## **NEXT NEIGHBORHOOD CLEAN-UP**

The Antioch Police Department is excited to announce the 76th installment of the Neighborhood Cleanup Program. The event will occur on **Saturday, November 5th 2016 from 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m.** We will be cleaning the neighborhood along Sequoia Drive, Redwood Drive, and surrounding streets. Volunteers will meet at the south end of Cherry Street and park along the curb near the trail/open space (see map). Volunteers will receive instructions and the equipment necessary to accomplish the goal. The targeted area is within walking distance. Excluding inclement weather, future Neighborhood Cleanup events are scheduled for the first Saturday of every month and the locations will be announced in advance.

This is a collaborative community effort which involves active participation from The Antioch Police Department Crime Prevention Commission; Neighborhood Watch Program; Volunteers in Police Service; community volunteers and the Public Works Department. The City of Antioch Neighborhood Cleanup program is not just for residential neighborhoods. The 2<sup>nd</sup> pre-election Candidate Campaign finance reports (Form 460) for the period 9/25 – 10/22/16 were due no later than 4:30 p.m. on Thursday, October 27<sup>th</sup>. The FPPC Enforcement Division has advised all City Clerks and County Clerks that they will be contacting us immediately following the filing of requesting all clerks to report any late filings to the FPPC Enforcement Division for follow-up action. The FPPC has also just instituted an electronic method for Clerks to report delinquent filings. Only one candidate failed to submit their 2<sup>nd</sup> Pre-election Campaign Committee Finance Report (FPPC Form 460) on time and provided it 5 days late. Late filings of FPPC Form 460, 496 and 497 are subject to a \$10 per day fine for each day the report is submitted late.

Candidate campaign finance reports are available for the public to review at the City Clerk's Office. As of June 25, 2016 there were 46,677 registered voters in the City of Antioch.

**Save yourself 68 cents in postage by dropping your completed mail-in ballot in the red ballot boxes that are located on the City Clerk's counter on the ground floor of City Hall (200 H Street) next to the Finance Cashiers.**

**The County Elections Office emptied the Mail-in Ballot Boxes twice this week as they filled up fast. They also added a fourth Ballot Box due to high number of envelopes being placed in the ballot boxes.**

**Early voting is available October 31 thru November 4 from 11:00am to 7:00pm; and on Saturday, November 5 from 8:00am to 5:00pm at Golden Hills Community Church, 2401 Shady Willow Lane, Brentwood and at the Pittsburg Library Community Room, 80 Power Avenue, Pittsburg. Any registered voter who normally casts their votes at a polling station can vote early at these two locations.**

Requests for City of Antioch public documents under the California Public Records Act must be sent to the City Clerk's office. Request forms are available on the City Website and at the City Clerk's Counter at City Hall. Requests can be made in person, by mail or email. **RECREATION UPDATES:**

- The Antioch Council of Teens is currently accepting donations of fleece material for their blanket drive. Any material, any size! Donations can be dropped off to the Antioch Community Center or Antioch Senior Center between now and November 23<sup>rd</sup>!
- This week, staff added an additional adult cooking class to accommodate a growing waitlist for "Seafood for the Holidays." The additional class has been scheduled for December 13<sup>th</sup>; call now if you are interested.
- On Wednesday, staff attended a Recreation Risk Management Workshop. Topics covered included: Staff administration of Medication, ADA/ California State Law, Waivers and Releases, Insurance Requirements, Governmental Immunities, and the California Child Abuse and Neglect Reporting Act.
- On Tuesday, 16 youth began "The Art of Nature" youth art class, which is taught by our own veteran art teacher Nancy Roberts. The class explores the beauty of nature looking through the artists eyes! Projects are focused on drawing, collage and painting media.
- With the cold and rainy season now here, weekly participation has increased for all 3 co-ed drop-in sports programs: Basketball on Sundays from 12:30 to 2:30pm, Pickleball on Sundays from 3:00 to 6:00pm, and Volleyball on Tuesdays from 7:00 to 9:30p, which are all held in the Antioch Community Center Gymnasium where the climate stays the same year round! Participation fee of \$5 per person per class is collected at the gym door.
- Throughout the week, 4 new facility rental contracts were received and staff is preparing for a busy month of rentals for the month November, beginning with 3 events this weekend!

