Police



This past week, 7 of our Police Explorers attended a 4-day, live-in academy in the City of Vallejo. There were 45 Explorers from different police agencies in Solano County and Antioch in attendance. The Antioch Police Department was the only agency outside of Solano County invited to attend. This academy gave the Explorers in-depth exposure into what the actual police academy and training is like. They were up early every day completing physical fitness exercises and drill. Afterward, they attended daily classes and instruction which included leadership, crime scene investigation, building searches, marine operations, force options, and traffic safety (to name a few). At the end of the academy, these recruits new found knowledge and expertise was tested during practical scenarios.

During graduation, Antioch Police Explorer, Johnny Martinez was awarded Top Male Athlete. This valuable youth program provides opportunities for our Explorers to develop essential life skills such as leadership, discipline, teamwork, and critical thinking. 
Lateral Police Officer, Devon Wenger, was sworn-in on July 30, 2018. Devon grew up in the Antioch/Brentwood/Oakley area and graduated from Freedom High School in 2010. After high school, Devon enlisted in the U.S. Army where he served for five years as a Military Police Officer and was deployed to Afghanistan. Devon continues to serve our country as a member of the California National Guard. Devon worked for the Sonoma County Sheriff's Department for about a year and a half before joining the Antioch Police Department. Devon is our 95th Sworn Police Officer. Lateral Police Officers are a great addition as they typically have a much faster training process than those without previous law enforcement experience. Since Lateral Officers already have law enforcement experience, their training focuses on familiarizing them with the geography and hot spots of the city as well as the policies and procedures of the Antioch Police Department. On August 14, 2018, the City Council will consider a series of guidelines addressing the recent Ordinance allowing the approval of Cannabis Businesses in the City of Antioch. These guidelines will offer direction and clarity for the operation and establishment of a Cannabis Business and will serve to improve the quality of applications and operations in the City of Antioch. The Community Development Department began accepting Use Permit applications for Cannabis Businesses on July 27, 2018. Planning

At the August 1st Planning Commission meeting, a zoning text amendment to the Accessory Dwelling Units ordinance will be heard. The proposed amendments are in response to 2017 State laws that made changes to the State's Accessory Dwelling Unit law. The proposed amendments include: clarifying that accessory dwelling units may be built on properties zoned to allow a single-family or multifamily use, allowing accessory dwelling units to be built in conjunction with a proposed single-family dwelling, reducing some parking requirements, and allowing offstreet parking spaces that must be replaced when an off-street parking structure is demolished or converted into an accessory dwelling unit to be provided in any configuration on the lot. After the Planning Commission meeting, the text amendments will be taken to the City Council for adoption.

Public Works

Landscaping

Our contracted landscape maintenance crews continue working on rights of way (ROW) and medians in the following areas:

- Lone Tree Way at Indian Hills Drive and heading east – Medians.
- Deer Valley Road at Rocky Point Drive and heading south – ROW.
- Deer Valley Road at Asilomar Drive and heading North – ROW.
- Fredrickson Lane at Noakes Drive to Golf Course Road

Crews completed the landscape trim and clean up on E. 18th Street at Hillcrest Avenue earlier this week.





Engineering & Development Services

Caltrans is scheduled to begin landscape improvements in Antioch later this year. Landscaping will be installed within the freeway and along some adjacent City streets and parcels, at on-off interchange ramps and their medians. This project will utilize drought tolerant plants and recycled water irrigation wherever feasible. Caltrans will maintain the new plantings and irrigation for a 3-year Plant Establishment Period after which the City will assume maintenance responsibilities.

- **Segment 2** of this project begins at Somersville Road/Auto Center Drive and continues to Cavallo Road. Construction is expected to begin mid-August and be completed by April 2019. 55% of the irrigation systems in Segment 2 uses recycled water.
- Segment 3 picks up at Hillcrest Avenue at the new BART station and continues along Highway 4 southeast to Laurel Road and northeast to Highway 160. This last segment is currently under design review; construction is expected to begin in January 2019.

These landscape improvements bring a welcome beautification to our community. We will post future updates on how the project is progressing and keep you informed of traffic alerts when motorists may be impacted.

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

Collection Systems

The Collection System Lateral Maintenance crew is currently working at Clearbrook Road. The Maintenance Lateral crew plays a critical role in assessing the service life, and physical condition of over 31,000 city maintained wastewater laterals. During field inspections, pipe defects are identified and classified according to a standard pipe condition code.

This systematic method provides accurate and consistent data which is used to prioritize future maintenance



Completing these inspections and proactively conducting maintenance plays a vital role in protecting our collection system, the environment and the health and safety of the members of our community. Lateral Maintenance Inspection crews completed 155 lateral wastewater inspections this past week. If you experience a sewer problem remember to call us first to see if we can help you.

A Special City Council Meeting was held on Tuesday, July 31st at 5:00 p.m. to amend Resolution No. 2018/92 Section 2 Ballot Language, the City Council's Sales



Tax Ballot Measure, to bring it under the 75-word limit.

A Special City Council Meeting was also held on Friday, August 3rd at 2:30 p.m. to amend Ordinance No. 2145-C-S (An Ordinance of the City Council of the City of Antioch submitting a Measure to the voters of the City of Antioch to amend Article 4 of Chapter 5 of Title 3 of the Antioch Municipal Code to increase the City's Transactions and Use Tax from a half-cent to one cent and to impose this tax until repealed by the voters).

Fair Political Practices Commission (FPPC) Campaign Finance Reports for open candidate, officeholder and local Political Action Committees were required to file their semi-annual Form 460 or Form 470 Campaign Finance Report to the City Clerk's Office no later than July 31, 2018. A total of four committees failed to file on time and will be assessed a \$10 per day Late Filing Fee. Committees that fail to file within ten days after July 31st will be referred to the FPPC Enforcement Division. A status of Campaign Committee filings is posted at the City Clerk's counter at City Hall. Campaign Finance reports are available for public review at the City Clerk's office.

- Sales Tax Citizens' Oversight Committee (Extended deadline date to apply: August 17, 2018)
- Planning Commission (Partial Term) deadline to apply: August 31, 2018

To be considered for these volunteer positions, a completed application must be received in the Office of the City Clerk by 5:00 p.m. on the date listed above. 
