Mayor and Members of the City Council:

This is the City Manager's Report for the week ending September 29, 2017.

CITY MANAGER'S OFFICE

Delta 6, a quarterly meeting of East County mayors, city managers and our County supervisors met this week to discuss issues including the Concord Naval Weapons Station and projected impacts to Highway 4 and interchanges, the family justice center, a collaborative East County proposal for the facility Amazon is looking to locate, and the upcoming EC2 Economic Summit scheduled for October 20th at the Antioch Community Center.

On Saturday I was able to stop by the 1st Annual Rivertown Brews and BBQ Cook-Off which was a huge success with 15 entries. At the same time, the Antioch Arts and Cultural Foundation was holding the 7th Annual Nature's Canvas Exhibit at the beautiful Lynn House Gallery, where there was an artist reception. Both events brought lots of folks downtown and showcased our amazing Rivertown.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Last week Amazon sparked national news by announcing plans for a second headquarters (HQ2). The race amongst cities has started. Amazon is taking bids through a response for proposal (RFP) process due by October 19th. Antioch is working with the three other East Contra Costa County cities to complete the RFP.





Antioch, Pittsburg, Brentwood, and Oakley economic staff are working together to complete components of the RFP. Regional knowledge sharing and work is important to Antioch's success. We have found that by collaborating with other East Contra Costa County cities on proposals, strategies, branding and marketing the region, makes our efforts stronger. There are eight specific components that Amazon seeks from cities or regional efforts that include: site/building, capital and operating costs, incentives, labor force, logistics, time to operations, cultural community fit, and community/quality of life.



Food Truck Thursdays had another successful event at the Antioch Community Center! The Foodie Crew had a line-up of trucks including

BBQ, gyros, pasta, and desserts. This is a food truck market that will take place every Thursday night from 5:00 p.m. to

RECREATION

On Monday, staff conducted a site visit at the Antioch Community Center with The Contra Costa Zero Tolerance for Human Trafficking Coalition to discuss training space and the location for the artwork for the upcoming Red Sand Project, which will occur during Food Truck Thursdays on October 19th, 2017.

Prewett Community Park serves as the home course for the Deer Valley High School cross country team. Their first meet of the season was this Wednesday and four schools participated. Junior Varsity and Varsity participants, along with their families,



made for an exciting afternoon in the park! There are two more meets coming up in October.

Last Friday, excited participants had a blast in the Intro to Kayaking Class being offered with Delta Kayak Adventures at the Antioch Marina. As many physical benefits as there are to paddling, there are just as many mental ones. Whether drifting along with the help of river waves or going through strong currents, kayaking is a great way to destress. Our goal is to explore how outdoor sports make us healthier, happier and full of adventure in our own back yard! Registration is open for more classes this fall.



This past weekend, teens between the ages of 12-17 participated in the Babysitting Safety & Certification program. Certified babysitters, unlike regular babysitters, are individuals who have received specialized training in babysitting duties and responsibilities. Our certified babysitters attend a 4.5 hour training program, which prepares them to provide safe and high quality care in our community.

Recreation's drop-in sports programs continue to be very popular at the Antioch Community Center Gymnasium. Tuesdays from 3:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m., there is youth open gym for those 11-16 years of age. Also on Tuesdays is volleyball open gym from 7:00 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. for ages 17 years and up. On Sundays, there is basketball for 17 years and up from 12:30 p.m. to 2:30 p.m., and pickleball for those 15 years and up from 3:30 p.m. to 5:30 p.m.

Over the last week, 366 affordable, healthy meals were served through the CoCo Café. This program helps prevent heart attacks, depression, asthma and congestive heart failure. No membership or income requirements are required to eat at the CoCo Café. All supplies are provided by the County for participating cafés.