- Last week, Staff met with members of the Antioch Historical Society in regards to planning for the 2017 programming year and annual Crab Feed to take place in March.
- On Wednesday, staff met with members of the planning committee for the Holiday Parade and celebration to discuss the logistics of the NRCC parking lot and skating rink.
- On Monday, the Water Park customer satisfaction survey was revamped, it is now more user-friendly, less time consuming for the customer and will collect measurable data for the City.
- On Monday, water park staff began reorganizing the first aid room and inventory to make operations smoother for the 2017 season.
- On Tuesday, training scenarios were created for cashiers; these scenarios are based on past Water Park experiences and will better equip staff to handle customer service requests.
- Throughout the week, preparations for Water Park buyouts continued including new marketing materials and a customer list which will be distributed in January.
- Throughout the week, logistics were finalized for the new Prewett Community Park Playground ribbon cutting and celebration on Saturday!
- On Thursday, recreation staff attended the California Park and Recreation Society Fall Institute where they gained new information about programming best practices and networked with other local agencies.
- The Antioch Council of Teens will meet on Monday November 7<sup>th</sup> from 6pm-7:30pm at the Antioch Water Park. All teens are welcome!

### Senior Center Services

- There are presentations about Alzheimer's scheduled for November 7<sup>th</sup>, and 14<sup>th</sup> and there is a workshop on November 15<sup>th</sup> entitled "Becoming a Dementia Aware Community."
- Over the last week, 407 affordable, healthy meals were served through the CoCo Café; an increase of 70 meals over last week. This program helps prevent heart attacks, depression, asthma and congestive heart failure. No membership or income requirements are required to eat at the C.C. Cafe. All supplies are provided by the County for participating cafes.
- Last week, a small leak in the roof was discovered. Water was leaking through a light fixture into the back hallway adjacent to the theatre dressing rooms. The facility maintenance department was contacted and began to investigate the issue.
- On Monday, staff submitted the Antioch Senior Center Newsletter at the local USPS for distribution; 455 copies will be delivered while the remainder will be available for pick up.
- Staff met with the Financial Clerk from the Contra Costa Nutrition Program (CoCo Café). CoCo Café provides the nutritional lunch program to the Antioch Senior

Center. This meeting was to discuss the collection and filing of the mandatory paper work on every participant.

- On Monday, over 100 seniors celebrated Halloween with a costume party and plenty of raffle prizes. More than 80 participants took part and a lot of fun was had by all! Grand prizes were awarded to the winners for each category: Scariest, Funniest and Most Creative.
- On Tuesday, the Antioch Senior Citizens Club Board of Directors met. A slate was approved for the upcoming general election. Proposed amendments to the By-Laws were also presented. The General Meeting and Election is scheduled for Tuesday, December 6. Staff provided updates on the Club website as well as the status of a grant request submitted in their name to the Rotary Club of Antioch for a new karaoke machine
- On Wednesday, the Senior Citizens Club showed the movie ‘Mother’s Day’ with Jennifer Aniston and Timothy Olyphant. This was Garry Marshall’s last movie prior to his passing on July 17<sup>th</sup>.
- On Wednesday, 15 seniors attended the Alzheimer Association presentation titled, “Healthy Living for Brain and Body”.
- On Friday, staff created a flyer for the Antioch Senior Center new Saturday Bingo, and for our “Annual Thanksgiving Dinner” event scheduled on the 18<sup>th</sup> of November between 5:00-8:00pm.
- Staff began preparing for the “Holiday Happenings” event presented by East County Senior Coalition scheduled for December 14<sup>th</sup>.
- Throughout the week, staff reached out to known donors who financially support members of the Antioch Senior Center and successfully received funds to subsidize those interested in our Thanksgiving dinner, but have financial hardship.
- To date the Senior Club has received a total of new and renewal membership applications from 996 seniors. For the months of October through December membership dues are dropped to half price (\$10.00).

