COVID-19 Update

COVID-19 is still a serious health concern. The governor established a requirement that face coverings must be worn by all individuals when out in public. The City continues to reopen our facilities with the Antioch Water Park now open for lap swim, and the rest of the facility preparing to reopen once established protocols and safeguards are in place. We encourage our residents and businesses to please continue to be diligent in taking necessary precautions like social distancing of 6' or more, washing hands, and regularly sanitizing surfaces.

Town Hall Meetings

Last week the City Council held two special meetings to discuss the establishment of an ad hoc committee to discuss police reforms. Over 800 public comments were received and read into the record for this very important matter. Council consensus is to hold Town Hall style meetings where the entire City Council and interested community members, organizations, and our Police Department can participate in this discussion. The first meeting will be **Tuesday**, **June 30th**, **via Zoom** with future meeting dates and specific agenda items to be determined. We invite the community to join us as we strive to identify and implement meaningful change.

Improving and Beautifying Antioch

The City is in the midst of a large street resurfacing project, maintaining landscaped medians and parkways along our main streets throughout town and cleaning up illegal dumping, shopping carts, graffiti, and trash. The restrictions that resulted from COVID-19 have resulted in a delay in spraying for weeds and conducting our standard landscape maintenance programs. We are moving full speed now. Thank you for your patience as we do our best to beautify and clean up our City.






POLICE DEPARTMENT

Antioch Police Youth Academy

The Antioch Police Youth Academy is ON! It appeared that restrictions related to the COVID-19 crisis were going to cause us to cancel this year's Academy. As the restrictions continue to loosen, it looks like we will be able to proceed (of course, with added precautions!). What is the Youth Academy, you ask? Well, the Youth Academy is a week-long, hands-on training for kids aged 14-18 years of age who live in our local area.



During the Academy, the kids will learn about law enforcement from the inside out, have the opportunity to meet many of our officers, and have real conversations about current events in a non-threatening environment. Due to our late start, we are streamlining our process. Due to class size restrictions, we are limiting enrollment to the first 40 applicants. Applicants must be between 14-18 years of age, live in our local area, pass a cursory check, and commit to attending the entire Academy. The Academy will be held July 13-17th.

Fireworks Safety

As a friendly reminder, all fireworks are illegal in the City of Antioch. We want to remind Antioch residents, businesses, and visitors that the sale, possession, and use of all fireworks are banned within the City of Antioch. This ban includes the "safe and sane" variety of fireworks that are legal in some other cities.

Police resources will be on patrol in Antioch during the peak times of concern to maintain an active vigilance against fireworks use. We are receiving calls on missing pets scared by fireworks. **PLEASE** be more vigilant in the weeks leading up to July 4th. Do NOT leave pets in your vard unattended at night. Their best anti-anxiety is YOU. Staying at home with your pets during these nights of fireworks is the best comfort you can offer them.

We are anticipating a high call volume during the Fourth of July holiday season. We ask that community members help due their part to keep our City safe and only dial 9-1-1 during an actual or potential emergency. Antioch Water Park is Open for Lap Swim

The Antioch Water Park opened for lap swim on June 15th, making it the first recreation program offered to the community since the Shelter in Place Order began in March! So far, 136 reservations have been made, and residents keep calling for time slots. Lap swim is offered in 30-minute sessions, 8:00–11:00 a.m. and 4:00-6:00 p.m., seven days a week for swimmers 12 years and older. Interested swimmers must call the Antioch Water Park at 925-776-3070 to reserve a lap swim time. The cost for lap swim is \$4 per session. To ensure safety for community members, bathrooms will be available, but

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Parcel Rezoning

On June 23, 2020, the City Council will consider a recommendation from the Planning Commission regarding rezoning three City-owned parcels to contain the Emergency Shelter (ES) zoning designation. This action would support the City Council's ongoing efforts to address the homeless crisis in our City by creating a temporary housing community for families with children in the Antioch Unified School District. The City of Antioch recently received five travel trailers from the State of California through a program designed to provide housing for those experiencing homelessness. If approved, these trailers (photo above of typical trailers to be used in this program) would be installed at the chosen location along with other improvements to create a safe and comfortable housing solution for these families. The City is also working to develop a partnership with a non-profit organization to assist with the management of the community, the selection of families, and the provision of social services to assist with the transition out of homelessness.

The Planning Commission recommended that none of the sites be selected for this purpose based on mixed concerns about the suitability of the sites, not on the necessity or desire to house homeless families. The City of Antioch remains committed to confronting the homelessness crisis through efforts to improve the lives and provide opportunities for those affected. We recognize the complexity of this issue and the diversity of the homeless population and its varying needs. By reaching out to homeless families with children in AUSD, the City is taking a monumental first step towards a solution. The staff report and supporting information is available here.

Water Distribution



PUBLIC WORKS

Project Update -2020 Roadway Cape Seal

Phase 1 – Chip Sealing' of the City's 2020 Road Cape Seal Project was completed last week. Chip seal gets its name from the "chips" or small crushed rock placed on the surface.



Phase 2 – Micro Surfacing' portion of the project is still in progress; and consists of the application of an asphalt emulsion mixture that is placed on top of the ½" black aggregate (tiny crushed rock) creating a smoother wear surface (micro-surfacing). Micro-surfacing is applied to preserve and protect the underlying pavement structure and provide a new, smooth driving surface.

The entire cape seal project will cover 3,758,285 square feet of roadway surface and is expected to conclude by the end of June. This project will entail temporarily altering traffic patterns and street parking during construction. Temporary street closures and detours will be facilitated by the Contractor as well as notifying all affected properties.

We ask for your patience during construction and obey all traffic control and warning signs that are placed for the safety of workers and the public.



This construction operation is expected to be completed in approximately one month. The list of streets included in this project is posted on the City's website homepage under Announcements **here**.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Economic Development Department Hours

The Economic Development Department staff will continue to provide service and information remotely during the COVID-19 Pandemic. Departmental phones are being answered, and email capability is in place. The hours of operation are 8:30 a.m. - 5:00 p.m.

Outdoor Dining Permits

On Friday, June 5, 2020, the revised County Order allowed for restaurants to start serving patrons by providing outdoor dining. To facilitate this, a simple Outdoor Dining Permit application was created. The application was provided to all Antioch restaurants on Tuesday, June 9, 2020, and as of June 19, five restaurants have received approval. The application includes a self-certification process through a series of questions, and can be approved in 24 hours, and is free to applicant.



Economic Development Commission

The City of Antioch's Economic Development Commission had its June 2 meeting via Zoom teleconferencing. The Commissioners have been tasked by the Mayor to come up with an Economic Development Business Recovery and Retention Plan of Action for the City. The Incentive Subcommittee presented preliminary drafts of possible programming, which include: grants, marketing, and technology. Each commissioner spoke about what they hear from businesses about their needs as a result of the Pandemic.






