The attendance for the Candidate Forum for the City Council and Mayor Candidates was just under 100, which made it the largest turnout for a Candidate Forum in Antioch Tuesday night.

The City Clerk's Office provided candidate contact information for the Mayoral & City Council candidates and AUSD Trustees to the sponsors of upcoming candidate forums and the media.

Requests for City of Antioch public documents under the California Public Records Act must be sent to the City Clerk's office. Request forms are available on the City Website and at the City Clerk's Counter at City Hall. Requests can be made in person, by mail or email. Email requests must be sent to cityclerk@ci.antioch.ca.us to ensure a timely response.

The City Clerk's Office received 2 California Public Records Act requests which were forwarded to the appropriate departments for a response.

The City Clerk, Deputy City Clerk, City Attorney, Administrative Services Director and the Police Records Supervisor travelled to Vallejo Wednesday afternoon to meet with the Vallejo City Clerk and the Vallejo Police Records Supervisor to see how they handle California Public Records Request using a program which provides immediate response to requests received, sends the requests to the appropriate department, sends notices as the 10 day deadline approaches, advises if a 14-day extension is needed and posts the responses to the requester and online for anyone in the public to review. Requests for

records from the police department are sent via a link to the Police Department which handles public record requests under a different set of rules. The program also directs requesters of property deeds, birth, death and marriage records via a link to the County Clerk/Recorder's office.

RECREATION UPDATES

- Last week, an interactive e-mail blast was sent to families that detailed upcoming programs and activities that begin on September 12th. Email "Shout Outs" has strengthened our marketing strategy, along with social media, to get our message out to more people. The goal is to increase awareness of the Recreation Department and its programs, grow customer loyalty, and improve City connections within the community.
- Labor Day Weekend marked the end of the 2016 summer season at the Antioch Water Park. The Park will still be open for school and large group rentals through next week, and will continue to host Lap Swim, Water Aerobics, Parent-Tot Swim Time, and Swim Lessons in the Lap Pool through October 15th
- On Tuesday, Water Park staff updated the website to reflect the Fall 2016 program times and information for the Lap Pool.
- Water Park staff is working on organizing the 2016 files for group ticket sales, buyouts, slide rental, and tent rentals; updating forms and information in preparation for 2017.
- Last week, staff began filming for the Antioch Water Park 2017 season, which will include showcasing the new Spray Park and promoting job and volunteer opportunities for youth.
- On Wednesday, the Contra Costa Sheriff's Department enjoyed their annual Water Park buyout with very warm weather!
- Last week, staff participated in an ACTIVE Network training on the younger participant lifecycle. Over 1,400 participant parents were surveyed to gain insight into how parents find programs, and what factors influence their decisions to register their children. Surveyed program directors used the same questions to compare program offerings and strategies to what parents are looking for in a program. Data was analyzed with some powerful statistics to compose an optimized community member lifecycle. The information and training recommendations will help develop strong and loyal customers.

- Last week, maintenance staff arranged for repair work resulting from the recent fire prevention inspections at all Recreation Facilities.
- On Tuesday, Water Park Maintenance Staff met with the Parks Supervisor from Contra Loma Regional Park. Staff showed off the Water Park mechanical systems to East Bay Regional Parks and gave some perspective and ideas to help our sister agency make some technological advances in its own operations.
- Throughout the Week, Maintenance staff provided feedback to CIP in regard to the Prewett Community Park projects.
- On Tuesday, The Antioch Council of Teens met and discussed upcoming September events. ACT will be doing a teen kayaking trip on Sunday September 25th, with 9 teens already registered – it is gearing up to be a fun day on the Delta!
- The Antioch Council of Teens will also be out for Coastal Cleanup Day, the teens will work on handing out gloves and garbage bags to volunteers.
- Coastal Cleanup Day is Saturday, September 17th and there are three locations to volunteer: the Antioch Marina, Fulton Shipyard Road and the Water Park. Boy Scout Troop 159 is volunteering at the Water Park, which is the best location for families and kids. Come help clean up the creek!

