NEXT NEIGHBORHOOD CLEAN-UP

The Antioch Police Department is excited to announce the 76th installment of the Neighborhood Cleanup Program. The event will occur on **Saturday, November 5th 2016** from 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. We will be cleaning the neighborhood along Sequoia Drive, Redwood Drive, and surrounding streets. Volunteers will meet at the south end of Cherry Street and park along the curb near the trail/open space (see map). Volunteers will receive instructions and the equipment necessary to accomplish the goal. The targeted area is within walking distance. Excluding inclement weather, future Neighborhood Cleanup events are scheduled for the first Saturday of every month and the locations will be announced in advance.

This is a collaborative community effort which involves active participation from The Antioch Police Department Crime Prevention Commission; Neighborhood Watch Program; Volunteers in Police Service; community volunteers and the Public Works Department. The City of Antioch Neighborhood Cleanup program is not just for residential neighborhoods. It is a program that will change venues on a monthly basis and it will include business and commercial areas as well. Neighborhoods that are free of trash and refuse are inviting, and a clean community instills a sense of community pride. Remember, cleaning up your neighborhood can make life better for your family, your neighbors and your community!

The 2nd pre-election campaign finance reports for mayoral and city council candidates with a campaign finance committee were due no later than 4:30 p.m. on Thursday, October 27th covering the period 9/25 to 10/22/16. Late filings are subject to a \$10 a day fine and reporting to the FPPC Enforcement Division. The 24-hour reporting period for any contribution of \$1,000 or more to a candidate's campaign committee (Form 497) and Independent Expenditures supporting or opposing a candidate (Form 496) are due to the City within 24-hours of receipt by FAX, email, overnight delivery, or in person. Regular mail is not accepted. A contribution received on a Friday can be submitted on the following Monday (except for the last weekend prior to the November 8th Election). Late filings are subject to a \$10 per day fine. Candidate campaign finance reports are available for the public to review at the City Clerk's Office.

As of June 25, 2016 there were 46,677 registered voters in the City of Antioch.

Mail-in ballots for the November 8th General Election were mailed out by the County Elections office on October 10th. You will be able to save yourself 67 cents in postage by dropping your completed mail-in ballot in the red ballot boxes that are located on the City Clerk's counter on the ground floor of City Hall (200 H Street) Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

An early voting station for voters from anywhere in Contra Costa County will be set up at Golden Hills Church on the Antioch-Brentwood border and the Pittsburg Library. They will be open October 31 to November 5. Operating hours will be available in next week's report.

The four applications received for two positions on the Antioch Planning Commission were sent to the Mayor, Council and Community Development Staff. Next, the Mayor will be setting up interviews for the applicants and then the appointments will be placed on a future City Council agenda for confirmation.

RECREATION UPDATES

- The Antioch Council of Teens (ACT) is currently accepting donations of fleece material for their blanket drive. Any material, any size! Donations can be dropped off at the Antioch Community Center or Antioch Senior Center between now and November 23rd!
- The Junior Warriors Youth Co-ed Basketball League has two weeks of registration remaining; there are only a few more spots available before reaching the 240 maximum number of participants. The league will play on Saturdays starting in November and will run through February with adult volunteer coaches that emphasize skill building, fun, and sportsmanship for grades 1 thru 8.
- This week, Contractor Agreements were drafted and mailed for all instructors teaching classes and programs for the Winter/Spring 2016 session.
- Last Thursday, staff attended a professional development roundtable titled "Summer Camp Lunch and Learn" in San Pablo, CA.
- Throughout the week, the 5th Annual Halloween Carnival was held at the Antioch Community Center for preschoolers and their families. Fun games and activities including the famous Eyeball Fishing Cauldron, Bean Bag Pumpkin Toss, Creepy Crawly Dig and so much more!
- On Monday, Water Park staff was invited to attend a "Survivor Recognition Lunch" through Contra Costa County Health Services. The recognition will take place on November 9th in Walnut Creek and will recognize the lifeguards that were involved in an incident that required them to perform CPR on their co-worker over the summer.

