



WE'RE JUST GETTING STARTED

On January 1, 2022, I humbly assumed the City of Antioch City Manager's duties and responsibilities. City governance is never an easy task to master; it takes time and a lot of patience. Over the past five months, our staff has **accomplished** so much. I intend to provide a **mid-year report** to share the City's efforts in pursuing innovative plans to address our unhoused resident issues, establish a new department, and illustrate our commitment to addressing our mental health crisis.

The issue of homelessness has been a national problem, and according to the Contra Costa County Public Health Department, Division of Health, Housing and Homelessness, the City of Antioch has the highest percentage of the unhoused population in Contra Costa County. Additionally, Antioch Police Department data reveals that an increased rate of their **routine service calls** involves individuals with either mental health or drug addiction issues. Despite the numbers, the City of Antioch, under the leadership of the mayor and the entire city council, has taken **meaningful steps** to address its unhoused residents and homelessness problems.

One major step is pursuing Homekey funding, which would be used to purchase the Executive Inn Hotel in Antioch. The City's overarching goal is to create a **safe and secure environment** where our unhoused residents can receive shelter and wraparound services. The City is currently identifying a vendor that would be selected as a Community Crisis Intervention Response Provider for Low-Level 911 calls. Two primary goals of the **mental health crisis response team** are: 1) Provide residents an alternative option in addressing non-violent and low-level police calls. 2) Free up police officers to respond to emergency and urgent police calls for service.

Once I officially assumed the reigns of the City Manager's Office, our city staff prioritized establishing the **Public Safety and Community Resources Department**. This newly created department will have five divisions as follows: 1) Youth Services,

- 2) Violence Intervention and Prevention, 3) Homelessness and Housing,
- 4) Community Engagement and 5) Environmental Sustainability.

Our City is rapidly growing, and with urban growth come challenges, like increased homelessness, low level police calls for services, non-violent crimes, and residents' mental health issues. I want to give a **special thanks** to all our leadership team and team member who has given so much to our City. So, sit back, take in some beautiful sun rays, and relax because "we're just getting started."

Juneteenth commemorates June 19, 1865



ANTIOCH'S FIRST GATEWAY SIGN

The historic Rivertown District has seen much **geographical growth** and economic development. Recently, the City of Antioch installed its first Gateway Sign downtown, on 2nd and E Street! The construction of the new, **internally-illuminated** 2-sided Rivertown Gateway sign was mounted, sidewalk to sidewalk, in Antioch's historic Rivertown District. The eye-catching sign is now a **permanent fixture downtown** and one of the city's many signage projects.

Whether you want to participate in activities at the Antioch Senior Center or Nick Rodriguez Community Center, have a hankering for theater and the arts, enjoy a meal at any of the **various restaurants** or just window shop at the many small **businesses downtown**, it all begins at the gateway to downtown, right here on 2nd and E Street! With the warm weather upon us and the 4th of July just on the horizon, there is no better time to head downtown!



Our storm drains don't filter what we put into them. They run directly into our creeks and rivers. To help keep them clean, **properly dispose** of your motor oil, pick up after your pet, take your car to a car wash and follow the directions when you spray and fertilize your yard. Polluted stormwater runoff can have many **adverse effects** on plants, fish, animals and people.

Sewer drains and storm drains are two completely separate drainage systems. The sewer system takes all household wastewater from toilets, showers and sinks and routes it through your **plumbing system** and directs it to a treatment plant.

YOUR DRINKING WATER

Our Annual Water Quality Report for 2021 is now available. Every year we provide a report full of water quality data to see how Antioch's water quality compares to state and federal drinking water standards. The City of Antioch purchases untreated water from CCWD, treats it in a City-owned treatment plant, and delivers it to customers through the City's distribution pipes. The City can also pump directly from the San Joaquin River or purchase treated water from CCWD.

The City's Water Treatment Plant ensures that the potable water distributed by the City is of the highest quality possible and meets or **exceeds all State and Federal** health standards. DRY CONDITIONS CALL FOR WATER USE RESTRICTIONS FOR CITY OF ANTIOCH

California is in its **third consecutive year** of dry conditions, prompting Governor Newsom to issue Executive Order N-7-22 on March 28, 2022, directing the State Water Resources Control Board ("SWRCB") to consider adopting emergency regulations to increase water conservation. On May 24, 2022, the SWRCB passed Resolution No. 2022-0018, **adopting emergency regulations** to reduce water demand and improve water conservation.

To comply with these emergency regulations, on June 14, 2022, the Antioch City Council adopted a resolution declaring a Stage 2 water shortage, implementing the measures identified in the City of Antioch's Water Shortage Contingency Plan, https://www.antiochca.gov/public-works-department/, under the 'Water Conservation Links' tab. The City is also recommending, based on a supply allocation letter from Contra Costa Water District (CCWD), a 15% reduction of potable water usage by all residents. Failure to comply may result in penalties as allowed by the City of Antioch Municipal Code 6-10.02.

To prevent the unreasonable use of water and promote water conservation, the City prohibits potable water usage for the irrigation of non-functional turf at commercial, industrial, and institutional sites and for **nonessential purposes** (City of Antioch Municipal Code 6-10.04 – Nonessential Use of Water Prohibited). The nonessential prohibited actions include, but are not limited to:

- a. Permitting water to flow onto a sidewalk, driveway, or street, or escape down a gutter, ditch, or other service drains;
- b. Outside watering that results in excessive flooding or runoff into a gutter, drain, walkway or street;
- c. Using City-furnished water for non-recirculating decorative fountains or filling of decorative lakes or ponds:
- **d.** Washing of paved or other hard surface areas, including sidewalks, walkways, driveways, patios, and parking areas with City-furnished water;
- e. Failing to repair a controllable leak of water; and/or
- **f.** Using a hose without an automatic shutoff nozzle

Stage 2 Demand Reduction Actions

The following restrictions from Antioch's Water Shortage Contingency Plan will be implemented once the City declares a water shortage:



- Stage 2 Restaurants may only serve water upon request.
- Stage 2 Prohibit vehicle washing, except at facilities using recycled or recirculating water.
- Stage 2 Restrict water use for decorative water features, such as fountains, that uses potable water and is non-recirculating.
- **Stage 2** Require commercial kitchens to use pre-rinse spray valves.
- Stage 2 Require to opt out of linen services at lodging establishments.
- Stage 2 Allow filling of swimming pools only when an appropriate cover is in place.

MICROBUSINESS GRANT NOW AVAILABLE

The California Office of the Small Business Advocate has awarded funding to the Chabot - Las Positas Community College District for the Microbusiness COVID-19 Relief Grant Program to provide grants to microbusinesses in the counties of Alameda, Amador, Contra Costa, and El Dorado.

This program will provide grants of \$2,500 to microbusiness (businesses that have fewer than 5 employees and earn less than \$50,000 per year) that were in operation in 2019, still in operation, and were impacted by the COVID-19 public health restrictions. 












OPEN REWARDS PROGRAM