Senior Center Services

- Last week, 328 meals were served through the C.C. Café. The daily lunch and socialization help prevent heart attacks, depression, asthma and congestive heart failure. No membership or income requirements are required to eat at the C.C. Cafe. Thursday's lunch was an exciting day as visitors re-told the story of the power outage.
- On Tuesday, staff attended the monthly Senior Citizens Club Board meeting. Staff recommended that the Club invest in updating their web page. The board approved this recommendation.
- Last week, ten seniors attended the Senior Computer Class, which started up for the fall session. This class weekly helps older adults improve their basic computer skills.
- On Wednesday, 17 seniors enjoyed the movie 'Creed' during Movie Mania!
- On Thursday, the Spanish class increased in numbers by 250%. The class is limited to ten per session and is really sparking an interest in many seniors.
- Last week, staff created a large font program schedule to be posted in the Dining Hall for easy readability by all visitors.
- There are over 40 vendors registered for the Resource Fair including businesses, health organizations, non-profits, and medical practitioners within Antioch and throughout Contra Costa County. The Resource Fair is scheduled on September 30th. Mark your calendars! The first 150 participants will receive complimentary tote bags with the City and Club logos to promote the Senior Center.
- To date the Senior Club has received new and renewal membership applications from 959 seniors.

Homeless:

Zero: 2016 - The Zero: 2016 Leadership Team from Contra Costa, including the City's representative (T House), will be attending a one-day Action Camp with Community Solutions, Santa Cruz County and Sacramento County. The focus for the day will be on strategies and action to build "By Name" lists of Veteran and chronically homeless persons to better understand their unique needs, implementation of Coordinated Entry Systems, and identifying strategies to move the needle towards Functional Zero for Veterans and those experiencing chronic homelessness.

In addition to coaches from Community Solutions, we will have support from their technical assistance collaborative including colleagues from Abt Associates, the Technical Assistance Collaborative (TAC) and the National Veterans Administration Office. This high-powered team of specialists are working closely with the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to find permanent solutions to homelessness throughout the nation.

- Community Solutions, the national coordinator of the Zero: 2016 Campaign is an internationally recognized non-profit organization working toward a future without homelessness. They adapt successful problem-solving tools and strategies from diverse sectors like public health, manufacturing and design to civic and human services issues, supporting communities to develop their own solutions.

- Abt Associates is a global leader in research, evaluation and program implementation in the fields of health, social and environmental policy, and international development.
- The Technical Assistance Collaborative, Inc. (TAC) is a national nonprofit organization that advances proven solutions to the housing and community support services needs of low-income people with disabilities and people who are homeless.

Contra Costa is very fortunate to have access to these partners, and to be able to tap the solutions being developed in the surrounding areas of Sacramento and Santa Cruz, as we attempt to craft the most effective system to eliminate homelessness in our community.

Coordinated Entry - The results of the Homeless Continuum of Care HUD Funding Round 2016 and Coordinated Entry project funding will be made available later in the week.

Project Homeless Connect - Project Homeless Connect will be held at the County Fairgrounds in Antioch on Thursday, October 13th, from 9 am to 3 pm. Homeless Connect is a one-day, one-stop event that provides on-site healthcare, social services and housing resources to persons experiencing homelessness. Last Week's Irrigation Repairs and Service:

- Parks Citywide: Water restrictions have been relaxed for your City Parks, however, reduced water use continues except at the Recycled Water Parks.
- Diablo West Park: 4 sprinklers were replaced. 1 sprinkler was repaired.
- Hansen Park- A leaking shrub valve was repaired.
- Knoll Park: An inoperative turf valve was replaced.
- Marchetti Park: A plugged sewer line was cleared and a leaking toilet was repaired.
- Prewett Water Park: A leaking turf valve was replaced along with 7 broken sprinklers.
- L St. – 4 sprinklers repaired, 1 R.P. turned back on, 2 controllers reprogrammed and 1 valve rebuilt.
- Hillcrest Ave. – 3 sprinklers repaired, 2 valves rebuilt, 1 nozzle adjusted, 1 valve replaced and 1 controller repaired.