- Throughout the week, Water Park staff continued to create and update opening and closing forms, rescue equipment forms, and daily logs for the seasonal positions at the Water Park. This new system is intended to make communication between staff and operations more detailed and thorough this upcoming summer.
- On Wednesday, the Water Safety Instructor course for Water Park staff came to an end. Four new swim instructors are now certified and ready to begin their shadow training in the spring when swim lessons return to the Water Park.
- The update of Water Park Buyout information, packet, and prices in ActiveNet has been completed and the Water Park is ready for the 2017 season. Buyouts will be accepted beginning January 9th.
- Throughout the week, The Water Park team continued to batten down the hatches for the winter at the Water Park. This week's focus was shutting down systems and adjusting controls for a more energy efficient winter.
- Last week, The City's shade structure vendor completed the replacement of two structure tops at the Water Park. These new tops will provide shade for the new Spray Ground which is opening next year!
- On Tuesday and Thursday, The Aquatic Maintenance worker drafted various contracts and insurance documents for projects throughout the department.
 Highlights of upcoming improvements include new carpeting for the Nick Rodriguez Community Center and additional video security for Prewett Community Park.
- On Wednesday, the City completed installation of a new water heater in the Arts & Crafts room at the Nick Rodriguez Community Center. The heater is up and operational and program users in this room are very happy with the results.
- On Friday, staff began outreach to all of the potential community users for the Nick Rodriguez Theatre in 2017. This outreach is to promote an open house of the theatre on Monday, November 7th. A total of 23 different schools, agencies, and organizations were contacted.

Senior Center Services

- Over the last week, 337 affordable, healthy meals were served through the C.C. Café. This program helps prevent heart attacks, depression, asthma and congestive heart failure. No membership or income requirements are required to eat at the C.C. Cafe. All supplies are provided by the County for participating cafés.
- Last week, staff assisted seniors with developing draft text for suggested amendments to the Antioch Senior Citizen's Club By-Laws. Suggestions for Amendments need to be submitted to the Senior Citizens Club Board by October 31st for approval for the General Meeting in December.
- Last Friday, 18 members attended the "Senior Fun N Fishing" event presented by East Bay Regional Parks. All participants enjoyed a live bluegrass performance, free hot-dog lunch provided by the Kiwanis Club of Pittsburg, and an outdoor game of Bingo.
- On Monday, staff met with a representative from AARP tax service and discussed their network requirements for the upcoming 2017 tax season.

- On Tuesday, 34 seniors enjoyed the monthly Casino trip to Cache Creek. It was an action packed day at the Casino.
- On Tuesday, staff adjusted the settings for the outdoor lighting around the Senior Center in preparation for Standard Time.
- Also on Tuesday, staff worked with volunteers to do a check on the hot water heater and the refrigerator in the Nutrition Kitchen as both appeared not to be working. The refrigerator was adjusted and appears to be fine. American Plumbing has been contacted for the water heater as it is new and still under warranty.
- On Wednesday, the Flapper's tap dance group began to work on their upcoming Christmas performance. The Senior Center was full of carols and songs for the holiday while the popular dance group practiced.
- On Wednesday evening, the Sons of Italy held their annual Halloween party at the Senior Center. More decorations were added to the already festive dining hall. Staff joined them to observe the celebration and festivities.
- Last week, the November/December newsletter was submitted for production.
- On Tuesday, seniors enjoyed their second "Karaoke Tuesday." Staff participated in an attempt to entice other seniors to participate...and many did so!
- On Tuesday, staff submitted a grant request to the Antioch Rotary Club, on behalf of the Antioch Senior Citizen's Club, for the purchase of a new karaoke machine.
- On Tuesday, staff trained a new volunteer at the front desk.
- On Wednesday, staff created flyers for two upcoming events: Alzheimer Association presentations on November 2nd, 7th, 14th and Comfort Keepers Creating an Alzheimer/Dementia Awareness Community event on November 15th.
- On Thursday, staff created a PowerPoint presentation of the Nov/Dec newsletter for the monitor located in the Antioch Senior Center lobby.
- To date the Senior Club has received a total of new and renewal membership applications from 986 seniors. For the months of October through December membership dues are dropped to half price (\$10.00).

