#### ANGELO QUINTO CRISIS RESPONSE TEAM

A humane approach to a mental health crisis

On May 25, 2020, the nation witnessed the brutality of the George Floyd incident, which ignited nationwide civil unrest, peaceful international demonstrations, and a collective societal chorus line demanding police reform and a non-police response to low-level, primarily mental health calls for service. On December 23, 2020, the City of Antioch had to brace itself for its own community tragedy involving one of its residents, Angelo Quinto, who was experiencing a bout with mental illness. Angelo Quinto was a 30-year-old Filipino American Navy veteran who died on December 26, 2020, from complications stemming from a law enforcement encounter.

City Council member Monica Wilson from District 4, with the support of Mayor Lamar Thorpe, advocated for creating a mental health crisis response team. This approach focuses on a nonviolent and non-life-threatening response to an individual experiencing an altered mental state. Instead, and based on copious research, the city council determined that citizens would be better served if well-trained civilians responded in low-level police calls for service.

This Pilot Program aims to provide community-focused, trauma-informed, and healing-centered call responses by well-trained non-police personnel who can increase impacted individuals' access and connection to timely, appropriate, and safe community-based services and resources.

In 2021, the City Council presented the operating name of Antioch Care Team (ACT) to the proposed pilot program. On Tuesday, October 25, 2022, the entire City of Antioch City Council voted unanimously to rename the Antioch Care Team to the Angelo Quinto Crisis Response Team.

The City Council also adopted a resolution that selected the Felton Institute to provide Non-Police Community Crisis Intervention Services. The Angelo Quinto Crisis Response Team Pilot Program will operate for a minimum two-year duration. On April 12, 2022, the City Council allocated operational costs of \$3.6 million. Let us remember mental health is not a crime and every person who suffers from mental health deserves to be treated and served with respect and dignity.



### **Travis Credit Union Project**

On October 25, 2022, the City Council approved the Travis Credit Union project at 3500 Hillcrest Avenue. The project scope includes the construction of a new 3,525-square-foot Travis Credit Union branch with a drive-up ATM and associated site improvements. The improvements include constructing a new parking lot, site lighting, landscaping, and stormwater detention basins. There will be a total of eleven full-time employees on a typical shift.

## **PUBLIC WORKS**

### Storm and Rain Season is upon us!

To report street flooding, fallen trees or limbs, plugged storm drains or culverts, traffic signals or streetlights out or street signs down please call (925) 779-6950 or email us at publicworks@antiochca.gov. The Public Works office is located at 1201 W 4th Street, and we are open to serve the public Monday through Friday from 7:00 am to 4:00 pm.


During storms, we will clear downed trees and limbs from the roadway, and clean-up crews will return to pick up debris after the storm. Our phones can become very busy during major storms, so we ask for your patience. Please use email to support our efforts to serve our customers as quickly and efficiently as possible. Our emergency standby crew is on call seven days a week, 24 hours a day, and in an after-hours emergency, dial (925) 778-2441.

The City's sandbag station is self-serve and open 24 hours a day for the storm's duration. The sandbag distribution site is located at the City's corporation yard at 1201 W 4th Street (enter at N Street). If you see a downed power line, assume it is energized and keep yourself and others away. Call 911 immediately to report the location of the downed line, then (800) 743-5002, PG&E's 24-Hour Emergency line. Click here for PG&E's Outage Map.



For your well-being and safety at home, keep a watchful eye for leaves and debris collecting in the curb and gutter to ensure the storm drains remain clear to prevent street flooding. Have battery-operated flashlights and radios with fresh batteries ready. Plan for alternate communication if you have a telephone system that requires electricity to work (such as a cordless phone or answering machine). Have a landline telephone handset and cellular telephone ready as a backup. If your property has a history of flooding, take advantage of the City's sandbag station BEFORE the storm hits. #### **Economic Development Strategic Plan**

On September 13th, the Antioch City Council adopted the "Reinvest Antioch" Economic Development Program – Action Plan and Toolkit. With the adoption of this document, the process of creating an economic development strategy is concluded, and staff will now begin the implement phases of the Action Plan.

- 3. Workforce Opportunity Initiative
- 4. Entrepreneurial Development/Startup Assistance
- 5. Direct Project Investment/Public-Private Partnerships
- 6. Leveraging Housing Demand to Promote Economic Development
- 7. Regional Interface/Advocacy
- 8. Funding/Resource Expansion
- 9. Coordination with City (and Other) Foundational Functions