- Tiered water rates are still in effect and were calculated to reflect the cost of service to treat and deliver water to the community. These rates were developed independent of the drought status and will remain in effect. The State has officially declared the drought is over and removed the 25% statewide water conservation goal. Beginning in June of this year, the City of Antioch is mandated to conserve water based on a three year projected "stress test" formula provided by the State. This will remain in effect until January 2017. Based on our results, we have a sufficient water supply for our water production rates and will not have a conservation target. The City of Antioch is no longer requiring restricted watering days. We still encourage all conservation efforts where possible to protect our valuable resource. All of the "prohibited water activities" as outlined by the State are still in effect. This includes: washing off driveways and walkways, irrigating 48 hours after a measurable rainfall and irrigating in such a way that causes runoff to non landscaped areas. To see a complete list, search saveourwater.com or other similar websites on the California drought. Water customers did a fantastic job with their water conservation efforts. We were able to meet our State mandated goal of 28%. Thank you all for the conservation efforts and success we achieved. Please continue to protect this precious and limited resource.

Engineering & Development Services

- Almondridge East Subdivision 8880, an 81-unit single family home development by KB Homes, located between East 18th Street and Oakley Road, east of Phillips Lane and west of the State Highway 160: Staff is reviewing plot plans for ongoing new home construction and provided a punch list for offsite improvements (for bond reduction purposes). Staff is reviewing backup documents for traffic signal reimbursement.
- Buchanan Crossings Shopping Center, a 103,139 square foot commercial center on a 13.5-acre site located at the northwest corner of Somersville Road and Buchanan Road: CVS and Grocery Outlet stores have been open for business for a while and Pad E plan check is under review. Environmental clearances and the United States Bureau of Reclamation (USBR) permitting requirements for Phase 2 development are in progress.

- City-owned cell sites, various locations: Staff is performing site visits and review of land leases, 100% construction drawings, consent letters, photo-sims and related technical reports and materials in response to various applications for equipment upgrades and site modifications.
- Delta Courtyard Apartments, located at 701 and 810 Wilbur Avenue, a 126-unit multi-family apartment complex: Staff prepared conditions of approval and reviewed the parking study for Pacific West Communities' application. A Planning Commission hearing is scheduled for September 7th.
- The Habit Burger, 2424 Mahogany Way: New restaurant development. The project was approved at the July 20th Planning Commission meeting. Staff is reviewing construction drawings for building permit.
- Laurel Ranch, a 180-unit housing development by Richland Communities, located at the eastern terminus of existing Laurel Road and west of Highway 4: The project was recommended to the City Council for approval at the July 20th Planning Commission meeting. Staff is working with the developer on Laurel Road concerns in preparation for going to Council.
- Nelson Ranch Subdivision 6893, end of Wildhorse Road: Staff performed a site inspection and provided a punch list in response to the developer's request for release of the warranty bond.
- Park Ridge Phase I, a 123-unit housing development by Davidon Homes, located west of Canada Valley Road and east of Highway 4: The subdivision plan and map checks have been completed and staff is working with the developer to form a district to fund offsite improvements. The developer has applied for an "at-risk" grading permit. Staff is reviewing proposed Slatten Ranch Road infrastructure improvements.
- SR4 (Segment 2) Contra Loma Blvd. Interchange/ 'G' Street Overcrossing Project: The project has been accepted by the State. City staff continues to work with Caltrans to complete the punch list.
- SR4 (Segment 3A) 'A' Street/Lone Tree Way Interchange, Cavallo Road/Garrow Drive Undercrossing Project: City staff is working with Caltrans to complete the punch list. There will be lane closures in both directions on A Street/Lone Tree Way between Rossi Ave. and E. Tregallas Rd. from 9 am to 3 pm. The signal at Sunset/A Street/Rossi is now working and the Sunset Dr. extension between A Street and Bryan Ave. is open. Pedestrians and motorists are advised to exercise caution while travelling through these areas.
- SR4 (Segment 3B) Hillcrest Avenue Interchange and BART Tunnel Project: Staff prepared a punch list for Caltrans' contractor to complete. City staff is working with the CCTA to complete the punch list. There will be lane closures in both directions on Hillcrest Avenue between Larkspur Drive and Sunset Drive from 9:00 am to 3:00 pm. Pedestrians and motorists are advised to exercise caution while travelling through this area.
- BART Parking Lot and Maintenance Facility: Staff approved the design for a proposed 12" sanitary sewer main from the new Maintenance Facility, north of the S.P.R.R. railroad line to the southerly extension of Willow Avenue and is reviewing

grant deeds for public easement dedications. Staff returned comments to BART's Ownership and Maintenance of Utilities Agreement for storm drainage improvements.