Community Development Block Grant (CDBG):

The City of Antioch is now accepting applications for funding with CDBG and Housing Successor funds for the 2017-20 three-year grant funding cycle. ALL NEW APPLICANTS or applicants not funded in the previous funding cycle are STONGLY advised to discuss their proposed activity with Teri House prior to submitting a grant application. Please call her at 925-779-7037 to discuss or schedule an appointment.

Applications for Housing services must be submitted in City Data Services (CDS) no later than 5:00 PM on Wednesday, November 22, 2016. Applications for Public Services, Fair Housing, Homeless Services, Economic Development and Infrastructure/Public Facilities are due no later than 5:00 PM on December 12, 2016. Late submissions will not be accepted. Review the Application Guidelines, found online at http://www.ci.antioch.ca.us/CitySvcs/CDBG.htm for additional information.

The City of Antioch will be accepting applications in these categories for the following high priority needs identified in the Consolidated Plan:

- Public Services Senior and Disabled services, Youth services, Homeless Services, Fair Housing and Tenant Landlord Counseling ONLY. Public Services are capped by HUD to 15% of the grant amount, which is approximately \$100,000 for Antioch, so this category is HIGHLY competitive.
- Economic Development job training and placement, microenterprise development and assistance.
- Housing Homeowner and Mobile Home Owner rehabilitation loans and grants, Rental Housing rehabilitation loans, and Code Enforcement.
- Infrastructure City street improvement and homeless infrastructure/public facility.

A CDBG Subcommittee, consisting of two Antioch City Council members and CDBG Program staff, review the applications and make funding recommendations. The Subcommittee will ask applicants to make a brief presentation in February or March 2017. A public hearing will be tentatively held April 25, 2017 for the full City Council to review and allocate funding for the three-year funding cycle. Proposals will be evaluated based upon a published 100 point criteria.

Housing:

 Construction is underway for the 85 unit Tabora Gardens development at James Donlon and Tabora Drive, after the groundbreaking ceremony held last week. Satellite Affordable Housing Associates is constructing 85 new units of very affordable senior and senior Veteran housing which is expected to be completed in about 18 months.

Homeless

- November is Homeless Awareness Month To educate and inform the public about homelessness in our County, the City's CDBG/Housing Consultant, Teri House, will be making presentations at City of Antioch, Concord, Pittsburg, Brentwood, and Oakley Council meetings.

<u>Administration</u>

 Hillcrest/SR 4 area traffic signals: The City of Antioch has been passing on complaints regarding the signal timing to Caltrans and they have been working on the coordination. The close spacing of Larkspur/Tregallas to the EB ramps is making it very difficult. We applied for and received a "PASS Grant" from MTC to work on progression timing on Hillcrest and Deer Valley from Slatten Ranch Road to Lone Tree Way, and the off/on ramps at Slatten Ranch Road. The consultant is in the data collection phase right now. We have been keeping them informed of the complaints near the freeway so they are very aware of the issues.

Engineering & Development Services

- Almondridge East Subdivision 8880, an 81-unit single family home development by KB Homes, located between East 18th Street and Oakley Road, east of Phillips Lane and west of the State Highway 160: Staff is reviewing plot plans for ongoing new home construction and provided a punch list for offsite improvements. Staff has completed its review of backup documents for traffic signal reimbursement.
- Delta Courtyard Apartments, located at 701 and 810 Wilbur Avenue, a 126-unit multi-family apartment complex: The project was approved at the 9/7 Planning Commission meeting and will be appealed at the 11/8 City Council meeting.