Last week, the Antioch Water Park hosted the Bay Area Public Pool Operator's Association (BAPPOA) fall meeting. Agencies from as far away as Sacramento, Roseville, and San Jose attended the meeting.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Building Inspection Services Division. During the month of September, the Building Inspection Services Division issued 13 building permits for new homes as part of the Park Ridge development by Davidon Homes. Thirteen additional permits are pending and will be issued in October. Planning Division. The Planning Division is currently circulating two environmental documents for public comment:

 An Initial Study/Mitigated Negative Declaration (IS/MND) for the Wildflower Station project is currently available for public review at <u>http://ci.antioch.ca.us/CityGov/CommDev/PlanningDivision/Environmental-</u> <u>docs.htm/</u>. The Project is located on an approximately 23-acre site generally north of the intersection of Wildflower Drive and Hillcrest Avenue (APN 051-140-002). The proposed Project would include a combination of residential and



commercial uses within the overall site. Commercial development (10.45 acres) would include nine buildings ranging from 3,225 square feet to 23,723 square feet along the west edge of the property fronting to Hillcrest Avenue. Residential uses would include 22 single-family homes (4.05 acres) located on the northeast edge of the property that would be adjacent to existing residences on Wildflower Drive and 98 condominiums (7.0 acres) generally between the single-family and commercial uses.



An Initial Study/Mitigated Negative Declaration for the Rocketship Elementary Project currently available public School is for review at http://ci.antioch.ca.us/CityGov/CommDev/PlanningDivision/Environmentaldocs.htm. The project is located at 1700 Cavallo Road. The Project would include the demolition of the existing, vacant office building and the development of a new charter elementary school with a total building area of 31.052-squarefeet. The Project would serve up to 600 students between Pre-K and 5th Grade with 32 full-time staff. The applicant has requested a rezone from Regional Commercial District (C-3); to Professional Office District (C-0).

Planning Commission Update. On September 20, 2017, the Planning Commission considered policy updates to the General Plan Land Use Element addressing the Sand Creek Focus Area and recommended that the City Council direct staff to develop a Supplemental Environmental Impact Report to evaluate the update's impacts. The City Council will consider this item at its October 24, 2017 meeting.

In addition, the Planning Commission considered a request from the developers of the Promenade-Vineyards at Sand Creek project for amendments to the Development Agreement and modifications to the project Conditions of Approval. The amendments would provide the developer with a project subsidy of up to \$3.1 million and would reduce the project's requirements to complete adjacent roadway improvements. The intent of these changes is to make the project more financially viable and to encourage its initiation sooner than later. The Planning Commission elected not to forward a recommendation to the City Council, but to take a neutral position. The City Council will consider this item at its October 24, 2017 meeting.

POLICE

Traffic related complaints are among the highest frequency of complaints received by the Antioch Police Department. This includes speeding, stop sign violations, reckless driving, and many others. The Antioch Police Department takes these complaints and traffic safety in general very seriously.



The Antioch Police Department has begun conducting proactive traffic enforcement patrols in an effort to alleviate traffic related issues and reduce collisions.



On Thursday, September 21st, the Antioch Police Department hosted a multi-agency vehicle enforcement detail known as VSET. This is a County Wide detail run by the CHP that takes place in a different City, once a month. Eight police agencies from all over Contra Costa County participated in the Antioch Detail, resulting in 120 enforcement stops, 12 citations issued, 2 vehicle impoundments, and 1 misdemeanor arrest. The City

of Antioch appreciates the collaborative efforts by all participating agencies.



The most recent proactive traffic operation was conducted on September 26th. Officers issued a total of 57 citations for a variety of traffic violations including speeding, red light violations, stop sign violations, and cell phone use. More proactive enforcement operations will occur in the near future.

In addition, officers on regular patrol are providing extra patrol in known locations for reckless driving and side shows. On September 23rd, an officer observed a 26 year old Antioch resident "spinning donuts" in the parking lot of Kmart. The officer conducted a traffic enforcement stop on the vehicle. The driver was subsequently arrested for reckless driving and his vehicle was impounded. Also on September 23rd, an officer observed a 22 year old Brentwood resident "spinning donuts" in the parking lot of the Antioch In-Shape Gym. The driver was also arrested for reckless driving and his vehicle was impounded.

The **85th** Neighborhood Cleanup event will occur on **Saturday, October 7, 2017, from 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m.** We will be cleaning the neighborhood near San Jose Drive, Buchanan, Carmona, Lopez, Seville Circle, Petar Place and Lucena Way. Volunteers will park and meet in the parking lot of Antioch Covenant Church located at 1919 Buchanan Road (*parking accessible via Lucena Way*).



Volunteers will receive instructions and the equipment necessary to accomplish the goal. The targeted area is within walking distance. Excluding inclement weather, future Neighborhood Cleanup events are scheduled for the first Saturday of every month and the locations will be announced in advance.