- Vineyard Self-Storage, located at E. 18th Street/Vineyard Drive: Staff is preparing conditions of approval for American Recess' application. A Planning Commission hearing is scheduled for September 7th.
- Aviano, an approved 533 unit housing development located west of the current terminus of Hillcrest Avenue, east and north of Dozier-Libby Medical High School: Staff has reviewed the 3rd submittal for the first phase of construction documents and returned the plans and other documents for revisions.
- Staff is working with the developers to create Community Facilities Districts for Sand Creek Focus Area landscape maintenance.
- Tabora Gardens, a senior apartment complex on James Donlon and Tabora Drive: Staff has completed our review of the plans, reports and other documents and will be issuing an encroachment permit.
- Child Care Education Building in Williamson Ranch Plaza: Staff has returned the plans with comments. We are waiting for quitclaim of easement from Contra Costa County Flood Control District.
- 326 Nash Avenue: The owner/applicant is requesting to merge parcels. We are working with the applicant to take the merger to the Planning Commission for approval.

Capital Improvements Division

- Country Hills Drive and Vista Grande Drive Water Main Replacement: A-S Pipelines, Inc. has completed all work associated with this project. Acceptance of this work is schedule to be considered at the September 27th City Council meeting.
- Sunset Booster Pump Station Replacement: Tesco Controls is manufacturing and testing the new equipment panels and pump facility controls.
- Zone I Transmission Pipeline Rehabilitation at HWY 4: RMC Water and Environment is incorporating the City's recent comments into the contract documents.
- Downtown Sanitary Sewer Rehabilitation: Staff is developing project plans and specifications.
- Water Treatment Plant Disinfection Improvements: CDM Smith is preparing design documents that include the use of non-diluted sodium hypochlorite and ammonia sulfate.
- West Antioch Creek Channel Improvements: Condemnation negotiations are proceeding regarding acquisition of property and easements located at 1400 and 1420 West 10th Street. U.S. Fish and Wildlife Services' review this project's Biological Assessment continues to be delayed by the agencies current focus on the CA WaterFix project.
- Water Treatment Plant 'A' Electrical Improvements: TJC and Associates is developing the 90% draft project plans and specifications for electrical modification to Plant 'A' of the Water Treatment Plant.

- Brackish Water Desalinization Plant: Carollo Engineers is developing a revised facility layout. State Water Resources Control Board continues to review the City's State Revolving Fund loan application.
- North East Annexation Infrastructure Improvements: BKF Engineering is now under contract to provide engineering services and preliminary plans, estimates and studies for the planning and the design of infrastructure improvements needed to serve Annexation Areas 1 and 2B. BKF will set up a Kick Off meeting with staff in October.
- 2016 Pavement Management Program: MCK Services, Inc. completed the pavement rehabilitation activities throughout the City and is working on replacing the traffic signal loops. The project included improvements to major arterial streets such as Lone Tree Way, James Donlon Blvd., Somersville Road, Buchanan Road, Golf Course Road, and Hillcrest Ave., and various residential streets north of Highway 4. The project is expected to be completed and accepted by the City Council at the September 27, 2016, meeting.
- Transportation Impact Fee Study: Staff is working with the consultant, EPS, to finalize the land use forecasts, the transportation improvement list, the network to be used in the traffic model, and proposed fee. EPS is developing several scenarios for the fees; the final draft Fee Study is scheduled to be presented to the City Council for public review and comments before the end of the year.
- Prewett Water Park Improvements: Sierra Valley Construction continues to work on the playground and the spray ground facilities. Both projects are scheduled to be completed in September 2016.
- Rubberized Cape Seal Program: The Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery (CalRecycle) issued a Notice of Grant Funds available for Rubberized Cape Seal projects for FY 16-17 for the maximum grant amount of \$350,000. The grant application due date is October 26, 2016.
- Antioch Pavement Management Street Survey: AMS Consulting Services will perform a comprehensive City wide pavement condition survey of all city streets. Inspection of the pavement condition will be done using a Mobil Mapping System equipment. The mobile mapping vehicle will start the Citywide pavement inspection in September and completed by November 2016.