- The Habit Burger, 2424 Mahogany Way, a new restaurant development: The project was approved at the July 20, 2016 Planning Commission meeting. Staff is reviewing construction drawings for building permit issuance.
- Olive Groves Subdivision, 263 single-family detached senior housing units with assisted living facility, commercial uses and open space: Residential portion gated with private streets. Staff is preliminarily reviewing the PDP-16-01 application.
- Park Ridge Phase I, a 123-unit housing development by Davidon Homes, located west of Canada Valley Road and east of Highway 4: The subdivision plan and map checks have been completed. Intent to form a Community Facilities District (Police Services) and Benefit District (Future Urban Area 2) will be presented to the City Council at the November 8th meeting. The developer is grading the site "at-risk".
- SR4 (Segment 2) Contra Loma Blvd. Interchange/'G' Street Overcrossing Project: The project has been accepted by the State. City staff is working with Caltrans to complete the punch list. A Freeway Maintenance Agreement is being reviewed by staff.
- SR4 (Segment 3A) 'A' Street/Lone Tree Way Interchange, Cavallo Road/Garrow Drive Undercrossing Project: City staff is working with Caltrans to complete the punch list. A Freeway Maintenance Agreement is being reviewed by staff.
- SR4 (Segment 3B) Hillcrest Avenue Interchange and BART Tunnel Project: Staff prepared a punch list for Caltrans' contractor to complete. City staff is working with the CCTA to complete the punch list. A Freeway Maintenance Agreement is being reviewed by staff.
- Vineyard Self-Storage, located at E. 18th Street/Vineyard Drive: The project was approved at the October 11th City Council meeting.
- Aviano, an approved 533 unit housing development located west of the current terminus of Hillcrest Avenue, east and north of Dozier-Libby Medical High School: Staff is reviewing the 3rd submittal for the first phase of construction documents and plans.
- Staff is working with the developers to create Community Facilities Districts for Sand Creek Focus Area landscape maintenance.
- Child Care Education Building in Williamson Ranch Plaza: Plans and documents approved; staff is waiting for developer to apply for permits.
- 326 Nash Avenue: The owner/applicant is requesting to merge parcels. The merger has been approved by the Planning Commission. Staff is waiting for submittal of documents for review and recording.

Capital Improvements Division

- Sunset Booster Pump Station Replacement: JMB Construction has removed the temporary pump station from the site. The adjacent asphalt concrete and concrete flatwork has been replaced. The remaining site restoration and clean up is expected to be performed next week.
- Zone I Transmission Pipeline Rehabilitation at HWY 4: RMC Water and Environment is developing final project plans and specifications.

- Downtown Sanitary Sewer Rehabilitation: Project plans and specifications are available for purchase at a cost of \$100 per set. The public bid opening for this project is scheduled for November 22nd at 2:00 p.m. in the City Council Chambers located at 200 "H" Street. Subdynamic Locating is televising and locating existing sanitary sewer laterals in the downtown area.
- Water Treatment Plant Disinfection Improvements: CDM Smith is developing the 99% draft project plans and specifications.
- West Antioch Creek Channel Improvements: Condemnation negotiations are proceeding regarding acquisition of property and easements located at 1400 and 1420 West 10th Street. U.S. Fish and Wildlife Services' review of this project's Biological Assessment continues to be delayed by the agencies current focus on the CA WaterFix project.
- Water Treatment Plant 'A' Electrical Improvements: TJC and Associates are developing 90% draft project plans and specifications.
- North East Annexation Infrastructure Improvements: BKF Engineering is now under contract to provide engineering services and preliminary plans, estimates and studies for the planning and the design of infrastructure improvements needed to serve Annexation Areas 1 and 2B. BKF will set up a Kick Off meeting with staff in November.
- Transportation Impact Fee Study: EPS has developed several scenarios for the fees; the final draft Fee Study is scheduled to be presented to the City Council for public review and comments in January 2017.
- Prewett Water Park Improvements: Sierra Valley Construction completed the construction for the playground and the spray ground facilities and is working on the punch list items. Staff will schedule the County Health's and Fire District's final inspections the first week in November 2016.
- Rubberized Cape Seal Program: The Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery (CalRecycle) issued a Notice of Grant Funds available for Rubberized Cape Seal projects for FY 16-17 for the maximum grant amount of \$350,000. The grant application was submitted to CalRecycle last week.
- Antioch Pavement Management Street Survey: AMS Consulting Services will
 perform a comprehensive citywide pavement condition survey of all city streets.
 Inspection of the pavement condition will be done using Mobil Mapping System
 equipment. The mobile mapping vehicle started the citywide pavement inspection
 in September and will be completed by November 2016.
- Retaining Walls Rehabilitation: Staff completed the design for the replacement of two retaining walls: one on James Donlon Blvd. and one on Contra Loma Blvd. Project plans and specifications are available for purchase at a cost of \$25 per set.  - Using a hose without a shut off nozzle.
 - Washing paved or other hard-surfaced areas, including sidewalks, walkways, driveways, patios and parking areas.
 - Use of City furnished water for non-recalculating decorative fountains or filling decorative lakes or ponds.
 - > Failing to repair a controllable water leak.
- Staff continues to monitor water meters and usage at all City buildings and parks for water conservation.
- Staff continues to respond to drought hotline inquiries.
- Staff responded to customer calls regarding water maintenance issues city wide.
- Staff repaired water service on Asilomar Dr.
- Staff replaced a damaged hydrant on Delta Fair Blvd.
- Staff replaced a water service on Danbury Ct.
- Staff replaced a water service on Lanitos Ct.
- Staff replaced a water service on Hayward Ct.
- Staff replaced 3" meter on W. 7th St.
- Staff repaired water main on W. 10th St.
- Staff now performing proactive leak detection program.

