Maintenance crew; paving the way to a better Antioch!

The crew worked hard and fast in the afternoon heat Thursday afternoon repairing the asphalt leading up to Union Pacific railroad crossing on northbound Auto Center Drive. The crews removed and replaced a section of the road that had some areas causing issues for motorists. Only one of the two lanes of traffic was closed while the work was completed in one day. Look for the crew next week at the railroad crossing in the northbound lane of A Street, south of Railroad Avenue.

Landscaping

Our contracted crews are in full force tackling the landscape maintenance in the areas next to the sidewalks on major arterial roads; these areas are called 'rights of way.' The landscape contractors are dealing with a significant labor shortage in their industry but rest assured, we are all working diligently to keep up with the

The crews are currently working on Hillcrest Avenue, Deer Valley Road, Somersville Road and Phillips Lane. Collection Systems

Preventing Pollution

- Store and handle materials safely
- Clean up spills properly
- Never dump or wash out items down or near a storm drain



Only Rain Down the Drain! Our storm drains do not filter what we put into them. They run directly into our creeks and rivers. To help keep them clean; properly dispose of your motor oil, pick up after your pet, take your car to a car wash and follow the directions when you spray and fertilize your yard.

Polluted stormwater runoff can have many adverse effects on plants, fish, animals, and people:

- Sediment can cloud the water and make it difficult or impossible for aquatic plants to grow. Sediment also can destroy aquatic habitats.
- Excess nutrients can cause algae blooms. When algae die, they sink to the bottom and decompose in a process that removes oxygen from the water. Fish and other aquatic organisms can't exist in water with low dissolved oxygen levels.
- Bacteria and other pathogens can wash into swimming areas and create health hazards, often making beach closures necessary.
- Debris plastic bags, six-pack rings, bottles, and cigarette butts washed into waterbodies can choke, suffocate, or disable aquatic life like ducks, fish, turtles, and birds.
- Household hazardous wastes like insecticides, pesticides, paint, solvents, used motor oil, and other auto fluids can poison aquatic life. Land animals and people can become sick from eating diseased fish and shellfish or ingesting polluted water.

Remember, sewer drains, and storm drains are two entirely, separate drainage systems. The sewer system takes all household wastewater from toilets, showers, and sinks and routes it through your plumbing system and directs it to a treatment plant. Stormwater drains to our ponds, rivers and ocean bays.