Water Treatment Plant

- Cleaned Solar Bees out on the municipal reservoir. Solar Bees circulate the water in the reservoir; cleaning the Solar Bees prevents weeds from restricting the circulation. Also cleaned the staff gage on the tower.
- Treated the municipal reservoir for the second time to control algae growth and taste and odor problems.
- Repaired chemical lines to the elevated tank.

Water Distribution

- Water Distribution staff had 237 stops for water service including disconnections.
- Water Distribution staff had a total of 70 USA tickets completed for utility location.

- Water Distribution meter reading has now started for the month of September.
- No drought notices were issued this week.
 - The city of Antioch now has a 0% water conservation goal thru January of 2017 based on the State of California's "stress test". However the following prohibitions will remain in place:
 - Watering outdoor landscapes in a manner that causes excessive runoff such that water flows onto adjacent property, non-irrigated areas, private and public walkways, roadways, parking lots, or structures.
 - Using a hose without a shut off nozzle.
 - Washing paved or other hard-surfaced areas, including sidewalks, walkways, driveways, patios and parking areas.
 - Use of City furnished water for non-recalculating decorative fountains or filling decorative lakes or ponds.
 - Failing to repair a controllable water leak.
- Staff continues to monitor water meters and usage at all City buildings and parks for water conservation.
- Staff continues to respond to drought hotline inquiries.
- Staff responded to customer calls regarding water maintenance issues city wide.
- Staff replaced a fire hydrant on Larkspur Dr.
- Staff replaced a water service on Tehachapi Ct.
- Staff repaired a water line on James Donlon Blvd.
- Staff replaced a water service on W. Madill Cir.
- Staff replaced an air relief valve on Hillside Dr.
- Staff now performing proactive leak detection program.
- State mandated annual backflow testing program is on schedule.
- Staff performed City wide preventative maintenance on fire hydrants and water quality flushing.
- Staff attended training thru AWWA for upcoming Senate Bill 555 mandate (Annual Water Loss Control Audit).
- Staff hauled off green waste, asphalt and concrete for recycling as well as cleaned up debris at the city's Fulton yard.

Public Works Operations – Parks and Landscape

- Playground and Park Safety Inspections: Completed at Chaparral, Dallas Ranch, Diablo West, Hansen, Heidorn and Marchetti Parks. Park follow-up inspections are ongoing at Prewett Water Park.
- Antioch Community Park Soccer Fields: Abated seven wasps' nests along the fence perimeter.
- Diablo West Park: Repaired one sprinkler and replaced four.
- Hansen Park: Repaired a leaking shrub valve.
- Hillcrest Park: Removed a tree branch failure. No injury or damage occurred.
- Knoll Park: Replaced an inoperative turf valve.
- Marchetti Park: Cleared a plugged sewer line and repaired a leaking toilet.

- Prewett Water Park: Replaced a leaking turf valve and seven broken sprinklers.
- Memorial Tree Plaques: Installed and dedicated two plaques at Mira Vista Hills Park.
- Tree Removal Permits: Approved six tree removal permits for PG&E: One Sycamore and one California Pepper on Hillcrest Ave., two Sycamores on Morgan Way, and one Pear and one California Pepper at Country Manor Park.
- Irrigation: Repaired 65 irrigation leaks on City property as needed.
- Trim Crews: Hillcrest Avenue, Mt. Hamilton Drive, Country Hills Drive, Police Department, Phillips Lane, Auto Center Drive, Somersville Road, Wilbur Avenue, James Donlon Boulevard rights of way, Viera Avenue, and Wild Horse Road.
- Spot Spray: Heidorn Road, Vista Grande Drive, Golf Course Road, Slatten Ranch Road, Canada Valley Road, and Country Hills Drive medians; Mokelumne Drive, Deer Valley Drive, and Canada Valley Trail.