- Striping: Crews painted six stop legends, 204 feet of 12 inch, 60 feet of 8 inch and 10 feet of 4 inch striping.
- Pre-emergent Spray: Crews assisted the Parks Department with its annual preemergent spray application.

Public Works Utilities - Collections Division

- Calls for Sewer Service: Received and responded to 11 calls for service from the public. Responding crews televised 280 linear feet of public sewer laterals connecting to the City's sewer system.
- Sewer Mains: Daily preventative maintenance performed on over 19,075 linear feet of sewer main lines.
- Quarterly Sewer Main Cleaning: The route schedule is under review to increase inspection frequency of identified priority locations and integrate a proactive preventative cleaning schedule for these pipelines.
- Sewer Lateral Maintenance Program (SLMP): Repaired two laterals that were severely damaged requiring immediate repair. Crews also televised two laterals.
- Manhole Inspection Program: Crews inspected 51 manholes. Manholes are inspected for loose lids, debris, locking mechanisms, and status of infrastructure for future maintenance and rehabilitation. We are updating the program and processes for integration in our computerized maintenance management system.
- Sanitary Sewer Overflow (SSO) Reduction Program: Staff has located strategic
 areas within the collections system manholes to place SMART Manhole Monitoring
 Devices and staff is currently installing them. The live system monitoring began
 October 11, 2016. The use of "SMART Manholes" in strategic areas will be utilized
 to alert leadership staff within the division of potential SSOs. This program will also
 address the need for locking mechanisms.
- Closed Caption Televising (CCTV): The CCTV Preventative Maintenance inspects sewer mains to identify the condition and causes of blockages and SSOs. The lateral crew inspected 323 sites and televised 244 public sewer laterals consisting of 8,540 linear feet.
- National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System: Crews removed 186 yards of green waste from various creeks and channels and removed 17 yards of illegal dumping. Weed abated 3.4 acres in channels from bank to low water line. Inspected and cleaned 2.5 yards of debris from Trash Capture Devices. These activities ensure the City meets the federal Clean Water Act requirements of municipalities discharging storm water into waterways. Proactive preventative maintenance is restricted to the months of April through October.

She was taken into custody and sent to county jail.
- 10/25/2016 at 8:31 am, as an officer was driving past 85 South Lake Dr, 57 year old Robert Gould decided to run into the house. A probation search was conducted on the house and Gould was located inside and found to have a warrant for his arrest for a DUI charge. He arrested and was taken to county jail.
