
This brings us to the pressing question, "what can we do together to ensure our public streets and sidewalks stay clean to our collective reasonable expectations and satisfaction"?

Habit Burger Aggravated Assault – Arrest

On November 12, 2022, at approximately 5:25 pm, the Antioch Police Department Dispatch Center began receiving calls of an assault that occurred at The Habit Burger Grill located at 2430 Mahogany Way in Antioch. Officers learned an employee was punched in the face multiple times after protecting an individual with an intellectual disability from being bullied. The victim lost her right eye as a result of the incident.

Our Investigations Bureau worked tirelessly to identify and locate the suspect over the last several weeks. Through that ongoing investigation, Isaac White-Carter, a 20-year-old resident of Hayward, was identified as the assailant. Antioch Police Department Special Operations Unit detectives collaborated with the United States Marshals Service (USMS) to locate Mr. White-Carter. USMS Agents with the Pacific Southwest Regional Fugitive Taskforce arrested White-Carter in Hayward, California, and turned him over to Antioch Police detectives. He has been arrested for the felony charges of mayhem and aggravated assault causing great bodily injury. Detectives will present their case to the Contra Costa County District Attorney's Office for prosecution.

We want to thank the Contra County Sheriff's Office, the United States Marshal's Service, and community members who came forward to assist with this investigation.

Youth Scholarship



Antioch Animal Services Receives \$59,500 Grant from California for All Animals (CA4AA)



Antioch Animal Services is joining animal welfare organizations across California to eliminate barriers to well-being. Antioch Animal Services received grant funds from California for All Animals to help reduce stress for the pets in the shelter by reimagining pet housing to **create better environments** for all sheltered pets. Over the next year, cat and dog housing throughout the shelter will be receiving updates, and some rooms will be relocated within the shelter to ensure each pet in our care is provided the least stressful environment possible during their stay in the shelter.

City of Antioch - Tobacco Ordinance

The City of Antioch Municipal Code (AMC) regulates the sale of tobacco products by retailers. The AMC regulates the establishment of new tobacco retailers and the sale of individual tobacco products. In general, the following regulations apply:

- New tobacco retailers are prohibited in the City of Antioch, except when at a convenience store, at a gas station or if the store is larger than 5,000 square feet. If a new market or other retail store opens, it may not sell tobacco products. Possession of a State Cigarette and Tobacco Products Retailer's License does not approve the sale of tobacco products in the City of Antioch.
- Existing tobacco retailers may continue to operate. However, effective January 1, 2023, cigarette stores (smoke shops) may not be sold or transferred to another party. A cigarette store is defined as using more than 20% of the floor area for tobacco product sales. This is verified through the City Business License process.
- Citywide the AMC and California State Law prohibit the sale of tobacco products with a characterizing flavor. This includes, but is not limited to, vapes/e-cigarettes, smokeless tobacco, and menthol cigarettes.
- Little cigars, commonly sold under the brand name of Swisher Sweets in packs of two, may not be sold in quantities of less than 20. A little cigar is defined as a small cigar weighing less than 1.36 grams.
- Cigars, which include traditional large cigars weighing 1.36 grams or more, may not be sold in quantities of less than 6.

Violation of the AMC is subject to enforcement by the Code Enforcement Division of the Community Development Department. If a retailer is found to be violating the City's regulations pertaining to tobacco products, it may be subject to citations as high as \$1,000 per day. Generally, violators are given a warning and an opportunity to correct any identified violations prior to citation.

Collections Divisions Close Circuit Television



The Collection Systems Inspection crew completes approximately 25% of sewer mainline video inspections of our sewer system each year. Completing these inspections and proactively conducting maintenance plays a vital role in protecting our collection systems, the environment, and the health and safety of the members of our community. The CCTV crew, as we call it, utilizes two highly trained staff members and a small tractor-mounted camera to identify, locate and assess the condition of the City's sewer and storm infrastructure. CCTV condition assessment provides the critical information needed to determine the service life, physical condition, and functionality of our 310 miles of wastewater and 282 miles of stormwater collection systems.

During the field inspection, pipe defects are classified using a standard coding system, and pipe condition is assessed using a systematic method to produce consistent, useful information. The collected data is reviewed by the Collection Systems management team and is used to assist in scheduling preventative and routine maintenance. This information is also used to make decisions about pipe rehabilitation and replacement and estimate our pipe's remaining useful life and long-term performance capabilities.



Sidewalk and Street Improvements

Redgwick Construction Co. is currently performing sidewalk and street improvements for the Capital Improvements project CDBG 678-9 Downtown Roadway Pavement Rehabilitation Phase 9 on West 8th Street between A and D Streets. The project is expected to be completed early next year. Traffic control and roadway detours should be expected in this area.



Construction at Water Treatment Plant

Construction is continuing at the Water Treatment Plant as crews replace existing filters, meters and valves with new ones.

- 8. Funding/Resource Expansion
- 9. Coordination with City (and Other) Foundational Functions