### **Environmental Resources:**

**Climate Action Plan programs evaluation-** Our CivicSpark Fellow, Jason Moeller, has begun the work to evaluate the programs highlighted in our 2010 Climate Action Plans (CAP). The first measure to be analyzed is the installation of photovoltaic systems (solar panels). In our Community CAP, we had a goal of 10,000 kW of solar installed by 2010. At this point, we have 20,000kW installed! Next step is to estimate the GHG reduction from this and project out the savings from future installations.

### **Community Development Block Grant (CDBG):**

The City of Antioch is now accepting applications for funding with CDBG and Housing Successor funds for the 2017-20 three-year grant funding cycle. The City of Antioch will be accepting applications in these categories for the following high priority needs identified in the Consolidated Plan:

- **Public Services – Senior and Disabled services, Youth services, Homeless**

**Services, Fair Housing and Tenant Landlord Counseling ONLY.** Public Services are capped by HUD to 15% of the grant amount, which is approximately \$100,000 for Antioch, so this category is HIGHLY competitive.

- **Economic Development** – job training and placement, microenterprise development and assistance.
- **Housing** – Homeowner and Mobile Home Owner rehabilitation loans and grants, Rental Housing rehabilitation loans, and Code Enforcement.
- **Infrastructure** – City street improvement and homeless infrastructure/public facility.

A CDBG Subcommittee, consisting of two Antioch City Council members and CDBG Program staff, review the applications and make funding recommendations. The Subcommittee will ask applicants to make a brief presentation in February or March 2017. A public hearing will be tentatively held April 25, 2017 for the full City Council to review and allocate funding for the three-year funding cycle. Proposals will be evaluated based upon a published 100 point criteria.

#### **Housing:**

- Construction is underway for the 85 unit Tabora Gardens development at James Donlon and Tabora Drive, after the groundbreaking ceremony held last week. Satellite Affordable Housing Associates is constructing 85 new units of very affordable senior and senior Veteran housing which is expected to be completed in about 18 months.

#### **Homeless**

- **November is Homeless Awareness Month** – To educate and inform the public about homelessness in our County, the City's CDBG/Housing Consultant, Teri House, has made presentations at the cities of Antioch and Concord, with upcoming presentations at the Pittsburg, Brentwood, and Oakley Council meetings.

