City Manager

Red Sand Project and Big Truck Day

A perfect October evening was the setting for last week's Food Truck Thursdays.
One of the most significant and most successful yet with "Big Truck Day" and the Red Sand Project both a part of the



event. With over a dozen "big trucks" provided by the City and local businesses the young and old alike were still streaming in well after dark. The Red Sand Project brought awareness to the plight of human trafficking and allowed participants to fill cracks in the parking lot and walkways with red sand and hear a presentation about how to identify and report this activity.

Along with Public Works staff, I attended a Measure W Quality of Life Presentation at the Antioch Community Center. Whether at a Coffee with the Cops or a Parks and Recreation Commission meeting, these Quality of Life venues have been occurring for the better part of a year as we try to better understand what is essential to our residents so we can do a better job of providing information and services. Jobs Corridor/Northern Waterfront

East Contra Costa city managers and County staff met to discuss the Jobs Corridor and Northern Waterfront Initiative. The goal of this effort is to bring jobs to East Contra Costa County by bringing awareness of incredible opportunities that exist in Pittsburg, Antioch, Oakley, Brentwood and the County. With deep water ports, zoning which permits all types of industry, affordable land prices, and a significantly improved transportation system with the recent widening and extension of Highway 4 and BART, East Contra Costa is poised to provide everything from heavy industrial to high tech. A place to locate and thrive.

L Street

As a top City Council priority, staff met to discuss plans for improving L Street from Hwy.4 to the entrance of the Antioch Marina. Undergrounding existing overhead utilities, providing bike lanes, widening the street next to the Fairgrounds and providing landscaping in the medians and on the sides of the road are aspects of the project to be designed and ultimately constructed. The City Council will provide funding direction during the budget process in 2019.




Police- Animal Services







Water Distribution Emergency Response Team

The Water Distribution Emergency Response Team responded to a water main break at 5 PM on Tuesday. The main break occurred on Country Hills Drive and Deer Valley Road. The cause of the break is unknown but likely attributed to the age of the infrastructure. Responding crew's first task is to secure the perimeter of the break to protect the public at this busy intersection. Next, they begin excavation to isolate the broken main line and determine the extent of the repairs. Crews worked diligently well into the evening all the way through to 7:00 a.m. the next morning to complete the repairs. Public Works "On Call Team" addresses emergencies affecting the public after normal business hours. The emergency response team members are skilled, trained and at the ready to serve our community. The team members have achieved State certification in water distribution and sanitary sewer collection systems. Keeping our Creeks and Channels Clean: Collection Systems crews are working to remove litter and debris in West Antioch Creek on Sycamore Drive. Natural creeks and channels flow through our community providing storm-water drainage and refuge and avenues of travel for wildlife. Economic Development

Economic Development Commission

The Economic Development Commission held a meeting on Tuesday, October 16th at 7:00 p.m.
The Commission received a presentation from Somersville Towne Center's General Manager,
Julie Neward and Saint Mary's College's Director of the Center for Regional Economy, Dr. Berna Aksu. The two
presented a proposal that will be led by the Antioch Chamber of Commerce, that would incorporate areas of Antioch
into the class curriculum of students in the Center of Regional Economy program. The Commission also received
presentations from staff on Measure W, Economic Development Incentives, and a recap of the Evviva Brands
"Opportunity Lives Here" presentation that was presented to City Council.

East Bay EDA

Economic Development Director, Kwame Reed, recently attended two East Bay EDA meetings. The first meeting was with the Executive Committee that had a panel of healthcare providers from Kaiser Permanente, Stanford Health Care, John Muir Health, and UCSF Children's Hospital Oakland. The second meeting was with the Economic Development Directors Committee that included a panel of individuals that led a discussion on state-wide ballot measures that will have an impact of economic development. The group included Gregory McConnel, President & CEO, Jobs Housing Coalition, Ed Del Beccaro, Seniors Managing Director, Transwestern, and Robert Ogilvie, Director, Oakland SPUR. The Committee also received an update to the Regional Marketing Campaign being led by East Bay EDA.