Public Works Operations – Street Maintenance

- Graffiti: Crews removed graffiti from numerous areas around the City.
- Signs: Crews replaced four existing signs due to poor reflectivity or line of sight issues.
- Red Curb: Crews continue to prep red curb for painting on Sycamore Dr., Mahogany Dr., and L. St. Crews painted three miles of red curb in other areas citywide.
- Lane Delineators: Crews replaced 1,950 raised pavement markers.
- Potholes: Filled 10 potholes.
- Road Stencils: Crews restriped thermo stop bars utilizing 700 pounds of thermo.
- Slurry Seal: Crews slurry sealed the parking lot adjacent to the Collections building.

Public Works Utilities – Collections Division

- Calls for Sewer Service: Received and responded to 17 calls for service from the public; responding crews televised 455 linear feet of public sewer laterals connecting to the City's sewer system.
- Sewer Mains: Daily preventative maintenance performed on over 17,609 linear feet of sewer main lines.
- Quarterly Sewer Main Cleaning: The route schedule is under review to increase inspection frequency of identified 'hot spots' and integrate a proactive preventative cleaning schedule for the 'hot spots.'
- Sewer Lateral Maintenance Program (SLMP): Crews repaired 1 lateral that was severely damaged requiring immediate repairs and televised 13 sewer laterals.
- Manhole Inspection Program: Crews inspected 66 manholes. Manholes are inspected for loose lids, debris, locking mechanisms, and status of infrastructure for future maintenance and rehabilitation. We are updating the program and processes for integration in our computerized maintenance management system.

- Closed Caption Televising (CCTV): The CCTV Preventative Maintenance inspects sewer mains to identify the condition and causes of blockages and SSOs.
- Sanitary Sewer Overflow (SSO) Reduction Program: Staff is working on formal inspection criteria to inspect manholes in rural areas. The use of “SMART Manholes” in strategic areas will be utilized that will alert leadership staff within the division of potential SSO’s. This program will also address the need for locking mechanisms.
- Closed Caption Televising (CCTV): Crews televised 5,412 feet of sewer main lines this past week. The CCTV Preventative Maintenance crew inspects sewer mains to identify the condition and causes of blockages and SSOs.
- NPDES (National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System): Crews removed 159 yards of trash and green waste. Assisted Code Enforcement with removal of 7 yards of debris from homeless encampments. Removed 15 yards of illegal dumping. Weeds abated from bank to low water line in channels 2.5 acres. Sprayed weeds from bank to low water line in channels 0.9 acres. These activities ensure the City meets the federal Clean Water Act requirements of municipalities discharging storm water into waterways. Proactive preventative maintenance is restricted to the months of April through October.

Public Works Operations – Fleet Division

- Preventative Maintenance: 16 services on City vehicles as scheduled.
- Unscheduled Repairs: 54 unscheduled necessary repairs to City vehicles.

Public Works Operations – Municipal Marina

- The Marina approved one application for permanent berthing, and responded to six berthing enquiries.
- Maintenance: Continued to paint several B dock kneeboards completing 60%. Removed graffiti at sails structure.
- Filming of “Forgotten Evil” was completed featuring areas of the Antioch Marina, film to be released in early 2017.
- Submitted a grant proposal for a new kayak launch facility at the Boat Launch Ramp and Marina.
- Salmon Fishing along with a boating (the boat launch was busy all weekend) brought the public out to enjoy the Marina on Labor Day.
- Advertising and Outreach: Approved advertisements placed in Yachtsman magazine reaching over 40,000 boaters, Craigslist advertisements placed in Bay Area, Stockton, Sacramento, Monterey, and Santa Cruz listings. POLICE DEPARTMENT UPDATES

When the victim told Kinder to stop throwing trash, Kinder threatened his life. Kinder was arrested and booked into county jail for felony threats.