- Undergarments – undershirts, underwear and socks for men, women and children.
  - Sweatshirts, jackets, plastic rain coats/ponchos, gloves, hats
  - Sleeping bags, towels, blankets, backpacks
  - Food items – protein bars, easy open tuna and other staples
  - BART tickets
- **Housing Security Fund Accepting Donations** - In partnership with the Richmond Community Foundation, Contra Costa is building a fund to help address many of the barriers people transitioning out of homelessness face, including deposits, credit check and other startup costs. Once active, the Contra Costa Housing Security Fund will be able to cover those costs and also offer financial benefits to landlords who offer our clients an opportunity. - Almondridge East Subdivision 8880, an 81-unit single family home development by KB Homes, located between East 18<sup>th</sup> Street and Oakley Road, east of Phillips Lane and west of the State Highway 160: Staff is reviewing plot plans for ongoing new home construction and provided a punch list for offsite improvements. Staff has completed its review of backup documents for traffic signal reimbursement.
- Delta Courtyard Apartments, located at 701 and 810 Wilbur Avenue, a 126-unit multi-family apartment complex: The project was approved at the 9/7 Planning Commission meeting and appealed at the 11/8/16 City Council meeting.
- The Habit Burger, 2424 Mahogany Way, a new restaurant development: The project was approved at the 7/20/16 Planning Commission meeting. Staff is reviewing construction drawings for building permit issuance.
- Olive Groves Subdivision, 263 single-family detached senior housing units with assisted living facility, commercial uses and open space: Residential portion gated with private streets. Staff is preliminarily reviewing the PDP-16-01 application. Staff will be visiting the site on Friday, Nov. 4<sup>th</sup>.
- Park Ridge Phase I, a 123-unit housing development by Davidon Homes, located west of Canada Valley Road and east of Highway 4: The subdivision plan and map checks have been completed. The developer is currently grading the site “at-risk”. Intent to form a Community Facilities District (Police Services) and Benefit District (Future Urban Area 2) will be presented to the City Council at the 11/8/16 meeting. Final Map approval and a public hearing for a reimbursement agreement for roadway and utility improvements will be presented to the City Council at the 11/22/16 meeting.
- SR4 (Segment 2) Contra Loma Blvd. Interchange/‘G’ Street Overcrossing Project: The project has been accepted by the State. City staff is working with Caltrans to complete the punch list. A Freeway Maintenance Agreement is being reviewed by staff.
- SR4 (Segment 3A) ‘A’ Street/Lone Tree Way Interchange, Cavallo Road/Garrow Drive Undercrossing Project: City staff is working with Caltrans to complete the punch list. A Freeway Maintenance Agreement is being reviewed by staff.
- SR4 (Segment 3B) Hillcrest Avenue Interchange and BART Tunnel Project: Staff prepared a punch list for Caltrans’ contractor to complete. City staff is working with the CCTA to complete the punch list. A Freeway Maintenance Agreement is being reviewed by staff.
- Vineyard Self-Storage, located at E. 18<sup>th</sup> Street/Vineyard Drive: The project was approved at the October 11<sup>th</sup> City Council meeting. Staff is working with the developer’s engineer on design issues.
- Aviano, an approved 533 unit housing development located west of the current terminus of Hillcrest Avenue, east and north of Dozier-Libby Medical High School: Staff is reviewing the 3<sup>rd</sup> submittal for the first phase of construction documents and plans. Staff is reviewing the 1<sup>st</sup> submittal for Phase 2.

- Staff is working with the developers to create Community Facilities Districts for Sand Creek Focus Area landscape maintenance.
- Child Care Education Building in Williamson Ranch Plaza: Plans and documents have been approved and staff is waiting for the developer to apply for permits.
- 326 Nash Avenue: The owner/applicant is requesting to merge parcels. The merger has been approved by the Planning Commission. Staff is waiting for submittal of documents for review and recording.

#### Capital Improvements Division

- Sunset Booster Pump Station Replacement: Final restoration and clean up of the site is being performed.
- Zone I Transmission Pipeline Rehabilitation at HWY 4: RMC Water and Environment is developing final project plans and specifications.
- Downtown Sanitary Sewer Rehabilitation: Project plans and specifications are available for purchase at a cost of \$100 per set. Copies may be obtained by logging on [www.blueprintexpress.com/antioch](http://www.blueprintexpress.com/antioch) or by calling BPXpress Reprographics at (707) 745-3593. The public bid opening for this project is scheduled for November 22<sup>nd</sup> at 2:00 p.m. in the City Council Chambers located at 200 "H" Street. Subdynamic Locating is televising and location existing sanitary sewer laterals in the downtown area.
- Water Treatment Plant Disinfection Improvements: CDM Smith is developing the 99% draft project plans and specifications.
- West Antioch Creek Channel Improvements: Condemnation negotiations are proceeding regarding acquisition of property and easements located at 1400 and 1420 West 10<sup>th</sup> Street. U.S. Fish and Wildlife Services' review of this project's Biological Assessment continues to be delayed by the agencies current focus on the CA WaterFix project.
- Water Treatment Plant 'A' Electrical Improvements: TJC and Associates are developing 90% draft project plans and specifications.
- North East Annexation Infrastructure Improvements: BKF Engineering is now under contract to provide engineering services and preliminary plans, estimates and studies for the planning and the design of infrastructure improvements needed to serve Annexation Areas 1 and 2B. BKF will set up a Kick Off meeting with staff in November.
- Transportation Impact Fee Study: EPS has developed several scenarios for the fees; the final draft Fee Study is scheduled to be presented to the City Council for public review and comments in January 2017.
- Prewett Water Park Improvements: Sierra Valley Construction completed the construction for the playground and the spray ground facilities and is working on the punch list items. Staff will schedule the County Health's and Fire District's final inspections the first week in November 2016.
- Rubberized Cape Seal Program: The Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery (CalRecycle) issued a Notice of Grant Funds available for Rubberized



Cape Seal projects for FY 16-17 for the maximum grant amount of \$350,000. The grant application has been submitted to CalRecycle.

- Antioch Pavement Management Street Survey: AMS Consulting Services will perform a comprehensive citywide pavement condition survey of all city streets. Inspection of the pavement condition will be done using Mobil Mapping System equipment. The mobile mapping vehicle started the citywide pavement inspection in September and will be completed by November 2016.
- Retaining Walls Rehabilitation: Staff completed the design for the replacement of two retaining walls: one on James Donlon Blvd. and one on Contra Loma Blvd. Project plans and specifications are available for purchase at a cost of \$25 per set. The public bid opening for this project is scheduled for November 8<sup>th</sup> at 2:00 p.m. in the City Council Chambers located at 200 "H" Street. Construction is expected to start in January 2017 and completed in March 2017.

#### Water Treatment Plant

- Cleaned Solar Bees out on the municipal reservoir. Solar Bees circulate the water in the reservoir; cleaning the Solar Bees prevents weeds from restricting the circulation. Also cleaned the staff gage on the tower.
- Completed the installation of the wireless equipment at Sunset pump station. Sunset is now on SCADA and can be operated from the Water Treatment Plant.
- Completed calibration for this month's turbidimeters at both 'A' and 'B' plants.

#### Water Distribution

- Water Distribution staff had 199 stops for water service including disconnections.
- Water Distribution staff had a total of 74 USA tickets completed for utility location.
- Water Distribution meter reading for the month of November has started.
- Water Distribution issued four drought notices this week.
- The City of Antioch now has a 0% water conservation goal through January of 2017 based on the State of California's "stress test". However the following prohibitions will remain in place:
  - Watering outdoor landscapes in a manner that causes excessive runoff such that water flows onto adjacent property, non-irrigated areas, private and public walkways, roadways, parking lots, or structures.
  - Using a hose without a shut off nozzle.
  - Washing paved or other hard-surfaced areas, including sidewalks, walkways, driveways, patios and parking areas.
  - Use of City furnished water for non-recalculating decorative fountains or filling decorative lakes or ponds.
  - Failing to repair a controllable water leak.
- Staff continues to monitor water meters and usage at all City buildings and parks for water conservation.
- Staff continues to respond to drought hotline inquiries.

- Staff responded to customer calls regarding water maintenance issues city wide.
- Staff installed a new meter and backflow on W. 8<sup>th</sup> St.
- Staff replaced a water service on “E” St.
- Staff installed a new water sample station for the Water Treatment Plant on Banbury Way.
- Staff replaced a 2” meter at the Belle Rose apartment complex.
- Meter test program has started in meter reading routes 1 through 5.
- Staff is now performing proactive leak detection program.
- The State mandated annual backflow testing program is on schedule and scheduled to be completed by December 1<sup>st</sup>.
- Staff continues to provide water connect and disconnect services to Finance Department.
- Staff performed citywide preventative maintenance on fire hydrants and water quality flushing.
- Central Stores staff cleared debris and graffiti from Amtrak platform.
- Central Stores staff cleared household debris and graffiti from Fulton Shipyard Rd. boat launch area.

#### Public Works Operations – Parks and Landscape

- Playground and Park Safety Inspections: Completed at Chaparral, Country Manor, Deerfield, Diablo West, Heidorn, Knoll and Meadow Creek Parks. Follow-up inspections were completed at Hillcrest and Prewett Water Parks.
- Park Irrigation: All park irrigation water is currently off due to recent rains.
- Antioch Water Park: New grass seed is sprouting at the east end of the Water Park.
- City Park: The restrooms remain closed due to vandalism.
- Chichibu Park: Planted three new American Elms (*Ulmus parvifolia* “Americana”).
- Hillcrest Park: Installed a new tennis net headband.
- Markley Creek Park: Installed a new doggie waste container at the dog park.
- Tree Removal Permits: Issued a tree removal permit for 605 K Street.
- Irrigation: Repaired eight irrigation leaks on City property as needed.
- Trim Crews: James Donlon medians, Lone Tree Way rights of way (south side), Ridgeline Dr., Deer Valley rights of way (east side), Mt. Conness Trail, Deerfield Corridor Trail, and Fairside Dr. median.
- Spot Spray: Lone Tree Way medians and Hillcrest Dr. medians.

#### Public Works Operations – Street Maintenance

- Graffiti: Crews removed graffiti from numerous areas around the City.

- Signs: Crews replaced 26 existing signs due to install requests, poor reflectivity or line of sight issues.
- Red Curb: Prepared for red curb painting on Davison Dr.
- Potholes: Filled 126 potholes.
- Debris: Removed one yard of debris in the roadway.
- Pre-emergent Spray: Crews assisted the Parks Department with its annual pre-emergent spray application.

#### Public Works Utilities – Collections Division

- Calls for Sewer Service: Received and responded to four calls for service from the public. Responding crews televised 140 linear feet of public sewer laterals connecting to the City's sewer system.
- Sewer Mains: Daily preventative maintenance performed on over 22,398 linear feet of sewer main lines.
- Quarterly Sewer Main Cleaning: The route schedule is under review to increase inspection frequency of identified priority locations and integrate a proactive preventative cleaning schedule for these pipelines.
- Sewer Lateral Maintenance Program (SLMP): Repaired three laterals that were severely damaged requiring immediate repair. Crews also televised three laterals.
- Manhole Inspection Program: Crews inspected 100 manholes. Manholes are inspected for loose lids, debris, locking mechanisms, and status of infrastructure for future maintenance and rehabilitation. We are updating the program and processes for integration in our computerized maintenance management system.
- Sanitary Sewer Overflow (SSO) Reduction Program: Staff has located strategic areas within the collections system manholes to place SMART Manhole Monitoring Devices and staff is currently installing them. The live system monitoring began October 11, 2016. The use of "SMART Manholes" in strategic areas will be utilized to alert leadership staff within the division of potential SSOs. This program will also address the need for locking mechanisms.
- Closed Caption Televising (CCTV): Crews televised 6,726 feet of sewer main lines. The CCTV Preventative Maintenance inspects sewer mains to identify the condition and causes of blockages and SSOs. The lateral crew inspected 28 sites and televised eight public sewer laterals consisting of 280 linear feet.
- National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System: Crews pruned and removed 68 yards of green waste from various creeks and channels; removed 50 yards, 32 bags of trash, 1 tire, 3 mattresses, and 9 shopping carts of illegal dumping. Inspected and cleaned 4 catch basins and 331 feet of storm pipe. These activities ensure the City meets the federal Clean Water Act requirements of municipalities discharging storm water into waterways. Proactive preventative maintenance is restricted to the months of April through October.

#### Public Works Operations – Fleet Division

- Preventative Maintenance: 9 services on City vehicles as scheduled.
- Unscheduled Repairs: 61 unscheduled necessary repairs to City vehicles.

### Public Works Operations – Municipal Marina
